# **Foul play not** found in deaths of local women

#### By THOMAS JENKINS Staff Writer

The bodies of two Big Spring women who were discovered in the bathroom of their home Monday afternoon died of natural causes, according to law enforcement officials. Autopsies on 83-year-old

Helen Thomason and her daughter, 51-year-old Carol Thomason were performed Wednesday, according to officials with the Big Spring Police Department. "The autopsy confirmed

(there was) no foul play with either victim," Sgt. Tony Everett, public information with the BSPD, said. "It appears the daughter, Carol Thomason, had fallen in the bathroom and due to her physical condition, was unable to get up. Her mother, Helen Thomason, attempted to help her daughter and, in doing so, suffered a fatal stroke. At that point Carol was unable to summon help and died from heart failure."

The bodies of the two women were discovered Monday afternoon at their home,

# **Howard College** breaking ground for expansion

Thanks to the record growth over the last several vears. the campus is finally getting two new buildings. The of-

ficial ground breaking is set for 4 p.m. Wednesday at the West Texas Training Center campus on U.S. Highway 67.

"We are very excited about this new opportunity for growth on our San Angelo campus," said Dr. Cheryl T. Sparks, Howard College president. "We have come a long way over the last several years and we are proud to be taking this next step in our development in San Angelo."

The buildings are considered phase one the master plan and include one

building for classroom and instructional purposes and one for student services, totaling 45,000 square feet. The construc-

tion will also include additional parking.

"Howard College San Angelo has been a part of the San Angelo community for 40 years," noted Provost LeAnne Byrd. "Through the implementation of the master plan, the campus will now create





with (billions of dollars), through efficiencies and savings, to come up with \$100 million.'

Pickett said the costcutting aims to appease critics wary of giving TxDOT more funds without assurances that the agency is committed to spending every dollar wisely.

TxDOT Executive Director Phil Wilson told the House Select Committee on Transportation Funding that the reductions were possible.

"We're doing every-

thing we can to reduce spending," Wilson said. Road capacity has sorely lagged behind population growth in Texas the past quartercentury. One major stream of highway construction revenue comes is a gas tax that charges drivers 20 cents per gallon at the pump. But the

tax rate hasn't budged

in decades, while the population has soared and cars have become

more fuel-efficient. With tax hikes of any kind unpopular in the Republican-controlled Legislature, lawmakers hatched a plan to siphon money currently funneled to the state's Rainy Day Fund and put it to-

ward roads. Pickett has proposed giving budgetwriting lawmakers authority to regularly set a minimum balance for that reserves fund.

Even given another \$900 million, it's still only a sliver of the \$4 billion more that Tx-DOT said is needed just to maintain the status quo on roads. The Legislature a

month ago was poised to ratify the spending, but that was before Democratic Sen. Wendy Davis embarked on an 11-hour filibuster to block new abortion restrictions. Her marathon speech ran out the clock on the first special session, with the help of shouting protesters in the Senate gallery, leaving no time for the transportation bill.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who has faced criticism from fellow Republicans about his handling of that ses-

sion, acknowledged this week that he could have put the transportation bill up for a vote first.

"I take full responsibility for not foreseeing the effect of the international socialist movement organizers and the different groups that simply overwhelmed our security," said Dewhurst, who faces a stiff primary challenge for his job next year.

Perry called a second special session, during which GOP lawmakers pushed through the abortion restrictions, but the TxDOT funding was left undone.

Democrats have used the twice-stalled transportation funding to blast Republicans for failed leadership. Those who is weighing a run day marked Day 203. for governor.

The House had a second chance to approve more highway dollars earlier this week, but the absence of 23 lawmakers for the vote hampered the bill's prospects. Some lawmakers

might have prevailed in a full chamber, but attendance is waning as the summer drags on.

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

prosecution sought to paint U.S. Army Pfc. Bradley Manning as an anarchist and a traitor, while the defense portrayed him as naive and well-intentioned. The judge, rightly, ing the enemy" but

uring the trial, the

rejected both characterizations, finding Manning not guilty of "aidguilty of violations of the Espionage Act for releasing information that could cause harm and stealing government property.

