Funny money passers nabbed

Officials with the Big Spring Police Department say Wednesday's arrest of a pair of alleged counterfeiters could be tied to recent reports of fake bills in other Permian Basin cities, however, it's too early in the investigation to know for

James Anthony Griego, 17, was arrested Wednesday and booked into the county detention center Thursday by the BSPD on a charge of forgery of a government instrument after police officials say he and a juvenile suspect tried to pass counterfeit \$100 bills at



erett, public information officer with the BSPD, cashiers with the local department

spotted the fake bills and alerted authorities.

"The cashiers weren't fooled by the counterfeits, which weren't of a very high quality at all," Everett said. "They alerted the police depart-

ment. The suspects left the store without the merchandise because the store employees are not allowed to detain the suspects. "Shortly after the call came in on the counterfeit

bills, a patrol officer spotted a vehicle matching the description fitting the one provided by the employees at Wal-Mart. The occupants in the vehicle also fit the description and they were arrested and charged." Everett said this may not be

the first time the pair have

tried to pass funny money in the Big Spring area.

"We've had similar counterfeit \$100 bills turn up previously," Everett said. "We had one show up at the H-E-B a while back that was very similar to the ones these two were trying to pass. We're not sure if they were passing them or if they might have made their way there by circulation. The investigation is ongoing."

Everett said the Secret Service — the federal agency charged with investigating most cases of counterfeiting U.S. Currency — has been notified.

"We're not sure yet, but

Economists forecast modest U.S. hiring in April, leaving unemployment rate unchanged

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. hiring likely picked up last month after its March swoon, though the gains are expected to be modest.

Economists predict employers added 163,000 jobs in April. That would be better than the disappointing 120,000 jobs created in March. But it's not enough to lower the unemployment rate, which is expected to stay at 8.2 percent — a three-year low.

The Labor Department will release the report at 8:30 a.m. Eastern time Friday. The economy created an average of 246,000 jobs a

month from December through February. The hiring slowdown in March sparked fears that job growth was weakening.

Some economists have said that a mild winter led some companies to accelerate hiring in January and February. That may have weakened March's figures. For many, April's report will serve as more of a bellwether.

Don't break oaths and don't kill Muslims: In letters, bin Laden worried about al-Qaida image

CAIRO (AP) — During his last months holed up in a villa in Pakistan, one of the concerns on Osama bin Laden's mind was image control: Al-Qaida's branches and allies were making the terror network look bad in the eyes of the Islamic

A newly released selection of letters captured in the U.S. raid that killed bin Laden a year ago shows the al-Qaida leader was meticulous in tracking how his associates' actions and public statements reflected on the cause of jihad, or holy war. And he frequently tried to keep them in line.

In an October 2010 letter to a top lieutenant, bin Laden complains about Faisal Shahzad, the militant recruited by the Pakistani Taliban to set off a

car bomb in New York's Times Square. The May 2010 bombing failed. During his trial, Shahzad — a Pakistani who gained U.S. citizenship — told the court he "didn't mean it" when he took his American citizenship oath, which includes a vow not to harm the United States. Bin Laden said lying about an oath breaks Islamic

"This is not the kind of lying to the enemy that is permitted. It is treachery," bin Laden wrote. He told his lieutenant to take it up with Hakimullah Mehsud, the leader of the Pakistani Taliban, and ensure it didn't happen again.

Gay-rights leaders press Obama for further moves on workplace bias, same-sex marriage The refrain sounded by his aides is accurate:

Barack Obama has done more for the cause of gay rights than any president before him. Nonetheless, gay-rights activists and organiza-

tions are on the president's case these days, pressing him for further steps on two fronts and suggesting that political timidity is holding him back. One source of frustration is Obama's stance on

same-sex marriage — he has yet to endorse it even though he advocates equal rights for gay and lesbian couples. Tensions may mount as activists and many leading Democrats call for the Democratic National Convention to support marriage equality in the platform it will adopt in September. The other dispute involves a months-long cam-

paign by gay-rights advocates urging Obama to issue an executive order barring federal contractors from discriminating against employees on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. The White House says Obama supports the goal

of such workplace protections but believes the best solution is for Congress to pass the long-pending Employment Non-Discrimination Act, which would extend those protections to workers in all sectors nationwide.

Is a click worth a thousand words? Judge says Facebook 'like' not protected by First Amendment

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — The "like" button on Facebook seems like a relatively clear way to express your support for something, but a federal judge says that doesn't mean clicking it is constitutionally protected speech.

