FISD looks for answers in Newtown's wake

FORSAN — When it comes to student safety and security procedures, Forsan Independent School officials don't consider "good" good

enough.

A review of safety and security protocols in the school district left officials giving FISD a passing grade, but they were quick to add improvements could and prob-

ably will be made — up to and including the possibility of arming district personnel.

"I'd give us a 'B'," FISD Superintendent Randy Johnson said after trustees conducted a review of student safety policies at their meeting Monday night. "I think there's a lot of positive things that have been in place here for years. But there's a new awareness that has led us to have some good, necessary discussions and will hopefully lead us in the future to getting an 'A'."

The "new awareness" Johnson spoke of is that, in the wake of last month's school

Park closures are in the news again

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) – Texas might have to close 20 of its 95 state parks unless the Legislature approves \$18.9 million in additional funding, wildlife officials have said.

The additional money being requested is part of the state Parks and Wildlife Department's request for \$507.1 million over the next two years, plus an additional \$103 million to restore previous cuts, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported.

Whether the Big Spring State Park is one of those 20 remains to be seen, but because it was one of a few targeted in 2011, it seems probable that it may be. The park currently remains within the state park system due to an agreement with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the city of Big Spring and Howard County. Both local entities agreed to pay \$10,000 — for

Crossroads woman killed in U.S. 87 accident

A Big Spring woman was killed and an Odessa man injured early Monday morning in a traffic accident approximately 8 miles south of Big Spring on U.S. Highway 87, according to officials with the Texas Department of Public

Safety.

Sandi Allen, 49, of Big Spring was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident near the intersection of S. U.S. Highway 87 and FM 821, inside Glasscock County at 8:25 a.m., according to DPS reports filed with the regional office in Midland.

Injured in the accident was 23-year-old Kolton Linthicum of Odessa. According to DPS

officials, the Odessa man is listed in fair condition at a Midland hospital with lacerations to the face and a broken

According to DPS reports, Allen was traveling west on FM 821 in a 2009 GMC Yukon when she attempted to turn onto U.S. Highway 87, failing to yield the right-of-way to Linthicum, who was traveling north on U.S. Highway 87

in a 2012 Ford F-250 pickup.

Allen was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash, while Linthicum was not, according to DPS officials.

Allen was pronounced dead by Glasscock County Justice of the Peace Kay Machicek. According to Big Spring Fire Department and EMS records, Linthicum was evacuated from the scene by helicopter.

The roadway was dry at the time of the accident and no other contributing factors were listed on the accident report, which was filed by Texas DPS Trooper Jimmy Matthies.

Funeral arrangements for Allen are being handled by Myers & Smith Funeral Home.

Ethics Commission finds against city councilman Marcus Fernandez

The Texas Ethics Commission has issued a note of final resolution in the complaint against Big Spring District 1 Councilman Marcus Fernandez claiming the local politician illegally accepted campaign contributions during his 2011 bid for office. According to the report, the TEC met

Nov. 29, 2012, to consider the complaint, which was filed by local resident Joyce Crooker in March 2012. The complaints were the result of an investigative report published by the Big Spring Herald in 2011 alleging Fernandez — along with Mayor Tommy Duncan and District 3 Councilman Glen Carrigan accepted campaign contributions from corporations, which is prohibited by



Sections 253.003 and 253.094 of the Texas Election Code.

According to the TEC and published in Section IV Findings and Conclusions of Law, the commission found credible evidence of violations of Sections

Fernandez 253.003 and 253.094 of the Texas Elections Code. "On Feb. 22, 2011, the respondent

(Fernandez) filed a campaign treasurer appointment with the city of Big Spring," the notice reads. "On his campaign treasurer appointment, the respondent signed a statement stating he was aware of the restrictions in Title 15 of the Election Code on contributions from corporations or labor See ETHICS, Page 3

TxDOT begins repairs on bridge at FM 700

Big Spring — The Texas Department of Transportation will begin repairs this week to the eastbound I-20 bridge over FM 700 in Big Spring that was damaged in October by an 18-wheeler carrying a high load.

Work will include removing and replacing part of the bridge deck, replacing the damaged beams and installing guard rail. Repairs are expected to be complete by early March.

Drivers should be prepared for occasional short-term detours and reduced lanes on I-20 and FM 700 while work progresses. Some closures on FM 700 will be necessary while beams are removed and J.H. Strain and Sons Inc. of Tye will

complete the project for about \$250,000.



