County views audit bids



RED RIBBON WEEK is observed at Richardson Elementary School in Dimmitt with a balloon launch. Many of the students attached a return address to the red balloons and included a message about being drug free as a part of the special week's observance. More than 500 balloons were launched,

and they were donated by the Lions Club. In addition, individual red lapel ribbons were supplied for each student and staff person at all Dimmitt schools. The ribbons were supplied by Texans' War on Drugs. These children are from the second grade class taught by Cathy Thames.

At Monday's meeting of the Castro County commissioners' Court, four bids were received on performing a two-year audit on the county accounts and a resolution was passed supporting new prison construction.

The resolution voices support for Proposition 4 on the ballot in Tuesday's election, saying that the state needs to relieve the burden on the counties that are forced to house state prisoners because of lack of space in state facilities.

Audit proposal bids were received from:

—Doshier, Pickens and Francis of Amarillo for an estimated 268 hours of work at an estimated fee of \$15,500.

—Jones and Pendergast of Plainview for an estimated 355 hours and an estimated fee ranging from \$16,000 to \$18,000.

—Brown, Graham and Co. of Pampa for approximately 10 to 15 days of work for an estimated cost of \$14,500 to \$15,750.

—Davis Kinard of Abilene for estimated costs ranging from \$11,800 to \$13,000.

The bids were tabled until the next meeting of the court, Nov. 11.

In approving payment of bills, a bill for \$200 to Precinct 1 from Amarillo engineer Bill McMorries for engineering services was questioned.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Harold Smith said he had consulted McMorries on the drainage problems on First Street in Hart, and Smith added that the expense could be taken out of his budget allowance for seal coating.

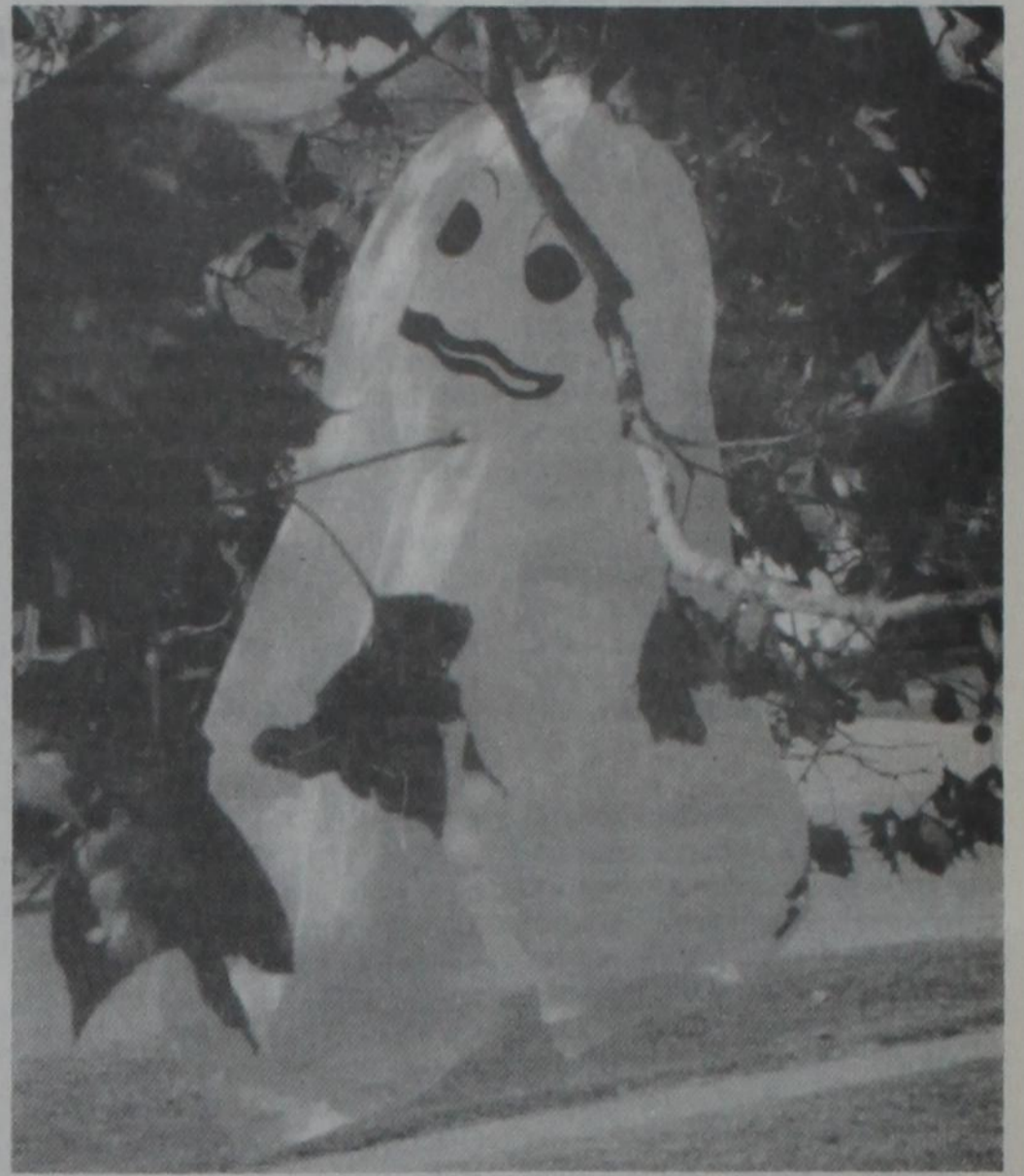
County Judge Polly Simpson said she would like to see a written report on McMorries' findings before approval of the bill. Smith said he would ask McMorries to submit one.

In an effort to avoid repetition, Pct. 3 Commissioner Jeff Robertson moved for adjournment when agenda items requested by Smith came up.

