Crash takes California man's life

A traffic accident near the 186 mile marker of Interstate Highway 20 early Saturday morning claimed the life of a California man and sent one other person to the hospital in serious but stable condition, according to officials with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Ronald Anthony Webb, 66, of Redland, Calif., was pronounced dead at the scene of

Islamist claims victory in Egypt presidential election as military grabs most power

CAIRO (AP) — The Muslim Brotherhood declared early Monday that its candidate, Mohammed Morsi, won Egypt's presidential election, which would be the first victory of an Islamist as head of state in the stunning wave of protests demanding democracy that swept the Middle East the past year. But the military handed itself the lion's share of power over the new president, sharpening the possibility of confrontation.

With parliament dissolved and martial law effectively in force, the generals issued an interim constitution granting themselves sweeping authorities that ensure their hold on the state and subordinate the president. They will be Egypt's lawmakers, they will control the budget and they will determine who writes the permanent constitution that will define the country's future.

But as it claimed a narrow victory over Hosni Mubarak's last prime minister Ahmed Shafiq in a deeply polarizing election, the Brotherhood challenged the military's power grab. The group said Sunday it did not recognize the dissolution of parliament, where it was the largest party. It also rejected the military's right to issue an interim constitution and oversee the drafting of a new one.

That pointed to a potential struggle over spheres of authority between Egypt's two strongest forces. The Brotherhood has campaigned on a platform of bringing Egypt closer to a form of Islamic rule, but the military's grip puts it in a position to block that.

Instead, any conflict would likely center on more basic questions of control — if the Brotherhood pushes a fight. It has reached accommodations with the military in the past.

Businessmen, leaders gathering in Mexico for summit express relief over pro-Euro Greek vote

LOS CABOS, Mexico (AP) — World leaders expressed relief on the eve of a G20 summit that Greek voters had stepped back from the edge and elected a government that supports painful reforms in exchange for a European Union bailout of the country's troubled economy.

Fears that Greek voters would instead choose an anti-bailout government and possibly force the country's exit from the currency union had haunted the gathering in this sunbaked Mexican resort, where the crisis facing Greece, Spain, Italy and other European economies have taken center stage.

Instead, world leaders said they saw Sunday's vote as a boost for European unity even in the face of economic turbulence.

Greek parties head into coalition negotiation; fears of imminent euro exit recede

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Greek conservative leader Antonis Samaras will launch coalition talks Monday after coming first in national elections that follow weeks of uncertainty over the debt-crippled country's future in Europe's joint currency.

The campaign was closely watched by global leaders and markets, while central banks stood ready to intervene in case of financial turmoil as the Sunday's election was seen as a vote on whether Greece

should stay among the 17 nations that use the euro.

A Greek exit would have potentially catastrophic consequences for other ailing European nations, while the fallout would hit the United States and the entire global economy.

Leaders of the European Union appeared relieved that a pro-austerity government could now be formed.

The EU "is convinced that continued fiscal and structural reforms are Greece's best guarantee to overcome the current economic and social challenges," it said in a statement.

Asian stock markets climbed early Monday on the news, as did those in Greece with Athens stocks gaining 5.1 percent in early trading.

'Can we all get along?': Rodney King, whose 1991 beating sparked LA race riots, dies at 47

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Just a few months ago, Rodney King was once again the center of attention as the world checked back in on the man whose videotaped beating by police sparked one of the nation's worst race riots.

King had left Los Angeles behind, moving an hour east to a home where neighbors would often hear him splashing in the pool late at night.

The scars from the more than 50 baton blows — those both inside and out — remained, but King struck an upbeat note on his life.

"America's been good to me after I paid the price and stayed alive through it all," he told The Associated Press. "This part of my life is the easy part now."

But King was found around 5:30 a.m. Sunday at the bottom of the swimming pool at his Rialto, Calif. home.

in the right lane of the highway, according to the report, when a Volvo tractor trailer driven by Webb struck it from behind, causing both vehicles to roll.

According to reports, the driver of the Mustang was identified as 25-year-old Bobby Wayne Flores of Weatherford, Texas. Both Flores and a passenger in the tractor trailer, 50-year-old Esther Webb of Redlands, Calif., were transported to the emergency room at Scenic Mountain Medical Center.