French lead all-night bombing campaign in Mali town of Diabaly, conquered by Islamists

BAMAKO, Mali (AP) — French forces led an allnight bombing campaign over a minuscule Malian town, not even big enough to appear on most administrative maps, in an effort to dislodge the Islamist extremists who seized the area, including its strategic military camp.

Meanwhile, a convoy of 40 to 50 armed trucks carrying French troops crossed into Mali from Ivory Coast, where they were stationed, as France prepares for a possible land assault. French President Francois Hollande launched an

attack on Mali's rebels, who are linked to al-Qaida, last week after the rebels began advancing south. France's action pre-empted a United Nationsapproved plan for a military operation in Mali, which was expected to start about nine months from now. Hollande decided a military response could not wait that long.

French officials have acknowledged that the rebels are better armed and prepared than they expected. Despite France's five-day-old aerial assault, the Islamist fighters have succeeded in gaining ground, most notably taking Diabaly on Monday, which puts them roughly 400 kilometers (250 miles) from Mali's capital, Bamako. When the air raids began last week, the closest known point they occupied was 680 kilometers (420 miles) away from the capital.

Obama weighing action on guns, still pushing assault weapons ban

WASHINGTON(AP)—Facing powerful opposition to sweeping gun regulations, President Barack Obama is weighing 19 steps that could be taken through executive action alone, congressional officials said.

Those steps could include ordering stricter action against people who lie on gun sale background checks, striking limits on federal research into gun use, ordering tougher penalties against gun trafficking, and giving schools flexibility to use grant money to improve safety.

Obama is expected to unveil his proposals as early as Wednesday, barely over a month since the massacre of 20 children and six adults at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn., thrust the gun issue into the national spotlight after years of inaction by Obama and lawmakers. At the same time Obama is vowing not to back

off his support for sweeping gun legislation that would require congressional backing — including banning assault weapons, limiting the capacity of ammunition magazines and instituting universal background checks — despite opposition from the influential gun lobby. "Will all of them get through this Congress? I don't

know," Obama said at a news conference Monday.

N.Y. agrees on 1st state gun control laws since Newtown massacre; urges states, U.S. to follow

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — New York lawmakers agreed to pass the toughest gun control law in the nation and the first since the Newtown, Conn., school shooting, and now dare other states and Washington to follow

"This is a scourge on society," Gov. Andrew Cuomo said Monday night, six days after making gun control a centerpiece of his progressive agenda in his State of the State address. The bipartisan effort was fueled by the Newton tragedy that took the lives of 20 first graders and six educators. "At what point do you say, 'No more innocent loss of

Sen. Jeffrey Klein, leader of the Independent Democratic Conference in the Senate, said it is landmark legislation. "This is not about taking anyone's rights away," said Klein, a Bronx Democrat. "It's about a safe society ... today we are setting the mark for the rest of the county to do what's right."

The measure, which calls for a tougher assault weapons ban and restrictions on ammunition and the sale of guns, passed the Senate 43-18 on the strength of support from Democrats, many of whom previously sponsored bills that were once blocked by Republicans. The Democrat-led Assembly gaveled out before midnight and planned to take

the issue up at 10 a.m. Tuesday. It is expected to

Northeastern lawmakers seeking \$50.7B Sandy aid bill face roadblocks by fiscal conservatives

pass easily.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Northeastern lawmakers hoping to push a \$50.7 billion Superstorm Sandy aid package through the House face roadblocks by fiscal conservatives seeking offsetting spending cuts to pay for recovery efforts as well as funding cuts for projects they say are unrelated. The amendments by budget hawks set up a

faceoff, with Northeast lawmakers in both parties eager to provide recovery aid for one of the worst storms ever to strike the region as the House moves toward expected votes on the emergency spending package. The base \$17 billion bill by the House

Appropriations Committee is aimed at immediate Sandy recovery needs, including \$5.4 billion for New York and New Jersey transit systems and \$5.4 billion for the Federal Emergency Management Agency's disaster relief aid fund.

Northeast lawmakers will have a chance to add to that bill with an amendment for an additional \$33.7 billion.

massacre in Newton, Conn., educators' worst nightmare — students being gunned down in their classroom — is no longer a hypothetical situation to discuss but a possibility that must be taken seriously. While Johnson was hesitant to talk

specifics on certain emergency response procedures, he did say two hot-button topics — arming of district personnel and increasing law enforcement presence around the campuses — are now on the table.

