





are only going to get worse as the winter months continue on.'

According to county officials, the ban will only effect rocket-type fireworks with fins. However, Barr, along with County Volunteer Fire Chief Tommy Sullivan, are imploring local residents to use extreme caution when dealing with any kind of ignition sources.

"The rockets pose the highest level of danger when it comes to starting a grass fire or wildfire," Sullivan said. "However, don't be fooled into thinking everything else is OK. Any kind of firework that produces heat or sparks can start a fire, even firecrackers and other items that don't normally take flight. The best way to avoid a problem is to just avoid shooting fireworks altogether."

Barr said a complete ban of fireworks sales during the holiday season would require support from the Texas Governor's office, something he isn't expecting at this point.

"I can place a ban on all fireworks for a 60-hour period, but 60 hours won't do much good," Barr said. "It takes the governor to sign a decree to make the ban last long enough to get us through the holiday, and right now

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I'm not expecting that to happen." Barr said he has spo-

ken with meteorologists at the state level and the outlook for West Texas at this point doesn't look very good going into 2012. "Without some serious

rain, we could be looking at a fire risk greater than what we had this time last year," Barr said ominously. "The meteorologists have all said the outlooks don't look favorable for rain between now and this coming spring and they are simply unwilling to try to guess beyond that. So no one really knows at this point what to expect. We really need to try to do everything we can to protect our county."

Barr said he hopes the continuation of the burn ban will help the county accomplish that, but it will take county residents observing it to really drive home the message.

"I think everyone remembers what we went through earlier this year and during the past couple of years. That re-

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up to the danger of these fires," Barr said. "We just want to keep that caution at the forefront of their thinking so we can avoid those kinds of conditions."

ally woke a lot of people

Sullivan said there are already so many different ways fire can start that are out of residents' control, it's vital to eliminate as many of the preventable fires as possible.

"It's an extremely dan-

gerous situation right now, and it's going to get worse as we move further into the winter months," Sullivan said. "There are plenty of ways fire can start, such as downed electrical lines or problems with the railroad tracks, so we need to do everything we can to keep the human causes of these grass and brush fires to a minimum."

This is a tribute to our visionaries

s islands go, it's a small one--32 miles long and 2.5 at its widest point--but thanks to the grit and determination of visionaries who dug

in 109 years ago, it's still on maps. Mother Nature almost eliminated Galveston Island during the Great Storm of 1900. Winds peaked at 145 MPH; the entire island was covered by raging flood waters seven feet deep.

Nature's calling card of carnage marked the nation's deadliest natural disaster. Fatality estimates range from 6,000-12,000, with most figures pegged at some 8,000. About 20% of the island's residents died, and many thousands fled, most never to return. Within two years, remaining

stalwarts didn't change the order of galaxies or alter the earth's orbit. But with grit and determination, they methodically took on two seemingly impossible tasks — to build a 17-foot seawall and to increase much of the island's surface by up to 17 additional feet above sea level. Their hope and prayer was that such herculean efforts would eliminate future historic disasters.

Visionaries remain strong. In 2002, the Port of Galveston, hoping to tap growing tourism interest, convinced Carnival Cruise Lines to add Galveston to its list of homeports. It was done, and the years since have been history-making, with leapfrog jumps in boardings each year. More than a million people will board cruise ships in Galveston in 2011.

So confident are Carnival leaders that their newest, most innovative vessel, the Magic, is

assigned to the Port of Galveston on a year-round basis. (With another vessel, the Carnival Triumph, also in Galveston, the cruise line expects to carry a record 450,000 cruisers in 2012.)

The arrival of the Magic in Galveston for its inaugural voyage resulted in unprecedented news coverage. Indeed, November 13-14 were red-letter days on cruise calendars. On the 13th, more than two

dozen media folks, several from out-of-state, were taking notes and shooting photographs during a 20-hour preview blitz of local attractions arranged by the Galveston Island Convention and Visitors Bureau. At the same time, the Carnival Magic was completing a 16-day trans-Atlantic voyage from Barcelona, where its initial cruises of the Mediterranean began May 1.

The \$830 million vessel docked in Galveston hours before daylight on the 14th, and with day's first light, motorists were slowly driving by. Children were eager to see the twin water slides atop the 15-deck vessel. Adults' imaginations whirled at recollections of innovations dominating the cruise conversation grapevine. ("Laid-back" describes the ship's ambiance. One example: "Gangway" signage is complete with definition — the "thingy" we use to get from ship to shore.)

Soon, U.S. immigration officials boarded as expected to check credentials of 1,400 crew members from more than 100 countries. Then came U.S. Department of Public Health officials. "Oh, no, the government is occupying Carnival," one writer exclaimed. (It is worthy of note that the Magic received a grade of 100 from the health officials.)

