Council to discuss energy pact, hear economic development info

The Big Spring City Council will have a number of routine items before it when it meets Tuesday evening, including final approval of a franchise agreement with Atmos Energy Corporation.

The council approved first reading of the agreement during its Oct. 9 meeting on a unanimous

The agreement — which expires at the end of October - is for 10 years and will net the city \$170,000 annually, according to City Finance Director Peggy Walker. The franchise agreement comes

on the heels of months of negotiations between the energy giant and several West Texas cities served by the company regarding a request for rate increases. According to Walker, the matter recently ended up before the Texas Railroad Commissioner, a last stop for disputes between energy providers and municipalities.

"In this case there were actually three factors because there was a group of cities, which Big Spring was part of, the energy company

and then Lubbock and Amarillo. They (Lubbock and Amarillo) were a separate entity within these negotiations because they had already established rates for their citizens, which were considerably lower than anyone else in West Texas. They fought tooth and nail to maintain those low rates. It was a very difficult process. I don't know how many meetings we had, conference calls, e-mails and communications back and forth."

According to Walker, Atmos

Shootings rock the city

Gunfire erupted Sunday morning in what appears to be two unrelated altercations that sent a couple of people to an area hospital.

The two were among three people injured in a drive by shooting about 2 a.m. in the 1400 block of Mesa.

Ines Jesus Gonzales, 25, of Big Spring suffered a bullet wound to his right forearm and was airlifted to Lubbock. David Garza Jr., 27, of Big Spring suffered a bullet wound to his left lower leg and another to his buttocks. He was also airlifted to a Lubbock hospital.


A third victim, Abilene Mojica, 30, also of Big Spring, refused treatment after being

Former mayor McEwen dies

Russ McEwen, longtime businessman and former councilman and mayor, died Sunday at his home. He was 63 years old.

A lifelong resident and Big Spring High School graduate, McEwen formed the Russ McEwen Agency in 1975. He ser-



ved as a city councilman from 1981 until 1988 and as mayor from 2000 until 2010. Under his leadership, the community expanded the youth sports complex on Interstate 20, made numerous downtown renovations and built the water park in Comanche Trail Park

He also worked with youth, coaching gymnastics teams to two national championships and numerous individuals to top 10 finishes. In 2011, McEwen was chosen at the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce Man of the Year.

He is survived by his wife, three children and three grandchildren. His services are being handled by Nalley-

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Schools take their case to court again

AUSTIN, Texas — A closely

watched fight over how Texas funds its public schools heads to court Monday, where rich schools, poor schools and charter schools will try to convince a judge to declare the system unconstitutional.

The trial, the sixth legal battle of its kind since 1984, comes nearly 18 months after Texas lawmakers cut \$5.4 bil-

lion from public schools. Lawyers say that simply re-

storing funding to levels prior to the 2011 legislative session won't be enough to fix a fundamentally flawed system. They point out the cuts have come even as the state requires schools to prepare stumore costly to educate. But they also concede that simply putting the money

dents for standardized tests that are getting more-difficult — and amid a statewide boom in the number of low-income students who districts say are

"That's not all it's about,

Austin courtroom of Texas District Judge John Dietz and is expected to last into January. It involves six lawsuits filed since last October on behalf of about two-thirds of Texas school districts, which in turn educate around 75 percent of the state's roughly 5 million students. Districts both in rich and

poor parts of the state are on the same side of the case. Texas' funding system relies heavily on property taxes and a "Robin Hood" scheme where districts with high property values or abundant tax revenue from oil or natural gas resources turn over part of the money they raise to poorer districts.

Many "property wealthy" districts say that while they are in better shape than their counterparts,





was requesting a rate increase estimated at \$11.6 million. Despite the breakdown in negotiations — which ultimately led to the matter going before the Texas Railroad Commission an agreement has been reached.

