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U.S. presses NATO to honor Afghanistan committments

BRUSSELS — The Obama administration pressed its European allies on Wednesday to follow through on their pledges to Afghanistan's security after most international troops withdraw in 2014, fearful of being left with the check in an era of austerity budgets and defense cutbacks. Donors pledged \$4.1 billion a year

to support Afghan forces from 2015 to 2017 at a May summit in Chicago firming up a key plank of the U.S. strategy to leave behind a secure Afghanistan after battling insurgents for more than a decade. But many governments have yet to come through with the cash. Speaking at NATO headquarters,

U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton told allies it is "crucial on their commitments, and for those who haven't yet committed any funding to do so." To make her point, she invoked Afghanistan's troubled history of chasing out the Soviet Union in the 1980s only to descend into civil war and the oppression of an extremist Taliban government. "All of us here have an interest in

ensuring this region does not once again become a safe haven for international terrorists," Clinton said. "We cannot afford to repeat the mistakes of 1989 and just disengage. That's why we made an enduring commitment, and it's why we have to follow through on it — today, tomorrow and for years to come." For the United States, supporting



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

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

You may not agree with anything I've said, but I column as I



Save a life; deport unlicensed driver

n Nov. 16, 2010, an unlicensed driver named Roberto Galo took a left turn at Harrison and 16th streets and hit motorcyclist Drew Rosenberg. After Galo backed over Rosenberg's body,

the law-school student died. A jury convicted Galo for manslaughter and driving without a license. After serving 43 days in jail, he was released on home detention.


Don Rosenberg of Westlake Village in Los Angeles County — blames San Francisco politics for his son's

so eager to protect illegal immigrants who cannot obtain California drivers' licenses that in 2009, then-Mayor Gavin Newsom announced that the city no longer would impound the cars of unlicensed drivers automatically. In 2008, the AAA Foundation for Public Safety reported that 29 percent of fatal car crashes in California involved a driver without a valid license. No worries, San Francisco sent a message to folks who haven't



Accidents happen, but Rosenberg doesn't see this crash as an accident — Galo, after all, backed over Rosenberg's son.

You can't blame California's law that denies driver's licenses to illegal immigrants. As a legal immigrant given temporary protective status, Galo was eligible for a driver's license. But he didn't have one, and he drove anyway. That decision demonstrated a reckless disregard for the safety of others and disrespect for the law.

Repeated disrespect. Five months earlier, police stopped Galo for driving the wrong way on a one-way street and driving without a license. He paid a \$220 fine. Then-Police Chief George Gascon — now the district attorney — supported the Newsom plan. He even told me at the time that it would help legal residents who couldn't afford to get a license or driver training. Does he still support it? No answer from his office.

The Public Defender's Office, which represented Galo, did not wish to discuss the case.

The next question is whether Galo, having been convicted of two misdemeanors, can remain in the United States legally. While immigration officials have not responded to my queries, aides to Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif, told me that Immigration

and Customs Enforcement (ICE) told them Galo was guilty of only one crime of moral turpitude -

which suggests that he can stay. Jessica Vaughan of the proenforcement Center for Immigration Studies told me, "What makes this particular case disconcerting is that authorities seemed willing to overlook this serious violation in order to pro tect someone from deportation who has killed someone." Will Washington follow San Francisco's example?

If so, thank groups like the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights of Los Angeles who have sold the idea that driving without a license is not a big deal. Spokesman Jorge-Mario Cabrera told me, "We don't believe that most traffic offenses should be deportable.'

As Rosenberg noted, San Francisco's message to unlicensed drivers is that they can drive, kill somebody and serve only 43 days in jail. The Obama adminis tration, however, could send the message that when immigrants seeking permanent legal status flout the law and drive without a license, and they kill somebody, they will be deported.

The only reason not to send that message: You care more about people who break the law than the law-abiding general public.

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

Home observatories make star-gazing easier

interest in astronomy, visitors to Chris Krstanovic's home want to look through his telescope.

Krstanovic recently built an observatory at his house in Windham, N.H. Before he added the domed structure, he didn't star-gaze as often as he liked because of the time and effort involved in setting up his telescopes and other equipment.