Dockside for some 36 hours, the Magic got once-overs — even twice-overs — from some 2,500 travel agents and tour directors on an overnight visit to check

out the ship. And 4,000 fans gathered for a Maroon 5 dockside concert of celebration.

Before lifting anchor, Carnival officials exchanged plaques, plaudits, promises and pleasantries with Port of Galveston leaders. Enthusiasm abounded concerning the future of what is now the nation's fourth-busiest homeport — number 1 outside of Florida, where the modern-day cruise industry began.

Throughout the cruise, "oohs and ahhhs" reached record

Truly, this 1,000-foot vessel is a marvel, already duly noted by national cruise writers. Galveston Island is a marvel, too, the latter likely unknown by most Texans. It is rich in history, offering attractions to augment

Prospective visitors will do well to visit www.galveston.com for details on an array of attractions. An additional three days tacked on either end of cruises can be well spent.

Until this century, Texans rarely included cruises in vacation conversations. Now, it is commonplace.

Carnival claims that one of its 19 North American homeports is within a day's driving distance of about half of all Americans.

Galveston CVB leaders say that 30 million folks live within 300 miles of their port. With the recent addition of the Royal Caribbean's Mariner of the Seas--plus Disney's Magic and Princess' Crown Princesss cheduled for seasonal cruises in 2012--Galveston is destined to become one of the world's most popular cruising homeports. The Carnival Magic, in a class by itself, defies description. It must be experienced.

Tycho Brahe described as what some say unlikely revolutionary

birthday of Danish as-(1546-1601), one of five key players in the 150-year long Copernican revolution – a revolution he didn't even fully support.

Up to their time, it was believed the Earth was the center of all creation, a view called the geocentric theory. In the 1530s, Nicolaus Copernicus (1473-1543)

postulated that the Sun was at the center, called the heliocentric theory – but he had no observational evidence to support his radical theory. With the newly invented telescope, Galileo Galilei (1564-1642) began finding supporting evidence in 1610, but using the then-prevailing view that planetary orbits are circular, the

convincing. About this same time, Johannes Kepler (1571-1634) discovered that planetary orbits are elliptical, not circular, and when this was applied to Copernicus' into place – although ironically Galileo was never convinced of elliptical orbits. The fifth player, Isaac Newton (1642-1727), in the 1680s discovered and set forth the laws of gravity to further explain planetary motions. So where did Tycho Brahe come in? He furnished the data without which mathematician Kepler would never have discovered elliptical orbits.

heliocentric theory still wasn't

The son of a prominent Danish nobleman, Tycho's life was both colorful and full of ironies. At age 2 he was kidnapped and raised by an uncle and aunt. Before his birth his parents promised him to his father's brother

ecember 14 is the 465th and wife as they were unable to have children, however after his tronomer Tycho Brahe birth, his parents began to have second thoughts – so he was kidnapped. Apparently, no hard feelings resulted as the families remained close.

> Tycho received an education befitting a nobleman, but he also had a brash tempestuousness about him that he came to regret on occasions. At age 20, he got into a duel and suffered a disfiguring injury when his rival's sword removed the bridge of his nose. Being a resourceful chap, he fashioned a prosthetic nosepiece of silver and gold which he affixed with a wax paste and wore the rest of his life.

At the age of 25 he fell in love with Kirstin, a Lutheran minister's daughter. Since she was a commoner and he a nobleman they couldn't officially marry, so they lived together as husband and wife, establishing a common-law marriage. It lasted 30 years until Tycho's death, and produced eight children, six of whom lived to adulthood.

His family intended that he go into law, but being star-struck at age 13 by a solar eclipse, he began his own personal astronomical studies along with his other formal studies. He quickly recognized the imprecision and inconsistencies of the astronomical books and charts of the day, and at age 17, set forth his life goal when he wrote:

"I've studied all available charts of the planets and stars and none of them match the others. There are just as many measurements and methods as there are astronomers and all of them disagree. What's needed is a long term project with the aim of mapping the heavens conducted from a single location over a period of several years." Truly remarkable for a renaissance

teenager. In 1573, he wrote De Stella Nova about a "new star" he had

observed the previous year now known as Supernova 1572.

In 1576, at age 29, Tycho was given, by the king of Denmark, the small island of Hven and funds for the construction of an observatory. Here he spent much of the next 20 years making the observations for which he is famous.

He constructed many of his own astronomical instruments and invented others. Born with exceptional eyesight, he became one of the great observers in astronomical history. Ironically he died eight years before the invention of the telescope – the instrument that revolutionized observational astronomy.


