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HC tuition compares favorably

Despite years of increasing pressure to tap local sources of revenue for its financing, Howard College tuition fees

remain competitive compared to other community colleges in this area.

A Texas Association of Community College survey of tuition fees charged by West Texas junior colleges for the Spring 2013 semester shows Howard to be near the bottom of the scale, at least where indistrict and in-

state students are concerned. For students living within the junior college district, HC charges tuition of \$78 per semester hour. In comparison, Midland College charges \$72 per semester hour, while Clarendon College tops the list at \$91.

For students whose home is outside the district, Howard charges \$113 per semester hour. Of the colleges surveyed, Cisco College had the smallest tuition rate for out-

of-district students at \$99 per semester hour, while Vernon College topped the list at \$128.

When it comes to students who come from outside of Texas, however, Howard is the second most expensive community college in this area, as possible to benefit charging tuition fees of \$164 per semester hour, trailing

> Vernon at \$198. The cheapest area community college for out-of-state students is South Plains in Levelland, which charges \$121 per semester

> State-wide, community colleges charge an average of \$76 per hour for in-district stu-

dents, \$118 for out-of-district students and \$173 for outof-state students, according to information released by TACC.

Howard President Dr. Cheryl Sparks said the college has managed to remain competitive with its tuition fees despite years of decreased state aid to two-year institutions.

Information from TACC reveals that state aid to community colleges, as a percentage of the institutions' total budget, has shrunk from a high of 68 percent in 1980 to 29 percent in 2010. Tuition fees, meanwhile, have increased from 16 percent in 1980 to 32

percent in 2010, while the portion of a college's budget paid for by local taxes has increased from 16 percent in

1980 to 39 percent in 2010. "And that was before the sizable decrease in state funding during the (2010)







Lawmaker seeks to overturn abortion waiting period

AUSTIN, Texas(AP)—Controversial new abortion restrictions have caused anguish but led few to turn away from the procedure, according to a study presented Wednesday by a state lawmaker who wants to repeal the restrictions.

"It's just ridiculous that we do things to women to manipulate their minds instead of just trusting that they've already made a very difficult decision," said Rep. Jessica Farrar, a Democrat from Houston. "Unfortunately, it has been a political issue. It has won people campaigns."

Enacted in 2011 with two-thirds majority support in both chambers, the restrictions require women seeking abortions to hear a doctor's description of sonogram images, wait 24 hours and then return for the procedure. The law allows some exceptions, including cases of rape and incest. A group of doctors successfully challenged the policy on First Amendment grounds, but an appeals court reinstated the law.

Similar restrictions have been adopted in 29 other states, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

The new study, Impact of Abortion Restrictions in Texas, was performed by researchers at the University of Texas in partnership with Ibis Reproductive Health, a Massachusetts research group that "aims to improve women's reproductive autonomy." They gathered survey results last year from more than 300 women who had completed their preliminary visits in Dallas, Houston, Austin, El Paso, McAllen and San Antonio.

The researchers reported a 10-15 percent decline in the number of abortions performed at several large clinics in the year after the law took effect. But Daniel Grossman, a researcher for Ibis, attributed the reduction to the logistical hurdles of traveling to two appointments, not the psychological impact of the waiting periods and sonogram images.

The women in the survey reported traveling an average of 42 miles to obtain an abortion. Some traveled 400

On average, the women waited 3.7 days between consultation and procedure, with wait times dependent on aligning their own schedules with their doctors' schedules.

Nearly a third of the women said the waiting period negatively affected their "emotional well-being," but 89 percent of the women remained confident in their decision to have an abortion.

Texas session of the Legislature," Sparks said. "So the discrepancy is even greater now.'' At Howard, the percentage

of its budget financed by state money shrunk from a high of 59 percent in 1992 to 40 percent in 2012. In that same time span, the percentage of the budget paid for by tuition and

other fees has grown from 17 percent to 38 percent, while the percentage paid for by local taxes has dropped from 25 percent to 21 percent. That information, Sparks

said, has to come with a bit of a disclaimer.