"The idea of arming teachers is something that scares me to death," Johnson said. "But I'm afraid schools are being forced to think of some things they never had to before. Will we look at some kind of policy that allows certain people on campus to carry firearms? Yes. Hopefully, we'll receive some sort of guidelines from the state in the coming weeks." With Forsan campuses being miles

away from the nearest emergency first responder, Johnson also supports the idea of increasing law enforcement presence near the district.

"We are looking into several different options," he said. "Do we have a specific plan in place? No, but we would love to have a permanent law enforcement presence in the community."

Increasing student security also is one of the driving forces behind plans for a new elementary campus which would be situated adjacent to the junior high/high school. Elbow Elementary, which is approximately 15 miles away from Forsan and roughly 10 miles away from law enforcement officials in Big Spring, has been a se-

curity concern for FISD officials for decades.

Johnson recalled when the school was forced into lockdown following an intruder alert a few years ago.

"I promise you, I did not follow the speed limit, but it still took me several minutes to get there," Johnson said. "Law enforcement did a wonderful job — they were there before I was — but it is still an area of concern

"I will feel a lot more comfortable getting the campuses more in proximity to each other," he added.

organizations. "Nevertheless,

March 3, 2011, and March 10, 2011, the respondent accepted two contributions corporations totaling \$1,200. The contributors were identified as incorporated entities on the contribution checks at issue. The respondent endorsed one of the checks. There is credible evidence of violations of Sections 253.003 and 253.094 of the Texas Elections Code."

According to campaign finance reports filed with the city of Big Spring during Fernandez's bid for office, the city councilman accepted a donation of \$1,000 from Quad A Inc. and a \$200 donation from Hydro Dynamics.

Fernandez was sanctioned by the Texas Ethics Commission as a result of the complaint.

"After considering the nature, circumstances and consequences of the violations described under Sections 3 and 4, the sanction necessary to

deter future violations, the commission imposes a \$200 civil penalty," the notice reads.

According to TEC records, Fernandez accepted the resolution agreement Dec. 16, 2012.

The TEC entered a similar agreement with Carrigan, issuing a \$200 fine. According to the campaign report submitted by Carrigan during his 2011 bid for the District 3 seat, the councilman reported receiving \$1,000 from Quad A Inc. and \$400 from Hydro Dymanics.

The complaint filed against Duncan has not yet been resolved by the TEC, however, a judgment could come as soon as February, according to paperwork received by Crooker.

While Fernandez and Carrigan can now close



Who really benefits from vouchers?

he idea our state's graduation ranking is not valid fits into a continuing effort to lobby for the use of public funds in private and forprofit charter schools in Texas.

The graduation rate question was raised by Bill Hammond, president and CEO of the Texas Association of Business. As a lobbyist for the business interests in our state, Mr. Hammond does not spend any sleepless nights concerned about the education of all students. He does dedicate a great deal of time promoting the failure of public schools while continuing to support outdated methods of student assessment. This is an effort to open the door to the use of public funds to support learning institutions not held to the same level of accountability as public schools.

Mr. Hammond is well aware the graduation rankings come from a newly adopted standardized graduation rate measurement comparing apples to apples for the nation.

His commentary came on the heels of comments by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and state Sen. Dan Patrick about a system to "rescue" public school students who are being subjected to unacceptable education. Sen. Patrick said, "Students in poverty in low-performing schools have the same right as any other Texas family." It is a good statement that no one could or should have a problem with. But questions need to be asked:

What is happening at the schools these students of poverty are going to attend under a voucher system that is different from where they are now? Answer: Private schools that will accept some of them are not held to the same standard of accountability as Texas public schools for curriculum, graduation requirements and/or mandated assessments.

If this is a better method of providing an education, why are public schools held to a set of inhibiting requirements? If the state's system is the best method of measuring success in education, it stands to reason every student in Texas should be held to that standard to ensure the best-educated workforce for our economy. But this campaign is not about what is best for all students in the state. It is about tax savings for entities that support the senator and an agenda to move state tax dollars into private school systems and the families that already have students

Will all disadvantaged students have an opportunity to benefit from this system? No. The students most effected by poverty will not be able to pay the difference between the voucher and tuition. Students in rural areas will not have a non-public school to exercise the "choice" offered to some. Students with disabilities, both physical and instructional, will be left out because the private school can choose whom it will accept. So the plan promoted by Patrick and Dewhurst will most benefit those students already enrolled in private schools and a select few others who may be accepted. This is not a plan for Texas, it is a plan for loyal donors to the party.