With remarkable precision, he charted the locations of 777 stars and compiled tables of motions of the then-known five planets. Shortly before his death, Tycho was joined by the 29-year old mathematician Johannes Kepler in what proved to be a scientifically fateful collaboration. They worked together only a year or so, but following Tycho's death, Kepler used Tycho's 20 years of measurements of the positions of Mars to discover the elliptical nature of planetary orbits – an enormously significant contribution to the Copernican revolu-

Ironically, although Tycho was a contemporary of Galileo, there is no indication they ever met. In fact, Galileo, 18 years younger, was a mathematics professor who didn't get into astronomy seriously until after Tycho's death.

While Tycho reportedly admired Copernicus, he never knew him, having been born three years after Copernicus died. Furthermore, he never came to agree with Copernicus' heliocentric theory, and even came up with his own theory, known as the Tychonic system, which enjoyed favor for a time.

Yet, it was his accurate and meticulously recorded observations that doomed his own theory and led to the eventual acceptance of Coperni-

Tycho Brahe died rather suddenly at the age of 54, and the cause of his death is still a mystery. Initially attributed to kidney stone complications, his body was exhumed in 1901 and when no stones were found, the cause of death was cited as uremia. Later studies found toxic levels of mercury in his body – he has also dabbled in alchemy - and it is now believed he died from mercury poisoning.

As voting nears, ad wars get intense

NEW YORK (AP) — The crush of presidential campaign ads is here.

Less than five weeks before voting begins in the 2012 presidential contest, the Republican candidates are stepping up their presence over the TV airwaves and online. Super PACs have been running ads. and the Democratic National Committee is doing its best to try to weaken a leading GOP contender, former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney.

President Barack Obama has even tiptoed into the fray with a limited ad buy soliciting volunteers for his cam-

"We've been waiting for it to start, and it's been a little slower in Iowa and New Hampshire than we expected. But that doesn't say anything about what's going to happen next, and in the coming year," said Ken Goldstein, president of the Campaign Media Analysis Group, which tracks ad spending.

The new, more aggressive advertising phase comes as the Republican field remains deeply unsettled before the Iowa caucuses Jan. 3. The New Hampshire primary follows on Jan. 10.

The field may become more volatile still. After months of training their attacks primarily on Obama, a Democrat seeking his second term, the Republicans are beginning to assail one another.

This emerging ad crush poses particular challenges for Romney, who polls at or near the top of the field in the early states but has failed to consolidate support behind his candidacy. While he's tried to run a general election strategy focused on beating Obama, he's been the target of attacks from both his GOP rivals and the DNC.

Romney's campaign began running its first TV ad just last week, in New Hampshire, and it immediately drew crit-

The ad criticizes Obama's handling of the economy and appears to quote the president from the 2008 campaign saying, "If we keep talking about the economy, we're going to lose." But the quote is misleading — Obama was paraphrasing a comment from an aide to then-Republican rival John McCain. Romney has stood by the ad, saying the quote is fair game.

Romney's campaign announced Thursday it would begin running ads in Iowa, signaling he has decided to compete fully in the state after steering clear of it for much of the campaign. Romney spent about \$10 million in Iowa in 2008 only to lose the caucuses to former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee.

Romney's rivals, meanwhile, have sharpened their

attacks on him.

Former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman has launched a tough web ad against Romney, using a tense interview Romney gave with Fox News earlier this week as a pretext to renew criticism of Romney as a flip-flopper on key issues. Our Destiny, a super PAC supporting Huntsman, has spent \$650,000 on an ad in New Hampshire indirectly hitting Romney.

Huntsman, the ad promises, won't be a "phony who tells me one thing and you another."

The DNC has also gotten in the game, producing a TV spot likening Romney's shifting positions to "two men trapped in one body." The ad is being aired in a handful of swing states, and it garnered considerable publicity in national news outlets.

But Romney isn't the only target.

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who has surged to the top of many recent polls. has come under withering attack from rival Ron Paul. The Texas congressman released a scathing web video painting Gingrich as a shape-shifting mercenary who has changed position on key issues because of lucrative consulting contracts with the housing giant Freddie Mac, the health care industry and others.

Romney gently pokes Ging-

rich in his new Iowa ad, which closes with a shot of Romney and his wife of 42 years, Ann, walking through a corn field and holding hands. It's a notso-subtle contrast with Gingrich, who has been married 3 times and has acknowledged infidelity in his first two mar-

Gingrich hasn't aired commercials yet but his rising popularity has fueled a burst of fundraising success that could fund some advertising in the coming weeks, campaign officials said.