Exactly what a "like" means — if anything played a part in a case in Virginia involving six people who say Hampton Sheriff B.J. Roberts fired them for supporting an opponent in his 2009 reelection bid, which he won. The workers sued, saying their First Amendment rights were violated.

Roberts said some of the workers were let go because he wanted to replace them with sworn deputies while others were fired because of poor performance or his belief that their actions "hindered the harmony and efficiency of the office."

One of those workers, Daniel Ray Carter, had "liked" the Facebook page of Roberts' opponent, Jim Adams.

While public employees are allowed to speak as citizens on matters of public concern, U.S. District Judge Raymond Jackson ruled that clicking the "like" button does not amount to expressive speech. In other words, it's not the same as actually writing out a message and posting it on the site.

"If the court rules in favor of it will effectively legalize the harassment and discrimination of an entire population — just because of the color of their skin or the accent with which they speak," warns immigrant rights advocate Frank Sharry. "Under this law anyone 'reasonably suspect' of being here without immigration status has to be asked by law enforcement to produce their papers. If allowed to go into effect, citizens and immigrants

Yet when SB 1070 went before the Supreme Court last week, Chief Justice Roberts had the audacity to assure us that "this is not a case about ethnic profiling."

Is he for real? Latinos and other legal immigrants in Arizona already are complaining about being profiled! And that's in spite of the courts barring the law from taking effect.

Imagine what happens if the

Supreme Court gives it a green light, not only for Arizona but for several other states that have been waiting to emulate its draconian measures. Is there any doubt that it would lead to widespread discrimination against Latinos and other "immigrantlooking" Americans? Yet, if the tea leaf readers are

correct, this Supreme Court could take us all into the state of intolerance that Arizona has become. The Statue of Liberty would become a symbol of the nation we used to be. "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free ..." would become a sad joke. Our proud tradition as nation that appreciates the contributions of immigrants would be thrashed.

If the federal government fails to prevail in its case against Arizona, for Latinos and other immigrant-looking Americans around the country, the civil rights clock would be turned back for several decades.

And given the forceful way in which the majority of the justices seemed to attack the U.S. government's position for more than an hour last week, Arizona officials are optimistic that their mean-spirited measures will prevail.

Even immigrant rights advocates seem to be bracing themselves for a terrible blow when the Supreme Court rules on SB 1070 in late June.

"Changing the course of history has never been easy, and the fight for immigrant justice is no different," said Sharry, who heads the America's Voice Education Fund. "But the truth is that the number of angry extremists in this country is relatively small, and their days of blocking humane and sensible immigration reform are numbered."

While this may be true — be-

cause demographics don't lie a Supreme Court decision to uphold SB 1070 could be devastating. U.S. Latinos of the 21st century could find themselves living in the racist 1950s.

Obviously trying to pick up some downed spirits among the pro-immigrant troops, Sharry noted in a statement that, "What ever radicals in Arizona or the Supreme Court decide, we will prevail."

"Let's keep up the fight," he added. "Let's continue to build the political power we need to win. And let's know in our hearts that victory is not a matter of if, but a matter of when."

It's true. The pendulum eventually will swing in the opposite direction. But if a conservative majority in the Supreme Court sets back our clock for years, if we see our civil rights regressing because of this ruling, this may be the final kick in the stomach that Latinos need to start a new civil rights movement in this country.

Even the few Latinos who don't sympathize with undocumented immigrants would soon see that they, too, would be profiled and harassed unnecessarily.

If the High Court rules for Arizona, a new important issue will rapidly emerge in the Hispanic community. Until now, most Latinos could care less about the composition of the Supreme Court or about selecting a president who can change it. But if a Supreme Court majority allows profiling, count on Latinos to start profiling them.

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Mitt Romney being described as one Conservative Extremist?

ne of the first things I teach my undergraduate students is how to listen to the campaign talking heads and figure out what the poll said. That is, the poll that led to the strategy that led to the talking points that you're hearing from the various campaign talking heads almost in unison. This week, for example: Mitt Romney, conservative extremist.

Catch it. Axelrod (David,

super-strategist). Cutter (Stephanie, deputy campaign manager). Biden (Joe), even. Romney is "extreme" on tax policy, foreign policy, immigration policy. You can catch the word "extreme" in all the comments. I haven't seen

these polls, but I've seen enough to know what they're saying: Swing voters aren't into extremes. That's why they're swing voters. They are basically, for want of a better term, moderate.

