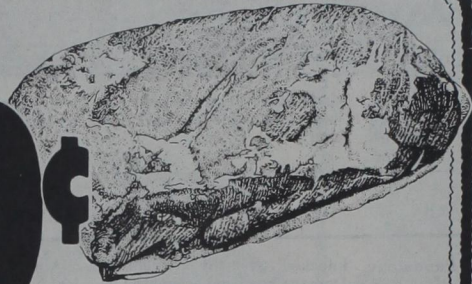

FIRE DESTROYED a vacant house at 107 NW Sixth in Dimmitt Tuesday afternoon. Two units from the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to the alarm at about 5:15 p.m., but the entire house was aflame before firemen were able to arrive. Fire Mar-

shall Steve Jameson said two juveniles playing with matches were responsible for the fire, which kept firemen busy for over an hour.

Police Calls

Ruben Bermea Sifuentez, 19, of Dimmitt was arraigned Tuesday on felony charges of burglary of a vehicle stemming from the early Monday theft of a rifle from the vehicle of Isabel Rodriguez.

Sifuentez is being held on \$2,500 bond.

Rodriguez told police that she and her husband saw the suspect remove the rifle, a 308 Winchester bolt action 30.06 caliber weapon, from their vehicle parked near their apartment at the Azteca Complex. Rodriguez said her husband shouted at the suspect, who then ran from the scene with the couple chasing him.

Rodriguez called the police at about 1 a.m. Monday after the suspect had eluded her and her husband. She said the rifle is valued at \$600. Police apprehended Sifuentez at 7:15 p.m. Monday.

A group of juveniles are the suspects in the late Saturday burglary and vandalism of Autos Unlimited and the related vandalism of a car belonging to Linda Grand.

Wade Maynard, owner of Autos Unlimited, reported to police Saturday at 10:24 p.m. that his office had been broken into. Entry apparently was gained through a broken window, 10" x 20".

The greatest loss in the incident was the \$300-worth of damage done to a blue 1978 Trans Am, which had an obscenity written across the hood with black spray paint. Paint was also sprayed on the desk and chair in the office.

Taken were a Panasonic AM/FM radio valued at \$25, and six model cars valued at \$20 each.

The small size of the entry point and small footprints in and out of the building indicated juvenile suspects.

At 12:42 a.m. Sunday, Grand called police to report an obscenity sprayed in black paint on the left front fender of her 1984 Pontiac. She told police she did not notice the damage until she arrived home from her job at the Pizza Hut, where she is the manager. She noted that earlier in the evening she had ejected a group of juveniles from the restaurant.

Last Thursday morning, Jimmy Butler reported a burglary at his Arrow Package Store at 610 N. Broadway. Entry was gained by prying the lock off of the front door.

Items taken included \$6 worth of quarters, \$2 worth of dimes, four six-packs of beer valued at \$16, and a carton of cigarettes valued at \$10.

Sometime over the weekend, 400 gallons of gasoline valued at \$436 were taken from Cimmaron Feed Yard, located 2½ miles north of FM 2397 in the northwest part of the county. The loss was reported Monday by Jack Bradley, feedlot owner.

Sunday afternoon, police noticed that a US Post Office mail storage box in the 100 block of Northwest Ninth Street had apparently been

knocked over by a vehicle. Damage has been estimated at \$150.

Witnesses told police the license number of the vehicle and the name of the driver, a 37-year-old Dimmitt man, who was subsequently charged with felony DWI and unlawfully carrying a weapon, and misdemeanor driving without a license and failure to stop and leave information at the scene of an accident.

Two Dimmitt youths were injured Sunday afternoon, but not seriously, when the 1984 Honda three-wheeler they were riding collided with a 1976 Chevrolet four-door driven by Harry Hauf, 53, of Dimmitt.