What is a low-performing school? For most people, the term brings visions of chaos in the classroom. Actually, a school campus or district will be labeled academically unacceptable if any sub-population of students by race, language or economic status numbers more than 30 and fails to meet the minimum standard on the state-approved assessment instrument. So "low performing" is an indication that as few as 30 students did not do well on a one-shot, multiple choice, bubble sheet exam that has no relevance to what the majority of experts in education are promoting as 21st century learning.

The Texas Legislature does not have a constitutional responsibility to grow the private school industry and promote the success of private sector educational enterprises. It is expected and required to abide by the Constitution of the State of Texas, which makes it the duty of the state "to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

The faculty, staff and administrators of Texas public schools are not opposed to scrutiny, accountability and/or competition with any other educational entity. We are opposed to being held to a completely different standard and then being labeled "failing.' Every challenge that has been placed before us has been successfully completed and that will continue to be the case.

Remember when Obama told an open-borders crowd that he couldn't enact the DREAM Act without Congress, only to change course shortly thereafter and implement many of its provisions via executive order? He got away with that, so why

not try the same thing with guns? It's not just his proposed actions that are unconstitutional; so is his method of imposing them. Vice President Joe Biden said Obama could and would take executive action to change the law. In his gun control initiative,

Obama is planning on using the same tactics of corporate bribery and cronyism he used to buy off major opponents of Obamacare. His ploy is to craft the law in a way that will benefit businesses, such as Wal-Mart, that sell guns.

If you are operating under the assumption that this nation is still operating under the old checks and balances system established in the Constitution that leftist professors are now openly condemning as obsolete, then you haven't been keeping up with Obama's pattern of governance through administrative regulations.

Tom Donohue, the CEO of the

Chamber of Commerce, described the tsunami of new regulations coming out of Washington: 447 new rules are planned for the Dodd-Frank financial reform law, and you can be sure they'll function to thwart, as much as facilitate, the law's stated purposes. Obamacare's massive regulations will impose federal control over aspects of our lives not remotely contemplated by the Framers.

The EPA isn't iust an unchecked regulatory agency issuing its edicts outside the reach of normal accountability; reports have surfaced dem-

onstrating collusion between this corrupt, politicized agency and environmental activists.

Meanwhile, Obama is also gratuitously rubbing our faces in the dirt with his recent appointments. He nominated Chuck Hagel for secretary of defense despite Hagel's unmasked hostility toward Israel and his softness on Iran — and then trotted out the hapless Jay Carney to deny both, effectively imploring us to abandon our rational and sensory faculties.

He is appointing White House chief of staff Jack Lew to replace Timothy Geithner as treasury secretary. Lew is widely known to be a strong liberal and partisan Democrat who, according to a senior House GOP aide, "has consistently stood in the way of efforts to deal with our debt and deficit." He reportedly approaches these issues with the same uncompromising militancy Obama does, issuing his demands and repeating them over and over while refusing to listen.

Obama also intends to appoint John Brennan as his new CIA director. Brennan told us in 2009 that Obama doesn't describe our fight against iihadis as a "war on terrorism." He said that we need not only to defeat al-Qaida and its allies but to address ignorance, poverty and repression and that we should reach out to "moderate" elements of the Hezbollah terror group. By putting off dramatic cuts in spending and raising taxes only on the most cushioned Americans, Obama has avoided what made the fiscal cliff so scary the specter of draining over \$500 billion from a still-weak economy. A second round of recession could have followed, with the blame bouncing back to Obama and the Democrats.

Some liberals balk at setting such a high income level for let-

ting income-tax rates rise. They are correct that more people should be paying more taxes. But they should understand that taxation is partly a mind game. Breaking through the right's icebound stand that taxes should not rise for anyone ever was no mean achievement.

Complaints that this and only a handful of other tax changes basically enshrine the reckless tax-cutting of the Bush era miss the point. Nothing is forever, and now the very rich have less incentive to propagandize against raising taxes lower down the income scale as a means to protect their own rates.

