Big voter turnout expected

Saturday is national election day in Texas, one of the few days that Mr. and Mrs. Texan have an opportunity to approve or disapprove of government policies. To be a complete American citizen you must exercise your right of franchise.

With few exceptions, I will not comment on the various candidates vying for offices on the ballot. As usual I will vote in the democratic primaries and expect practically all of the democratic nominees to be elected in November.

It is a foregone conclusion that President Carter will not only carry Texas, but will be reelected in November. Ronald Reagan will carry Texas in the republican primary and has the nomination in the bag, but he is unelectable.

So far as state races are concerned, neither one of the present members of the Texas Railroad Commission should be reelected. They have promoted the interests of the oil companies without showing any regard for the consuming public whatsoever.

Local party workers are expecting large voter turnouts in Saturday's Democratic and Republican primary elections. Not only are there 14 contested races—two in the Republican primary and 12 on the Democratic ballot, including a six-man sheriff's race. There are also emotional issues in the air, ranging from local lawsuits to the Iranian crisis, that are expected to stimulate heavier-than-usual balloting as voters voice their opinions as well as their choices of candidates.

The redrawing of county precinct boundaries this year is certain to add confusion to Saturday's elections. But it's also likely to stimulate a larger voter turnout—especially among Mexican-American residents, who are now believed to be the majority in two of the county's four precincts.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday. Democrats will vote at 16 polling places and Republicans at four sites in the county.

Also, County Tax Assessor-Collector Jerry Heller will keep his office open on election day to help voters who have questions about their registration or precinct number.

Sample ballots of both party primaries appear on Page 10 of this issue, sponsored by the First State Bank of Dimmitt. In the Democratic primary,

the spotlight is on the sheriff's race. With six men running—five of whom have previous law enforcement experience—the race is almost certain to go into a runoff. Candidates are Joe Ben Mitchell, Santos Perez Jr., Cowboy (Roy) Johnson, Lonny N. Rhynes, Ronnie Wayne Ballew and Donald Ray Carmichael.

Also expected to stimulate voter turnout are the county commissioners' races. In Precinct 1, Commissioner Ed Bennett of Hart is being challenged by Reyes Sandoval of Dimmitt, and in Precinct 3, Commissioner Anna Margaret Moss faces a challenge from former Commissioner Jimmy Howell.

Gerald McCathern and Bill Sarpalus, both from Hereford, are vying for the Democratic nomination for state senator, with the winner to face Sen. Bob Price (R-Pampa) in the November general election.

Democrats will also indicate their preference for President for the first time in a primary. The race is between President Jimmy Carter and Sen. Ted Kennedy. California Gov. Jerry Brown also appears on the ballot, but he has dropped out of the race since he filed.

The Democratic ballot also features seven contested races for state and judicial offices. Of these seven races, the only one that has generated much heat is the contest

between Railroad Commissioner John Poerner and his challenger, Arthur (Buddy) Temple. The rest of the state-office candidates have been running low-key campaigns.

The Republican primary ballot is shorter, but it has the drawing power of the most-followed national race—the struggle between Ronald Reagan and George Bush for the GOP presidential nomination.

Republicans also will express their opinions of two of Gov. Bill Clements' proposals—whether state police should be able to use wiretaps in gathering evidence against suspected drug [See ELECTIONS, Page 15]

Sheriff candidates scuttle forum

Dismayed Farm Bureau leaders this week said the six candidates for county sheriff did "a disservice to the public" when they declined to appear in the FB's scheduled "Meet the Candidates" forum Friday night.

In an unusual display of unity for competing candidates, the six sheriff hopefuls agreed among themselves last Thursday not to appear in the forum. They said the program presented "some insurmountable problems" and that they were troubled by its timing.

The sheriff candidates were the only ones scheduled to appear in the forum at Dimmitt High School auditorium. Under a controlled format, each candidate was to answer six to 10 common questions in rotating order.

The questions were to be formulated by the Farm Bureau Forum Committee and posed by an out-of-county moderator. No questions from the public were to be allowed. The candidates had been issued "topic sheets," and were to be given the list of specific questions half an

hour before the forum was to begin.

The candidates scuttled the forum last Thursday night when they presented Forum Committee Chairman Alfred Sammann with this letter:

"Dear Mr. Sammann:

"This letter is in reference to the 'Meet the Candidates' forum to be held on April 25, 1980. We, the candidates for sheriff of Castro County, are in agreement that there are possibly some insurmountable problems involved. The lateness of the scheduling is our greatest concern in that if

there was a misunderstanding, there would not be sufficient time left to change or correct the misunderstanding prior to the Democratic primary on May 3, 1980.

"Therefore, we the candidates for Castro County sheriff apologetically decline to appear at the forum."

The letter was signed by all six candidates—Ronnie Ballew, Donald Carmichael, Roy "Cowboy" Johnson, Joe Ben Mitchell, Santos Perez and Lonny Rhynes.

"They called me Thursday night and asked me to come

and meet at the courthouse," Sammann said. "When I got there, all six of them were there, and they handed me the letter."

Sammann and Farm Bureau President Gale Sadler said the letter came as a shock to them.

"We had no idea there was any problem," Sadler said. "All the feedback we had gotten had been positive."

Sadler explained that the Farm Bureau's board of directors had voted March 11 to set up the forum committee, and [See FORUM, Page 13]

Housing board regroups; will fight suit

Allan Webb and Ray Robertson submitted their resignations from the troubled Castro County Housing Authority board of directors at Monday's meeting of the County Commissioners' Court.

Webb is the chairman of the CCHA board, and Robertson was one of the original

directors named when the CCHA was formed in 1972 to operate the huge migrant housing project here.

The commissioners appointed Desi Pesina and Pete Garza to succeed Webb and Robertson on the CCHA board.

Pesina is a long-time Dimmitt businessman. Garza is

assistant cashier and installment loan officer at the First State Bank, and serves as president of the Panhandle Community Action Corp.

