Hit & run

Autopsy confirms homicide ruling on Padron death By THOMAS JENKINS

Preliminary autopsy results on a Big Spring man who died shortly after being found in a roadway last week confirm he was the victim of a hit and run incident, according to law enforcement officials.

Eleutario Torres Padron, 62, was discovered in the roadway by passerbys Thursday evening near the intersection of Sgt. Paredez and Trades Avenue on the city's north side, according to police reports.

Howard County Justice of the Peace Kathryn Wiseman said Monday preliminary autopsy results confirm Padron was struck by a vehicle before being left in the road.

"He suffered two collapsed lungs as a result," Wiseman said. "He died shortly after arriving at Scenic Mountain Medical Center. The autopsy leaves no doubt he was hit by a vehicle. His death has been ruled a homicide.'

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County OKs jail expenditures

Howard County commissioners approved a number of routine items Monday, including a \$1,300 expenditure

at the county jail that will make it easier to house inmates, according to jail officials.


According to Jail Administrator Mike Dawson, the inability to isolate water sources in jail cells — specifi-

cally to showers and sinks has made it tough to house a smaller number of inmates than designed for the areas.

Dawson

However, some rather inexpensive valves and some plumbing know-how will fix that problem, Dawson told commissioners.

"The total cost of the project is \$1,300, and that's for the valves," Dawson said during Monday's meeting.

"We need some half-inch valves to isolate the plumbing in the cells. We also need some valves in the laundry areas," he added.

"The \$1,300 is for materials only. We have a master licensed plumber on staff who is going to do the work. I recently had County Judge

(Mark) Barr out at the jail and I corralled him and showed him what it would take. It could really save us some money in the long run."

Barr agreed, saying the work could be done at a minimal cost to the county.


"It's not a very big job at all," Barr said. "You're talking about going in and putting in a nipple and a valve. I think it's a good idea. In the long run I think it's going to

be a really good idea." Commissioners approved the expense on a unanimous

vote. Another project the court approved — but not quite as excitedly — was the \$2,500 cost for the repair of a decorative mailbox in the county. According to Road and Bridge Administrator Eddy Jameson, the mailbox, constructed mainly of brick, was struck by a driver in his department while working on a county

According to county officials, the damage is not covered by county insurance



It's not if, but how big Romney wins in New Hampshire

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) — While Mitt Romney is the overwhelming favorite to win the New Hampshire presidential primary, the size of his expected victory could help shape upcoming contests in South Carolina and Florida.

Romney's five opponents will try to shrug off a convincing victory as the expected outcome for a former Massachusetts governor who owns a vacation home here. But a narrow win in the nation's first presidential primary - or a surprisingly strong finish from one of his rivals — will be played up as more evidence that Republicans still have their doubts about Romnev. Those doubts were on display in Dixville Notch,

the tiny New Hampshire village that traditionally votes at midnight. Romney and Jon Huntsman each received two of the six votes cast; Newt Gingrich and Ron Paul received a vote apiece. The rest of New Hampshire voters go to the polls

Tuesday after receiving months of attention from the Republican candidates and witnessing an increasingly sharp tone in the intraparty struggle for the nomination. "If I am president of the United States, I will not

forget New Hampshire," Romney said during a Monday night rally in Bedford, hinting at the impact of Tuesday's contest while surrounded on by his wife, children and grandchildren.

Bomb targeting anti-Taliban militia kills 25 people in Pakistan PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — A bomb targeting

a militia opposed to the Pakistani Taliban exploded in a market close to the Afghan border Tuesday, killing 25 people in the deadliest blast in the country in several months, officials said.

The explosion, likely detonated by remote control, hit vehicles being used by the militia in the Khyber region, said local security officer Khan Dad Khan. It also wounded 24 people, said local govern-

Supreme Court weighs validity of broadcast TV regulation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court is considering whether government regulators may still police the airwaves for curse words and other coarse content at a time when so many Americans have unregulated cable television, and the Internet is awash in easily accessible adult material. The justices are hearing arguments Tuesday in a

First Amendment case that pits the Obama administration against the nation's television networks. The material at issue includes the isolated use of expletives as well as fines against broadcasters who showed a woman's nude buttocks on a 2003 episode of ABC's "NYPD Blue." The broadcasters want the court to overturn a 1978

decision that upheld the Federal Communications Commission's authority to regulate both radio and television content, at least during the hours when children are likely to be watching or listening. That period includes the prime-time hours before 10 p.m. At the very least, the networks say the FCC's cur-

rent policy is too hard to figure out, penalizing the use of particular curse words on awards programming but not in the airing of the movie "Saving Private Rvan." for example. The administration said that even with the explo-

sion of entertainment options, broadcast programming remains dominant. It also needs to be kept as a dependable "safe haven" of milder programming, the administration said.

