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Aquatic Center to be named in McEwen's honor

The Big Spring City Council voted unanimously to rename the Big Spring Aquatic

Center the Russ

McEwen Aquatic Center in honor of the former mayor during a special meeting held Saturday afternoon. The motion to

McEwen rename the facility was made by District 4

Councilman Bobby McDon-Former mayor McEwen,

who passed away at his

home Oct. 21, heavily supported the aquatic center project, which was opened to the public last summer.

McEwen served on the Big Spring City Council from 1981 until 1988 and as mayor from 2000 until 2010. McEwen is also credited with helping retain the Veterans Affairs hospital in Big Spring after it was targeted for closing or moving by the federal government and was named 2011 Man of the Year by the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce.

Gasoline prices take a 2.6 cent dip over past week

Special to the Herald

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 2.6 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.14/g

This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.2 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.43/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 1.2 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 30.5

cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 26.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 6.5 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"With Thanksgiving just days away, Americans will be hitting major thoroughfares en masse. While gasoline prices have dropped in the last month and a half, the national average will still come close to breaking a record- the highest ever national average for

Thanksgiving can mean only one thing in the Crossroads area ... it's turkey

While the holiday normally means a delicious, home cooked bird, Big Spring Fire Department Chief Craig Ferguson said the caution when deep frying turkeys is an absolute must to keep the holiday from taking a turn for the worse. "With Thanksgiving and

the holiday season here, people will be ready to eat, and deep fried turkey has become

a Thanksgiving favorite here in Big Spring," Ferguson said. "The Big Spring Fire department wants to make sure vou cook safely for the entire family."

Ferguson said one of the most important things area residents can do to avert danger is make sure they have the right cooking equipment and are using it in the correct

"Many units easily tip over, spilling the hot oil from the cooking pot. Also, if the cooking pot is overfilled with oil, the oil may spill out of the unit when the turkey is placed in it. Oil may hit the burner or flames, causing a fire to engulf the entire unit. If possible, wear safety goggles to protect your eyes from

oil splatter.

"Partially frozen turkeys placed into the fryer can cause a spillover effect, as well. Make sure the turkey is completely thawed and be careful with marinades.

Ferguson said the National

Turkey Federation (NTF) recommends thawing the turkey in the refrigerator approximately 24 hours for every five

pounds in weight. "Oil and water do not mix and water causes oil to spill over, causing a fire or even an explosion hazard. With no thermostat controls, the units also have the potential to overheat the oil to the point of combustion. Also, the lid and handles on the sides of the cooking pot get dangerously hot, posing severe burn

Ferguson said turkey fryers should always be used outdoors and at a safe distance from buildings and other flammable materials.





Nearly 3.3M Texans expected on road for holiday

IRVING, Texas (AP) — A travel group has predicted nearly 3.3 million Texans will hit the road for the Thanksgiving holiday period.

AAA Texas on Monday estimated the number of Texans traveling this holiday week will increase 1.6 percent compared to last year. Thanksgiving is Thursday. The association de-

fines the holiday travel period as round trips of 50 miles or more from Wednesday through Sunday. AAA Texas spokeswoman Rhonda Wilson says

the predicted increase in holiday travel comes as people feel more confident this year about the econ-

The travel group's recent survey found that most Texas will be driving to their holiday destinations. Half of all travelers intend to shop during the holiday period, especially the Friday after Thanksgiving which is traditionally the busiest shopping day of the year.

HOUSTON (AP) — Attorneys will make their final arguments to jurors in Houston in the trial of a Texas woman convicted of murder after a fire at her home day care killed four children.

The Harris County jury is scheduled to hear those arguments Monday in a state district court. Those jurors could sentence Jessica Tata to five years to life in prison. Tata was convicted on Tuesday of felony murder in the death of 16-month-old Elias

Son charged after Texas father, 63, fatally shot

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities are trying to determine a motive in a Houston-area shooting that left a 63-year-old man dead and his son charged with murder.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office says Dale Lee Baker died Sunday at a hospital several hours after being shot in the head while at home. Jail records show 41-year-old Cory Dale Baker

was being held Monday on \$50,000 bond. Online jail records did not list an attorney for the son, who was arrested shortly after the shooting around 11 a.m. Sunday. The sheriff's office says the suspect's mother

called 911 to say the couple's son had shot his fa-

Pilot dies after plane hits East Texas hangar

JACKSONVILLE, Texas (AP) — Investigators say a 60-year-old novice pilot has died after her small plane crashed into a hangar at an East Texas

The Department of Public Safety says Debra Birch was alone in the plane during the crash around 5 p.m. Sunday at Cherokee County Airport near Jacksonville. Birch was transported to a Jacksonville hospital where she died Sunday night.

