Big Spring High School's academic team fell just short of earning a second straight District 4-3A title, placing second to Abilene Wylie High School in Tuesday's University Interscholastic League meet at

Wylie scored 541 points to handily win the meet, while Big Spring was second with



Snyder High School finished third with 220 points, followed Monahans, Greenwood and Sweetwater. "I was proud

of our students," said Jennifer Adams of BSHS, the district's meet coordinator. "I was hoping we'd repeat as district

champs, but Wylie is always going to be tough." While BSHS fell short in

the competition for overall team honors, several students earned spots in the upcoming Region I-3A UIL meet, which will be held April 18-19 at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Students who placed in the top three of each event qualified for the regional meet.

Big Spring's speech squad

earned its 10th team district title under Adams' tutelage. Leading the way was Ethan Morelion and Chelsey Parker, who finished 1-2 in persuasive speaking; Shiloh Creswell, who won in informative speaking; Bell Guillory, tops in poetry interpretation; and Luis Casillas, who placed first in prose interpretation.

A stampede of the nicest kind will be held Friday when Lamun-Lusk-Sanchez Texas Veterans Home hosts its annual Easter egg hunt on the south side of the complex.





business owners living in the 20-county, South Texas area where the Eagle Ford Shale formation is currently being cultivated.

"Most everyone has heard of the current oil and gas boom going on in North Dakota with the Bakken Shale," Wegman said. "That boom is approximately five years ahead of the Cline Shale discovery. The Eagle Ford Shale formation is about two years ahead of where we are.

"The Eagle Ford Con-

sortium was started to help foster lines of communication between the oil companies in the area and the government bodies, such as cities, counties and school districts. They delve into the effects the discovery has had on the local cities and counties, which is very valuable information for us as we try to figure out what to expect."

Members of the consortium will be in Big Spring at 6 p.m. Thursday, April 4, at the Dora Roberts Community Center for a presentation on what effects counties can expect from the Cline Shale exploration, according to

Wegman.

"We'll have a presentation regarding the basics of the Cline Shale formation, which will delve into what it is and where it's located," Wegman said. "We'll also talk about its potential in comparison to other oil plays around the country and what's currently planned to develop the play, including what types of businesses will move into our communities to support that development.

"Following that presentation, Jeff Labenz-Hough, an architect and one of the leaders of the Eagle Ford Consortium, will talk about the opportunities and challenges associated with the rapid development of a major oil play to

our community and region."

Following Labenz-Hough's presentation, consortium members Paula Sydel and Jimmie Lopez will talk about the lessons the small businesses and cities have learned through the Eagle Ford Shale exploration, according to Wegman.

"Right now, most people in the Permian Basin are wondering how the Cline Shale will affect them and their cities," Wegman said. "By looking at what the Eagle Ford Consortium has experienced and gone through, we can try to get an idea of what's to come. It can also help us figure out

what we can be doing to ready ourselves for it in the meantime."

Early estimates for the Cline Shale formation based on Oklahoma City-based Devon Energy's exploration in the area — put the estimated recoverable reserves at 30 billion barrels of oil. By comparison, the U.S. Geological Survey estimates the Eagle Ford holds up to 7 billion to 10 billion in recoverable reserves, while the Bakken Shale could hold as much as 4.3 billion barrels of recoverable oil.

Cuts made to border security, immigrant detention

PHOENIX (AP) — Marco Antonio Durazo had been awaiting deportation from an Arizona detention center for six months when an officer came to get him from his cell.

"Obama doesn't have any money," the officer said.
"We found it very funny"

"We found it very funny," Durazo said, but it wasn't a joke.

Soon, he was free along with hundreds of other illegal immigrants who were released by the Obama administration because of budget pressures. Officials have also scaled back border agent hours, drug patrols and staffing at border crossings — all during the peak illegal border-crossing season.

While prompted by the nation's money woes, the changes also come amid the nation's shifting immigration policy after years of mass arrests and deportations and billions spent on border security.