Kevin Reed, 16, was driving the three-wheeler owned by Ronald Craig Heller, 14, who was also a passenger. The vehicle emerged from the alley between Oak and Pine and struck Hauf's vehicle, which was heading south on Southwest Seventh. Reed was ticketed for failure to yield right of way to a vehicle.

April 29, Ysrael Salinas told police that his son's bicycle had been taken while he had been spending the night with a friend at 505 SW 4th in Dimmitt. The Huffu brand bike, valued at \$150, has hand brakes, racing handle bars, a black seat that had been repaired with black tape, and is silver with red trim. It was taken sometime the night of April 27.

April 30, Genaro Jaramillo of 200 NE 2nd told police he had loaned his bike to a juvenile at about 7 p.m. the previous day. When Jaramillo went to retrieve it, the juvenile said he no longer had the bike. Jaramillo noticed that the tires on the juvenile's bike looked like the ones that had been on his bike, but it was a different frame. Jaramillo said his frame is red with spots of blue paint, has a bent red fender and a new blue seat.

May 1, Billy Ray Aleman, 11, of 309 SW 6th, reported that this red Huffu BMX-style bicycle was stolen sometime between 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. that day. The bike has black handlebars, seat, and tires.

Monday afternoon two girls' bikes were reported stolen, and the same day the bikes' stripped frames were found in an alley.

Mrs. Jessie Silva of 710 W. Dulin called police at 4:55 p.m. to report her daughter's bike, a 20" Huffu valued at \$129, was taken from the front of their house sometime between 11 p.m. Sunday and 8:15 a.m. Monday. In scanning the neighborhood, Mrs. Silva's son discovered the two bike frames in the alley between Northwest Eight and Ninth Streets in about the 300 block. The seat, handlebars, and tires were missing from the Siva bike.

At 5:47 p.m. Mary Flores of 400 NW 10th reported her daughter's bike was missing,

The cost of membership in the association is \$15 for an adult, \$6 for students, and \$35 for an entire family. Membership in the local association entitles members to attend other Community Concert Association performances in cities across the nation.

"We hope to enroll many new members and patrons this year to help finance the fine performances we have scheduled," Froehner said.