Adjournment was staved off by a three to two vote, with Robertson and Pct. 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos voting in favor of adjournment and Smith and Pct. 2 Commissioner Dale Winders voting against. Simpson broke the tie by saying the meeting could continue if Smith would limit his remarks to the road situation in the Coronado Acres subdivision and any new information on the other agenda items he had requested.

Smith remarked that he had a letter from the State Attorney General's office on the Coronado mat-

CED sets budget

The Castro County Education District board approved the 1991-92 budget for the CED at a meeting Monday afternoon.

With total income for the CED estimated at \$1,790,000 for all three school districts, Dimmitt will receive \$1,330,161. Hart is expected to receive \$335,329, and Nazareth will receive \$117,136.

Another \$6,300 will be spent by the CED for liability insurance and to pay for an annual audit, as well as providing for administrative services, publications, supplies, travel, fees and dues, leaving \$1,374 not spent.

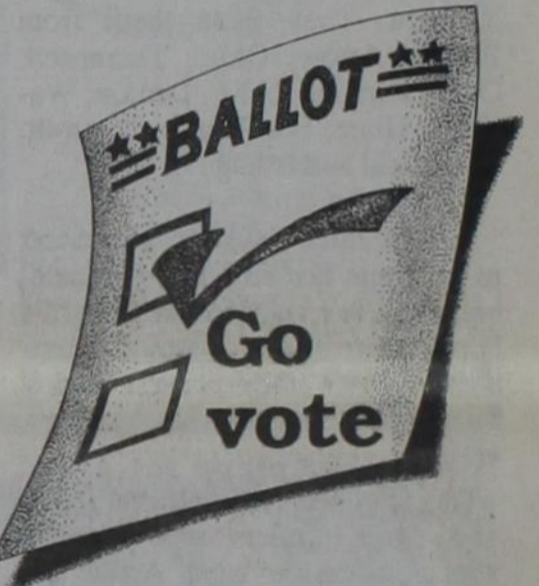
The revenue for the CED comes from the 72 cents of ad valorem taxes assessed per \$100 property valuation for each district.

Any funds left over at the end of the year would go toward lowering the CED assessment the next year, if possible.

School districts may levy addi-

tional taxes to increase funding. Dimmitt assesses an additional 30.24 cents; Hart adds another 27.8 cents, and Nazareth adds 37 cents per \$100 of property valuation.

The CED board has set a meeting for today (Thursday) at 1 p.m. to consider a contract for provision of legal services in collecting back taxes.



Vote early through Friday; election is set for Tuesday

Friday is the final day for early balloting by personal appearance for Tuesday's referendum on 13 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Early ballots may be cast at the County Clerk's office today (Thursday) and Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. both days. Ballots obtained by mail must be returned by Tuesday.

Regular balloting on Tuesday will be held at eight voting boxes throughout the county from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. County Clerk Joy Jones recommended that voters bring their voter's registration cards

when they come to vote, either for early balloting or on election day.

"It is the law," she stated, adding that she would like to encourage all registered voters to get out and vote.

Voting boxes in the county are located:

Precinct 1: County Courtroom in the Courthouse.

Precinct 2: Drivers' License Office, Courthouse.

Precinct 3: District Courtroom, Courthouse.

Precinct 4: Adult Probation Office, Courthouse.

Precinct 5: Golden Group Build-

ing, Hart.

Precinct 6: Flag Fertilizer.

Precinct 7: Frio Baptist Church.

Precinct 8: Community Building, Nazareth.

Amendment proposals concern charter amending for home rule cities with less than 5,000 population, expenditures for toll roads, Veterans' Land Board investment authority, bonds for prisons and other institutions, tax exemptions in enterprise zones, establishment of a Texas Ethics Commission, public retirement system investments, presentation of state debt questions, issuance of land patents, establishment of a state lottery, tax exemption for nonprofit water corporations, water development bonds for colonias, and bonds for college student loans.

The funeral for Janice Bell Saturday afternoon was the longest funeral I've ever attended. It ran a little more than an hour, with four different speakers taking part in the service. But it wasn't too long at all. Not for this particular lady.

The Bedford Street Church of Christ was packed with people whose lives Janice had touched in one way or another. She was active in many spheres, always as a "giver" and never as a "taker."

My own experiences with Janice were mainly in the American Field Service student exchange program here. For many years, Janice was the heart and soul of the AFS chapter, starting with the year she and Lonnie served as the American parents of Zito Sartarelli of Brazil.

She was the president of our AFS chapter in 1975, when we hit a snag. Dimmitt had the chance to get an exceptional girl from New Zealand, Susan Ryan. But that was one of those years when we couldn't line up a host family, no matter how hard we beat the bushes.

Janice couldn't stand the thought of Susan not being placed, or of Dimmitt not getting her. Finally, she turned the chapter presidency over to me, and she and Lonnie applied to be a host family again. Susan was their second AFS student.

Zito and Susan both are listed among Janice's survivors as foster children.

When Zito (who now lives in Indianapolis) and Susan (who now lives in Canada) were notified of Janice's death, neither hesitated. They simply dropped everything and came.

Such was the effect this one woman had on others whose lives she touched.

"I asked each of her children to complete the sentence, 'Mom lived...'" Benny Baker said.

"Each one of her children (Mike, Rick, Jeff and Lori) finished the sentence the same way: 'for others.'"

Road work starts soon on FM 1055

Barricades and warning signs were put in place this week and the construction phase is expected to begin very soon on a road improvement project on Farm-Market Road 1055 in Castro County.

The Texas Dept. of Transportation held a pre-construction conference on the project Monday afternoon to complete last minute paperwork and to notify local interested parties.

The project area will extend along FM 1055 from State Highway 86 (west of Dimmitt) south to the intersection with Farm - Market 1524, which is known as the Flag area.

Castro County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes and Dept. of Public Safety Trooper Ron Morgan were present at the meeting, along with three county commissioners. Representatives of the highway department and the contractor and subcontractors for the project were also present.