Be mindful that support for government programs, such as Medicare, depends on more than the level of benefits provided. It also relies on taxpayers feeling they are getting more value for their dollars — and that the money is there. Obama has been taking quiet steps to start restoring fiscal balance, while preserving the essence of worthy government programs. These changes haven't grabbed the big headlines, but over time, they will build confidence that America can have well-run public programs and fiscal sanity at the

same time. Some examples: This week's fiscal deal continues the good fight, started by the Affordable Care Act, to curb waste and abuse in health care spending. For instance, it lowers Medicare payments to doctors who give more than one therapy session to a single patient in a single day. At the same time, it

stopped the scheduled 26.5 per-

cent cuts in Medicare payments to doctors, guarding patients'

access to care. Obama may nominate Chuck Hagel as defense secretary, another move toward rethinking priorities. The former Republican senator from Nebraska has long questioned America's bloated defense budgets and penchant for carelessly sending Americans into foreign battle. A decorated Vietnam veteran, fiscal conservative and independent thinker, Hagel has the credibility to oversee paring the

defense budget in a rational way. Another reason for optimism is Obama's statement that he will not let anyone use threats to America's credit rating as a bargaining tool, as he did in 2011. "While I will negotiate over many things," he said, "I will not have another debate with this Congress over whether or not they should pay the bills they've already racked up through the laws they have passed." Mr. President, hold that thought.

As a final reality test, my unhappy liberal friends, listen to the groaning on the right. Do that, and you'll conclude: Obama did good.

Learning a lesson from a falcon mexicanus

eisurely reading the morning paper **⊿** on New Year's Eve was a luxury. With the unexpected ringing of the doorbell, our day suddenly changed.

Fortunately, there are tall, narrow windows

on either side of our front door. From that vantage could easily be seen an Animal Control truck parked at the curb.

"Where is the

officer?" I thought. Perhaps the person had walked back toward the truck and was in front of our garage.

Because she had been standing directly in front of our door, I had not seen Amanda. Upon opening it, we discovered she had brought us another bird. A looksee through the gate of her carrier indicated a raptor. "Where did you get it?" I asked. "At the corner of Third and

Over the glossy black eyes that glared back at me were faint white streaks. Leading downward from the back of each eye was a white patch. Parallel to the white were dark brown streaks located just under the center of its eyes. "Could it be?" I wondered.

In contrast to the light-brown, barred feathers of its upper part was its creamywhite underside streaked with brown spots. After Art had opened the gate, my gloved hands pressed

the raptor's wings to its body. Withdrawing it from the carrier, I rotated the bird just enough to look at the sides of its beak.

The "tooth," or sharp point on the beak as it curved upward from the tip, was a defining identification mark known only to falcons. Turning to Art, I told him, "We have another one." To Amanda, I said, "You have brought us a prairie falcon."

Another noticeable sign, and to be sure of what we had, would be found on the underside of its wings. After laying the bird on a towel, Art covered its head and helped spread its wings. Where the wings joined the body, the "armpits" were black. It was definitely a falcon mexicanus.

Telling her we had dealt with another "prairie" found in downtown Lamesa in November, we were both excited and worried about having two within a month and a half. "What happened?"

As Amanda had approached the intersection, she noticed the falcon on top of a car. Realizing that was not normal, she had stopped and left the truck. By that time, the raptor was hopping on the bed cover of a pickup. Hurrying back to her vehicle for her gloves, she returned to find the bird of prey on the pavement.

Trying to elude the officer, the falcon made several attempts at becoming airborne. Unable to use its legs and feet to propel itself high enough for its flapping wingtips to keep from



With a wingspan of three feet that gives it the ability to dash through the sky with rapid strokes, the prairie falcon frequents the western half of the United States. In addition to small birds, the raptor, with its swift, low flight hunts for small mammals, such as ground squirrels, mice, rabbits and young prairie dogs.

hitting the asphalt, the bird of prey had failed on every try. It was obvious the bird was too weak to fly.

Feeling of its breastbone or keel, we confirmed what she had observed. With no surrounding body fat, the keel felt like the edge of a dull razor. As Amanda prepared to leave, we told her without her help, the bird would have died from starva-

While wrapped in a towel, the falcon first received fluids. Then it was placed in a carrier. Two hours later it was fed minced mice and beef heart. Since it was probably too weak to tear food or even interested in eating it, and not wanting to "manhandle" it, I used a hemostat to place each morsel at the back of its throat.