Ronald Webb was

wearing his seatbelt at the time of the crash, according to the report, as was Flores. Esther Webb, however, was not wearing a safety belt and suffered head injuries. She was transported from the scene in serious but stable condition. Flores suffered minor injuries in the crash.

According to Reed's report, road conditions were dry and clear at the time of the accident. The DPS report did not note what caused Flores to stop his vehicle in the right lane of I-20 instead of the shoulder, how-

ever. No citations were issued as a result of the crash. The westbound lane of I-20 was closed down following the ac-

cident until much later that afternoon, according to DPS officials.

Teen in beating case rearrested

HOUSTON (AP) — As he testified last month at the first of potentially several trials of ex-Houston police officers accused of beating him during a 2010 burglary arrest, Chad Holley explained to jurors that his brush with the law was an aberration and that he was planning to go to college to get his life on track.

But less than two months after Holley, now 18, finished probation for that burglary, he has been accused of committing another one. His latest arrest could be problematic not just for him but for prosecutors, who have indicted three other officers for their roles in the teen's alleged beating, which was captured on videotape.

In the first trial, a jury acquitted ex-Houston police officer Andrew Blomberg on a misdemeanor charge of official oppression, prompting black community leaders to criticize the verdict by an all-white jury as unjust and racist. Blomberg's defense attorneys had said he never kicked Holley, who is black, but was only trying to secure a potentially armed suspect. Holley testified he wasn't resisting arrest.

In a statement, Harris County District Attorney Pat Lykos declined to comment on how Holley's new arrest

might affect how prosecutors proceed, saying she doesn't want publicity resulting in the pending trials being moved to another jurisdiction.

But some legal experts say while Holley's new arrest doesn't derail the criminal cases against the three other indicted ex-officers it will make it harder for prosecutors to prevail.

"Most of the citizens of Harris County don't want to punish a police officer if they think that they were doing God's work in their duties and if they think, 'Well you know Mr. Holley is a burglar and the other officer has already been acquitted.' I think it makes it difficult to get a conviction," said Keith Hampton, a Houston attorney familiar with the case.

The 2010 videotaped arrest of Holley, who was 15 at the time, prompted fierce public criticism of the Houston police department by community activists who called it an example of police brutality against minorities.

In the video footage from a security camera, Holley is seen falling to the ground after trying to hurdle a police squad car. He is then surrounded by at least five officers, some who appear to kick and hit his head, abdomen and legs.

Four officers, including Blomberg,

were fired and later indicted on various misdemeanor charges. Holley was convicted of burglary in juvenile court in October 2010 and placed on probation, which ended in April.

On Wednesday, Holley and three others were arrested on suspicion of burglarizing a home. Holley, who made a court appearance Friday, has been released on bond.

Quanell X, the community activist who released the video of the alleged beating to the media, said he was disappointed by the new arrest. He said Holley is dealing with an undisclosed mental illness and had stopped taking medication for it.

"We are not going to throw this young man in the garbage pail. He needs help," he said after Holley's court appearance.

Benjamin Hall, an attorney representing Holley and his family in a pending federal lawsuit filed against Blomberg, the other fired officers and the city of Houston, said while the teenager will have to face the consequences of his actions, the new arrest should not be part of the pending trials.

"I'm sure the judge will instruct (jurors) accordingly that the only conduct that is to be viewed is the crimi-

nal conduct these police officers did two years ago," he said.

But attorneys for two of the fired officers yet to be tried say the new arrest is something they will try to get admitted into evidence. Their trials have yet to be scheduled.

"It helps in regard that we've been trying to portray him as a person that is not a law-abiding citizen, and he's simply a dangerous person and continues to act in the same manner," said Carson Joachim, an attorney for ex-officer Drew Ryser.

Joe Owmbly, an attorney for ex-officer Raad Hassan, said the defense is entitled to bring up this new arrest because it speaks to Holley's credibility.

Joel Androphy, another Houston attorney familiar with the case, said he doesn't think the judge presiding over the pending trials will allow jurors to hear about Holley's new arrest because it's not relevant to the alleged beating.

"But the jury is going to know about it. It's going to be problematic for the district attorney's office," he said. "Jurors are going to look at this as a problem young man and (could give) the officers more wide latitude in justifying how they arrested him."

