# **Two face** robbery charges **By THOMAS JENKINS**

A pair of Big Spring men were arrested early Sunday morning after law enforcement officials allege they were part of an aggravated robbery in the 1000 block of E. 16th

Street

Thaddeus Ontario Straughter, 21, of 1401 Virginia, was arrested Sunday on two counts of aggravated robbery, according to police reports. Also arrested was Jordan Allen McLeod, 21, of 618 Tulane, who is also charged with two counts of aggravated robbery.

According to Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the Big Spring Police Department, the two suspects were part of a group which allegedly robbed a pair of victims

in the area of the 1000 block of E. 16<sup>th</sup> Street at approximately 2:30 a.m.

"According to reports, there were two males in the 1000 block of E. 16<sup>th</sup> Street when a vehicle pulled up," Everett said. "The vehicle was occupied by four male suspects, two of which appeared to be armed Straughter with handguns. The suspects took

property from the victims and fled the scene." Everett said Straughter and McLeod were located nearby shortly after the robbery had occurred.

"Officers made the two arrests based on witness statements," Everett said. "There were no injuries reported as a result of the robbery or the arrest. Investigators are still looking for the other two suspects, so we fully expect more arrests in this case."



"It wouldn't matter if they took \$1,000 or one cent, the value of the property has no effect on the charge," Everett said. "As soon as they displayed the handguns it became aggravated robbery."

Aggravated robbery is a first-degree felony punishable by five to 99 years to life in prison and a fine not to exceed

Division I ratings at recent concert competition — aside from Harris' Honor Band, the Symphonic Band (directed by Hale), Concert Band and the No. 1 junior high band (both conducted by Daniel Garrett) earned the top UIL ratings. ### Advocate for blind Chinese lawyer says U.S. asylum deal expected

BEIJING (AP) - U.S. and Chinese officials are ironing out a deal to secure American asylum for a blind Chinese legal activist who fled house arrest, with an agreement likely before Secretary of State Hillary Clinton arrives this week, a U.S. rights campaigner said Monday.

Bob Fu of the Texas-based rights group ChinaAid said that China and the U.S. want to reach agreement on the fate of Chen Guangcheng before the annual high-level talks with Clinton and other U.S. officials begin in Beijing on Thursday.

"The Chinese top leaders are deliberating a decision to be made very soon, maybe in the next 24 to 48 hours," Fu said, citing a source close to the U.S. and Chinese governments. Both sides are "eager to solve this issue," said Fu, a former teacher at a Communist Party academy in Beijing whose advocacy group focuses on the rights of Christians in

### Syria: 2 blasts that kill at least 8 in city of Idlib carried out by bombers

BEIRUT (AP) — Syria's state news agency says the two explosions that killed at least eight people in the city of Idlib were carried out by suicide bombers.

The state news agency, SANA, said Monday's blasts wounded nearly 100 people. The explosions were near a military compound, but it's not clear what the target was.

The force of the explosions shattered windows in the area and sent debris flying for hundreds of meters

### Sailboat wreckage found hours after disappearance,

ENSENADA, Mexico (AP) — Eric Lamb was doing safety patrol on a 124-mile yacht race when he spotted a boat that appeared too close to Mexico's Coronado Islands. He never got there.

As his twin-engine boat neared the uninhabited islands just south of San Diego, he stumbled on sailboat shards that were mostly no more than six inches long strewn over about two square miles. He saw a small refrigerator, a white seat cushion and empty containers of yogurt and soy milk.

Over several hours, a U.S. Coast Guard helicopter directed him in his search and led him to two dead bodies floating with their backs up, badly scraped and bruised. The Coast Guard recovered a third body and the fourth member of the crew was missing Monday in California's second deadly accident this month involving an ocean race.

Lamb, 62, said the 37-foot racing yacht looked like it "had gone through a blender."

"It was real obvious it had been hit just because the debris was so small," he said Sunday.

### Once rivals, Obama and Clintons forge genuine partnership

McLEAN, Va. (AP) - There were no bear hugs on display, but President Barack Obama and former President Bill Clinton looked relaxed and friendly as they began a summer fundraising blitz that demonstrates their shared hopes for Democratic victory despite past differences.

Although Clinton had dismissed Obama in 2008 as undeserving of the presidency his wife Hillary Rodham Clinton was then seeking, on Sunday evening Clinton warmly declared "Barack Obama deserves to be re-elected president of the United States."

Obama is "beating the clock" to restore the nation's economy to health, Clinton told about 500 cheering supporters who had paid as little at \$1,000 and as much as \$20,000 apiece to see, as Obama put it, "two presidents for one."

