Gunfire leaves 2 dead

EDEN, Texas — A shooting spree in over a two-county area early Sunday morning has left two people dead and at least five injured.

A Department of Public Safety trooper and a game warden were able to end the carnage when they shot and killed a 23-year-old North Carolina man, whose name has not been released.

The Texas Rangers, assisted by local law enforcement and Texas Parks and Wildlife, are still investigating multiple scenes.

The first incident took place around 4:30 a.m. when the suspect opened fire on a vehicle in the Eden area. A woman was shot and remains hospitalized in Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo.

A short time later, two people were injured when the suspect shot at them as they sat in their vehicle at a convenience store in Brady in McCulloch County. Both were hit with buckshot and drove themselves to the hospital, according to reports. They were treated and released.

The suspect then returned to the Eden area in Concho County where he fired at another vehicle at approximately 5:30 a.m., a DPS press release said. The victim was also treated and released.

Then, just after 6 a.m.,

a woman was found shot to death in her car in Eola after a shots fired call to the Concho County Sheriff's Office. She has been identified as 41-year-old Alicia Torres.

About 15 minutes later, Concho County Sheriff Richard Doane encountered the suspect north

of Eden on U.S. 83. The suspect opened fire on his vehicle, wounding the sheriff. He remains in the Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo with non-life threatening injuries.

DPS Highway Patrol troopers and a Texas Parks and Wildlife game warden then arrived on the scene to assist. A trooper and the game warden exchanged gunfire with suspect, who died at the scene. The suspect's name has not been released, pending notification of next of kin.

An assault rifle, a handgun and hundreds of rounds of ammunition were recovered.

The DPS Highway Patrol, DPS Criminal Investigations Division, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Concho County Sheriff's Office, McCulloch County Sheriff's Office, Brady Police Department and Tom Green County Sheriff's Office assisted/or are assisting the Texas Rangers in the investigation.

the International Fire Code. The council will also consider first reading of an ordinance calling for the creation of a new lieutenant position within the fire department to perform health inspections.

- First reading of an ordinance amending the pay scale for the fire department providing for certificate, education and assignment pay in accordance with Chapter 143 of the Texas Local Government Code.
- First reading of an ordinance amending Chapter 14 of the Big Spring City Code entitled "Offenses," Article

1 entitled "General," by adding a new section in order to prohibit the introduction of certain contraband items into a private or public correctional institution. The ordinance defines contraband as any item not provided by or authorized by the operator of the correctional institution, or any item provided by or authorized by the operator of the correctional institution which has been altered to accommodate a use other than the originally intended use.

- First reading of an ordinance amending Chapter 13, Article Five of the Big Spring City Code entitled "Food and Food Establishments" to change the definition

of regulatory authority to include any certified health inspector employed by the city and to charge the city manager with conducting administrative hearings related to food and food establishments.

- Discussion and consideration of updating and amending the City of Big Spring Comprehensive Plan and the McMahan-Wrinkle Airport Master Plan and authorizing city administration to seek proposals from qualified professionals to assist in the project.
- Approval to apply for a Department of State Health Services grant for financial assistance through the EMS Local Projects Grants pro-

gram and authorizing the city manager or his designee to execute any necessary documents.

This deal occurred in the semi-final of the 2000 women's world championship in the match between Denmark and the United States. The Americans won the match handily and then lost to the Netherlands in the final by the narrowest margin in world championship history — half an International Match Point.

The deal illustrates the basic principle that when a partnership has determined during the bidding that it holds the majority of the high cards, and the opponents wind up playing at

a high-level contract, a trump lead is frequently very effective.

The bidding shown took place when the U.S. pair of Jill Meyers and Randi Montin were East-West, respectively. North's four-notrump bid was the "unusual notrump," promising length in the minors. After South stated her preference for clubs, Meyers doubled, ending the auction.

Montin then led a trump, with devastating effect. Trine Bilde, South, won with the ten and led a diamond to the king and East's ace. East returned a trump, taken in dummy, and Bilde tried to cash the diamond queen, ruffed by East. Regardless of how declarer proceeded, she could score only six trump tricks and the ace of spades — down four for a loss of 800 points.

At the other table, the bidding was exactly the same, except that East conservatively declined not to double five clubs. West then led the king of spades rather than a trump.

Renee Mancuso, South, took the spade ace and led a diamond to the king and ace. East cashed a heart and returned a spade, ruffed in dummy. Declarer then embarked on a complete crossruff, scoring eight trumps, the spade ace and the diamond queen (which East unaccountably failed to ruff) to finish down one, -50. The net gain of 750 points gave the U.S. a 13-IMP pickup on the deal.