Texas Gov. Rick Perry has devoted more resources to TV advertising than anyone in the field. His campaign took the un-

usual step of buying ads on

the national Fox News network, an expensive gamble aimed at boosting his credibility with conservatives following several weak debate performances. The campaign has also

spent more than \$2 million on television in Iowa, including a special "one time only" ad making light of Perry's recent flub of which Cabinet departments he'd eliminate. The ad was paired with Perry's appearance Thursday on NBC's "The Tonight Show."

A pro-Perry super PAC, Make Us Great Again, has spent nearly \$900,000 to run ads in Iowa, New Hampshire and South Carolina, another

early voting state.

The ad blitz hasn't done much to boost Perry's standing in the race.

Most polls show him trailing many rivals in the early states, including Romney, Gingrich, Paul and businessman Herman Cain. Cain, who briefly topped many polls until he was hit

with sexual harassment allegations last month, released a new ad promoting his business credentials Thursday in part to insist his campaign remains on track.

But it's unclear whether the ad is actually airing any-

A Georgia woman came forward this week claiming to have had a 13-year affair with Cain, and while he has denied the allegations he has said campaign contributions have dried up and he's reassessing whether to stay in the race.

Obama, meanwhile, has appeared in two new re-election ads urging people to volunteer for his campaign. "Don't sit this one out," the president says, apparently trying to counter the expectation that the intense grassroots interest in his candidacy in

He wins the club with the queen and leads a diamond. West plays the queen, dummy the king and East, very alertly, the deuce. If East plays the ace instead of the deuce, South has an easy time of it. Whatever East returns, South can cash the J-10 of diamonds and concede a diamond to the nine to acquire his ninth trick. But if East ducks the king of dia-

monds, and also the jack, South goes down one. It is not really difficult to find this defense, because East knows West's queen is a singleton, and that by ducking twice he can limit dummy to two diamond tricks. However, just as East can read the


queen as a singleton, so can South, and if he pays close attention to his knitting, he can make the contract anyway. He simply allows West's queen to hold the first diamond trick! This play makes mincemeat of

It is not easy for declarer to think of ducking the queen of diamonds when West plays it. One would tend to cover the queen with the king instinctively without giving the matter much thought. The moral is that you should look before you leap.

Woman, 81, unharmed

Hickman says the plane went down near the back of one house, damaging a storage room and a garage before traveling across an alley and smashing into the elderly woman's home. The house caught fire and was destroyed.

GRAND PRAIRIE (AP) — A North Texas worker hanging Christmas lights on a historic building has died after being electrocuted.

Grand Prairie police say the man was moving a 40-foot-tall aluminum ladder when it fell onto power lines Friday morning. He had been standing on the ground but was still holding onto the ladder.

Police say 51-year-old Jens "Renee" Gardner died at a hospital, where he was taken after emergency personnel started CPR at the scene.

Feds appeal judge's fine for La. oil spill

LAFAYETTE, La. (AP) — The Justice Department is appealing a judge's ruling that CITGO Petroleum pay only \$9 million out of the more than \$240 million in penalties government attorneys had sought in a 2006 oil spill at the company's Lake Charles refinery.

U.S. District Judge Richard Haik ruled in September that CITGO should pay \$6 million to the federal government and \$3 million to the state government in a federal Clean Water Act lawsuit pursued by the Justice Department.

During a trial earlier this year, The Advocate reports (http://bit.ly/snCE94) reports federal attorneys had asked for at least \$247 million in penalties, noting the magnitude of the oil spill and alleging that CITGO put profits before safety.

Justice Department spokesman Wyn Hornbuckle declined to comment Thursday on details of the appeal arguments, citing a policy of not discussing pending litigation.

The lawsuit was filed in response to a June 2006

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spill that occurred when heavy rains caused the overflow of two tanks holding "slop oil," a mix of oil, water and other waste from the refinery.

CITGO did not deny its fault in the spill but had argued against the penalties sought by the Justice Department and disputed the government's figures on how much waste oil flowed into area waterways, including the Calcasieu River.

CITGO argued that about 54,000 barrels of waste oil leaked out, while government experts put the amount at 76,800.

The figure is important in Clean Water Act cases

The figure is important in Clean Water Act cases because the number of spilled barrels is generally used in calculating the penalty.

Bush starts health project in Zambia

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) — Former U.S. President George W. Bush and his wife have launched a project in Zambia to expand the availability of cervical cancer screening, treatment and breast care education.

The George W. Bush Institute said in a statement

Friday that Zambia is the first country to become part of the Pink Ribbon Red Ribbon project. The Bushes were in the country Friday.

