Show of support

Citizens speak out in favor of 4B project during public hearing

If Tuesday night's public hearing is any indication, Crossroads residents are firmly behind the 4B project to overhaul the municipality's water and wastewater facilities using up to \$13 million in economic development funding set to go before voters next month.

More than a half-dozen area residents spoke in favor of the project during Tuesday night's meeting of the Big Spring City Council, which held a public hearing regarding the proposed project.

The project calls for the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation to provide \$750,000 a year for the first two years, and then 40 percent of its sales tax revenue — with a floor of \$500,000 and a ceiling of \$750,000 for the following 18 years — with the city of Big Spring picking up the remainder of the tab on the renovations, which are expected to total up to \$13 million.

Local resident Bo Fryar supports the initiative because she believes an improved infrastructure will help attract new businesses and residents to the Crossroads area.

"I am in favor of the 4B project. In

City, Alon OK water pact

After more than a month of negotiations, it appears the city of Big Spring and Alon USA — owner of the Big Spring Refinery — have been able to reach an agreement on raw water costs and price structures, as the city council voted unanimously Tuesday to approve a new contract between the two entities.

The contract — which was originally signed in 1957 — has been up-

dated during the years, with the most recent revision in 1997, when it was agreed the oil company would reimburse the city the same price it paid to the water district, plus 5 cents.

However, the expenditure weighing over the proceedings during the past several weeks is the fixed cost the city pays to the Colorado River Municipal Water District, overhead that totals more than \$3 million a year.

"Alon is planning to put in some water wells, decreasing the amount

of water they use from the city," Walker said. "That sounds good at first, however, it could have some drastic effects on our fiscal situation. They pay 25 percent of the overhead cost, which is based on how much water they use. However, if they decrease that amount drastically and cause that percentage to drop - say from 25 percent to 10 percent — the city will still have to pay the same





amount to CRMWD."

According to Walker, the contract approved by the council Tuesday will place a 20 percent floor on the amount of overhead Alon is required to pay.

"The contract stipulates Alon will pay a minimum of 20 percent of that fixed cost ... if, in fact, they have used 25 percent of our total purchases for that month, they will pay 25 percent of the fixed cost," Walker said. "If they use 30 percent, they will pay 30 percent.

"They are also going to pay the given water district delivery rate plus 25 cents per 1,000 gallons. We will review the contract annually to see if there are changes that need to be made. It will be a long-term contract, but we will review it annually to see if there are revisions that need to be made, and, if so, we'll be bringing those back to the council at that time."

Walker said the city's goal throughout the negotiations has been to reduce the municipality's risk if Alon should fall below the 20 percent mark in paying the fixed cost levied by CRMWD, a cost that must be paid before a single gallon of water is purchased by the city.

3A "What we've tried to do through these negotiations is try to mitigate some of the risk of Alon's consump-

tion going down so much that they are no longer paying between 20 and 25 percent of that fixed portion of our water usage," Walker told the council. "Mr. (Jimmy) Crosby has been very courteous and cordial to work with. Obviously, he's looking at Alon's profit margins while the city, on the other hand, is across the table looking at ways to mitigate our risk and keep from going up on the rates we have to pass along to our citizens."

Walker said she feels the new contract will allow the oil giant to see a reduction in its production costs if it manages to cut its water usage without hamstringing the city in the process.

The city of Big Spring — along with numerous other cities in droughtstricken West Texas — has been faced with drastic cuts in water deliveries from CRMWD, forcing the municipality to enact water-use restrictions as part of its Drought Contingency Plan, which is currently in Stage 3.

our neighbor city of Coahoma, their voters voted for the same kind of project in 2010 where funds could be used to build city infrastructure, as well as to attract new businesses," Fryar said. "They are doing a great job with that. In my opinion, the best thing you can do to draw new businesses into your community is to have good schools, good water, good streets and low taxes."

Norma Garcia echoed those remarks, saying the city must be ready to provide for the basic needs of a business.

"The infrastructure in our community has been ignored for far too long," Garcia said. "We can not expect to attract businesses, industry or even residents if we can not provide for the basic needs of our community, like a reliable water treatment and delivery system and good streets." Local resident Loretta Farquhar also offered up her support for the 4B project. "What is all this fuss about? Can't we all agree that we need good water and streets without potholes?" Farquhar said. "To clean up this decaying infrastructure is economic development in its truest form ... I support the decision to let our citizens vote on this issue." Local resident and former mayor Cotton Mize said he has no problem with using the EDC funds for the project. "When I look at the history of our economic development, I'm not really sure we're getting our money's worth," Mize said. "There have been businesses that have come in and there have been some to leave, but I can't help but think some could have stayed if our water and streets had been a little more accessible to the people. If we use the money to (renovate the)

water treatment plant, I can't help but believe our money is going to be a lot better spent. The water treatment plant will still be here, it won't be gone like some of the businesses will be."

