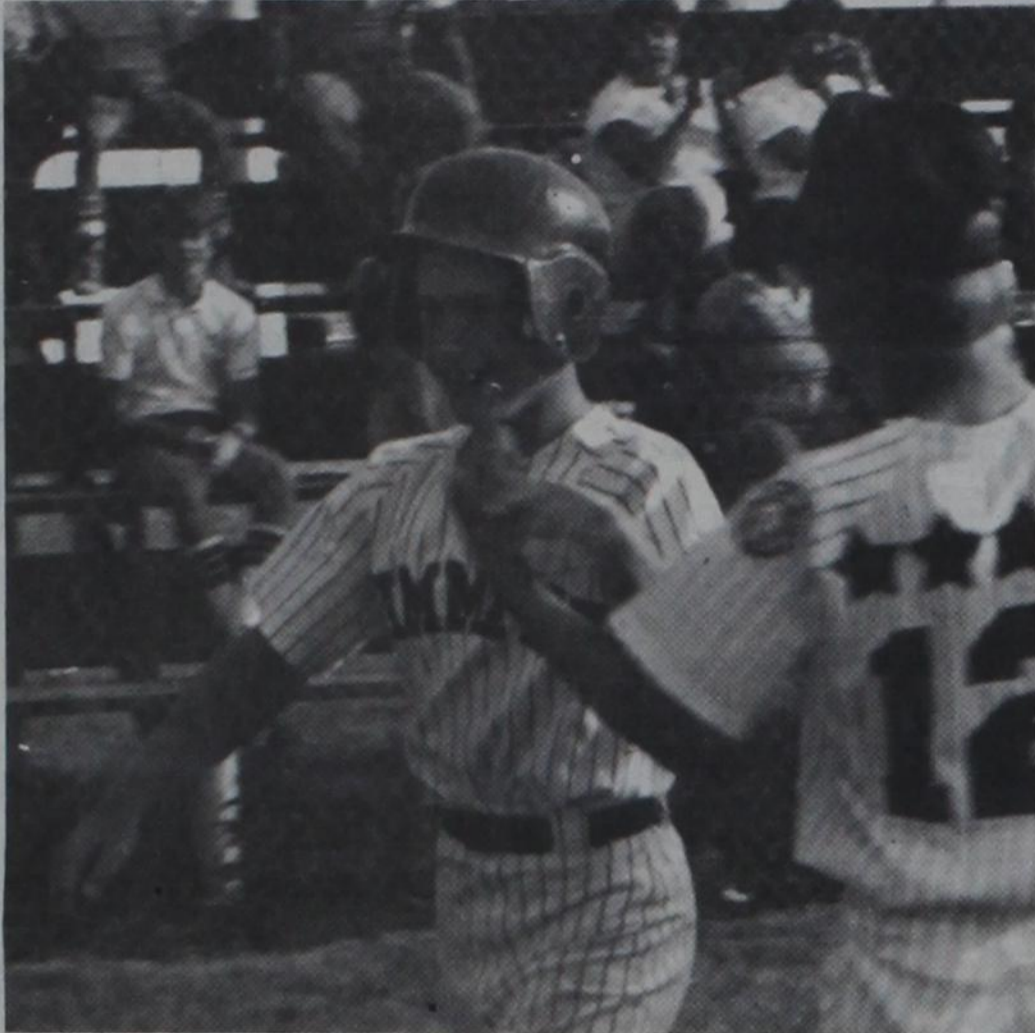

## Bronco teams erupt at 'Tater Town'

In baseball parlance, a home run is known as a "tater."

At George Howell Memorial Park, 13 taters were mashed in the first two nights of the Sectional Bronco Baseball Tournament in Dimmitt.

The cozy field, which is just 208 feet at the deepest point, saw six balls hit out of the park Monday night and seven more hit Tuesday night.