"You have to realize that our student population has shifted over the years," she said. "In 1992, we didn't have as many out-of-state students as we do now. Another reason for the increase in tuition percentages is that we've had a significant increase in the number of students at our San Angelo campus."

And those figures don't include tuition for dual-credit enrollees — high school students who also take college courses. Howard charges indistrict high school students \$164 per every three-hour course they take. Outside the district, that rate increased to \$250 for every three-hour course.

Dual-credit students comprise almost 25 percent of the district's total enrollment, Sparks estimated.

During the past 10 years, Howard has increased its tuition rates four times, most recently in 2011. Despite that, Sparks said hiking tuition is a measure of last resort for college officials when they craft the district's yearly budget.

"What we try to do is, when we're looking at tuition and fees, we consider other possible solutions first," she said. "Tuition and fees is a revenue source, but it's not our

first option."

And Sparks vowed the college would continue that policy in the future.

"We'll always strive to remain competitive in that area," she said. "The most important thing we try to keep in mind when determining tuition and fees is keeping them as low as possible to benefit our students."



Spare the hype of 'budget armageddon'

arack Obama's strategy going into the scheduled sequestration was to hit the panic button, over and over again, putting the very Obama-friendly media into a heavy rotation of disaster metaphors. "Hours, now,

until massive government cuts go effect that into could impact every American. Jobs vaporizing, flights delayed. even criminals walking free," warned ABC morning anchor Josh Elliott. On screen were the words "BUDGET ARMAGEDDON."



"Like the asteroid headed to earth, they're coming! Eighty-six billion in automatic budget cuts. And don't bother trying to duck," hyped CNN anchor Carol Costello. "So we let these draconian budget cuts take place. You know who's going to suffer the most? It's not going to be Congress. It's not going to be the president. It's going to be us."

"Kids without vaccines, schools without teachers and massive airport delays — we'll show you the worst-case scenario for government spending cuts," CBS morning host Charlie Rose read off the Panic Prompter.

It sounded a little like Bill Murray in "Ghostbusters" when he was whimsically warning: "Fire and brimstone coming down from the skies! Rivers and seas boiling! Human sacrifice, dogs and cats living together ... mass hysteria!" Media Research Center ana-

lysts reviewed all of the 88 sequestration stories on ABC, CBS and

NBC from Feb. 14 through March cians stopped their paychecks. 1 when the "cuts" took effect and found 58 (66 percent) were dominated by panic nonsense, without a second of rebuttal of common sense. Another 10 stories offered the same hyperbole but at least included a few seconds of the skeptical view that the sequestration reductions weren't huge and their effects were being overhyped.

But for people who read newspapers, there was another worstcase scenario coming.

"The good news is the world doesn't end March 2. The bad news is, the world doesn't end March 2," liberal lobbyist Emily Holubowich told the Washington Post. "The worst-case scenario for us is the sequester hits and nothing bad really happens. And Republicans say: 'See, that wasn't so bad."

There is no daylight between the views of liberal lobbvists and the national news media.

This was the same game Bill Clinton played against the conservatives in Congress in the mid-1990s. The liberals are always presumed to have the upper hand in the blame game because the liberals have a very large Blame Machine known as the media.

ABC's Jack Smith unloaded this dire warning at the end of 1995: "Monuments and national parks are shut. So are museums. A long-awaited rare exhibit of the Dutch painter Vermeer at the National Gallery, eight years in the making, is closed. And the shutdown now has a human face. Joe Skattleberry and his wife Lisa both work for the government. Both have been furloughed. They can't afford a Christmas tree."

Please suspend all reason and try to avoid wondering how two federal workers couldn't spare \$50 for a Christmas tree. Smith reported this a week into the shutdown and before paychecks were even delayed.

On Jan. 2, 1996, future "CBS Evening News" anchor Scott Pelley compared budget negotiators to bombers: "In April, terrorists tried to kill them. Today, politiIn Oklahoma City's Social Security office, they're being ordered to work for nothing. ... The bomb broke Beverly Rankin's ankle. Politics is breaking her bank." They called this a "newscast."