Webb and Robertson have been working since July to keep the housing project from bankruptcy after a federal court ordered an end to "block leasing" of apart-

ments. They indicated they were resigning, effective May 1, to help the CCHA comply with the Farmers Home Administration's insistence on a racially balanced board.

CCHA directors told the commissioners' court Monday that they will continue to fight the class-action lawsuit filed by Texas Rural Legal Aid,

Inc., and wanted to be certain that the county would not be liable for any court costs or settlements, since the housing authority is virtually broke.

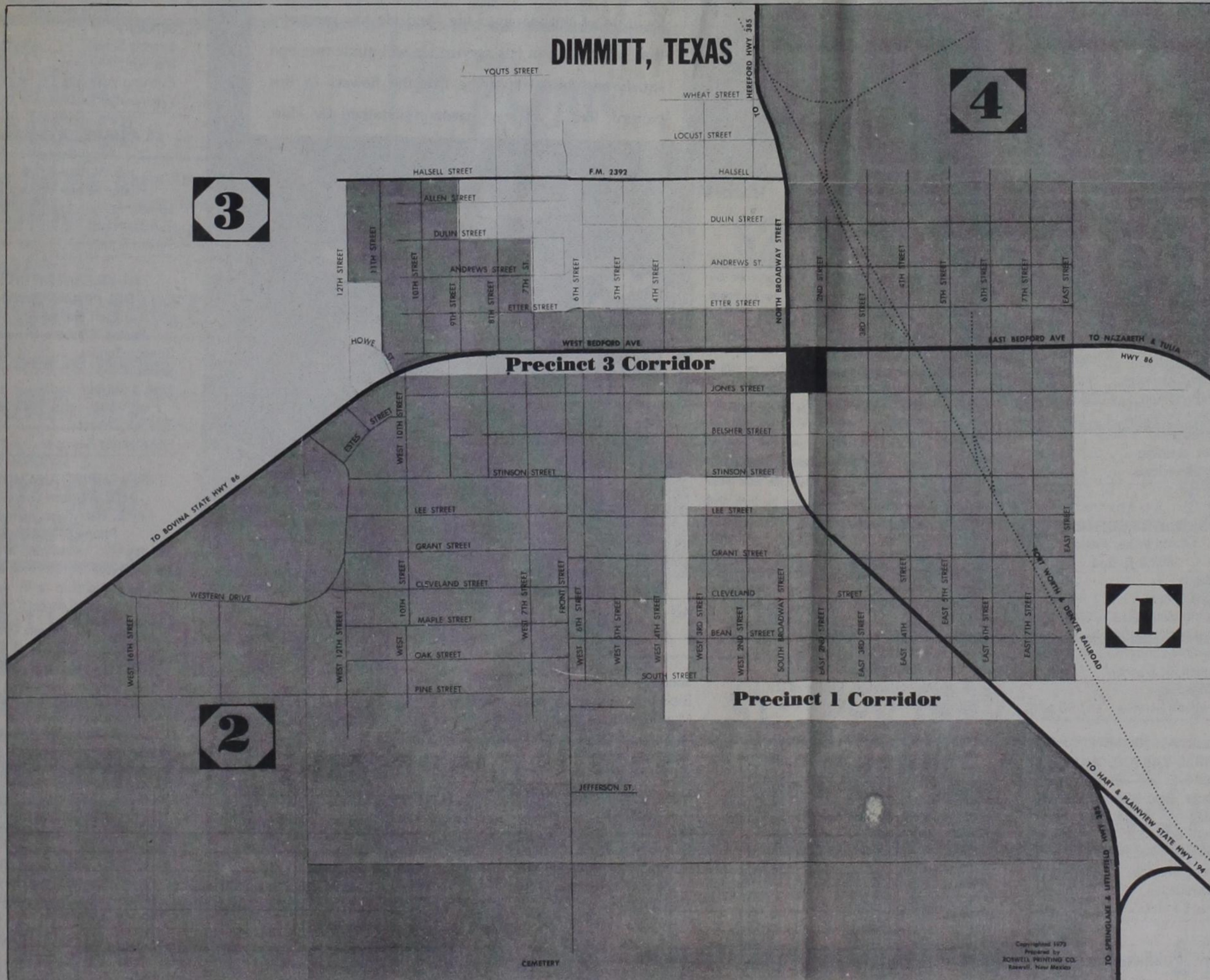
TRLA alleged in its lawsuit that the "problem areas" concern block leasing, maintenance, project delinquencies and record keeping. [See HOUSING, Page 16]

VETERAN'S SERVICES

By BEDFORD W. SMITH Veterans' Service Officer

We've received word that the interest rate on VA and FHA guaranteed home loans has been cut to 13%. Rates on these loans had risen to 14% in early April. We can hope for further reductions.
We've been informed by the Texas Veterans' Land Board that no more applications will be sent out until additional bonds can be sold. This popular program is now out of money.

The Veterans Administration regional office of Waco sent us the following information on re-employment rights of veterans:

The Veterans Administration and the Department of Labor have joined forces to remind recently discharged servicemen and women of their reemployment rights.

VA is including in an information kit it sends to new veterans a Labor Department flyer detailing the reemployment rights federal legislation mandates for them.

Officials of the two agencies believe the flyer will aid veterans confronted with re-employment problems, many of whom are unaware of the rights they have in this area.

By law veterans are entitled to restoration in their previous job or to a similar one offering the same seniority, status and pay, including all benefits becoming due after reemployment which would have accrued by seniority.

Veterans must apply to their pre-service employer within 90 days after separation from active duty.

There are also special provisions for reservists and Air National Guard personnel.

For further information and assistance veterans should contact the nearest Veterans Administration regional office or Department of Labor field office.

The nearest VA regional office is in Waco. They have a toll free information service for any VA benefit. It is 1-800-792-3271.