The Bush institute, the U.S. President's Emer-

gency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), the U.N. AIDS agency and Susan G. Komen for the Cure are working together on the project, bringing public and private funds to the effort.

Bush, who launched PEPFAR in 2003, says "It's

not acceptable to save a woman's life from HIV/AIDS and watch her die from cervical cancer."

Weekly US oil and gas rig count drops by 7

HOUSTON (AP) — The number of rigs actively

exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. dropped by seven this week to 1,993. Houston-based drilling product provider Baker

Hughes Inc. reported Friday that 1,132 rigs were exploring for oil and 856 for natural gas. Five were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago this week Baker Hughes reported 1,713 active rigs.

Of the major oil- and gas-producing states, North

Dakota and Oklahoma each gained one rig.

Colorado and Texas each lost four rigs, Louisiana lost two, and New Mexico and Pennsylvania each lost one. Alaska, Arkansas, California, West Virginia and Wyoming were unchanged.

The rig count peaked at 4,530 in 1981. A low of 488 was recorded in 1999.

3 Dallas police officers hurt working wrecks

DALLAS (AP) — Three Dallas police officers have been hurt while trying to clear two unrelated Interstate 635-area wrecks on a rainy morning.

Police say two officers were injured around 2 a.m.

Friday when a tractor-trailer rig hit two parked squad cars.

Police say both officers were transported to Park-

land Memorial Hospital, where one was treated and released. The other remained for observation.

The second accident happened around 2:30 a.m.

The second accident happened around 2:30 a.m. Friday when a stopped patrol car was hit from behind by another vehicle. Police say the squad car's gas tank ruptured, leading to a hazardous materials spill. One officer was transported to Parkland for observation.

Names of the three officers weren't immediately released.

Bay City woman shot by spouse remains critical

BAY CITY (AP) — A Southeast Texas woman shot three times by her husband, who then fatally shot their four children before killing himself, remains in critical condition two days after the attack.

A spokesman for Memorial Hermann-Texas Medical Center in Houston said Laura Gonzalez of Bay City remained hospitalized Friday.

Gonzalez last month went to a battered women's shelter after allegedly being assaulted by Jose Avila. Police say Gonzalez declined to press charges.

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

In or out? Cain to announce whether he'll stay in GOP race

ATLANTA (AP) — Herman Cain is keeping supporters in suspense as he readies an announcement on whether to abandon his campaign for the Republican presidential nomination following a string of sexual harassment allegations and a claim of an extramarital affair.

The Georgia businessman planned to make the announcement Saturday at what was supposed to be a festive grand opening of a new headquarters in Atlanta, rented when Cain sat surprisingly atop the GOP pack.

With the candidate's poll numbers plummeting and fundraising stalled, some campaign aides said privately they expected him to exit the race. But Cain spokesman J.D. Gordon cautioned late Friday that no decision had been made.

A meeting with key staff members was expected early Saturday.

Cain returned to his suburban Atlanta home Friday and met with his wife, Gloria, the first time they have seen each other face to face since 46-year-old Ginger White came forward on Monday and said she and the Republican had carried on a 13-year relationship.

Sandusky says Paterno never discussed alleged incident with him

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky said Joe Paterno never spoke to him about any suspected misconduct with minors, the New York Times reported Saturday.

Sandusky has been charged with 40 counts of molesting eight boys over 15 years and is free on bail while awaiting a preliminary hearing on Dec. 13.

Penn State's board of trustees fired Paterno on Nov. 9 because it felt the football coach didn't go far enough in alerting authorities after an assistant coach said he told Paterno he saw Sandusky assaulting a young boy in the football building showers in March 2002.

During a lengthy interview at his lawyer's home, Sandusky told the newspaper he and Paterno never spoke about the alleged 2002 incident or a 1998 child molestation complaint investigated by the Penn State campus police.

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"I never talked to him about either one," Sandusky said. "That's all I can say. I mean, I don't know." He worked for Paterno for nearly 30 years.

Presidential campaigns doing more to track voters across the Web

NEW YORK (AP) — As they peruse the Internet, voters in New Hampshire and Iowa are probably seeing ads for Mitt Romney and President Barack Obama alongside those for shoes and holiday gifts. The ads will then follow those voters around the Web, popping up on news sites, Google searches and on social networking sites like Facebook.

Online advertising, once used primarily as a way to reach young and heavily wired consumers, has emerged as an essential communications tool in the 2012 presidential contest. While few expect Web ads to supplant television commercials anytime soon, strategists say online ads may be the most nimble, efficient and cost-effective way to reach voters.

"Online advertising cuts through because of its ability to target. It's unparalleled in any other medium," said Romney's digital director, Zac Moffatt. "TV may be more effective for driving a big message, but per usage, the Internet is more powerful. We are probably one presidential cycle from everyone believing that."

