Rains scant aid to area's water woes

Wednesday's rainfall helped boost Colorado River Municipal Water District reservoir levels around the region, but according to local officials, the increases are small when compared to the "big picture" the current water shortage has left West Texans to face.

According to meteorologists with the National Weather

Service Office in Midland, Big Spring saw a total rainfall of approximately .23 of an inch, while Snyder received .18 of an inch and the city of Midland saw .27 of an inch. All totals are currently unof-



According to previous reports made by Grant to the city of Big Spring, Lake Ivie is expected to run dry some time around the end of December, a date that has many municipal officials very nervous.

In the meantime, however, efforts to increase the amount of groundwater — specifically from wells located in Ward County — being delivered into the CRM-WD system are under way, with completion of a second pipeline estimated at \$150 million expected to be completed in January of 2013.

Having already cut water delivery totals to customer cities several

times in the past year to accommodate demand especially during the summer months — Grant said he expects to see another decrease in February.

"We'll be going to winter usage totals," Grant said. "If everything goes as planned, that could give us an extra 90 to 120 days on that December deadline and stretch out the life of Lake Ivie while we continue to develop the Ward County project."

According to Big Spring Assistant City Manager Todd Darden, the February decrease in deliveries would bump the city down from its current allocation of 5.9 million gallons per day to 5.1 million gallons per day.

"The water district

has included some buffer room in those numbers," Darden said. "The decrease will have an impact on our water customers, we're just not sure at this point to what degree. We're going to have to sit down and look at our current drought contingency plan and figure out where we want to go from here, and that's going to require us to crunch a lot of numbers."

Oh, to be able to go back again

s the weather turns a bit dark and brooding, I have a tendency to let my thoughts turn inward, a habit my daughter warns me time and time again just leads me to the wide and misfortunate paths of melancholy, and, like most fathers, I rarely heed her warnings.

I'm not sure why it happens. I suppose the weather reminds me a bit of home, as the cloudy skies are pretty common in South Carolina,

where it seems like it rained as often as it didn't when I was a child. I remember plenty of Saturday afternoons spent in the garage — mostly in my father's workshop, building whatever contraption came to mind staring out at the puddles and



back out. As my thoughts turn inward, it's tough to ward off some of the more traumatic events of the past year. Probably the most pressing was the loss of my longtime roommate, Dave Murphy, who passed away in my home-

town of Sumter, S.C., at the age

just waiting for the sun to come

of 47 in May. Dave — or "Crazy Dave," as most of us knew him over the years — was a special guy. He spoke his mind in a way that, in all honesty, scared the living mess out of most people. That filter located directly between the brain and the mouth that stops us sometimes and whispers in our ear, "Hey, dummy, you better not say that," simply didn't exist for Dave.

Come to think of it, that same filter really didn't exist for most of us in our tight-knit, little group. Hey, when you really think about it, who needs it anyway, right?

Dave was my roommate for a few years, and, needless to say, all of those times weren't roses. I got yelled at when a friend of a friend, I believe his name was O'Shea — yeah, you buddy, you're getting called out nearly 20 years later — spit his chewing tobacco in the bath tub ... and then there's the famous New Years Eve debacle where we all found out too much sugar and alcohol in my blood stream equals a visit from the Sumter Police Department's finest.

However, there were times when Dave was the only thing that held me together. When I

was living more than 1,000 miles from my family on a holiday, I can remember him ditching his own family to just hang out with me and our friends. Dave was, without a doubt, a guy you could count on in a pinch. No matter how messed up the situation was, you knew he would be there for you.

Unfortunately, time marches on. I left South Carolina and came to Big Spring to be closer to my parents, leaving Dave and the rest of my friends — they were more like family than my actual family, outside of my parents, sister and daughter have ever been — behind.

I lost touch with Dave, although I did get to see him for a few minutes when I took my daughter to Sumter a few years ago to see where I grew up. Hayley met him, just for a minute. I suppose I always thought there was time. Unfortunately, life is filled with details we're simply unaware of.

The story, as I've been informed, is fairly straight forward. At some point in the past couple of years, Dave began experiencing migraine headaches, the debilitating kind that make you just want to curl up in a ball and dismiss the world until it's gone. The doctors looked and looked, but, as they often do, they couldn't find the source of the problem, so they were left to try to simply treat the symp-

Many of my friends blame the combination of drugs — oxycodone and Lunesta — which, after countless hours of research on my part, have been known to cause suicidal thoughts and actions on the parts of patients. I'd like to blame the drugs, as well. I'd like to blame the doctors, too. I'd like to point to their incompetency, their inability to figure out what was wrong with Dave, who was living each and every day — every minute — in excruciating pain.