The long-term impact of that change has yet to be seen. The Border Patrol said January and February numbers showed a nearly 10 percent increase in apprehensions along the Mexico border for the first two months of the year, compared with 2012.

There could be several factors for the rise, including immigrants motivated by an improving U.S. economy or those anticipating congressional action that could create a path to citizenship.

The cuts come as lawmakers are struggling to work out a comprehensive immigration reform package whose success may ultimately be tied to questions of border security.

On Wednesday, Sen. John McCain led a bipartisan group of senators on a tour of the border, and they said they were close to a deal but continued to tie it to keeping immigration in check. They promised more details next week, but McCain said that there's "no doubt" in his mind that the border is less secure because of the budget cuts.

The release of more than 2,200 immigrants like Durazo drew headlines this month as the government prepared for looming cuts that began in March. In February, the government let go of hundreds of immigrants from detention centers in states including Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia and Texas. The administration planned to let roughly 3,000 more go in March, according to an internal government budget document reviewed by the AP and later released by the House Judiciary Committee.

The moves were an attempt by Immigration and Customs Enforcement to get its detainee population in line with what it could afford. The released immigrants still face deportation but will not be held while awaiting their court dates. Some in Congress said ICE should have explained beforehand that there wasn't enough money to keep everyone in detention.

In February, the government let go of hundreds of immigrants from detention centers in states including Arizona, California, Florida, Georgia and Texas. The administration planned to let roughly 3,000 more go in March.

The immigrants and their lawyers say they were released with little notice or instruction beyond being told to check in periodically.

In many cases, the immigrants were dropped off in the middle of the night at bus stations or airports in metropolitan centers without money to finish their journey home. In Florida, some were released from a facility bordering rural swamp land outside Miami.

Critics argue the plan allowed the release of thousands of criminals without regard to public safety, but officials say almost all the detainees were characterized as low risk. ICE Director John

Morton told a congressional panel that 10 of the 2,228 people were the highest level of offender.

"In reducing detention levels, we took careful steps to ensure that national security and public safety were not compromised," he told a congressional hearing.

Meanwhile, the Obama ad-

ministration, in the midst of trying to get immigration overhauled, switched from daily declarations that the border was secure to warning of the increasingly dire consequences of cutting \$754 million from Customs and Border Protection's \$12 billion budget.

In the first week of the cuts, some agents in South Texas reported a spike in arrests of immigrants who said smugglers told them they would be briefly detained and then released. The agents' union quickly spread word of a "tidal wave" of immigrants taking advantage of the situation.

Several immigrants interviewed at a migrant shelter in Reynosa, Mexico, across the border from McAllen, Texas, said they had not heard anything suggesting now was a particularly good time to cross. Instead, several said they were returning home because the drug cartel that controlled river crossings made it too expensive and dangerous.

"Here, they say you can't

cross the river right now because there are a lot of kidnappings. They're killing a lot of people," said Josue Manuel Vazquez, who added that he escaped kidnappers who held him for five days as they tried to extort \$4,500 from his daughter, a legal U.S. resident.

Some contend the budget cuts are relatively small when put in the broader context of the huge build-up of border security over the past decade.

According to the Government Accountability Office, the Department of Homeland Security assigned about 28,100 people in 2004 to patrol land borders and inspect travelers at all ports of entry at a cost of about \$5.9 billion. By the end of 2011, those figures were 41,400 employees at a cost of \$11.8 billion.

"The scale of (automatic budget cuts) is minuscule compared to the vast build-up," said Geoff Boyce, spokesman for No More Deaths, an immigration advocacy group in Tucson, Ariz.

The effects of the cuts are being seen in border cities and among agents. Customs and Border Protection reduced overtime for its officers at ports of entry. In San Diego and other crossing points, that translated to fewer lanes open at land crossings and longer waits for people and trucks carrying produce and other goods from Mexico.