So what do you do when you're running against a candidate who, coming off of the primaries, isn't very well known? Easy. Fill in the blanks before he can. Convince swing voters that he is precisely what they don't want: an extremist. Been there.

Back in 1988, the last time a Massachusetts governor was nominated for president, most Americans actually thought he was a moderate, which was why he was running ahead of then-Vice President Bush in the polls. Unlike Romney, he had a "good war" in the primaries. He ended up beating candidates who were somewhat (Dick Gephardt) and

very much (Rev. Jesse Jackson) more liberal than he was. So the Bush team smartly moved, very quickly, to paint him as a capital-L liberal. And it worked. Big time.

Twenty-four years later, I'm sure the polls are telling the Obama folks that the easiest guy for them to beat is a capital-E extreme capital-C conservative. So off they go.

There's just one difference. Michael Dukakis was, and is, a liberal. Proudly. Painting him as one was both easy and authentic. It worked because it was true

Romney is a much tougher sell as an extreme conservative.

Can we talk? Extreme conservatives don't get elected in Massachusetts.

Liberals and lobsters. If Romnev were an extreme conservative, he would have locked up the Republican nomination in February, not April.

National Public Radio did a story this past week about the new Obama "extreme conservative" offensive. They were focused on Ohio, which is as good a place to focus as any. They interviewed both Republicans and Democrats. And here's the striking thing: None of the folks they interviewed thought Romney was an extreme conservative. The conservatives, as a matter of fact, weren't quite convinced that he was conservative enough. Seriously, what kind of extreme conservative would have successfully promoted "RomneyCare" and generally supported gay rights and women's rights?

The only problem with a good strategy is that it might not actually fit the guy you're running against.

Can I see Romney as a hopeless opportunist? Sure. All things to all people. A liberal in Massa-

chusetts. A conservative in New Hampshire. Hard core in March, moderate in August. As they used to say in Massachusetts, he wasn't pro-choice or antichoice; he was multiple-choice. Multiple-choice Mitt. That works. The only problem is that people think all politicians are opportunists. Being an extreme conservative is much worse or, from the Obama perspective,

much better. Can I see Romney as a hopelessly out-of-touch rich guy, the boy from Bain, the man with the Cadillacs and the horses and the offshore investments and the friends who own (and don't just root for) NASCAR teams? That works. Lower taxes for money you don't earn? Sure. Bailouts for Wall Street but not for Detroit? Sure.

Only problem is, everybody who runs for president is rich by the time they do. And people don't hate rich people nearly as much as they do extremists.

Here's the thing about presidential politics: At the end of the day, it has to ring true. Rick Santorum or Newt Gingrich certainly would have been easier for Obama to beat, because their views really are more extreme. Romney is a hard pill for many conservatives to swallow precisely because he is less conservative than they'd like.

Sometime between now and November, the president's team is going to have to focus on the opponent they've got, instead of the one they would have preferred.

Looking for a legal loophole

n interesting statement has surfaced in the John Edwards trial. Edwards has admitted that he had an affair during his bid for the Presidential nomination in 2003 while his wife was battling cancer.

He has also admitted that he arranged for hundreds of thousands of dollars to be channeled to his mistress and that he arranged for

his associate to falsely claim paternity for his child in order to cover up the affair. In preparation for the trial, his attorney has stated, "What John Edwards did may be sinful and immoral, but it was not illegal."

What does this statecommunicate about the moral and

spiritual condition of our nation? Does it imply that it doesn't matter what you do as long as you can avoid being punished for it? Does it imply that morality and ethics are less important than the law? What is legal depends upon the lat-

est laws passed by men who are able to garner votes in Congress. What is moral is contained in the

Ten Commandments, the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you," the Great Commandment: "Love God with all your heart and your neighbor as yourself," and the Sermon on the Mount.

We all stand in need of God's grace. The Bible says, "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God."

Without the grace God has extended in Christ, we would all be condemned. But I am deeply concerned with the growing misperception that God doesn't care how we live.

Receiving God's grace requires heartfelt repentance. While Jesus offered eternal life saying, "He who lives and believes in me will never die,"

He also warned against religious lip service saying, "Except you repent you shall all likewise perish."

I don't know whether John Edwards will be found guilty of misappropriating campaign finances to cover up his moral failure or not.