I'm not sure where the nearest Labor Dept. field office is located; but there is one in the Federal Building, 1201 Texas Avenue in Lubbock.

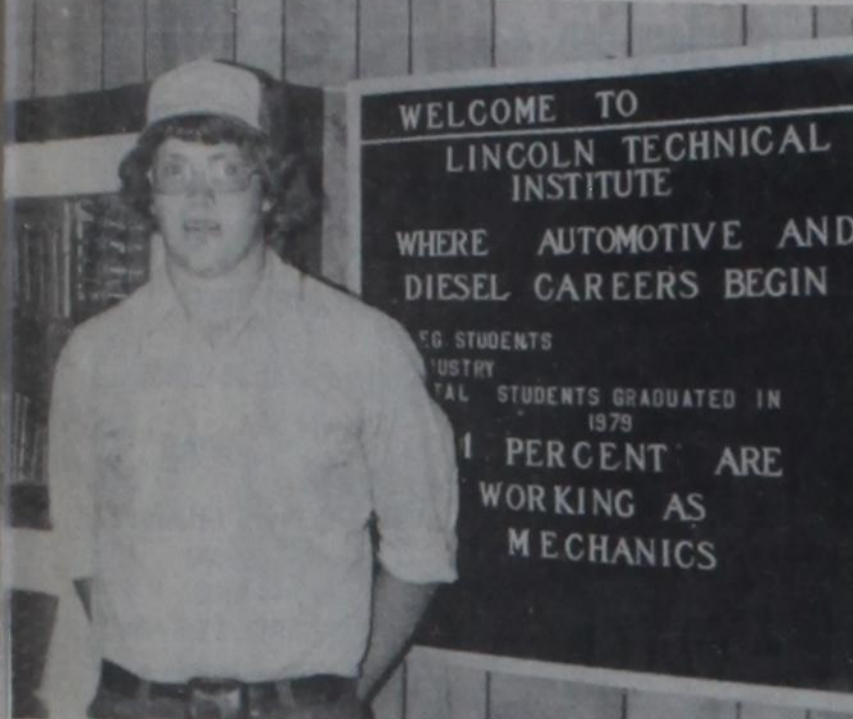

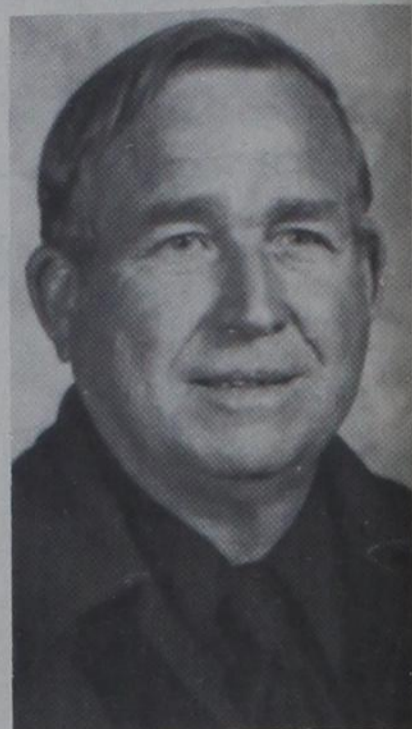

View from the Library

This article will be an ordeal. It will be an ordeal because that's what the book review will be about. The name of the book is "Ordeal" by none other than Linda Lovelace.

For those of you who remember Linda Lovelace, this will be an article of some interest. Lovelace, that fleshy young paragon of porno, has written a book about her life and how she ended up as a hard-core porn movie star. Not everyone has had that opportunity, and for that reason the story holds interest. Surprisingly, it is well written, giving the atmosphere of the sordid surroundings, passable descriptions of her fellow porn stars, and mounting suspense as she tries over the years to break away from

her husband, who forces her out the door every morning to go to work in her pornography career—sometimes even threatening to kill her with his handgun.

Dante, in his "Divine Comedy," says that midway in his life he went astray and as he worked toward returning to the True Way he was blocked from going further by unchastity, by violence and by fraud. Strangely, though she wrote no epic, Linda Lovelace fell from her True Way by the same evils and then she had no guide to take her away from a life which resembled Dante's Inferno to a marked degree.

Throughout the book, she admits that she couldn't get up enough guts just to run away. When she attempted to escape and failed, there were always punishments to make her think again before planning another attempt.

As she hesitated, her life with her husband became worse and worse as he had her do more bazaar and sickening things. The climax of her career was the movie, "Deep Throat," for which she, and her co-star, are still being prosecuted.

One hears things about Linda Lovelace every so often, a middle age has been before the age of 50, going from court to court. Stories abound about how strangers who have seen her movies accost her for sexual favors. There are still cheap magazine stories about her, touting her "new" loves who are, in reality, non-existent. All told, it's not a very good life even now for Linda Lovelace.

Yet the book is redeeming in this way. It has a moral and a warning to those who lose their sense of self and who cannot power their lives with their own decisions.

A person, it seems, does not have to be responsible for his own life if he does not want to, and pays a heavy price when he relinquishes control of the things he is to learn and to experience.

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ASCS notes Higher target prices in effect this year

1980 FARM PROGRAM—The Agriculture Adjustment Act of 1980 includes higher target prices for wheat and feed grains. Producers who stay within the Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) will qualify for program benefits based upon the new target prices. Producers who exceed their NCA will receive benefits based on the target price used in the Food and Agricultural Act of 1977.

There will be no off-setting compliance requirement under the high and low target concept. Accordingly, producers interested in the production of wheat or feed grain on a farm planting within the NCA are eligible for the higher target price even though they operate or have an interest in another farm which plants wheat or feed grain and exceeds the NCA.

1980 final target prices and national loan rates are as follows:

- Wheat (Bu.), target within NCA \$3.63; target exceeds NCA \$3.08; loan rate \$2.50.
- Corn (Bu.), target within NCA \$2.35; target exceeds NCA \$2.05; loan rate \$2.10.
- Grain Sorghum (CWT), target within NCA \$4.46; target exceeds NCA \$4.38; loan rate \$3.57.