Ahmadinejad defends Iran's nuclear program

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad defended his country's nuclear program as he began a four-nation tour of Latin America, joining his ally Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez in accusing the U.S. and its allies of using the dispute to unjustly threaten Iran.

Both leaders dismissed U.S. concerns about Iran's intentions in the Middle East and its growing diplomatic ties with Chavez and his allies in Latin

"They accuse us of being warmongers," Chavez said. "They're the threat."

Both leaders planned to travel to Nicaragua on Tuesday for the inauguration of newly re-elected President Daniel Ortega, and then Ahmadinejad will also visit Cuba and Ecuador.

The Iranian leader is using the visit to tout relationships with some of his close friends shortly after the U.S. imposed tougher sanctions on Iran over its nuclear program.

Mo. woman's quest could mean Medal of Honor for her father

LABADIE, Mo. (AP) — It was bravery at the highest level: William Shemin defied German machine gun fire to sprint across a World War I battlefield and pull wounded comrades to safety. And he did so no fewer than three times.

Then, with the platoon's senior soldiers wounded or killed, the 19-year-old American took over command of his unit and led it to safety, even after a bullet pierced his helmet and lodged behind an

Yet Shemin never earned the nation's highest military citation, the Medal of Honor — a result, many suspected, of the fact that he was Jewish at a time when discrimination ran rampant.

Although there was some trouble finding Padron's next of kin following his death, Wiseman said they have been located and arrangements have been made for the 62-year old man. "His next of kin has been notified and his body will be transported to Mexico for burial,' Wiseman said.

According to Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the Big Spring Police Department, Padron's body was discovered lying in

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the roadway in the 600 block of Sgt. Paredez Street shortly after 7 p.m. Thursday.

"Officers found a severely injured male who was transported to the emergency room by ambulance," Everett said. "At this time all evidence in the case in-

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dicates the victim was struck by a vehicle. He was found by a passerby who notified police."

Everett said no description of the suspect or suspects or any vehicle involved is currently available.

"The vehicle that struck the victim left the scene prior to him (Padron) being found," Everett said. "There is no suspect or vehicle information currently available to pass on at this time. Anyone who has any information on this crime should call the Big Spring Police Department."

Our Views

Rushing to a solution? ometimes the most important ingredient

in local government is time. Time for elected officials to talk to the constituents and get a hold on their feelings for what their government is planning for the future of their community. Time for voters who have to deal with the comings and goings of their own lives to pick up the phone and talk to their councilman or councilwoman and let them know how they feel about the direction of the municipality.

It's an ingredient the Big Spring city council has recognized for years, passing its agenda items on first and second reading, usually giving at least two weeks so voters and council members could appreciate the full measure of their actions before the ordinances and resolutions became law.

Unfortunately, that's a tradition that seems to be coming to a close.

Mayor Tommy Duncan announced in December he would be calling for the council to vote on an ordinance calling for an election that would allow funding destined for the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation be used for a multi-million dollar 4B project to revamp existing water, wastewater and waterlines in the city.

True to his word, first reading of that ordinance will come during tonight's council meeting, set for 5:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth Street. However, final reading of that ordinance, which would normally come during the council's regularly scheduled Jan. 24 meeting, is instead slated for Thursday at 5:30 p.m. at the same location.

That leaves less than 48 hours between tonight's meeting and Thursday's final reading for area residents to educate themselves on the matter, approach their district's council member and make their feelings known on the issue.

Duncan has made it clear the final reading of an ordinance or resolution is no time to quibble or debate. However, on an issue as important as this — when millions of dollars and possibly thousands of jobs are at stake for the next several decades — is it really too much to ask for a couple of weeks to research the issues?

