

**Rains buy** some time for CRMWD

Ivie sees biggest benefit from recent downpours

Recent rainfall in and around the Crossroads area — along with increased water conservation efforts — has likely added another two to three months to the dangerously short lifespan of the local water district's lone surviving reservoir, according to officials.

According to John Grant, Colorado River Municipal Water District general manager, the recent rainfall has done little to improve low reservoir levels at Lake Thomas and Lake Spence,

from Mother Nature's gift. "The heavier rain we had about three weeks ago had the most effect on our reservoirs," Grant said. "We

but Lake Ivie saw a considerable gain

didn't see any real changes at Spence or Thomas, but at Ivie we saw the lake level raise approximately one foot, which is good.'

According to CRMWD records, the

Ivie Reservoir is currently at 16.26 percent of capacity, making it the water district's principle source of raw water. Lake Spence remains at just 0.39 percent capacity and Lake J.B. Thomas is at 0.78 percent capacity.

"We haven't used Lake Thomas to supply Big Spring with water in quite some time. It's been since around 2008 since we've sent water from Thomas to Big Spring," Grant said. "However, water levels have finally gotten so low we've had to stop pumping water from Thomas to the city of Snyder, which is basically getting the same Ivie water the rest of the cities are getting now. "We're working on getting a barge pump up and running at Lake Thomas, so we haven't given up on pumping water from there altogether. How-



ever, it's going to take a very considerable influx of rainfall before we can look at it or Spence as a viable source of reservoir water again.'

Grant said the recent rains, along with increased conservation efforts, should mean a longer period of time before Ivie theoretically runs dry.

"Previously, we were looking at running out of reservoir water at Ivie sometime around December or January," Grant said. "However, we've been able to decrease our overall water deliveries to the cities we serve, which we believe extended the life of Ivie out until about April of 2013.

saved through conservation, should give us until June or July before Ivie is too low to pump water from, and that is if we don't get any more rain between now and then. So, we're definitely in much better shape now than we had expected to be in when we began looking at the situation."

Also an encouraging note on the water district's calendar is the ongoing work on a pipeline to bring water from its Ward County well fields to the Crossroads area, a project Grant said is developing right

pipeline completed in January 2013. However, things are going very well with the pipeline and barring some sort of unforeseen problem, I fully expect it will be up and running on time."

Permian Basin Area Foundation.

The project - which is estimated at \$140 million, along with ongoing efforts to build a water reclamation plant in Big Spring — could generate approximately 45 million gallons of water per day for the Crossroads area.

"We actually have two pipelines currently construction," under Grant said. "The first is to connect a new well field CRMWD has purchased with the existing one in Ward County. The second pipeline will increase the amount of water we can deliver from the well fields. We're also in the process of drilling more wells in the Ward County fields." While the recent rainfall may have given CRMWD a bit of a cushion going into 2013 and added some greenery to the local scenery, the city of Big Spring remains in Stage 3 of it's drought contingency plan, implemented by the city council to meet CRMWD's decreases in water deliveries.

Currently, municipal water customers are on a two-hour-a-week schedule for outdoor watering, according to Assistant City Manager Todd Darden. The restrictions allow residential customers whose address ends in an odd number to water their lawns for a two-hour period Tuesdays between the hours of 6 p.m. and 10 p.m., while residential customers whose address ends in an even number are allowed to water for a two-hour period Thursdays between the hours of 6 p.m. and 10 p.m.

helped to green-up many of our lawns, but they haven't changed the need for water conservation at all," Darden said. "The situation is just as dire and in need of our attention now as it was before the rains. In truth, it's going to take a lot more than a few rain storms before we can put these drought issues behind us."

Commercial establishments are curently allowed to water in accordance with the Drought Contingency Plan for a two-hour period Wednesdays between the hours of 6 a.m. and 10 a.m.





TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iran's military is denying claims by the U.N.'s nuclear watchdog that it demolished buildings at a base in a suspected attempt to cover up nuclear testing, the state media reported Monday.

