

PD building closes doors Facility, opened in 1956, making

way for law enforcement center

Today marks a first for the Crossroads area, as the Big Spring Police Department made its final move into the Troy M. Hogue Joint Law Enforcement Center, placing all local law enforcement agencies under the same roof.

The BSPD — which joins the Howard County Sheriff's Office at the newly constructed facility — announced this week the move marks the closure of the previous police department building, located in downtown Big Spring.

"The former building - located at 400 E. Fourth St. — has been the home of the Big Spring Police Department since 1956," Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the BSPD, said. "For a lot of us who have come up through the BSPD ranks, this place has been like a second home for us for a very long time. However, the move to the joint law enforcement center is going to allow us to better serve the citizens of Big Spring and Howard County."

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U.S. economy adds 146,000 jobs

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy added 146.000 jobs in November and the unemployment rate fell to 7.7 percent, the lowest since December 2008. The government said Superstorm Sandy had only a minimal effect on the figures. The Labor Department's report Friday offered a mixed picture of the economy.

Hiring remained steady during the storm and in the face of looming tax increases. But

the government said employ- was much smaller many anaers added 49,000 fewer jobs in October and September than it initially estimated.

And the unemployment rate fell to a four-year low in November from 7.9 percent in October mostly because more people stopped looking for work and weren't counted as unemployed.

The report "is something of a mixed bag but, on balance, it's a positive," said Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics.

lysts had predicted. The government noted that as long as employees worked at least one day during a pay period two weeks for most people — its survey would have counted them as employed.

Still, there were signs that the storm disrupted economic activity. Construction employment dropped 20,000. And weather prevented 369,000 people from getting to work — the most for any month in nearly two years. These workers were still counted as

employed.

Stock futures jumped after the report. Dow Jones industrial average futures were down 20 points in the minutes before the report came out at 8:30 a.m., and just afterward were up 70 points.

As money shifted into stocks, it moved out of safer bonds. The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note, which moves opposite the price, rose to 1.63 percent from 1.58 percent just before



the report was released. Since July, the economy has added an average of 158,000 jobs a month. That's a modest pickup from 146,000 average in the first six months of the year.

The job growth suggests that most employers aren't yet delaying hiring because of the "fiscal cliff." That's the combination of sharp tax increases and spending cuts set to take effect next year unless the White House and Congress reach a budget deal before then.

There is "no obvious impact from the looming fiscal cliff yet," Ashworth added, "but it could still have a greater effect on December's figures."

In November, retailers added 53,000 positions. Temporary help companies added 18,000 and education and health care also gained 18,000.

Auto manufacturers added nearly 10,000 jobs.

Still, overall manufacturing jobs fell 7,000. That was pushed down by a loss of 12,000 jobs in food manufacturing that likely reflects the layoff of workers at Hostess.

Sandy forced restaurants, retailers and other businesses to close in late October and early November in 24 states, particularly in the Northeast.

Ashworth noted that hiring by companies was actually better in October than the government first thought. The overall job figures were revised lower that month because governments cut about 35,000 more jobs than first estimated.

The U.S. grew at a solid 2.7 percent annual rate in the July-September quarter. But many economists say growth is slowing to a 1.5 percent rate in the October-December quarter, largely because of the storm and threat of the fiscal cliff. That's not enough growth to lower the unemployment rate.

The storm held back consumer spending and income, which drive economic growth. Consumer spending declined in October and work interruptions caused by Sandy reduced wages and salaries that month by about \$18 billion at an annual rate, the government said.

Still, many say economic growth could accelerate next year if the fiscal cliff is avoided. The economy is also expected to get a boost from efforts to rebuild in the Northeast after the storm.

Everett said. "Patrol services have already been moved over to the new facility and all other BSPD divisions will begin working Monday morning at the Troy Hogue Joint Law Enforcement Center."

The new Troy Hogue Joint Law Enforcement Center - located in the 3600 block of W. Highway 80 — represents a joint venture between the city of Big Spring and Howard County, with funding for the facility coming from both government agencies. The project is estimated to cost approximately \$2.7 million, with the city of Big Spring chipping in \$1.7 million and

the county picking up the balance.

Parker said the new facility is a step forward for law enforcement in Howard County thanks to the accessibility of between information the BSPD and sheriff's office.

"When you have investigators from both agencies working in the same building, it's a lot easier for them to share information and resources," Parker said. "It also allows us to provide services to the citizens more efficiently, since we don't have to duplicate services such as dispatch between us. It's a definite step forward for law enforcement in this area."

Phone services were installed at the Troy Hogue Law Enforcement Center during the weekend, causing an approximate 30-minute blackout on non-911 dispatch lines. Parker called the installation the last step before the PD moving into the facility.



They were not guaranteed a victory, and they didn't get one — just another failed Phoenix comeback.