We don't imagine the members of the Big Spring EDC board of directors would mind the time. After all, it's their budget we're thinking of cutting from approximately \$1.6 million a year to approximately \$800,000 a year, possibly crippling our city's chance of drawing industry — and thereby jobs — to the Crossroads area.

We at the *Herald* think the existing businesses and industries in Big Spring wouldn't mind that time, considering they stand to lose a valuable resource in growing their investment in the coming

Time. Whether we measure it in minutes, hours, weeks or years, we often undervalue its effects, especially on our community. After all, it was our inability to measure time and its impact on our water, wastewater and water lines that got us into this mess in the first place.

We didn't dig ourselves into this hole in a day. It's doubtful we'll be able to dig ourselves out of it that quickly, either. Hopefully our elected city officials will figure this out and not try to rush to a solution.

George Stephanopoulos wins

e've been dealing with liberal media bias for years, but George Stephanopoulos' performance in the Republican presidential debate Saturday night in New Hampshire was particularly egregious. In many of these MSM-mod-

erated debates, liberal moderators have tried to stir up personal fights between candidates, which diverts our focus from more important issues and before national television audiences, shifts attention far away from Barack Obama and his disastrous agenda.

Yes, these are debates among Republicans and designed to bring out distinctions among the candidates, but it should be up to the candidates to initiate and define those distinctions, and it is improper for the moderators to continually steer the debate away from substance and into the personal. With the moderators constantly stirring up catfights, liberal ends are served, both in placing Republican candidates in the worst light and in creating the illusion that their primary differences are with one another rather than Obama.

If you doubt this, then ask yourself how often in Saturday night's debate the candidates were given an opportunity instead of showing how corrupt, immoral or inexperienced their GOP rivals are — to distinguish their policy proposals from the others in the context of the Obama record. The narrative in these debates ought to be how each of the candidates is betterequipped than the others to reverse Obama's agenda.

In addition to misdirecting the debates substantively, the liberal moderators have also, too often, injected themselves into the debates as if they were either driven by their irrepressible egos to make themselves players rather than facilitators or so ideologically revolted by the

GOP's policies that they were compelled to argue Obama's side in his absence. The moderators shouldn't be allowed to have it both ways. If they are going to direct the debate solely toward differences among the GOP candidates, they shouldn't present Obama's side for him, giving him and the liberal position a free ride.

As for stirring up personal and nasty issues, ABC's George Stephanopoulos asked Rep. Ron Paul whether he would stand by charges in one of his South Carolina ads that former Sen. Rick Santorum is "corrupt — a corporate lobbyist, a Washington insider with a record of betrayal." As if to ensure Paul wouldn't sidestep the corruptness charge, Stephanopoulos repeated, "You also call him corrupt in that ad." This kind of baiting would

never happen in a Democratic debate, even if Fox News furnished the moderators. After an extensive back-and-

forth on this issue, Stephanopoulos tried to keep it going by turning the ball over to Texas Gov. Rick Perry, nudging him to pile on both Santorum and Paul. Why settle for a back-and-forth when you can have a three-way?

Before Stephanopoulos' next turn, for good measure, moderator Josh McElveen, as if trying to perpetuate a gossip chain in a schoolyard, asked former House Speaker Newt Gingrich how he would respond to Paul's calling him a "chicken hawk."

But the evening's award performance goes to Stephanopoulos, for his next round of questions to former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney. Completely out of the blue, manufacturing an issue out of whole cloth, Stephanopoulos asked, "Gov. Romney, do you believe that states have the right to ban contraception? Or is that trumped by a constitutional right to privacy?"

To his credit, Romney called him on it: "George, this is an unusual topic that you're raising."

When Romney wouldn't take the bait, Stephanopoulos argued with him, derisively reminding Romney that Romney had attended Harvard Law School and

therefore couldn't pretend not to understand the issue — as if Romney's understanding of the issue, as opposed to its stunning irrelevance, were what Romney was reacting to.

But Stephanopoulos held on to the question like a rabid terrier, petulantly making himself and his asinine line of questioning the issue. Perhaps Stephanopoulos, in a most convoluted way, was trying to get Romney to denounce the Supreme Court's judicial establishment of a Ninth Amendment right to privacy, ultimately culminating in the infamous abortion decision, Roe v. Wade.