I want to, but I can't. Dave faced his pain and made a decision, a decision which would break the hearts of his friends and leave many of us with more questions than answers for many, many years to come. He decided to take his own

Each of us ask ourselves the obvious questions. Should we have seen it coming? Even if we had, is there anything we could have done to stop it? For more, the questions seem

a bit darker. I left my friend — most of my friends, for that matter — behind to try to make a better life. If I had stayed, what would have been different? Would I have caught the warning signs? Could I have done anything to stop my friend's death?

It's these questions that sit quietly in the back of my mind, much like passengers sitting in the back of a bus, just waiting for those quiet moments when they know the driver is looking in the rearview mirror so they can wave, a quick reminder, nothing more, nothing less.

Most of us have gone our separate ways over the years, and everyone is doing the best they car to deal with Dave's death. Each of us tries to honor his memory by concentrating on the good times, like the time we all piled in Dave's Cavalier and drove all the way to Georgia to buy a lottery ticket because someone had a silly dream.

However, it's hard not to let the reality of what has happened not creep into the picture. It's hard not to let that shadow fall over our faces, over our eyes and blind us from the good times and the beauty we are left with.

Regardless of what your religious views are — especially regarding suicide, so you can keep those little tidbits to yourself — I suppose it all comes down to just one, simple matter of fact.

I miss my friend.

Note: I generally don't add notes to my columns ... I figure if it needs to be said in the column, then it should be said in the column. However, there was one thing I did want to add to this particular column, but I didn't feel like it had a place above.

If you or someone you love — or even care about, for that matter — is having thoughts of suicide, do not hesitate to seek help. That may mean encouraging them to get help, and it may mean you going out and getting help for them, possibly against their own wishes. Either way, the only wrong thing you can do in this situation is to sit on your hands and do nothing. As someone who has faced the aftermath of a suicide attempt — both successful and otherwise — it is not something you want on your conscience.

It's always better to err on the side of safety, so don't be afraid to ask the people in your life how they are doing. Their answers will most often be exactly what you expect. However, just once in a blue moon, you may have the chance to lend a hand to someone who really needs one.

In a presidential election year, Pentagon stressing positive side of defense cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is preparing to tighten its belt, but with an election-year battle looming in Congress and on the presidential campaign trail, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta wants to stress the positive: Parts of the budget devoted to reshaping the military to fit a new global strategy will actually get fatter, he says.

But that's unlikely to mollify Republicans who say President Barack Obama's plan will leave the Pentagon stretched too thin to handle potential security threats in the Middle East, Asia and Panetta is expected to outline the main areas of

proposed spending cuts and increases at a Pentagon news conference Thursday, more than two weeks before the Obama administration submits its 2013 budget proposal to Congress. He will be joined by Army Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, for a presentation designed to highlight the military leadership's embrace of defense

Panetta and Dempsey are expected to cast the plan as one that reflects President Barack Obama's strategy for reorienting the military as it recovers from a decade of war in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Prominent in the Obama plan is a renewed focus on Asia, where China's rapid military modernization has raised worry in Washington and rattled U.S. allies. That, along with continued security threats in the Middle East — especially Iran — is why Panetta wants to invest more in certain air and naval assets. He also is putting a focus on cybersecurity and commando forces like those who killed Osama bin Laden last May and who swooped into Somalia on Tuesday to rescue two hostages, including an American.

Special-ops hostage rescue in Somalia shows shape of U.S. campaign to come

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy SEAL operation that freed two Western hostages in Somalia is representative of the Obama administration's pledge to build a smaller, more agile military force that can carry out surgical counterterrorist strikes to cripple an enemy.

That's a strategy much preferred to the land invasions of Iraq and Afghanistan that have cost so much American blood and treasure over the past decade. The contrast to a full-bore invasion is stark: A small, daring team storms a pirate encampment on a near-moonless night, kills nine kidnappers and whisks the hostages to safety.

Special operations forces, trained for such clandestine missions, have become a more prominent tool in the military's kit since the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks that led to the ongoing war in Afghanistan. The administration is expected to announce

Thursday that it will invest even more heavily in

that capability in coming years.

The SEAL Team 6 raid in Somalia, which followed last May's operation that killed al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden, has political dimensions in an election year.

It gave an added punch to the five-state tour President Barack Obama began the day after he delivered his State of the Union speech. Obama did not mention the raid that was unfolding during his Tuesday night address, but he dropped a hint upon arriving in the House chamber by telling Defense Secretary Leon Panetta, "Good job tonight."

Consumer groups fear White House may water down rule on user-friendly health plan summaries

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer groups are scrambling to salvage a popular provision of President Barack Obama's health care overhaul that suddenly seems to be in question. This time it's not Republican opposition they're

worried about, but the White House itself.

At issue is a requirement that health plans provide simple, standard summaries of coverage and costs to help consumers pick benefits that are right for them — a sort of "CliffsNotes" version of cryptic insurance company jargon. Consumer advocates say they fear the adminis-

tration may heed industry complaints that the regulation as proposed last summer is too costly, burdensome and intrusive. The rule is due to take effect this year and is undergoing final review by the White House. It would apply to all private and employer health plans, covering an estimated 180 million Americans.