### Obama hosts

Japan prime minister

WASHINGTON (AP) — Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihiko Noda, in his Monday meeting with President Barack Obama, is looking to reaffirm Japan's strong alliance with the U.S. and boost his leadership credentials as his popularity flags at home.

Noda, who came to power in September and is Japan's sixth prime minister in six years, faces huge challenges in reviving a long-slumbering economy and helping his nation recover from the worst nuclear crisis since Chernobyl.

His Oval Office meeting and working lunch with Obama, to be followed by a gala dinner hosted by Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, could offer Noda some brief relief from domestic woes. The two sides are determined to show that U.S.-Japan ties are as close as ever, particularly after the assistance the U.S. lent following the massive March 2011 earthquake and tsunami that triggered a meltdown at a nuclear plant.

The U.S. alliance with Japan, the world's thirdlargest economy, is at the core of Obama's expanded engagement in Asia — a diplomatic thrust motivated in part by a desire to counter the growing economic and military clout of strategic rival China.

The U.S. has about 50,000 troops in Japan, and both sides never tire of saying that their defense cooperation underpins regional peace and security.

### Officials probe cause of accident that killed 7, including 3 kids

NEW YORK (AP) — Three generations of a family died in a horrifying crash just a few miles from home when the SUV they were traveling in plunged more than 50 feet off a highway overpass and into a ravine on the grounds of the Bronx Zoo, killing all seven aboard, including three children.

"Sometimes you come upon events that are horrific and this is one of them," FDNY deputy Chief Ronald Werner said shortly after the crash.

Authorities were trying to determine what caused Sunday's accident that killed Jacob Nunez, 85, and Ana Julia Martinez, 81, both from the Dominican Republic, their daughters, Maria Gonzalez, 45, and Maria Nunez, 39, and three grandchildren. Police say Gonzalez was driving.

The children were identified as Jocelyn Gonzalez, 10, the daughter of the driver, Niely Rosario, 7, and Marly Rosario, 3, both daughters of Nunez.

'They were a good, wholesome family," a Bronx neighbor, Felicia Lee, 29, told the Daily News.

### Cross-country fugitive siblings being sentenced in Colorado

DENVER (AP) — Three Florida siblings accused of shooting at a police officer and staging a daring bank robbery in a multistate crime spree are facing sentencing on charges stemming from their shootout and capture in Colorado — effectively ending their stay here as Georgia authorities await their extradition.

Lee Grace Dougherty, 29, Dylan Stanley-Dougherty, 27, and Ryan Dougherty, 22, pleaded guilty to charges related to the Aug. 10 freeway chase and shootout with police in southern Colorado. Once 3rd Judicial District Judge Claude Appel hands down their sentences, the U.S. Marshals Service will transport them to Albany, Ga., for a court hearing on May 15, making it likely they'll be transferred from state to federal custody within days, if not hours of Monday's sentencing.

Consider this deal from a pairs

contest played many years ago in Los Angeles. The final contract at most tables was four hearts by South, and at practically every table the outcome was down one after the ten-of-diamonds opening lead.

Declarer covered the ten with the jack and took East's queen with the ace. After drawing three rounds of

trumps, South returned the six of diamonds. West showed out, and East, holding the Q-8 of diamonds over dummy's 9-7, won the six with the eight and shifted to a club. Declarer had no choice but to play low on the club even though West was marked with the king for his overcall. So South ended up losing a spade, two diamonds and a club for down one. At one table, however, declarer (Meyer Schleifer) made the contract Exercising his customary wizardry, Schleifer ducked the ten of diamonds in dummy and then allowed the ten to hold the trick!

As a result of this extraordinary play, the contract could not be defeated. West could do no better than shift to a trump, and after draw-ing three rounds of trumps, Schleifer played the ace and another diamond.

East won with the king and returned a club, but school was out. Schleifer went up with the ace, crossed to dummy with a diamond, discarded his club loser on the fifth diamond and conceded a spade to the ce — making four. Ducking the ten of diamonds is ace

clearly the right play. West's lead must be either a singleton or from the 10-8 doubleton. In either case, nothing can be lost by retaining dummy's jack and then, after East produces the eight, holding up the ace. The double-duck might be ingenious, but it is also dictated by the circumstances.

# Spurs, Parker take first postseason game from Jazz

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — This was not another early playoff letdown by the San Antonio Spurs. For the first time in four years, they won a series opener.

But more important to them was Tony Parker looking like his old postseason self.