More likely, Stephanopoulos was angling, via a pathetic effort at Socratic questioning, to lay a trap for Romney that would expose him as the flip-flopper he's reputed to be and knock him down a peg or three. For Stephanopoulos next said, "But you've given two answers to the question."

Romney obviously didn't even know what Stephanopoulos was talking about. He had invoked an irrelevant issue and tried to trick Romney into answering it the way he wanted him to so he could pounce, and when Romney didn't, he supplied Romney's answer(s) anyway because he was determined to ensnare him, even if the ghost of Socrates wasn't cooperating.

With a half-century of experience as a witness to liberal media bias, I'm not easily shocked or outraged by current displays of it, but George Stephanopoulos deserves special notoriety for his disgraceful performance Saturday night.

et's set aside the backand-forth over the recess appointment of Richard Cordray as chief watchdog at the new Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. President Obama named the former Ohio attorney general to lead the agency when the Senate was supposedly out of session, which he's allowed to do.

Republicans refuse to confirm him without changes that would

render the bureau toothless. And they hold that the Senate wasn't out of session because they had someone whack the gavel every four days, calling the empty chamber to order. Democrats tried the same trick during the George W. Bush administration. The Constitution neglected to define "recess,"

The bigger question is why Republicans oppose an agency that would stop financial companies from cheating and taking ad-

vantage of ordinary Americans, which happened to millions during the mortgage mania. They complain that the current setup leaves the bureau "unaccountable" to the American people, in part, because its funding comes automatically out of the Federal Reserve's budget rather than through the congressional ap-

Unfortunately, the interests of the American people and individual members of Congress are not always one and the same.

propriations process.

The funding mechanism was created precisely to remove the power of the purse from the industry's handmaidens in Congress. During 2007 and 2008, the height of Wall Street excess, conservatives cut the funding for the Securities and Exchange Commission, whose job it was to patrol the markets. They apparently want the ability to deny the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau the means to stand between the unscrupulous financial salesmen and their unsophisticated prey.

Sen. Richard Shelby, the Alabama Republican, further warned that the bureau "will directly affect every American household by limiting their choices when purchasing financial products, restricting the availability of credit to consumers" and so forth.

Limit consumer choice? Restrict the availability of credit? Jolly good, I say.

If taking poison off the shelves means limiting consumer choice, that's OK. And if some people can't get a loan under reasonable standards, so be it. And really, how does requiring that financial contracts be written in plain English challenge the sanctity of free markets?

There is a moral case for protecting ordinary folk from abusive or fraudulent financial products, but also a selfish one. We who were not foolish, lazy or reckless during the housing bubble also paid a price. When the slick operators' practices brought the financial markets to their knees, the taxpayers had to bail them out or face another

Great Depression. They con-

tinue to suffer from the Great Recession that followed. (The operators, meanwhile, ran off with their sacks of upfront fees and the pickings from working-

class pockets.) We don't want that to happen again, do we? One may argue with reason that other factors also crushed the financial markets — government guarantees for risky mortgages, shoddy and corrupt work by the financial ratings agencies and a policy of low interest rates to keep the game going. But a well-built jetliner has any number of backups ready to keep the thing flying should one system malfunction.

Obviously, there's lots of money in letting Wall Street feed the little guys into the grinder. The financial, insurance and real estate industries have given Washington politicians \$135 million in 2011-2012, according to the Center for Responsive Politics. Republicans received 56.3 percent of that largesse, versus 37.7 percent going to Democrats.

While many of the contributors are fine, upstanding citizens, one still senses a monetary motive behind the Republican campaign to defang the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. In the end, the Republican position would seem more aimed at defending the cons than the Constitution.

A fine, featherless friend gets grounded

aving had a large brown raptor for three days, a woman notified Texas Parks & Wildlife. Not knowing what to expect, a game warden pulled up to a residence. After being ushered into a back yard, he

Standing erect, a redtailed hawk exemplified the magnificence of its specie. As it turned to walk further away from the officer, its rusty tail denoted its maturity and was an easy

color for identification. As the warden watched the raptor, he gave his usual

short lecture concerning the illegal possession of wild, migratory birds to the caller. Repeatedly, the woman answered, "But it couldn't fly." Then he slowly walked

toward the hawk as it tried to leave. Gaining no lift as it flapped its broad wings in an effort to become airborne, it settled in another part of the

When it spread its wings defensively as he approached it again, his quick glimpse at the undersides noted a remarkable absence of feathers. Able to corner the hawk, the officer also noticed the end of one wing was missing, and numerous feathers had been broken.