Neither side got exactly what they wanted, which is often the sign of a just result. Manning may have been "wellintentioned" in the colloquial sense, but legally speaking, he intentionally violated the law. He did not steal the files "by mistake." He is a trained intelligence officer. He knew exactly what he was doing, and he knew exactly what WikiLeaks would do with the files He may have been hoping for a spirited debate, but he knew the files would be seen by both our friends and our enemies. Those who intentionally violate the law must know — and must accept — the consequences of doing so.

It doesn't matter whether he was seeking fame or better policy, at least not in terms of

Many in the civil liberties community, while relieved that Manning was acquitted of the most serious charges, worry that

the convictions will nonetheless chill whistleblowers and leakers, who are critical sources for national security reporting. Many others, from military leaders to mothers with children serving this country in harm's way, worry that individuals, even well-intentioned ones, can endanger our country and their children when they decide they know best what should be made public. There are, in short, legitimate

concerns on both sides. I've taught the First Amend-

ment for decades, but I don't pretend to have any easy answers. The First Amendment is not a license to steal.

It does not empower the individual to ignore the rules, damn the majority and decide that he or she knows best. The issue here is not whether news organizations have a right to print material that was wrongfully taken (they do, with extremely limited exceptions), but whether those who steal it, knowing it is wrong to do so (as Manning certainly did), are above the law. They aren't.

Manning's case was, in some respects, easy because it was so extreme. We are not talking about a document, not a sheaf of documents, not about leaking unlawful activity being done by the government that the government refuses to acknowledge. Manning stole 700,000 files, including 250,000 diplomatic cables, front-line reports and dossiers of Guantanamo prisoners. Did he really think there would not be serious, very serious, consequences to doing

so? Did he really think he had the right to decide that everyone else in the government was wrong about the need for security, that only he knew better? Did he really think the rules didn't apply to him?

But "aiding the enemy" was going too far. Classic prosecutorial overreaching, as one of my smartest friends put it.

Technically speaking, in criminal law terms, you can be held to have intended consequences that you know will result: Manning surely knew the information he was stealing would be seen and, to the extent possible, used by our enemies.

But he is not an agent of al-Qaida. If he were, he would have given the information to them — not to the press. Had he been convicted, he would have instantly become a martyr endangering the very principles his prosecution was intended to vindicate.

That would have been a victory for our enemies.

The only remaining question has to do with exactly how many decades Manning will be incarcerated. It will be decades. Even without the conviction for aiding the enemy, he will, as my friend put it, still have plenty of time to contemplate his actions.


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
# The new king of intolerance

e has become toxic material in Washington D.C. Even the leaders of his own party are running away from him and strongly condemning the waste that keeps coming out of his mouth. But Iowa

Rep. Steve King is undeterred. He has a narcissistic need for attention, and he is determined to get it by bashing on immigrants.

It's not a new phenomenon. In recent history, we've had quite a American xeno-







Yet, aside from having been obnoxious demagogues when they were in office, the thing they still have in common is the word "former" preceding their elected titles.

Is King heading in the same direction? Are his constituents getting tired of his embarrassing diatribes? Is there a pattern

Not quite.

Unlike the other poster boys who represented states and districts where the Latino vote was significant, King represents the overwhelmingly white and conservative 4th Congressional District in southwest Iowa, where he is now in his sixth term and where minority voters still are a tiny minority.

Apparently, he feels he can afford to be obnoxious. In his latest diatribe — the one

that is getting all the headlines - King went after the young undocumented immigrants who were mostly brought here by their parents when they were children. With absolutely no basis for his conclusion, he determined that for every so-called "Dreamer" who is a valedictori-

an in an American high school,

they've got calves the size of cantaloupes because they're hauling 75 pounds of marijuana across the desert."

And while these remarks were condemned even by some GOP leaders, including House Speaker John Boehner and House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, although they used words like 'wrong," "hateful" and "inex cusable" to describe King's diatribe, you have to wonder what took them so long to at least pretend that they are offended by King's conduct.

After all, it's not like this was the first time King has made offensive remarks. It's not like we didn't know that he actually thrives on repulsive comments. If "Intolerance" was a country, this guy could be its King!

You have to wonder why the GOP leadership didn't react this way when King has compared human beings to livestock and dogs, or when he said 80 million out-of-work Americans were "slackers," or when he characterizes undocumented immigrants as criminals, or when he has tried to deny American citizenship to U.S.-born children of undocumented immigrants, or when he warned against the "optics" of an Obama presidency, or when much more other toxic waste came out of King's mouth is the past few years.