"We have reached a negotiation," Walker said. "Atmos did not get the amount of money they were requesting and we

agreed on a much lower amount. All of that rate increase, that additional revenue, will be absorbed by the residents of Lubbock and Amarillo. They brought that right up to the agreement they presented to the Railroad Commission and they presented testimony and pleadings at the commission. However, it was a unanimous agreement that has been approved.

"Our citizens basically will see no increase with some slight varia-

tions based on service charges. Base rates will go up, which was approved by the Railroad Commission, however, the commodity charge has gone down considerably. When you add those two together, your gas bill should be fairly identical to what it's been in the past."

Walker said approval of the franchise agreement with Atmos will not cause a change in rates for Big Spring customers.

"The city has the op-

tion to come back at a specific interval and renegotiate the franchise fee," Walker said. "However, Atmos has made it clear that any increase in the franchise fee will be passed on to the customers, which are the citizens of Big Spring."

system still starves them of funding since local voters who would otherwise support property tax increases to bolster funding for their schools refuse to do so, knowing that most of the money would be sent somewhere else. Also suing are charter

schools, who want state funding for their facilities, and a small number of parents. All argue that the system defies the Texas

Constitution, which promises "a general diffusion of knowledge" by an "efficient system of public free schools." Texas Attorney Gen-

eral Greg Abbott's office places the blame on individual districts. "Given the fact that

the public education system is founded on local control, success or failure of a school district is necessarily linked to the school district's own leadership, polices and operations,' the attorney general's office said in a pretrial brief. "If a local school district fails to provide

its students a general diffusion of knowledge, such a result, while unacceptable, does not render the entire public school system unsuitable."

Whatever Dietz decides is likely to be appealed to the state Supreme Court. If the courts rule against the state, it will be up to the Legislature to remake the system — but a high-

Obama and Romney seek foreign policy edge in final campaign debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Still neck-and-neck after all these months, Barack Obama and Mitt Romney head into their third and final debate with each man eager to project an aura of personal strength and leadership while raising doubts about the steadiness and foreign policy credentials of the

Each is aiming for a commanding performance Monday to settle the seesaw dynamics of the first two debates: Romney gave Obama an old-fashioned shellacking in the first round, and the chastened president rebounded in their second encounter.

The 90-minute faceoff at Lynn University in Boca Raton, Fla., offers the candidates their last opportunity to stand one-on-one before tens of millions of Americans and command their undivided attention before next month's election. Both candidates largely dropped out of sight and devoted their weekends to debate preparations, a sure sign of the high importance they attach to the event.

While the principals warm up for their evening debate in the battleground state of Florida, their running mates will be busy Monday seeking votes in two of the eight other states whose up-for-grabs electoral votes will determine the next president – Vice President Joe Biden in Ohio and Republican Rep. Paul Ryan in Colorado. Also still hotly contested: Iowa, New Hampshire, Nevada, North Carolina, Wisconsin and Virginia.

It fell to campaign surrogates on Sunday talk shows to frame the foreign policy matters that moderator Bob Schieffer will put before the candidates in a discussion sure to reflect "how dangerous the world is in which we live," as the CBS newsman put it. Iran's nuclear intentions, the bloody crackdown in Syria, economic angst in Europe, security concerns in Afghanistan, China's growing power all that and more are on the agenda.

Wisconsin gunman had history of abuse

BROOKFIELD, Wis. (AP) — A Wisconsin man accused of opening fire at the salon where his wife worked, killing three women and wounding four others, had a history of domestic abuse, with allegations that he had slashed his wife's tires a few weeks earlier, police said.

Radcliffe Franklin Haughton damaged his wife's tires on Oct. 4, Brookfield police said. She sought court protection four days later, and a judge granted a four-year restraining order on Thursday. As part of the order, Haughton was prohibited from owning a firearm.

Brookfield Police Chief Dan Tushaus declined to elaborate on the circumstances of whether Haughton had surrendered any weapons prior to Sunday's salon rampage. Tushaus also said he wasn't immediately aware of a motive.