Putting together his best playoff game since 2009, Parker scored 28 points and the top-seeded Spurs erased four years of putting themselves in 0-1 holes to start the playoffs, beating the Utah Jazz 106-91 in Game 1 of their first-round series Sunday.

It marked the 11th straight win for the Spurs dating to the regular season, and kept the Spurs from being hounded by the same doubts that emerged this time last year when they also entered the playoffs as the No. 1 seed, only to be ousted by Memphis.

"I think everybody knows what happened last year," Parker said. "Everybody's motivated this year, but we don't even talk about it.'

What Parker — and coach Gregg Popovich— have talked about is the All-Star's unremarkable series against the Grizzlies a year ago. Popovich told Parker that he thought his star point guard tried harder with the French national team last summer than in the playoffs, and Parker vowed to return with a different attitude.

He's making good on it so far.

The Jazz, meanwhile, hung close for three quarters in the franchise's first playoff game without Jerry Sloan since 1988. Paul Millsap led Utah with 20 points, but the Jazz couldn't keep up when the NBA's top 3-point shooting team began burying them with three in a two-minute burst to finish the third.

"The biggest thing we're going to learn is the different ways to guard the pick and roll, and what worked and what didn't," Jazz guard Gordon Haywood said. "We can't let them get to the paint as easily, because it's kick out 3's and dump down's and whatever. So we have to do better at that."

Game 2 is Wednesday in San Antonio.

Hayward scored 17 points and Al Jefferson had 16 for the Jazz, who present the Spurs problems with a bigger frontcourt but contributed to their own doom with 16 turnovers.

"But we are a young team," Millsap said. "Things like that happen."

Tim Duncan added 17 points and 11 rebounds for the Spurs, who despite boasting the No. 1 seed for a second straight year hadn't won a Game 1 in its last six postseason series. The last one was a double-overtime win over Phoenix in 2008, which was also round the last time that the Spurs entered the playoffs as healthy as they are now.

But they didn't leave this game entirely scot-free.

Parker shook off a slow start to shoot 10 of 19 from the floor. He also had eight assists in his best playoff game since scoring 43 against Dallas in 2009.

"We needed this one. We played a pretty good game. It wasn't brilliant," said Spurs guard Manu Ginobili, who had seven points. "But it was steady and we kept fighting."

# Astros can't hold off Lyles, Cincinatti

CINCINNATI (AP) -Houston's Jordan Lyles pitched well enough to win his first start. Unfortunately, for the 21-yearold right-hander, the Astros' bullpen blew the lead, sending him back down to Oklahoma City with a no decision.

Jay Bruce's fourth home run in four games lifted the Cincinnati Reds to a 6-5 comeback win over the Astros on Sunday.

Lyles, who was recalled Sunday to make an emergency start in place of Kyle Weiland, gave up three runs and four hits in six innings. He walked three and struck out four, leaving with a 4-3 lead.

"He threw the ball extremely well," manager Brad Mills said. "He had thrown the ball so well, we wanted to get him out of there with a lead."

The Astros sent Lyles back to Triple A Oklahoma City after the game. Infielder Marwin Gonzalez will return from paternity leave.

"We told him there have been guys that have come up here (major leagues) for one day and ended up staying,' Mills said before the game. "We just told him to go pitch."

Lyles impressed the Astros in spring training but at 21 wasn't

"It went well," Lyles said. "I was using a new delivery and windup. It was the second game that I've used it. I was working the ball downhill. It pretty much went as planned."

Bruce hit reliever Fernando Rodriguez's (0-3) first pitch 381 feet into the right field seats for his seventh homer of the season. Bruce has hit home runs in a career-high four consecutive games, one short of tying Cincinnati's club record.

"This is what you play for," said Bruce, who leads the Reds in homers. "This is a hard game. There are a lot of times when it's not too much fun."

Joey Votto drove in four runs with a home run and a double to help the Reds capture their third consecutive series and finish the month of April with a .500 record (11-11) after losing eight of their first 12.

"The way we started was really ugly," Votto said. "It was a shock to everybody. It was humbling, but I think it was a good thing, too. I'm a firm believer in that, while you don't want to start bad, it doesn't hurt.







# Hamilton leaves game, Rangers lose to Rays

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) -Now that the Texas Rangers have lost a series for the first time this season, they hope Josh Hamilton will be back soon to help make sure it doesn't become a habit.

David Price beat Texas for the first time in 10 career starts and the Tampa Bay Rays won 5-2 Sunday night, making them the first team to take a series from the Rangers this year.

Texas played most of the game without Hamilton, the American League leader in home runs and RBIs. He left in the third inning with back spasms and is day to day.