State briefs

Police kill gunman in standoff at Temple hospital

TEMPLE, Texas (AP) — Police have shot and killed a gunman to end a standoff at the emergency room of a Central Texas hospital.

Temple police say nobody else was hurt in the hourlong incident Sunday night at Scott & White Hospital.

Police on Monday identified the gunman as 54-year-old Larry Wayne Robards of Temple. Authorities are trying to determine what sparked the standoff.

A hospital spokeswoman did not immediately provide more details Monday.

Sgt. Brad Hunt says police around 6:45 p.m. Sunday responded to a call about an armed man. Several hospital staffers were being held hostage in the emergency room common area.

Police had started negotiations when a hostage tried to grab the suspect's gun. A Temple officer fatally shot Robards to end the struggle.

3, including boy, die in Houston area glider crash

WALLIS, Texas (AP) — Authorities say three people, including a boy, are dead after their glider crashed into a field in Southeast Texas.

The Texas Department of Public Safety says the crash happened around 5 p.m. Sunday near Wallis, about 40 miles west of Houston.

The department has yet to release the names of the man, woman and boy who died in the crash.

The Federal Aviation Administration says that the glider was released from the tow aircraft and almost immediately went into a nose dive and crashed.

Investigators are trying to determine what caused the accident.

Honduran man on death row loses court appeal

HOUSTON (AP) — A man from Honduras on Texas death row for the rape-slaying of a 15-year-old girl in Houston has lost a federal court appeal, moving him closer to execution.

Edgardo Rafael Cubas had argued to the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals the trial judge in his case, Jan Crocker, was biased against him because she had prosecuted an unrelated capital murder case years earlier as an assistant district attorney in Harris County. Lawyers for Cubas contended Crocker was impartial because at the time of his trial in 2004, she sought to file an affidavit in the unrelated capital case to keep that inmate on death row.

The 5th Circuit on Friday rejected the claim.

200th Kemp's ridley turtle nest found in Texas

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Experts have confirmed the discovery of a record 200th Kemp's ridley endangered sea turtle nest along the Texas coast.

Donna Shaver with Padre Island National Seashore says some visitors located the nest Sunday.

Shaver says a turtle patrol worker in April spotted tracks in the area where the 200th nest was found, but couldn't locate the nest. The area had been marked and was being monitored.

The Corpus Christi Caller-Times reported Monday that the finding tops last year's 199 nests. Shaver says it's the highest number of Kemp's ridley nests located annually in the area since record keeping began in the early 1980s.

Shaver says windy conditions expected later this week would be favorable for nesting.

3 die in San Antonio wreck, police suspect DWI

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio police say three people have been killed and three hurt after their car hit some parked construction equipment.

Police say the driver in the wreck early Monday suffered minor injuries in the apparent DWI-related accident. Police say he's expected to be charged

with three counts of intoxication manslaughter and two counts of intoxication assault.

Names of the woman and two children who died at the scene were not immediately available. The two injured youngsters were transported to a San Antonio hospital. Further details on them weren't immediately available.

Police are trying to determine whether the six people are related.

November 6 special election to replace Texas lawmaker

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A special election has been scheduled Nov. 6 to replace a Houston-area legislator who died this month.

Gov. Rick Perry says voters in District 144 will pick a replacement for Rep. Ken Legler on the same day of the general election.

Legler had served in the Texas House since 2008. The Republican from Pasadena died June 1 of an apparent heart attack. Legler was 54.

Candidates face an Aug. 23 deadline to file applications to run for the seat.

1 killed, 1 jailed in wrong-way collision

DALLAS (AP) — Police are blaming a wrong way driver for a deadly four-vehicle crash on a freeway northwest of downtown Dallas.

The crash happened about 7:30 a.m. Sunday on Interstate 35E northbound at Texas 356. A police statement says a car driving south in northbound lanes of the freeway slammed into at least three other vehicles, killing the driver in one vehicle that was hit broadside. The statement identified her as 33-year-old Maria Vasquez.

Santiago Morin-Gonzalez has been charged with intoxication manslaughter as the wrong-way driver. The 21-year-old Dallas man is jailed without bond. No attorney is listed for him in jail records.

Driver killed in crash after hitting motorist

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Two women were killed when one motorist stepped from a disabled sport utility vehicle and was hit by another SUV, which then slammed into the disabled vehicle.