The report by YJC.ir news website quoted Defense Minister Gen. Ahmad Vahidi as saying allegations that Iran was trying to erase evidence at the Parchin military base are "irrelevant and unwise." Iranian officials have issued similar denials over the past few weeks but this is the first by the defense minister, under whose authority the base falls.

"The allegations are aimed at affecting nuclear talks in Moscow," Gen. Vahidi was quoted as saying, referring to an upcoming round of negotiations between Iran and six world powers in the Russian capital over the Islamic Republic's nuclear program.

The West suspects Iran is trying to develop weapons technology. Iran says its nuclear program is for peaceful purposes.

### Lawyers in Sandusky case set to make opening statements, as other investigations grind on

BELLEFONTE, Pa. (AP) - A jury of seven women and five men will get their first glimpse of the case against former Penn State assistant football coach Jerry Sandusky — and his defense — when opening statements begin inside a central Pennsylvania courthouse.

Sandusky's lawyers and state prosecutors have been under a gag order for months, so their outline of the case to jurors Monday should reveal new details about an investigation that has taken several years.

Sandusky, 68, faces 52 criminal counts that he sexually abused 10 boys over 15 years, allegations he's consistently denied. Sandusky's lawyers were

### Suspect sought in shooting near Auburn U. that killed 3, including 2 ex-football players

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — The search continued Monday for a gunman suspected of killing three people and wounding three more in a shooting at a pool party near Auburn University. Two of the slain victims were former players for the school's powerhouse football program.

Authorities were searching for Desmonte Leonard, 22, of Montgomery, who is accused of opening fire Saturday night at an apartment complex after getting into a fight with some of the victims over a woman. He faces three counts of capital murder.

Auburn Police Chief Tommy Dawson said Leonard fled the scene in a white Chevrolet that he abandoned on the way back to Montgomery, about 55 miles away. They believed he was in the Montgomery area.

Of the three wounded victims, John Robertson remained in critical condition after being shot in the head. Xavier Moss was released from the hospital. The third wounded victim was Eric Mack, a current football player who is expected to recover.

Slain were Edward Christian, who had to quit the team because of a lingering back injury, and Ladarious Phillips, who had previously quit playing football. The other person killed was 20-year-old Demario Pitts.

### Iraqi president says premier's opponents unable to muster votes needed to unseat him

BAGHDAD (AP) — Opponents of Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki have failed to muster enough support to bring him down in a vote of no confidence, Iraq's president said in a statement posted on his website Sunday.

Al-Maliki, a Shiite, faces a growing challenge from Sunni and Kurdish parties as well as other Shiites within his unity government who accuse him of monopolizing power.

But al-Maliki also has allies such as President Jalal Talabani, a Kurd, whose office must affirm that a petition for a no-confidence vote has enough signatures. Talabani's refusal to ratify the no-confidence campaign's letter is a setback for al-Maliki's opponents, although the constitution gives them other ways of trying for the vote.

Coalition rebels said in a statement they would keep trying to unseat al-Maliki and to "put an end to the monopoly (on power) and domination" by the prime minister.

Talabani has close ties to Iran, which has been using its leverage in Iraq to keep al-Maliki in place. Divisions among the prime minister's opponents may also be undercutting the no confidence push. Now, "Once" has completed its Cinderella story, winning the coveted best-musical Tony award Sunday for its bittersweet love story that has captured the hearts of theatergoers, just as it did with movie audiences in 2006.

"Once" won eight awards in all, including for its lead actor, Steve Kazee, who brought movie-star looks and a soulful singing voice to the part of Guy, a street musician in Dublin who falls for a Czech immigrant flower-seller.

Kazee gave one of the most poignant speeches of a night that had many of them, paying tearful tribute to his mother, who passed away on Easter Sunday. He also thanked his cast mates, especially co-star Cristin Milioti, for helping him cope: "They carried me around and made me feel alive."