Merlin Bennett, Texas Dept. of Transportation Resident Engineer from Plainview, said the completed roadway will have a 32-foot wide base and 30-foot wide pavement, with 12-foot traffic lanes and three-foot shoulders.

Bennett announced that the general speed limit for the construction area will be placed at 45 miles per hour, with additional step-downs as needed in specific construction phases and areas.

In response to a question, he noted that the 45 mph limit would not be strictly enforced in portions of the project not immediately affected by the construction.

Bennett said flaggers will be used for the project and the state will inspect the contractor's safety measures often throughout the project. He also noted that the traffic flow will be clearly marked.

Contractor for the project is J.H. Strain and Sons of Abilene.

Bobcat, Swift marching bands earn top ratings

NISD to receive satellite television access equipment

Nazareth Independent School District is one of 250 school districts in Texas which will begin receiving state-funded Television Receive Only (TVRO) satellite receiving equipment.

This is a program sponsored by the Texas government to expand its public school system's telecommunications capabilities. Within five years, Texas plans to install at least one TVRO in each of its school districts, and in cooperation with private businesses to place more on many of its 8,000 individual campuses statewide.

element of that facet is a planned Very Small Aperture Terminal (VSAT) digital network. While work on initial installation of that digital network has been delayed, the analogue video network expansion is proceeding with the 200-plus TVRO installations.

The TVRO equipment which is being installed in Texas districts and regional education service centers will be dual band, remotely-controlled, 100-channel programmable and include video cassette record, audio talk-back, VideoCi-

pher II Plus descrambler and computer control capabilities.

Also, a new Texas Education Agency-sponsored network, T-STAR, will begin operations in early 1992 to deliver limited state-provided programming to schools. However, the Texas schools are expected to mainly use their newly acquired TVROs to access extant and future distance learning, insertive and supplemental instructional television from the variety of US satellites and service providers nationwide.

Breast cancer screening clinic to be held here

The breast cancer screening program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo will hold a community outreach clinic for early detection of breast cancer in Dimmitt on Monday.

The clinic provides low-cost screenings, including a breast exam by a registered nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of self-examinations and a mammogram.

Appointments are required for the exams, and the clinic will be open from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Plains Memorial Hospital.

For more information about the clinic or to make an appointment, call the Harrington Cancer Center, toll-free, at 1-800-274-4673.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detec-

tion. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are to learn and perform breast self-examinations every month, have a physical exam each year, and have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age, which include one baseline mammogram for women ages 35 to 40, a mammogram every one to two years for women ages 40 to 50 and yearly mammograms for women over age 50.

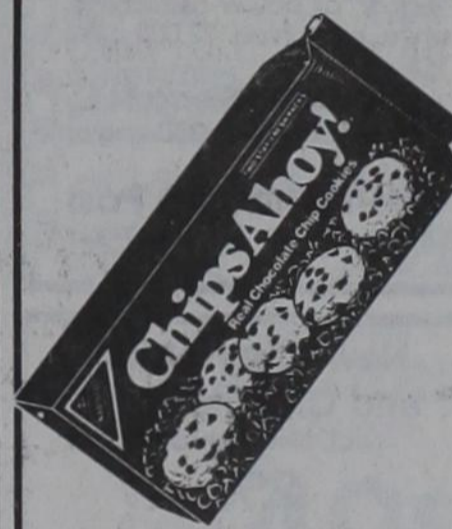

Police Calls

ter, but he said he did not have a copy with him.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis said Smith showed him the letter from Assistant Attorney General John Fuller, which details court cases concerning issuance of declaratory judgments in similar cases. Davis repeated once again that property holders in Coronado Acres have the option of seeking a declaratory judgment against the county in their complaint, but would have to seek it in district court.

He also reiterated the other options open to them, including establishment of a special, self-imposed tax specifically for road improvements.


Smith remarked that the roads

must be county roads, because the county could not work on private roads, and he insisted that county equipment had been used to open the roads and maintain them.

Robertson asked whether Smith's work on private roads constituted county acceptance of those roads, saying he had seen Smith's workers blading the private road to Paul Armstrong's house.

Smith replied he had not authorized such work, and someone commented that Smith should keep up with what his workers are doing.

At that point in the discussion, Simpson entertained a motion for adjournment, with Robertson and Guggemos also voting in favor and Smith against. Winders abstained, and the meeting was adjourned.