The strange sequence unfolded just before 4 a.m. Sunday on Interstate 820 in far western Fort Worth. Officer Daniel Segura says a woman lost control of her SUV, which struck a guardrail and spun 180 degrees. The driver stepped out and was standing in the highway when another SUV struck and killed her before slamming head-on into her SUV. The woman at the wheel of that vehicle died in the crash.

No identities have been released.

4 killed in 2 vehicle collision

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — Four people are dead after a head-on collision of two vehicles on a dark recreational road in East Texas.

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports the accident happened about 8:30 p.m. Friday on Recreational Road 255, about a mile east of the Neches River and about 120 miles northeast of Houston.

Jasper County Justice of the Peace Freddie Miller tells the Beaumont Enterprise (<http://bit.ly/NClzmL>) the dead are 28-year-old Christopher Lemond Douglas, 37-year-old Stacey Rae Henry, 13-year-old Tyra Moye and 11-year-old Tiara Moye. DPS Trooper Lester McCray says the Woodville residents were in a sport utility vehicle Douglas was driving when it slammed into an oncoming pickup truck.

The truck driver, 49-year-old Bryan Paul Baker of Kountze, was listed in stable condition Sunday at Nacogdoches Memorial Hospital.

This deal occurred in the 1990 world team championship final between Germany and the United States. It arose early in the match and put the Germans, who ultimately won the title, ahead for the first time.

When a German pair held the North-South cards, they stopped at a quiet three notrump, making seven with the aid of no opening spade lead

and a couple of diamond finesses.

At the other table, where Charles Coon and Mike Moss of the U.S. sat North-South, the bidding went as shown. West's two-spade overcall was pre-emptive, leaving Moss awkwardly placed after Coon bid three hearts. He tried three notrump, which Coon raised to six.

Had West led a spade, South would have been down two before he could blink. However, West (Roland Rohowsky) did not lead a spade, seemingly handing declarer the slam. But Rohowsky's choice of a low diamond lead instead proved to have diabolical consequences.

From Moss' perspective, after dummy was tabled he could count 12 virtually ironclad tricks — six hearts, five clubs and the ace of diamonds. It would therefore have been the height of folly to risk a diamond finesse, which, if it lost, would give the opponents a chance to cash their top spades.

So Moss put up dummy's ace and tried to run the hearts. But when West showed out on the first heart, Moss' six heart tricks quickly shrank to five, and he finished down one for a team loss of 820 points and 13 IMPs to the Germans.

Rangers rally past Astros with 7-run sixth inning

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers are getting used to the consistently good starts Colby Lewis has been giving them lately.

Lewis gave up three hits and walked one while striking out 10 in seven innings, Ian Kinsler had a three-run triple and Adrian Beltre hit a two-run homer in a seven-run sixth inning, and the Rangers beat the Houston Astros 9-3 on Sunday.

Lewis (6-5), who won his second straight outing, has a 2.25 ERA while going 3-2 over his last six starts. He kept the Rangers in the game when the team couldn't take advantage of opportunities in earlier innings past Astros rookie pitcher Dallas Keuchel, who was making his major-league debut.

"He was outstanding," Rangers manager Ron Washington said of Lewis. "We (had) opportunities earlier against (Keuchel) . the kid made some pitches.

But Colby stayed steadfast and kept us around."

The Rangers won for the sixth time in seven games after limping into June with injuries and losing six of 10 on a road trip to start the month.

Kinsler had two hits and went 4 for 9 the last two games after an 0-for-14 stretch. He began the day hitting .227 in his previous 18 games.

"You have to keep grinding, keep putting the pressure on them and something good happens," Washington said. "Today it was Kinsler. You just have to keep grinding."

Beltre, who also singled in the eighth, has hit

James scores 29, Heat takes second straight from Thunder

MIAMI — The Miami Heat have been here before, two wins from an NBA title.

The difference now? LeBron James isn't letting his head get in the way of his talent.

James had 29 points and 14 rebounds, and the Heat took a 2-1 series lead with a 91-85 victory over the Oklahoma City Thunder on Sunday night.

Miami also won Game 3 of the finals last year, but that was its last victory as the Dallas Mavericks stormed to the title. It was a painful failure for James, who looks determined to prevent a similar collapse.

