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Officials: Time for Elbow to go

Upkeep on aging building said to be cost prohibitive

FORSAN — School officials here believe it's time Elbow Elementary received an honorable retirement. The school was first constructed in the ear-

ly 1930s, replaced two decades later renovated times since then. Despite all the upgrades, however, structural issues and simple age have conspired to render the buildpractically obsolete, educators say.

The solution FISD administrators have devised

is a \$23.8 construction project, subject to voter approval this May, which will replace Elbow with an elementary campus in Forsan, as well as funding renovations at the second-

FISD Superintendent Randy Johnson said the idea of replacing Elbow began percolating several years ago.

"It's developed slowly over a period of time," said Johnson, who began his career with the district as

Elbow principal. "Over the years, we've dealt with so many issues at the school, such as plumbing and other utility work, that the school board started responding to our repair requests with, 'At what point do we get where we're throwing good money

after bad?"

One problem facing the building is that it is almost literally bursting at the seams.


Gasoline prices drop a few pennies

Big Spring City Council will meet Tuesday to discuss a number of agenda items, including contracts with a number of firms for consulting services. In new business, the coun-

cil is expected to consider approval of an amendment to the John Crane Productions Solutions Inc. lease agreement and authorize the city manager or his designee to execute any necessary documents. The council is also to con-

sider approval of an agree-

ment with company Maximus

for cost allocation consulting

services, according to city officials, and allow the city manager or his designee to execute the agreement.

Approval of an inter-local agreement with other local government entities for joint bidding and engineering management for the 2013 seal coat project will also be up for consideration, as is a contract with engineering firm Parkhill, Smith & Cooper for the same project.

All three agreements and the amendment to the John Crane Production Solutions Inc. lease will be heard by the council only one time — most agenda items require a first and second reading before being approved — because they are for contractual services. Also, the council is to

dawn, the old saying goes, and often a declarer reaches a dark point during the early play that precedes his ultimate step toward victory.

Consider this deal from the final round of the 1977 world team championship. The bidding shown occurred when Billy Eisenberg, a member of the eventually victorious American team, held the South

West did not have a clear-cut opening lead, and, after great thought, he elected to lead the five of hearts. This did not work out well when Eisenberg won the trick with the eight, cashed the K-A of spades and ruffed the jack of spades in dummy

Eisenberg next played the A-K of trumps, and when West showed out, it appeared South would eventually have to lose a diamond trick and a trump trick. But Eisenberg, never one to give up without a fight, found a way to make the slam anyway.

He abandoned further trump leads and instead proceeded to set the stage for a trump coup. The queen of hearts was led and covered by the king and ace, after which Eisenberg ruffed a heart, played a diamond to the ace and ruffed another heart. This left him with just three cards — the Q-9 of trumps and the eight of diamonds. East's last three cards were the J-6 of trumps and the king of diamonds.

Eisenberg now exited with the eight of diamonds, not caring in the slightest whether East or West won the trick. In either case he was certain to score the last two tricks with the Q-9 of trumps and so make the slam.

Jet goes off tarmac in Houston

HOUSTON(AP) - A Delta Air Lines jet has gotten stuck in a grassy area off a runway at William P. Hobby Airport in Houston.

Airport spokeswoman Darian Ward says nobody was hurt in the incident this morning as the plane prepared to depart for Atlanta.

Ward says the plane carrying about 70 passengers somehow veered off a runway. Images from the scene showed the jet's front gear in the grass. Ward didn't immediately provide the plane's

flight number. She says the incident didn't affect other arriving or departing flights. Shuttle buses were dispatched to transport the

passengers back to the terminal for rebooking.

Boats to be checked for mussels

WACO, Texas (AP) — Boats at a Central Texas lake will be checked for invasive zebra mussels as another community tries to stop the spread of the devastating creatures.

The Waco Tribune-Herald reports city workers on Memorial Day will begin inspections at Lake Waco to make sure boats aren't infested. Waco will work with the Army Corps of Engi-

neers to educate operators about cleaning and emptying boats that have been hauled from one lake to another. Workers will be on the lookout for boats that have visited zebra mussel-infested lakes in the Great Lakes, Oklahoma and Texas, including Lake Texoma and Lake Ray Roberts. Waco city water quality manager Tom Conry

says zebra mussels breed so prolifically that they can quickly clog water intakes.

A facility committee comprised of district residents and educators was formed last fall and studied the main issue of renovation vs. replacement. Earlier this year, it recommended to the school board that a new elementary campus be built adjacent to the secondary campus in Forsan.

The proposed new campus, which would cost approximately \$14 million, would feature pre-kindergarten

classrooms, as well as four classrooms apiece for grades kindergarten through fifth. Also included would be spaces for a nurse's station, diagnosticians, a library/ resource room, gymnasium, cafeteria and outside play area.

The \$14 million price

tag would include all the equipment and associated costs for the new campus, including furniture, road work. parking lots and computer technology quirements, Johnson said.

Another advantage to the new building, Johnson said, would come with its proximity to the secondary campus. "That will help with

everything from secondary students mentoring elementary kids to teachers and administrators from both campuses being able to interact more efficiently," Johnson said.

If voters approve the bond, officials hope to have the new campus ready to receive students at the start of the 2014-2015 school year, he

Hawks fall to NMJC, 60-59 in thriller

No. 11 Howard College can still receive at-large bid to national championship

LUBBOCK — Howard College's season came down to a free throw Saturday. With the game tied at 59 with 4.32 seconds left on the clock, if New Mexico Junior College's Desond Lee missed his second shot from the line, the NJCAA Region V championship game at the Rip Griffin Center would have likely gone into overtime. But he made it, putting the Thunderbirds up 60-59.

dramatic fashion, the No. 22 ranked Thunderbirds punched their ticket to the national championship in Hutchinson, Kan. HC gained possession of the ball one last time after Lee's foul shot, but turned it over when a player stepped out of bounds.