"It takes you two hours to set up plus two hours to take down. It takes away from your observing time," said the business owner, who developed an interest in astronomy as a kid. "Being out there in the open sky, it's kind of cold. It's miserable."

Now, he can easily search the sky for exoplanets — planets outside the solar system — anytime he wants to. And share his hobby with guests.

"Everybody comes to our house wants to go in there and look," he said. "Many of my neighbors have young kids. This opens up a whole new field for them. It is a very good way to get young people interested in science."

A growing number of amateur astronomers around the country are installing home observatories to indulge their passion for exploring the night sky, said John Goss of Roanoke, Va., vice president of The Astronomical League, which represents more than 200 astronomical societies.

The cost of equipment has decreased dramatically over the last 20 years, he said. Advances in technology also mean amateurs can buy cameras and viewing equipment once limited to professional observatories. Today, amateurs can buy a telescope and accessory equipment

that allows a more detailed look at deep space for about \$4,000. A similar set-up might have cost \$20,000 two decades ago and wouldn't have been as effective.

Aside from telescopes and cameras, a home observatory must have a roof that opens or retracts, and a stable mount for the telescope. Do-it-vourselfers often construct observatories out of shed-type structures designed so the roof rolls off the building onto support beams. Others buy prefabricated domes and mount them on their homes or other small buildings. It helps to live far from the city lights.

You can set up a home observatory for about \$20,000, said Suzy Gurton, education manager at the Astronomical Society of the Pacific, in San Francisco.

She used to see such a project "as the exception. Now, I'd compare it to buying a new car."

And the equipment for viewing and photographing the sky has advanced so much that amateurs, too, are regularly "contributing to science," she said.

"That's the amazing part. The equipment to do scientific observations has become affordable," she said.

Volunteers helped astronomers at Yale University discover a series of small galaxies that could offer insights on how stars are formed. An amateur in Australia is credited with alerting NASA to a spot on Jupiter that scienwhen a comet or meteor crashed into the planet. Current equipment also allows amateurs to closely study supernovas and offer data on the life cycle of stars.

Krstanovic with professional astronomers to help measure star spots, which can determine how fast a star rotates.

"You now can have something that if you know how to use it and if you have the right camera, you can do some real science," he said.

He completed his observatory, a 10-by-10-foot structure built on a deck behind his house, about four months ago. Winter viewing is best and he is looking forward to using the new setup in the coming months.

already watches the sky remotely from a computer in his house because the observatory is unheated. Telescopes function best when they are the same temperature as the air.

Hobbyists often opt for a home observatory when they acquire so much equipment that it's cumbersome to set it

tists believe occurred up and take it down, said Jerry Smith, owner of Technical Innovations, a Gaithersburg, Md., company that produces observatory domes for amateurs and professionals. For \$20,000, he said, an amateur can create a setup that would have cost about \$200,000 a decade ago.

Many of Smith's customers are retirees who have more time to pursue their interest in astronomy. Some clients design their retirement homes to include observatories, and he cites communities in Arizona, Georgia and New Mexico that are intended for amateur astronomers. The developments are in rural areas and have restrictions on outdoor lighting to make star gazing easier.

Scott Jamieson doesn't live in a dedicated astronomy community but he was thinking about his observatory when he chose the location of his home in Eagle, Wis. The recent retiree heads out to the observatory in his backyard about once a week to photograph galaxies and star clusters.

But this didn't stop Sylvia from playing in the expert game, where, of course, she was outclassed. Her lack of familiarity with the finer points of the game produced countless disasters, but at the same time, this ignorance occasionally resulted in a triumph that would become a cause celebre among the membership. **Take today's deal,** which occurred

shortly after Sylvia learned to finesse. This newly found device was a revelation to her, and she relished each and every opportunity to use it with a zest that scared her partners half to death.

West led the queen of clubs against Sylvia's four-spade contract. Sylvia won with dummy's ace, returned a trump and finessed the jack! After this extraordinary play succeeded, Sylvia lost a heart, a diamond and a club to make four

East-West felt deeply aggrieved by the unusual first-round trump finesse, without which they believed Sylvia would inevitably have gone down one. Yet, strangely enough, later analysis proved that Sylvia's play was correct and the only way to assure the contract.