"He had a game where he

struggled and he kind of let that get into his mind a little bit and he was thinking too much. Now he's playing, he's on attack and being very aggressive," Dwyane Wade said. "He's playing very aggressive and that's the difference obviously from last year to this year, and the difference in our team."

Wade had 25 points, seven rebounds for the Heat, who "carry that pain with us" from last year, according to forward Chris Bosh.

"We think about it every day and that really helps us to succeed in this series," Bosh said.

James' poor performance

was part of the problem then, but he seems on top of his game this time. His 3-pointer sent the Heat to the fourth quarter with the lead, and he scored five straight Miami points when the Heat were building just enough cushion to hold off another late flurry by the Thunder.

"Just trying to make plays," James said. "I told you guys, last year I didn't make enough game-changing plays, and that's what I kind of pride myself on. I didn't do that last year in the finals. I'm just trying to make game-changing plays, and whatever it takes for our team to win, just trying to step up in key moments and be there for my team-

mates."

Game 4 is Tuesday night.

Kevin Durant had 25 points for the Thunder, but picked up his fourth foul in the third quarter and had to go to the bench when they seemed to have control of the game.

"It was frustrating," Durant said.

"Of course we had a good lead and they came back and made some shots. We fouled shooters on the 3-point line twice. It's a tough break for us, man. You know, I hate sitting on the bench, especially with fouls."

The Heat survived their own fourth-quarter sloppiness — nine turnovers — by getting enough big plays from

their Big Three.

James scored 30 and 32 points in the first two games, his two best finals performances. He fell just shy of another 30-point effort but reached 20 points for the 20th time this postseason, two shy of Wade's franchise record set in 2006.

Gone is the player who seemed so tentative down the stretch last year in his second finals failure. He's constantly on the attack now, all while defending Durant in key situations.

"He was great. He's been great for us all playoffs," Heat forward Udonis Haslem said.

didn't participate in any baseball activities. He leads all players in voting for the American League All-Star team.

Hamilton will make the trip for the team's three-game series against San Diego, which starts Monday.

He is expected to play, though manager Ron Washington says Hamilton's status is day-to-day.

Earnhardt Jr. gets elusive victory at Michigan after 143-race drought

BROOKLYN, Mich. — Dale Earnhardt Jr. had finally reached Victory Lane again, ending one of the longest stretches between wins in Sprint Cup history.

He had gone 143 races without finishing first — but not all of those defeats ended in failure. Over the last couple years, Earnhardt has methodically worked his way back among NASCAR's elite, to the point where his victory at Michigan International Speedway seemed almost inevitable.

It really was only a matter of time.

"I feel like we are getting stronger," Earnhardt said. "This year, we have gotten faster throughout the year. We started off pretty quick and we have gotten quicker, and quicker, especially these last couple weeks. So that's been a thrill for me."

Earnhardt's first Cup victory since 2008 came in convincing fashion

when he beat Tony Stewart by 5.393 seconds Sunday.

When the black Chevrolet with the green No. 88 crossed the finish line, Earnhardt could stop answering questions about when he was going to win again. Now, he's a legitimate contender for the overall series championship.

Earnhardt is second in the points standings and has been consistently impressive all year.

"We have a conference meeting on Tuesday with all of the drivers and crew chiefs and that will be a thrill since we won," Earnhardt said.

"But we have got to start talking about the next race. We need to keep our eye on the goal and, like I said, we'll enjoy this, but we are ready for the next opportunity to win one, because this is fun."

It was Earnhardt's 19th Cup victory and his second in 159 starts for Hendrick Motorsports.

He had 17 victories in 291 races for Dale Earnhardt Inc.

In 2009, he averaged a 23rd-place finish, but by last year, that average was up to 14.5. Sunday was his 12th top-10 finish in 15 starts this season. He's second to Matt Kenseth in the standings.

The victory came almost exactly four years to the day after his previous win in a Cup race.

That also was in Michigan on June 15, 2008. He led for 36 laps a week ago at Pocono but made a late stop for gas instead of trying to stretch the fuel to the end.

On Sunday, it wasn't even close — but Earnhardt was still sweating out the finish, waiting for the other shoe to drop during the final moments of the 200-lap race.

"I was in there just going crazy," he said. "I just knew I was going to come around the next corner and see a piece of metal laying in

the racetrack. I just was waiting on something to happen. That was terrifying."