It sounded more like CBS started a super PAC to run negative ads against Newt Gingrich. They wonder why a strong majority now tells pollsters that the media is guilty of favoring one side. The favoritism isn't just obvious it's completely shameless. We've lived through four years

of Obama, and as the federal government overspent us into trillion-dollar deficits every year, no reporter hit a panic button. The Federal Reserve is printing money like it's making Monopoly games, and no journalist is reporting with their hair on fire. The tax burden on most Americans went up this year, and no one took a camera and a microphone to interview someone who'll get by on a few less thousand dollars this year.

Our journalists talk like they're not only willing marionettes for the Obama panic message but like they're addicts for ever-growing government. Every potential spending limitation is portrayed as a dire and cruel assault on the suffering. In the statist mindset of the media elites, an American can never suffer from more government, only from less.

Americans won't feel these GOP-made disasters because they won't happen. They will, however, remember the hype. Perhaps the press will understand why only 6 percent of the public finds them "very trustworthy."

Palin can't hold onto a job even at Fox News. And while I know a number of people who would like Romney to run again in 2016, they all happen to be Democrats.

Romney went on TV recently to disprove rumors that he has been spending the last few months in a hotel suite in Vegas shuffling around with Kleenex boxes on his feet. Romney spoke to Chris Wal-

lace on Fox News about something Romney has just discovered: There was a "passion gap" in the last election between Republicans and Democrats. Anybody who watched the

"If you can't accept Chris Christie as a conservative, then you're really just asking for another election loss in 2016,' King said. "And it makes us look crazy in the eyes of the American people."

Republicans yearn for.

DNA links ex-inmate to

HOUSTON (AP) — DNA has linked a newly freed inmate to the 2006 slaying of an alleged accomplice in a Houston-area utility and robbery scam. The Harris County Sheriff's Office on Thursday

announced Alvin Wiltz has been charged with capital murder. Wiltz was arrested Wednesday — a day after be-

ing released from prison in a drug case. Online jail records don't list an attorney for Wiltz, who's being held without bond in the slaying of Jermaine Homeowner Oscar Richmond awoke when Clem-

ons knocked on his door, falsely claimed to be a utility worker and told him to evacuate due to a gas leak. Richmond knew his neighborhood didn't have natural gas and he got his gun.

The pair fought before a second suspect opened fire — wounding Richmond and fatally shooting Clemons.

Pharmacist allegedly sold drugs from Texas home

DENTON, Texas (AP) - A North Texas pharmacist has been charged with selling prescription drugs from her home after her business closed.

The Dallas Morning News reported Wednesday that Esther Chinedozi Amaka of Arlington is charged with diverting controlled substances. Denton police last month raided her residence.

Online jail records do not list an attorney for Amaka, who was booked Feb. 13 and released the following day on \$50,000 bond.

State regulators say narcotics turned up missing from a Denton pharmacy before Express Rx closed in 2012 at its licensed location. Amaka, who's listed as the owner and head pharmacist, allegedly then dispensed drugs from her home.

Texas woman gets 30 years for boyfriend slaying

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A South Texas woman who in 1996 fatally stabbed her boyfriend and argued self-defense has been sentenced to 30 years in prison for killing another suitor.

A judge in San Antonio on Wednesday sentenced Beatrice Ann Ibanez of Van Ormy. Ibanez in January pleaded no contest to murder in the 2011 death of Alfredo Ramirez — who had a record of assault-

Ibanez told police she killed Ramirez in self-defense but later said she stabbed him as he slept.

The San Antonio Express-News reports Ibanez, while known as Beatrice Trevino Hernandez, was investigated in the 1996 slaying of Jesse R. Cardenas. Ibanez told police she was beaten by Cardenas and stabbed him in self-defense. Charges were

Ibanez says she was drinking alcohol before both slayings.

2 San Antonio fires prompted hotel evacuations

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Dozens of firefighters have battled two downtown San Antonio building blazes in apparent unrelated incidents.