Cotton (Lbs.), target within NCA .584; target exceeds NCA .584; loan rate .48.

The disaster program has been extended for the 1980 crop year. A limitation of \$100,000 per person is imposed on total 1980 disaster payments for wheat, feed grains and cotton. Disaster rates are as follows:

Wheat (Bu.), within NCA \$1.815; exceeding NCA \$1.54. Corn (Bu.), within NCA \$1.175; exceeding NCA \$1.025.

Grain Sorghum (Bu.), within NCA \$1.25; exceeding NCA \$1.225.

Cotton (lb.), within NCA .194; exceeding NCA .194.

ACREAGE REPORTS

To be eligible for the above program benefits an accurate report must be made of all fall seeded crops no later than May 15.

Library reading program has 'Sports Splash' theme

The Rhoads Memorial Library is among nearly 400 libraries throughout Texas participating this year in the Texas Reading Club. The program is sponsored by the Texas State Library and participating libraries. Young readers will take part in activities built around "Sports Splash," the theme selected for 1980. The nearly universal interest in sports that range from solitary activities like jogging to team sports like baseball and football gives them appeal for most young readers. And libraries have books about sports that range from books on how to play the games through biographies of famous players to novels and stories with sports themes. Most important of all, young Texans who participate will sample the fun of recreational reading. Today's public libraries include a wide range of books and other printed materials for young readers. Summertime is vacation time,

but skills honed by vacation time reading will be sharp for the year ahead. "One of the most serious problems we face today is the deterioration of reading ability among young people," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library. "We know, however, that people of all ages who develop the habit of reading for recreation become good readers. Reading is a recreational activity with both immediate and long-term benefits." In recent years school libraries and learning resource centers have undergone major improvements. As a result many youngsters have developed sophisticated skills in using libraries. The Reading Club encourages them to use these skills and the library materials they find for recreational purposes. Special activities that encourage regular visits to the library have been planned by

James L. and Carol H. Thomas of Denton. He teaches in the North Texas State University School of Library and Information Sciences, and she recently completed a doctorate in special education at the University of Virginia. They are the parents of two sons.

Veterans' land program puts hold on new loans

The Veterans' Land Program will not be sending out any more loan applications until some of the program's

authorized \$140 million in additional bonds can be sold. Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, chairman of the Veterans' Land Board, said the board voted April 15 to suspend the mailing of applications. He said the Texas Constitution limits the interest rate at which these bonds can be sold to six percent, and the current New York bond market is experiencing the highest rates in its history. "Our financial advisors are optimistic that we will be able to sell at a reasonable rate before the end of the year," Armstrong said. "We just have more customers than we have money," Armstrong said. He said the money currently available for loans has been committed much more quickly than anticipated because the Veterans' Land Program has become virtually the only source for long-term, low-interest real estate loans for small tracts in Texas. Under the program, veterans are able to borrow up to \$20,000 on a 40-year note to purchase 10 or more acres. Veterans who now have applications will still be able to get a loan under the program, Armstrong said, provided they return the required papers before the expiration date on their applications.

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Best food buys

Best food buys for the next week or two include fresh fruit and vegetables, pork, poultry and eggs.

From the standpoint of Dr. Carol Akkerman, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, here's how the picture shapes up:

FRESH VEGETABLES — are becoming more plentiful in local markets as "their" season begins. Take advantage of good buys—pay close attention to cabbage, sweet potatoes, Oregon potatoes, green onions, radishes, carrots, tomatoes, salad greens and rutabagas.

You'll find prices down considerably on lemons, pineapple, strawberries, Valencia oranges and apples — red, golden delicious and Granny Smith. These apples are crisp, juicy and good for eating fresh or cooking.

Pineapples are ripe when only a slight yellowish tinge is on the green shell. To prepare, cut off the ends, slice in half lengthwise and carefully peel the thorny skin. If pineapple eyes remain in the juicy pulp, use a paring knife to lift them out. Slice and remove the fruit from the pithy core. Eat fresh with or without a little sugar.

Eating a wide variety of fresh vegetables and fruits will add the essential nutrients to your diet, the minimum amount of calories, and it will cost next to nothing.

MEAT — in the meat department, pork, chickens, turkeys and eggs are still best buys.

Because of the variety of fresh and cured pork available, select different cuts, including pork chops, rib-end and loin-end roast, ham and bacon.

Beef production is still down, and it's likely prices will continue to go up in the next few months. If you have extra cash and freezer space, you may want to stock up on beef.

Eggs are still available at bargain prices. Shell color doesn't affect the grade, nutritive value, flavor or cooking performance. Color is determined by the breed of hen.

Eggs are an excellent source of vitamins, minerals and protein. Include them in the diet in moderation.

Easy-to-prepare main dishes with eggs are cheese souffles, ham omelets, and quiche.

Always store eggs in a cool, covered container with the large end of the egg turned upward.

DAIRY — specials for the next couple of weeks will include milk, sour cream, yogurt, and a variety of cheeses.

Approximately nine pounds of milk is used to make one pound of cheese, so cheese is considered a milk substitute.

Exact food values differ among cheese varieties, but all are exceptional sources of calcium, and all are good meat substitutes.

In summary, remember, your best food buys for the upcoming week or two will be fresh fruits and vegetables, pork, poultry and eggs.

