Before you vote . . .

Before you vote Saturday, read these election facts. They could be important to you, because they deal with some of the most-asked questions and most common problems that come up on election day. The information below was provided by County Tax Assessor-Collector Jerry Heller, County Democratic Chairman Oscar Wylie and County Republican Chairman Deanne Clark.

Before you can be issued a ballot, you must present your WHITE voter registration receipt, or your name must be on the current poll list. YELLOW cards are now out of date.

If you were a registered voter last year but do not have a white registration card, your name may appear on the "struck" list at your polling site. If your name is on this list instead of the current poll list, you will be allowed to vote, but will have to fill out a voter registration application.

If you think your voting precinct has been changed, you should go to the County Tax Office before the election to have your precinct number checked and your voter registration card re-marked if necessary. Election workers will not make the decisions on what precinct you live in; they will go only by the current poll list that has been furnished to them for their precinct. If your name is not on their poll list, you will be sent to the County Tax Office to straighten out your registration and precinct number.

If you find that you are not eligible to vote in Saturday's elections, you can register now and be eligible to vote in a primary run-off election, or in the November general election. If you need an interpreter to help you read or understand the ballot, one will be provided for you. You may not bring your own interpreter with you to help you with your ballot-you must use the interpreter who has been appointed to provide this service. You may not take a sample ballot, or any piece of paper with notes on it, to your voting table to refer to while marking your ballot. Remember, Saturday's elections are political party events, held to choose the Democratic and Republican Party nominees to be voted on in the general election in November. The parties use separate election sites. You can vote in either party's primary election Saturday, but not in both. Your party preference, or affiliation, does not yet appear on your 1980 voter registration card. That will be determined by which primary election you choose to vote in Saturday. When you are issued a ballot Saturday, the poll worker will stamp your card "Democratic" or "Republican." This stamp will show that you have voted, will show your party preference, and will admit you to your party's precinct convention, county convention and other party events. In addition to holding primary elections, the two major political parties will also hold precinct conventions Saturday. After you have voted Saturday, you will be eligible to attend your party's precinct convention at the same polling place later in the day. At these precinct conventions, resolutions may be adopted and delegates will be elected to the county conventions to be held the following Saturday. At the county conventions, state convention delegates will be elected and resolutions will be adopted to be submitted at the state conventions. For the time of your Democratic precinct convention, inquire at your polling site Saturday. Republican precinct conventions will all be held Saturday evening at 8. Before you vote, study the sample ballots on Page 10 of this issue. These ballots include marking instructions and the names of all candidates. Each candidate has paid a filing fee and/or presented a nominating petition to get his or her name on the ballot. Each candidate is running to become the party's nominee, to oppose the other party's nominee in the November general election. Candidates who win in Saturday's primaries, and again in the November general election, will take office next January.

Veterans' land program puts hold on new loans

terans' Land Program will not be sending out additional bonds can be sold. any more loan applications Land Commissioner Bob until some of the program's Armstrong, chairman of the Veterans' Land Board, said the board voted April 15 to suspend the mailing of applications. He said the Texas Constitution limits the interest rate at which these bonds can be sold to six percent, and the current New York bond market is experiencing the highest rates in its history. "Our financial advisors are optimistic that we will be able to sell at a reasonable rate before the end of the year, Armstrong said. 'We just have more customers than we have money,' Armstrong said. He said the money currently available for loans has been committed much more quickly than anticipated because the Veterans' Land Program has become virtually the only source for long-term, low-interest real estate loans for small tracts in Texas. Under the program, veterans are able to borrow up to \$20,000 on a 40-year note to purchase 10 or more acres. Veterans who now have applications will still be able to get a loan under the program, Armstrong said, provided they return the required papers before the expiration date on their applications.


Dear Editor:

Eating a wide variety of fresh vegetables and fruits will add the essential nutmum amount of calories, and it will cost next to nothing. MEAT - in the meat department, pork, chickens, turkeys and eggs are still best buys.

Because of the variety of fresh and cured pork available, select different cuts, including pork chops, rib-end and loin-end roast, ham and bacon.

Beef production is still down, and it's likely prices will continue to go up in the next few months. If you have extra cash and freezer space, you may want to stock up on beef.

Eggs are still available at bargain prices. Shell color doesn't affect the grade, nutritive value, flavor or cooking performance. Color is determined by the breed of hen.

Eggs are an excellent source of vitamins, minerals and protein. Include them in the diet in moderation.

Easy-to-prepare main dishes with eggs are cheese souffles, ham omelets, and quiche.

Always store eggs in a cool, covered container with the large end of the egg turned upward.

DAIRY - specials for the next couple of weeks will include milk, sour cream, yogurt, and a variety of cheeses. Approximately nine pounds of milk is used to make one pound of cheese, so cheese is considered a milk substitute. Exact food values differ among cheese varieties, but all are exceptional sources of calcium, and all are good meat substitutes.

In summary, remember, your best food buys for the upcoming week or two will be fresh fruits and vegetables, pork, poultry and eggs.