Web ads can take many forms, from small display boxes to clickable videos to 15- or 30-second commercials known as "pre-rolls" a viewer sees before the start of a news clip or YouTube video.

Targeting is key. While campaigns invest heavily in television ads to reach a mass audience, Web ads are geared specifically to people based on their ZIP code, demographics and, most importantly, their Internet browsing history.

2.6 million Afghans at risk of hunger from severe drought

MAZAR-E-SHARIF, Afghanistan (AP) — Zara, an Afghan mother of seven, doesn't know what to tell her children when they ask about dinner.

"I simply tell them that we must wait until their father gets home to see if he's going to bring anything," she said, speaking from under a dusty blue burqa covering her from head to toe.

Zara, who uses just one name, is one of an estimated 2.6 million Afghans facing food shortages after one of the worst droughts to strike northern Afghanistan in a decade, according to Afghan officials and aid agencies. Already living in poverty in a country at war, many have been left destitute by the drought, which has affected 14 of Afghanistan's 34 provinces — all in the north.

Wells have dried up. Hundreds of children have been treated for malnutrition. Families are selling their animals at below-market prices. People are moving to cities to try to find food, water, work and, in some cases, a refuge from the fighting.

The Afghan government and aid agencies are racing to help them before snow blocks access to remote areas.

As Putin plans to stay in power, many Russians want to leave

MOSCOW (AP) — Natalia Lepleiskaya is just the sort of person today's Russia needs — a successful young IT manager who does charity work in her free time.

But frustrated by what she describes as the corruption and stagnation around her, she and her husband are packing their bags to start a new life

in Canada.
"I don't see how I can change things ... and I don't want to waste my youth on it," said the 29-year-old, who moved to Moscow from a provincial city several years ago and rose to a senior position at a top technological company.

As Vladimir Putin's party prepares to dominate weekend parliamentary elections in a prelude to his planned return to the presidency in spring, an increasing number of Russians are contemplating leaving their homeland in search of a brighter future abroad. A March presidential election victory for Putin — all but taken for granted — raises the

prospect of his being in the top job for 12 years.

Disenchantment with life in Russia was growing even before Prime Minister Putin and President Dmitry Medvedev agreed in September to swap jobs,

McGovern hospitalized after falling prior to TV interview

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Former Democratic presidential candidate George McGovern was being treated at a hospital in South Dakota after falling and hitting his head on the pavement outside a library bearing his name.

McGovern's daughter Ann McGovern said her father was to be treated at a Sioux Falls hospital after being flown by helicopter from Mitchell, S.D., where a live C-SPAN interview was to take place at the Dakota Wesleyan University's McGovern Library on Friday.

"He had just walked from home to the center. He lives literally just across the street," Ann McGovern told The Associated Press.

McGovern has lived in St. Augustine, Fla., since 2008 but also has a home in Mitchell.

Friends and faculty who had gathered at the library for the C-SPAN taping said McGovern fell at about 5:15 p.m. — less than two hours before the program began. A former South Dakota senator, McGovern, 89, was "bleeding profusely" but was conscious and talking as he was taken from the university by ambulance, said Donald Simmons, dean of the College of Public Service.

Top UN official confident rich nations will renew CO2 pledges

DURBAN, South Africa (AP) — The top U.N. climate official said Saturday she is confident industrial countries will renew their pledges to cut greenhouse gas emissions after their current commitments expire next year.

Further commitments under the 1997 Kyoto Protocol, an unshakable demand by poor countries, would avert a feared derailment of U.N. negotiations, but would mark little advancement toward the goal of a rapid and steep drop in worldwide car-

bon emissions blamed for climate change.

The protocol's future has been in doubt because rich countries have conditioned its continuation on an agreement by nations such as China, India, Brazil and South Africa to also accept binding emis-

sions targets for themselves in the future.

"Countries are here these two weeks exactly talking about how they are going to go into a second commitment period of the Kyoto Protocol," U.N. official Christiana Figueres told The Associated Press.

"The discussion this week is not about the 'if,' it's about the 'how.' That doesn't mean that we are out of the thick of it," she said. Delegates are discussing participation, the legal form of the rules and all of the conditions that will define the second commitment period, she said.



James ran for 219 yards and three touchdowns against UCLA, setting a league record with three straight 1,500-yard seasons, will bolt to the NFL next season.

While James celebrated with his teammates after the victory, UCLA coach Rick Neuheisel paused before Bruins fans at Autzen Stadium and tipped his hat.

The former UCLA quarterback was fired this week after four seasons at his alma mater.

