5 contracts extended

DISD board okays raises

In an executive session Monday night, the Dimmitt School Board approved increases in teachers' salary increments and extended the contracts of 15 administrators, coaches, counselors and

The board also hired two teachers to fill mid-year

The local increment to professional people working in the district is \$800 above the state scale this year. But teachers in the DISD will receive from \$200 to \$700 more than that in the 1981-82

Increases in local increments will be in addition to any salary increase that the Texas Legislature may grant.

The new increment schedule rewards teachers for their years of service within the local school district.

Under the new schedule, a teacher with a bachelor's degree and less than three years' service will receive \$1,000 above state scale; with three to five years' service, \$1,100; with six to eight years' service, \$1,200; and with nine or more years'

degree and less than three years' service will receive \$1,200 above state scale; with three to five years' service, \$1,300; with six to eight years' service, \$1,400; and with nine or more years of service, \$1,500.



A teacher with a master's Hart alcohol plant opens

Joe Percy Hart opened his alcohol fuel plant Saturday with 75 people present for a tour of the operation and a barbecue lunch.

The equipment for the plant south of Hart was purchased in February 1980, and construction began in September.

The equipment for the plant was produced by Easy Engineering, Inc., of Denver,

Hart's plant has a production capacity of 20 gallons of 190-proof fuel alcohol per hour, using 200 gallons feedstock per hour.

Hart plans, of course, to fuel his farm vehicles and equipment with alcohol from his own plant. Easy engineer Don Cates explained that excess alcohol produced in this type of plant may also be sold to a "drying plant" for the production of gasohol.

According to Cates, the plant will produce fuel alcohol from any source with starch content, such as corn, milo, barley, wheat, rye - even potatoes. Functioning at a 200-gallon per hour feed-use capacity, he estimated it would take 13 to 14 hours to use a tank of feed. Hart's operation has three tanks.

The 'slop," or byproducts of production, can be used as grain feed for livestock.

Cates also predicted that fuel alcohol would soon be the cheapest form of fuel because it is produced from a renewable resource.

has been up to. His name is Tom Ballard. He is a branch librarian in Cleveland, Ohio, and he has been a traitor to librarians' most cherished theories for 10

a traitor within our midst.

magazine has exposed him.

Tom Ballard sits in his office. He looks like an overgrown high school senior and dresses like one. He's a real talker, too. Right now he is talking about his favorite subject - market surveys for libraries. He hates them!

". . . (Marketing surveys) are neither necessary nor appropriate - although some of the general tenets of marketing theory might prove

be very useful." Ballard goes on to say that libraries have used the marketing survey for over 30 years and that the results of them have not changed over the years. What's more, he says, the results do not differ from place to place. Something's wrong.

The library survey usually finds that a few people use the library a great deal and most use it hardly at all. For whether they're satisfied or not. Ballard says that information doesn't get the librarian anywhere at all.

If a business took a similar survey, Ballard explains, then the business would drop the non-users and concentrate on the needs and desires of the users. Librarians, though, refuse to do that. And that, Ballard says, is bad business. Of course, giving up on the non-user, usually the lower income people, smacks of

Horrors! The library cannot do that. It has a mission to fulfill - even to lower income folks who have never used the library and have stated that they never will.

Baloney. That is what Tom Ballard says. Then he goes on to prove his point by showing us data which seem to reflect a trend. Everytime the libraries spend their money on programs for nonusers, their circulation went down and the non-users remained non-users.

'So look,' says Ballard,

while he sits in the middle of a large pile of donated books, "it's logical what libraries ought to do. Accumulate more books! We ought to serve the users because we know how. We can't change the others who are non-users, and we've never found a successful way to reach







Further design improvements on corn-toalcohol fuel plants may soon be announced, according to the Department of Energy which has begun tests on an energy efficient design at a small scale alcohol fuels plant in Idaho. The test plant, using current technology, can be used as the design basis for constructing plants or as a reference for comparison against other fuel producing designs. Corn is the feedstock for distilling 25 gallons of 190 proof alcohol per hour when the plant is operational. The alcohol content will be increased to 200 proof after six months of testing. Operational testing of the fully automated plant will begin early this year, with four-hour per day, single operator maintenance expected. Construction was accomplished with the public sector in mind, using off-theshelf components. Once testing is completed, data will be available from the DOE free of charge to persons or groups interested in building small

Mr. Farmer Do You Know About Life In The Soil -Soil Micro-Organisms

In order to understand the need for Planterra, it is necessary to understand the functions of micro-organisms in the soil.

To the farmer, life on the soil is well understood, but not so well understood is "life in the soil." It is the tiny little plant-like creatures called "micro-organisms," the organic life which activates substances in our soil and makes things happen (when you are generous in your treatment of them, they serve you well).



Former CCHA Treasurer Doug Proffitt said that office

furniture, a 1973 GMC pickup, tools, and several other belongings of the authority were still located at the project. The commissioners decided

to bid for the purchase of the furniture, pickup "and everything else they have out there" for \$2,500.

Proffitt reported that reworking the project and bringing it up to the State Health Dept.'s minimum standards would cost almost half a million dollars, according to FmHA's State Director Bill Knovacks.

The Dimmitt-based Azteca Corp. estimates the cost of revamping the housing project to be closer to \$1.85 million. Azteca is a non-profit economic development corporation whose purpose is to help the community "in any way it can," President Larry Gonzales said.

The huge housing project, the first and largest of its type in the US, was completed in the fall of 1967 at a cost of almost a million dollars. Its purpose was to provide better housing to agricultural workers, especially migrants.

Phil Madley of the district FmHA office in Amarillo said, 'We must decide if it is economically feasible to rework the project to get it up to standards."

Friday, FmHA received a pre-application from an organization wanting to purchase the project, but certain requirements must be met by the applicant, Madley said. Even if FmHA sells the project, jt will still be operated under FmHA regulations, he added

studies break in water line

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen held a special meeting last Thursday to hear a report about a burst in the water line between the city and the south water field. According to Director of

Public Works Ned Smith and City Manager Garnett Holland, the break has been repaired and won't happen

The break occurred Feb. 2. when a two-inch tap connecting the plastic line to the main line broke and released a two-inch water stream from the main water line.

City maintenance workers stopped the water flow on both ends of the 18-inch main line, which released the water pressure in the line. They then turned off the corporation valve located next to the large pipe and about four feet under the ground.

The plastic line and tap were replaced with galvanized

Sloughing off of calcium sediment in the lines caused the algae, which were saturated with drip oil and which constantly grow in the lines, to distribute into the water system, Smith and Holland explained. That's why many city residents, principally in Southwest Dimmitt, noticed the water in their faucets was discolored and oily for the next three

Holland asured the aldermen that the water was safe and that the burst had been repaired. Even though the cause of the break was unknown, the water pressure may have been too much for the plastic tap over a period of time, Holland theorized.

"It won't break anymore,"


