Pay your fines now, or get cuffed, Judge tells the Herald

If you have unresolved warrants in the Crossroads area, you have plenty to fear this

week and next, as law enforcement agencies in Howard County and the surrounding areas get ready to conduct a warrant Saturroundup

Part of a state-



wide effort to help municipalities and other government agencies tackle the growing number of arrest warrants being issued, Big Spring Municipal Judge Tim Green said every effort has been made to contact those with warrants and get the matters cleared See CUFFED, Page 3

up before the handcuffs get slapped on.

'We had letters sent out last week to those people who have warrants, so this shouldn't come as some big surprise," Green said. "The simple truth of the matter is this: They can either take care of their fines and warrants in the time leading up to the warrants, or they can risk it and possibly end up with a pair of handcuffs snapped on them when Saturday rolls around."

Having already wrapped up their first week of dealing with the warning letters, Green said it's been hectic around the municipal court.



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

SKorea conducts live-fire drills near disputed sea boundary; no NKorea action on attack threat SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea con-

ducted live-fire military drills near its disputed sea boundary with North Korea on Monday despite Pyongyang's threat to respond with a "merciless' North Korea did not carry out the threat as it

focuses on internal stability two months after the death of longtime leader Kim Jong Il and prepares for nuclear disarmament talks with the United States later this week. But with American forces scheduled to conduct additional military exercises with ally South Korea over the next few months, tensions are expected to remain high in the re-Washington and North Korea's neighbors are

closely watching how new leader Kim Jong Un, Kim Jong Il's son, navigates strained ties with rival South Korea, the planned U.S.-South Korean military drills and a long-running standoff over the country's nuclear weapons programs. South Korea's drills took place Monday in an area

of the Yellow Sea that was the target of a North Korean artillery attack in 2010 that killed four South Koreans and raised fears of a wider conflict. North Korea didn't threaten similar South Korean firing drills in the area in January, but it called the latest exercise a "premeditated military provocation" and warned it would retaliate for what it considers an attack on its territory.

A North Korean officer told an Associated Press staffer in Pyongyang on Sunday that North Koreans would respond to any provocation with "merciless retaliatory strikes.'

UN inspectors in Tehran for key talks over nuclear allegations TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — U.N. nuclear inspectors

arrived in Iran on Monday in the latest push to hold key talks with Iranian officials about how far the country's controversial nuclear program has The trip is the second in less than a month by the

International Atomic Energy Agency team, reflecting growing concerns over alleged weapons experiments — something Iran has so far both denied and Herman Nackaerts, a senior U.N. nuclear official

said in Vienna before the team departed on Sunday that he hoped for progress in the talks but his careful choice of words suggested little expectation the meeting will be successful. The West suspects Iran's nuclear program is

geared toward making weapons, a charge Iran denies, insisting it's for peaceful purposes only, such as power generation. Iran's state TV said the IAEA team arrived early

Monday morning for a two-day visit. The state radio, meanwhile, said the inspectors hope to meet Iranian nuclear scientists and pay a visit to the Parchin military complex.

NYPD monitored students at colleges across Northeast; sent agent on rafting trip, noted prayer NEW YORK (AP) — One autumn morning in Buf-

falo, N.Y., a college student named Adeela Khan logged into her email and found a message announcing an upcoming Islamic conference in Toronto.

Khan clicked "forward," sent it to a group of fellow Muslims at the University at Buffalo, and promptly forgot about it. But that simple act on Nov. 9, 2006, was enough to

arouse the suspicion of an intelligence analyst at the New York Police Department, 300 miles away, who combed through her post and put her name in

an official report. Marked "SECRET" in large red letters, the document went all the way to Commissioner Raymond Kelly's office. The report, along with other documents obtained

by The Associated Press, reveals how the NYPD's intelligence division focused far beyond New York City as part of a surveillance program targeting Muslims. Police trawled daily through student websites

run by Muslim student groups at Yale, the University of Pennsylvania, Rutgers and 13 other colleges in the Northeast. They talked with local authorities about professors in Buffalo and even sent an undercover agent on a whitewater rafting trip, where he recorded students' names and noted in police intelligence files how many times they prayed.

Transgender kids get puberty-blocking drugs, sex-changing hormones

CHICAGO(AP) - A small but growing number of teens and even younger children who think they were born the wrong sex are getting support from parents and from doctors who give them sex-changing treatments, according to reports in the medical journal Pediatrics.