After placing the hawk in a carrier and loading it in his vehicle, he asked the woman what she had been feeding it. Shocked to learn she had not fed the bird, he decided the closest source of food was his

Opening a can of dog food, he placed the contents on a platter and placed it in the carrier. Without hesitation, the hawk ate the entire serving of beef chunks.

Concerned about the condition of its wings, the warden then delivered the hawk to Odessa's Eigth Street Vet Clinic. Within the auspices of our license, Julie Marshall, a vet tech, and the veterinarian are assisting in wild bird rescue.

With Julie's phone call came the results of a full body scan as finding no breaks. She noted the hawk had good body fat. "But its feathers are a mess. Many broken, or missing," she

Wing by wing she assessed the damage.

All the primary feathers were missing from the left wing. Likening the wing to a human arm, she said from the wrist out was gone. There was a gap of feathers missing from the center portion of the right wing. Bleeding had occurred and formed

In addition to the most noticeable injuries were numerous broken feathers. From what she told me, even if the hawk were healthy, it would have to be confined until a complete molt oc-

Since we would meet at the Midland office of Parks & Wildlife three days later, she offered to keep the hawk at the clinic so it could receive antibiotics to prevent infec-

Delayed by an appointment, we missed thanking Julie by a few minutes, but were entertained by the office staff and captain. Since

Julie needed to take her carrier, she had opened the gate to extract the hawk. Eager for freedom, it had bolted past her and had been loose in the conference room.

With the receptionists taking refuge in another room, the captain managed to get a cardboard box over the raptor. Adeptly folding the lid, he had succeeded in squeezing a very large hawk into a most confining space without an inch to spare.

Fortunately, the red-tail was not boxed for long. Laying it on its back, Art and I were appalled by the disappearance of its feathers. Both areas indicated they had been pulled or yanked from the hawk. Our concern was would the missing feathers be replaced.

Startling, also, were the broken feathers. Splintered, they were of varying lengths and at random. It was as if some maniacal creature had snapped or broken them as a whim.

Once home, I examined the featherless wing sites one more time.

Deciding nature had provided a more than adequate compress of its own over the bleeding areas, I hesitated in removing the scabs because of the possibility of further bleeding.

After four days of rest and feasting on mice and beef heart, the red-tail was delivered to Gail Barnes in Lubbock. Throughout its ordeal of captivity, the woman,

game warden, vet tech and TP&W staff had all said, "It tries to fly."

Placed in a mew in the barn, the raptor could access low perches, and with plenty of room, exercise its wings. Having given the hawk enough time to see if it might begin to produce new feathers, Gail took the red-tail to their veterinarian.

When I answered her call later that day, Gail mentioned having taken the bird to be examined. For a brief moment I held my breath in anticipation.

"There's growth in those areas that have no feathers! Dr. J thinks the feathers will come back," she continued. "Its next appointment will be in three to four weeks." In a call before Christmas,

Gail described the hawk as "thriving." As 2012 approached, she added that it was "doing well."

Replacement of the missing and broken feathers might possibly take as long as nine months to a year. Then the next phase of its recovery would be based on its performance in the flight cage. Attaining the highest perches and building muscle tone and stamina were crucial to its release.

In this new year, to see it gracefully rise in elevation to heights denied by a horrific incident would be to appreciate its indomitable spirit. Taking flight would once again establish its dominance of the skies.

A mole is a mole — but not a gopher or ground hog

was in a discussion with my father-inlaw a few days ago about moles and how to get them off the property.

I've had very little experience with moles so I decided to do a bit of research and found it interesting enough to share with you.

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First, I discovered you must be certain you are dealing with moles and not gophers, since trying to get rid of them is completely different.

Speaking of gophers, please note a gopher is not a ground hog. Gophers are small, measuring anywhere from four to 12 inches

in length and weigh as little as three centigrams or as much

> as two pounds. Gophers do not hibernate or swim as groundhogs do.