"It's no big deal," said Rangers manager Ron Washington, ejected on his 60th birthday. "We'll see (Monday night in Toronto). If he feels better, he'll be out there. If not, we'll give him his A game for a few innings, another day."

Hamilton was injured while getting his 25th RBI on a single to center in the first that scored Elvis Andrus.

The outfielder winced as he ran back to the dugout after beingforced out on Adrian Beltre's grounder. He was slow to come out on the field for the start of the second inning and stayed in the dugout in the third.

Price (4-1) gave up two runs and six hits in 6 1-3 innings, striking out six and walking one. The two-time All-Star entered 0-6 with a 5.30 ERA against the Rangers — including a pair of playoff starts.

"He had his A game tonight, and he's capable of doing that,' Washington said. "In the past when we faced him, he had

and he had a bad inning that we took advantage of. Tonight, we couldn't sustain anything against him."

Ben Zobrist had three hits and an RBI, and Price earned his fourth victory in five starts. Tampa Bay touched up Texas lefty Derek Holland (2-2) for five extra-base hits.

Holland allowed five runs and nine hits in seven innings, striking out eight. He walked Carlos Pena to start the third and gave up a run-scoring double to Zobrist.

Price was able to work his fastball in and out and keep the league's best-hitting club off balance with an effective changeup.

"They've got power 1 through 9," Price said.

### Dufner wins Zurich Classic, first PGA event of career

AP Sports Writer AVONDALE, La. — A first-time PGA Tour win-

ner one weekend, a married man the next. The spring of 2012 will go down as a memorable time in Jason Dufner's life.

Although it took pair of playoff holes, Dufner finally proved he could hold it together and make a mid-tournament lead stand up, making a birdie on his second extra trip down the par-5 18th hole at the TPC Louisiana to win the Zurich Classic in a playoff with Ernie Els.

"It's always really tough playing on Sundays whether you're in the lead or middle of the pack, and today I was fighting, trying to win an event, and I think I showed myself a good bit out there," said the 35-year-old Dufner, whose wedding is next weekend. "Ernie made a great run at me and it felt like with five or six holes (to go) we were probably going to be battling for the win."

Dufner, whose average score at the cut this season ranks second on the Tour, finished atop the leader board for the first time in 164 career PGA Tour starts.

Now if he can only figure out his honeymoon plans.

"The honeymoon is going to be at The Players Championship," Dufner joked about the event in two weeks at TPC Sawgrass. "They got an island green."

Dufner's fiancée, Amanda Boyd, wasn't about to complain. Watching from behind the 18th green, she was tearful as Dufner finally made the clutch shots he needed to finish on top.

"It's awesome. He's been so close so many times. I don't feel like it's real," Boyd said. "It will be a good wedding."

Dufner said he was more nervous about his final putt of less than 2 feet than about his impending marriage.

"There's a been a good bit of pressure," Dufner said. "People talking about, 'Why aren't you winning? Why can't you close the deal? ... Friends, family, media, even people in my inner circle. And not in a negative way, but when you're leading tournaments going into weekends and you're finishing 24th, there's going to be some questions." The win should also stamp out some of the bad memories haunting Dufner since the Masters, when he shared the lead after two rounds but faded to 24th. Dufner lost playoffs last year to Mark Wilson in the Phoenix Open and Keegan Bradley in the PGA Championship for two of his three career runner-up finishes. He had held five previous leads through two rounds, including twice this year. Entering the fourth round with a two-shot lead in New Orleans, Dufner shot a 2-under 70, while Els had a 67 to match Dufner for a course-record 19-under 269 total.

first playoff, so they went back to the 18th tee for the second extra hole, which Dufner won by hitting the green in two strokes and tapping home a short birdie putt after Els' birdie attempt from the fringe narrowly missed.

The 6-foot-3 Els, who goes by the nickname "The Big Easy," hasn't won on the PGA Tour since the 2010 Arnold Palmer Invitational at Bay Hill, a little more than two years ago.

He did not have a bogey in the final round or the playoff, and could have celebrated his 19th career PGA Tour title in the Big Easy if he could have made a birdie putt of a little less than 6 feet on the first playoff hole.

"It was a nice little charge I made and, you know, nice to catch the leader," Els said. "I had a chance to win the tournament with a 6-footer and missed it, but I made quite a few putts on the back nine to keep myself in it. ... Hit the ball pretty well today — no bogeys on the final round — so there's a lot of positives."

On the second playoff hole, Els' tee shot went into a fairway bunker, and his second shot landed 137 yards from the pin. His third shot landed on the fringe, nearly 19 feet from the pin, but he nearly saved birdie from there, his putt missing by 2 inches.