Muleshoe, who hammered five home runs including three by Larry Gonzales in a 14-8 win over Hereford Tuesday, and Amarillo III, who had a pair of home runs in the first inning in their 13-3 win over Dimmitt Tuesday, will square off in a winner's bracket contest at 8 p.m. Thursday, with the winner to go into the championship game at 2 p.m. Saturday in the double-elimination tourney.

Wednesday night, Dimmitt faced Amarillo II at 6 p.m., while Amarillo I squared off against Hereford at 8 p.m. The losers of those two games will be eliminated while the winners will meet Thursday at 6 p.m.

The winner of the early game Thursday will face the loser of the late game on Friday night at 6:30, with the winner to face either Muleshoe or Amarillo III in the finals.

Dimmitt never got a fighting chance in its game Tuesday as Amarillo rocked starter Billy Ray Thomas for two home runs, a single and a walk, getting five runs off Thomas in just one-third of an inning. Jesse Garza relieved Thomas and put out the fire after giving up a walk, and struck out three of the four Amarillo batters he faced in the second.

Garza then surrendered three walks, a base hit and hit third baseman Bryan Paulk with a pitch, giving up four runs without an out. He was relieved by Ruiz, who gave up yet another run, then gave up three more runs in the fourth.

Dimmitt, meanwhile, scored all three of their runs in the fourth when Roger Gauna singled, Thomas walked and Garza hit his second "tater" of the tournament.

Dimmitt had runners at second and third in the fifth on a double by Scott Acker, a sacrifice by Matt Cozby and a walk and stolen base by Armando Arce, but Freddie Fernandez struck out to end the inning and the game, which was called by the 10-run rule.

Hereford was dumped by Muleshoe, who got 15 hits off Hereford pitching and the performance of Gonzales, who had seven RBI and surrendered just one run in three innings on the mound.

Abel Barron and Daniel Rodriguez also homered in the contest.

Hereford, who had just one hit in its 8-6 win over Amarillo II Monday night, had seven hits, but further aided Muleshoe's cause by committing five errors.

Dimmitt advanced to Tuesday's winner's bracket game against Amarillo III by dumping Amarillo I 12-10 Monday night in the tournament opener.

Johnny Espinosa singled in two runs in the top of the seventh inning for the game-winning RBI off losing pitcher Casey Mann, who came in to relieve Tom Sell after Sell had walked two, given up two base hits and had two costly errors committed by his defense in the seventh.

The first five Dimmitt batters — Jesse Garza, Robert Ruiz, Johnny Rodriguez, Scott Acker and Armando Arce — all reached base and scored in the seventh as 11 batters went to the plate.

Amarillo went out to an early lead on back-to-back homers in the second inning by Cole Webb and Sell off Dimmitt starter Scott Acker, but Dimmitt jumped out in front in the fourth in three consecutive home runs by Adam Cline, Garza and Ruiz.

Webb scored for Amarillo in the fourth after a bases-loaded error by first-baseman Cline, and Chris Stull tied the score for Amarillo in the fifth on a sacrifice fly by Mann.

Dimmitt jumped back in front, 7-4, on a bases-loaded double by Billy Ray Thomas, but Amarillo answered with six runs in the sixth inning when Ruiz, who came in to relieve Garza, had a crucial error behind him by Espinosa in center to allow one run, then gave up a walk and two singles before Mann hit a grand-slam over the left-centerfield fence to give Amarillo a 10-7 lead going into the seventh.

The loss dumped Amarillo I into Wednesday's late game in the loser's bracket.

In Monday's second contest, Hereford had just one hit but still edged Amarillo II, 8-6.

Brant Hoving led off the game for Amarillo II with a home run, but Amarillo pitching had trouble finding the strike zone in the bottom of the third, and once they did find the plate, Hereford's Anthony Mondragon hit a grand-slam home run.

Hereford then scored four more runs on a hit batsman, four walks, a sacrifice fly and two steals.

Amarillo II scored single runs in the fourth, fifth and seventh innings and scored two runs in the sixth on two singles, a sacrifice fly and a ground out, but pitcher Robert Rico, who picked up the win, came back with a vengeance in the top of the seventh after Hoving scored on a Jeff Clark single to force two pop ups and a strikeout to send Hereford into Tuesday's winner's bracket game against Muleshoe.

