Assault death investigated as homicide

Local law enforcement officials are investigating an assault that led to the death of a Big Spring man earlier this week. Daniel Flores, 44,

Tuesday evening outside his Second Street residence by Howard Coun-Flores ty Justice of the Peace Quail Dobbs after family members discovered his body, according to officials with the Big Spring Police Department.




"Tuesday, at approximately 6:03 p.m., officers were dispatched to an unattended death at 1407 W. Second Street," Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the BSPD, said. "Officers were met by family members of the deceased and advised Flores had been found sitting in the passenger seat of an old vehicle on the family property and had passed away."

Everett said an initial investigation showed Flores had suffered severe trauma prior to his death.

"The investigation revealed

Nelda Lois Callarman



Nelda Lois Callarman died Sunday morning, Feb. 17, 2013, at Vitas Hospice in San Antonio. After suffering two aneurysms on Christmas Eve at home in Big Spring, she spent six weeks in the hospital and rehabilitation clinics in Lubbock and San Antonio before moving to hospice one week ago.

Nelda was born Sept. 7, 1931, in Levelland, Texas. She was the sec-

ond of O.C. and Allie Belle Richards' four children and is survived by her three siblings, LaVerne Sandlin Davis of Birmingham, Ala. And Winona Herrin and David Richards, both of Phoenix, Ariz.

She attended Texas Women's College and transferred to Texas Tech, graduating with a bachelor's degree in 1952. She began her teaching career in Portales, N.M. and then taught in Lovington, Jal and Hobbs, N.M. and Andrews, Texas. In 1962, she married Eldon Callarman. They lived in Hobbs until 1973 when they moved to Big Spring. She taught elementary school until her retirement in 1982 and maintained a close circle of teacher friends who met together for lunch weekly long after their careers came to an end.

Nelda and Eldon loved to travel and took many trips around the United States. Over the course of her lifetime, Nelda visited all 50 states and together, the couple explored state parks in Texas and all of the great national parks in the United States. When Eldon died in 2010, she missed him terribly but received a warm welcome from a group of ladies at College Baptist Church in Big Spring.

Family and friends mattered very much to Nelda and she took great care to stay in touch. She learned enough about computers to become an active e-mailer, but those who loved her still cherished receiving her hand-written letters in perfectly elegant script.

In addition to her siblings, she is survived by 18 nieces and nephews; her devoted brother-in-law, David Callarman, of Cisco, Texas; and two sistersin-law, Priscilla Callarman, of Dallas and Martha Callarman of Athens, Texas.

A memorial service will be held at College Baptist Church at 11 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 21, 2013. Pastor Ken McMeans will officiate. Interment will be in the Oakwood Cemetery in Cisco, Texas.



DPS targets cold case slaying investigations

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Department of Public Safety has expanded its efforts to solve cold case slayings by offering an online update on a dozen investigations.

DPS officials on Wednesday unveiled the Texas Rangers unsolved homicides webpage featuring two cases from each of the agency's six regions. The public will have the opportunity to submit tips or other information online via the webpage.

Director Steve McCraw says DPS wants to send a clear message that investigators are not giving up on the victims.

Texas Rangers and local law enforcement agencies will also take another look at evidence and persons of interest. Many of the unsolved cases involve smaller or rural law enforcement agencies.

Prayers Monday for Native American bones in Texas

PHARR, Texas (AP) — Prayers will be offered Monday for some Native American bones found at a South Texas construction site and reburied by

The Monitor newspaper reported Thursday that the ground-blessing ceremony in Pharr will be done by the Lipan Apache tribe. Tribal official Robert Soto says the bones are not

believed to be from his tribe but his group plans the ceremony because Native Americans feel the ground has been desecrated. Work to expand a retirement community was

stopped when the bones were discovered Feb. 11. Police contacted anthropologists, the Texas Historical Commission and tribal leaders about the bones believed to be several hundred years old.

Soto says police and the company have been accommodating. Police on Wednesday reburied the bones near the original location and an officer said prayers.

'Victory or Death' letter returns to the Alamo

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — William Barret Travis

letter vowing "Victory or Death" and pleading for help for his besieged forces at the Alamo will return for the first time to where it was penned for a two-week public viewing.