"Once" triumphed over the more obviously commercial "Newsies" for the top prize, and that was a theme of the night — many of the top-honored shows were neither big-budget nor star-driven, and a number had started off-Broadway in small theaters.

## Wildfires spread quickly in N.M., Colo.; hundreds flee as flames destroy structures

LAPORTE, Colo. (AP) — An eerie orange dusk shrouded part of northern Colorado, while heavy smoke choked a small community in southern New Mexico — as both regions battled wildfires spreading rapidly through mountainous forest land that have forced hundreds of evacuations and destroyed dozens of structures.

The Colorado fire, burning in a mountainous area about 15 miles west of Fort Collins, grew to more than 31 square miles within about a day of being reported and has destroyed or damaged 18 structures.

The fire on Sunday sent up heavy smoke, obscuring the sun in the middle of the day. The smell of smoke drifted into the Denver area and smoke spread as far away as central Nebraska, western Kansas and Texas.

Strong winds, meanwhile, grounded aircraft fighting a 40-square-mile wildfire near the mountain community of Ruidoso in southern New Mexico. Crews were working to build a fire line around the blaze, which started Friday and has damaged or destroyed 36 structures.

It wasn't immediately clear how many of the structures lost were homes. "We're still trying to take a tally," Kerry Gladden, public information officer for Ruidoso, said late Sunday afternoon.

### Police: Commerce Secretary Bryson investigated in 2 Calif. crashes

SAN GABRIEL, Calif. (AP) — Police are investigating two traffic collisions allegedly caused by U.S. Commerce Secretary John Bryson in the Los Angeles area that left him injured and unconscious, authorities said Monday.

One of the crashes was under investigation as a felony hit and run, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's department and the San Gabriel Police Department said.

Bryson, 68, was treated at a hospital for non lifethreatening injuries following the crashes around 5 p.m. PDT Saturday, the agencies said in a joint statement. "As far as we know he is still admitted," sheriff's deputy Tony Moore said early Monday. He declined to provide any other information, including the name of the hospital. Commerce Department officials couldn't immediately be reached for comment.

**South's unusual bidding** would seem to warrant close consideration, but both Wests, apparently thinking South had temporarily taken leave of his senses, doubled without pause for thought. Both Wests then led the king of spades and a short time later entered minus 1,090 on their scorecards.

Both Wests should have given more credence to South's bids. Since West was looking at the king of clubs — a critical card South knew he was missing when he bid the small slam — it would have been reasonable to conclude that South was not concerned about the lack of either majorsuit ace. South thus had to be void in both major suits. This would be consistent with his one-club opening and subsequent six-diamond bid, marking him with 6-7 distribution.

But the story does not end there, for there was actually a way to defeat the slam! If West leads a low club at trick one, East ruffs, and West later scores the king of clubs for down one!

Finding the killing lead is not as far-fetched as it might seem. If West is more trusting of South's bidding and passes six diamonds, East might very well make a "Lightner" double, requesting an unusual lead. Given the bidding, the unusual lead would have to be a club, sinking the slam.

### Heavy rains flood Fla. homes; man drowns in Gulf

PENSACOLA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Flood warnings stretched along the Gulf Coast from Florida's Panhandle into Mississippi as locally heavy rain Monday threatened a repeat of weekend downpours and storms that damaged homes, blacked out a jail and spun off at least one tornado in Alabama.

A 23-year-old Mississippi man drowned off Florida's Pensacola Beach and more than a dozen other swimmers were ordered out of rough surf amid heavy rain that caused widespread flooding over the weekend, officials said. The Pensacola News Journal (http://on.pnj. com/KvdzhV) said the man's name has not been released.

The newspaper also reported the storms forced the evacuation of a 200unit apartment complex Pensacola. Many in residents found severe flood damage when they returned Sunday afternoon. Officials say electric power could be restored at the complex Monday.

SAN FRANCISCO — A near-perfect day for the Texas Rangers pitching staff ended the same way so many others have this season: in the training room.