"I can tell you we're not seeking additional suspects," he said at a news conference Sunday evening. "The community can feel safe."

The shootings set off a confusing, six-hour search for the gunman that locked down a nearby mall, a country club adjacent to the spa and the hospital where the survivors were taken. The search froze activity in a commercial area in Brookfield, a middle-to-upper class community west of Milwaukee, for much of the day. Ultimately, Haughton was found dead in the spa after killing himself.

Overnight clashes in Lebanon leave 2 dead, officials say

BEIRUT (AP) — Clashes in Beirut and other parts of Lebanon killed at least two people and left more than a dozen wounded overnight as fears grow that Syria's civil war is spilling over into its smaller neighbor, security officials and state-run media said Monday.

The latest spasms of violence came amid rising tension between Lebanese groups that support and oppose the regime of Syrian President Bashar Assad and in the wake of the assassination last week of a top anti-Syrian intelligence official in Leba-Most of Lebanon's Sunnis have backed Syria's

mainly Sunni rebels, while Lebanese Shiites tend to back Assad. The Syrian president, like many who dominate his regime, is a member of the Alawite sect, an offshoot of Shiite Islam. Lebanese Brig. Gen. Wissam al-Hassan, who was

killed in a car bomb in an east Beirut neighborhood on Friday, was a Sunni who challenged Syria and

His assassination has threatened to shatter Lebanon's fragile political balance. Many politicians have blamed Syria for the killing and angry protesters tried to storm the government palace after al-Hassan's funeral Sunday but were pushed back by troops who opened fire in the air and fired tear

NEW YORK (AP) — Abbie Hoffman sobbed that fateful night at the downtown Manhattan apartment of fellow activist Jerry Rubin. So did Rubin and Allen Ginsberg. John Lennon was drunk, and out of control, shouting "Up the Revolution!" in

mock celebration of a dream defeated.

It was November 1972 and George McGovern had just been whipped in a landslide by Richard Nix-

McGovern, who died Sunday at age 90, was the

earnest son of a minister, raised on a South Dakota farm. He wasn't a longhair and he wasn't charismatic, not a man you'd expect to win the loyalty of rock stars or win the heart of Hoffman, the Yippie prankster who just four years earlier had suggested a pig should run for president and said what America needed was nonstop sex in the streets. But the candidate's steady liberal principles, and

the timing of his run, made McGovern the first presidential nominee of a major political party to attract a broad and public following from the rebels who had come of age the decade before.

"He was the first candidate I voted for," says the activist and historian Todd Gitlin, who was in his late 20s at the time. "I think the support he got was a sign that the era of radical obstinacy was over."

Clintons visit Haiti to inaugurate controversial industrial park that seeks to develop north

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The Haitian government is hosting Hillary and Bill Clinton, a delegation of foreign investors and a crowd of celebrities Monday to showcase the marquee project of the U.S. aid effort since the 2010 earthquake. It's an industrial park, more than a hundred

miles from the slowly recovering quake zone. The Clintons and their allies hope the \$300 million facility will transform the northern part of this impoverished country by providing thousands of desperately needed jobs. Some Haitians have a sharply different view.

They say the Caracol Industrial Park does little more than replicate failed efforts from the past and contend it will benefit outsiders more than Haitians. They also worry it will harm some of the few pieces of undamaged environment that still exist in

The star turnout for the opening — Sean Penn, who has run his own aid effort in Haiti, actor Ben Stiller and supermodel Petra Nemacova are among those expected to participate — speaks to an eagerness to show concrete results in a country where progress is hard to find amid stalled reconstruction projects.

"It's really all-in on this project, and there's a high bar to deliver," said Laurent Dubois, a historian who teaches at Duke University and is author of "Haiti: The Aftershocks of History." "It really needs to deliver in a big way so that people will think, yeah, this was the right thing to do."

Fort Worth theater reopens after renovation

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Fort Worth's historic Ridglea Theater has reopened after being closed for more than two years for renovations.