Neuheisel was fired following last weekend's 50-0 loss to No. 9 Southern California, in what turned out to be a wave of coaching moves around the Pac-12. Arizona State let go of Dennis Erickson. Washington State parted ways with Paul Wulff, then quickly hired former Texas Tech coach Mike Leach a day later.

The Bruins were granted permission this week from the NCAA to accept a bowl invitation despite their losing

"We made it a game, at least for a time. I was thrilled that we got that kind of effort, given the events of the last week," Neuheisel said. "I just am excited for these guys. They get one more game. They'll find out where here soon."

With his three TDs, James moved into a tie with USC's second on the league's career rushing TD list with 52.

James ran 30 yards for a touchdown on Oregon's first drive. He went into the game as the nation's top running back with an average of 142.7 yards per game.

UCLA tied it when linebacker Patrick Larimore intercepted Darron Thomas and ran 35 yards for a touchdown. Neuheisel pumped his fist in celebration.

Thomas scored on a 10-yard keeper and then found true freshman tight end Colt Lyerla alone in the end zone with a 7-yard scoring pass to make it 21-7.

UCLA narrowed it with quarterback Kevin Prince's flea-flicker to Nelson Rosario for a 37-yard touchdown, but James added a 3-yard scoring run to make it 28-14 before Thomas connected with Daryle Hawkins for a 25-yard TD reception.

UCLA's Tyler Gonzalez kicked a 44-yard field goal to make it 37-17 at halftime.

Prince scored on a 1-yard run early in the third quarter to pull UCLA closer to the Ducks, but James answered with a 5-yard TD dash to make it 42-24.

A Heisman Trophy finalist last season as a sophomore, James fell out of the running for the most part this season because he missed two games with a dislocated right el-

There has been speculation all season last season that James may leave for the NFL after this season.

David Paulson caught a 22yard touchdown pass midway through the third, which put Darron Thomas in front of Danny O'Neil (1991-94) for most passing TDs at Oregon. Thomas has 63.

Rosario pulled down a one-

handed, 19-yard touchdown pass from Prince with less than two minutes to play. Rosario finished with six catches for 98 yards.

Prince completed 13 of 26 passes for 164 yards and two touchdowns.

Oregon was stung early in the game when dynamic true freshman De'Anthony Thomas fumbled after a hit by Tevin McDonald. Shaken up on the play, the versatile running back who earlier this week was named the Pac-12's co-freshman of the year on offense did not return.

Oregon coaches said after the game the injury was not serious.

The addition of Colorado and Utah to the Pac-12 paved the way for a league championship game this season. In previous years, the team with the best conference record claimed the title.

While No. 9 USC (10-2, 7-2) finished atop the Pac-12 South, the Trojans are ineligible to play in the postseason because of NCAA sanctions, which put UCLA in the title game.

Because of Neuheisel's dismissal, offensive coordinator Mike Johnson will take over if UCLA is selected to play in a bowl game. The NCAA granted permission to the Bruins to play in a bowl despite their losing record.

The Bruins have reached just one bowl in the past three seasons. Athletic director Dan Guerrero said he wants to reward the Bruins' 18 seniors by going to a bowl even while the program is in upheaval.

Oregon went to the 2010 Rose Bowl in its first season under Kelly, losing to Ohio State. Last season the Ducks went to the BCS championship, where they fell to Au-

"They've taken everything that I ever did for any young person and twisted it to say that my motives were sexual or whatever," Sandusky told the Times. "I had kid after kid after kid who might say I was a father figure. And they just twisted that all."

He is accused of mining the ranks of his Second Mile charity to find underprivileged boys to abuse. Sandusky also said that the charity never restricted his access to children until he became the subject of a criminal investigation in 2008.

He said he regularly gave money to the disadvantaged boys at his charity, opened bank accounts for them and gave them gifts that had been donated to the charity. "I tried to reward them sometimes with a little money in

hand, just so that they could see something," he said. "But more often than not, I tried to set up, maybe get them to save the money, and I put it directly into a savings account established for them." "I never bought a computer for any kid; I had a computer

given to me to give to a kid. I never bought golf clubs. People gave things because they knew there would be kids. They wanted to get rid of things." Asked about his physical interaction with children who

were not his own, Sandusky said that aspect of the relationships "just happened that way." "I think a lot of the kids really reached out" for wrestling

and hugging, he said. The paper said he grew most animated when talking about

his relationships with children and most disconsolate when he spoke of Paterno and Penn State.





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Manning looks to be passing the ball soon

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Pevton Manning could soon be throwing footballs to his teammates, the best news Colts fans have heard since this miserable season began.