Amarillo II played in the first losers bracket game Wednesday.

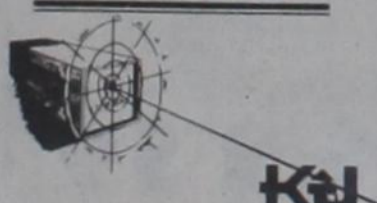

(Continued from Page 1) expanding the operation as long as it's profitable." Smith said the water used by the floral crops is about average for other crops grown in the region. "The gladiolas use about as much water as corn," Smith said, "But most of the flowers use a little more than cotton but a little less than corn." Another problem faced by Van Zielst and Smith include insects and weeds. "What we use for weed control in Holland we can't use here," Van Zielst said. "It's

not labeled for use here. We have some insect problems with the primrose, but we don't have any problems with the gladiolas here, but we have to spray them in Holland." And what about the investment needed for the operation? "Well, for all of this seed we have planted, counting the freight cost and everything, it cost about \$22,000 for the 450 acres we have planted," Smith said.

Some of the seed, depending

on how the US Dollar stacks up against the Dutch Guilder could bring as much as \$100 an ounce or more for the more precious seed.

Of course, if it's Holland, there have to be some tulips. "We don't have any tulips here this year," said Neele, who will be returning to The Netherlands next month. "I think we will have some next year, perhaps. The heat is what concerns me. The tulips must have a tough, sturdy bulb, and I'm concerned the bulb might be too thin in the higher temperatures here.

"It's okay for the gladiolas to be a little thinner. The customers will look at them, and maybe break off a seed or something, but not with the tulip bulbs.

"We hope we're here for a long time." In Holland-Texas.

Lakes Grasmere and Windermere, and the Rothay River) where he grew up, learned every bend and boulder, and wrote his immortal sonnets, ballads and poems. This is where many English people go to find solitude and beauty along the graveled and paved walking paths.

Wordsworth described its beauty in his 1800 poem, *Home at Grasmere*:

*How vast the compass of this theatre,  
Yet nothing to be seen but lovely pomp  
And silent majesty: the birch-tree  
woods  
Are hung with thousand thousand  
diamond drops  
Of melted hoar-frost, every tiny knot  
In the bare twigs, each little budding-  
place  
Cased with its several bead, what  
myriads there  
Upon one tree, while all the distant  
grove  
That rises to the summit of the steep  
Shows like a mountain built of silver  
light.  
See yonder the same pageant, and  
again

That parts the image from reality:  
And the clear hills, as high as they  
ascend  
Heavenward, so deep piercing the lake  
below.*

Other highlights for us were the great and historic cities of Edinburgh, Scotland, and York and London; the Yorkshire Dales National Park, with its rock boundary fences, some of which were built by the Romans; Loch Lomond, where we spent Verbie's birthday and came upon the roadside shop of Sandy McPherson, handloom weaver; the lochs and row-planted forests of the Scottish midlands; and, of course, Westminster, the Tower of London, the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace (which is your basic ceremonial excess), and all the other fairytale sights of the British

capital. I found myself surprisingly intrigued by the architecture and the use of stone throughout northern and central England. Although the Romans were succeeded by later conquerors, it was their stonebuilding methods that prevailed in the permanent structures of the country. (They even knew how to make clay brick.)

Most English people live in "detached" homes of Victorian architecture — duplexes three and four stories high — and their "gardens" in the cities are the size we would devote to a patio. In the cities, the homes are brick. In the countryside, the architecture is the same, but the homes are built of quarried native stone. New homes are built to resemble the old. Each village and metropolis has its rows and rows of houses jammed together.