Travis' Feb. 24, 1836, letter addressed to "the People of Texas and All Americans in the World" will get a police escort to the Alamo on Friday from the state archive in Austin, where it is kept. A courier on horseback smuggled the single-page

letter from the old Spanish mission where Travis and his men had taken up defense against Mexican army forces sent to put down their rebellion. It was widely published in newspapers and pamphlets, but too late to help the roughly 180 men defending the Alamo, who were all killed.

Suspected illegal immigrants found in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Law officers in Houston who answered a call about a kidnapping have detained at least 30 suspected illegal immigrants found at an apparent stash house. Houston police and federal agents early Thursday

responded to a call from the parents of a woman allegedly smuggled across the border with Mexico. Police spokesman Chris Hassig says the relatives

agreed to pay a certain sum for the transfer but then the smugglers demanded more cash and threatened to hurt the woman. The family then called police. Further information wasn't immediately avail-

able on whether any suspected smugglers were caught. Houston police say one man suffered minor injuries when he attacked an officer while try-Immigration officials will work to determine the

identities and homelands of the detainees.

State Senate panel mulls charter school expansion

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Senate education panel is discussing sweeping legislation to expand charter schools in Texas.

State Sen. Dan Patrick filed Senate Bill 2 this week, and the Education Committee the Houston Republican chairs is reviewing it Thursday. The measure would lift the current limit of 215

licenses to operate charter schools statewide and create a special oversight board. It also seeks to allow charter schools to receive public money for facilities expenses, not just for operations as under present state law.

Charter schools already educate about 135,000 of the 5 million-plus Texas public school students. Patrick has made increasing "school choice" a signature issue, though traditional school leaders are

Past efforts to overhaul Texas charter school laws have fizzled, not drawing much support from either

Linn buying Berry Petroleum for about \$2.5B HOUSTON (AP) — Linn Energy is buying the

drilling company Berry Petroleum Co. for stock worth about \$2.5 billion. Linn, an oil and gas producer, said Thursday that the deal will broaden its presence in California, the

Permian Basin, Texas and the Rockies and boost its production by 30 percent. Its estimated proved reserves will be increased by 34 percent. As part of the transaction, a Linn affiliate will issue 1.25 shares for each outstanding Berry share. That values Denver-based Berry's stock at almost

\$46.24 per share, a 19.8 percent premium to Berry's closing price on Wednesday. The companies value the deal at \$4.3 billion including assumed debt.

Berry will be converted into a limited liability company as part of the transaction and Linn affiliate LinnCo will give the Berry assets to Linn Energy in exchange for units of Linn Energy. LinnCo, based in Houston, went public in October.

Garland boy, 3, dies after being shot at home

GARLAND, Texas (AP) — Police say a 3-year-old Dallas-area boy has died after being shot in the head while at his home. Garland police are investigating circumstances

of Wednesday night's shooting while both parents and at least two other children were at the residence. Police say one of the parents called 911. Officer Joe Harn says police are trying to deter-

mine whether the shooting was an accident and if anyone will be charged. Harn says there's no record of previous violence reported at the home.

The name of the boy and further details on the investigation weren't immediately released.

Oversight needed for drone strikes

t's safe to say that if a Republican president carried out as many drone attacks as Barack Obama, Democrats and liberals would be howling. But you barely hear a peep from them.

Finally, though, some congressional scrutiny has been put on Obama's use of state-sponsored assassinations, and it's about time.

The Obama administration has carried out hundreds of drone strikes in Pakistan alone, far more than authorized under President George W. Bush. The administration is tracking and executing terrorists based on secret intelligence — and the president's final approval.

Attacks also have been carried out in Somalia and Yemen and, at times, American citizens have been targeted. As commander in chief, Obama has a lot of latitude in the war against terrorism, but even presidential powers aren't

The strikes are supposed to be carried out only if subjects pose a "continuing and imminent threat" to the United States. But a Justice Department memo, first reported by NBC News, diminishes that requirement by suggesting a strike does not require U.S. authorities to conclude that a specific attack will take place "in the immediate future."

A bipartisan group of U.S. senators wants the Obama administration to cite all its legal opinions underlying the authority to use drones, especially to kill American citizens. This should be the first step toward a much clearer policy.

The public should be greatly concerned there is no judicial procedure in place, no due process and no oversight regarding the use of drones. In contrast, Congress has set up a secret court to review and approve surveillance warrants, including the wiretapping of suspected terrorists. Having some type of judicial review in place before the government orders a death strike makes sound legal and moral sense.