Oscar Garcia, a former member of the Big Spring City Council, also spoke in favor of the project, saying area residents have a right to better water.

"This is a quality of life issue, above all else," Garcia said. "We have drinking water now that nobody drinks. This is water that should be accessible to everyone in the community, whether your income is \$1 million a year or you're just above the poverty level. You have the right to have good tasting water. You have the right to have a life that is healthy and comfortable and a future for

future generations." Not everyone who of-

"I'm for the 4B project but I'm against the way we're paying for it," local businessman Bobby McDonald said. "We're scuttling what I know we need. I've spent 10 vears in conferences and seminars and I have never heard any company say they were going to a particular city because it had good water. They come for other purposes. I want good water and I want good streets ... but I'm not sure it attracts industry the way we want it to.

"Do you know what it would cost to pay for that bond? Here's a quarter and here's a penny. It would cost 26 cents a day to pay for that \$11 million bond ...

we need a reserve and our best reserve is that half-percent (sale tax) we have put back for the EDC. If the EDC is shackled, it can't serve its purpose."

Former EDC board president Larry McLellan also warned the council and voters against levying such a heavy tax against the EDC for the next 20 years, saying nothing in life — no matter how it looks - is free.

"I'm disappointed we're looking totally at the EDC to pay 80 percent of this. I think we could have broken this apart - a little with the taxes, a little with the water department," McLellan said. "The

5-cent tax break we gave Nothing is free. It looks last year benefitted the average homeowner by \$16.48. That would have raised \$270,000 and that would have paid for onethird of this. For as little as \$2 a week, we could fund it totally through an increase in the water rate. There are other av-

enues. "It doesn't bother me for the EDC to help, it bothers me that this is going to be for 20 years. I hope the citizens of Big Spring will realize 20 years is much too long to tie up our arms for economic development and for the vision of Big Spring and growth in Big Spring. I feel like we're looking in the wrong direction.

free, but life is not free. You will get this and you will pay the price, believe me."

According to state law, because the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation, which is funded by local sales taxes, is designated a 4A entity, it can only fund 4B projects — in this case, an initiative to improve the city's infrastructure — if the project is approved by the city voters.

Early voting in this year's municipal elections is slated to begin Monday and end May 8, according to local election officials. The deadline to request a mailout ballot is May 4.




Tapping personal archives and family interviews plus a 40-year friendship with Carly, Davis has written a mesmerizing account of a wonderful musician.

You will find this in the large print biography section, on the west wall of the library.

While not a "new' book, just now in large print, "The Shadow of Your Smile" (LP F WAR S) by Susan May Warren is the story of a couple barely hanging on together.

As a beautiful blanket of snow covers Deep Haven, it can't quite hide the wreckage of Noelle and Eli Hueston's marriage. After 25 years, they're contemplating divorce. As soon as their youngest son graduates from high school, the marriage will be dissolved. But then an accident erases part of Noelle's memory.

Though her other injuries are minor, she doesn't remember Eli, their children, or the tragedy that has ripped their family apart. What's more, Noelle is shocked her life has turned out nothing like



As she tries to regain her memory and slowly steps into her role as a wife and mother, Eli helps her readjust to daily life with sometimes-hilarious, sometimes-heartwarming results. But can she fall in love again with a man she can't remember? Will their secrets destroy them?

she dreamed it would.

Or has erasing the past given them a chance for a future?

On "Dateline," I think, there was an episode on the new "rules' for grandparents today. Nowadays, you swaddle your grandchild, you lay them on their backs to go to sleep in the crib; there is nothing in the crib — no toys, bumpers, blankets, or anything — which the baby might get caught up in.



Supreme Court takes up Ariz. immigration law

Associated Press WASHINGTON The U.S. Supreme Court is questioning Arizona's tough "show me your papers" law aimed at driving illegal immigrants out of the state, amid objections from the Obama administration that states have a limited role to play in

immigration policy. The court's review of the Arizona law includes a provision that requires police, while enforcing other laws, to question a person's immigration status if officers suspect he is in the country illegally. In the final argument of the term Wednesday, the justices will explore whether lower federal courts were right to

block that and other key provisions.

The administration challenged the law in federal court soon after Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer signed it two years ago. Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, South Carolina and Utah passed similar laws, parts of which also are on hold pending the high court's decision.