It's a crowded way to live, but theirs is a crowded island. In the areas we visited, the shingles are all chipped of slate. When a roof needs rebuilding, they simply take

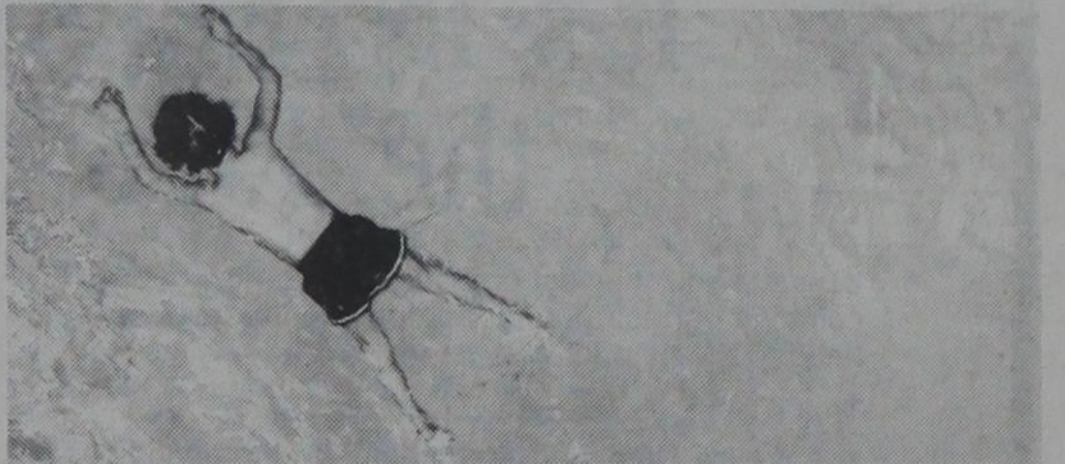
the slate shingles off, stack them aside until the structural work is done, then put them back on.

Their roadways, also, were all made originally of granite blocks (now paved over with asphalt), and they are uniformly smooth and good, if narrow. All streets and roads are lined with curbstones, each about 6x6 inches square and three feet long, either of quarried granite or concrete molded to resemble granite. Most roadways also have paved walkways alongside.

The things the English have done through the centuries with carved stone — from the immense cathedrals to the majestic Parliament buildings — are not just impressive, but breathtaking.

The sights, the scenery, the history, the art, the people, all made it one of the best vacations we've ever had.

We wanted to spend a week in Edinburgh, a month in London, a year in York. But after two weeks, we were ready to come back to good old Dimmitt, and glad to get home!

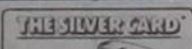

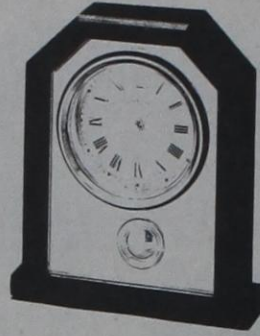

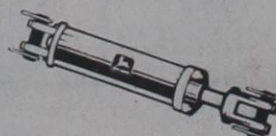

# Referendum, director election underway

Four grain sorghum producers of the Texas High Plains area are candidates for re-election to the office of Director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. Their names will appear on the same ballot as referendums to establish a uniform grain sorghum checkoff throughout Texas.

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board was established in 29 counties of the Texas High Plains in 1969. Since that time, it has financed most of the promotion and market development for Texas sorghum. In this election, sorghum producers outside the current TGSPB area will vote on a proposal to join TGSPB and expand the program statewide.

The High Plains candidates are: Dennis W. Anthony of Friona in Parmer County, Albert Scheele of Lockney in Floyd County, Weldon Shelton of Lamesa in Dawson County and Loyall Turner of Spearman in Hansford County. If the referendum to expand the program is approved by two-thirds of the producers voting, seven directors will be elected at-large from a slate of 23. The seven directors-elect will join eight who are serving unexpired terms on the existing board. Directors are elected to six-year terms with one-third

of them rotating off each two years.

The directors have the full responsibility of the TGSPB programs within limits approved by the voters. They have the authority to set the rate of the assessment but may not exceed the maximum specified in the referendum. They also hire staff, decide projects and determine collection procedures. They are elected officers of the State of Texas. They are not paid for their services but provisions have been made to reimburse them for travel expenses.