The San Antonio Fire Department says nobody was hurt in Wednesday night's fire that destroyed a vacant building or in a commercial building fire early Thursday. Authorities are trying to determine the causes of both blazes.

Investigators say the initial fire in a two-story building prompted evacuation of a neighboring Travelers Hotel. The second fire happened several hours later about a block away, forcing the evacuation of the nearby Indigo Hotel.

Department spokesman Christian Bove says there does not appear to be a connection between the two fires.

Texan gets fine, probation in whooping crane death

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — A Dallas man has been sentenced to a year of probation after he pleaded guilty to killing a whooping crane, a federally protected species of endangered waterfowl.

Worthey D. Wiles pleaded guilty in Corpus Christi on Wednesday to violating the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act. U.S. Magistrate Janice Ellington also ordered Wiles to pay a \$5,000 fine and a \$10,000 community-service payment to the nonprofit Friends of Aransas and Matagorda Island National Wildlife Refuges.

Court papers show Wiles was a guest hunter at a Rockport hunting club when he shot and killed the juvenile crane. He told game wardens he thought the whooper was a sandhill crane.

Whooping cranes are among the world's rarest birds with a total popula-

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tion of about 437 in the wild.

Planned Parenthood to rally at Texas Capitol

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Planned Parenthood is holding its annual lobbying day at the Capitol despite a vote by the Legislature to bar it from getting state funding and a possible vote to keep it out of Texas sex education classes.

The organization expects hundreds to attend the Thursday rally featuring actress Stephanie March from "Law & Order: Special Victims Unit."

Its supporters will then fan out to lobby lawmak-

The Republican-controlled Legislature targeted Planned Parenthood in 2011 when it outlawed state funds for organizations linked to abortion providers. Then, on Tuesday, the Senate Education Committee began mulling a bill barring Planned Parenthood from teaching sex education in public schools. Planned Parenthood has affiliated health educa-

tors who have taught sex education in some school districts statewide, but the practice isn't wide-

Dallas DA due in court on misconduct allegations

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas County District Attorney Craig Watkins is due in court to answer misconduct allegations by attorneys for an oil fortune heir charged with mortgage fraud.

A state appeals court denied Watkins' request to stay Thursday's hearing in the case of Al Hill III.

Watkins didn't attend a hearing last month, saying he was ill and didn't believe he should have to answer why his office was prosecuting Hill. However, Hill's attorneys say the DA is targeting their client as a favor to a Watkins friend and political

Watkins' spokeswoman, Debbie Denmon, said that barring any other court action, Watkins would appear in the courtroom Thursday. But she wouldn't say if he'll testify.

3 more former drug task force members indicted

MCALLEN, Texas (AP) — A federal grand jury indicted three more former South Texas law enforcement officers on drug conspiracy charges Wednesday, bringing to seven the number of members of a now-disbanded drug task force to face charges.

The superseding indictment added three more former Hidalgo County sheriff's deputies who were members of the so-called Panama Unit, a joint task force between that agency and the Mission Police Department targeting street-level drug sales in that South Texas city, according to a statement from the U.S. attorney's office.

Also added to the case were Fernando Guerra Sr. and Fernando Guerra Jr., who had been separately charged last month. According to documents filed in the elder Guerra's original case, he sat atop a drug trafficking ring that employed corrupt police to steal drugs from other traffickers. Guerra Sr. told the confidential informant that whoever was responsible for delivering the cocaine to him at the pre-determined location would be stopped by corrupt police officers and arrested.

"According to Guerra Sr. and Fernando Guerra Jr., the driver would be charged with only a portion of the narcotics and the rest would be given to Guerra Sr. and Guerra Jr. by the corrupt law enforcement officials," according to documents filed in that case. The elder Guerra would then sell the stolen cocaine and give the confidential informant 30 percent of the proceeds.

Trials delayed for man with hacking group ties

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas man once affiliated with the global hacking collective Anonymous is now scheduled for trial in September after a judge granted his request for a delay.