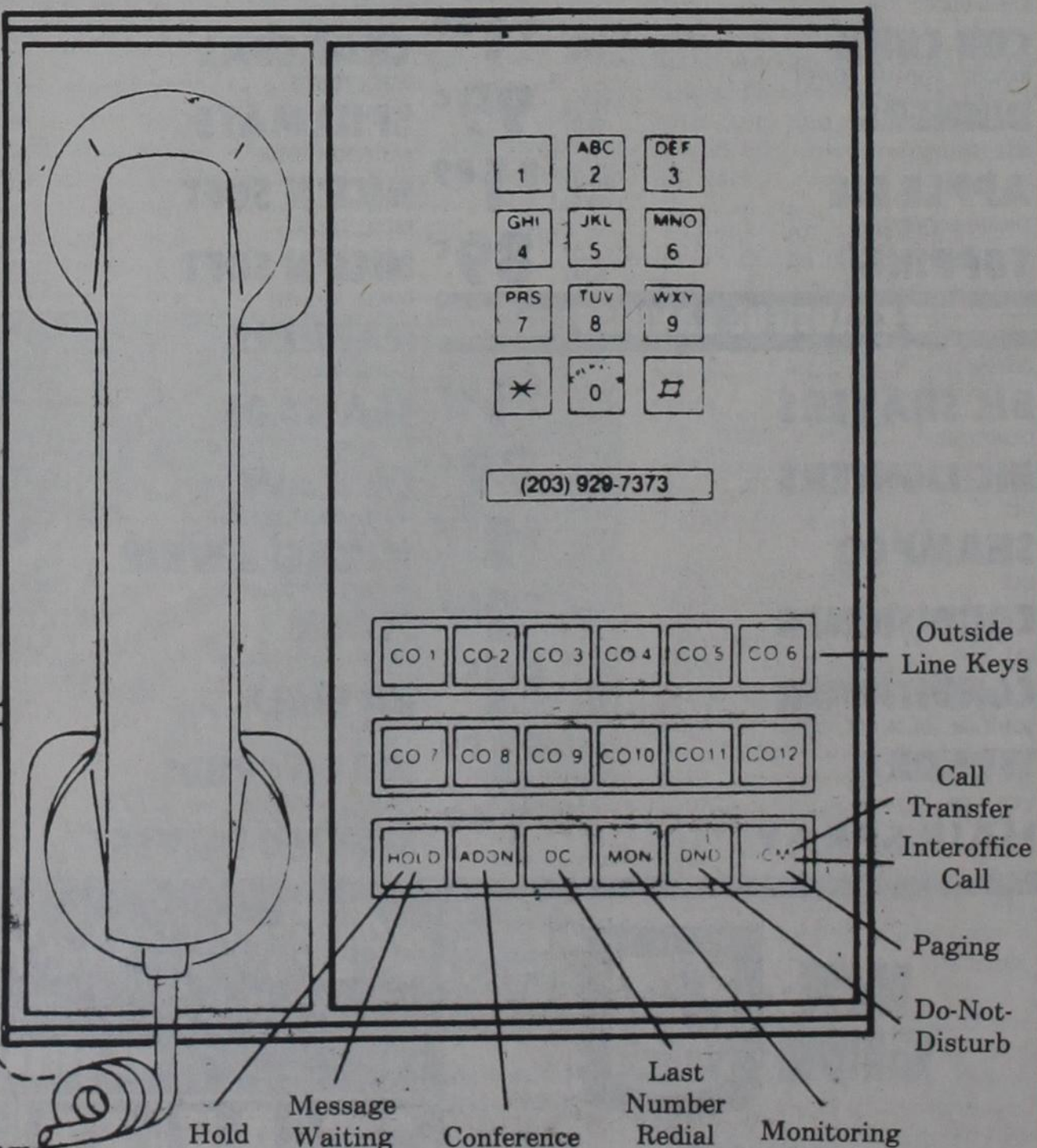

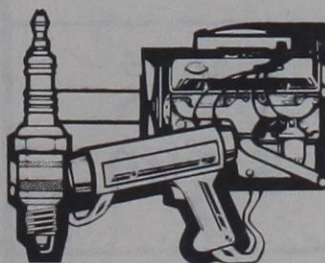

Broderson earns PDK key, trip

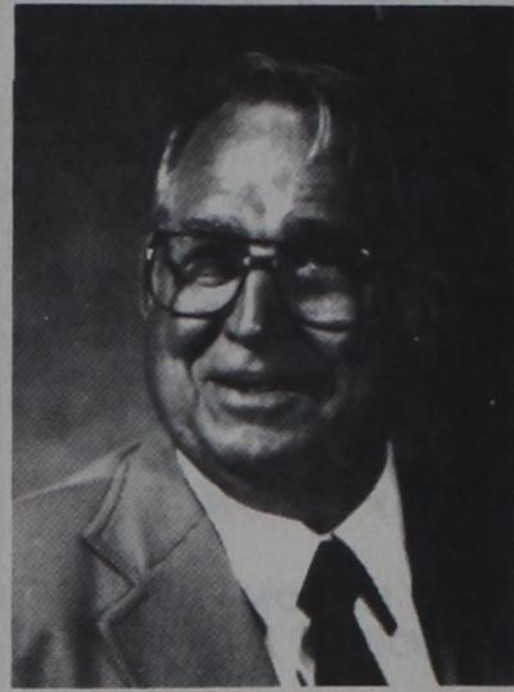
Dimmitt Middle School principal Emmett Broderson has been honored twice by Phi Delta Kappa, the international educators fraternity.