Gophers have only two litters per year; are quite docile and can be

raised in captivity.

They can be very beneficial in gardens and eat weeds in addition to our prized roots and bulbs; given the chance, they can do more good than harm, but if you plant only desired items and eliminate all weeds, gophers have nothing to eat but what you give them, which make them your competitor rather than your helper.

They like dandelions and most tubers and bulbs.

They have quite a long list of natural predators — cats, dogs, coyotes, snakes, raptors, owls, hawks, weasels, badgers and skunks.

A mole is a tiny, gray or black mammal which enjoys burrowing underground. Moles are often thought to be blind because of their tiny eyes, but since they live mainly underground they have no real need of good eyesight.

Moles mostly feed on earthworms; they do eat grubs but using grub control products as a method of controlling moles will not be effective.

Even in grub free lawns, moles continue to survive, because the majority of their diet consists of the everpresent earthworm.

It appears when the ground dries out in the summer, or when it freezes in the winter, earthworms and soil dwelling insects remain deeper in the ground

and so do the moles.

This behavior makes control difficult because one can never be certain the moles are truly eliminated, even though they are not making surface runs.

Moles are not rodents like rats and mice which can be baited using rodent foods. Poison peanuts or other grain baits won't work since moles don't feed on seeds, alfalfa pellets or any of the typical baits sold to kill rodents.

Most of the schemes to drive moles away, such as using chewing gum, human hair, moth balls, pinwheels and other ultrasonic devices usually are not effective; however, they have been known to be effective in some incidences.

Rather than using poisons, traps or mole barriers, there are a few interesting ways that seem effective to control moles you may want to consider.

Castor oil is a repellent for moles. Before applying castor oil, the ground must first be

thoroughly watered, then spray castor oil onto the lawn before watering the area again. This may have to be repeated several times to be totally effec-

Garlic is a plant moles will avoid and I have read if garlic is planted in different areas of the lawn moles will not

dwell in that area. What appears to be simple, yet effective, way to rid your yard of moles is to try cat litter.

Cats are a natural enemy of moles.

When used cat litter is poured into the mole holes, the moles seem to be convinced that they should move to another area.

I guess the difficult part is to actually find the opening of the mole hole to be able to pour the litter, but it's worth the trouble if it really works.

No doubt: Bama best in AP poll

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — As required, Alabama's players whooped it up amid the confetti and fireworks, yet there was something muted about this championship celebration.

Turns out, these guys knew the ending to the sequel before they even got to the Big Easy.

For two months, the Crimson Tide stewed over its first meeting with top-ranked LSU. By the time the team touched down in New Orleans, there was little doubt in anyone's mind about the outcome. Not just win, but dominate.

Boy, did they ever.

With a smothering display of old-school football, No. 2 Alabama blew out the Tigers 21-0 in the BCS championship Monday night, celebrated a bit and headed back to Tuscaloosa with its second national title in three

The Crimson Tide also claimed the top spot in the final Associated Press poll for the eighth time, tying Notre Dame for the most of any team in college football. Coach Nick Saban's team was an overwhelming choice with

55 of 60 first-place votes.

"We knew what we were capable of," offensive lineman Barrett Jones said. "I guess that's kind of arrogant, but it's the way we felt. We felt like we were capable of dominating, and we did that."

Credit one of the greatest defenses in college football history, a bunch of NFLready players such as Upshaw Courtney Dont'a Hightower who made sure LSU (13-1) never had a chance.

Jordan Jefferson When dropped back to pass, he

was swept under by a tide of crimson. When the LSU quarterback took off running, he must've felt like Alabama had a few extra players on the field. It sure seemed that

"It feels like a nightmare," Jefferson said. "We just didn't get it done on offense. Some defenses have your number, and Alabama had our number."

LSU beat the Crimson Tide (12-1) in overtime on Nov. 5, a so-called Game of the Century that was roundly criticized as a dud because neither team scored a touchdown.

The Rematch of the Century was next, after Alabama worked its way back up to second in the rankings to claim a spot in the BCS title game. Turns out, it was even less of a classic than the first meeting, much closer to "Speed 2" than the "Godfather

But the Alabama defense was a thing of beauty, putting its own spin on this postseason of high-scoring shootouts.