Senate education panel OKs 'parent-trigger' bill

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Senate Education Committee has referred to the full Senate a modified version of a bill that would make it easier for parents to urge school boards to close failing schools — or convert them into charters.

Currently, schools rated "Academically Unacceptable" for three straight years can be reorganized by state officials.

If the school doesn't improve for two more years after that, a majority of parents can petition the school board seeking closure or conversion to a charter.

Senate Bill 1263 sought to let parents seek school board action after just two years of unacceptable ratings. But an amended version approved by the committee Thursday made it three years.

The new bill also says petitions against failing schools must be truly grassroots and not influenced by charter operators.

Man accused of selling bogus newspaper ads

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — A 61-year-old Minden man faces charges in at least six parishes and one Texas county in connection with an alleged scam that involved selling bogus newspaper ads.

Caddo Parish Sheriff Steve Prator says David Edward Dix is accused of going into several Caddo businesses and stating that he works for a local newspaper.

Prator says Dix sold ads and told the businesses their ads would appear in the June edition of the paper. When the ads did not appear, the businesses contacted the paper and discovered Dix never had worked for it.

The Montgomery County Sheriff's Office says Britt Privatte was captured Thursday in north Harris County and a dozen people face charges.

Lt. Dan Norris says Privatte was seen walking from a hotel. Police dogs found Privatte into a tree,

he jumped and ran but was caught. Privatte was treated for a dog bite before being returned to the lockup in Conroe.

Norris says 11 inmates are charged with hindering apprehension in the March 17 escape from a jail recreation area. A person from Cleveland, about 25 miles east of Conroe, faces evidence tampering charges

Privatte was jailed on aggravated robbery charges following a January bank holdup.

Drugs suspected in Austin apartment explosion

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Propane tanks have been found inside a Central Texas apartment that exploded and burned two occupants in what police call a drug-related blast.

Austin police detained a third person at the scene of Wednesday's explosion.

Investigators say a man and a woman suffered serious burns over 20 percent of their bodies and have been transported to Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio. Names of the hospitalized pair haven't been released.

Further details on the uninjured third person and any possible charges weren't immediately avail-

Austin police Lt. Norris McKenzie says it appears the apartment occupants were "cooking" marijuana to extract psychoactive ingredients. The explosion caused about \$85,000 in damage to the second-floor unit.

DPS: Texas' greatest crime threat from cartels

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — State public safety officials say Mexican cartels pose the single greatest organized crime threat to Texas.

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced this week findings from this year's Public Safety Threat Overview.

The review says identifies Mexican cartels and prison gangs — many of which work with cartels — as the two biggest organized threats to the state.

According to the report, the majority of crimes involving cartel members go unreported. DPS says it believes six major Mexican cartels, including Los Zetas and the Gulf Cartel, are currently operating in the state.

Texas also faces threats from international terrorism, natural disasters and motor vehicle crashes.

South African presidency says Nelson Mandela was admitted to hospital with lung infection

JOHANNESBURG (AP) — Nelson Mandela, the anti-apartheid leader who became South Africa's first black president, has been admitted to a hospital with a recurring lung infection, South Africa said Thursday. Mandela, 94, has become increasingly frail in re-

cent years and has been hospitalized several times since last year, mostly recently earlier this month when he received what a presidential spokesman described as a "successful" medical test. Mandela was admitted to a hospital just before

midnight Wedesday "due to the recurrence of his lung infection," the office of President Jacob Zuma said in a statement.

"Doctors are attending to him, ensuring that he has the best possible expert medical treatment and comfort," the statement said. It appealed "for understanding and privacy in order to allow space to the doctors to do their work."

Zuma wished Mandela a speedy recovery, referring to him affectionately by his clan name, "Madi-

Cyprus prepares to open its banks for first time in more than a week; capital controls apply

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Bank employees and financial authorities in Cyprus are preparing banks to reopen after being shut for more than a week due to the country's acute financial crisis.