While farmers in counties outside the TGSPB area vote on the checkoff, those in the High Plains area will vote on a referendum to raise the maximum limit of the assessment from ¼ cent per hundredweight to one cent. The proposition is to allow adjustments in assessments to meet the operating costs of the 1980's. If approved, the board of directors will have the authority to set the assessment at any rate which does not exceed one cent per hundredweight.

The TGSPB checkoff funds are used to finance the promotion of Texas grain sorghum in markets throughout the world. In recent years, TGSPB has concentrated most of its efforts in Mexico. Due largely to those efforts, Mexico is now buying as much US sorghum as half of the Texas production.

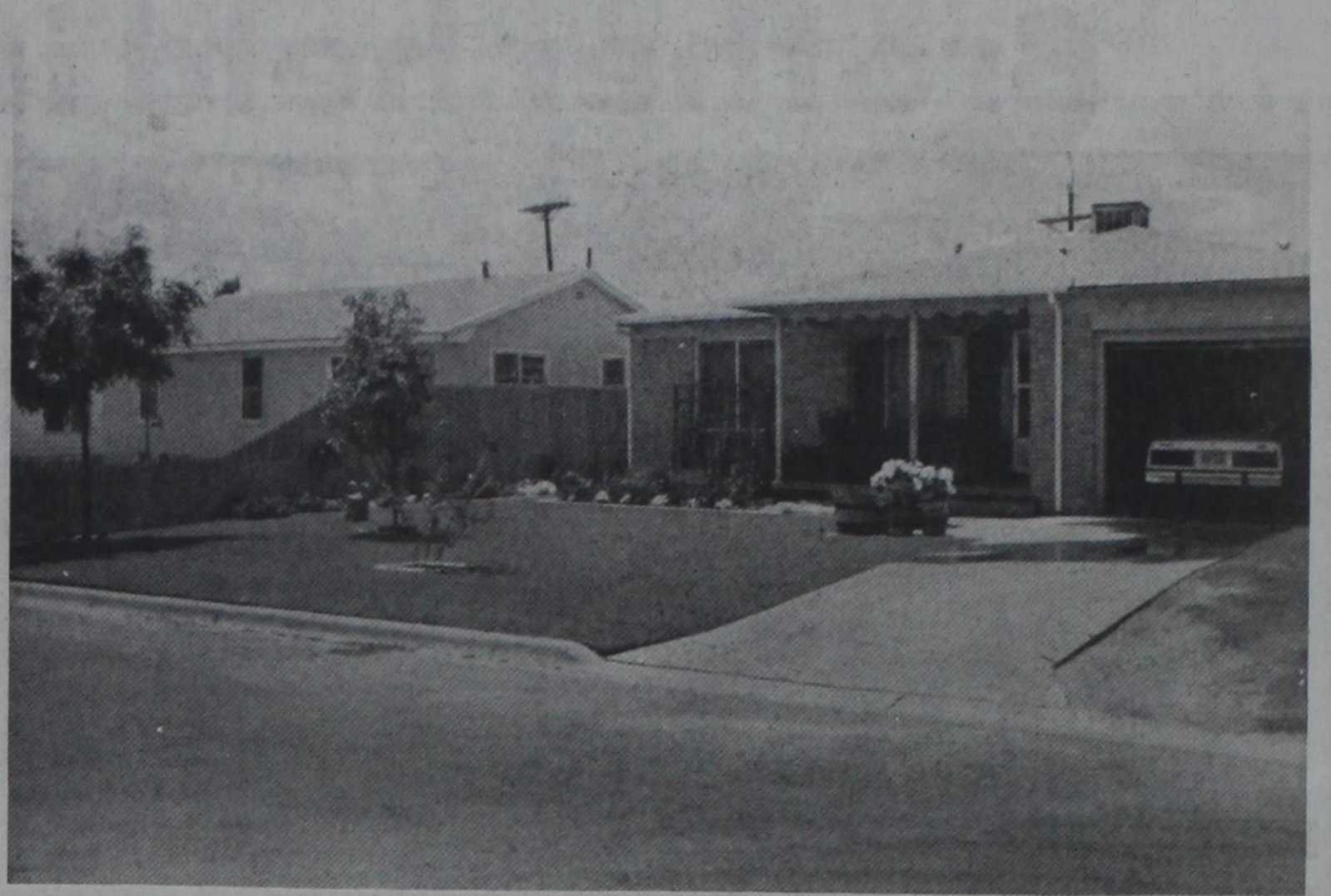
Other TGSPB projects are selling Texas sorghum in Asia and South America with demonstration projects beginning in China and the Mideast. TGSPB has conducted numerous research projects to