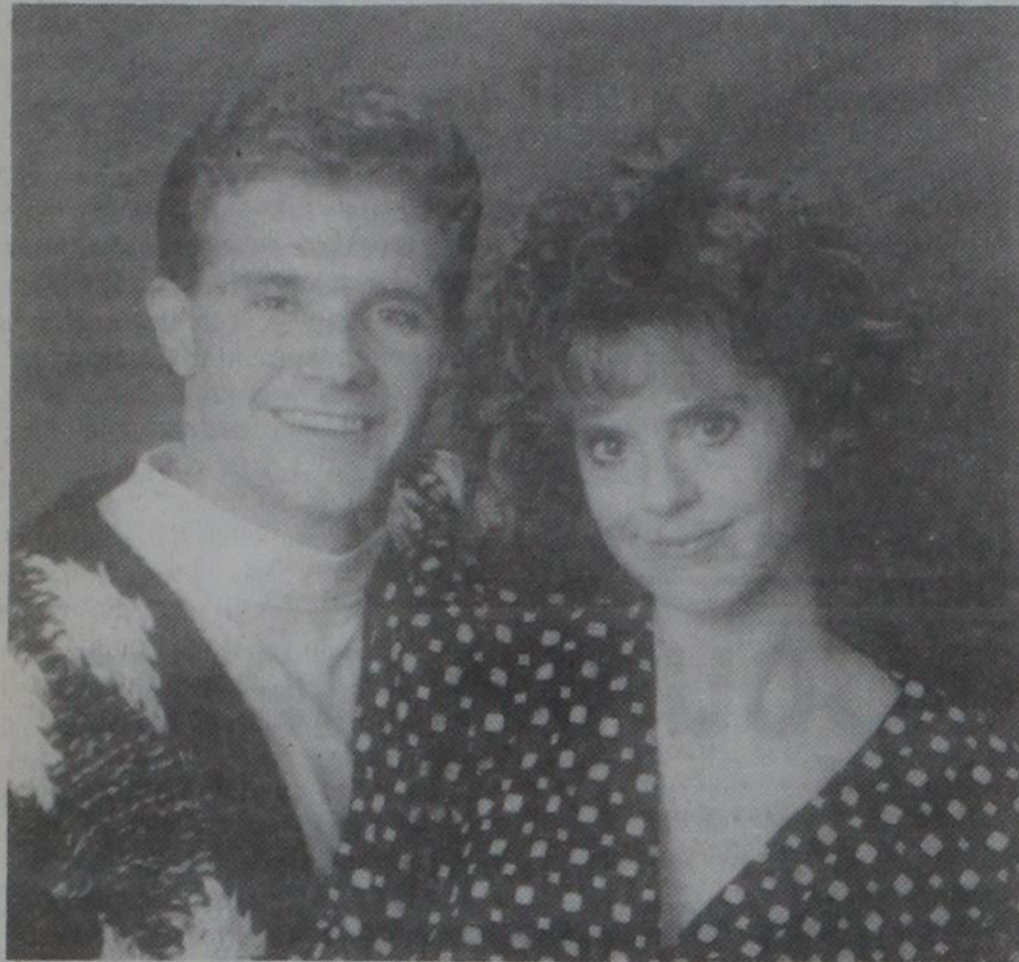

worker for the CPS is Donna Stump.

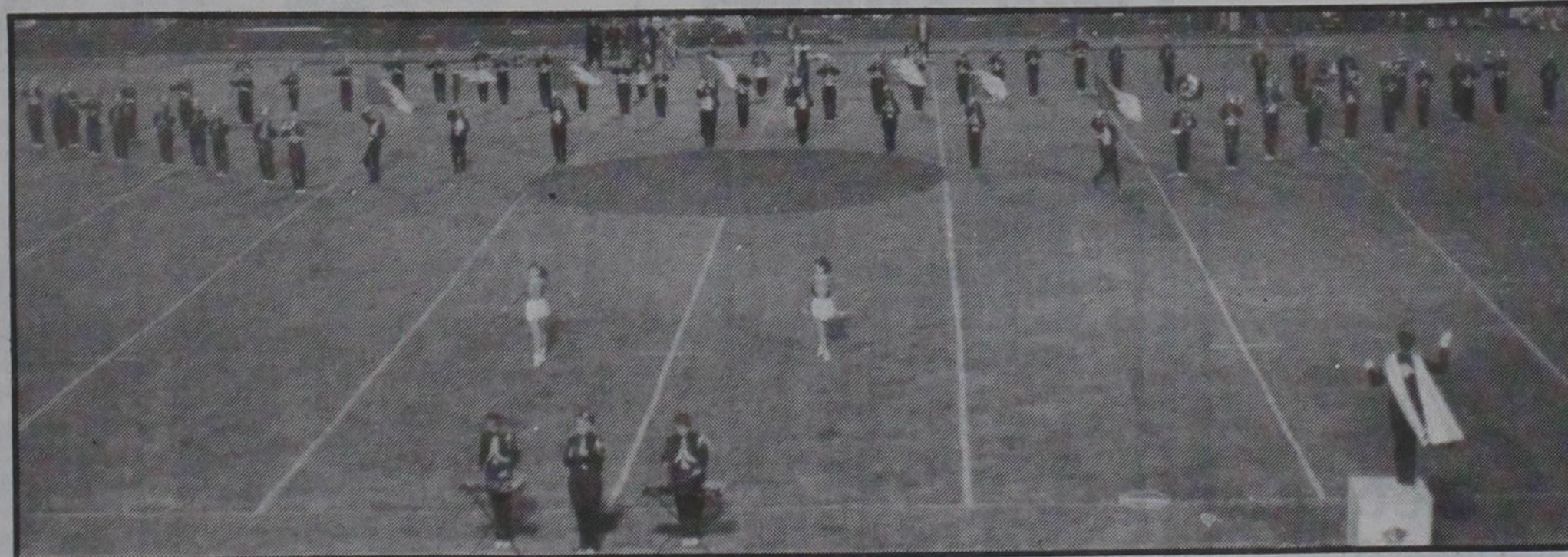

Littlefield kills Bobcats' hopes, 14-0

After a scoreless first half, Littlefield's Wildcats broke two long touchdown runs for a 14-0 victory over Dimmitt's Bobcats in a key District 2-AAA game Friday night at Littlefield.

It was the second district loss for the Bobcats, and killed their dream of going into the playoffs.

The Littlefield victory kept the Wildcats in a first-place tie with Floydada at 3-0.

"They just wore us out with their bench strength," Bobcat Coach Bill Rogers said. "Anytime you have as many kids as we do who have to play both ways, you've got a hard row. The line play was especially crucial. Our kids had to stay in while they ran in somebody fresh, and they've got pretty good-sized kids all down their roster."

Littlefield suited up 32 players to Dimmitt's 23.

The two teams spent the first half pushing each other back and forth as both defenses proved to be better than either offense.

"I thought from the start that whoever got on the scoreboard first, that would be the difference," Coach Rogers said.

It looked as though that first score would be Dimmitt's after Lincoln Stewart broke a 54-yard run down the sideline to the Littlefield 19 in the first quarter. But the threat died five plays later at the Littlefield 21. It would be the deepest thrust by the Bobcats all night.

The Wildcats buckled down noticeably in the second half, and with 5:27 left in the third quarter, senior slotback Trevor Blair zipped around left end on a reverse, then outdodged the Dimmitt secondary 58 yards for the game's first touch-

down. James Bond kicked the extra point to make it 7-0.