Strict restrictions have been set on financial transactions once the banks open for six hours at noon (1000 GMT). The maximum cash withdrawal limit has been set at 300 euros (\$383) per day and no checks will be cashed. Travelers leaving the country can only take up to 1,000 euros, or the equivalent in foreign currency, with them in cash.

Banks have been closed since March 16 as politicians scrambled to come up with a plan to raise enough funds for Cyprus to qualify for 10 billion euros (\$12.9 billion) in bailout loans for its stricken banking sector.

However Supreme Court rules, sharp divisions over gay marriage will persist across U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — However the Supreme Court

rules after its landmark hearings on same-sex marriage, the issue seems certain to divide Americans and states for many years to come.

In oral arguments Tuesday and Wednesday on two cases involving gay couples' rights, the justices left open multiple options for rulings that are

But they signaled there was no prospect of imposing a 50-state solution at this stage. With nine states now allowing same-sex marriages and other states banning them via statutes or constitutional amendments, that means a longer spell with a patchwork marriage-rights map — and no early end to bruising state-by-state battles in the courts, in the legislatures and at the ballot box.

A decade ago, opponents of same-sex marriage were lobbying for a nationwide ban on gay nuptials. They now seem resigned to the reality of a divided nation in which the debate will continue to splinter families, church congregations and communities.

"It's a lot more healthy than shutting off an intense debate at the very moment of its greatest intensity," said John Eastman, chairman of the National Organization for Marriage and a law professor at Chapman University in Orange, Calif.

By contrast, supporters of same-sex marriage believe a nationwide victory is inevitable, though perhaps not imminent. Many of them see merit in continuing an incre-

mental hearts-and-minds campaign, given that many opinion polls now show a majority of Americans supporting their cause.

German guest worker program offers lessons for U.S. as it ponders immigration reform

BERLIN (AP) — In gritty backstreets of Berlin, housewives wearing head scarves shop for lamb and grape leaves. Old men pass the time in cafes sipping coffee, chatting in Turkish and reading Turkish newspapers.

More than three million people of Turkish origin live in Germany — the legacy of West Germany's Cold War-era program to recruit temporary foreign labor during the boom years of the 1950s and 1960s when the country rebuilt after World War II. What started as a temporary program has changed

the fabric of German urban life — from mosques on street corners to countless shops selling widely popular Doener kebab fast food sandwiches.

Germany's experience with "guest workers" offers lessons for the United States as it debates immigration reform, including whether to provide a path to citizenship for unskilled foreign laborers, or whether there should be additional temporaryonly visas for such workers. President Barack Obama has urged Congress to begin debate in April after lawmakers return from a two-week recess.

Decades after Germany's formal guest worker program ended in the early 1970s, the country is still wrestling with ways to integrate Turks the second biggest group among the estimated 15 million-strong immigrant community after ethnic Germans who moved from the former Soviet Union and for Soviet bloc countries — into German soci-

Afghan villagers flee their homes, blame U.S. drones as targeted killings of militants rise KHALIS FAMILY VILLAGE, Afghanistan (AP)

 Barely able to walk even with a cane, Ghulam Rasool says he padlocked his front door, handed over the keys and his three cows to a neighbor and fled his mountain home in the middle of the night to escape relentless airstrikes from U.S. drones targeting militants in this remote corner of Afghani-Rasool and other Afghan villagers have their own

name for Predator drones. They call them benghai, which in the Pashto language means the "buzzing of flies." When they explain the noise, they scrunch their faces and try to make a sound that resembles an army of flies. "They are evil things that fly so high you don't

see them but all the time you hear them," said Rasool, whose body is stooped and shrunken with age and his voice barely louder than a whisper. "Night and day we hear this sound and then the bombardment starts."

The U.S. military is increasingly relying on drone strikes inside Afghanistan, where the number of weapons fired from unmanned aerial aircraft soared from 294 in 2011 to 506 last year. With international combat forces set to withdraw by the end of next year, such attacks are now used more for targeted killings and less for supporting ground troops.