"They are unbelievable,"

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama saluted Dirk Nowitzki and the Dallas Mavericks on Monday as NBA champions who staged a season-ending charge to beat LeBron James and the vaunted Miami Heat and claim their first title with a "heart that's the size of Texas.'

"This was a remarkable run, a great victory," Obama declared, as owner Mark and Mavericks stars, including series MVP Nowitzki, looked on. "It's too bad that next year, it'll be the Chicago Bulls here."

The first basketball fan a passionate supporter of his hometown Bulls — was nonetheless lavish in praising the Mavericks, who beat the Heat in six games last June. "They know how good teams

win," Obama said. "Not just by jumping higher or running faster, but by finding the open man, working together, staying mentally tough, being supportive of each other, playing smarter." He said that's how Dallas

Playing from 1986-04 — all with his hometown Reds — Larkin hit .295 with 198 home runs, 960 RBIs, 2,340 hits and 379 stolen bases.

Stricker starts year with win in Hawaii

KAPALUA, Hawaii (AP) — Steve Stricker had a silver trophy in his hands and a white-and-purple lei around his neck, a photo opportunity at Kapalua that didn't seem likely four months ago when he could barely hold onto a golf club.

He withdrew from the BMW Championship outside Chicago because of weakness in his left arm. It was a nervous time, even when it was diagnosed as a neck injury. The first doctor he saw recommended surgery, and Stricker nearly went along with it. Stricker decided against surgery,

opting for therapy, rest, a series of massages and two cortisone shots.

It looks like it was the right

Stricker opened the PGA Tour season with a final round Monday on Maui filled with more tension that he needed, even if he is used to it by now.

Staked to a five-shot advantage at

the Tournament of Championship, his lead was down to a single shot after just six holes.

As he does so many times, though.

Stricker's short game bailed him out. He birdied back-to-back holes at the turn to regain control, answered Jonathan Byrd with a wedge into 2 feet for another birdie on the 16th, and wound up with a 4-under 69 and a three-shot win for an ideal start to "It was tough," said Stricker, who

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





A Reward for Good Technique



West North East South 1 NT Pass Opening lead — three of spades.

Good technique consists of very little more than paying close attention to details. For example, take this deal where West leads a spade against three notrump. Declarer hopefully plays the queen from dummy, but East produces the king, taken by South with the ace.

With the opponents' spades established, it is certain that if South loses the lead before he can take nine tricks, he will go down. This leaves him no choice but to assume that he can score four diamond tricks and four club tricks in addition to his ace of spades.

South is far from sure that he can actually take eight tricks in the minor suits, but he should make every effort to do so. He starts by cashing the ace of clubs and then the queen. The queen is played, rather than leading a low club to the king, to guard against a holding of J-x-x-x in the West hand. In that case West's jack would be finessable.

But when West produces the club jack on the queen, South must take advantage of his good fortune by overtaking the queen with dummy's king. (If he doesn't, he will go down.) He then takes a diamond

Declarer must again be careful to next lead the seven of clubs, not the deuce, to dummy's ten. After another diamond finesse, South leads the two of clubs to dummy's six for his third and final diamond finesse.

As a reward for his perspicacity, declarer winds up with precisely nine tricks. But if South fails to overtake the club queen with the king, or later neglects to lead the seven to the ten, he goes down one, scoring only three diamond tricks instead of the four he needs to make the contract.

said Jones, relieved that he only has to go against them in practice. "That defense is as good as any defense I've ever seen. They rush the passer, they have awesome linebackers and they're great in coverage. They really don't have any weaknesses. They have to be as good as any defense ever."

LSU didn't cross midfield until there were less than 8 minutes remaining in the game. The Tigers finished with just 92 yards and five first downs, on the wrong end of the first shutout in the BCS' 14-year history.

"This defense is built on stopping them, and that's what we did," said Upshaw, the game's defensive MVP.

"We wanted to come out and show the world we beat ourselves the first game. We wanted to come out and dominate from start to finish, and that's what we did."