Trooper Tyson Metzig says the Jacksonville woman was doing practice takeoffs and landings in a single-engine plane. Richard Birch says his wife was on her third solo flight. Parts of the plane ended up stuck atop the hangar.

Jacksonville is 110 miles southeast of Dallas.

TSA puppy breeding in San Antonio to close

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Transportation Security Administration has announced plans to shut down its South Texas facility for breeding and development of bomb-sniffing dogs.

The Canine Breeding and Development Center at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland in San Antonio will close early next year in a budget-saving move.

The San Antonio Express-News reported Sunday that center supporters are appealing to Congress for further review.

Kimberley Thompson with the Federal Air Marshal Service says TSA dogs will be purchased through existing contracts and other sources, including the Department of Defense. DOD breeds military dogs at Lackland. The center, with an annual budget of about \$400,000, stopped breeding dogs last April.

Thompson said Friday that TSA dogs purchased from other sources will still train at Lackland.

Dyess airman accused of not reporting child abuse

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — An airman at Dyess Air Force Base is set to appear at a military hearing related to the case of an Abilene toddler who died from dehydration and malnutrition. Senior Airman Christopher Perez is charged with

child endangerment, failure to report child abuse

and adultery. Perez allegedly was dating the toddler's mother, Tiffany Klapheke, who claims she neglected her children because she was distraught over her husband's military deployment. Her 22-month-old daughter died in August after being found unresponsive at their home at Dyess.

The preliminary autopsy report says the toddler had chemical burns from human waste. Klapheke, a civilian, is charged with three counts

of injury to a child. Evidence will be presented at the Article 32 hear-

ing to determine if Perez should go to trial.

Parade where vets killed used route for 3 years

MIDLAND, (AP) — Organizers of a parade in West Texas in which four U.S. military veterans were killed when a train plowed into a truck had been using the same route for three years, investigators said Sunday.

National Transpor-Safety Board tation spokesman Mark Rosekind also announced that oilfield services company Smith Industries was the owner of the truck that served as the float the veterans were on during Thursday's parade in Midland.

Rosekind said the company was cooperating with investigators, who expect to interview the driver on Monday. The NTSB declined to release the driver's name, and Rosekind said investigators don't know if the driver worked for Smith Industries.

Rick B. Smith, Smith Industries' CEO and president, did not immediately respond to phone calls or emails seeking comment.

Investigators have said the truck began crossing the train tracks even though warning bells were sounding and lights were flashing.

and the arms go down, the veterans' service. but before they are fully down, the train is already at the intersection," said Mark Thomas, who lives blocks from the track and says he crosses it daily.

"These signal times unacceptable," Thomas added.

According the NTSB, the warning system was activated 20 seconds before the accident, and the guardrail began to come down seven seconds after that. Everything functioned properly, Rosekind said, but investigators will have to check to make sure the signal timing met the requirements for that particular crossing.

The truck was the second of two parade floats filled with wounded war veterans. The first float had already cleared the tracks when the accident happened. Four veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan were killed and 16 more people were injured.

The parade was organized by a group called Show of Support-Hunt for Heroes and has been an annual event in Mid-

Midland is in Texas' oil-rich Permian basin, a region that has experienced a significant oil boom in recent years.

According to its web-Midland-based Smith Industries sells and manufactures oilfield service equipment. The website says the company provides steel and fiberglass tanks, separators, ladders, walkways and other equipment. The company has been in operation since 2000.

Smith Industries has a large facility and warehouse about five miles from the city. On Sun-

day, the business was closed. An American and Texas flag flew at half-mast and blue ribbons were tied around columns in a small parking lot. Large tanks. pipes, heavy machinery and trucks were scattered behind the gates.

Rosekind said the NTSB will conduct a sight test, probably Tuesday, to try to determine what the train engineer could see leading up to the crash. He said Smith Industries would likely provide a truck for the test.

According to the NTSB, the train sounded its horn nine seconds before the crash. The guardrail hit the truck, and then the engineer

meeting, the council canvassed the results of the Nov. 6 election, which included a proposition to make radical changes to the city's economic development corporation.

The proposition — which was championed by Mayor Tommy Duncan and received stiff opposition from local economic development officials — called for the abolishment of the existing Type A economic development corporation and to create a new, Type B agency.

The proposition failed, receiving 3,257 ballots against (61.34 percent) and 2,053 votes in its favor (38.66 percent).