But I do know that all of us will one day stand before God to give account of everything we have ever done.

The kind of faith in Jesus Christ that will save us in that day will be reflected in how we live today. Jesus closed his Sermon on the Mount with this warning, "Many will say to me on that day, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name and in your name drive out demons and in your name perform many miracles?' Then I will tell them plainly, 'I never knew you. Away from me, you evildoers!' (Matthew 7:22-23).

John Edwards got it backwards Our greatest concern should be whether our actions are moral rather than whether they are legal.

Family Faith Center will celebrate National Nurses Week with a special and time honored tradition. National Nurses Week 2012 is being celebrated from

National Nurses Day is observed May 6 and National Parish Nurse Day will be observed May 12. Sam and Christina Segundo, senior pastors of Family Faith Center, will host the third annual Blessing of Nurses' Hands for Big Spring nurses and those from surrounding areas. Pastor Sam states "the church motto is 'Your Healthy Place to Be'" and the Segundo's recognize parish nurses play an important role in the health of local fellowships. A Parish Nurse is a registered nurse who specializes in matters of health and healing within a faith-based community. Some congregations use the term Faith Based Nursing or Faith Based Nurses. The pastors have included the Parish Nurse Ministry as one of many key faith components available to members of the Family Faith Center congregation.

Sam Segundo further noted "our Parish Nurse Ministry is known as "The Gate Called Beautiful' and is headed by certified parish nurse Les White PhD RN FNP. Dr. White indicates there are many aspects of parish nursing, however the core concept is assisting church members to understand the relationship between their faith, their health and healing. He conducts a health and healing service twice monthly to pray for those who are ill or injured. White has been a member of Family Faith Center for 11 years and received his certification in parish nursing in 2003 at Bellarmine University in Louisville, Ky. Dr. White believes he may be the only certified parish nurse in Big Spring, but remarks "that one does not have to be certified to use the title of parish nurse. Any registered nurse may provide services as a parish nurse", he adds "they would be expected to follow the Scope of Practice as outlined by the American Nurses Association." White is not the only nurse providing spiritual nursing care through "The Gate Called Beautiful." Faye Flowers, Tony Hess and Jeff Vidal are registered nurses who perform parish nurse duties for the congregation of Family Faith Center. Kristie Hernandez, Sylvia Polonco and Mari Torres are licensed vocational nurses who serve as congregational nurses for the fellowship.

Two historical events have propelled nursing to its current position: advent of Christianity and the writings of Florence Nightingale. Nightingale is considered the architect of modern nursing and the date of her birth is May 12 which traditionally marks the close of National Nurses Week. Wednesday, May 9, during the evening service, at 7 p.m., Family Faith Center will observe its third annual Blessing of Nurses Hands. Parish nurses and others who provide health care will receive a blessing upon their hands for another year of service to mankind. 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


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

3. Four Spades. You can't stop short of a small slam, so all your efforts should be bent toward trying to get to seven. It would be wrong to use Blackwood, because partner's responses wouldn't tell you whether he had the king of spades — a very vital card — even if he showed two aces and two kings.

Hands where specific intermediate cards are crucial are better handled by cuebids than by Blackwood. By exchanging information about your side's controls (usually aces and kings), you can often produce better results than by using Blackwood, which in effect turns partner into an automaton who can do no more than tell you how many aces and kings he has. If partner happens to have a hand such as: ♠ K5 ♥ A92 ♠ KQ63 ♣ A872, you will have an excellent play for 13 tricks.



SAN DIEGO-Those who knew and loved Junior Seau say they didn't see this coming.

"This is not anything I thought he would ever do,"

Like many of Seau's friends, McPherson was still trying to comprehend the death of the former star NFL linebacker the day after his body was found inside his home in suburban Oceanside with a selfinflicted gunshot wound to the chest. The San Diego County medical examiner ruled the death a suicide

"Junior is a warrior. He played 20 years in the NFL as a linebacker. You have to be a warrior. Warriors conquer problems they face and they run at them," McPherson said Thursday.

"This is a different team in sense of maturity and understanding the game. They're getting better and that

Rivera's career in question after knee injury

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) Mariano Rivera's career may have ended Thursday night, not while basking in the glow of adoring fans at Yankee Stadium, but in agonizing pain on the outfield grass before a few thousand fans in Kansas City.