Drone technology and its use are bound to grow; indeed, drones are effective tools, allowing the administration to target terrorists, limit civilian casualties and keep our armed forces out of harm's way in the process. Such attacks have been carried out against terrorists connected to the attack at Fort Hood in Texas and to the failed "underwear bomb" plot, both

Obama and future presidents will undoubtedly continue the program, and the federal government also is bolstering its "domestic drone" strategy, for observation purposes for our aviation system and at our borders.

As this technology continues to expand, it's imperative the government put sensible guidelines in place, including a reasonable system of checks and balances. The potential for abuse through this program is alarming and should be headed off now.

Presidents demand a certain amount of privacy to do the people's

business and also to relax in a job that becomes more and more demanding in an increasingly complex and dangerous world.

The White House press corps, which for the most part is very hard working and highly skilled, believes it has something akin to a sacred duty, enshrined by the Constitution, to inform the public.

There is another dynamic at work: TV and still photographers need pictures. Radio people need sound. A print reporter can recreate an event by interviewing people and stitching a story together, but the electronic media need the shot or the bite. So this weekend was a disaster.

The president decided to stiff the press during one of his golf outings, which is not unusual. But this weekend was different. Without announcing it in advance, President Obama played 18 holes with Tiger Woods at an exclusive resort in Florida. But Obama's traveling press pool was kept in the dark and far away.

In his first term, when Obama played separate rounds of golf with Bill Clinton and House Speaker John Boehner, the press pool had been allowed some access and pictures.

So why not with Tiger Woods? Especially since a reporter from Golf Digest and Golf World, who was apparently a member of the

private club, saw the two men and did tweet after tweet about

The White House press corps was furious, and the press quickly struck back.

Two story lines emerged: First, a president who had once promised to be "transparent" was not acting that way, and second, the White House was behaving as if it didn't want any pictures of Obama and a man who had gone through a very messy marital breakup. Ed Henry of Fox News, acting

in his capacity as president of the White House Correspondents' Association (of which I am an associate member), issued a gale force statement:

"A broad cross section of our members from print, radio, online and TV have today expressed extreme frustration to me about having absolutely no access to the president of the United States this entire week-

There is a very simple but important principle we will continue to fight for today and in the days ahead: transparency."

Later, Henry told me in a phone interview: "It was a direct but respectful message saying we want access, period. The president was playing not with me or you or Joe Schmoe, but a celebrity and one of the most controversial figures in sport because of his own issues. Was the White House a little nervous about putting a photo of him and Tiger Woods out there?'

The Associated Press had this as the fourth paragraph in its story on Sunday: "The White House, which has promised to be the most open and transparent in history, has prohibited any media coverage of Obama's golf outing."

The story also stated: "It seems Obama and Woods — the first black men at the top of their respective fields — have spent the past few years inching toward Sunday's meeting on the fair-

In other words, it was a historic meeting for reasons of race, and therefore, by implication, the press pool should have been allowed to record the moment.

At the very top of the "NBC Nightly News With Brian Williams" on Monday, Williams made the golf outing his second tease. Eight minutes into the newscast, Williams introduced the golf story with the headline "Getting Away" and said the president had showed a "a desire to stay out of camera range."

Andrea Mitchell, one of NBC's most respected reporters, then took over, saying the press had been "locked out," and she raised the possibility that the White House did not want pictures of the president "with a controversial figure like Tiger Woods." The story lasted about three minutes, which is a pretty long time for the evening news.

After the president got back to Washington and was walking into the White House later Monday evening, there was this pool report: "As the president walked close by, a group of reporters yelled, in unison, 'Did you beat Tiger?!?' He appeared to hear over the helicopter engines, but just smiled and continued on inside."

The White House denied that it had done anything wrong or even unusual and was only doing, as one wag put it, what was par for the course.

"But this has nothing to do really with golf," Ed Henry told me. "That's trivial. We're taking a stand: We're relevant. We represent not just our news organizations, but we represent history and the American people. That might sound hokey, but that's why we're here.

The Democrat-controlled House passed a statewide ban on concealed-carry weapons on college campuses, along with several other extreme gun-control measures that will undermine citizen safety and drive dozens of businesses out of the state.