Had the finesse lost to the singleton or doubleton queen, the contract would still have been a certainty. The defense could cash a club and shift to a diamond, but declarer would win, cash a high trump and then play a heart to the queen and ace. South would later discard her diamond loser on the king of hearts, using the six of spades as an entry to dummy.

Fort Worth police major demoted after DWI arrest

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — An officer who was chief of staff to Fort Worth Police Chief Jeff Halstead has been demoted following his arrest on a driving while intoxicated charge.

Halstead says Maj. Paul Henderson has been demoted to captain and will return to work Saturday but with the community programs division. The police chief says Henderson will have administrative duties until the internal investigation is completed.

Henderson was off-duty when he was arrested last weekend in Parker County by a Texas trooper.

Henderson was placed on detached duty status following his arrest. He also faces a pay cut with the demotion announced Tuesday.

Troubled \$3B cancer agency meets amid new scrutiny

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Leaders of an embattled \$3 billion cancer-fighting agency in Texas are meeting for the first time since disclosing that a lucrative state grant was improperly awarded to a private company.

The Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas faces questions from top lawmakers after spending much of the year under a barrage of criticism. The agency's woes intensified when it was revealed that a Dallas biomedical company won \$11 million in taxpayer funds without having its proposal vetted by experts.

The agency's governing board meets Wednesday. Among the agenda items is a report from the compliance officer who uncovered the improper grant to Peloton Therapeutics.

Gov. Rick Perry and other key Republicans last week called on the agency to explain how and why Peloton's proposal was never reviewed.

New judge appointed in Fort Hood shooting case

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — The Army's highest legal branch appointed a new judge to preside over the case of the Fort Hood shooting suspect, indicating the court-martial is on track to move forward after lengthy delays.

U.S. Army Col. Tara Osborn was named Tuesday to head the case of Maj. Nidal Hasan, who faces the death penalty if convicted in the 2009 shootings that killed 13 and wounded more than two dozen on the Texas Army post.

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces on Monday ousted the previous judge, Col. Gregory Gross, saying he appeared biased against Hasan. The court also tossed out Gross' order to have Hasan's beard forcibly shaved before his courtmartial, though it didn't rule on whether the order violated his religious rights as he claimed.

While in custody this spring, Hasan started growing a beard that he says is an expression of his Islamic faith. Gross had sided with prosecutors who say the beard violates Army grooming standards and could confuse witnesses.

The ruling Monday by the military's highest court said the command, not a judge, is responsible for enforcing grooming standards, which means another judge isn't likely to order Hasan to shave, some military law experts said.

"This ruling will have a chilling effect on the

future judge because he or she ... will not pursue this beard issue any longer, and the appeals court still hasn't answered the key question of whether Hasan has to comply with military regulations and shave like every other military officer," said Jeff Addicott, director of the Center for Terrorism Law at St. Mary's University School of Law in San Antonio. The retired military attorney is not involved in Hasan's case. "But on the flip side, the jury is going to see him in a full beard and may think he is motivated by radical Islamic beliefs. That's what prosecutors and the judge (Gross) were trying to prevent."

Texas murder suspect surrenders after escape

DALLAS (AP) — A capital murder suspect stole a deputy's gun, fled a Dallas hospital and held police at bay for nearly two hours Tuesday night before surrendering peacefully and returning to the hospital, officials said.

Franklin B. Davis, 30, of Carrollton, surrendered

shortly before 11 p.m. Tuesday and was returned to Parkland Memorial Hospital, the same hospital from which he'd escaped about 8:30 p.m. while receiving treatment, Dallas County sheriff's spokeswoman Carmen Castro said.

Castro said she did not know what kind of treatment Davis was receiving.

Dallas police tactical squad officers surrounded the 30-year-old Carrollton man about 9 p.m. after he sought refuge in a van about a mile from the hospital, Castro said. Negotiations finally resolved the standoff peacefully, she said.

Castro said the deputy was not injured in the incident at the hospital, but she said she had no other details.

Davis is awaiting trial in the death of Shania Gray, a 16-year-old sophomore at Hebron High School in Carrollton. Her body was found Sept. 8 along a fork of the Trinity River. She had been shot and strangled.