Alexi Ogando pitched three perfect innings before leaving with a strained groin after a bunt single, combining with three relievers on a three-hitter to lead Texas past the San Francisco Giants 5-0 on Sunday.

The Rangers also shut out San Francisco for the first time this season in a 5-0 win Friday.

"Seemed like everything we tried to do," Texas manager Ron Washington said, "worked for us." Well, almost everything.

Robbie Ross (6-0) allowed only a double to pinch-hitter Aubrey Huff in the sixth while working four innings. Mike Adams gave up two hits in a scoreless eighth and Joe Nathan tossed a 1-2-3 ninth.

The AL West-leading Rangers tagged Tim Lincecum (2-7) for all their runs and finished a 4-6 road trip. Even still, the Bay Area finale left its mark.

Ogando, who made his first start of the season filling in for injured Derek Holland, could be the latest Texas starter headed for the disabled list.

"Right now it feels pretty bad," said Ogando, scheduled to have an MRI exam Monday back in Texas. "I feel bad because of the situation we're in but that's something that happens in Giants in the fourth baseball." Josh Hamilton and Ian Kinsler each See **RANGERS**, Page 6

## Astros power past White Sox

CHICAGO (AP) -Lucas Harrell made the big pitches when he needed to and let his teammates do the rest.

The result was a satisfying win over his former club.

Justin Maxwell, Jose Altuve, J.D. Martinez and Brett Wallace all homered, leading the Houston Astros over the Chicago White Sox 11-9 on Sunday for their first road series of the season.

Maxwell's two-run shot in the fifth inning put the Astros ahead 4-3. He also singled, walked and scored two runs. His homer was estimated at 461 feet, curling just inside the left-field foul pole into the second deck.

Altuve hit a two-run shot in the eighth for an 11-4 lead. He drove in three runs and stole home on the back end of a double steal in the sixth.

Martinez homered on first pitch of the second, and Wallace added a solo shot in a five-run sixth for Houston that broke the game open.

The Astros put up 20 runs in the three-game series -19 of them came in the two wins.

"It was huge to be able to put up that many home runs and get our first road (series) win," Astros manager Brad Mills said. "It was nice to see the guys come out swinging like that."

Adam Dunn hit his 20th homer of the season and Paul Konerko added his 12th for the White Sox. Konerko also singled, raising his average to .365.

Harrell (6-4) tied a career high by going 7 1-3 innings, winning his first start against the team that let him go. He gave up five runs and six hits and struck out five.

The White Sox drafted Harrell in the fourth round in 2004, but waived him last July. Harrell has won four of his past five starts.

"I played with half those guys for two, threeplus years," Harrell said. "You know their tendencies, you know what they work on when

### Miami returns, OKC makes debut at finals

AP Sports Writer OKLAHOMA CITY -When the Oklahoma City Thunder signed five-time champion Derek Fisher late in the season, they added a veteran guard with oodles more NBA finals experience than the rest of the roster he was joining.

Whether Fisher can prepare his Thunder teammates for what they're about to face is another matter.

While the Miami Heat are returning to the finals for the second straight season, it'll be an eye-opening, first-time experience for most of Oklahoma City's youthful players. Only Fisher, starting Kendrick center Perkins and backup Nazr Mohammed have ever made it this far —

all winning titles with other teams.

But for all the leadership Fisher has provided since joining the Thunder in late March, he doesn't plan any lectures for the team's younger set that includes threetime scoring champion Kevin Durant and All-Star point guard Russell Westbrook.

"With my experience, I've found it better to on some level allow guys to experience things for themselves in its natural state," Fisher said. "You can't always tell someone what they should feel or what they should be thinking as they get ready to go into what may be the biggest moment of their life or their career.

"I think it's important to allow people to be

### Nadal tops Djokovic for 7th French Open title

PARIS – Rain or shine, clay or mud, Sunday or Monday, Rafael Nadal rules Roland Garros.