prove the value of sorghum as a livestock feed. One such project persuaded USDA to raise the loan rate and price support of sorghum from 92 percent of that corn to 95 percent. That project has added from 10 to 15 cents per hundredweight to sorghum's price each year since 1972.

The proposed TGSPB checkoff is a uniform way to finance the sorghum promotion for the benefit of all sorghum farmers. Participation is voluntary. Any producer who does not wish to pay the assessment simply requests and promptly receives a refund.

Anyone who has produced sorghum in Texas during at least one of the past three years is eligible to vote in the election. Ballots will be mailed to more than 60,000 Texas sorghum producers on the ASCS roll. Any producer who does not receive a ballot by August 1, may obtain one at his County Extension Office or by calling toll-free 1-800-692-4169. Farmers are also advised to use the toll-free number with any questions about the referendum or checkoff program.

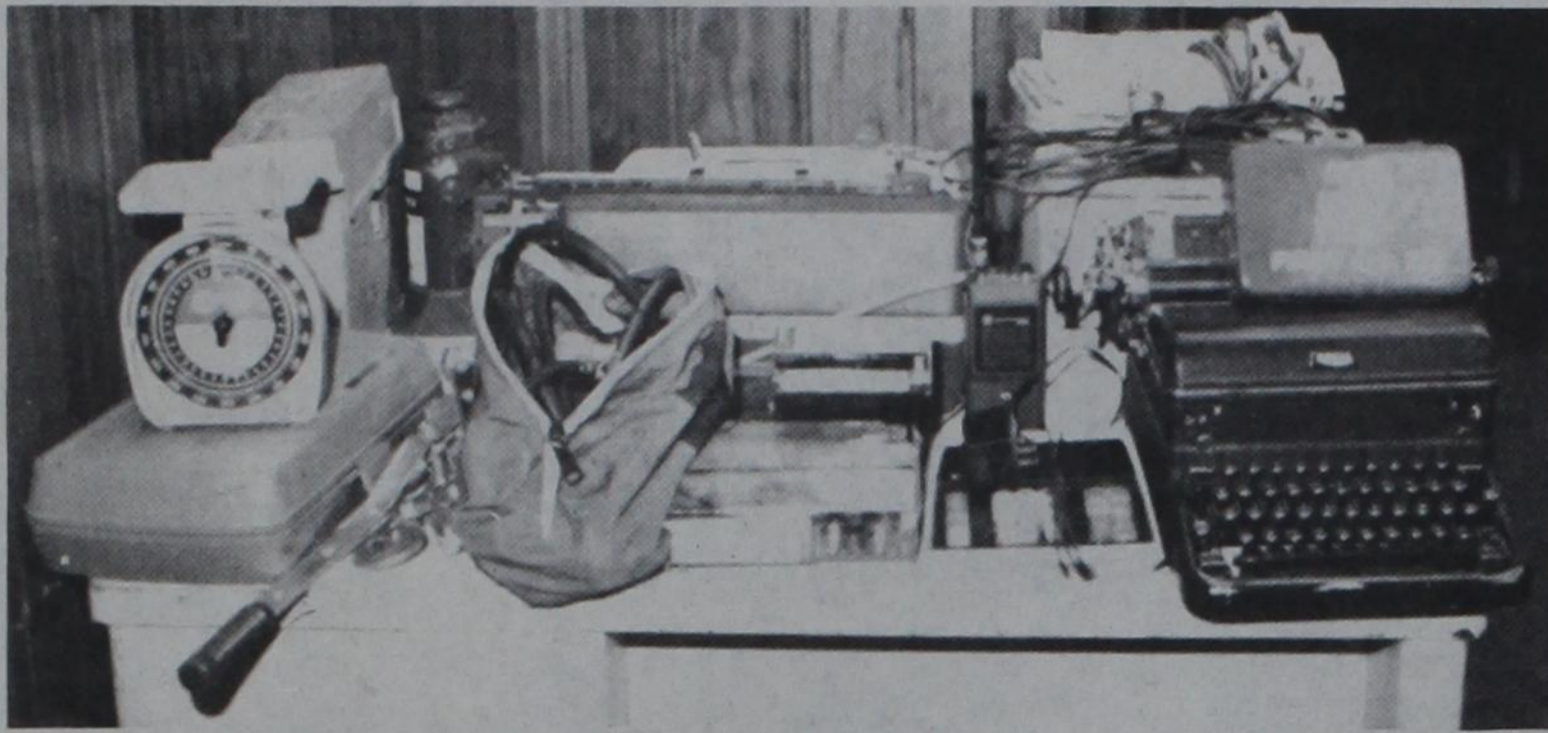

## Brother held in Montiel death

Joe Montiel died July 9 at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo of internal injuries he received during a fight with the suspect, police said.

Ruben Naranjo Baldivia, 39, of Portales, N.M., who is charged with capital murder in the June 13 stabbing death of Bob Ballard near Sunnyside, was transferred from Clovis, N.M., Thursday. Baldivia was picked up in Clovis June 14. He is being held in lieu of a \$100,000 bond.

The capital murder charge was filed because the murder allegedly occurred during the perpetration of a robbery.

Dimmitt police arrested Andres Lopez Sunday while he was allegedly attempting to burglarize Castro Gas and Oil Co. After further investigation, police also charged Lopez with the burglaries of NC + Hybrids, Farmers Union Insurance, Dairy Queen, Jeff Robertson, Dodd Oil Co. and the Burlington Northern Railroad station. Stolen items were recovered and were released to the owners Monday, police reported.