The Crimson Tide, piling up 384 yards and 21 first downs, spent much of the night in LSU's end of the field, setting up Jeremy Shelley to attempt a bowl-record seven field goals. He made five of them, matching a bowl record. Then, as if responding to all the critics who complained that an offensive powerhouse such as Oklahoma State or Stanford should've gotten a shot in the title game, Alabama finally made a long-overdue trip to the end zone.

With 4:36 remaining, Heisman finalist Trent Richardson broke off a 34-yard touchdown run.

either of the Southeastern Conference powerhouses managed over two games, plus that overtime period back in November.

"It felt so good to get that touchdown against LSU," lineman D.J. Fluker said. "That's all we talked about. We said we were going to get (Richardson) a touchdown, and we did it."

On LSU's one and only trip into Alabama territory, the Tigers quickly went back, back, back — the last gasp ending appropriately with the beleaguered Jefferson getting the ball jarred from his hand before he could even get off a fourth-and-forever pass. "We didn't do a lot differ-

ent," Saban said. "We did some things on offense formationally. Our offensive team did a great job. Defensively, we just played well, played the box. Our special teams did a great job."

The coach has now won a pair of BCS titles at Alabama, plus another at LSU in 2003. He's the first coach to win three BCS titles, denying LSU's Les Miles his second championship. The Tigers will have to settle for the SEC title, but that's not likely to ease the sting of this ugly performance.

"I told my team that it should hurt," Miles said. "We finished second. It's supposed to hurt."


LSU simply couldn't do anything — running or passing. Kenny Hilliard led the Tigers with 16 yards rushing, while Jefferson was 11 of 17 passing for 53 yards, usually hurrying away passes before he was sent tumbling to the Superdome turf. He was sacked four times and

threw a mystifying interception when he attempted to flip away a desperation pass, only to have it picked off because his intended receiver had already turned upfield looking to block.

A.J. McCarron was the offensive MVP, completing 23 of 34 passes for 234 yards. Richardson added 96 yards on 20 carries. But an even bigger cheer went up when the defensive award was presented to Upshaw, who had seven tackles, including a sack, and spent a good part of his night in the LSU backfield.

"The whole defense is the MVP," Upshaw said. "The whole defense. Roll Tide, baby. Roll Tide!"

With the way his defense was playing, McCarron simply had to avoid mistakes and guide the offense into fieldgoal range.

The Texans have been coping with obstacles all season, most of them injury-related. For a change, they escaped Saturday's 31-10 win over Cincinnati without any players significantlv hurt.

Right guard Mike Brisiel played "about three quarters" after missing three games with a broken right fibula, and tight end Owen Daniels hurt his right hand, but will be back at practice on Wednesday, Kubiak said.

Star receiver Andre Johnson looked like his old self against the Bengals, catching five passes for 90 yards, including a second-half touchdown. Johnson was on the field for about 40 plays, and Kubiak said he "came out of the game fine" after missing nine games in the regular season with injuries.

One of the games Johnson sat out was Baltimore's 29-14 win in Week 6, in which Houston set season lows for points and total yards (293) that held up through the end of 2011. Matt Schaub was the quarterback in that game, not rookie T.J. Yates, and the Texans were playing for the first time without outside linebacker Mario Williams, who tore a chest muscle the previous week.

Houston still led 14-13 in the third quarter, before the Ravens pulled away in the fourth.

"Well, they closed and we didn't," Kubiak said. The Ravens held Arian Foster to 49 yards rush-

ing in the first meeting, though Foster was also Houston's top receiver that day, with six catches for 52 yards.

If Baltimore can bottle up Foster again, the pressure will fall on Yates, the fifth-round

draft pick thrust into a starting role after season-ending injuries to Schaub and backup Matt Leinart.

Yates is 1-1 in two road starts, rallying the Texans past the Bengals in Cincinnati on Dec. 11, but then losing to Indianapolis 11 days later.

Kubiak has firsthand experience for what Yates can expect on Sunday. He was Denver's offensive coordinator in 2000, when the Broncos met the Ravens in Baltimore in an AFC wildcard game. The Ravens won 21-3 on their way to the Super Bowl.

"This will be probably the ultimate test from the standpoint of the noise and being there in a playoff game," Kubiak said. "But it's our job as coaches, too, to make sure that we're doing things that give him the best chance to get in and out of the huddle and go play and to give our guys up front the best chance. "