Littlefield's second TD was set up by one of the Wildcats' five interceptions. Chad Gray picked off a Billy Ray Thomas pass at the Dimmitt 25 with 1:16 left in the third, and three plays later—on the first snap of the fourth period—Wildcat quarterback Michael Vaught scored from 20 yards out on a keeper around left end. Bond kicked the extra point to make it 14-0.

Despite the shutout, the Bobcats made it exciting at times—especially on a pair of fourth-quarter catches by junior split end Jeremy Casey that gained 66 total yards.

Casey's first catch was actually a steal. A Littlefield defender intercepted the Tait Crow pass but Casey simply ripped the ball out of his hands as he came down, then raced to the Dimmitt 40 for a 28-yard gain.

Casey's second reception was the Bobcats' prettiest pass play this season. With 3:43 left in the game and the Bobcats on their own 30, Crow fired a perfect bullet to Casey on a deep crossing pattern. Casey grabbed it chest-high without breaking stride and raced to the Littlefield 32 for a 38-yard gain.

But on the next play, Littlefield's Mark Cox intercepted to kill the Dimmitt threat. The game ended with still another Wildcat interception—this one by Blair, who returned the ball to the Dimmitt 30 as the clock ran out.

Stewart, in addition to his 54-yard run, brought the crowd to its feet two other times when he dropped back to punt, only to have to scoop the low-snapped ball up

off the grass and do something with it.

The first time, on the fourth play of the game, Stewart raced right to avoid Littlefield's charging linemen and threw a pass to Billy Ray Thomas downfield. That play was nullified, though, by penalties against both teams that resulted in a Dimmitt first down.

On the second low-snap punt play—this one in the second quarter—Stewart again turned adversity into a first down with a 13-yard pop-valve pass to Thomas.

"Coming out after the half, I was thinking, 'Somebody's got to break it, and whoever does will win,'" Coach Rogers said. "And Trevor Blair did it. He killed us on that

Tracy Davis and Ricky Leavitt, both seniors, should have been listed on the honor roll for the first six weeks of school.

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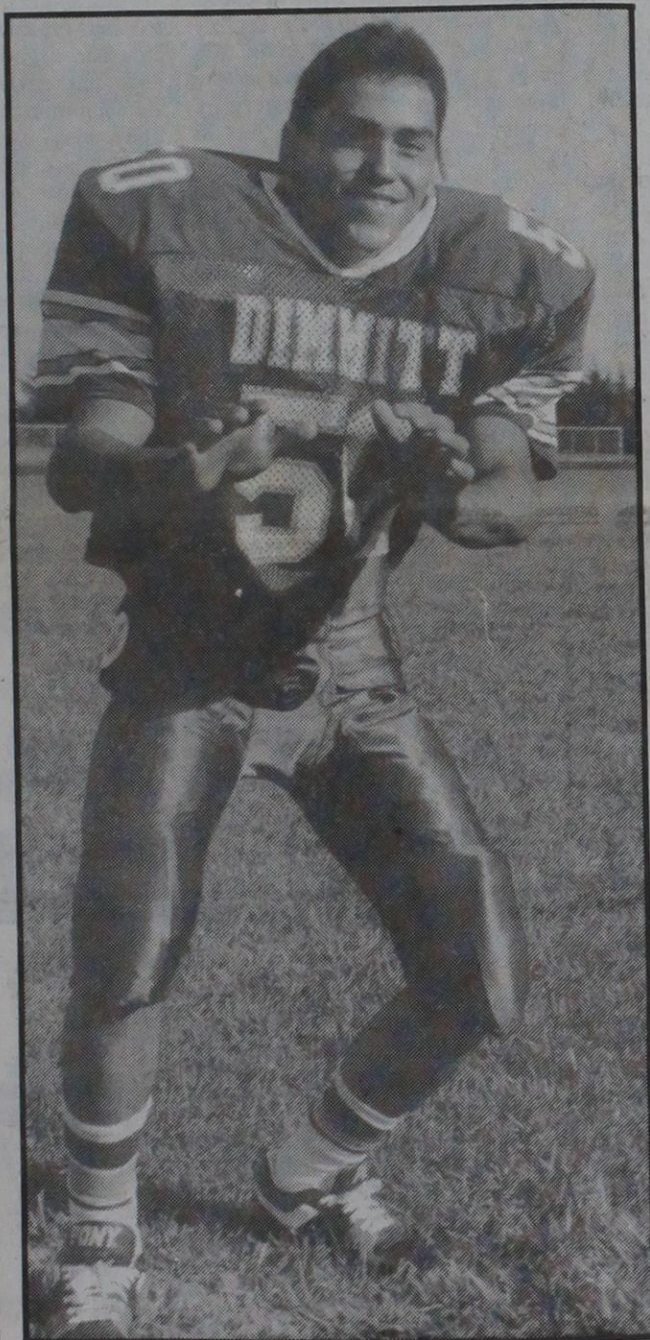