"That means never use a turkey fryer in a garage or on a wooden deck," Ferguson said. "Make sure the fryers are used on a flat surface to reduce accidental tipping, as well. Never leave the fryer unattended and you should never let children or pets near the fryer, even if it is not in use. The oil inside the cooking pot can remain dangerously hot for hours after use."

"Keep an all-purpose fire extinguisher nearby," he said. "Never use water to extinguish a grease or oil fire. If the fire is manageable, use your all-purpose fire extinguisher. If the fire increases, immediately call the fire department for help. Always follow the manufacture directions and safety recommendations."

According to Ferguson, a bit of prevention can go a long way for preventing turkey-fueled accident this holiday.

"Try not to get into a situation where you're rushed and trying to make up time. We make a lot of mistakes we wouldn't, otherwise, when we're in a hurry," he said. "Make sure you plan ahead and have all your necessary materials together before you even turn the cooker on. We want everyone in the Crossroads area to have a fantastic Thanksgiving holiday."

Big Spring Fire Department recipe for deep fried turkey

Ingredients

- 1 (10-pound) turkey
- 2 tablespoons house seasoning, rec-
- 2 tablespoons of your favorite dry
- 3 to 5 gallons peanut oil

Cook's Note: To measure the amount of oil needed to fry the turkey, place turkey in fryer, add water to top of turkey, remove the turkey and the water line will indicate how much oil will be needed to fry your turkey. Having too much oil can cause a fire. The pot should not be more than 3/4 full or the oil could overflow when the turkey is added.

Directions

Wash bird inside and out, and allow to drain. Rub turkey all over with house seasoning (recipe below). Coat turkey with dry rub. Allow the bird to sit until it reaches room tempera-

Heat peanut oil in a turkey fryer or a very, very large stockpot to 350 degrees F. Lower turkey into hot oil very carefully, making sure it is fully submerged. Fry turkey for 3 minutes per pound plus 5 minutes per bird. Remove turkey from oil and drain on paper towels. Serve with favorite Thanksgiving sides and salads.

House Seasoning:

1 cup salt

1/4 cup black pepper 1/4 cup garlic powder

Mix ingredients together and store in an airtight container for up to 6 months.

Dry Rub Recipe

This recipe calls for a lot of bay leaves. It's actually about 1/3 cup, so if you have crushed bay leaves you can use that.

The real secret to fried turkey is to

get the rub well on the surface of the turkey before it hits the oil.

Ingredients:

- 25 medium whole bay leaves
- 3 tablespoons hot Creole seasoning 3 teaspoons dried thyme
- 3 teaspoons dried oregano
- 2 teaspoons garlic powder 1 1/2 teaspoons black peppercorns

Preparation:

In a spice grinder, grind the bay leaves into a fine powder. Place in small bowl. Grind thyme, oregano, peppercorns similarly. Add all ingredients to bowl and mix together. Divide into three equal parts. Rub one part on the inside of turkey. Rub the second third under the skin around the breasts. And rub the last portion over the outside of the turkey.

Cowboys beat Browns in wild OT finish

ARLINGTON, Texas – Tony Romo and Dallas coach Jason Garrett spend a lot of time talking about protecting the ball when chaos surrounds the Cowboys quarterback.

They have another good teaching point from Sunday's 23-20 overtime win against Cleveland.

Just when it looked like Romo would persevere through a careerhigh seven sacks to lead a Cowbovs comeback, he lost a critical fumble that sparked a wild finish and sent Dallas scrambling to find a way to win.

The Cowboys ended up extending the Browns' road losing streak to 12 games when Dan Bailey kicked a 38yard field goal with 6:07 left in the first overtime

game at Cowboys Stadium. Dallas gave up the lead after Romo's miscue, but Bailey forced the extra period on a tying kick with 2 seconds left in regulation.

"Tony didn't protect the ball the way he needed to," Garrett said. "Obviously a big play in the game, one that we had to overcome both the rest of those six minutes of regulation and obviously through overtime."

Dallas (5-5) appeared ready to lock up consecutive wins for the first time this season when Romo put the Cowboys up 17-13 in the fourth quarter on a 28-yard scoring pass to Dez Bryant, who had a careerhigh 145 yards receiving. Anthony Spencer sacked Browns rookie Brandon Weeden on

Schaub rallies Texans past Jags

HOUSTON — For weeks Andre Johnson has been saying he was finally feeling like himself again after last year's injury plagued season.

He hopes his careerbest 273-yard performance, including a 48-yard game-winning touchdown reception, in Houston's 43-37 overtime win over Jacksonville on Sunday proves his point.