A tough, fall-away 21-footer by O.J. Mayo proved to be the difference as the Mavericks handed the Suns their fifth loss in a row, 97-94 on Thursday night.

It was a nice bounceback for a Dallas team beaten by 22 by the Clippers in Los Angeles 24 hours earlier, the Mav-

Romo, Cowboys trying to hang on in uneven season

IRVING, Texas (AP) – Tony Romo threw 13 interceptions in the first seven games and has just two since. He was booed lustily in two mistake-filled home losses, then broke Troy Aikman's franchise record for touchdowns in the most efficient outing of his career.

The Dallas quarterback has used phrases such as "exhausting my brain" while the Cowboys have lived on the edge of the playoff chase, and their penchant for falling behind looked like it might wear out his right arm.

Romo won't call this up-anddown grind tougher than any other in six years of trying to get the Cowboys even remotely close to a Super Bowl for the first time since the 1995 season. It sure looks like it, though — even

sounds like it.

"I constantly analyze what our team needs or what can help our football team, what we may need to change to help what or who we are and what this team needs to do to get better," said Romo, who is a year away from the end of his contract and now the married father of an 8-month old boy. "That's always in my brain. How can I do it? How can I help others? You think about it constantly."

Because of the games and throws that got away, the Cowboys (6-6) may not survive another loss as they begin the final quarter of the season Sunday at Cincinnati (7-5). Dallas hasn't reached the postseason since 2009, when Romo had his only playoff victory and just the second for the Cowboys since their last Super Bowl win.

If the Cowboys are going anywhere, Romo will probably have to be the one leading them.

One of his classic scrambles and completions was the most important play in a win over Philadelphia that started the current 3-1 stretch. The injury-depleted Dallas defense couldn't stop the Eagles in the rematch, but Romo kept pace until a big defensive touchdown gave the Cowboys a cushion.

One of Romo's two interceptions in the past five games helped Washington take a 28-3 halftime lead on Thanksgiving, but he came back with three second-half touchdowns and had the Cowboys within seven when a defensive letdown put the

Notre Dame's Te'o eyes Heisman trophy after Maxwell win

LAKE BUENA VIS-TA, Fla. (AP) — Manti Te'o is one of the most leaders important for undefeated Notre Dame, having played in a ton of big games for the Fighting Irish.

Even so, he had a tough time processing this victory.

The senior linebacker was "at a loss for words" after capturing the Maxwell Award as the nation's most player. outstanding one of three honors he received at the 22nd Home Depot College Football Awards show Thursday night at Disney World.

"The last time I ever dreamt of winning that award was on a video game," he said. "So to win it is a mind-blowing experience."

Te'o now has won six major awards since the end of Notre Dame's regular season, also taking home the Bednarik Award for top defensive player and Walter Camp Foundation player of the year award on Thursday. He became the first defensive player to win the Maxwell Award since 1980, ending a string of nine straight quarterbacks.

Next up is the Heis-

man Trophy ceremony on Saturday night, with Te'o and Texas A&M Johnny quarterback Manziel considered the favorites. Then Te'o will try to help the Fighting Irish dethrone defending champion Alabama in the BCS national championship game.

While Te'o and Notre Dame certainly had a big night, so did Texas A&M. Manziel won the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award and junior offensive lineman Luke Joeckel took home the Outland Trophy for the nation's best interior lineman.

Manziel acknowledged he will be nervous Saturday knowing he has a chance to win college football's most hallowed individual honor. Kansas State quarterback Collin Klein is the third finalist for the Heisman Trophy.

Three sophomores have won the Heisman, including Tim Tebow in 2007, Sam Bradford in 2008 and Mark Ingram in 2009. The best a first-year player has ever done is second.

"I had high expectations, but I never would have expected this for myself," said Manziel.

Redskins back in control.

In the second halves of his past two games, Romo has thrown for 513 yards and six touchdowns with one interception, and he now has 168 career TDs, three more than Aikman, a three-time Super Bowl winner.

"I think more than anything else, he's taking care of the ball and still making plays," Dallas coach Jason Garrett said.

"When Tony's playing his best, he's able to do that. We never want to stifle him, but we believe that he can play the way he plays and still minimize the bad plays."

The turnovers are down even though defenses targeted Romo while not having to worry as much about a compromised Dallas running attack. DeMarco Murray missed six games with a sprained

right foot, and the Cowboys rushed for more than 100 yards just once without him.

Murray's first play back Sunday against Philadelphia snapped a streak of 52 straight where snaps Romo didn't hand off, and he carried for 14 yards. Murray ended up getting the ball the first three Dallas plays and finished with 23 carries for 83 yards. Oh, and the Cowboys rushed for 100 yards again — and would have approached 150 if not for a couple of fluky negative plays.

It may not be a coincidence that with Murray behind him again, Romo was 10 of 10 in the second half of a 38-33 win over the Eagles. Plus, he didn't have to throw as much. He was 22 of 27 after tossing 112 passes in