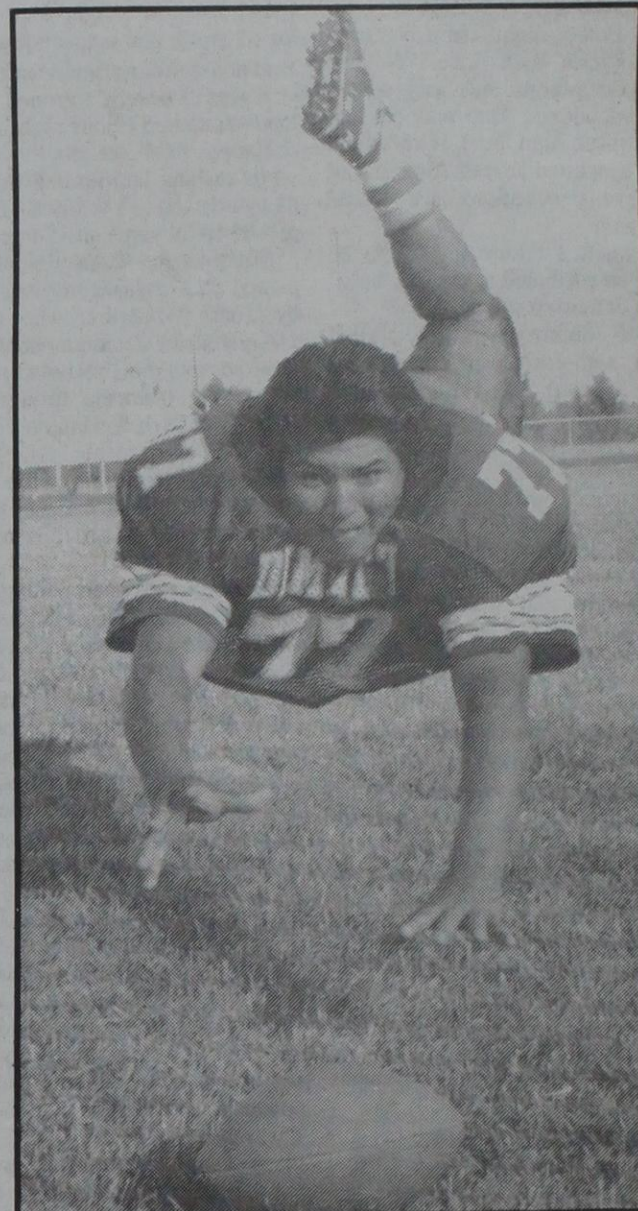

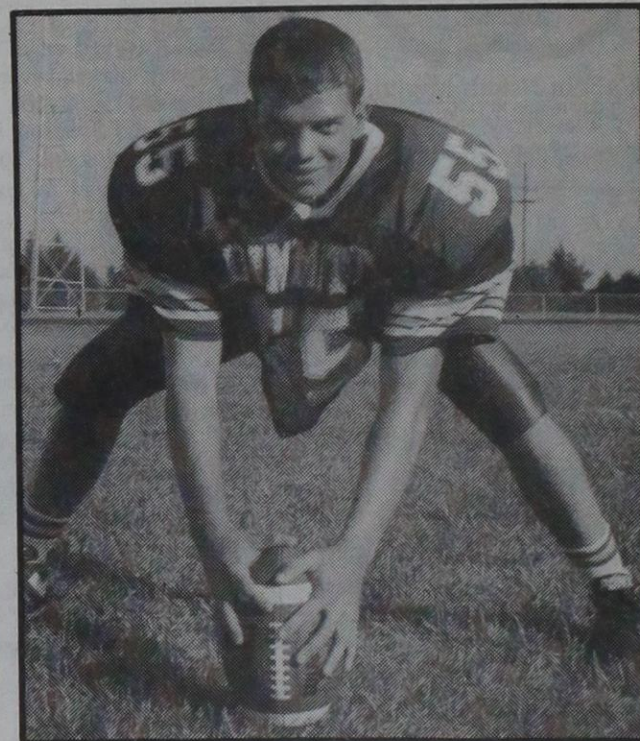

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Happy ends Swifts' hopes for a district sweep, 20-9

Nazareth crossed Happy's 20-yard line five times Friday night, but only one of the penetrations led to a touchdown and the four drives that were stalled, enabled Happy to hand the Swifts their first loss of the year, 20-9.

The District 2-A battle was hard-fought and even until the fourth quarter, when the Cowboys scored twice—first to retake the lead, then to pad that lead for the win.

"We had a lot of wasted opportunities Friday night," said Nazareth Head Coach Rick Price. "We had five penetrations and only scored one touchdown. That was the key to the game right there. If we would have converted at least three out of the five penetrations, we would have won."

Nazareth's failure inside the 20 could be attributed to the Cowboys' tough defensive stands.

Both defensive units played tough, with each team barely managing to earn 200 yards total offense. Nazareth ended up with more yards on offense with 205, but Happy's 201-yard offensive performance yielded more trips across the goal line.

Nazareth's defense was paced by senior tackle Mac Annen, who recorded 14 tackles. Russell Huckert contributed 10 tackles and T.J. Garza brought down eight Cowboy runners. Nick Johnson recorded six

tackles while Lynn Nelson and Brandon Schilling each had five. Nelson added a fumble recovery and Adrian Farris picked off a Justin Dempsey pass for the Swifts.

Nazareth's air attack, led by junior quarterback Michael Schmucker, accumulated more than half of its total offense. Schmucker was accurate on 12 of 26 passes for a total of 131 yards and a touchdown. Travis Schulte was on the receiving end of four passes for 43 yards, Johnson caught four passes for 43 yards and a touchdown and Brandon Schilling hauled in two.

It was Nazareth's ground attack that was stalled Friday night.

Happy held the Swifts to 74 yards rushing and limited Garza to 44 yards on 15 carries. Nelson picked up 29 yards on 15 totes.

Meanwhile, Happy's offense picked up 122 yards rushing, paced by Todd McCarley, who gained 114 yards on 25 attempts. Jimmy Stockett was the Cowboys' powerhouse on offense, though. He scored each of Happy's three touchdowns.

The scoring started on the Cowboys' first offensive drive of the game, which started inside Nazareth territory.

Nazareth took the opening kickoff, but failed to move the ball and Garza was forced to punt it away to Happy. Garza had problems handling the low snap, and when he attempted to punt the ball, the kick was blocked. After a mad scramble, a Happy defender came up with the ball and a few plays later the Cowboys scored.

The Cowboy offense worked its way to the one-yard line, then Stockett plowed through the line to score with 8:19 left in the first quarter. Brandon Clark's PAT was good to give Happy a 7-0 lead.

Nazareth got on the scoreboard later in the stanza, courtesy of a Happy bad snap which landed the punter in the end zone with the ball. That made the score 7-2, and that's the way the score stayed throughout the rest of the half as the teams battled to a defensive stalemate.

Most of the third quarter action was reminiscent of the second quarter, but Nazareth was able to mount one successful drive that gave the team its first and only lead of the game.