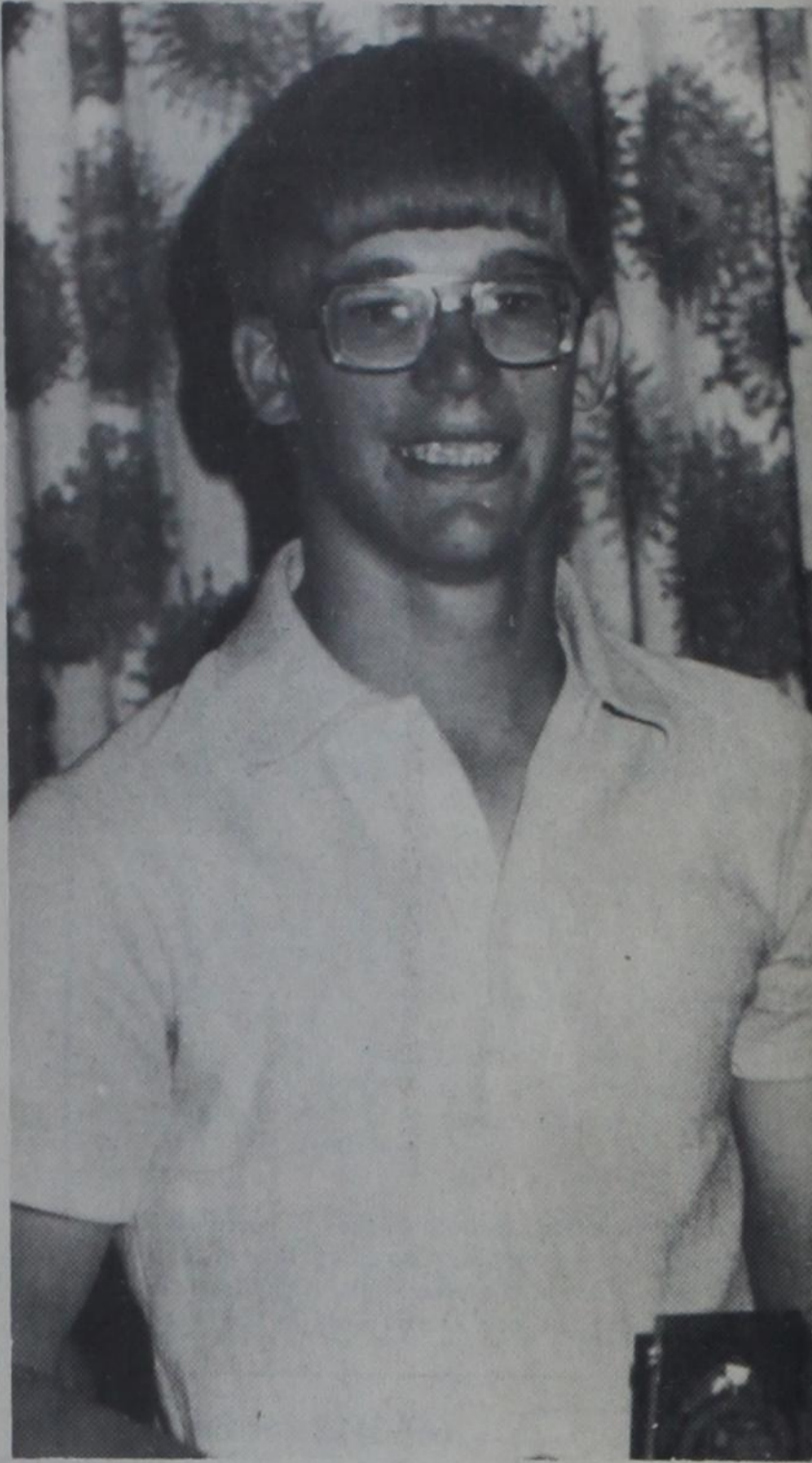

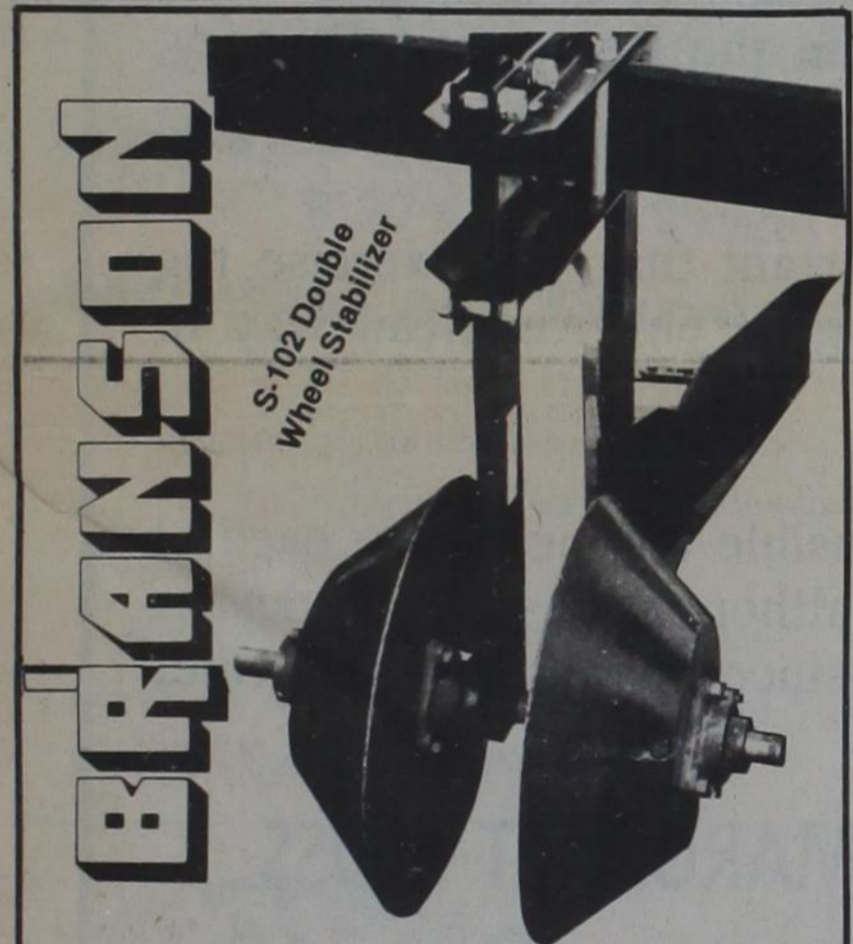

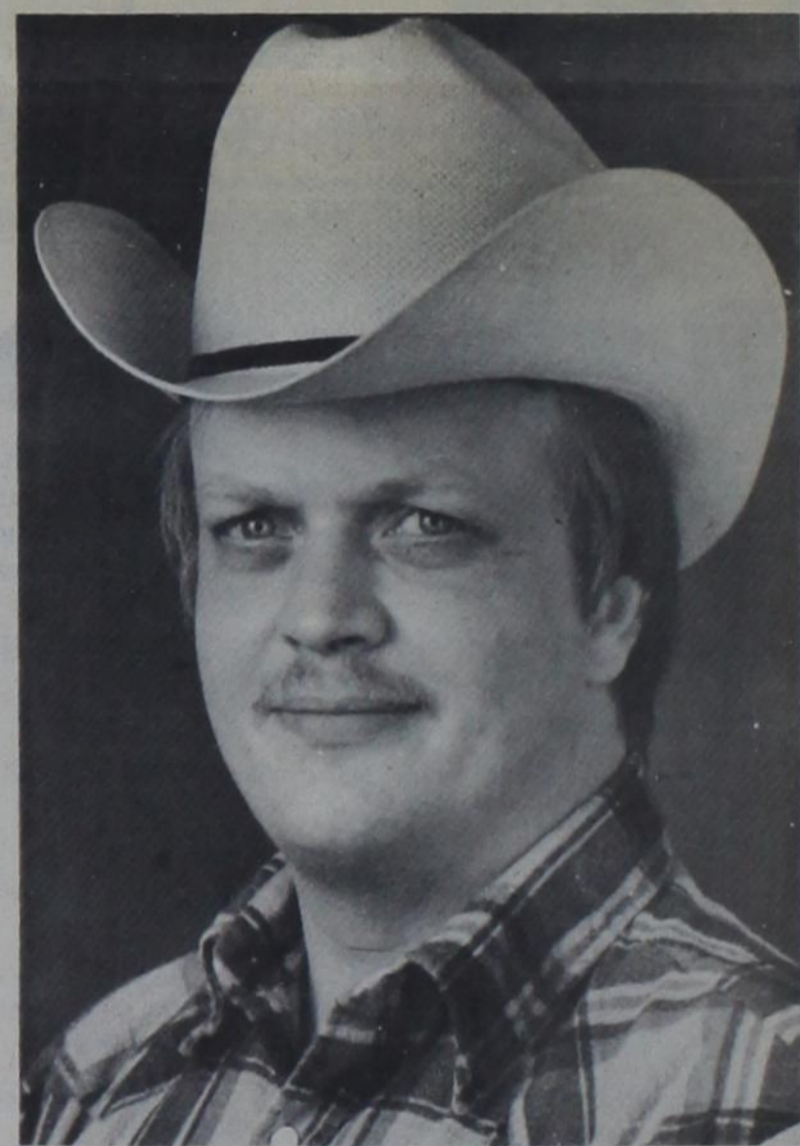

Anti-trust trial goes to jury today

Closing arguments began Wednesday morning in the seventh week of the \$32.5 million Dimmitt Agri Industries anti-trust suit being tried in US District Court in Amarillo.

The trial is expected to go to the jury today (Thursday). Summations totaling 4½ hours started at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday morning.

Corn Products International, the world's largest supplier of corn starch and corn

is being sued by DAI for allegedly engaging in "monopolistic acts" designed to force the cooperative out of the corn milling business.

The trial could result in the largest settlement in the Amarillo court's history. Anti-trust statutes provide for triple damages if DAI can prove its case—making an award of nearly \$100 million possible.

CPI was charged with artificially reducing the market price for corn starch and corn syrup in 1974 to such levels that DAI could not make a profit with its new corn mill.

DAI attorneys have tried to produce evidence indicating CPC acted conspiratorially to lower corn product prices in an effort to put the cooperative out of business.

The Dimmitt-based corn starch plant went on stream in December of 1970 and failed less than three years later. That business failure is alleged in the suit to have been the result of acts by CPC and other corn product firms to substantially lessen competition and hold for themselves a monopoly in corn products activity.

that the committee had mailed its first letter to the candidates March 13, posing the public-forum idea and asking for a response by March 25.

"We got written replies from every candidate, saying they were willing to participate and thanking us for the opportunity to meet the public," Sadler said. "Some of the committee members did receive some phone calls later regarding the questions and asking about the committee's make-up."