You would think Boehner and Cantor would have been similarly offended when King suggested we build an electrified Mexican-border fence that could shock immigrants who tried to enter the country without proper documents — because, "We do it with livestock all the time." Or when King suggested that this country should select immigrants like hunters select their dogs by choosing "the pick of the litter" from "every donor civilization on the planet." So why now? Why is the House

GOP leadership suddenly concerned about immigrant bashing? Could it be because they suddenly care about immigrants or because they suddenly need to pretend that they care?

Have they really changed

trying to keep King from annoying Latino voters across the country? Even if he is safe in his own district, surely his national grandstanding can hurt other Republicans with Latino voters throughout the United States.

Obviously, this is more about damage control than a real change in direction for the Republican Party

After all, this is still the same party where not too long ago, King wasn't the only wacko trying to deny citizenship to "anchor babies" or to electrify border fences or to make life so difficult for 11 million undocumented immigrants that they

would want to "self-deport." **Expecting Boehner and Cantor** to suddenly become more tolerant of immigrants is unrealistic especially when so many of their conservative House colleagues still are obsessed with persecuting these people. Their reactions to King's latest insults were nothing more than an act

cheap theater, lip service! But what about King's constituents? They may be 95 percent white, but according to a recent poll, 65 percent of them already favor a path to legalization for undocumented immigrants. Sure, they still are very conservative, and they want a Congressman who represents their values. But can't they find someone who could do that with out promoting ignorance and hatred?

When the last xenophobia poster boy, Russell Pierce, was recalled from office in Arizona in 2011, it was because another Republican, Sen. Jerry Lewis, had vowed to stay way from "hateful rhetoric."

Surely, Iowa must have Republicans with a little more wits and a lot more class.



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# Real faith is blind

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One of my favorite stories is a fable about six blind men who went to see an elephant. Retold in my own words, the tale goes like

this: The first blind man rubbed the thick skin on the elephant's broad side and declared that an elephant is like a wall.

The second

man felt of the elephant's long, round trunk and assumed that an elephant must be like a snake.

When the third blind man touched the elephant's sharp tusk, he argued that an elephant must be like a spear. The fourth blind man, who ran his fingers up and down the elephant's stout leg, insisted that an elephant must be like the trunk of a tree.

Yet, the fifth man rubbed the elephant's big floppy ear and was convinced that an elephant is more like a fan.

Finally, the last blind man clasped the elephant's tail and concluded that an elephant is more like a rope.

Several years ago, a friend suggested to me that forgiveness is like the fable of the elephant and the blind men because we each have our own perception of what forgiveness means based on our own experiences.

While I have shared her analogy many times, I believe that

the fable is also an illustration of faith.

We also define faith according to our own perceptions. We tend to limit faith to our

own experiences without ever touching the whole elephant. In his second letter to the Corinthians, the apostle Paul wrote,

"For we walk by faith and not by sight" (2 Corinthians 5:7 NASB). Most of us are happy if we can see the road ahead and feel that

we have some control over our destiny.

However, sometimes the road makes an unexpected turn,

causing our faith to be tested.

That's when we are forced to walk by faith and not by sight.

We either walk by faith or not at all because sometimes there is

The author of the book of Hebrews also wrote, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1 NASB).

Faith is not just trusting God when we can see what is down the road ahead.

Faith is that unseen elephant of assurance in our lives. It is that invisible, thick-skinned conviction that God is in control even when we can't see beyond our immediate circumstances. Real faith is always blind faith.

#### Snowden's asylum enrages U.S., but won't destroy already challenged ties with Russia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Russia's decision to grant asylum to Edward Snowden has upset the Obama administration and enraged Congress. But if the United States wasn't prepared to scrap its maddeningly difficult relationship with Russia because of missile defense, human rights or Syria's civil war, it's unlikely the 30-year-old National Security Agency leaker alone will sour ties irrevocably between two powers that both have moved past their half-century Cold War for global supremacy.

After Snowden left the transit zone of Moscow's airport and officially entered Russia on Thursday, the White House declared itself "extremely disappointed" and suggested President Barack Obama would reconsider his autumn summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin in Moscow.