Condescending Democratic Rep. Joe Salazar of Colorado asserted that young women can't be trusted to assess threatening situations at their colleges or universities: "It's why we have call boxes, it's why we have safe zones, it's why we have the whistles," Salazar said during floor debate. "Because you just don't know who you're gonna be shooting at. And you don't know if you feel like you're gonna be raped, or if you feel like someone's been following you around, or if you feel like you're in trouble when you may actually not be..." Colorado Sen. Jessie Ulibarri,

another elitist Democrat, argued that instead of firing back at a crazed gunman, innocent vic-

"ballpoint pens" to stab him when he stops to reload. Colorado Rep. Paul Rosenthal, another Democrat, told women to rely on the "buddy system" instead. And on Tuesday, after personally lobbying Colorado Democrats to restrict self-defense options, Vice President Joe Biden blithely dismissed a woman's concerns about family security. He advised her, "You don't need an AR-15" — even though it is the long arm of choice of three million law-abiding citizens, half of whom are veterans, law enforcement officers or both.

The presumptuous paternalism of gun-grabbing male Democrats is not confined to the political arena. On college campuses across the country, the literal disarming of women is standard operating procedure.

At the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, officials advise women that "passive resistance may be your best defense." The school's recommendation to girls: "Tell your attacker that you have a disease or are menstruating."

If that fails, it's time to deploy other assault bodily fluids! No joke. UCCS seriously advises potential victims: "Vomiting or urinating may also convince the

attacker to leave you alone." In a quick survey of campus tips for women, Twitchy.com editor Jenn Taylor notes that at the State University of New York at Plattsburgh, women are also told that "passive resistance (vomiting, urinating, telling the attacker you're diseased or menstruating) may be your best defense." The University of Wisconsin Oshkosh tells girls to "(c) ry or create a scene of emotional or mental instability." Instead of a Glock, the school prefers students take a page from "Glee." Yes, ladies, when you fear for

your lives, it's time to engage in

theatrics by faking a "faint" or "seizure." And at Oregon State female students are advised to tell sexual predators they are "sick or pregnant," because guns and knives are banned on campus.

As I've noted before, colleges and universities have become coddle industries. Big Nanny administrators oversee speech codes, segregated dorms, politically correct academic departments and designated "safe spaces" to protect students selectively from speech the left deems "hateful." Instead of teaching students to defend their beliefs, American educators shield them from vigorous intellectual debate. As the erosion of intellectual self-defense goes, so goes the erosion of physical selfdefense. Instead of encouraging autonomy, our higher institutions of learning stoke passivity and conflict-avoidance.

Where are the War on Women warriors of the left when you need them? Paging Ashley Judd Eva Longoria, Sandra Fluke and every indignant feminist who (rightly) took Todd "legitimate rape" Akin to task — as I did last fall. The sexist stance of gun-grabbers goes far beyond Akin-esque junk science about magical wombs that can prevent pregnancy. The idea that women can't be trusted to know when they are at risk takes direct aim at their very sovereignty and security.

It's anti-self-determination. It's anti-freedom. It's anti-choice.

Obama administration considers urging Supreme Court to overturn California gay marriage ban

WASHINGTON (AP) — Facing heightened expectations from gay rights supporters, the Obama administration is considering urging the Supreme Court to overturn California's ban on gay marriage — a move that could have a far-reaching impact on same-sex couples across the country. The administration has one week to file a friend-

of-the-court brief with the justices outlining its opinion on the California ban, known as Proposition 8. While an administration brief alone is unlikely to sway the high court, the government's opinion does carry weight with the justices.

Opponents of the Proposition 8 ban believe the president signaled his intention to file a brief when he declared in last month's inaugural address that gays and lesbians must be "treated like anyone else under the law." An administration official said Obama — a former constitutional law professor – was not foreshadowing any legal action in his remarks and was simply restating his personal belief in the right of gays and lesbians to marry, though the official said the administration was considering filing a brief.

The Proposition 8 ballot initiative was approved by California voters in 2008 in response to a state Supreme Court decision that had allowed gay marriage. Twenty-nine other states have constitutional amendments banning gay marriage, while nine states and Washington, D.C., recognize same-sex marriage.

Solicitor General Donald Verrilli is consulting with the White House on the matter, according to a senior administration official, who spoke only on condition of anonymity because the official was not authorized to address the private deliberations publicly.

Winter storm gathers strength as it pushes into Great Plains, blamed for fatal Oklahoma crash

ST. LOUIS (AP) — An armada of snow plows and salt spreaders deployed Wednesday on highways across the nation's heartland working to stay ahead of a powerful winter storm that already is blamed for one road death.

