## Superman coming to Big Spring

The legendary Man of Steel will take Scenic Mountain and the Big Spring State Park by storm Saturday, as the Big Spring Film Society screens the 1978 classic "Superman" atop the local landmark.



With the film expected to begin at dusk, Film Society Chairman Brandon Johnson said the screening will kick off the group's summer series.

"Come early to check out some of the 1940s Max Fleischer Superman cartoons presented by the Karat Patch," Johnson said. "There will be concessions onsite and filmgoers will have a chance to win a six-foot-tall cutout of the Man of Steel, along with a re-creation of the red phone booth that Clark Kent always used to be changed into his alter-

ego in the comics."

The film is rated-PG and stars Christopher Reeves, Marlon Brando, Gene Hackman and Margot Kidder.

"For so many of us, this film was the original superhero movie," Johnson said. "Today, movies based on comic books are coming out quicker than most of us can see them and they have become a huge box office draw. Just look at what the recent 'Avengers' film did and is still doing at theaters. However, in 1978 no one really knew if a film like this could work. It's a huge accomplishment."

The film would also serve as a catalyst for the career of Reeves, who managed to get the role despite being up against the likes of Warren Beatty, James Caan, Burt

Improvements to the city's infrastructure took the spotlight Tuesday night as members of the Big Spring City Council presented pet projects they would like to see addressed in the city's 2012-2013 budget.

The council heard a presentation from City Manager Gary Fuqua during the

special meeting regarding the city's accomplishments during the past fiscal year, as well as some of the major challenges the municipality will be facing when it begins the arduous task of preparing the coming year's budget.

Mayor Tommy Duncan asked each council member what issues they would like to see addressed in the coming year, beginning with newly

elected District 4 Councilman Bob McDonald.

"After considering a lot of (projects), I tried to come up with one that would be feasible, economical, needed and specific," McDonald said. "Now, before you say this is a drought situation ... the trees at the

park are understandably stressed by the drought and some of them are actually already gone. Some of those trees were there when I was a teenager.

is \$25 per person and all ages are welcome to take part.

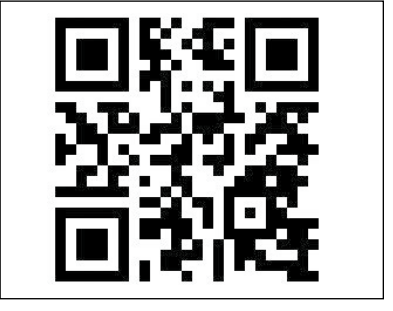
"We want to encourage everyone who wants to take part to come out and join us," Shaunaci Armentrout, Run for God instructor, said.

### For Obama and Romney, deepening crisis in Syria is a no-win political situation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Escalating violence in Syria has become the ultimate no-win political situation for President Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney: The deepening crisis is impossible for their campaigns to ignore but too complex for them to articulate an easy solution.

Romney has seized on the crackdown in Syria as an opportunity to dent Obama's foreign policy credentials, painting him as weak and indecisive in the face of more than a year of violence. But Romney's vague prescriptions for what he would do differently have opened him to criticism from the Obama campaign that he is weighing in from the sidelines with "nothing but tough talk" while the president does the real work of managing the crisis.

The violence in Syria hasn't captured the full attention of an American electorate consumed by the economy and other domestic issues. But the barbs being traded between the campaigns try to raise questions of leadership for the two men battling for a job filled with unexpected challenges.

Romney zeroes in on what he portrays as a lack of leadership in Obama's handling of Syria's 14-month government crackdown on opponents to the regime. Following a weekend massacre of more than 100 Syrian civilians, including dozens of women and children, Romney said the president's weakness had resulted in a "policy of paralysis."

In turn, the Obama campaign has sought to cast the president as the one bearing the responsibility for actually handling the crisis. While Obama "has demonstrated his ability to work with world leaders to resolve international conflicts," campaign spokesman Ben LaBolt said, Romney has a "rudderless foreign policy agenda."

### SpaceX Dragon leaves space station for flight home, aims for Pacific splashdown off California

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The Dragon spacecraft is on its way home.

Early Thursday morning, space station astronauts set the SpaceX capsule loose after a five-day visit.