It's an issue that raises ethical questions, and some experts urge caution in treating children with puberty-blocking drugs and hormones. An 8-year-old second-grader in Los Angeles is a

typical patient. Born a girl, the child announced at 18 months, "I a boy" and has stuck with that belief. The family was shocked but now refers to the child as a boy and is watching for the first signs of puberty to begin treatment, his mother told The Associated Press. Pediatricians need to know these kids exist and

deserve treatment, said Dr. Norman Spack, author of one of three reports published Monday and director of one of the nation's first gender identity medical clinics, at Children's Hospital Boston. "If you open the doors, these are the kids who

come. They're out there. They're in your practices," Spack said in an interview.

Winter storm heads out to sea after dumping snow on parts of South, causing power outages RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A winter storm that

dumped several inches of snow across parts of the South, causing power outages, slippery roads and numerous accidents during the Presidents Day holiday weekend, moved out to sea Monday. Crews were working to restore power to tens of

thousands of households that lost electricity as a result of the storm. The storm brought as much as 9 inches of snow to

some areas on Sunday as it powered its way from Kentucky and Tennessee to West Virginia, Virginia and North Carolina. The storm system was expected to push off the coast early Monday, with the nation's capital getting only snow flurries, according to the National Weather Service.

The storm hit toward the end of what has been an otherwise mild winter in the region.

In northern Tennessee, about 20 vehicles were involved in crashes along a three-mile stretch of Interstate 75 near the Kentucky border on Sunday

He was, however, one of the first people prosecuted under a 2006 federal law aimed at curbing false claims of military valor. Concerns that the law improperly limits speech

and turns people into criminals for things they say, rather than do, are at the heart of the Supreme Court's review of his case and the Stolen Valor Act. Veterans groups have come to the aid of the

Obama administration, which calls the law a narrowly crafted effort to protect the system of military awards that was established during the Revolutionary war by Gen. George Washington. The high court will hear the case Wednesday, which is Washington's 280th birthday.

Avalanche swept 4 skiers far down mountain, killed 3 of them

STEVENS PASS, Wash. (AP) — Well-equipped and familiar with the terrain, about a dozen expert skiers were making their way through a foot-and-a half of fresh snow when an avalanche hit them in an out-of-bounds area near a popular Washington

Three men were killed Sunday when they were swept about a quarter-mile down a canyon, and a fourth skier caught up in the slide was saved by a safety device, authorities said. The large group had split into three smaller groups before the avalanche, but all the backcountry skiers were buried to some extent. Those who were able to free themselves rushed to dig out the victims and unsuccessfully performed CPR on the three, believed to be in their 30s and 40s.

"Most of the people involved in this were wellknown to the ski community up here, especially to the ski patrol," said Deputy Chris Bedker of the King County Sheriff's search-and-rescue unit. "It was their friends who they recovered."

The Stevens Pass fatalities were part of a deadly Sunday on Washington ski slopes. A male snowboarder was killed in a separate avalanche incident at the Alpental ski area east of Seattle, authorities

The men who died on Stevens Pass tumbled approximately 1,500 feet down a chute in the Tunnel Creek Canyon area, King County Sheriff's Sgt. Katie Larson said.

CEOs' clash roils company behind comic hero Archie

NEW YORK (AP) — The past three years have been upbeat ones for Archie, the everyteen hero of one of America's most enduring comics. He's gotten married — twice, no less. He's even appeared on a postage stamp. But behind the scenes, a bitter and sometimes

bizarre feud has brewed at the company that produces the more than 70-year-old comic.

In lawsuits, Archie Comic Publications' co-CEOs Jon Goldwater and Nancy Silberkleit (SIL'-bur-

klayt) are accusing each other of all sorts of funny business.

He's asked a court to strip her of her role at the company. She's sued him for defamation and \$100 million in damages.

A judge vows to appoint a temporary receiver to protect the company's assets amid the fight if the two sides can't choose someone on their own by Wednesday.

Famed NYC boardwalk may get plastic makeover NEW YORK (AP) — New York City's Coney Is-

land boardwalk may be getting a makeover — from wood to plastic. The New York Times reports the city parks department is proposing to replace stretches of the

Mills has been working with the front office.

"With any different group, it seems like you're going to have, maybe some different ideas in certain areas. ... The feeling only lasted two holes.

Haas captured his fourth career PGA Tour title and moved to No. 12 in the world.

"To beat guys of that is amazing, caliber something I will never forget," Haas said.

Mickelson seized control early with the best shot he hit all week. With pin tucked in the back right corner on a new green at the fifth hole — a deep swale behind it and to the right Mickelson hooked a 9-iron that started out toward the gallery and wound up 4 feet away for birdie.

That put him at 9 under, two shots clear of Haas, who had birdied the par-3 sixth two groups ahead. Jonathan Byrd, who had been tied for the lead, made double bogey on No. 5 with a hooked tee shot into the hay.

All it took was a pair of mistakes by Mickelson to turn the back nine into a shootout, with a half-dozen players in the mix.