Davis already had been charged with four counts of sexually assaulting Gray when he allegedly took Gray from her school. Police have said Davis confessed to killing the girl. Police say he did so to prevent Gray from testifying against him in a sexual assault case.

Family and friends had said that when she was

killed Gray's family was in the process of moving from one Dallas suburb to another so her father could be closer to work. Neighbors in Mesquite, the eastern suburb where the family lived for years, described Gray as friendly and caring.

South Texas man gets 14 years as child predator CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — A South Texas

man has been sentenced to more than 14 years in prison for being an online child predator and meeting his victim in Laredo.

A federal judge in Corpus Christi on Tuesday sentenced Anthony Michael Puckett. The 41-year-old

Corpus Christi man in September pleaded guilty to online coercion and enticement of a child.

Prosecutors say Puckett in 2010 began communi-

cating with a then-14-year-old girl and eventually met her in Laredo for sexual activities.

Investigators say Puckett, who was indicted in July communicated with the girl twice while in

July, communicated with the girl twice while in federal custody.

He remains behind bars.

Agents in El Paso seize \$52K from detergent box

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Border agents in Texas are trying to determine whether \$52,000 in undeclared cash hidden in a detergent box was laundered money.

El Paso County Jail records show 36-year-old Edgar Lopez Chavez was being held Wednesday on a bulk cash smuggling charge.

Online jail records did not list bond or an attorney for Chavez, who's from Mexico but lives in Aurora, Colo.

Customs and Border Protection officials say Chavez was arrested Monday when his southbound car was searched at the Bridge of the Americas. Officers found five packets of currency in the laundry detergent box.

Fiscal cliff offers hint at billions more in defense cuts on top of 10-year, \$500B reduction

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans' "fiscal cliff" counteroffer to President Barack Obama hints at billions of dollars in military cuts on top of the nearly \$500 billion that the White House and Congress backed last year, and even the fiercest defense hawks acknowledge that the Pentagon faces another financial hit.

The proposal that House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, and other Republican leaders sent to the White House this week calls for cuts of \$300 billion in discretionary spending to achieve savings of \$2.2 trillion over 10 years. The blueprint offered no specifics on the cuts, although the Pentagon and defense-related departments such as Homeland Security and State make up roughly half of the federal government's discretionary spending.

By any credible calculation, the military, which is still coming to grips with the half-trillion-dollar cut in last year's deficit-cutting law, is looking at an additional \$10 billion to \$15 billion cut in projected defense spending each year for the next decade. It's a prospect that Republicans recognize is the new reality, with wars in Iraq and Afghanistan ending and deficits demanding deep cuts.

"Not too devastating," said Sen. John McCain of Arizona, the top Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee. That's especially true compared with the alternative that McCain dreads—the double hit of tax hikes and automatic spending cuts dubbed the fiscal cliff.

If Obama and Congress are unable to reach a deal this month, the Pentagon would face across-the-board cuts of some \$55 billion after the first of the year and nearly \$500 billion over a decade. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta and military leaders have warned that such a meat-ax approach to the budget would do considerable harm.

Serbia ambassador to NATO leaps to death from parking garage platform at Brussels airport BRUSSELS (AP) — Officials say Serbia's ambas-

sador to NATO committed suicide by leaping from a busy parking garage platform at Brussels Airport.

A Serbian government statement said Wednesday that the envoy, Branislav Milinkovic, 52, died instantly on Tuesday night.

A diplomat who could not be identified because he was not authorized to speak to the media said Milinkovic suddenly jumped from the 8- to 10-meter-high (26- to 33-foot-high) platform while waiting with the Serbian delegation for foreign ministry officials due to hold talks with NATO officials.



Serbia is not a member of the military alliance, but has a mission in the headquarters complex. Milinkovic, a former journalist, previously served as Serbia's ambassador to Austria.

The death occurred during two days of meetings of NATO foreign ministers in Brussels.

Workers end crippling 8-day strike at nation's largest port complex after deal is reached

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Clerical workers and longshoremen at the nation's largest port complex will return to work Wednesday, eight days after they walked out in a crippling strike that prevented shippers from delivering billions of dollars in cargo across the country.