While the Colts and the fourtime league MVP are still trying to find out what the next part of his rehabilitation program entails, lifting weights and throwing balls are apparently going to be part of it. "Throwing will be part of

the next progression," Manning said Friday before heading back to the team's weight room. "I will be doing some throwing and I have been doing some throwing. But now we're going to ramp it up a little more."

Manning called the news encouraging and said he would like to practice or even play

this season if he's cleared.

Vice chairman Bill Polian said he is pleased with Manning's progress

"It's great news that the fusion has healed," Polian said after speaking at the Big Ten Football Awards Gala. "It's on schedule, so we just keep going from here."

It was welcome news in a winless season that began with Manning underdoing his third neck surgery in 19 months back on Sept. 8. He has not practiced since having a single-level spinal fusion that doctors hope will not only alleviate pressure on a damaged nerve that had caused weakness in Manning's throwing arm but allow the 35-year-old quarterback to return to his perennial Pro Bowl status.

Indy (0-11) has kept Man-

ning on the active roster all season with the hope that he may start throwing at practice before the Jan. 1 seasonfinale at Jacksonville. He just

On Thursday night, the team issued a statement from Dr. Robert Watkins who said the fusion had healed firmly enough for Manning to increase the intensity of his workouts.

Those at the team complex are still trying to figure out what Manning can do.

"I don't know. I really don't know," coach Jim Caldwell said when asked about Manning's rehab program. "I just know they've been pretty cautious with what they've allowed him to do. I just know he's not practicing today. I know that."

The Manning story was newsy on a busy day in Indianapolis, where the inaugural Big Ten football championship is being played Saturday night and basketball fans are celebrating the return of the Pacers and the resurgence of the Indiana Hoosiers (7-0).

Even before Manning walked into the room, his locker was surrounded by so many reporters that teammates started joking about the entourage. Some simply laughed. Pro Bowl defensive end Robert Mathis climbed a cameraman's unoccupied stool to get a view from above. One player asked whether President Obama was expected in the locker room and when another asked what was going on, Pro Bowl receiver Reggie Wayne quipped: "He's

retiring."

Manning was not amused by the media horde, which had anticipated a medical update Wednesday.

"There is no schedule, there never has been. I think we have checkpoints here, and I don't know when the next one is," he said during a 12½-minute question-andanswer session. "But I hope they don't announce it, so y'all won't be here on decision day like Wednesday supposedly was.'

best decision for him.

"The intent all along was to put himself in a position to explore any opportunities as they present themselves. He could not do that while he was a member of the Minnesota Vikings." Vikings coach Leslie

Frazier knew McNabb from their days together in Philadelphia, and he hand-picked the veteran to serve as a bridge between Brett Favre and rookie Christian Pon-

Frazier was convinced a rough season in Washington in 2010 was a fluke and McNabb could help the first-year head coach avoid a rebuilding season in Minnesota. Playing behind a leaky

offensive line and with a lack of playmaking receivers in the passing game, McNabb struggled to get the Vikings offense off the ground. He completed 60 percent of his passes for 1,026 yards with four touchdowns and two interceptions in six games. But he only completed five passes of 25 yards or more and was benched in the fourth quarter of a blowout loss in Chicago that dropped the Vikings to 1-5.

Ponder took over as the starter the following week, and McNabb pushed for his release when he realized that there would be no chance for him to see the field for the rest of the season. The Vikings (2-9) obliged on Thursday and picked up Sage Rosenfels off waivers from Miami to fill Mc-Nabb's roster spot.

That leaves the future of a highly decorated quarterback — six Pro Bowls, five NFC championship games, a Super Bowl appearance and more than 37,000 yards passing — very much in doubt. After leading the Eagles so proudly for 11 seasons, the 34-year-old McNabb has stumbled in his last two stops in Washington and Minne-

Smith said McNabb "still feels he can play at a high level today."

There was talk of his hometown Bears putting a claim in on Mc-Nabb after they lost starter Jay Cutler to a broken thumb. But the Bears declined to do so, hoping that Caleb Hanie can steer them to the playoffs before Cutler is healthy enough to return to the field.

After passing through waivers, McNabb is free to sign with any team, and Smith said that playing time wouldn't necessarily be the top priority.

"At the end of the day, at this stage of his career, the most important thing for him is winning a Super Bowl," Smith said. "That's what he wanted in Minnesota, that's what he wanted in Washington and that's what he wanted in Philadelphia. If he moves to another team, that's what he'll want there."

But will that next opportunity come as a starter? Frazier said Thursday he still believes McNabb has a future in the NFL, but he hesitated when asked if it was as a starter.

"I'm not certain about that," Frazier said. "It depends."