Winter storm warnings were issued from Colorado through Illinois, with as much as a foot of snow expected in several areas.

Kelly Sugden, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Dodge City, Kan., said early Thursday morning that the storm was moving a bit slower than was previously forecast but that it was "starting to get back together." "It's very active," Sugden said, noting the snow-

fall was mixed with lightning and sleet showers.

Sugden said Wednesday's highest snowfall total for the state was $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches recorded in the tiny central town of Rozel. He said they were expecting heavy snow but not blizzard conditions. Still, he warned that the Interstate 70 corridor could see as much as 13 inches of snow with drifts adding to the danger for drivers.

Egypt's Brotherhood suspected of running secretive outfits that mirror state institutions

CAIRO (AP) — Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi speaks publicly of firsthand knowledge of a meeting where opponents allegedly plotted against his Muslim Brotherhood group, Khairat el-Shater, says he has access to recordings of former military rulers and electoral officials engineering his disqualification from last year's presidential race.

In Egypt, those statements are seen by security officials, former members of the Islamist group and independent media as strong hints that the Brotherhood might be running its own intelligencegathering network outside of government security agencies and official channels. Such concerns dovetail the Brotherhood, which

has a long history of operating clandestinely, to suspicion that it remains a shadowy group with operations that may overlap with the normal func-Brotherhood supporters also demonstrated mi-

Disappointment permeates Jesse Jackson Jr's former Chicago area district after guilty plea

CHICAGO (AP) — Residents in this swath of sprawling Chicago neighborhoods and suburbs have brimmed with loyalty to Jesse Jackson Jr. over the past 17 years, giving him an enthusiastic majority each election — even after questionable links to ex-Gov. Rod Blagojevich, reports of an extramarital affair and a bizarre five-month medical

But the former congressman's guilty plea to charges that he lived off and lavishly spent campaign money for personal use — on everything from toilet paper to mink capes — has turned the tide. In territory where it was difficult to scrape up any criticism of Jackson, his Chicago alderman wife or his famous civil rights leader father, the mood is now simply one of disappointment. "He knew better; it was a very stupid thing to do,"

said 75-year-old Jeannette Reese, shaking her head as she grocery-shopped at a busy shopping complex. "He and his father came to our church. I thought he was the real thing."

Reese said she had voted for the younger Jackson

Jackson, who resigned from office in November, pleaded guilty Wednesday in federal court in Washington to criminal charges that he engaged in a scheme to spend \$750,000 in campaign funds on personal items. He faces up to 57 months — more than four years — in prison and a fine, under a plea deal with prosecutors.

China hacking reveals outsourcing to private U.S. firms in international cyberwar WASHINGTON (AP) — When Kevin Mandia, a re-

tired military cybercrime investigator, decided to expose China as a primary threat to U.S. computer networks, he didn't have to consult with American diplomats in Beijing or declassify tactics to safely reveal government secrets.

He pulled together a 76-page report based on seven years of his company's work and produced the most detailed public account yet of how, he says, the Chinese government has been rummaging through the networks of major U.S. companies.

It wasn't news to Mandia's commercial competitors, or the federal government, that systematic attacks could be traced back to a nondescript office building outside Shanghai that he believes was run by the Chinese army. What was remarkable was that the extraordinary details — code names of hackers, one's affection for Harry Potter and how they stole sensitive trade secrets and passwords came from a private security company without the official backing of the U.S. military or intelligence agencies that are responsible for protecting the nation from a cyberattack. The report, embraced by stakeholders in both

government and industry, represented a notable

alignment of interests in Washington: The Obama administration has pressed for new evidence of Chinese hacking that it can leverage in diplomatic talks — without revealing secrets about its own hacking investigations — and Mandiant makes headlines with its sensational revelations. The report also shows the balance of power in

America's cyberwar has shifted into the hands of the \$30 billion-a-year computer security industry.

Former Sen. Pete Domenici of New Mexico acknowledges having son outside marriage 3 decades ago

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — For nearly 40 years, Sen. Pete Domenici's reputation was that of a well-respected — some might say staid — conservative Republican and honorable family man.

But the 80-year-old New Mexico political giant's persona was shaken Wednesday with the revelation that he had an out-of-wedlock child in the 1970s and became embroiled in what might be described as an inside-the-Beltway soap opera.