The 62-year-old theater, which has been a movie house and a concert venue during its history, reopened Saturday. The theater, which features large lobby murals, will now be a multipurpose venue for movies, concerts and private events.

Jerry Shults paid an undisclosed amount in late 2010 to save the theater from the wrecking ball. Shults tells the Fort Worth Star-Telegram (http:// bit.ly/VquziM) that the outside neon has been redone, the roof is new and the theater is painted as it was in 1950. The balcony isn't yet complete but is back to its full size after having been split in two during the late 1980s to form two upstairs theaters.

Body of missing boater found in North Texas lake

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Searchers have found the body of a 51-year-old boat captain a week after his 26-foot cabin cruiser capsized on a North

The man's found was found early Sunday morning. Twelve people had been on board when the boat was apparently hit by a wave on Oct. 14 on Eagle Mountain Lake, located just north of Fort Worth. Witnesses had seen the captain swimming back to the cruiser after it took on water.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram (http://bit.ly/ QBu5kk) reports that the Tarrant Regional Water District says the man's name has not been released pending notification of family members. The district's officers, joined by state game wardens, had been searching for the boater 12 hours a day since he went missing.



CHARLOTTE, N.C. — It's been awhile since the Dallas Cowboys relied this heavily on their de-

But that's exactly what coach Jason Garrett did in Dallas' 19-14 win over the Carolina Panthers on Sunday.

Faced with a third-and-4 at the Carolina 18 and the Cowboys leading by two points, Garrett elected to run the ball and kick a field goal rather than try to deliver a knockout punch with his offense. In so doing, he put his defense on the field with 53 seconds left to close out

They answered the call, stopping the Panthers at midfield.

Garrett said he made the decision to run the ball because he was confident his defense, ranked second in the league, could hold the Panthers.

"We trust our defense immensely," Garrett said. "Our defense is outstanding and they've played great all year long."

Critics of G.M. Ireland coming around with progression of Miami, QB Tannehill's play

DAVIE, Fla. — Watching a midweek practice, Miami Dolphins general manager Jeff Ireland is chatting with several other spectators when the subject turns to the presidential debate the previous night.

Ireland, a debate team member in high school, says he found the event engrossing but doesn't offer an evaluation of the participants. As with his own performance, he leaves the critiquing to others.

For the past several seasons, Ireland has been the No. 1 subject of disputation among Dolphins' fans, with many contending he's the primary culprit for the franchise's failings. The ongoing conversation takes place without his involvement, because he rarely speaks publicly, but a staunch defender of Ireland has come for-

ward this season: his team.

The Dolphins' steady improvement suggests Ireland — with considerable help from new coach Joe Philbin — may finally have things headed in the right direction. Miami is 3-3 and in a four-way tie for the AFC East lead, and following a bye this week, the Dolphins will take a two-game winning streak into their road game Oct. 28 against the New York Jets. "Kind of the fun part about

where we're at, to a certain degree, is we've got a big division road game," Philbin said. "We've never had one before."

He didn't really mean the Dolphins have never had one before; it just seems that way. They finished below .500 each of the past three years, a new low for a franchise that hasn't won a playoff game since 2000 and hasn't

reached the Super Bowl since 1984.

The recent results are reflected

in shrinking attendance. Instead of buying tickets, fans vent about Ireland, a Bill Parcells protege in his fifth year with Miami.

At last season's finale, a small plane tugged a banner calling for the GM to be fired. Then, more than two dozen frustrated fans gathered outside the Dolphins' complex one day last offseason to protest the way the team was being run, with some holding signs that read "FIRELAND."

A rogue edit to Ireland's Wikipedia entry briefly appeared describing him as "the most incompetent human being in the history of existence."

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



Houston's offense couldn't do anything early. It was OK though as the defense got the Texans on the board. Connor Barwin took down Flacco in the end zone for his first sack of the season and a safety to make it 3-2 in the first quarter.