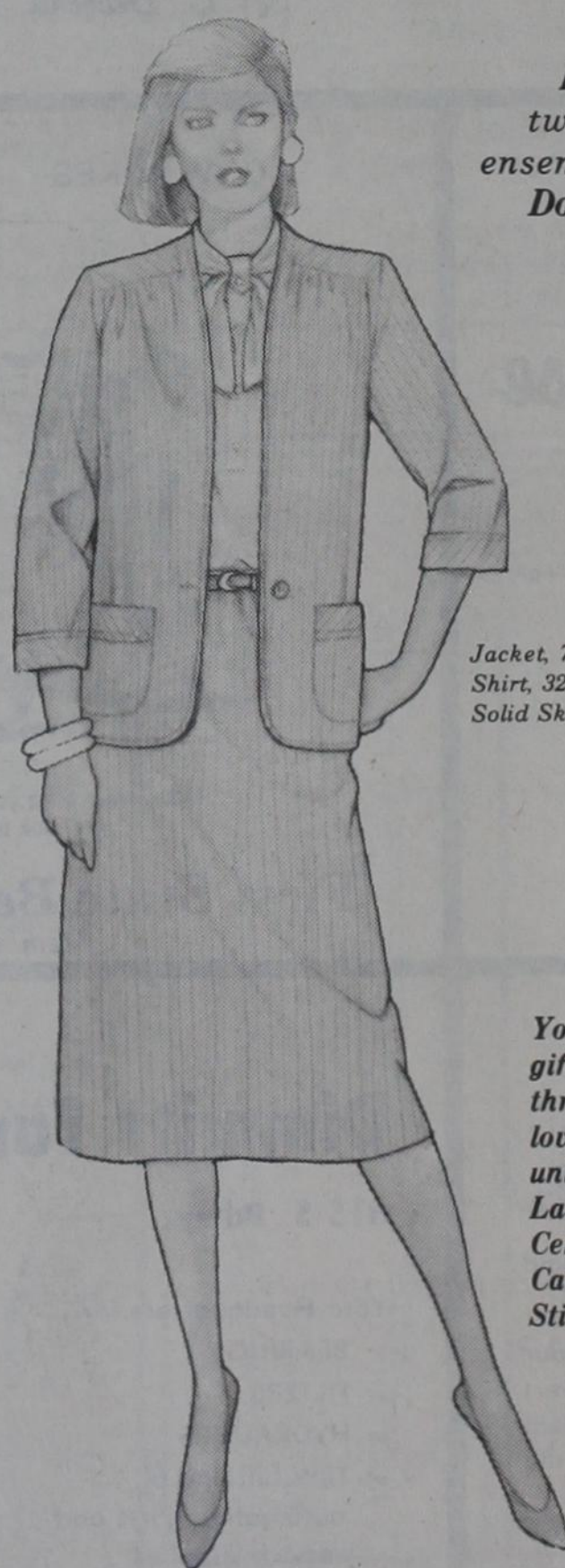

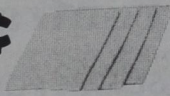

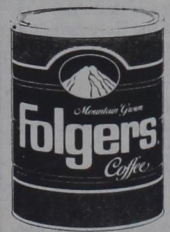

Defending state doubles champions Leona Gerber and Ramona Heiman will defend their state titles tomorrow in Austin at the state tennis and track meet in Austin.