Fortunately, this falcon and many raptors open their mouths defensively when approached. The trick is to get them to do it.

With mouth agape, food was quickly placed far enough back to cause the bird to swallow it. Bite, by bite, the prairie falcon and I accomplished its first feeding. Time consuming but worthwhile, the feeding process was repeated later in the day.

With the New Year came the hope it would take food from a platter. An hour later that morning, I discovered it was not going to eat on its own. It had, however, taken every bite of mouse and beef and scattered it throughout its carrier.

As it watched me gather each uneaten morsel, my only thought was that, hopefully, it would begin to take the initiative. It was not to be.

In the late afternoon, the raptor had its second meal. At least it was now readily swallowing each offering.

Having looked at the weather reports for the week, we decided the next day, January 2, to deliver the prairie falcon to Gail Barnes in Lubbock. After weighing

it, she confirmed it was well below its normal weight. Handing me a hemostat, she held the bird while I repeated the feeding regimen. For several days the falcon continued to require the same procedure, but at least now it was grabbing its food.

When I checked back with

Amanda to tell her the falcon had been delivered to the wildlife center in Lubbock, she said, "There's another one, but it's flying." After telling me of its location, I mentioned that the species readily eats smaller birds. Since seagulls, blackbirds, sparrows, and pigeons frequent the site, this third "prairie" was apparently catching enough to sustain it.

"The one you brought me on New Year's Eve was probably trying to catch some of the pigeons downtown." As we closed our conversation, she said she'd keep an eye on the latest one.

Then the afternoon of January 5, Gail called to say she had taken the falcon out into the barn to a large room. Wanting to see what the bird would do, she waited. The raptor just stood and stared at her in return.

For the first time,

she noticed that one of its wings was slightly higher than the other. After capturing it, she started feeling every part of its wing. What was not visible hid under creamy white feathers.

A gap in the skin appeared to be slowly healing. There was enough of an opening to see the tendons inside. Fortunately, there was no evidence of any infection or bleeding. Gail now realized why the bird couldn't fly.

Even though we had both examined the wings, we had found no evidence of a fracture or external injury. We had made an assumption that the bird was too weak to fly because of lack of food.

Instead, its injury had prevented it from hunting at all. Designed for speed, its long wings could no longer enable it to glide or hover in pursuit of its next meal A veterinarian would determine whether sutures were needed or to let the wound heal with time. Only this soft tissue injury, or bruising, was found after a full

body-scan and x-rays. Even though I had momentarily thought I was "seeing double" when having handled a falcon from Dawson county, and then another from downtown Big Spring, the experience gave all of us an insight into the dangers encountered by migratory raptors.

Court: Escape from Greek lockup justified

THESSALONIKI, Greece (AP) — A group of illegal immigrants was justified in escaping from a police lockup last year because of the miserable conditions in their overcrowded cell, which was filthy, ridden with disease and had no running water, a Greek court has ruled.

The court in the northwestern city of Igoumenitsa said the 15 adults from Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria, Egypt and Morocco — had been held for up to six weeks in "wretched and highly dangerous" conditions.

The decision to acquit the migrants of escaping police detention is a strong indictment of Greece's treatment of detained illegal immigrants, which has been criticized by international human rights groups.

A spokeswoman for the United Nations refugee agency in Athens said it was a very significant first for a Greek court to acknowledge that people held in such conditions had no option but to try to escape.

The country, grappling with revived anti-immigrant sentiment amid the worst financial crisis since the end of World War II, is the main entry point to the EU for thousands of undocumented migrants from Asia and Africa and has started a drive to round up and expel them.

More than 30 inmates were crammed into an 18-square-yard cell with no running water or bedding and just one chemical toilet, according to the ruling. It said the Igoumenitsa lockup was never cleaned and the detainees were coping with lice, skin disease and typhoid.

The men had been held in the port city pending deportation for allegedly illegally entering the country, and they escaped on Oct. 1 by pushing past police guards.

Judge Athanassios Terzoudis argued in his October ruling that both the duration and the conditions of their detention were in breach of the European Convention on Human Rights.

"Therefore, the court judges that (the detainees) escaped to avoid a severe and otherwise inevitable threat which — through no fault of their own - endangered their health."