While his wife Nancy was raising their eight children, Domenici had the affair and secret child with a woman about half his age — and who happened to be the daughter of one of his Senate colleagues. The woman raised the child on her own, became a prominent lobbyist, Republican activist and political commentator, and their 30-something son has since gone on to build an impressive Washington resume himself.

The saga shocked people in New Mexico who viewed Domenici as a man of honesty and integrity during his six terms and 36 years in the Senate that ended in 2008.

"I deeply regret this and am very sorry for my behavior," Domenici said in his statement. "I hope New Mexicans will view that my accomplishments for my beloved state outweigh my personal trans-

Adults get 11 percent of calories from fast foods

ATLANTA (AP) - Onan average day, U.S. adults get roughly 11 percent of their calories from fast food, a government study shows.

That's down slightly from the 13 percent reported the last time the government tried to pin down how much of the American diet is coming from fast food. Eating fast food too frequently has been seen as a driver of America's obesity problem.

For the research, about 11,000 adults were asked extensive questions about what they ate and drank over the previous 24 hours to come up

with the results.

Among the findings:

 Young adults eat more fast food than their elders; 15 percent of calories for ages 20 to 39 and dropping to 6 percent for those 60 and

Blacks get more of their calories from fastfood, 15 percent compared to 11 percent for whites and Hispanics. Young black adults

got a whopping 21 percent from the likes of Wendy's, Taco Bell and The figures are aver-

ages. Included in the calculations are some people who almost never eat fast food, as well as others who eat a lot

The survey covers the years 2007 through 2010 and was released Thursday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The authors couldn't explain why the proportion of calories from fast food dropped from the 13 percent found in a survey for 2003 through 2006.

One nutrition professor cast doubts on the latest results, saying 11 percent seemed implausibly low.

New York University's Marion Nestle

said it wouldn't be surprising if some people under-reported their hamburgers, fries and milkshakes since eating too much fast food is increasingly seen as something of a no-no.

"If I were a fast-food company, I'd say 'See, we have nothing to do with obesity! Americans are getting 90 percent of their calories somewhere else!" she said.

The study didn't include the total number fast-food calories, just the percentage. Previous government research suggests that the average U.S. adult each day consumes about 270 calories of fast food the equivalent of a small McDonald's hamburger and a few fries.

The new CDC study found that obese people get about 13 percent of daily calories from fast food, compared with less than 10 percent for skinny and normalweight people. There was no differ-

ence seen by household income, except for young adults.

The poorest — those

with an annual household income of less than \$30,000 — got 17 percent of their calories from fast food, while the figure was under 14 percent for the most affluent 20and 30-somethings with a household income of more than \$50,000.

That's not surprising since there are disproportionately higher numbers of fast-food restaurants in low-income neighborhoods, Nestle said.



Nike suspends contract

PORTLAND, (AP) — Nike Inc. has suspended its contract with Oscar Pistorius, the double-amputee runner from South Africa charged with premeditated murder in the Valentine's Day slaying of

his girlfriend.

Pistorius, who became

the first double-amputee runner to compete on the track at the Olympics at last year's London Games, is accused of intentionally killing model Reeva Steenkamp. Pistorius says he mistook Steenkamp for an intruder. "We believe Oscar Pistorius should be afforded due process and we will continue to monitor the situation closely," Nike said in a brief statement posted on its website Wednes-

On Monday, eyewear

with Oscar Pistorius maker Oakley Inc. suspended its contract with

Pistorius. Nike dropped Lance Armstrong in October, citing insurmountable evidence that he participated in doping and misled the company about those activities for more than a decade. But the Beaverton, Ore.-based company stood by Tiger Woods after he acknowledged infidelities and went to rehab for sex addiction.

Pistorius was born without fibula bones due to a congenital defect, and had his legs amputated at 11 months. He runs on carbon-fiber blades and was originally banned from competing against able-bodied peers because many argued that his blades gave him an unfair advantage.

Harden scores 46 to push Rockets past OKC

they are, of course, all equal in value. Nevertheless, which of these cards you choose to play at a given point might determine the fate of a hand.

Take this deal played by France and Belgium in the European Championship some years ago. At the first table, a French pair reached six spades as shown, missing the Λ -K of clubs. West led his singleton club, won by East with the king. If you were South, which card would you

play?

South played the jack, but this did not fool East in the slightest. He knew that the jack had to be a falsecard, and he therefore continued with the ace and another club to set the slam two tricks. East reasoned that the jack couldn't be a singleton, since West would have led the ten rather than the six had he held the 10-9-6.