The world's first commercial supply ship is due to splash down in the Pacific at midday, Eastern Time. It will aim for an area 560 miles southwest of Los Angeles. On board are

science samples and old station equipment.

Last week, the California-based SpaceX became the first private company to send a cargo ship to the International Space Station. It's now on the verge of becoming the only supplier to return major items. The government-provided cargo vessels of Russia, Europe and Japan burn up on descent. NASA lost the capability of getting things back when the shuttles were retired last year.

### When hitting 400 is not good: Levels of key greenhouse gas pass milestone, trouble scientists

WASHINGTON (AP) — The world's air has reached what scientists call a troubling new milestone for carbon dioxide, the main global warming pollutant.

Monitoring stations across the Arctic this spring are measuring more than 400 parts per million of the heat-trapping gas in the atmosphere. The number isn't quite a surprise, because it's been rising at an accelerating pace. Years ago, it passed the 350 ppm mark that many scientists say is the highest safe level for carbon dioxide. It now stands globally at 395.

So far, only the Arctic has reached that 400 level, but the rest of the world will follow soon.

"The fact that it's 400 is significant," said Jim Butler, global monitoring director at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Earth System Research Lab in Boulder, Colo. "It's just a reminder to everybody that we haven't fixed this and we're still in trouble."

Carbon dioxide is the chief greenhouse gas and stays in the atmosphere for 100 years. Some carbon dioxide is natural, mainly from decomposing dead plants and animals. Before the Industrial Age, levels were around 275 parts per million.

### Odd politics, but tradition: Bush at White House for portrait unveiling with Obama hosting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Keep your friends close, and your former presidents closer.

President Barack Obama is welcoming his favorite foil, former President George W. Bush, back to the White House on Thursday for the official unveiling of Bush's portrait. Given the history, the scene ought to be quite a picture.

Obama is still bad-mouthing Bush's

time in office, and it's not just because of the debt and the unfinished wars Obama inherited. Obama sees Bush's economic ideas as the same as his current rival, Mitt Romney, so he lumps them together.

Which makes it a little awkward that Obama is about to preside as Bush's image and legacy are enshrined forever.

Never mind all that, say the Obama and Bush camps. This is a timeout for tradition.

### Irish, mulling a 2nd bailout, vote on European Union's deficit-fighting treaty; result Friday

DUBLIN (AP) — Irish voters were deciding Thursday whether their government can ratify the European Union's fiscal treaty, a deficit-fighting pact designed to bind Ireland and other debt-hit eurozone members to much tighter spending limits.

The agreement, already signed by the leaders of Ireland and 24 other EU nations, is designed to promote greater confidence in the eurozone by creating new deficit limits for each ratifying nation. Automatic spending cuts would be imposed on those deemed guilty of violating them. Germany, the eurozone heavy-weight facing most pressure to keep bailing out its weaker neighbors, is the treaty's key backer but almost all Irish political parties have campaigned for its passage too.

All opinion polls in the past month's campaigning suggest that a majority will vote for the tougher budget discipline, but similar polls were proved wrong when Ireland voted to reject the EU's last two treaties in 2001 and 2008. Ireland is the only nation among the 25 requiring a national vote for ratification, although the treaty does not require Irish approval to proceed elsewhere. Results come Friday.

A "yes" verdict would have no immediate impact on Irish austerity policies, because Ireland already is committed to a severe program of cuts, tax hikes and asset selloffs as part of its 2010 EU-International Monetary Fund bailout.

A "no" could do most damage to Ireland itself, because its existing loans will run dry by the end of 2013 — and the treaty restricts future access to the EU's rescue fund to those nations that accept the new budget rules. But analysts agree it also would send political shockwaves across a eurozone already doubtful that it can confine its debt crisis to the three bailed-out countries of Ireland, Greece and Portugal.

Welcoming readers to my world where I enjoy simple, sometimes quick, but always delicious meals.

This week's recipe is inspired by another attempt at my gardening skills. It's safe to say I will not be eating off the land this year. I don't do weeds so I tried a potted and hanging garden this year to do my part on conserving the H2O.

Anyone who keeps up with my writing knows I am a cheap woman, so gardening is no exception. I wanted to do this as least costly as possible and I made several hanging planters from three-liter bottles and only spent a dollar a bottle. In order to keep my girlish figure, we drank the soda. It was one of the prices we were prepared to pay.