Barrett Lancaster Brown faces three federal indictments against him. The first came after he posted tweets and YouTube videos that ripped op-





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ponents and lashed out at law enforcement. The charges against him now include aggravated identity theft and concealing evidence. Brown's attorney Doug Morris asked for more

time to evaluate the evidence against his client, and U.S. District Judge Sam Lindsay granted his Brown's trial on one indictment is Sept. 3, while trials are set for Sept. 23 on the second and third

Texas awards \$60K in contest to kill hogs

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — More than 7,150 feral hogs were killed as part of a competition to curb their numbers in Texas and limit the hundreds of millions of dollars in damage caused to crops and ranchland every year, state agriculture officials said Wednesday.


The Texas Department of Agriculture awarded Sutton County in West Texas the \$20,000 first-place prize in the Hog Out Challenge that ran from October through December.

Five other counties will share the remainder of the \$60,000 in awards.

"Texans respond to a challenge, which is why I initiated a competition to reduce the numbers of hogs in the state," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said in a statement to The Associated Press on Wednesday. "With no natural predator and the ability to reproduce rapidly, these hogs will continue to cost Texas millions of dollars if they are not eradicated and controlled in a coordinated, statewide effort."

The standings were based on a formula that considers the number of animals killed along with participation by ranchers, landowners and others in educational programs to learn techniques to keep the hogs' numbers down.

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N. Korea threatens nuke strike against U.S.

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—North Korea vowed on Thursday to launch a pre-emptive nuclear strike against the United States, amplifying its threatening rhetoric hours ahead of a vote by U.N. diplomats on whether to level new sanctions against Pyongyang for its recent nuclear test.

An unidentified spokesman for Pyongyang's Foreign Ministry said the North will exercise its right for "a preemptive nuclear attack to destroy the strongholds of the aggressors" because Washington is pushing to start a nuclear war against the North.

Although North Korea boasts of nuclear bombs and pre-emptive strikes, it is not thought to have mastered the ability to produce a warhead small enough to put on a missile capable of reaching the U.S. It is believed to have enough nuclear fuel, however, for several crude nuclear devices.

Such inflammatory rhetoric is common from North Korea, and especially so in recent days. North Korea is angry over the possible sanctions and over upcoming U.S.-South Korean military drills. At a mass rally in Pyongyang on Thursday, tens of thousands of North Koreans protested the U.S.-South Korean

war drills and sanctions.

Army Gen. Kang Pyo Yong told the crowd that North Korea is ready to fire long-range nuclear-armed missiles at Washington.

"Intercontinental ballistic missiles and various other missiles, which have already set their striking targets, are now armed with lighter, smaller and diversified nuclear warheads and are placed on a standby status," Kang said. "When we shell (the missiles), Washington, which is the stronghold of evils, will be engulfed in a sea of fire."

The U.N. Security Council is set to impose a fourth round of sanctions against Pyongyang in a fresh attempt to rein in its nuclear and ballistic missile programs.

Russia's U.N. Ambassador Vitaly Churkin, the current council president, said the council would vote on the draft sanctions resolution Thursday morning.

The resolution was drafted by the United States and China, North Korea's closest ally. The council's agreement to put the resolution to a vote just 48 hours later signaled that it would almost certainly have the support of all 15 council members.

The statement by the North

Korean Foreign Ministry spokesman was carried by the North's official Korean Central News Agency.

It accused the U.S. of leading efforts to slap sanctions on North Korea. The statement said the new sanctions would only advance the timing for North Korea to fulfill previous vows to take "powerful second and third countermeasures" against its enemies. It hasn't elaborated on those measures.

The statement said North Korea "strongly warns the U.N. Security Council not to make another big blunder like the one in the past when it earned the inveterate grudge of the Korean nation by acting as a war servant for the U.S. in 1950."

North Korea demanded the U.N. Security Council immediately dismantle the American-led U.N. Command that's based in Seoul and move to end the state of war that exists on the Korean Peninsula, which continues six decades after fighting stopped because an armistice, not a peace treaty, ended the war.