Simon Roach, 44, of Amarillo was returned to Dimmitt Friday on a police warrant for allegedly stealing a car owned by Lloyd Blanton of Dimmitt.

Also arrested by local law enforcement agencies during the week were Julio Fierro, 19, of Dimmitt, on a charge of probation violation, and Donald Moon, 30, of Jacks Isle Ash-doon, Ark., on a charge of criminal non-support.

Donald Granger, 31, of Fort

Sumner, N.M., was charged with felony theft Monday. He is accused of stealing meat from a Bovina business.

Dimmitt police are investigating three burglaries, including one in which two pickup truck doors were removed from a 1983 Chevrolet Silverado pickup at Stan Byrnes Motor Co. The two cases involve tools taken from 204 Front Street, and a 10-speed bicycle stolen from 720 Oak Street.

Five persons were arrested for driving while intoxicated, and one other person was arrested for public intoxication during the week.

## Hance says he'll be in gubernatorial race

Former US Rep. Kent Hance Monday said he will be making an announcement soon that he will run for governor and downplayed rumors there is a rift in the Republican Party because of his gubernatorial

ambitions.

Hance also denied that support by long-time Republicans for the candidacy of Tom Loeffler was a message for him to back away from the governor's race.

"We're pretty well committed to the race," Hance said Monday. "We'll probably make a formal announcement in August or September."

Hance said he was surprised that one of three Republican congressmen who announced their support for Loeffler said that Hance had given too much support to Lloyd Doggett and Walter Mondale in last November's general election.

"That . . . disturbed me because anyone who followed the race knows that I only said I'd support the ticket," Hance said. "I never actively campaigned after the primary."