The Swifts worked down to the Happy 14-yard line and were facing a 4th-and-11 situation when Schmucker found Johnson in the end zone for the score. Johnson added the extra point to give the Swifts a 9-7 lead.

But that was all the Swifts could muster, and the Cowboys took advantage of a couple of Nazareth's mental errors to score two more times, enroute to the win.

Stockett scored twice in the stanza—first on a 10-yard run with 8:58 left in the game. Happy attempted a two-point conversion, but it was stopped short and the Cowboys had to settle for a 16-9 lead.

The Swifts were unable to move the ball on the ensuing drive, and

Happy took over, moving the ball down into Nazareth territory. The Swift defense appeared to stop Happy on a fourth down play, but a Nazareth penalty gave the Cowboys the ball on the one-yard line and a Stockett run gave the Cowboys another TD. The extra point was good, making the final score 20-9.

Then representatives from each school's Student Council released balloons in an act of hope and goodwill between the schools and each side's fans cheered the efforts. But once the game was underway, the cheers belonged to Olton and its running back Arturo Aviles, as the visiting Mustangs tallied 49 points enroute to a shutout victory. Olton dominated the contest, racking up 456 yards of offense—

259 on the ground and 197 through the air. And Aviles gained the majority of those rushing yards while scoring on runs of 1, 8, 20, 1, and 32.

The victory improved Olton's record to 6-2, 4-1 in District 3-AA play; while Hart fell to 3-5, 1-4.

The Mustangs went up 14-0 in the first quarter after Aviles scored from a yard out, then from eight yards out. Tony Hernandez booted the extra points in the stanza.

Aviles found the end zone two more times in the first half to give Olton a commanding lead.

The first TD run was a 20-yard effort, culminated by a Hernandez

extra point. That gave the Mustangs a 21-0 lead.

Aviles scored his fourth TD of the game later in the stanza, when he broke across the goal line from a yard out. Hernandez' kick was accurate again, giving Olton a 28-0 lead.

The Mustangs weren't through in the first half, though.

Mustang quarterback Brian Baize completed a 16-yard TD pass to Chad Schneider and Hernandez kicked another extra point to round out the first half scoring, giving Olton a 35-0 lead at half time.

The Mustangs struck twice in the second half to complete the scoring.

The first TD in the second half was a 50-yard aerial bomb from Baize to Randy Milloy in the third quarter. Hernandez booted the PAT to give Olton a 42-0 lead.

Aviles scored the Mustangs' last score in the fourth quarter when he broke through Hart defenders and raced 32 yards for the score. Hernandez again kicked the PAT to give the Mustangs their final 49-0 victory.

Naz needs win to stay alive in playoff chase

Nazareth at Vega

The Nazareth Swifts and Vega Longhorns are tied for second place in district play, both with 2-1 records, and the teams square off Friday night at 7:30 p.m. in Vega. The game is a must-win one for the Swifts.

"They're 2-1 right now and they're looking to get into the playoffs, just like we are," said Nazareth Coach Rick Price. "We've got to put it all together and hopefully we'll come out with a win."

Vega's district victories were over Kress and Bovina, while Happy is the only team that has beaten the Longhorns.

Offensively, the Longhorns offense is guided by quarterback Codi Cleavinger (5-11, 165), and he likes to throw the ball, usually to running back Jason Henderson (5-9, 185) and tight end Tim Thornhill (6-5, 220).

"Henderson's pretty dangerous—we're going to have to keep our eyes on him. Thornhill has good hands and he's a big threat as well," Price said.

The Longhorns like to go with four receivers and a single back set, and when they do that, Mike Potter is the guy in the backfield. Price said he "runs real hard" with the ball.

"They've been living by the pass these days," Price said. "They'll go into a power-I on short yardage situations."

The Longhorns offensive strength could be in the experienced line.

On defense, Price said Vega usually runs a 53, but he adds that he thinks they might try something different against Nazareth Friday night.

But with two district games left to play, they still intend to finish with a 6-4 record.

"I talked to the boys Saturday, and their attitude is positive," Coach Bill Rogers said. "They want to go out as winners. They've had a good attitude all along, and they still have."

The Bobcats' final two games will be played at home—against Friona Friday night and against Tulia Nov. 8.

Coach Steve Williams' Chieftains started the year with a lot of promise, with 10 offensive and eight defensive starters among 23 returning lettermen. But they have yet to win a game.

Despite their 0-8 record, though, the Chieftains have played some good teams close while running hot and cold this season.

"Littlefield had to score in the final nine seconds to beat them," Coach Rogers noted.

The Chieftains have lost to River Road by 15-10, to Tahoka by 19-12, to Canyon by 14-6, to Dalhart by 44-7, to Brownfield by 14-0, to Floydada by 41-12, to Littlefield by 14-7, and to Tulia by 32-0.

"They've got a good defensive ball club," Coach Rogers said. "Offensively, it doesn't look like they've put it together. That's a pretty tough schedule they've played, though."

He added, "We can't go into this game believing we have it made. Littlefield thought that, too."

Blair Burney, Friona's sophomore quarterback, is nursing an injury and is questionable for Friday night's game. If he can't play, junior Britt Conklin will run the Chieftains' Wing-T offense. Rounding out the backfield will be tailback Ismael Rocha (164, Sr.), fullback Curtis Brady (185, Sr.) and wingback Chad Hamilton (151, Sr.). Rocha will do most of the ball-carrying.

Friona's offensive line averages almost 184 lbs. per man, with a low of 113 (senior end Roman Garcia) and a high of 253 (senior tackle Wayne Jackson).

On defense, Hamilton will go from his wingback spot to an outside linebacker post, where he won all-district first team honors last season. He and two other linebackers usually will form up behind a five-man line.

Kickoff time at Bobcat Stadium will be 7:30.

Hart at Hale Center

Hart's defense will have to contain an experienced Hale Center backfield to come away with a District 3-AA win Friday night.