Dufner then made his birdie putt, and in his typically low-key way, briefly raised both arms to acknowledge the cheering crowd before casually walking off the green to accept some congratulatory hugs.

After becoming the seventh player to take his first career PGA Tour triumph in New Orleans since 2002, Dufner called it a "great wedding present" for himself and his bride to be.

"It helps with paying for the wedding, obviously," added Dufner, who earned \$1,152,000. "They're a little more expensive than I thought or had imagined. ... It'll be a big celebration not only for our marriage but also for my first victory out on the Tour." Luke Donald shot a 67 to finish third at 17 under, and move past Rory McIlroy for the No. 1 ranking in the world. Defending Zurich Classic champ Bubba Watson, playing for the first time since a life-changing win at the Masters over Easter weekend, entered the final round eight shots off the lead. He was unable to mount a charge after bogeys on his first two holes. He wound up tied for 18th at 11 under, a solid outing by most standards, but one of his worst finishes of the year. "All in all, pretty good week being tired, coming back for the first time after winning the Masters, all this different media attention," Watson said. "It's something you got to get used to. (It) wears on you, tires you out. Somehow I finished — I'm in the top 20. A lot of guys wished they did that." Els and Dufner were tied at 19 under after 11 holes. Els made par on each of his final seven holes of regulation. Dufner made par on his final eight, none more difficult than on 16, when he hit into water, but salvaged par with a 44-foot putt.

# Durant, Thunder spoil Mavs' playoff opener

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Kevin Durant was determined to not let the Oklahoma City Thunder lose another playoff game at home to Dallas.

He scored 25 points and hit the winning jumper from the foul line with 1.5 seconds left to give the Thunder a 99-98 victory over the Mavericks on Saturday night in Game 1 of the first-round playoff series — a rematch of last year's Western Conference finals.

The Thunder trailed by seven with  $2\frac{1}{2}$  minutes left before rallying to take the first step toward avenging a 4-1 series loss a year ago.

"It's the playoffs," Durant said. "No matter how it gets done, you've got to do it."

With his team trailing by one late in the fourth quarter, he forced his way toward the lane and found himself with defenders closing in and the clock winding down.

Durant maneuvered to the free throw line and got off a high-arcing shot over Shawn Marion that hit off the front of the rim and then off the backboard before falling through the net.

The defending NBA champion Mavericks, who were out of timeouts, could not get a shot off before the buzzer.

"If you have a timeout, you can move the ball (to half-court) and maybe have a look at it," said Dirk Nowitzki, who had hit two free throws with 9 seconds left to put Dallas ahead. "But if you don't have a timeout, that's definitely a buzzer-beater."

Nowitzki scored 11 of his 25 points in the final 5 minutes, going on a personal 7-1 run that made it 92-85 with 3:23 to go.

He then answered Russell Westbrook's layup with a foul line jumper to restore the seven-point advantage, but it didn't prove to be enough.

"It's tough. This is definitely as tough of a loss as you can get," Nowitzki said. "But if a team can recover it, it's an experienced one and we definitely have a lot of older guys who have been through a lot."

Westbrook led the Thunder with 28 points and Serge Ibaka had 22 points and five blocks. James Harden scored 19 points in his first game since sustaining a concussion when the Los Angeles Lakers' Metta World Peace hit him with an elbow last Sunday and earned a seven-game suspension.

Dallas' Jason Terry added 20 points — but none in the fourth quarter — and Marion had 17.

"We're going to keep coming at these guys. Trust me, we're going to keep going at 'em," coach Rick Carlisle said. "We have a tough-minded team. We have a locker room full of champions."

The second-seeded Thunder played catch-up most of the night, and Durant led the charge on the final push of seven straight Oklahoma City points before his right-handed slam tied it at 94 with 1:27 remaining.

Dallas went back ahead with an out-of-control possession, with Harden knocking the ball away from Jason Kidd and then Nowitzki losing it, too, before Vince Carter missed a desperation baseline jumper. Ian Mahinmi rebounded the miss and got fouled, stepping to the line to hit two free throws with 1:03 to play. Durant drove to set up Ibaka's three-point play at the other end, bumping the Thunder ahead 97-96. Nowitzki committed his second turnover of the final 3 minutes and Durant missed along the baseline before the two All-Stars came through in the clutch — with Durant getting the last chance. "It was a great shot," Harden said. "It saved the game for us. I don't think we played well ... but he saved us at the end."

Both missed birdie putts within 8 feet in the