I planted bigger veggies in five-gallon buckets I got for free from the bakery at Walmart. At this moment, they're kinda hanging on, I don't have a green thumb, and well, I just haven't sang to them this year, which was recommended by my friend Jimmy, who can grow anything.

I have a little cherry tomato plant and they don't all come off at once so my husband was laughing at me for using the only two I had ready that came off a day apart to slice into eight little slices for my burger. You gotta do what ya gotta do with what ya got.

Usually I write meal-type recipes and I decided to write about a spring- and summer-friendly salad. Most people think of salad as greens and tomatoes, but really a salad is anything you put together. This is a cool, refreshing salad that would pair alongside any meat and outdoor grilling. A few simple ingredients and we are done. Enjoy!

#### Spring Time Salad

- 1 can corn, drained
- 1 roma tomato, diced
- 1 small cucumber, peeled and finely diced
- 1 Tbls of onion, finely diced or 1 green onion, finely sliced
- 1/2 lime or lemon
- 1/2 teaspoon honey mustard dressing
- drizzle of oil
- 2-3 pinches of dill weed dried or fresh
- pinch of sugar
- salt and pepper to taste

Combine the first four ingredients in a bowl. In a small bowl, squeeze the juice from half the lime, add everything else and whisk, blending well. Pour into first bowl and gently toss well. Refrigerate for a least an hour or more.

you that the best lead by far is your singleton club. So you lead a club, taken by declarer with dummy's queen.

At this point — assuming that your theory about partner having an ace is correct — you have no way of knowing whether it is the ace of diamonds or the ace of hearts. (He can't have the ace of clubs or he'd have taken it at trick one and returned a club.)

So, when declarer next leads a low spade from dummy and plays the king, you must resist the temptation to win it because you wouldn't know which suit to return to secure the club ruff. Fortunately, you can afford to duck the king because you have another low trump available for the club ruff.

When South next plays the six of spades, you step up with the ace, hoping East can clarify the situation for you. As it happens, East shows out of trumps and, aware that you are looking to him for guidance, signals with the nine of hearts.

This is manna from heaven. East's illuminating discard removes all the guesswork. You lead a heart to East's ace, and his club return puts South out of business.

## Giant cuckoo clock gets new home in Ohio village

SUGARCREEK, Ohio (AP) — One of the world's largest cuckoo clocks has a new home in an Ohio village.

The wooden clock measures more than 23 feet tall, 24 feet wide and 13 feet deep. It was

hauled Wednesday from a vacant lot to a street corner in Sugarcreek, about 70 miles south of Cleveland.

It features a hand-carved, five-piece band playing music and a cuckoo bird that sounds

at regular intervals. Sugar creek Mayor Clayton Weller tells *The Times-Reporter* in nearby New Philadelphia the clock doesn't function and will get needed electrical work to operate again.

A Swiss cheese maker added the clock at his restaurant near Wilmot three decades ago.

The restaurant closed in 2009, and the clock was sold to an Ohio man who agreed to move it to Sugarcreek.

Holland gave up eight runs without finishing the second inning of a 21-8 loss to the Seattle Mariners on Wednesday night.

Seattle followed an eight-run second inning with an eight-run third in smacking Holland (4-4) and reliever Yoshinori Tateyama for 16 runs on 15 hits, including three home runs.

But while Holland looked nothing like himself, Seattle looked nothing like a club hitting .229 as a team.

Seattle reached double digits in back-to-back victories against the AL West leaders. Jesus Montero homered in three hits and Kyle Seager had four hits and two RBIs. Every Seattle starter had at least one hit in

## Rockies rout Astros 13-5

DENVER (AP) — Carlos Gonzalez's swing appears effortless. The results have been smashing.

Gonzalez extended a power surge by hitting three home runs in his last three at-bats, Michael Cuddyer belted a grand slam and Dexter Fowler also homered, leading the Colorado Rockies past the Houston Astros 13-5 on Wednesday night for their third win in a row.

"All I've been doing is trying to put good swings on the ball,"

Gonzalez said. "Obviously, I'm not looking for a home run. I'm just looking to hit the ball hard and just make sure it's in the strike zone. I saw three around the strike zone and put a good swing on them. Home runs just happen. I think special nights are just meant to be."