At the second table, the Belgian South also found himself in six spades following a different sequence of bids. He too got the sixof-clubs lead, but when East took the trick with the king, South played the ten on it. This left East to ponder whether West had led the six from the J-9-6, or whether the six was actually a singleton.

East finally decided in favor of the former possibility and made the neutral return of a heart. This proved less than a howling success when declarer later discarded the J-9 of clubs on the A-K of diamonds and made the slam. There is no doubt that the ten is

the better play and offers the best chance of misleading the defense. The jack is wrong for the reason already mentioned, and so is the nine, since West would not lead the six from the J-10-6. Only the ten offers some hope of stealing the slam.



Armstrong won't interview with USADA

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Lance Armstrong will not do a tell-all interview under oath with the agency that exposed his performance-enhancing drug use and took his seven Tour de France

The U.S. Anti-Doping Agency had told Armstrong he would have to reveal all knows about doping in cycling — a process officials expected would take several days — if he wanted to reduce his lifetime ban from sports.

Wednesday was the latest deadline for Armstrong to decide on USADA's offer. After negotiating with the agency for two months, he refused.

Armstrong attorney Tim Herman said the cyclist "will not participate in USADA's efforts to selectively conduct American prosecutions that only demonize selected individuals while failing to address the 95 percent of the sport over which USADA has no jurisdiction."

USADA chief executive Travis Tygart said the agency had expected Armstrong would agree to talk and would be "moving on" without him.

"Over the last few weeks he has led us to believe that he wanted to come in and assist USADA, but was worried of potential criminal and civil liability if he did so," Tygart said. "Today we learned from the media that Mr. Armstrong is choosing not to come in and be truthful and that he will not take the opportunity to work toward righting his wrongs in sport.'

Herman has said Armstrong is willing to participate in an international effort to clean up cycling, an effort that has broken down in spats between the International Cycling Union, the sport's governing body, and the World Anti-Doping Agency.

"He will be the first man through the door, and once inside will answer every question, at an international tribunal formed to comprehensively address pro cycling, an almost exclusively European sport," Herman said.

For more than a decade, Armstrong denied using performanceenhancing drugs. But last year, USADA released a report that detailed extensive doping on his Tour de France-winning teams and stripped him of those victories. Armstrong then admitted last month in an interview with Oprah Winfrey that he doped to

win those races.

Tygart has accused Armstrong of lying in portions of that interview, most notably Armstrong's claim that he raced clean when he came out of retirement in 2009-2010. USADA's report says blood evidence shows Armstrong cheated during his comeback.

USADA also wants to question Armstrong under oath about whether cycling officials helped him cover up positive drug tests during his career, charges he continues to deny.

Beyond his problems with USA-DA, Armstrong still faces several legal challenges.

Armstrong was the subject of a two-year federal grand jury investigation that was dropped a year ago without an indictment, but the Department of Justice is still considering whether to join a federal whistle-blower lawsuit filed by former Armstrong teammate Floyd Landis.

Armstrong also has been sued by a Dallas-based SCA Promotions to recover more than \$12 million in bonuses. And he has been sued by The Sunday Times in London to recover a libel judgment that the cyclist won against the paper.

Rockets make 6-player trade with Kings

HOUSTON (AP) -The Houston Rockets acquired No. 5 pick Thomas Robinson and forwards Francisco Garcia and Tyler Honeycutt from Sacramento on Wednesday for forward Patrick Patterson, center Cole Aldrich and point guard Toney Douglas.

Also Wednesday, the Rockets reached an agreement to send forward Marcus Morris to Phoenix for a future second-round pick, according to a person with knowledge of the deal. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because that trade had not been announced, pending league approval.

Patterson, Aldrich and Douglas walked out of the Toyota Center just as Houston was starting its game against Oklahoma City,

on the eve of the trading deadline. The Rockets came into the game holding the No. 8 spot in the Western Conference and the moves

were unexpected. The short-handed Rockets heard the news only 20 minutes before tipoff.

"It was definitely the weirdest game I've ever played in," said Houston forward Chandler Parsons. "It was hard to focus, it was hard to block (out) four friends leaving."

Houston rallied from 14 points down to beat the Thunder 122-119.

"A lot of distractions before the game," said James Harden, who scored a career-high 46 points. "I just rallied the guys together and told them to focus in on every play. It was going to be a tough game for us."