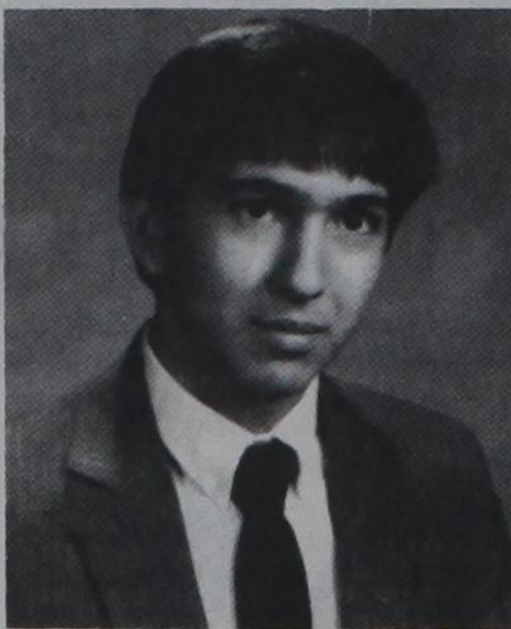

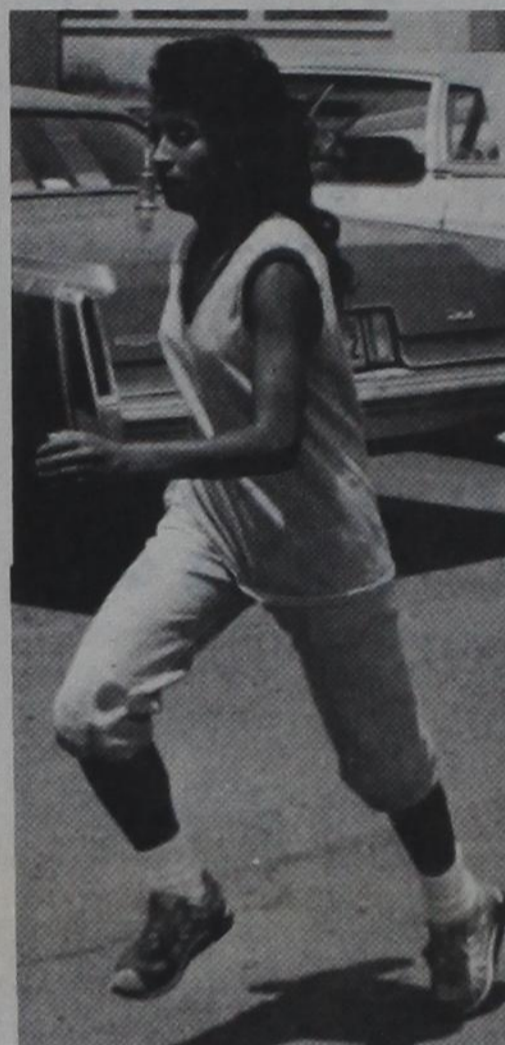

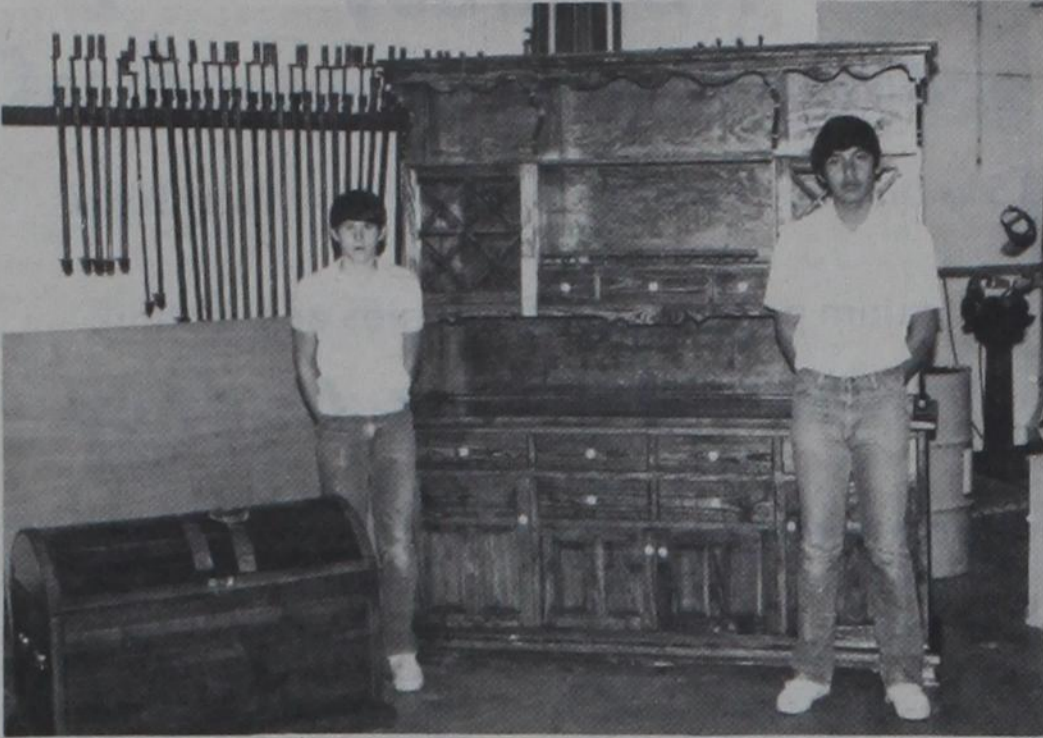

DHS also took third place honors overall in the 3A division of the contest.