The atmosphere was electric as fans chanted "Howard Hawks" as the game was getting under

Cameron Forte — the Hawks' leading scorer on the season — put nine points on the board in the opening minutes, leading the charge as HC took a

Then it was NMJC's turn to dominate, as it closed out the first half with two consecutive three-point baskets to cap a 21-8 run and take a 28-24 lead before the intermission.

"It wasn't our best performance, but I thought we played hard" HC Head Coach Mark Adams said. "(NMJC) shot the ball better than we did. When you shoot under 50 percent from the free throw line in a championship game, it's difficult to win. We missed some critical blockouts and we didn't take advantage of opportunities late in the game to

The Hawks' deficit only got larger until a pair of three-point plays by Goran Huskic and Forte and a basket by Ladon Carter got some momentum going for Howard. After being down by 13, Jacob Thomas' three-point shot brought the score to 54-56.

Carter had a chance to tie it up at the free throw line, but missed both of his shots. NMJC then sank a three-pointer as the shot clock expired to run its

With 21 seconds remaining, Hawks fans leapt to their feet when Thomas knotted the game at 59 before Lee sank the winning basket for the

Forte led all scorers with 27 points, Thomas added 13, Carter chipped in eight and Rico Richardson put up five in the loss.

The Hawks may benefit from a NJCAA rule change which went into effect this year. At-large bids are being awarded and Howard College appears to be an obvious contender for the designation. Selections will be finalized today.

Adams said that with a little luck, the Hawks (30-5) have the potential to make a run, should they be chosen to go to Hutchinson.

"There's always luck involved in certain games,"

Adams said. "You may need to play five games to get to the

championship game, so you need everyone to be healthy, you have to stay out of foul trouble and there's no question about it, you need strong contributions from the bench. A lot of it depends on preparation, but the ball's got to bounce your way, too."

Kenseth holds off Kahne to win in Vegas

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Matt Kenseth decided not to replace any tires during the final pit stop under caution, and the calculated risk put him in the lead.

Kenseth knows a bit about risk after his offseason move to Joe Gibbs Racing, and this latest gamble paid off with his third victory in Vegas. Kenseth won on his

41st birthday in just his third start for his new team, barely holding off Kasey Kahne at Las Vegas Motor Speedway for his 25th career victory Sunday.

"I was real nervous all day," Kenseth said. "(Kahne) had the best car. I told (crew chief) Jason (Ratcliff) with about 12 to go that I was sorry we were going to lose. We were just too tight. ... We didn't have the fastest car there, but we had it where we needed it to be."

Kenseth took charge by taking only fuel on the final pit stop during caution while almost everybody else replaced two tires. He took the lead and held onto it, using his veteran savvy — and a few screamed instructions at his new spotter — to keep Kahne's impressive Chevrolet behind him to the

finish.

The frequently laidback Kenseth celebrated with uncommon vigor after his JGR Toyota crossed the line. He's still getting comfortable with his new teammates after leaving Roush Fenway Racing in the highest-profile driver move of the offseason, joining Gibbs after 13 seasons with RFR.

"I'm not a huge goal person, but my goal was to win, and to win early," Kenseth said. "Nobody has put any pressure on me except for myself, but I also know that Coach hired me to come in there, climb in that car and win races. You certainly want to do

to disappoint people. I'm glad we got a win, but it's still only Week 3. I feel like this is the beginning." Pole-sitter Brad Kes-

elowski finished third, with Kenseth's teammate, Kyle Busch, in fourth and Carl Edwards fifth. Jimmie Johnson, the overall points leader, was sixth and Dale Earnhardt Jr. seventh.

Defending Vegas champion Tony Stewart finished 11th, while Gibbs driver Denny Hamlin was 15th after an eventful week featuring a \$25,000 fine from NASCAR for criticizing the new Gen-6 race car.

The win was the 50th for Toyota in Sprint Cup Series competition. Kenseth is just the third NASCAR driver to win on his birthday, joining Cale Yarborough who did it twice — and Busch.

"I showed them a fake ID when they hired me," Kenseth said with a laugh. "Told them I was 28, going to be 29 this year."

Kenseth has won at least one race in 11 of his 14 full seasons in the Sprint Cup series, but the first 13 were all

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Fenway, the team that gave him his break in NASCAR and fostered his development into a likely Hall of Famer. Kenseth's decision to leave for a seat on Gibbs' team was an open secret for much of last season, although the veteran star never really explained his move.

"I had a lot of confidence after our first meeting and decided to go do this, and just had a great feeling about it, and still do," Kenseth

Gibbs had his own worries before the race after a rough start to the season for Toyota. Kenseth and Busch both had serious engine trouble at Daytona two weeks ago.

"Lots of times, a victory, the thrill of it, depends on kind of what happens leading up to it," Gibbs said.

"We've had a couple of weeks, as everybody knows. ... In tough times, everybody bands together around our place. We started fighting, and we worked our way out of some tough things."

The 400-mile race was the first real test for

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
that, and you don't want in Fords with Roush NASCAR's new Gen-6 car on the intermediate tracks they're built to race. Although Hamlin commanded the week's headlines with his pessimism amplified by the NASCAR fine, most drivers were curious how the Gen-6 would work in its ideal 1.5mile environment.

Any drivers who still think it's too tough to pass in the new car must not have been watching Busch, who made two lengthy charges up to early leads, doing it both before and after a pit-row speeding penalty dropped him back to 18th.

"I just hate it for my team," said Busch, a Las Vegas native.

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