American lawmakers threatened worse, from demanding Russia forfeit its right to host a summit of the world's biggest economies to questioning whether Washington and Moscow can now cooperate at all. Some in Congress have spoken of boycotting next year's Winter Olympics in the southern Russian city of Sochi.

"Russia's action today is a disgrace and a deliberate effort to embarrass the United States. It is a slap in the face of all Americans," Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., said. "Now is the time to fundamentally rethink our relationship with Putin's Russia."

Retaliation against Russia comes at a cost, however. Putin has proved over more than a decade in power that he'll respond to perceived offenses from the United States, whether in the form of a missile defense network in Europe or U.S. support for pro-democracy demonstrations in Ukraine, Georgia and other neighboring nations. And for all the tough talk in Washington, the U.S. knows it needs Putin to promote a range of American national security interests and has tried to temper its reaction to Putin's provocations.

## 1 of 3 Cleveland victims tells kidnapper she 'spent 11 years in hell' but knew she'd escape

CLEVELAND (AP) — Free and safe, one of three women kidnapped and raped over a decade in a ramshackle home smiled lightly as her tormentor was led out of court in chains, a method he had used to control them.

Michelle Knight, the first of the victims kidnapped after accepting a ride from Ariel Castro, spoke in a soft but determined voice Thursday in front of a judge who followed a plea deal and gave Castro life in prison without parole plus 1,000 years.

"We said we'll all get out alive someday, and we did," Knight said.

"You took 11 years of my life away, and I have got it back," she said in the hushed courtroom. "I spent 11 years in hell. Now your hell is just beginning."

Knight, who spoke just a few feet from Castro in the courtroom, finished her statement and returned to her seat without looking at him. Earlier, he had tried to make eye contact, but deputies quickly stepped into his line of vision.

#### Global interest grows in New Zealand's designer drug law: You can sell them if they're safe

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) - A novel New Zealand law that could legalize some designer drugs is being scrutinized with interest by other countries struggling to keep up with the proliferation of "party pills" and similar products.

The law, enacted two weeks ago, represents a U-turn from the traditional approach of banning synthetic drugs. Instead, New Zealand will attempt to regulate them, allowing their sale if they go through rigorous safety testing similar to that for

pharmaceuticals. Giving users a high wouldn't be a reason to ban them, a government health official said, though they would need to come with warnings, such as not driving while under their influ-

The policy is getting some attention globally. A group of British parliamentarians this year recommended adopting a similar policy. Australian officials have contacted their New Zealand counterparts to learn more. And the New York-based nonprofit Drug Policy Alliance, which advocates legalizing marijuana, said this week that it wants to get a similar bill introduced in Congress.

But while the new law is giving fuel to some politicians and lobbying groups, most countries are likely to adopt a wait-and-see approach. If anything, the U.S. has become more aggressive in prosecuting cases since President Barack Obama signed a federal law last year banning 26 new synthetic sub-

Sold under street names such as "spice," and "bath salts," the drugs often mimic banned substances such as marijuana, ecstasy and methamphetamine. The U.S. National Institute on Drug Abuse says bath salts, a meth-like stimulant, can produce feelings of euphoria and increased sex drive and sociability, but also can have side-effects including paranoia.

## Japan minister refuses to step down over remarks seen as praising Nazis

TOKYO (AP) — Japanese Finance Minister Taro Aso refused Friday to resign or apologize over remarks suggesting Japan should follow the Nazi example of how to change the country's constitution stealthily and without public debate.

Following protests by neighboring countries and human rights activists, he "retracted" the comments on Thursday but refused to go further.

"I have no intention to step down" as Cabinet minister of lawmaker, Aso, who is also deputy prime minister, told reporters. The government also said it is not seeking Aso's resignation, which some opposition members have demanded.

Aso, who is known for intemperate remarks, drew outrage for saying Japan should learn from how the Nazi party stealthily changed Germany's pre-World War II constitution before anyone realized it. He also suggested that Japanese politicians should make visits to Tokyo's Yasukuni war shrine quietly to avoid controversy.