He's been awfully special at the plate lately, going 10 for 16 with five home runs, seven RBIs and six runs scored in his last four games. He has 13 homers on the season.

"His focus at the plate

right now, his plate discipline, is as good as I've ever seen it," Rockies manager Jim Tracy said. "He's stepping to another level, that's how dangerous he is."

The game was not without some concern for the Rockies, however. Star shortstop Troy Tulowitzki left the game in the top of the seventh with what the team said was a strained left groin. Tulowitzki appeared a little gimpy as he returned to the dugout after running out an infield groundout in the bottom of the sixth.

## Hornets to pick first in NBA draft

NEW YORK (AP) — After a painful wait for a new owner, the search for a new star was a breeze for the New Orleans Hornets.

All it took was a little luck of the draw.

And Anthony Davis can't wait to play as a pro in the city where he won a championship in college.

The Hornets, recently sold by the NBA to Laine's owner Tom Benson, won the league's draft lottery Wednesday and the No. 1 pick overall —

which they almost certainly will use to select the consensus college player of the year who led Kentucky to a national title.

"I'm excited for our fans, especially those people who hung in there with us," said coach Monty Williams.

Williams represented the Hornets on stage and insisted his team keep playing hard as its difficult season was ending, even though it could have hurt its chances of landing a high pick.

## NFL stars: Pro Bowl to be more competitive

NEW YORK (AP) — After a promise from players that the game will be more competitive, the NFL will hold the Pro Bowl in Honolulu next Jan. 27, a week before the Super Bowl.

Commissioner Roger Goodell had made it clear canceling the all-star game was a possibility after the uninspired play of this year's 59-41 AFC victory. Following discussions between the league and the players' union, the NFL announced Wednesday that Aloha Stadium would host the Pro Bowl for the third straight year.

It will be the 33rd Pro Bowl in Hawaii.

"The players have made it clear through the NFL Players Association that they would like the opportunity to continue to play the Pro Bowl in Hawaii,"

said NFL executive vice president Ray Anderson. "We will support the players on this initiative to improve the Pro Bowl. We have had many discussions with the players in recent years about the Pro Bowl and they recognize that the quality of the game has not been up to NFL standards. We look forward to working with the players toward the goal of improving the competitiveness of this season's game."

The Pro Bowl was held in Hawaii from 1980-2009. In 2010, the NFL moved the game to the week before the Super Bowl for the first time, and it was held in Miami, site of the Super Bowl that year.

The Pro Bowl returned to Hawaii for the 2011 and 2012 games but remained one week before the Super Bowl.

"The players believe that the Pro Bowl is an important tradition," NFLPA President Domonique Foxworth said. "We worked hard with the league to make sure the best players in the NFL are honored for their achievements on the field."

News of the Pro Bowl's return was met with praise by Hawaii tourism officials and Gov. Neil Abercrombie. Both Abercrombie and Mike McCartney, chief executive of the Hawaii Tourism Authority, hinted the state plans to deepen its ties to the league by helping it establish relationships in Asia — a continent with several major markets for tourism to the Aloha State.

"Beyond Hawaii's shores, we look forward to assisting the NFL in expanding upon their relationships in Japan,

and help them to establish a presence in China — both important markets for Hawaii tourism," McCartney said.

McCartney said the relationship of more than 30 years goes beyond the Pro Bowl game itself and both the state and the NFL would work on improving the overall experience.

"Hawaii looks forward to building upon our long-standing relationship with the NFL Pro Bowl well into the future," McCartney said.

Honolulu Mayor Peter Carlisle said he was "thrilled that the NFL Pro Bowl is going to return in 2013."

"Our residents, visitors, military, and many others look forward to this exciting event," he added. "There is electricity in the air when the Pro Bowl is approaching."

I don't know how to handle this girl. She never says thank you when you give her a gift, even in person, or when we cook dinner for her. And when the rest of us get up to clear the table, she just sits there. It's awkward for me to ask her to help.

**Dear New Jersey:** Please don't. It's possible that Meredith is horrifically shy and cannot bring herself to respond in a normal way. That would require that you patiently teach her. But if that's not the case, you have a rude, indulged girl who isn't going to change unless your son insists on it. And he has no intention of doing so.