Collison leads balanced Mavs over T'Wolves

DALLAS — Darren Collison now runs the floor where J.J. Barea was the spark that helped rally the Dallas Mavericks to their first championship two seasons ago.

Dallas' new point guard made sure one of his predecessors didn't finish off another comeback Monday night.

Collison led six players in double figures with 23 points and the Mavericks matched their season high with a third straight win, holding off a pair of Barea-engineered surges in a 113-98 victory over the Minnesota Timberwolves.

"I felt like we were going to attack," said Collison, who also had nine assists and three steals.

That used to be Barea's job coming off the bench in Dallas, until he became a starter midway through the 2011 NBA finals on Dallas' home court and helped erase a 2-1 series deficit against Miami.

He was finally back on that floor after sitting out Minnesota's first two trips with injuries since signing as a free agent when Mavericks owner Mark Cuban decided not to bring back several key pieces of the title team.

The diminutive guard is a reserve again, and he had former teammate Dirk Nowitzki and others chasing him all over the court while running the pick-and-roll and scoring 11 second-quarter points. He led the Timberwolves with 21 and was on the floor for a second-half rally that cut a 23-point deficit to eight.

"I have a lot of good history here," said Barea, who made 4 of 7 from 3-point range and added five assists. "I hit a couple of shots early so I just kept being aggressive the whole game. I always try to bring a lot of energy off the bench and help my team as much as I can."

Autopsy: Chief's LB Belcher drunk at time of murder-suicide

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Kansas City Chiefs linebacker Jovan Belcher had a blood-alcohol level more than twice the legal limit when he shot his girlfriend nine times and then killed himself in front of his coach and general manager, an autopsy released Monday showed.

The Jackson County Medical Examiner report on Belcher, 25, raised new questions about whether police should have done more before the Dec. 1 murder-suicide. Officers found Belcher sleeping in his idling car about five hours earlier, but let him go inside a nearby apartment to sleep it off.

At the time of the autopsy, Belcher's BAC was 0.17, more than twice the limit of 0.08 percent for Missouri drivers, and it was likely higher when he shot girlfriend Kasandra Perkins, 22, at the couple's Kansas City home.

A police report released previously said Belcher had gone out the night before with a woman he was dating on the side while Perkins attended a concert with her friends.

Police who found Belcher sleeping in his Bentley outside the woman's apartment told him to turn off the ignition and he complied, the report

The report said Belcher "initially displayed possible signs of being under the influence (asleep and disoriented)." But the report added that after a few minutes of being awake his "demeanor and communication became more fluid and coherent." The report added that officers didn't smell alcohol on Belcher, and that there were no signs of him being "violent or emotionally unstable."

Under both city ordinance and state law, it is illegal to operate a motor vehicle while intoxicated, city prosecutor Lowell C. Gard said in an email.

Armstrong confesses doping to Oprah

AUSTIN, Texas — Lance Armstrong has finally come

Armstrong confessed to doping during an interview with Oprah Winfrey taped Monday, just a couple of hours after a wrenching apology to staff at the Livestrong charity he founded and has now been forced to surrender.

The day ended with 2 1/2 hours of questions from Winfrey at a downtown Austin hotel, where she said the world's most famous cyclist was "forthcoming" as she asked him in detail about doping allegations that followed him throughout his seven Tour de France vic-

Speaking on "CBS This Morning," Winfrey said Tues-

day she had not planned to address Armstrong's confession before the interview aired on her OWN network but, "by the time I left Austin and landed in Chicago, you all had already confirmed it."

"So I'm sitting here now because it's already been confirmed," she added.

The session was to be broadcast on Thursday but Winfrey said it will now run in two parts over two nights because there is so much material.

Winfrey would not characterize whether Armstrong seemed contrite but said he seemed ready for the interview. "I would say that he met the moment," she said.

"I don't think 'emotional' begins to describe the intensity or the difficulty he experienced in talking about some of these

The confession was a stunning reversal for a proud athlete and celebrity who sought lavish praise in the court of public opinion and used courtrooms to punish his critics.

For more than a decade, Armstrong dared anybody who challenged his version of events to prove it. Finally, he told the tale himself after promising over the weekend to answer Winfrey's questions "directly, honestly and candidly."