# **Test Your Play**

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Hearts, and North leads the queen of diamonds. How would you play the hand? West

**♠** A 10 **♠**J83 ♥AJ962 ♥K 10 7 4 ♦ A K ♣AK73 ♣Q10642 2. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump, and North leads the queen of diamonds, South playing the seven. How would you play the hand? West

1. You are sure to make the contract — even if you lose a trump trick - provided the clubs are divided 2-2 or 3-1, since you can eventually discard your spade loser on dummy's fifth club. The same is true if the clubs are divided 4-0 and North has all four of them, since in that case you can overcome his jack with a finesse and thus get home safely.

The only real danger, therefore, is that South has the J-9-8-5 of clubs, so you should plan the play on that basis. Once you consign four clubs to South and none to North, it follows that North is far more likely to be

longer in trumps than South. Accordingly, at trick two you should play the ace of hearts, planning to continue with a heart and finesse the ten. This method of play makes it extremely unlikely that the slam will fail.

2. Let's assume you duck the diamond queen and North continues with the six to South's king. You win with the ace, and the question is whether it is better to lead a spade to the queen at trick three or cash the A-K-Q of hearts in the hope that the opposing hearts are divided 3-3.

There is no doubt that, percentagewise, the better play is to rely on the spade finesse rather than a 3-3 heart division. In the long run, North will be dealt the king of spades 50 percent of the time, while the hearts will divide evenly only 36 percent of the time, so the spade finesse is clearly superior.

It is only fair to add that in situations like this, the right play sometimes turns out to be wrong, and the wrong play sometimes succeeds. Even so, over the long haul, it is much better to go with the odds.

# Cowboys counting on Carter and Lee as playmaking pair

OXNARD, Calif. (AP) — Sean Lee dismisses talk of how good the Dallas defense could be if he and Bruce Carter started together at linebacker for a full season.

It hasn't happened yet. So until it does — and until the Cowboys get back to the playoffs — Lee's not listening.

"Until you win a Super Bowl, until you've got it on tape week to week, it means nothing," Lee said. "That's all hype. If we lean on that hype, we're never going to be good."

The Cowboys are counting on this playmaking pair to be

Dallas won three straight games last season when both were sidelined by season-ending injuries — Lee with a badly damaged toe in the sixth game at Carolina and Carter with a dislocated elbow on Thanksgiving against Washington.

But the defense ultimately faltered without them. The Cowboys couldn't stop Drew Brees' passing game and got run over by Washington rookie Alfred Morris in a pair of season-ending losses that kept them out of the playoffs for the third straight

Carter and Lee aren't watching anymore, though.

They're at the center of a defensive makeover that started soon after the season, when the Cowboys fired defensive coordinator Rob Ryan and replaced him with Monte Kiffin so they could return to the more linebacker-friendly 4-3 defense after nearly a decade in the 3-4.

"When you're playing the 4-3 defense, those ... (linebackers) are protected a little bit more," coach Jason Garrett said. "They gotta get to the football and make plays."

Both have shown they can. Lee has a knack for interceptions, something that was sorely missing last season on a defense that tied a franchise low with seven. Lee has that many in 35 career games, a high number for a linebacker.

Carter could have led the Cowboys in tackles last season if he hadn't been injured. His strength is speed, and he'll get his best chance to show it in the new scheme because one of the weakside linebacker's biggest jobs is running down plays away from him.

"I think guys are doing it well," Carter said. "Coaches kind of in-

get guys the whole grasp of the whole scheme. Now we're out here just flying around, getting

Carter and Lee joined the Cowboys a year apart and followed similar paths.

Both were second-round draft picks who played quite a bit as rookies but never started. Both earned starting jobs going into their second seasons. When Lee injured his toe last year, Carter took over the defensive playcalling on the field.

Even though he missed the final five games, Carter's first season as a starter did plenty to help him prepare for a leading

"A whole lot more comfortable," he said. "The more years you play, the more experience you gain, it just makes the game a lot slower for you. Especially for me, a guy coming off an in-

# Cruz unsure whether he will appeal if suspended

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Texas Rangers slugger Nelson Cruz said Thursday he hadn't decided whether to appeal if he is suspended as a result of Major League Baseball's latest drug investigation.

When asked before a game against Arizona if he had been told specifically what penalty could be forthcoming, Cruz responded, "No, I can not tell you, sorry.'

The All-Star right fielder, whose 25 home runs and 73 RBIs lead the Rangers, was in the lineup batting sixth against Arizona.