The man they call "Rafa" won his record seventh French Open title Monday, returning a day after getting rained out to put the finishing touches on a 6-4, 6-3, 2-6, 7-5 victory over Novak Djokovic. He denied Djokovic in his own run at history — the quest for the "Novak Slam.'

The match ended on Djokovic's double-fault, a fittingly awkward conclusion to a final that had plenty of stops and starts, including a brief delay during the fourth set Monday while – what else? — a rain shower passed over the stadium.

They waited it out and Nadal wound up as he has for seven of the past eight years: down on the ground, celebrating a title at a place that feels like home. He broke the record he shared with Bjorn Borg, improved to 52-1 at the French Open and beat the man who had defeated him in the last three Grand Slam finals.

"This tournament is, for me, the most special tournament of the world," Nadal said.

After serving his fourth double-fault of the match, the top-seeded Djokovic dropped his head and slumped his shoulders, an emotional two-day adventure complete, and not with the result he wanted.

He was trying to become the first man in 43 years to win four

straight major titles. He came up short and joined Roger Federer, who twice came up one match short of four in a row – his pursuit also halted by Nadal at Roland Garros in 2006 and 2007. Nadal won his 11th overall Grand Slam title, tying him with Borg and Rod Laver on the alltime list.

"It was a very difficult match against the best player in the world," Nadal said. "I lost three Grand Slam finals – Wimbledon, the U.S. Open last year, and the Australian Open this year. I'm very happy, very emotional."

A match with so much of tennis history riding on it proved awkward and frustrating for

As a coach, I'm the same way. As a player, I was the same way. But that's part of it."

Brooks even considers the nerves to be good, a sign that players care.

"Once the tipoff is in the air, our players aren't going to get nervous," he said. "Once that ball is in the air and they're ready to play, they're going to fly around the court, they're going to be aggressive and they're going to play good basketball."

Westbrook said Sunday the fact that he's in the finals probably won't settle in until he's playing in Game 1 on Tuesday night at home.

"I'm kind of just going with the flow right now," Westbrook said.

Seeking redemption for last year's finals loss to Dallas, Miami's roster should be aware of what's to come. The lion's share of the team is back from last season, and Dwyane Wade and Udonis Haslem were both on the 2006 squad that won it all.

LeBron James will be making his third finals appearance, including one with Cleveland.

"It's been a long 12 months. But obviously when you lose in the finals, it hurts," Wade said.







Today's Highlights in History:

On June 11, 1962, three prisoners at Alcatraz in San Francisco Bay staged an escape, leaving the island on a makeshift raft. Frank Morris and brothers Clarence and John Anglin were never found or heard from again.

On this date:

In 1509, England's King Henry VIII married his first wife, Catherine of Aragon.

In 1770, Captain James Cook, commander of the British ship Endeavour, discovered the Great Barrier Reef off Australia by running onto it.

In 1776, the Continental Congress formed a committee to draft a Declaration of Independence calling for freedom from Britain.

In 1919, Sir Barton won the Belmont Stakes, becoming

6-11

Crown winner.

In 1922, the groundbreaking documentary feature "Nanook of the North," produced by Robert J. Flaherty, premiered in New York.

In 1936, Kansas Gov. Alfred 'Alf" Landon was nominated for president at the Republican national convention in Cleveland.

In 1937, eight members of the Soviet Red Army High Command accused of disloyalty were put on trial, convicted and immediately executed as part of Josef Stalin's Great Purge.

In 1942, the United States and the Soviet Union signed a lendlease agreement to aid the Soviet war effort in World War II.

In 1963, a Buddhist monk (Thich Quang Duc) set himself afire on a Saigon street to protest the government of South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem.

In 1971, the year-and-a-halflong occupation of Alcatraz Island in San Francisco Bay by American Indian activists ended as federal officers evicted the remaining protesters.

In 1977, Seattle Slew won the

Triple Crown. In 1987, Margaret Thatcher

became the first British prime minister in 160 years to win a third consecutive term of office as her Conservatives held onto a reduced majority in Parliament.