Talk to your son as neutrally as possible. Ask if Meredith treats you so poorly on purpose and, if so, why. Ask what you can do to improve things. But we urge you to do it without condemning Meredith, which would force your son to defend her.

The point is to make him think about what his future with her will

closest friends and relatives and ask for an honest critique of your date-ability.

amassing 20 hits.

Dustin Ackley also had a three-run homer in support of former Rangers minor league prospect Blake Beavan (3-4).

"We were hitting with a lot of confidence up there tonight," said Seager, the best hitter in the Mariners' lineup at .265 when perennial All-Star Ichiro Suzuki sat out to rest.

"Hitting is contagious," he said. "We kind of got on a little roll there and everybody was feeling good, real relaxed and everything. It was just one of those days."

Seattle had lost five in a row before beating Texas 10-3 Tuesday night.

They scored eight runs in the second and third innings en route to scoring the second-most runs in club history, equaling a 21-9 victory against the Los Angeles Angels on Sept. 30, 2000.

Coincidentally, that was the same day the Rangers gave up the most runs in club history, a 23-2 loss at Oakland.

The Mariners started the game with only one player hitting better than .250 in the lineup. No matter, they sent 27 batters to the plate in the second and third innings, scoring 16 runs on 15 hits

— tying their season high for a game — including three home runs.

The 21 runs are the most scored in the majors this season, topping the Rangers and Rockies, who have each scored 18 runs.

"Obviously these guys really put it together here the last couple of nights," Seattle manager Eric Wedge said. "You're seeing a lot of what we've been talking about in regard to potential with these young players."

Holland got off to a quick start, retiring the top of the first in order, including strikeouts of Chone Figgins and Seager.

The Mariners found their groove in the second, sending 13 batters to the plate. Ackley and Montero each homered and accounted for five RBIs, all with two outs, in the inning.

Miguel Olivo had two RBIs in the inning, and Seager had one.

Only Michael Saunders did not reach safely in the inning, though he made up for that with a double and a run scored to start the Mariners' encore, an eight-run third inning.

Montero had two more RBIs and Smoak added a three-run home run.

The Rangers needed 97 pitches to retire six hitters.

Holland, who was 6-1 in seven career starts against Seattle, including 4-0 with a 2.70 ERA since the start of last season, threw 41

pitches in the second inning before being relieved by Yoshinori Tateyama.

Tateyama retired the final out of the second, but recorded only one out in the third, giving up seven hits and six earned runs.

"It was one of those days," Holland said. "I got beat. You have to give them credit, but at the same time it's a very frustrating."

"You have to shake it off," he said. "Tomorrow is a new day."

The Mariners added four more in the eighth. Ackley reached and scored on Seager's double, his fourth hit, and Montero walked for the second time before Smoak hit his second home run.

The Rangers tried to make a game of it, sending nine men to the plate in scoring five runs in the sixth. Texas added two in the seventh.

"I wish I wouldn't have given up a couple of those runs that last inning," said Beavan, who gave up five runs on eight hits with no walks and two strikeouts in six innings. "But that's how it goes when you just go after guys and you're throwing majority fastballs and you've got a lead like that."

Outfielder Josh Hamilton, who was back in the lineup after missing the previous two games with a respiratory illness, was 2 for 4 with two doubles, one a run-scoring hit that increased his major league-leading RBI total to 57.

## Catchers testify in Clemens' defense

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two catchers who were teammates of pitcher Roger Clemens said he played with integrity and refused to cut corners, the opposite of the image painted by prosecutors of a man who cheated to gain an edge and then lied about it to Congress.

"I don't think he'd cheat," said former journeyman catcher Charlie O'Brien, who caught Clemens' games for much of the 1997 season with the Toronto Blue Jays. O'Brien portrayed Clemens as such a stickler that he'd refuse to throw scuffed baseballs because he considered it cheating.

The former catcher testified Wednesday he once approached Clemens on the mound during a game with a scuffed ball and said, "This is a great ball to use." He said Clemens responded, "I don't need that."

O'Brien also said he had seen vitamin B12 "shots lined up ready to go" for players, a claim also made by Clemens and for which he was charged with obstructing Congress. The government maintains that Clemens concocted the B12 account as a cover for steroid injections.

During Clemens' trial, prosecutors have asked several government witnesses associated with major league teams whether they've ever seen B12 shots lined up, and all of them have said no.