Earnhardt's 143 races between wins was the sixth-longest streak in Sprint Cup history.

"Dale had the fastest car all day," Stewart said. "It's not a national holiday, guys. This morning they were celebrating his fourth anniversary of his last win, so I guess we're all in a state of mourning now, because he's broke that string now, so I don't know what we're all supposed to think."

Like his last victory in Michigan, this one came on Father's Day — fitting for the driver whose father is so revered around NASCAR circles.

Dale Earnhardt Sr. died in a last-lap crash at the Daytona 500 in 2001. "Junior" is now stock-car racing's most popular driver.

"They stayed loyal," he said. "As soon as I got out of the car, that was my initial thought."

NFL's Goodell hears Saints appeals regarding bounties

NEW YORK (AP) — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell was hearing the appeals Monday of four players suspended for their role in the Saints bounty program.

On hand at NFL headquarters were all four players: Saints linebacker Jonathan Vilma, who was suspended for the 2012 season, and defensive end Will Smith, docked for four games; Green Bay defensive end Anthony Hargrove, suspended for eight

games; and Cleveland linebacker Scott Fujita (three games).

Lawyers for the players and the NFL Players Association also attended. The union recently lost two grievances challenging Goodell's authority to hand out discipline for the bounty program.

The NFL turned over evidence to the four players and the union on Friday, as required by the collective bargaining agreement.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, June 18, the 170th day of 2012. There are 196 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On June 18, 1812, the War of 1812 began as the United States Congress approved, and President James Madison signed, a declaration of war against Britain.
On this date:
In 1778, American forces entered Philadelphia as the British withdrew during the Revolutionary War.
In 1815, Napoleon Bonaparte met his Waterloo as British and Prussian troops defeated the French in Belgium.
In 1873, suffragist Susan B. Anthony was found guilty by a judge in Canandaigua (kan-an-DAY-gwuh), N.Y., of breaking the law by casting a vote in the 1872 presidential election. (The judge fined Anthony \$100, but she never paid the penalty.)
In 1908, William Howard Taft was nominated for president by the Republican National Convention in Chicago.
In 1912, the Republican National Convention, which would nominate President William Howard Taft for another term of office, opened in Chicago.
In 1940, during World War II, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill urged his countrymen to conduct themselves in a manner that would prompt future generations to say, "This was their finest hour." Charles de Gaulle delivered a speech on the BBC in which he rallied his countrymen after the fall of France to Nazi Germany.
In 1945, William Joyce, known as "Lord Haw-Haw," was charged in London with high treason for his English-language wartime broadcasts on German radio. (He was hanged in January 1946.)
In 1958, President Dwight D. Eisenhower expressed support for his chief of staff, Sherman Adams, who was accused of improperly accepting gifts from a businessman. (Adams resigned in September 1958.)
In 1972, 118 people were killed in the crash of a Brussels-bound British European Airways Hawker Siddeley Trident 1C shortly after takeoff from London Heathrow Airport.
In 1979, President Jimmy Carter and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev signed the SALT II strategic arms limitation treaty in Vienna.
In 1983, astronaut Sally K. Ride became America's first woman in space as she and four colleagues blasted off aboard the space shuttle Challenger.
In 1992, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Georgia v. McCollum, ruled that criminal defendants could not use race as a basis for excluding potential jurors from their trials. Entertainer Peter Allen died in San Diego County, Calif., at age 48.
Today's Birthdays: Rock singer-composer-musician Sir Paul McCartney is 70.

"I don't know if he looks up at the clock or score sheet, but he knows when we need him to make big plays and come through for us, and he comes through."

Bosh had 10 points and 11 rebounds for the Heat, who can win a second title by winning the next two games at home. That's what they did in 2006, one of just two home teams to sweep the middle three games in the 2-3-2 format.

They seemed out of it when Oklahoma City opened a 10-point lead midway through the third. But Durant had picked up his fourth

foul with 5:41 left on Wade's baseline drive, though there appeared to be little or no contact. Thunder coach Scott Brooks decided to sit Russell Westbrook with him, and the Heat charged into the lead by the end of the period.

Westbrook looked angry going to the bench, but denied any frustration afterward.

The Thunder grabbed their last lead at 77-76 on James Harden's basket with 7:32 left. James answered with two free throws about 20 seconds later, and the teams would trade turnovers and stops over the next couple of tense minutes.