Nathan blows first save of season as Rangers fall to Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — The Texas Rangers thought they had a three-game sweep of the Seattle Mariners locked up after an RBI single from A.J. Pierzynski gave Texas a 3-2 lead in the 11th inning.

Joe Nathan was coming on to close and he had yet to blow a save on the road in his two seasons with the Rangers. Nathan had been so dominant he had converted his last 36 straight road save opportunities dating back to 2011. But Raul Ibanez came through as he batted first pitch fastball Nathan left up over the plate for a solo home run to give the Mariners continued life and Nathan his first blown save of the season.

"If you throw it into the zone, then he is pretty good at hitting it," Nathan said. "...He doesn't miss it too often when you put it there."

Elvis Andrus reached third with one out in the 13th inning but the Rangers were unable to drive in the go-ahead run off Mariners reliever Yoervis Medina (1-0). The Mariners finally took advantage after missed opportunities in the ninth and 12th innings.

After nearly homering off Nathan in the 11th, Jason Bay came through with an RBI single off Michael Kirkman (0-1) in the bottom of the 13th inning to drive in Carlos Triunfel and hand the Rangers a 4-3 loss.

"Any time you lose — especially when you go to extra innings — it's difficult but they took it from us," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "We had our chance. They took it back and they finally took it from us."

Jurickson Profar hit a leadoff home run off Mariners starter Hisashi Iwakuma. Texas scored again in the second after hits by Nelson Cruz and Mitch Moreland put runners in scoring positions. Leonys Martin drove in Cruz on a sacrifice fly to give the Rangers a 2-0 lead.

The Mariners left a pair of runners stranded in both the fourth and fifth innings before finally breaking through against Nick Tevesch in the sixth. Kyle Seager doubled down the right field line and Morales homered to knot the game at 2.

Tevesch went 5 2-3 innings for Texas, allowing just five hits and two runs. He walked one and struck out six.

The Rangers fumbled an opportunity to possibly retake the lead in the seventh inning. After a leadoff double from Adrian Beltre, Cruz struck out swinging at a ball in the dirt. Beltre was caught between second and third base as the ball bounced away from Mariners catcher Jesus Sucre.

Today is Monday, May 27, the 147th day of 2013. There are 218 days left in the year. This is the Memorial Day observance.

Today's Highlights in History:

- On May 27, 1933, the Chicago World's Fair, celebrating "A Century of Progress," officially opened. Walt Disney's Academy Award-winning animated short "The Three Little Pigs" was first released.
- On this date: In 1861, Chief Justice Roger Taney, sitting as a federal circuit court judge in Baltimore, ruled that President Abraham Lincoln lacked the authority to suspend the writ of habeas corpus (Lincoln disregarded the ruling).
- In 1896, 255 people were killed when a tornado struck St. Louis, Mo., and East St. Louis, Ill.
- In 1929, Charles A. Lindbergh Jr. married Anne Morrow in Englewood, N.J.
- In 1935, the Supreme Court

struck down the National Industrial Recovery Act.

In 1936, the Cunard liner RMS Queen Mary left England on its maiden voyage to New York.

In 1937, the newly completed Golden Gate Bridge connecting San Francisco and Marin County, Calif., was opened to pedestrians (vehicles began crossing the next day).

In 1941, the British Royal Navy sank the German battleship Bismarck off France, with a loss of some 2,000 lives, three days after the Bismarck sank the HMS Hood.

In 1942, Navy Cook 3rd Class Doris "Dorie" Miller became the first African-American to receive the Navy Cross for his "extraordinary courage and disregard for his own personal safety" during Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor.

In 1962, a dump fire in Centralia, Pa., ignited a blaze in underground coal deposits that continues to burn this day.

In 1964, independent India's first prime minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, died.

In 1985, in Beijing, representatives of Britain and China exchanged instruments of ratification for an accord returning Hong Kong to Chinese control in 1997.

In 1993, five people were killed in a bombing at the Uffizi museum of art in Florence, Italy.

Kevin Harvick managed to avoid those wrecks and beat Kasey Kahne on a restart with 11 laps remaining to capture his 21st career Sprint Cup victory. "This is one of those nights you just know going into it you got to grind away lap after lap, just keep yourself on the lead lap, not make any mis-

takes," Harvick said.

When Kahne decided not to pit and take on tires at lap 389, Harvick pulled down pit lane and took on two and came out in second place for the restart. He said right then he knew he had the race in the bag.

"The only frame of mind I was in was, 'Don't screw up,'" Harvick said.

The race was stopped for nearly 30 minutes when the TV camera support rope snapped and landed along the track and in the grandstands.

Drivers were allowed back to their pit stalls and given 15 minutes.