"There is concern that the consumer protections we were hoping to see may not be in the final rule." said Dr. LaShawn McIver, policy director for the American Diabetes Association. "Ultimately, we are looking for a consumer-friendly product that gives people the information they need about what levels of coverage they can expect.'

committee backing Gingrich that is run by the former House speakonetime aides. finance Campaign experts say the two \$5 million contributions are

among the largest known political donations in U.S. history.

No other candidate in the race for president appears to be relying so heavily on the fortune of a single donor. It's been made possible by last year's Supreme Court rulings — known as Citizens United that recast the political landscape by stripping away restrictions on contributions and how outside groups can spend their money.

Sheldon Adelson is Citizens United come to life. The bottom line is that it creates that potential for one person to have far more influence than any one person should have," said Fred Wertheimer, president of the campaign finance watchdog group Democracy 21.

Taxpavers still owed \$132.9 billion from financial bailout; some gone forever, watchdog says

WASHINGTON (AP) — A government watchdog says U.S. taxpayers are still owed \$132.9 billion that companies haven't repaid from the financial bailout, and some of that will never be recovered.

The bailout launched at the height of the financial crisis in September 2008 will continue to exist for years, says a report issued Thursday by Christy Romero, the acting special inspector general for the \$700 billion bailout. Some bailout programs, such as the effort to help homeowners avoid foreclosure by reducing mortgage payments, will last as late as 2017, costing the government an additional \$51 billion or so.

The gyrating stock market has slowed the Treasury Department's efforts to sell off its stakes in 458 bailed-out companies, the report says. They include insurer American International Group Inc., General Motors Co. and Ally Financial Inc.

If Treasury plans to sell its stock in the three companies at or above the price where taxpayers would break even on their investment — \$28.73 a share for AIG, \$53.98 for

GM — it may take a long time for the market to rebound to that level, the report says. AIG's shares closed Wednesday at \$25.31, while GM ended at \$24.92. Ally isn't publicly traded.

It will also be challenging for the government to get out of the 458 companies as the market remains volatile and banks struggle keep afloat in the tough economy, it says.




"We are at a point in our program right now where we feel we should be competing for a shot at the national title every year," said Britt Smith, head coach and HC athletic director.

Indy names head coach

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) The next chapter in the Peyton Manning saga could take a decidedly defensive turn.

Indianapolis hired Baltimore Ravens defensive coordinator Chuck Pagano as its new coach Wednesday and will introduce him at a news conference Thursday afternoon.

It's the third time Jim Irsay has turned to a defensive-minded coach since replacing his father as team owner in 1997, first hiring Jim Mora and then Tony Dungy as Mora's replacement in 2002.

"I like it," Pro Bowl defensive end Robert Mathis wrote on Twitter.

The Colts are hoping the change produces better results after Indy went 2-14 last season, its worst record in two decades.

But there are questions about how this decision will impact the future of Manning and his teammates.

The 51-year-old Pagano had been a career assistant until Wednesday. He had coached previously in the NFL at Oakland and Cleveland and also worked extensively in college with stops at Miami and North Carolina.

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



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Man charged in priest's death found dead in jail

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lic priest and setting parent suicide, correc- ney, Brian Alexander, off in the victim's car for a family vacation to Walt Disney World was found dead in his prison cell Thursday in an ap-

tions officials and his attorney said. Jeremy Wayne Man-

ieri, 33, was charged with shooting the Rev. Ed Everitt of Hammond, La., in July 2011 at a beach house in Waveland, Miss.

Corrections officials said Manieri was found dead in his cell at the Mississippi Central Correctional Facility in Rankin County. Details of his death were not released. Manieri's attorconfirmed the death.

Manieri was a handy man at the house used by a group of priests as a beach retreat. Manieri had claimed he shot Everitt after he passed out from alcohol and marijuana use and found the priest fondling him. But investigators believe robbery was the motive, because Florida authorities said Manieri had the priest's car, gun and wallet when he was arrested.

Authorities said Manieri's former wife and two children were with him when he was arrested at a hotel near Winter Haven, Fla. They had purchased tickets to Walt Disney World but never made it to the resort, investigators said.

Authorities say Manieri gave a detailed confession to investigators in Florida, but stopped cooperating by the time he returned to Mississippi.

Manieri is charged with murder and grand larceny.

Bad bomb joke

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Prosecutors in Utah charged a FedEx driver with a threat of terrorism count over allegations he joked that a package he was delivering to a Utah Army base was likely a bomb.

Charges filed Wednesday in Salt Lake City show the deliveryman was dropping off a package on Sept. 20 addressed to an Army Corps of Engineers employee at Camp Williams.

Prosecutors say that when a woman asked him what it was, he replied that it was probably a bomb. Military police then evacuated 215 people from the building and the surrounding area.





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