Wade then converted a three-point play, and

another minute went by before James powered to the basket, Durant trying to get in position to draw a charge but watching helplessly as he picked up his fifth foul. James made the free throw for an 84-77 advantage with 3:47 to play.

After another basket by James, the Thunder had one last burst — haven't they always in this series? — ripping off six straight points to get within one before Bosh made a pair of free throws with 1:19 to play. Durant missed badly on a wild shot attempt, and the Thunder missed another chance when Westbrook was off from behind the arc. James hit a free throw for a four-point lead with 16

seconds to go and Wade added two to close it out.

"Last year I don't know if we was experienced enough as a unit to deal with what came at us," Wade said. "I just feel like we understand the situations more and we can deal with it better."

The Thunder were just 4 of 18 on 3-pointers and hit only 15 of 24 free throws, unusually awful numbers for one of the league's best offensive teams.

Harden, the Sixth Man of the Year, shot 2 of 10 for his nine points. Westbrook finished with 19 points.

After a split of the first two games, the series made its way from Oklahoma City, where fans

in blue shirts filled every seat, to Miami, where white shirts hung on empty chairs just minutes before the tip. The late arrivals in Oklahoma City had been the Thunder players, who fell into big early deficits and acknowledged some first-time finals jitters in Game 1. Brooks said he heard the cries to change his starting lineup but said it never crossed his mind.

The Thunder quickly fell behind 10-4 in this one after spotting the Heat a 13-point lead in Game 1 and getting clubbed into an 18-2 hole in the opening minutes of Game 2. They didn't let things get any worse this time, playing the Heat even from there and trailing 26-20 after

one. James, Wade and Bosh combined for Miami's first 18 points.

James and Wade had some dazzling drives in the second and Shane Battier got free for a pair of 3-pointers in the final 2 minutes, but the Thunder stayed with them the entire way, briefly holding a three-point lead. Westbrook's 3-pointer with 2.3 seconds left cut Miami's lead to 47-46.

Brooks also pulled Westbrook with 5 minutes left and left him out the remainder of the period, leaving the Thunder without their two best players as they tried to hang onto the lead.

They couldn't.

The Heat scored the final seven of the period.

safely in 10 of his last 12 games.

Carlos Lee, in his first game back after missing time on the disabled list with a strained hamstring, went 2 for 4 with two RBIs as the Astros' designated hitter.

Lewis has struck out 84 and walked 12 in 96 innings, giving him a major league-leading strikeouts-to-walks ratio. His only walk Sunday, with one out in the fifth to Jason Castro, was followed by a two-base wild pitch. Matt Downs then blooped a single over a drawn-in infield on the right side to give the Astros a 1-0 lead.

Lewis followed by retiring the last eight batters he faced.

"Try to pound the strike zone and get some quick outs . that's my M.O.," said Lewis, who threw only 92 pitches. "Overall, it was

a good day. I was able to hang around for the offense to put up a big number."

The right-hander got into a bind in the second with runners on first and third with no outs after giving up leadoff singles to Lee and Brian Bogusevic. He followed, though, by striking out Justin Maxwell and Castro and then got an inning-ending grounder from Downs.

"He takes the ball every fifth day," Kinsler said. "We know we're going to get a quality start. He's the rock of our rotation."

Keuchel gave up four hits and four walks in five-plus innings, leaving after giving up a lead-off single to Nelson Cruz in the sixth.

"Any time a guy can come in and do what he did in his first major league start, it's a success," Astros manager Brad Mills said. "He had the bases loaded in the third and the fourth, and he

walked four guys, but he battled through it.

"He made pitches when he had to."

Fernando Rodriguez (1-7) replaced Keuchel in the sixth and was charged with four runs in two-thirds of an inning. He walked Mike Napoli and — after a sacrifice advanced the runners — Craig Gentry to load the bases. Kinsler followed with his bases-clearing triple.

After Elvis Andrus walked, Michael Young singled to drive in Kinsler, and Andrus scored when right fielder Bogusevic was slow getting the ball back to the infield. Beltre followed with his two-run shot into the left-field seats.

Andrus had an RBI single in the seventh to make it 8-1.

After Lee's two-run single in the eighth, Yorvit Torrealba added a run-scoring grounder in the bottom of the inning.