"I'm really pleased to tell all of you that my 10,000 longshore workers in the ports of LA and Long Beach are going to start moving cargo on these ships," said Ray Familathe, vice president of the International Longshore and Warehouse Union. "We're going to get cargo moved throughout the supply chain and the country and get everybody those that they're looking for in those stores."

Negotiators reached a tentative agreement to end

the strike late Tuesday, less than two hours after federal mediators arrived from Washington, D.C. No details about the terms of the deal were released, though a statement from the workers' union said it had won new protections preventing jobs from being outsourced.

Days of negotiations that included all-night bar-

Days of negotiations that included all-night bargaining sessions suddenly went from a stalemate to big leaps of progress by Tuesday. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa said the sides were already prepared to take a vote when the mediators arrived.

Obama signals willingness to go over 'fiscal cliff,' banks on GOP getting the blame

WASHINGTON (AP) — It may be just a bluff or a bargaining ploy, but the White House is signaling that President Barack Obama is willing to let the country go over the "fiscal cliff," a hard-line negotiating strategy aimed at winning concessions from Republicans on taxes.

If Washington really does fail to avert the loom-

ing series of tax hikes and spending cuts, the White House will portray Republicans as the culprits for insisting on protecting tax cuts for the wealthy, an effort the administration is laying the groundwork for now.

"This is a choice of the Republican Party," said

Dan Pfeiffer, White House communications director. "If they are willing to do higher rates on the wealthy, there's a lot we can talk about. And if they are not, then they'll push us over the cliff."

But going over the cliff also would be full of risk for a president fresh off re-election and facing at least two more years of divided government.

Ending the year without a deal could roil financial markets and dent consumer confidence just as the economy is strengthening. It could make it harder for Obama to get Republican help on his second-term priorities like overhauling the immigration system and the nation's tax code, or in getting potential Cabinet replacements confirmed.

World Bank: Climate change will hit Middle East and North Africa especially hard

DOHA, Qatar (AP) — The Middle East and North Africa will be especially hard hit by climate change in the coming decades, the World Bank said in a report Wednesday, saying the region will see less

rainfall, more recordingbreaking temperatures and rising sea levels.

Should temperatures rise as expected, the hotter conditions are likely to hit the region's \$50 billion (\mathbb{e}8.2 billion) tourism industry and further worsen its food security since many countries in the region — especially Gulf states — depend heavily on imports to feed their populations. Crop failures will also increase while yields will decrease and

household incomes will fall, the report said.

The report was presented at the United Nations climate negotiations in Doha, Qatar, where nearly 200 delegates for the first time are in the Middle East to discuss cutting emissions in an attempt to ensure that global temperatures don't rise more than 2 degrees C (3.6 degrees F) over what they were in preindustrial times.

Temperatures have already risen about 0.8 degrees C (1.4 degrees F), according to the latest report by the IPCC.

Class of 2012: EU labor market largely immobile as young find themselves trapped by language

MADRID (AP) — Maria Menendez, a 25-year-old caught in Spain's job-destroying economic crisis, would love to work in Germany as a veterinarian. Germany, facing an acute shortage of skilled workers, would love to have her.

A perfect match, it seems, but something's holding her back: She doesn't speak German.

The European Union was built on a grand vision of free labor markets in which talent could be matched with demand in a seamless and efficient manner, much in the way workers in the U.S. hop across states in search of opportunity. But today only 3 percent of working age EU citizens live in a different EU country, research shows. As young people in crisis-hit southern Europe face unemployment rates hovering at 50 percent, many find themselves caught in a language trap, unable to communicate in the powerhouse economy that needs their skills the most: Germany.

"I think going abroad is my best option," said Menendez, "but for people like me who have never studied German, it would be like starting from zero."

Mud-stained bodies show graphic toll of powerful Philippine typhoon that killed over 270

NEW BATAAN, Philippines (AP) — Mud-stained bodies covered with banana leaves were laid out in a row and survivors dried their soiled belongings on the roadside under a bright sun Wednesday, a day after a typhoon killed more than 270 people in the southern Philippines.

Officials feared many more bodies could be found as rescuers reach hard-hit areas that had been isolated by landslides, floods and downed communications

At least 151 people have died in the worst-hit province of Compostela Valley since Typhoon Bopha began lashing the region early Tuesday, including 66 villagers and soldiers who perished in a flash flood that swamped two emergency shelters and a military camp in New Bataan town, provincial spokeswoman Fe Maestre told The Associated Press.