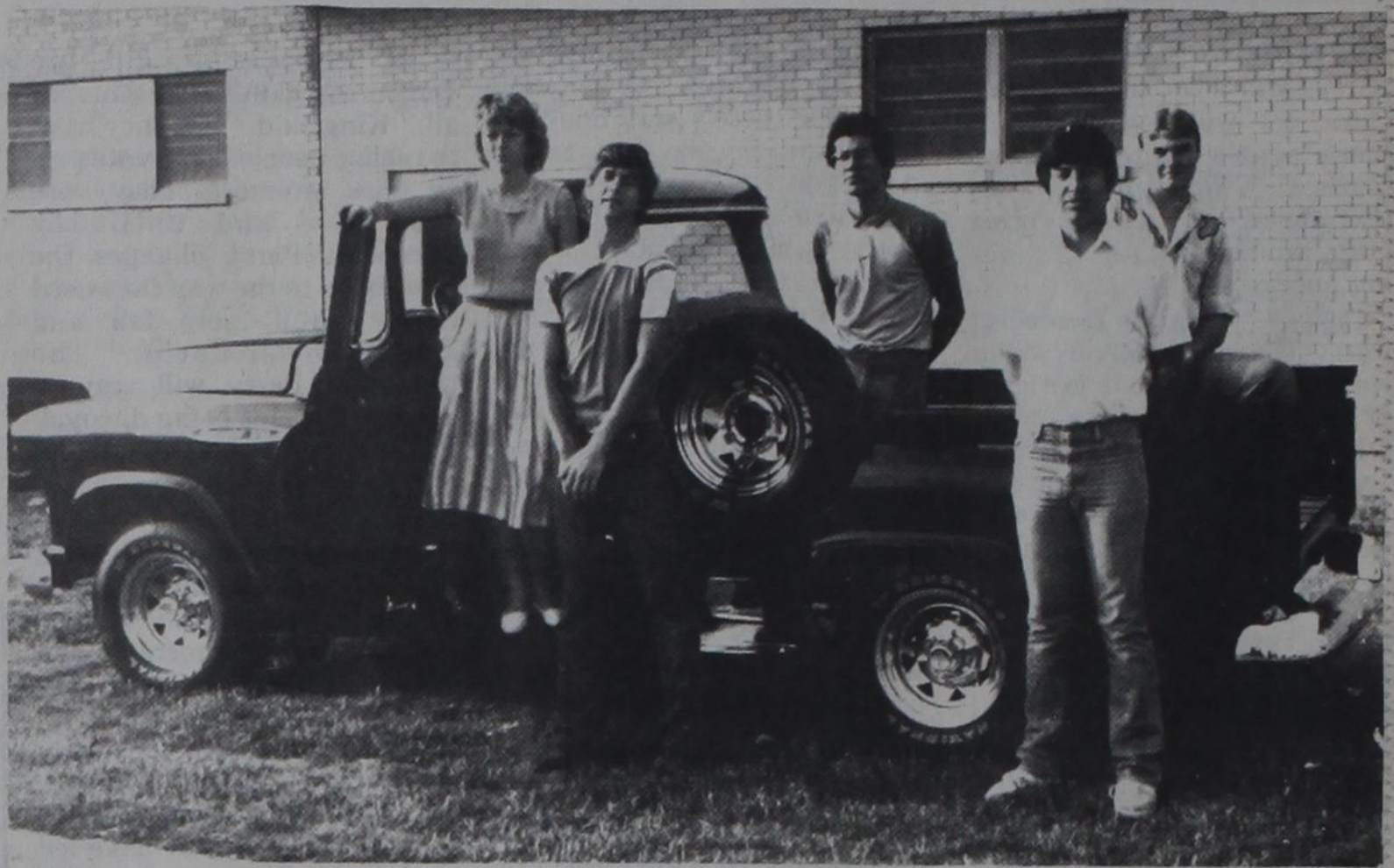

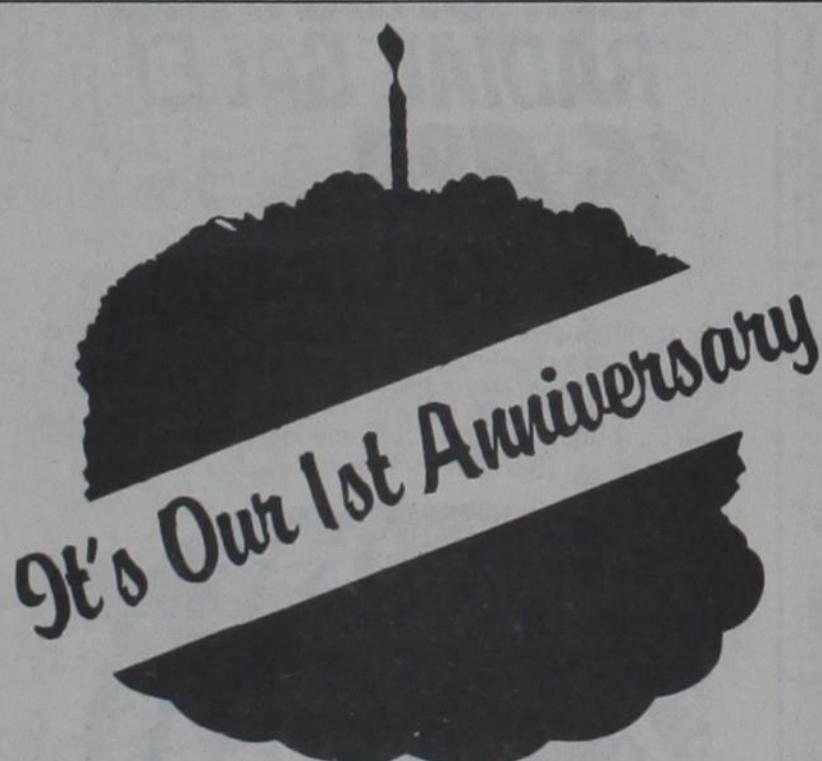

Social Security ...in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS
Most social security benefits to dependents or survivors of retired, disabled, or deceased workers end if the person divorces or marries.

But, benefits to widows or widowers who remarry at age 60 or older and benefits to disabled widows and widowers 50-60 who remarry are not affected and will continue unchanged.

Benefits to a child getting checks because he or she is under 18, 19 if a student, or disabled will end if the child marries. Checks to a spouse getting benefits on the record of a retired or disabled worker will end if the marriage ends in divorce unless the spouse is 62 or older and the marriage lasted 10 years or more.

Checks for a widowed mother or father getting benefits

because she or he is caring for an entitled child will stop if she or he remarries.

There is an exception to these general rules. If an otherwise eligible person receiving benefits as a widow, widower, or adult disabled in childhood marries a person also getting one of these kinds of benefits, he or she can continue to get benefits.