The court hearing comes as presumptive Republican nominee Mitt Romney is trying to find a way to cut President Barack Obama's strong support among Latino voters.

Romney was drawn to the right on issues like immigration as he fought off other Republicans in state GOP primary elections.

On Monday, Romney signaled he was considering a wide range of with its 370-mile border immigration policies. including a proposal from Florida Sen. Marco Rubio that would allow some of the estimated 11 million illegal immigrants a chance at visas to stay in the U.S.

A decision in the highprofile immigration case is expected in late June as both camps will be gearing up for the general election.

Other blocked provisions of the Arizona law require all immigrants to obtain or carry immigration registration papers, make it a state criminal offense for an illegal immigrant to seek work or hold a job and allow police to arrest suspected illegal immigrants without warrants.

Arizona argues that

with Mexico, it has paid a disproportionate price for illegal immigration. It says its 2010 law is consistent with federal immigration policy.

conflict with a more nuanced federal immigration policy that seeks to balance national security, law enforcement, foreign policy, human rights and the rights of law-abiding citizens and immigrants.

If you are a fan of NFL football, you know that Stanford's Andrew Luck and Baylor's Robert Griffin III are projected to be picked early in the first round of the NFL draft. If you are a Big Spring Steers fan, you know that Ryan Tannehill, who just completed an impressive college career with Texas A&M, may just make as big a splash as Luck or Griffin.

That is not just hometown chatter either. According to national sports sources, Tannehill is widely viewed as the third most sought-after quarterback prospect in the 2012 draft. Some projections have him going as quickly as the third pick in the first round.

Whether or not the media is playing a role in hyping the young star up remains to be seen, but teams such as the Miami Dolphins, the Cleveland Browns, the Kansas City Chiefs and the Philadelphia Eagles have all been mentioned as possible takers for the 6'4", 222 pound Tannehill.


During his time in Big Spring, Tannehill helped guide the Steers to playoff contention. In his senior year (Class of '06), BSHS went three rounds deep into the Class 4-A playoffs, with Tannehill racking up 1,258 passing yards and 617 rushing yards.

Tannehill's parents, Tim and Cheryl are both Texas Technical University alumni. Growing up a TTU fan, that's where Tannehill had hoped to play college ball, but the Red Raiders didn't recruit him. He was looked at by several schools including TCU, Houston and UTEP, but decided Texas A&M was a good fit.

Originally, the Aggies played Tannehill at wide receiver for his first two years at, but he was converted back to quarterback midway through his junior year, and finished with an overall record of 12-7 as starting quarterback. He also appeared in three bowl games, earning a win for A&M when they defeated Northwestern by a score of 33-22 at

Tannehill is more than just a football player.

Ritchey compares Tannehill to another great Texas quarterback — Troy Aikman — the former gunslingerfor the Dallas Cowboys.

"I liken him to Aikmen," Ritchey explained. "He has that type of physical look and a strong arm. And I have had the opportunity to see him play, and I've seen the intangibles he can bring."

The Tannehill family is a family of athletes. But Ritchey believes that in addition to raising stellar competitors, Tim and Cheryl Tanehill have raised great kids.

Ryan's younger brother, Tyler, shined for the Steers during his time on the varsity squad. He may have had a chance to play college ball if it weren't for multiple knee injuries that hampered his prospects. Tobyn, a freshmen is the youngest of the three brothers and like his brothers, is involved with sports also.

"From a school administrators point of view, the Tannehills get involved," Ritchey said. "There's not a better set of parents. You got to give them credit. You can see the difference between kids whose parents get involved and those who don't."

Darvish, Rangers down Yankees

Darvish is getting better each time out for the Texas Rangers.

The Japanese standout may already be getting to a point when he will have a hard time topping himself, after striking out 10 and pitching into the ninth inning of a 2-0 victory over the New York Yankees on Tuesday night.

"After my last start, I mentioned my command is starting to come together. Stuff-wise, there wasn't much difference," Darvish said through his interpreter. "I still like to think that there's still more in me."

Ian Kinsler put the Rangers ahead to stay when he led off the first with a deep homer to left center off Hiroki Kuroda (1-3), who limited Texas to two runs and five hits over 6 2-3 innings.

In only his fourth major league start, and the seventh-ever MLB matchup of Japanese starters, Darvish (3-0) worked out of some early jams and got through 8 1-3 scoreless innings even while allowing seven hits.

Effective with his large array of pitches, including a fastball in the upper 90s and several biting breaking balls, the 25-year-old right-hander had a season-low two walks, and the 10 strikeouts were the most by a Texas pitcher this season.