About 80 people survived the deluge in New Bataan with injuries, but an unspecified number of villagers remain missing. On Wednesday, the farming town of 45,000 people was a muddy wasteland of collapsed houses and columns of coconut and banana trees felled by Bopha's ferocious winds.



Georgian president and prime minister in battle of wills after parliamentary vote

TBILISI, Georgia (AP) — It is a battle of egos that could not be more visible: The shining palace of the president and the lavish glass villa of the new billionaire prime minister vie for attention on hills overlooking the capital of Georgia, a U.S.-allied former Soviet republic in the throes of a leadership shakeup.

And in a graphic symbol of President Mikhail Saakashvili's fading glory, the outdoor lights that illuminate his official residence will soon go off because his nemesis, Prime Minister Bidzina Ivanishvili, has refused to keep paying the bill.

Ivanishvili, who became prime minister after his Georgian Dream coalition unseated Saakashvili's party in this fall's parliamentary election, has set out to further weaken his rival with a series of arrests of top officials and moves to cut funding to the presidency and curb Saakshvili's powers.

Cowboys' WR Dez Bryant heeding advice, rolling along

IRVING, Texas — Dallas coach Jason Garrett implores Dez Bryant to run "north and south" with the ball. The Cowboys receiver is listening and his career sure seems headed a lot more north than south these days.

Bryant's first catch Sunday at Cincinnati (7-5) could get the Dallas receiver to 1,000 yards for the first time as a pro. The past four games, he scored in each one and had the same career high in yards twice.

On the go-ahead touchdown last weekend against Philadelphia, Garrett called for Bryant to get the ball on a screen pass 6 yards from the end zone.

The only way in was "north and south," and Bryant ran through a defender at the goal line, just inside the pylon.

"Dez is growing before our eyes," Garrett said after the 38-33 victory.

That score was actually the second time Bryant heeded his coach's words against the Eagles. The first wasn't planned, though. Tony Romo scrambled to his right and turned back to see Bryant wide open across the field. Bryant did a little weaving on that 23-yard score, but mostly headed in the direction Garrett prefers and beat two defenders to the goal line.

"Tony, he believes in me and I want that to increase more," said Bryant, who has 978 yards and eight touchdowns and a career-high 145 vards in consecutive games against Cleveland and Washington. "It's all about focus and not losing composure. If he calls a play and I do what I'm supposed to do, it makes a differ-

Unless you're part of the Manning family and hoping for a hometown reunion with Eli, Peyton and their teams in New Orleans, there's little reason now to make Super Bowl reservations.

With a quarter of the schedule remaining, there's no way to pick a favorite for the Lombardi Trophy. Not even the two teams with 11-1 records, the Falcons and Texans, or Eli Manning's Giants or Peyton's Broncos.

While there has been significant separation between the haves and the have-nots in the NFL — three division races are over and only the NFC North has no odds-on choice among the undecided sectors — none of the top teams presents overwhelming credentials for winning it all. Several teams are

trending upward, most notably the Broncos with a seven-game winning streak and the Patriots, who always begin peaking in November and December. Atlanta just about has home-field advantage in the NFC, and Houston would pretty much secure it in the AFC if it wins at New England next Monday night.

So that makes them the top contenders,

"Well, there's different championships," Broncos coach John Fox said. "Your division is obviously one, everybody aspires to be in the conference championship, but at the end of the day, everybody is looking for that world championship.

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

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
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Pet TAlk: Understanding equine distemper and purpura haemorrhagica

One of the most alarming of infectious diseases in the industry Strangles, which is noted for the characteristic large swelling of lymph nodes under the jaw or in the throat area.

Sometimes the node enlargement progresses to the point of interfering with airway or swallowing functions creating concern that the patient might strangle.

Strangles, also known as equine distemper, is caused by a bacterial infection of highly infectious Streptococcus equi (Strep equi). It most commonly young horses, generally two years of age

Although the disease is potentially fatal, mortality rate is generally less than 10 percent. The morbidity rate, however, is quite high due to the infectious nature of the germ and its ability to survive once infected horses contaminate the environment.