"I've heard a lot of stuff," Cruz said, though he wasn't specific about what and from whom before saying he couldn't comment further on

He sighed when asked if there was any indication when he might know something, then said, "It's tough. Sorry."

Cruz is among 14 players targeted for discipline because of their relationship to Biogenesis of America, a closed Florida anti-aging clinic accused of distributing banned performanceenhancing drugs. He appears to be facing a 50game suspension as a first offender under baseball's drug program. Discipline could be announced by Monday.

"It's tough. I mean we're in a good situation

now, we're close to first place and close to the wild card, also," Cruz said. "Hopefully everything plays well."

After three consecutive victories on game-ending home runs to sweep the Los Angeles Angels, Texas was within four games of idle Oakland in the AL West. The Rangers were a half-game back in the wild-card chase.

Today's Highlight History:

On Aug. 2, 1943, during World War II, U.S. Navy boat PT-109, commanded by Lt. (jg) John F. Kennedy, sank after being rammed in the middle of the night by the Japanese destroyer Amagiri off the Solomon Islands. Two crew members were killed; Kennedy led the survivors to nearby islands until they could be rescued.

In 1776, members of the Continental Congress began attaching their signatures to Declaration Independence.

In 1862, the Ambulance Corps for the Army of the Potomac was created at the order of Maj. Gen. George McClellan during the Civil War.

In 1876, frontiersman "Wild Bill" Hickok was shot and killed while playing poker at a

saloon in Deadwood, Dakota Territory, by Jack McCall, who was later hanged. In 1909, the original Lincoln

"wheat" penny first went into circulation, replacing the "Indian Head" cent. In 1922, Alexander Graham

Vice President Calvin Coolidge became president. In 1934, German President Paul von Hindenburg died, paving the way for Adolf

In 1945, President Harry S. Truman, Soviet leader Josef Stalin and British Prime Minister Clement Attlee concluded the Potsdam conference.

In 1964, the destroyer USS Maddox suffered light damage from North Vietnamese patrol torpedo boats in the Gulf of Tonkin.

In 1974, former White House counsel John W. Dean III was sentenced to one to four years in prison for obstruction of justice in the Watergate coverup.

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



pressed his confidence in Cleveland's owner and said the league has no plans to intervene or discipline him at this point.

Goodell said Haslam assured him he knew nothing of the rebate scam.

"He's been very clear that he's had no knowledge of that and he's been clear publicly and clear with you all," Goodell said. "He doesn't need any pushing. This company means a lot to him and he's obviously not happy about what has



thought processes in the box," Arizona's Adam Eaton "When you hit your spots and you have that many pitches, it's tough as a hitter to put the ball in play and get good swings on the ball."

Darvish also had 14 strikeouts when he faced the Diamondbacks just more than two months ago. But they managed to score four runs over 7 2-3 innings that night and won with a run in the ninth.

A.J. Pierzynski, Mitch Moreland and David Murphy all homered off Zeke Spruill (0-1), who went four innings in his first major league start. Pierzynski later added a two-run single.

Those homers were all hit early for the Rangers, who came off a three-game sweep of the Los Angeles Angels with game-ending homers in each. They had been shut out in three of the four games before the short homestand, and will now play 10 in a row on the road.

"Our offense has woken up, and the kev is to just keep going," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "We knew it was in there, it was just a matter of it coming out, and we're playing as a group."

Darvish struck out 10 of his first 13 bat-Rangers from Japan last season that he fanned at least 10. Dwight Gooden with 20 is the only other pitcher since 1900 with more in his first 50 starts.

"He was as good as I've seen him all year, counting the almost perfect game he threw the first start of the year. His stuff was just nasty," said Pierzynski, also the catcher when Darvish retired the first 26 batters at Houston four months ago. "He was throwing fastballs to the corners, he had a really good split, and obviousiy ne always nas a slider.

"He just kept mixing it up, and the strikeouts just kept coming and coming. Nights like that are fun."

It was the fourth game ters, marking the 16th this season Darvish time since he joined the reached 14 strikeouts — there are only two

other 14-K games in the majors this season. It is the most 14-strikeout games in one season for the Rangers, surpassing Hall of Fame pitcher Nolan Ryan's three in 1990. Over seven seasons in Japan, Darvish had 15
