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

Harvest bogged down again

THIS 1967 Ford, driven by Brenda Underwood, 15, of Dimmitt, collided with a 1964 Mercury driven by Rosalinda Villegas, 15, also of Dimmitt at the intersection of Front and Jones Tuesday afternoon. We had a fairly heavy frost Monday night. All of the frost that I saw was on the tops of cars. Maybe there was only slight, if any, damage to crops since they are closer to the ground than the top of a car. We are not quite ready for a killing frost, and chances are we won't be ready when it comes. Crops have just not had a chance to mature during the past weeks of cool rainy weather. We will have to be satisfied with just a fair crop this year, and be proud that we are getting an underground season for the production of a bumper crop next year.

Weekend rains bogged down Castro County's grain harvest week and a slow-moving cold front that swept down from Canada and spread across Texas toward the Gulf Coast, brought widespread frost conditions to the county Tuesday morning to add to farmers' woes.

FARMERS were hoping to venture into their fields to resume harvesting operations over the weekend but showers which began at about midday Saturday put an end to their hopes. The rains got heavier through the remainder of the weekend, reaching a peak Sunday.

Frost conditions Tuesday morning added to the farmers' worries. A good deal of the county's milo has not fully matured and if the Tuesday frost was severe enough to halt maturation of the grain, the milo crop will be short.

A good portion of Castro County's corn crop is already down, sent toppling by high winds and extremely wet conyellow grain falling.

Halfback Robert Mayberry staged a fantastic running show Friday night as Dimmitt's Bobcats treated a good Homecoming crowd to a 40-15 victory over the Lockney Longhorns.

VINCENT Braddock was named the premier breeder in the show, while Cecil Braddock displayed the highest producing three year old cow.