The disease has an incubation period ranging from a few days to two Therefore, weeks. minimum isolation time of two weeks is recommended with horses that have been exposed, or horses having an unknown history for biosecurity purposes.

"We see it so commonly

in young horses when the germ is found in endemic areas; the younger animals often lack adequate immune protection," said Dr. Glennon Mays, clinical assistant professor at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Science (CVM). "That means that once a location is contaminated with Strangles, we often see it reappear in the horse population because the bacterium is located in that environment. When horses are born or brought to that location, if they don't have

The Strep equi germ can survive in contaminated soil, water troughs, feed buckets, and tack. germ can even transferred by people from one location to another. transmission Direct horses occurs between through contaminated mucus excretions of the infected horse to the naîve horse. Contaminated horses may shed the germ for two to three weeks.

protective immunity, they

become infected."

Infected horses exhibit several signs, such as general depression and dull behavior, runny nose or eyes and fever. The classic symptom of the infection is swollen lymph nodes beneath the jaw or throat areas or in other external and/or internal body locations.

Lymph nodes will usually

swell two to three days after sometimes infection, and horses will be able to spread disease for approximately two to three weeks after clinical signs appear.

'These lymph nodes swell in reaction to the infection, and often develop into large pus formations," Mays said. "After swelling, when the nodes soften, it is often therapeutic to drain the nodes by surgical incision. But this requires great caution since large blood vessels are often in close proximity. Care to contain the recovered pus is necessary because it can be contaminating wherever it collects. The lymph nodes really serve as an area of collection of the bacteria and concentration point of the

infection." "You don't want that fluid getting into the soil, or on objects that will come in contact with uninfected horses,," Mays said. "Remember that the person handling the infected horse or the infected material coming from the horse can become a vehicle for spreading the disease.,"

In addition to relieving the swelling of glands, veterinarians will typically administer supportive care, such as anti-inflammatory medications, to horses that retain an adequate appetite, hydration status, and don't display difficulty breathing.Some patients may experience high fever spikes (103 F or more) and require more aggressive therapy. In these instances, administration electrolyte antibiotics, and fluids, antiinflammatories become necessary.

Additional products believed to stimulate the system

into the therapeutic plan, however, many equine practitioners choose against antimicrobial initiating therapy unless the patient is fevered, depressed, and listless to the point of not and eating drinking adequately.

Mays explained that in some cases Strangles can develop into a clinical presentation called Purpura Haemorrhagica. Purpura causes vasculitis in the extremities resulting in painful swelling of the legs due to acute inflammation of peripheral blood vessels.

The legs become tender and sore because circulation is impaired. Horses that develop this condition are infected with Strangles and progress to the purpura stage, or were previously exposed to the germ without developing an infection.

"The reason behind this development is poorly understood," Mays said. "But horses that develop purpura are extremely depressed and actually show more clinical signs of illness — essentially sicker than with Strangles alone.,"

The vasculitis in the legs can significantly prolong recovery, and can be severe enough that the swelling permanently damages musculoskeletal structures. Laminitis is not an unusual resulting chronic condition. Complications from can produce purpura career-ending results for performance horses. Purpura can also become fatal if not treated in a timely or effective manner.

"My biggest concern is purpura creating a systemic effect resulting in a generalized, body-wide infection producing toxins

incorporated that becomes a threatening condition ' "The best Mays said defense against Strangles is to create a barrier through

biosecurity." Avoid transporting young horses into contaminated or areas. Isolate endemic of unknown horses exposure history for a minimum of two weeks to prevent possible exposure

of disease to other animals. Do not bring horses displaying signs of illness into contact with healthy horses. Remember, the infection can be transferred on clothing, tack, vehicle tires, or hands.

Due Strangles extremely contagious character, seek veterinary care immediately suspected..

Often, the veterinarians prefer to examine the animal away from their clinic contamination. Vaccines have been available for decades, but remain a topic contested

recommendation. Mays explained that many veterinarians approach vaccination recommendation caution.

"Strep vaccines historically have more potential for reactive than properties equine biological products. Many practitioners express concern for an increased frequency vaccination complications with Strangles vaccine,' Mays said.