As the crowd roared its approval, Kanaan flipped up his visor to wipe away tears. Then in Victory Lane he gave his bride of two months a long kiss and poured the celebratory winner's bottle of milk over his head.

The losers were pleased with the outcome, evidenced by a scene similar to rivals lining up to congratulate Dale Earnhardt when he finally won the Daytona 500 on his 20th try. Dario Franchitti, whose crash brought out the race-ending caution, stood grinning by his crumpled car, two thumbs up as Kanaan passed under yellow.

"When I saw who was leading, it cheered me up a little bit," said Franchitti, last year's winner. "He's a very, very deserv-

ing winner."

The fans thought so, too, standing on their feet, screaming, "TK! TK! TK!" as he and team owner Jimmy Vasser went by during the traditional victory lap. It felt magical to Kanaan, as if he'd given the crowd at Indianapolis Motor Speedway a gift.

"It means a lot to me because so many people, I could feel that they wanted me to win, and it's such a selfish thing to do because what are they getting from it?" Kanaan said. "I'm the one who gets the trophy. I believed that this win was more for people out there than for me.

"I wanted it all my life, but over the years I was kind of OK with the fact that I may never have the chance to win."

His chance came at the end of a history-making race at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, where Kanaan knew he had to pounce at the green flag for the final restart with three laps to go. He

did, zipping inside leader Ryan Hunter-Reay to roar into the lead — where he wanted to be in case another caution came out.

"I knew I had to get the lead on the restart because it could be a yellow, which happened to me plenty of times here, and it did," Kanaan said. "How funny is life? The yellow was my best friend."

Kanaan had his fair share of chances to win at Indy, but came up short time and time again. He was leading when the rain came in 2007, only to lose to Franchitti when the race resumed.

In all, Kanaan went into Sunday's race with 221 laps led at Indy — more than any non-winner except Michael Andretti and Rex Mays — but his second-place finish to Buddy Rice in 2004 was the closest he had come to victory. He had a pair of third-place finishes, including last year — again to Franchitti.

June 6. "We want to finish as soon as we can for a lot of different reasons," Parker said. "I think that we should give them no hope, and it's always sweet to win on the road. I'm pretty sure the whole team understands that we have to keep taking nothing for granted and keep playing our game and try to finish tomorrow.

The Grizzlies find themselves in the exact same position as this franchise's first post-season in 2004 — trying to avoid being swept by the Spurs. San Antonio finished off that sweep, and history shows all

107 teams leading 3-0 in a best-of-seven series have never lost.

But Memphis is the first team in NBA history to fall behind 0-2 and win four straight by double digits.

The Grizzlies did just that in the first round in knocking off the Clippers, then ousted the West's No. 1 seed in Oklahoma City. Grizzlies coach Lionel Hollins played for Portland when the Trail Blazers fell behind 0-2 against Philadelphia in the 1977 NBA Finals and won four straight for the title.

"My hope though is for us to not listen to you guys and say that it's never been done before, that it's just a matter of time before the series is over and to reach down in their soul and dig for something that they didn't know they had because that's what you have to do to win a championship," Hollins said.

The Grizzlies know they easily could be up 2-1 right now if they just finished in regulation each of the past two games. Guard Mike Con-

ley missed the basket on a drive at the buzzer when Memphis had the ball last Saturday night. The team that set the NBA record once losing its first 12 playoff games hasn't been swept in the postseason since 2006.

"We have a lot of pride in this team, in this city," Conley said.

The Grizzlies' biggest challenge is shooting better, both overall and at the free throw line. They shot only 39.2 percent (38 of 97) Saturday night and would not have needed overtime if they hadn't gone 10 of 18 at the free throw line. Zach Randolph is only 7 of 16 at the line after not even getting a free throw attempt in Game 1.

Randolph has an NBA-best seven double-doubles this postseason but isn't scoring as he did against the Clippers or Thunder. Randolph went 1 of 4 in the fourth quarter and overtime combined Saturday night.

"We ain't been down like this, 0-3, so it's a different mindset," Randolph said. "It's now do or die. We've got to come out tomorrow and

come out like we came out last game and just sustain it and not break down towards the end of the game."

The Spurs have been able to frustrate Randolph down low and limit his easy putbacks. The Grizzlies got 19 offensive rebounds but only converted those into 21 points.

With Tiago Splitter and Matt Bonner helping defend Randolph, Duncan looked much more like the two-time MVP of 2002 and 2003. He played 44 minutes, scored the first five points in overtime and finished with a double-double on 24 points and 10 rebounds. He also had five assists and two blocks.

"Timmy has been a consummate professional from the day he got into the league," Popovich said.

"This isn't anything new for him, playing with the passion he's playing with. He loves basketball, he loves his teammates, and he decided again he needed to be more aggressive when the overtime period came."