"He just keeps getting better every time he takes the ball. Tonight, he used everything he had, and he was effective, very effective. He's getting more and more comfortable," manager Ron Washington said. "He

> Washington was going to give him a chance to finish the game but pulled Darvish after Nick Swisher's one-out single on his 119th pitch, his 82nd strike.

"We had a gameplan to make him throw strikes, and he definitely did that. If you tried to be patient you're down 0-1, 0-2. If you tried to be aggressive every pitch seemed like it started in the zone, then moved out of the zone."

Weeks leads Brewers overAstros

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A good night quickly turned into a nightmare for Bud Norris and the Houston Astros on Tuesday.

Rickie Weeks capped a five-run sixth inning with a three-run homer — one of four Brewers' homers in the game — as Milwaukee beat Houston 9-6.

"I felt good, I was pitching well," Norris said. "Ran into one really bad inning and I felt I made a couple good pitches, a couple bad ones to a ball club that can hit the ball out of the yard. That's something I need to get better at and move on.'

Corey Hart, Travis Ishikawa and Carlos Gomez also homered for Milwaukee, which moved back to .500 (9-9) and beat Houston for the 11th straight time. The Astros have lost eight of 10.

Norris (1-1) surrendered seven runs and nine hits in 5 2-3 innings - with Weeks sending his 102nd and last pitch deep above the Brewers bullpen.

"Bud threw the ball real well," Astros manager Brad Mills said. "Shoot, his pitch count was down and he was throwing the ball well, and they got the seven runs off him via the long ball. Two two-run homers and the three-run blast, that's the one that hurt."

Randy Wolf (1-2) struggled over six innings, giving up four hits and four walks, and striking out four. Alex Gonzalez added three hits, including an RBI single in the seventh, for Milwankee

John Axford allowed a single in the ninth but picked up his fourth save and 47th straight dating to last season, tying him with Brad Lidge for the fourth-longest streak all-time. The streak started a year ago Tuesday against the Astros.

Milwaukee blew it open with a five-run sixth behind two home runs. Ramirez singled to start the inning, and Hart followed with a 435foot homer into the camera box just below the center-field scoreboard. George Kottaras walked, and Gonzalez singled. Then, with two outs, the slumping Weeks homered. Weeks came in hitting .182 with two homers and just three RBIs.

Mills said he had no problem keeping Norris in as long as he did.

In the NFL, free agency helps but draft is key

NEW YORK (AP) — The haul in free agency and through trades has strengthened the Broncos, Bills and Bears. Now comes the lifeblood of any NFL team: the draft.

Denver merely landed the best quarterback ever to hit free agency, Peyton Manning. Buffalo homed in on one player to be a difference maker, 2006 top overall draft pick Mario Williams, and signed him before his only visit to a team ended. Chicago dealt for the No. 1 receiver it lacked, getting Brandon Marshall, and bolstered its roster by signing running back Michael Bush and even a quality backup quarterback behind the injury-prone Jay Cutler in Jason Campbell.

With Manning aboard, the Broncos are in a winnow mode.

"I think the bottom line is we want to do the best thing to surround him with a team that's going to give him an opportunity to win," Broncos boss John Elway said. "We want to come out of every draft ... with players that are impact players. As I said last year, you have a lot more misses in my mind when you draft to need, so we're going to find the best players in positions of need, but also try to find those impact players that are going to come in and help us right away. "We're talking about now. Impact doesn't necessarily mean a starter, but one that can come in and help us win."

Unquestionably, Manning is the major addition, as influential a newcomer as you can get. Denver could use an upgrade at receiver, and the Broncos just might target one at No. 25 overall.

The style of defense in Buffalo will be aggressive, with Williams as the focal point. Coming off a torn chest muscle that cost him the final 11 games of last season, the defensive end/linebacker still got the biggest contract in NFL history for someone on that side of the ball: \$100 million for six years, with \$50 million guaranteed.

Bills general manager Buddy Nix, however, always has emphasized that building a competitive team is done through the draft, and there's no shortcut to that approach. Nix's goal from the beginning has been to compile experienced depth — through the draft.

"My point is we've said from Day 1 that if there's a guy there that we think can make the difference we'll be aggressive and go after the guy," Nix said. "So this just plugs up a piece of the puzzle and he'll get us over the hump. He's a position of need that we were able to fill, but the same philosophy will hold through in the draft.

"I think it had a lot of impact on us really," Nix added of putting Williams, end Mark Anderson (another free agency signing), and incumbent tackles Kyle Williams and Marcell Dareus together. "Therefore, we're a little freer as far as who we pick (10th overall)."

"We got better," star linebacker Brian Urlacher said. "On paper we're a better football team than we were last year at the end of the season, so I'm excited about that."