Benefits will also continue if a person getting benefits as a widowed mother or father or adult disabled in childhood marries a person getting benefits as a retired or disabled worker. A retired or disabled worker's benefits are never affected by marriage or divorce.

The Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District is very proud to honor the 1985 Conservation Award winners.

George Sides was selected this year's Farmer of the Year and Joan Durbin as the 1985 Conservation Homemaker in Castro County.

George and Carolyn Sides have four children. All of the Sides family have been involved in agriculture and community activities.

George is very concerned about our diminishing water supply. He has constantly searched for ways to conserve the amount of irrigation water that he uses. He has installed flow meters on most of his irrigation wells. This enables him to keep a close watch on how much water that he is pumping, and what it is costing him.

George has purchased 6 P&R surge irrigation systems, he uses this equipment throughout the year. His greatest savings was realized on prewatering, which amounted to approximately 35%.

He also installs moisture blocks at depths of one, two and three feet. The blocks are set at different locations throughout his fields, they were checked two to three times a week and showed him how much moisture was available to his crops.

George is a very progressive farmer. He has worked closely with the district, Soil Conservation Service, and the High Plains Underground Water District.

George said, "We have to become more conservation minded and conserve our natural resources, the soil and water, for the generations to come, otherwise there will not be any resources for them to inherit."

George's progressive ideas and goals have made him a agriculture leader in the community, with this idea in mind, the Running Water District was proud to select him as this year's Conservation Farmer.

Joan is married to Paul Durbin, they have 11 children ranging in age from 5 to 21 years.

Joan has been active in 4-H over the last 9 years. She is an avid supporter of the Nazareth Band, and a Den Leader for 5 years in the Cub Scouts.

She has kept a scrapbook up to date of her classmates as well as her childrens classmates. She had a book copyrighted and printed for her parents entitled "Golden Weddings." The book covers six generations of the Schulte family.

Joan does a lot of sewing and she and the children take responsibility for caring for, harvesting and canning large quantities of vegetables and fruit for the family.

Joan takes a very active part in the operation of this truly family farm. She not only participates but enjoys driving tractors, fixing fences, combining and irrigating.

She has been an active and involved person, and she has incorporated these traits into her family, their farming enterprises, and also into the community. The Running Water District considers her a Champion Homemaker.

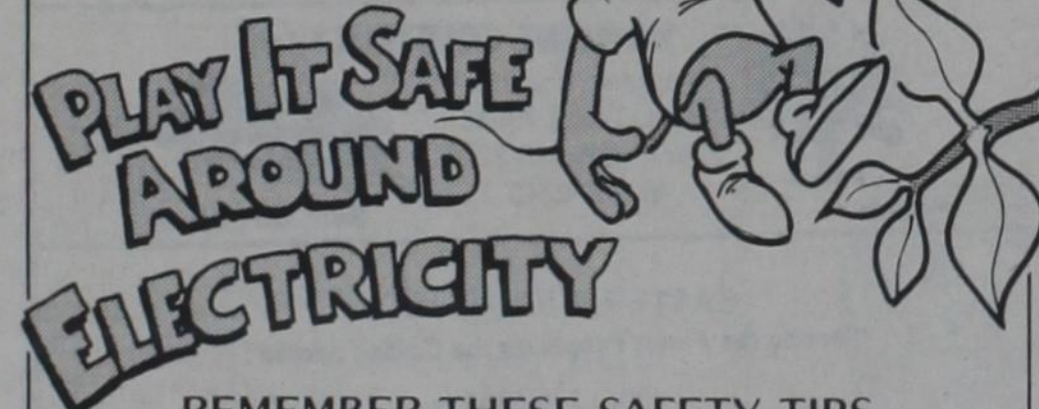

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.

- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

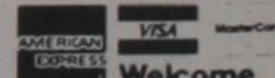