It's unclear whether Predator drone strikes will continue after 2014 in Afghanistan, where the government has complained bitterly about civilian casualties.

The strikes sometimes accidentally kill civilians while forcing others to abandon their hometowns in fear, feeding widespread anti-American senti-

Gun control backers struggle to win votes

WASHINGTON (AP) It would seem a lobbyist's dream: rounding up votes for a proposal backed by more than 8 in 10 people in polls. Yet, gun control supporters are struggling to win over moderate Democrats their in drive to push expanded background checks for purchasers firearms through the Senate next month.

Backed by a \$12 million TV advertising campaign financed by New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg, gun control groups scheduled rallies around the country Thursday aimed at pressuring senators to back the effort. President Barack Obama was meeting with gun violence

victims. Moderate Senate Democrats like Mark Pryor of Arkansas and Heidi Heitkamp of North Dakota are shunning Bloombergasameddling outsider while stressing their allegiance to their own voters' views and to gun rights. While saying they are keeping an open mind and that they support keeping guns from criminals and people with mental

crats are avoiding specific commitments they might regret later.

"I do not need someone from New York City to tell me how to handle crime in our state. I know that we can go after and prosecute criminals without the need to infringe upon the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding North Dakotans," Heitkamp said this week, citing the right to bear arms.

Heitkamp does not face re-election next year, but Pryor and five other Senate Democrats from Republican-leaning or closely divided states do. All six, from Southern and Western states, will face voters whose deep attachment to guns is unshakeable — not to mention opposition from the still-potent National Rifle Association, should they vote for restrictions the NRA opposes.

"We have a politically savvy and a loyal voting bloc, and the politicians know that," said Andrew Arulanandam, spokesman for the NRA, which claims nearly 5 million paying members.

The heart of the Senate gun bill will be expanded

requirements for federal background checks for gun buyers, the remaining primary proposal pushed by Obama and many Democrats since 20 first-graders and six women were shot to death in December at an elementary school in Newtown, Conn. Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid of Nevada has said there aren't enough votes to approve a ban on assault weapons, while prospects are uncertain for a prohibition on large-capacity ammunition magazines.

Today, the background checks apply only to sales by the nation's roughly 55,000 federally licensed gun dealers. Not covered are private transactions like those at gun shows and online. The Senate measure is still evolving as Sens. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., and Mark Kirk, R-Ill., use Congress' two-week recess to negotiate for additional support in both parties.

Expanding background checks to include gun show sales got 84 percent support in an Associated Press-GfK poll earlier this year. ground checks have received similar in other national polls.

Polls in some Southern states have been comparable. March surveys by the Quinnipiac University Polling Institute found more than 9 in 10 people in Florida and Virginia backing expanded background checks, the same margin found by an Elon University Poll in North Carolina in February.

Analysts say people support more background checks because they consider it an extension of the existing system. That doesn't translate to unvarnished support from lawmakers, in part because the small but vocal minorities who oppose broader background checks and other gun restrictions tend to be driven voters that politicians are reluctant to alienate.

Rangers wrapping up preseason, fall to Angels 6-3

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Angles manager Mike Scioscia is very excited about Ernesto Frieri and the rest of his bull-

Frieri pitched a hitless inning in Los Angeles' 6-3 victory over the Texas Rangers on Wednesday.

On getaway day for the Los Angeles Angels and with most of his starting lineup already on the way to California, manager Mike Scioscia gave several glowing reports of the status of his pitching staff, and in particular, the bullpen after Wednesday's 6-3 in over Texas at Tempe, the Angels' final Cactus League game.

"Ernesto looked the best he's looked all season so that is a good sign," said Scioscia, who refused to name

Frieri as his opening day closer when pressed Wednesday even though Rvan Madson is still coming back from Tommy John surgery.

Frieri finished with a 4-2 record and a 2.32 ERA with 23 saves for the Angels in 2012. He struck out 80 in 54 1-3 innings.