"Maybe you guys will believe me after that," Johnson said with a laugh.

Johnson's 273 yards receiving on a careerhigh 14 receptions were the most in the NFL since 2000.

Matt Schaub threw for 527 yards and careerhigh five scores as the Texans rallied from a 14-point fourth quarter deficit for the victory.

Schaub said he didn't have to say anything to the team before the game-winning drive.

"We knew what we had to get done," the quarterback said.

Schaub's yards passing are tied for the second most in NFL history. Warren Moon also threw for 527 yards for the Houston Oilers in December 1990 against Kansas City. Norm Van Brocklin holds the record with 554 for the Rams in 1951.

"Tremendous play by our quarterback, and probably as good a day as I've ever seen by a wide receiver," Houston coach Gary Kubiak said. "As a matter of fact, I know it is."

Cup 40 years after his first stock car race, beating five-time champion Jimmie Johnson of mighty Hendrick Motorsports while delivering the crown that fills a glaring hole on Penske's otherwise sterling

racing resume. Penske is considered the gold standard of open-wheel racing — he has 15 Indianapolis 500 wins — and his empire makes him one of the most successful businessmen in America. But until Sunday night Homestead-Miami Speedway, his NASCAR program was never more than average.

"Personally, I feel amazing that I've been able to achieve this in racing," Penske said. "I think it took guts for me to stay in the sport. We could have thought, 'Well, we won the Indy 500 15 times and we're a big deal.' But I'll tell you one thing ... I think I just woke up here tonight, and it's a big thrill."

As always, Penske credited the entire pro-

gram. But the program re-

At 28, he's the eighth youngest champion in NASCAR history and proud he doesn't have a date for the Nov. 30 champions

banquet in Las Vegas. "I've always wanted to date a celebrity," said Keselowski, "I'm just throwing that out there. That would be really cool, don't you think?"

Penske could only shake his head in bewilderment.

"Maybe I am conservative, but I like to have a little fun, too," Penske said. "And I think when you've won the NA-SCAR championship, the driver, you can kind of give him a little wider path, and he's certainly taken it side to side. I think it's all good."

Keselowski might not have seemed like Penske material three years ago, but he's a corner-

stone now.

He was a developmental driver for Hendrick Motorsports in 2008 when he went to see Penske, determined that he could be the driver to bring "The Captain" a coveted Cup championship. He wiggled free from his contract a year later, and had a secondtier Nationwide championship — and a closet full of starched white Penske shirts — to show

for his convictions. Now, three years into the plan, he and Penske have that Cup championship and a connection no one saw coming.

"Always, throughout my whole life I've been told I'm not big enough, not fast enough, not strong enough and I don't have what it takes," Keselowski said from the championship stage. "I've used that as a chip on my shoulder to carry me through my whole career. It took until this year for me to realize that that was right, man, they were right.

"I'm not big enough, fast enough, strong enough. No person is. Only a team can do that."

NEW YORK (AP) — Notre Dame is a victory away from playing for the BCS title. Alabama and Georgia each need two, and could have to go through each other.

A day after Oregon and Kansas State lost to give up control of the BCS race, the Fighting Irish (.9973) moved into first place in the standings for the first time.

"Now we don't have to answer questions about style points or politics," Notre Dame coach Brian Kelly said. "Now we have a chance to play for the national championship this week."

Notre Dame (11-0), ranked No. 1 in both polls and by the computer ratings, needs only to beat slumping rival Southern California on Saturday in Los Angeles to earn its first trip to the BCS title

Alabama (.9333) and Georgia (.8763) also have rivalry games Saturday. The Crimson Tide hosts Auburn and the Bulldogs play Georgia Tech at home.

If the favorites win, the Southeastern Conference championship game will be a national semifinal of sorts, with the winner advancing to the BCS title

If form does not hold, and there are more upsets such as the ones that took out Oregon and Kansas State on Saturday night, there are a handful of teams that could be in the mix.

Florida (10-1) is in fourth heading into a huge game at 10th-place Florida State. The Seminoles (10-1) also will have an ACC title game to play.

Dallas won for the first time in six games when Romo is sacked at least five times. Despite the constant pressure, he finished 35 of 50 for 313 yards with the touchdown to Bryant.

"Tony did a really good job of playing with poise," Garrett said. "When you play quarterback and you have a lot of negative plays ... it's easy to kind of get out of yourself and do some things you shouldn't be doing."

Referee Ed Hochuli carried on a running commentary in explaining replays and other rulings on the huge video board, and the most critical came in overtime when the officials ruled an incompletion on a throw that Miles Austin dropped.

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
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