The Longhorns will travel to Hale Center to take on the Owls with game time set at 7:30 p.m.

Hale Center is loaded with experienced players, and returns 13 lettermen including 10 offensive and 10 defensive starters from last year's 1-9 team.

Headlining the list of returnees on offense are senior quarterback Brian Clark (5-8, 170) and senior runningback Dwayne Johnson (5-8, 170), both in their fourth year of starting in the Owl backfield. The two turn out a solid offensive ground attack which averaged better than 247 yards per game last year. Johnson averaged more than 119 yards per game last year, and finished the 1990 season with 1,079 yards. Hart's going to have to contain him in the backfield to stop Hale Center on offense. Other returning starters include tight end J. Pete Laney, wingback Dewight Johnson and fullback James Cruz.

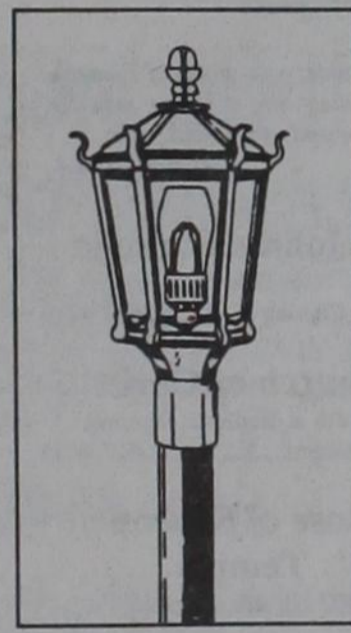

Carolyn's Corner

Membership in the 4-H program, Texas' largest youth organization, has surged to nearly one-half of a million this year.

Enrollment in the 4-H Youth and Development program increased from more than 402,400 to over 446,000 — a 10% gain since September 1990. This follows a 30% jump from the previous year.

The 199 census figures indicate that Texas has a little more than four million young people, ages 5 to 19, who are eligible for 4-H. The recent increase means that 4-H is reaching 11%—one out of every 10—of youths in the state.

When you add the 60,000-plus 4-H adult volunteers to the total of 446,000 youth enrollment, we are impacting one-half of a million people a year.

People are recognizing that youth in general are in a crisis situation, and they're making more efforts to get their children involved in the local programs.

We have started the Texas 4-H Clover Kids program, which is designed for children in kindergarten through second grade. So much of our entire body of knowledge as adults actually is gained from infancy to about eight years of age. That's why this audience is so important.

Already, 13% of the 4-H youths are Clover Kids, although the program has only been started in about

50 counties and Castro County is one of them, said Carolyn Osborn, county Extension agent.

Young people enroll in 4-H by joining a community or school-based 4-H club, by participating in short-term, special-interest group or by enrolling in a 4-H school curriculum enrichment project.

Many people perceive 4-H as being just agriculture or just home economics, but 4-H goes far beyond that.

Whether individuals participate in agriculture, aerospace or entomology projects, they learn to make decisions, set goals, cope with setbacks and improve communication and leadership.

Statistics show that 4-H membership appeals to a wide range of youths including five-year-olds to teens and to youths in rural and urban and all ethnic groups.

The Extension 4-H and Youth Development program is reaching a significant number of children in the state.

We work with many local people who are involved in all type of activities. They partner with 4-H to reach these young people with positive programs.

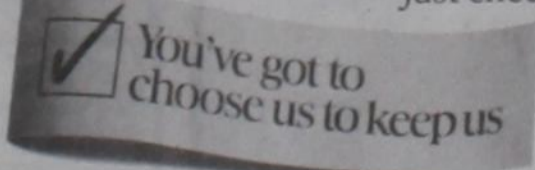

WIFE takes stand on ballot issues

Monday, the local WIFE chapter discussed the 13 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, which will be listed on the ballot in Tuesday's election.

Pros and cons of each issue were explained and discussed, and the group announced a stand on each issue, except for Proposition 11, concerning the establishment of a state lottery.

"This is a moral and economic issue, and although we discussed the pros and cons, we did not reach a conclusion," a group spokesperson said.

The chapter's opinions on the other issues are listed below by ballot proposition number.

Proposition 1: We are for this amendment. We feel this is necessary, particularly in smaller home-rule cities like Dimmitt. Such cities should be able to amend their charters. Also, no cost to the state is involved in approving this amendment.

Proposition 2: No. This would create another state debt, and we feel that these turnpikes, tollroads and toll bridges should be self-supporting.

Proposition 3: No. Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro is doing a good job now with the Veterans' Land Board, and we don't need risky investments.

Proposition 4: No. We don't know the effect on the reforms until the existing bond funds are fully spent. If this bond system passes, Texas will be paying one billion per year on operating costs and debt service for the prison system alone.

Proposition 5: Yes, we feel this would be advantageous to Dimmitt.

Proposition 6: No. It seems unnecessary to pass a Constitutional amendment creating another state agency, especially one charged with overseeing ethics. Furthermore, it seems dangerous to give a commission power over legislative pay.

Proposition 7: No. Our opinion is that investment managers should not be allowed to take risks with

teachers' retirement funds and state employees' retirement funds.

Proposition 8: We favor this amendment, which requires complete disclosure by requiring that propositions describe amount, purpose, and repayment sources.

Proposition 9: We are for this amendment, which would aid the individuals who purchased the land in good faith and paid taxes on the land for many years.

Proposition 10: Yes, we are for this amendment. Water is our most vital asset, and this amendment encourages water conservation and should help negate pollution.

Proposition 11: No conclusion.

Proposition 12: No. We oppose this amendment. There has already been one bond designed to help the "colonias" and we should allow sufficient time before another bond is added to it. We also feel that this issue should be dealt with at a local level, rather than at the state level.

Proposition 13: Yes, we agree with this amendment. We feel that with increasing costs of higher education, and financial aid to students decreasing, it is imperative that the state support programs that assist students in paying for an education.