Baseball's greatest closer tore a ligament in his right knee while shagging balls during batting practice before a game against the Royals, a devastating injury that will likely sideline the Yankees' 12-time All-Star for the remainder of the season.

"This is bad," Yankees manager Joe Girardi said. "There's no question about it."

The 42-year-old righthander's leg caught on the field where the grass meets dirt, causing his knee to buckle. He fell into the outfield wall and down to the ground, where Rivera grimaced in pain as teammates and training staff ran out to see him.

Rivera was carted from the field and taken for an MRI exam. Royals physician Dr. Vincent Key diagnosed a torn ACL after examining the scans of the

knee.

"I thought it wasn't that bad, but it's torn," Rivera said after the Yankees lost 4-3, pausing several times in the Yankees clubhouse to compose himself. "Have to fix it."

Rivera has said that he will decide after the season whether to retire, and while Girardi said he hoped that baseball's career saves leader with 608 would make a comeback.

Rivera was noncommittal.

"At this point, I don't know," he said. "At this point, I don't know."

"There is no football player-maybe a punter—that has not had multiple concussions, I would guess," McPherson said.

Longtime Chargers chaplain Shawn Mitchell said he wasn't aware of any major issues that would lead Seau to take his life, including any difficulties making the transition from the playing field to retirement. Seau played his first 13 seasons with the Chargers before moving on to the Miami Dolphins

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and then the New England Patriots. He helped lead San Diego to its

only Super Bowl, after the 1994 season; was voted to a Chargers-record 12 straight Pro Bowls; and was a sixtime All-Pro selection.

Mitchell said many players struggle once they leave the game.

"Junior was quite the opposite," said Mitchell, the pastor at New Venture Christian Fellowship in Oceanside. "Junior was one of the few guys with face recognition and first-name recognition across the nation. I'm almost amazed when people say he was torn up and missing the limelight. Golly, for a guy not in the league, the guy was doing contracts and he had a series on TV. He was such an icon and he had three cities, San Diego, New England and Miami, which loved the guy. I haven't seen in Junior what I see in hundreds of players, and that is a sense of great loss."

For a time, Seau hosted a reality show called "Sports Jobs with Junior Seau." He also continued to run his restaurant in Mission Valley, which has been open since the mid-1990s.







This Date In History

Today is Friday, May 4, the 125th day of 2012. There are 241 days left in the year. Today's Highlight

History: On May 4, 1942, the Battle of

the Coral Sea, the first naval clash fought entirely with carrier aircraft, began in the Pacific during World War II. (The outcome was considered a tactical victory for Imperial Japan, but ultimately a strategic one for the Allies.)

On this date:

In 1626, Dutch explorer Peter Minuit landed on present-day Manhattan Island.

In 1776, Rhode Island declared its freedom from England, two months before the Declaration of Independence was adopted.

In 1862, after a monthlong siege, Union forces prepared to unleash a massive bombardment against Confederate troops at Yorktown, Va., only to discover the Confederates had slipped away during the in Chicago, a labor demonstration for an 8-hour work day turned into a deadly riot when a bomb exploded.

In 1904, the United States took over construction of the Panama Canal. In 1916, responding to a

demand from President Woodrow Wilson, Germany agreed to limit its submarine warfare. (However, Germany resumed unrestricted submarine warfare the following year.) In 1932, mobster Al Capone,

convicted of income-tax evasion, entered the federal penitentiary in Atlanta. (Capone was later transferred to Alcatraz Island.) In 1959, the first Grammy

Awards ceremony was held at the Beverly Hilton Hotel. Domenico Modugno won Record of the Year and Song of the Year for "Nel Blu Dipinto Di Blu (Volare)"; Henry Mancini won Album of the Year for "The Music from Peter Gunn."

In 1961, the first group of "Freedom Riders" left Washington, D.C., to challenge racial segregation on interstate buses and in bus terminals.

In 1970, Ohio National Guardsmen opened fire during an anti-war protest at Kent State University, killing four students and wounding nine others.

In 1980, Marshal Josip Broz Tito, president of Yugoslavia, died three days before his 88th birthday. In 1994, Israeli Prime

Minister Yitzhak Rabin and

PLO leader Yasser Arafat

signed an accord on Palestinian autonomy that granted self-rule in the Gaza Strip and Jericho. Today's Birthdays: The former president of Egypt, Hosni Mubarak, is 84. Opera singer Roberta Peters is 82. Jazz musi-