Still, the Angels took a chance on former Philadelphia closer Ryan Madson, who is recovering from elbow reconstruction surgery and has not pitched since the 2011 season, signing him over the offseason.

Scioscia said Madson threw an undisclosed amount of pitches Wednesday at "100 percent" and added that Angels pitching coach Mike Butcher said that "the ball was coming out of his hand fine."

Madson complained of pain in his elbow again early in camp and has been slowed considerably this spring. Scioscia said Wednesday that Madson "was not even close" to pitching in a game and has at least two more weeks of bullpen work ahead of him. Earlier Wednesday,

Angels claimed right-hander Mark Lowe from the Los Angeles Dodgers off waivers.

Lowe, 29, was released by the Los Angeles Dodgers last week. He holds a career 3.94 ERA in seven seasons and had a 3.43 ERA with Texas last season over 36 games.

"He's got a big arm so we'll see how it plays out," Scioscia said. "If he throws to his capabilities, there's no doubt he can help us in our bullpen.

Scioscia said he would get a longer look at Lowe in the upcoming Freeway Series.

Garrett Richards, who figures to open the season in the bullpen, allowed three hits in 2 1-3 scoreless innings in his fifth appearance and second start.

Jerome Williams took

over for Richards and struck out six in 3 2-3 innings. He allowed two runs and six hits.

"Right now you see that Jerome and Garrett are stretched out," Scioscia said. "I think we feel real good about our starting pitching depth. Right now we'll see where we go from here as we head into the season."

Lance Berkman doubled in a run and Adrian Beltre added an RBI single in a two-run Texas third off Williams.

Texas lashed out 14 hits in the losing effort. Beltre, A.J. Pierzynski and Leonys Martin had two hits apiece.

Left-hander Brad Mills, acquired from the Angels on a waiver claim last Sunday, made his first appearance with the Rangers and his second start overall and fourth spring appearance.

Mills worked four innings and allowed one run and four hits.

"He's got good secondary stuff," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "He's got to command that fastball a little better."

Pistorius allowed to leave S. Africa with conditions

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) — Oscar Pistorius can leave South Africa to compete in international meets, a judge ruled on Thursday as he upheld the Olympic athlete's appeal against some of his bail restrictions.

Pistorius' agent told The Associated Press that this year's world championships could be "on the radar."

Bert Judge Bam said Pistorius, who is charged with murder in the Valentine's Day shooting death of his girlfriend Reeva Steenkamp, must travel under certain conditions. His passport will be held by a court while he is in South Africa, and he can only leave the country if he provides an itinerary of his travel plans at least a week before he is due to leave. Pistorius must also hand his travel documents back to the court within 24 hours of returning home.

The ruling in a North Gauteng High Court opens the way for the Paralympic champion, who is facing a life sentence if found guilty of murder, to run in international competitions again.

Pistorius' agent, Peet van Zyl, told the AP soon after the ruling that Pistorius could even run at the world championships in Moscow in August — if he wanted to and if he qualified.

The judge's decision was "fair," Van Zyl said, but any return to competition would be up to Pistorius, who hasn't run competitively since September or trained for two months.

"He's going to be the one that determines running and training," the agent said. "It's his call. He's the one under all the pressure for the court case and grieving for Reeva."

Although Pistorius' lawyers said in the appeal hearing that he had no immediate plans to compete, he would likely need to return to track in the future to earn money, they said. Pistorius himself, a double amputee widely known as the Blade Runner for his prosthetic legs, did not attend the court

session. "He has no desire to compete now but it might change and it will change," defense lawyer Barry Roux told the judge in arguing for some of Pistorius' bail restrictions to be eased. Roux said Pistorius would not try and evade trial if he is allowed to travel internationally, and would eventually need to run again "to

earn an income." "He is not going to run away and hide. He is going nowhere," Roux told the judge in the brown-walled courtroom in the high court, where television cameras and photographers were allowed in to record the proceedings. "Why stop him from traveling under controlled circum-