Committee members were Sammann, Sadler, Tommy Stanton, Allen Dobmeier, Ted Robb, Richard Connell and Edgar Dennis.

Sadler said the Farm Bureau had decided to stage the forum here because similar programs had been held successfully by Farm Bureau chapters elsewhere.

He said the committee decided to focus on the sheriff's race "because of the number of candidates, and the fact that there was no incumbent in the race."

"Our intent was strictly to perform a public service," Sadler said. "This was our first try at something like this, and we're afraid now that our credibility may be damaged."

"I think everyone on our committee was disappointed, and felt that the candidates had done a disservice to the public," Sammann said. "I think the candidates had some valid reservations about the forum, but I believe also that the public had a right to know what the candidates thought. It's impossible to have an informed electorate if the candidates refuse to take a public stand."

The News talked with three of the sheriff candidates this week, and all gave the same basic reasons behind their decision.

"No particular candidate was the driving force behind the decision to decline," one candidate said. "Each of us was thinking the same thing all along, but didn't know the others were. We just started talking about it as we bumped into each other, and realized we all had the same doubts about it."

He added, "We're all friends and want it to stay that way. There were some awfully touchy areas involved in the question topics they gave us, that could have caused some real problems for some of us individually—especially if our answers were misinterpreted."

"I don't think we owe the Farm Bureau an apology because they just didn't give us enough time," another candidate said. "But I feel we do owe the public an apology."