And Chicago hasn't even made a draft pick yet.

Free agency also strongly helped the Cowboys and Buccaneers retool weakened rosters, freeing them to concentrate on quality over need early in the draft. That most benefits Tampa Bay, which chooses fifth and could have available the top receiver (Oklahoma State's Justin Blackmon), the best pass rusher (North Carolina's Quinton Coples), most proficient running back (Alabama's Trent Richardson) or a shutdown cornerback (LSU's Morris Claiborne).

"I think there's value throughout this draft that fits the needs of our team," GM Mark Dominik said. "I don't truly believe a draft board is ever really set. You're always tweaking your board."

Middleweight fight blocked at El Paso's Sun Bowl

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A June 16 fight between WBC world middleweight champion Julio Cesar Chavez Jr. and Andy Lee will not happen in El Paso as scheduled after the University of Texas System chancellor blocked the use of the Sun Bowl, promoters said Tuesday.

Chancellor Francisco Cigarroa contacted Texas-El Paso officials one

hour before Top Rank was to hold a news conference to announce the fight, Top Rank vice president Carl Moretti said.

Citing security concerns over border violence, Cigarroa told UTEP officials the bout could not take place with UTEP facilities, Moretti said.

Moretti said Top Rank is searching for another venue for the June 16 fight. Houston and San Antonio are being considered, and arrangements should be made by the weekend, he said.

Moretti said the move was unique in his experience in boxing promotions, "and I've been in it for 25 years. I can tell you the people from UTEP were as amazed as we were and as shocked as we were." The directive was the result of "a specific-event risk assessment," according to a UT System statement.

"The conclusion was that the risk was higher than normal. Based on this assessment, the decision was made that the university and Sun Bowl would not be an appropriate venue for this specific event," according to the statement.

Romo feels he is getting stronger as **Dallas' quarterback**

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Tony Romo still wakes up thinking about how he can get better at football, not if he is running out of chances with the Dallas Cowboys.

The quarterback and first-time father also gets a smile on his face being around his newborn son each day.

"Yeah, I think it's definitely a good change and as you continue to grow, you obviously go through the different life changes," Romo said Tuesday after a workout at Valley Ranch, three days after his 32nd birthday. "We're lucky enough to have everyone be healthy and through the process and it just makes you smile every morning. It really does."

While Romo is just getting starting in fatherhood and has been married less than a year, he is heading into his 10th season since joining the Cowboys as an undrafted free agent.

There are only two years left on his contract, and he's got only one playoff victory in his six seasons as the starting quarterback.

Romo threw for 4,184 yards with 31 touchdowns and 10 interceptions last season, but the Cowboys were 8-8 and missed the playoffs for the second year in a row.

"It's frustrating whenever you don't accomplish your goal each season and obviously that's to win the Super Bowl," Romo said. "The thing I can control is how hard I work, how much better I'm getting every single year and am I bringing these guys along to make them as good as they can be. Because that's part of my job and I think that that's part of what it takes to win a Super Bowl. And that's what we're doing."

The three-time Pro Bowler said the exciting part personally is that he still thinks he is getting better every year.

When asked how much longer he wants to play, Romo smiled and responded, "15 more years, maybe." He later said he'd probably stop only when he feels he is regressing, but he doesn't feel that is close to happening yet.

Still, he has to be taking better care of himself since he's getting older. Right?

"Nah, that's probably not accurate yet. I think that I didn't start playing in the league at 22, 23. A lot of that's the hits that you take over time," he said. "So I think I'll probably have a lot of that stuff later on. That probably starts creeping in about 34, 35. Hopefully I'll be able to make it until a little later than that before you start feeling that."

Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman, who won three Super Bowls for the Cowboys in the 1990s, recently made comments about Romo already being a better quarterback than he ever was during his 12 seasons with the Cowboys.

When Cowboys owner Jerry Jones was asked about those comments at the NFL meetings last month, Jones said he had three Super Bowl rings because of Aikman.

"We have many things I think that we agree on. His assessment that Romo is a Super Bowl-caliber quarterback is one that we really agree on," Jones said. "But I have a little hard time making the same comparison he did.'

In 1972, Polaroid Corp. introduced its SX-70 folding camera, which ejected self-developing photographs. Actor George Sanders was found dead in his hotel room near Barcelona, Spain; he was 65.

In 1983, Soviet leader Yuri V. Andropov invited Samantha Smith to visit his country after receiving a letter from the Manchester, Maine, schoolgirl.

In 1992, Islamic forces in Afghanistan took control of most of the capital of Kabul following the collapse of the

Communist government.