In anticipation of the resolution's adoption, North Korea earlier in the week threatened to cancel the 1953 cease-fire that ended the Korean War.

North Korean threats have become more common as tensions have escalated following a rocket launch by Pyongyang in December and its third nuclear test on Feb. 12. Both acts defied three Security Council resolutions that bar North Korea from testing or using nuclear or ballistic missile technology and from importing or exporting material for these programs.

U.S. U.N. Ambassador Susan Rice said the proposed resolution, to be voted on at 10 a.m. EST (1500 GMT), would impose some of the strongest sanctions ever ordered by the United Nations.

The final version of the draft resolution, released Wednesday, identified three individuals, one corporation and one organization that would be added to the U.N. sanctions list if the measure is approved.

The targets include top officials at a company that is the country's primary arms dealer and main exporter of ballistic missile-related equipment, and a national organization responsible for research and development of missiles and probably nuclear weapons.

The success of a new round of sanctions could depend on enforcement by China,

where most of the companies and banks that North Korea is believed to work with are based.

The United States and other nations worry that North Korea's third nuclear test pushed it closer to its goal of gaining nuclear missiles that can reach the U.S. The international community has condemned the regime's nuclear and missile efforts as threats to regional security and a drain on the resources that could go to North Korea's largely destitute people.

The draft resolution condemns the latest nuclear test "in the strongest terms" for violating and flagrantly disregarding council resolutions, bans further ballistic missile launches, nuclear tests "or any other provocation," and demands that North Korea return to the Nuclear Non-proliferation Treaty. It also condemns all of North Korea's ongoing nuclear activities, including its uranium enrichment.

But the proposed resolution stresses the council's commitment "to a peaceful, diplomatic and political solution" and urged a resumption of six-party talks with the aim of denuclearizing the Korean Peninsula "in a peaceful manner."

Kentucky senator uses rare filibuster to block vote on President Obama's nominee to lead CIA

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Republican senator and tea party favorite from Kentucky used an old-style filibuster lasting nearly 13 hours to take control of the chamber and block Senate confirmation of John Brennan's nomination to be CIA director.

Sen. Rand Paul ended his filibuster Thursday

shortly after midnight, but Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, also a Kentucky Republican, said he would continue to oppose Brennan's confirmation and resist ending the debate on President Barack Obama's nominee to lead the spy agency. Paul's performance, which centered on questions

about the possible use of drones against targets in the United States, clearly energized a number of his GOP colleagues, who came to the floor in a show of support and to share in the speaking duties. And even as the night progressed, Paul appeared invigorated despite being on his feet for so long. Actual talking filibusters have become rare in the Senate, where the rules are typically used in procedural ways to block the other party's agenda.

After Paul yielded the floor, Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., filed a motion to cut off debate on Brennan's nomination, setting up a vote for later this week.

Russian dancer accused in attack on Bolshoi ballet chief denies ordering use of acid

MOSCOW (AP) — The star dancer accused of masterminding the attack on the Bolshoi ballet chief acknowledged Thursday that he gave the goahead for the attack, but told a Moscow court that he did not order anyone to throw acid on the artistic director's face.

The judge, however, refused to release Bolshoi soloist Pavel Dmitrichenko on bail and ordered him held until at least April 18.

Ballet chief Sergei Filin's face and eyes suffered severe burns in the Jan. 17 attack, which exposed a culture of deep intrigue and infighting at the famed theater.

Dmitrichenko said he had complained about the ballet chief to an acquaintance, who offered to "beat him up."

"It's not true that I ordered him to throw acid at Filin," the 29-year-old dancer told the court, speaking from a cage. He said he had never intended for the attack to cause such bodily harm.

Prospects shaky for expanding background checks as Senate panel ready to vote on gun curbs

WASHINGTON(AP)—President Barack Obama's prospects for winning near-universal background checks for gun purchases seemed shaky as the Senate Judiciary Committee prepared for Congress'

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first votes on curbing firearms since December's horrific shootings at a Connecticut elementary school.