"The questions to be asked just really put one or more of the candidates in a real bind," he said, "and we all felt the same way—that there were just too many problems and touchy areas involved."

He added, "We've all been running a clean race; we're all friends; we can have coffee together; and we respect each other—and I'd like to see it stay that way. I hope the public will see our viewpoint, and that this won't discourage people from getting out and voting."

"The Farm Bureau went to a lot of trouble, and their intentions were good," he said. "I can sympathize with them. This is something we should have talked about a long time ago, but we all held off on it. When we finally got together on it, it was a 100% decision by the candidates."

Another candidate remarked, "The letter speaks for itself—that's the way I felt from the time I received the first letter from them. Nobody pushed anybody into it."

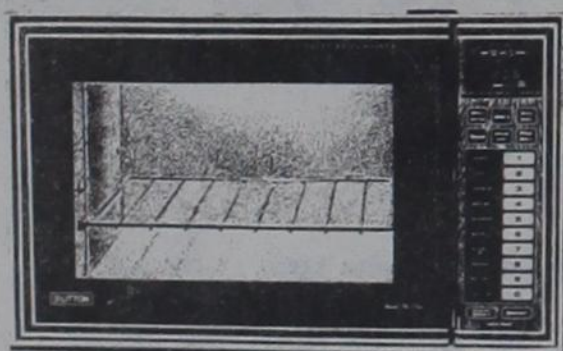

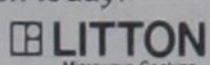

Does your child get enough sleep?

Is your schoolchild getting enough sleep?

Different children need different amounts — but each child needs to get enough sleep.

There are ways to tell if a child is getting enough — and to make sure he does, says Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist with the Extension Service.

Here's the major rule of thumb: if a child has trouble waking up in the morning, he's not getting enough sleep.

To be sure a child does get the right amount of sleep for him, you can do several

things: —Establish a definite hour for bedtime.

School-agers can tell time, so let the clock tell him it's bedtime — with a gentle reminder from you, if necessary. This will help eliminate a parent-child power struggle every night.

—Appeal to a child's independence by telling him he can rest, at least, if he isn't sleepy. Sleep usually will overtake him naturally. Never force a child to sleep.

—Establish bedtime rituals that allow a child to wind down before bedtime.

—Allow a child the comfort of a light or open door if he feels scared, lonely or isolated.

—Be flexible enough to allow later bedtimes on special occasions.

—Make the sleeping area quiet and comfortable for him.

In general, remember, age is not the only indicator of sleeping needs.

Consider the fatigue levels of each child. Each school-ager has individual needs — and this includes his need for rest.

[Continued from Page 1] dealers, and whether the state should have "initiative and referendum" as a way for the public to make laws. At present, state laws are enacted only by the legislature.

The only other contested race on the Republican ballot is for railroad commissioner, where three candidates—Henry C. (Hank) Grover, E. W. (Billy) Kidd and John Thomas Henderson—are seeking the GOP nomination. The winner will face one of the two Democrats—Poerner or Temple—in the November general election.

Only one person has filed as a Republican candidate for a local office. Robert Benton is running for the GOP nomination for county commissioner of Precinct 3, and will face either Mrs. Moss or Howell in the November general election.

Saturday's primary elections are a handicapper's dream, raising a ballot-box-full of questions. For example:

—How will the revised precinct boundaries affect the county commissioners' races?

—Which two of the six sheriff's candidates will survive to go into a runoff?

—Will Ronald Reagan's popularity draw many conservative Democrats or independents to the Republican primary this time? Or will the contested local races draw these "swing votes" into the Democratic primary?

Castro County's voters will answer those questions Saturday.

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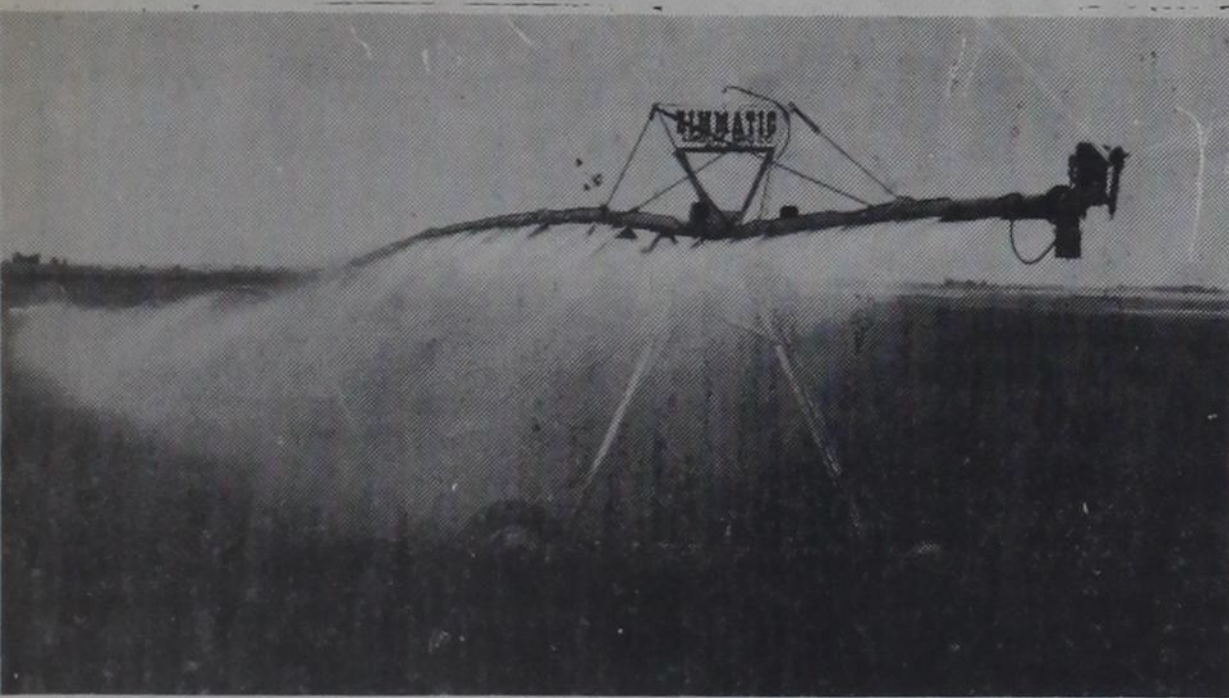