The cyclist was stripped of his Tour titles, lost most of his endorsements and was forced to leave Livestrong last year after the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency issued a damning, 1,000-page report that accused him of masterminding a

He added another nine tackles, including $1\frac{1}{2}$ sacks and three tackles for losses with two passes defended in Houston's two postseason games.

long-running doping scheme.

The International Cycling Union, or UCI, issued a statement on Tuesday saying it was aware of the reports that Armstrong had confessed to Winfrey. The governing body for the sport urged Armstrong to tell his story to an independent commission it has set up to examine claims it covered up suspicious samples from the cyclist, accepted financial donations from him and helped him avoid detection in doping tests.

Armstrong started Monday with a visit to the headquarters of Livestrong, the charity he founded in 1997 and turned into a global force on the strength of his athletic dominance and personal story of surviving testicular cancer that had spread to his lungs and brain.

About 100 Livestrong staff members gathered in a conference room as Armstrong told them "I'm sorry." He choked up during a 20-minute talk, expressing regret for the long-running controversy tied to performance-enhancers had caused, but stopped short of admitting he used them.

Before he was done, several members were in tears when he urged them to continue the charity's mission, helping cancer patients and their families.

"Heartfelt and sincere," is how Livestrong

spokeswoman Katherine McLane described his speech.

Armstrong later huddled with almost a dozen people before stepping into a room set up at a downtown Austin hotel for the interview with Winfrey. The group included close friends and lawyers. They exchanged handshakes and smiles, but declined comment.

Winfrey has promoted her interview, one of the biggest for OWN since she launched the network in 2011, as a "no-holds barred" session, and after the voluminous USADA report which included testimony from 11 former teammates — she said she went into the session with 112 questions ready to go. Not all of them were asked, she said, but many were.

USADA chief executive Travis Tygart, a longtime critic of Armstrong's, called the drug regimen practiced while Armstrong led the U.S. Postal Service team "the most sophisticated, professionalized successful doping program that sport has ever seen." USADA did not respond to requests for comment about Armstrong's confession.

For years, Armstrong went after his critics ruthlessly during his reign as cycling champion. He scolded some in public and didn't hesitate to punish outspoken riders during the race itself. He waged legal battles against still others in court.

At least one of his opponents, the London-based Sunday Times, has already filed a lawsuit to recover about \$500,000 it paid him to settle a libel case, and Dallas-based SCA Promotions, which tried to deny Armstrong a promised bonus for a Tour de France win, has threatened to bring another lawsuit seeking to recover more than \$7.5 million awarded by an arbitration panel.

In Australia, the government of South Australia state said Tuesday it will seek the repayment of several million dollars in appearance fees paid to Armstrong for competing in the Tour Down Under in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

"We'd be more than happy for Mr. Armstrong to make any repayment of monies to us," South Australia Premier Jay Weatherill





A Matter of Probabilities



Pass * strong, artificial ** negative

Opening lead jack of diamonds.

When declarer has more than one way to play a hand, he should select the approach most likely to succeed. If he has no reliable clues from the bidding or early play to guide him. he should rely mostly on probabili-

In today's deal, declarer didn't follow the indicated probability and failed as a result. He took the diamond lead with the ace, led a low trump to dummy's eight and finessed the queen of hearts. West won with the king, whereupon the defenders cashed two diamonds and shifted to a

Declarer won with the ace, cashed the heart ace, crossed to the nine of spades and ruffed a heart high, but when the suit failed to divide 3-3, he had to lose a club at the end for down one. South's line of play depended pri-

marily on the 50 percent chance that East had the king of hearts, or (if the that the heart suit would break 3-3 about a 68 percent combined probability. However, he missed a different method of play that offered a much After taking the ace of diamonds,

South should have played the A-Q of hearts! In the actual deal, West wins with the king, and the defense collects two diamond tricks before shifting to a club.

South wins, leads a spade to the eight, ruffs a heart high, leads a

spade to the nine, ruffs another heart high (establishing dummy's fifth heart as a trick) and later discards his jack of clubs on the eight of hearts, using the spade queen as an entry.

This line of play succeeds whenever the hearts are divided 3-3 (36 percent) or 4-2 (48 percent), assuming no worse than a 3-1 trump split. The resulting 84 percent chance of a favorable heart division is much more attractive than the line South actually adopted. In effect, declarer plays as though his heart holding were the A-x rather than the A-Q.