The Democratic-led panel had four bills on its agenda Thursday as lawmakers began shaping their response to the slaughter of 20 first-graders and six staffers in Newtown, Conn. The shootings elevated guns to a top-tier national issue, though many of Obama's proposals have encountered opposition from the National Rifle Association and many Republicans.

Besides expanding background checks, the other measures would ban assault weapons and ammunition magazines carrying more than 10 rounds, make gun trafficking and the purchase of firearms for people barred from owning them federal crimes, and provide more money for schools to buy video cameras and other safety equipment.

All four measures were expected to pass the committee, perhaps Thursday. But their fate when the full Senate considers them, probably in April, was less certain. The trafficking measure by panel Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., was thought to have the best prospects and the assault weapons ban by Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., seemed to have the slimmest chance.

Philippines cardinal taps Facebook, TV and serenades on rapid rise toward papal buzz

IMUS, Philippines (AP) — Asia's most prominent Roman Catholic leader knows how to reach the masses: He sings on stage, preaches on TV, brings churchgoers to laughter and tears with his homilies. And he's on Facebook.

But Philippine Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle's best response against the tide of secularism, clergy sex abuse scandals and rival-faith competition could be his reputation for humility. His compassion for the poor and unassuming ways have impressed followers in his homeland, Asia's largest Catholic nation, and church leaders in the Vatican.

Tagle's rising star has opened a previously unimaginable possibility: An Asian pope.

The Filipino prelate's chances are considered remote, as many believe that Latin America or Africa — with their faster growing Catholic flocks — would be more logical choices if the papal electors look beyond Europe. But even the hint of papal consideration has electrified many in the heavily Catholic Philippines, where past pontiffs had been welcomed by millions with rock-star intensity.

Multitudes bring late President Chavez 'home' to military academy after emotional procession

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Hugo Chavez has been carried back to the military academy where he started his army career, his flag-draped coffin lying in state in the echoing halls until Friday's fu-

neral

As a band played the hymn from his first battalion, a long ribbon of tearful mourners numbering in the hundreds of thousands bid farewell to the larger-than-life leader Wednesday after a procession carried his casket through Caracas.

With the entire government, including anointed successor Nicolas Maduro, caught up in the seven-hour procession, there were few answers to the most pressing question facing the country — the timing of a presidential election that must be called within a month.

Efforts to avoid gov't shutdown move to Senate as Obama seeks talks on bigger budget deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Efforts to stave off a late March government shutdown shifted to the Senate after House Republicans swiftly passed legislation to keep federal agencies running, while also easing

some of the effects of \$85 billion in budget cuts. The House legislation, approved Wednesday on a bipartisan vote, is the first step toward averting a possible fiscal showdown this month. If another budget crisis can be avoided, it could clear the way for lawmakers and President Barack Obama to restart talks on a longer-term deficit reduction plan.

That was Obama's focus during a rare dinner with a dozen Republican senators Wednesday night at a hotel near the White House. While no real breakthroughs appeared to emerge from the two-hour meal, the mere fact that it happened was significant given the lack of direct engagement between Obama and rank-and-file Republicans over the past

White House and congressional aides said the president and lawmakers had a good exchange of ideas centered on how they could work together to tackle the nation's fiscal problems.

Volunteer intern fatally mauled at California wild animal park after entering lion's enclosure

DUNLAP, Calif. (AP) — Authorities are trying to determine what provoked a lion at an exotic animal park in Central California to attack and maul to death a 24-year-old woman, who had been on the job as an intern there for just a few weeks.

Authorities said the woman was attacked and killed when she entered the male African lion's enclosure at Cat Haven about 45 miles east of Fresno.

Sheriff's deputies responding to an emergency call from Cat Haven found the woman severely injured and still lying inside the enclosure with the lion nearby, Fresno County sheriff's Lt. Bob Miller said.