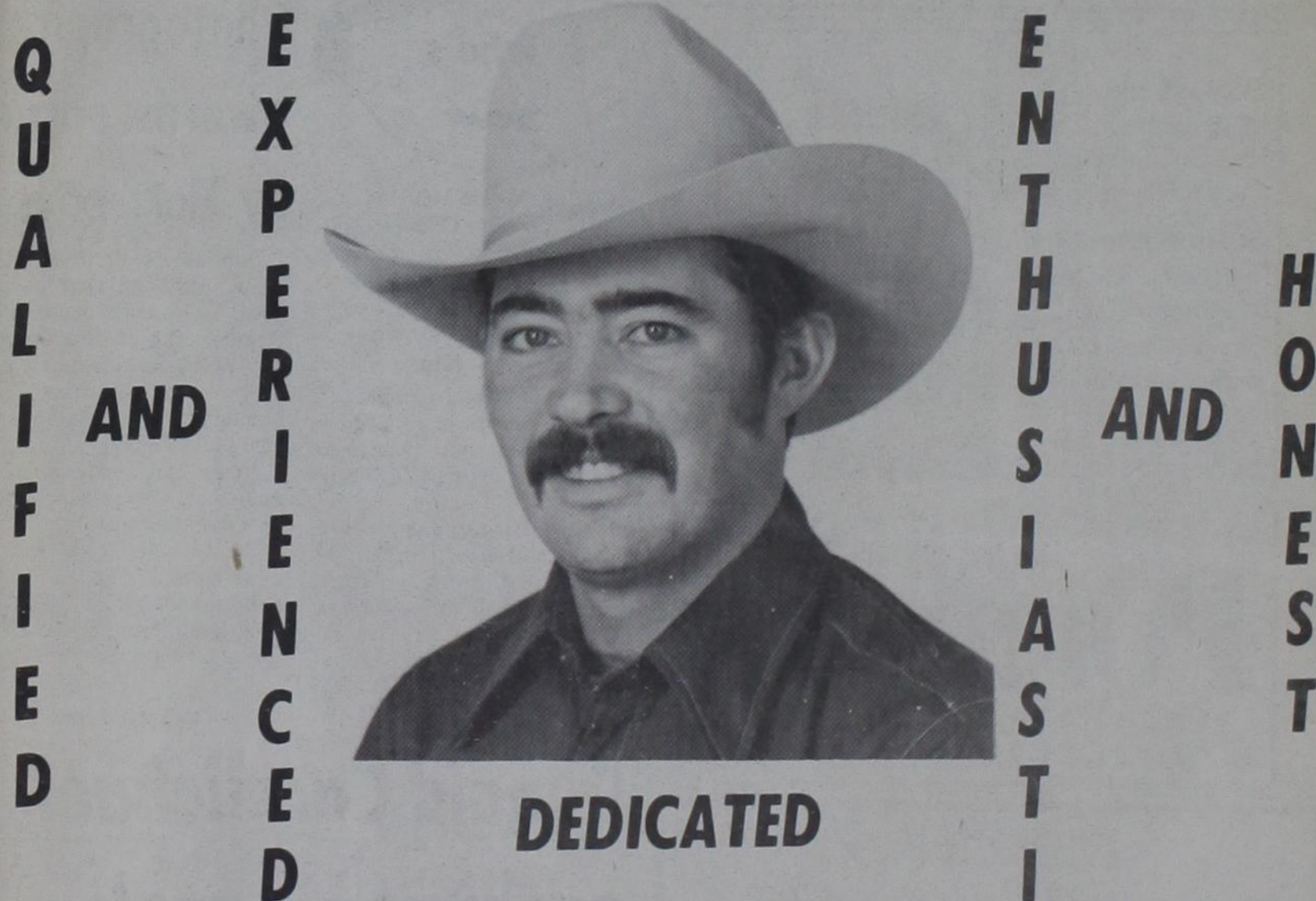

attorneys have proposed a compromise settlement of \$7,000 in attorney's fees and \$7,000 in individual damages.

Housing Authority Board Member Bruce Fuller said, "They (the TRLA and the court) broke us to make the housing project legal (by ending block leasing). Is the county liable, then?"

The commissioners said the county was exempt from financial liability under the joint city-county resolution that established the CCHA in October, 1972.

The only financial reserve the CCHA has, board members said, is some FmHA money for maintenance and upkeep. CCHA accountant Doug Proffitt reported that FmHA would not release these reserve funds to pay for court costs, but would consider a new loan.

Proffitt told county commissioners that if they were

worried about the pending court fight costing the county anything, "You can get out—all you have to do is revoke your authority."

Commissioner Anna Margaret Moss told the CCHA directors, "You guys know that we're really proud of the job you've done."

Edd Wilson added, "I think the board has done a marvelous job. They thought the program would pay its way and provide migrants with places to live."

In other action, the commissioners asked Thelma Smith of Ivey Insurance to review the insurance bid with an eye toward increasing the coverage on the library, exposition building and courthouse.

The commissioners also approved warrants to be issued to purchase motor-graders for each county precinct. The graders are Caterpillars, and are being purchased from West Texas Equipment Co.

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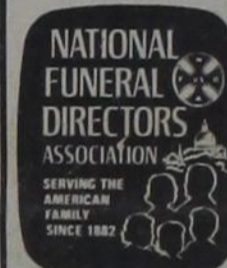