Another park worker couldn't lure the lion into another pen, so deputies shot and killed it to safely reach the wounded woman. But she died at the scene, Miller said.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Anto- starting All-Star point guards. nio coach Gregg Popovich will not tolerate excuses, so the Spurs know better than to feel self-pity when a key player like Tony Parker is injured.

Instead, San Antonio is actually feeling pretty good about itself. Tim Duncan had 18 points and 10

rebounds, and the Spurs beat the Chicago Bulls 101-83 on Wednesday night in a matchup of teams missing their

Manu Ginobili added 18 points and nine assists, Tiago Splitter had 13 points and 10 rebounds, and Kawhi Leonard scored 14 points for San Antonio (48-14), which won its third straight since Parker was injured.

Parker is expected to miss about four weeks with an ankle sprain and Derrick Rose has yet to play for Chicago this season after undergoing major knee surgery.

San Antonio continued to play well without Parker, shooting 54 percent from the field and handing out 22 assists to maintain the league's record.

"In the first half it was not great, not bad either, but the second half was great," Ginobili said. "We attacked and moved the ball around the court from side to side and that is what you have to do against good defensive

chance for an overtrick, which would give you an additional 30 points. In view of what's at stake, this is obviously a mere drop in the bucket.

All this is said by way of introduction to today's sad tale, where South bid aggressively to reach a sound sixheart contract but then failed to make

Declarer won West's opening trump lead and drew the outstanding trumps in three rounds. He next cashed the A-K of diamonds, receiving a jolt when East showed out on the second round. After cashing the queen and discarding a spade, he stewed for a while, not knowing which black-suit finesse to take. As it happened, he couldn't guess right, and he eventually lost a trick to each of West's kings to finish down one.

South's line of play was geared more toward making an overtrick than ensuring his contract. Since he could afford to lose a trick, he should have taken out insurance against a 4-1 diamond division.


The proper play is to lead a diamond at trick four and let the opponents win it! It is then a simple matter to win any return and run the rest of the diamonds to make the slam.

It is true that in adopting this approach, South might lose a diamond trick he didn't have to lose. But considering what's at stake, he should be willing to give away 30 points to ensure scoring 1,630.



new for Takahashi, who went to his first major league camp with the New York Mets in 2010 after signing a minor league contract with the

"I've played baseball a long time and feel I had a successful career in Japan as well," he said. "I was in the same spot with the Mets, so experience will play a big part."

With the Mets, Takahashi appeared in 53 games, including 12 starts. But he's been strictly a reliever since, pitching in 112 games the past two seasons for the Los Angeles Angels and Pittsburgh.

Cubs manager Dale Sveum said Takahashi, should he emerge from the six-player scrum for three bullpen spots, could fill needs ranging from a left-handed specialist to long relief.

"If he makes the team he could be that guy," Sveum said before Wednesday's game.

"He's been very durable. If the game dictates, he can pitch one (inning) or get a left-hander out. If the game dictates the other way, he can go two or three innings."

Such a role would be just fine with Takahashi, who turns 38 next month.

"The goal I set for myself is to be that lefty out of the bullpen and being able to pitch multiple innings," he said.

Rangers left-hander Robbie Ross allowed a first-inning solo homer to Scott Hairston but then retired 13 of his final 15 batters, including the last nine in a row. He gave up one run and four hits in four innings.

"That home run, I wish I could have done without that," Ross, competing for the last spot in the Texas rotation. "After that I settled down and just threw strikes. I guess it was just that feeling of, I didn't want to do what I did in the first inning."

Ross was a non-roster invitee to camp a vear ago and finished the season as the team's top left-handed setup man. He went 6-0 with a 2.22 ERA in 65 innings over 58 appearances.

"I'd like to think I've been given an opportunity and have to work hard for it, Ross said. "But it's a thing where I have to take it a day at a time and focus on what I have to do. It's not something I let linger in my mind. It's something where I'm just trying to make a job wherever it is, whether as a starter or a full-time guy."

Rangers right-hander Alexi Ogando, the team's projected fourth starter, allowed a run and two hits in three innings. He struck out six and walked two.
