# TEA: Improvement needed at BSISD

Accountability wise, work remains to be done at Big Spring Independent School District.

Three years after being tagged as "academically unacceptable" by the Texas Education Agency, BSISD fared little better In the revamped state accountability rankings Big Spring was one of 80 school districts or charters in the state to receive a a rating of "improvement required," the lowest of three possible At the campus level, Big Spring High School was the only local school to receive a "met standard" rating — all others received an "improvement required" label.

ratings.

Almost 93 percent of school districts in the state received a "met standards" ranking, TEA officials said.

Under the new TEA system, districts, campuses and charters received one of three ratings under the new accountability system: Met Standard;

Met Alternative Standard; or Improvement Required.

At the campus level, Big Spring High School was the only local school to receive a "met standard" rating — all others received an "improvement required" label.

The revised TEA ratings are based on a system that framework includes four ar-

uses various indicators to provide greater detail on the performance of a district and each individual campus throughout the state than previous years, Education Commissioner Michael Williams said.

The performance index

- Student Achievement Represents a snapshot of overall performance across all subjects by the entire student body.
- Student Progress Monitors how students improve from one school year to the next. Growth is evaluated by subject and student group and includes results from all students, student groups by race/ethnicity, English language learners and special



# Texas news in brief

## Hasan silent so far amid Fort Hood trial FORT HOOD, Texas

(AP) — The trial of Maj. Nidal Hasan is set to resume after more than 40 witnesses described how he prepared and carried out a shooting massacre that left 13 dead at Fort Hood.

Hasan faces the death penalty if convicted of murder and attempted murder in the November 2009 shootings.

So far, he's mostly watched in silence as those wounded in the attack described how he shouted "Allahu Akbar!" — Arabic for "God is great" — and drew a weapon and opened fire on unarmed soldiers. Hasan is representing himself, but has raised few objections asked only two witnesses questions.

# **New Texas** medical school under scrutiny

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) As the University of Texas prepares to open its medical school in Austin in 2016, it is negotiating the delicate agreements between public university and the religiously-affiliated health care provider who will train its doctors.

At the new medical school, most of the faculty and new doctors they train will be employees of Seton Healthcare Family, the largest health care system in Central Texas. As such, they will be required to follow the Catholic Ethical and Religious Directives, which include rules concerning birth control, abortion and end-of-life care.

The Austin American-Statesman reports that how the objectives of both institutions will be met is under scrutiny.

Americans United for Separation of Church and State sent a letter to both last month saying their agreement was unconstitutional.

Ian Smith, a lawyer with the Washingtonbased organization, said a government entity like the university "cannot legally bind itself to

those religious rules."

"If they are teaching in a medical school, they are a government actor," Smith said. "Restricting their behavior and their presentation under the Ethical and Religious Directives is problematic."

The university is researching the legal issues raised in the Americans United letter, said medical school spokesman Robert Cullick.

Seton runs the publicly owned University Medical Center Brackenridge in Austin, the oldest public hospital in Texas. With the creation of the new medical school, Seton will run and own the \$295 million replacement teaching hospital, which is scheduled to open in 2017. It will be the main training facility for the university's new Dell Medical School.

# 1 dead, 1 hurt in **Amarillo, victims** in club lot

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Amarillo police have found one man slain and another hurt after a caller reported he and his father were beaten and the older person died.

Police early Monday responded to an emergency call about a disturbance at the Las Chakalozas Nightclub. Arriving officers

found an injured man doing CPR on another man in the parking lot. Officers say 57-year-old Lamberto Sifuentes died at the scene. The man who was

hurt reported being assaulted with some type of weapon. He was transported to an Amarillo hospital with injuries not believed to be life-threatening.

Names of the two men and their relationship weren't immediately released by Amarillo police. Investigators did not

# Supporters of Egypt's ousted president dig in as police expected to move to besiege sit-ins

CAIRO (AP) — Supporters of Egypt's ousted president have dug in at their two Cairo sit-ins after security officials said police would besiege the entrenched protest camps within 24 hours — perhaps as early as Monday morning.

The development sets the stage for a possible confrontation between the military-backed government and the thousands gathered at the protest sites in support of ex-President Mohammed Morsi.

The protesters have said they will not leave until Morsi, ousted in a popularly supported coup on July 3, is reinstated.

Weeks of efforts by the international community to end the standoff and find a peaceful resolution have so far failed. Egypt's interim prime minister warned just ahead of the Muslim Eid al-Fitr holiday that ended Sunday that the government's decision to clear the sit-ins was "irreversible."

Egypt's new leadership says the protests have frightened residents of Cairo, sparked deadly violence and disrupted traffic. Leaders of the sit-in say they have been peaceful and blame security forces and "thugs" for violence. More than 250 people have killed in violence since Morsi's ouster.

# Sinkhole causes villa at central Fla. resort to partially collapse; another section sinking

CLERMONT, Fla. (AP) — A sinkhole caused a section of a central Florida resort villa to partially collapse early Monday, while another section of the villa was sinking, authorities said.

About 30 percent of the three-story structure collapsed around 3 a.m. Monday, Lake County Fire Rescue Battalion Chief Tony Cuellar said. The villa at the Summer Bay Resort had already been evacuated and no injuries were reported.

Cuellar said authorities were also concerned about another section of the villa, which was sinking.

The sinkhole, which is in the middle of the villa, is about 40 to 50 feet in diameter, Cuellar said. He said authorities think it was getting deeper but couldn't tell early Monday if it was growing outward.

The villa houses 24 units and about 20 people were staying in it at the time, Cuellar said.

As prisons overflow, Attorney General Holder calls for new

approaches to criminal justice

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the U.S. facing massive overcrowding in its prisons, Attorney General Eric Holder is calling for major changes to the nation's criminal justice system that would scale back the use of harsh sentences for certain drugrelated crimes.

In remarks prepared for delivery to the American Bar Association in San Francisco, Holder also favors diverting people convicted of low-level offenses to drug treatment and community service programs and expanding a prison program to allow for release of some elderly, non-violent offenders.

"We need to ensure that incarceration is used to punish, deter and rehabilitate — not merely to convict, warehouse and forget," Holder says in the speech he's scheduled to deliver Monday.

In one important change, the attorney general is altering Justice Department policy so that low-level, non-violent drug offenders with no ties to large-scale organizations, gangs or cartels won't be charged with offenses that impose mandatory minimum sentences.

Mandatory minimum prison sentences, a product of the government's war on drugs in the 1980s, limit the discretion of judges to impose shorter prison sentences.

# U.S. surveillance program casts shadow over

Kerry Latin America trip

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — U.S. Secretary of

State John Kerry's attempts to build warmer relations with two U.S. allies in Latin America may be hindered by resentment after reports about an American spy program that widely targeted data in emails and telephone calls across the region.

Kerry is visiting Brazil and Colombia this week, his first trip to South America as the Obama administration's chief diplomat. It comes at a time that disclosures by National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden could chill talks on several fronts.

Those include trade and energy, and even discussions about the Oct. 23 state dinner that President Barack Obama is hosting for Brazil's president, Dilma Rousseff.

Kerry arrived late Sunday in Bogota, the Colombian capital. The country is holding peace talks to end a half century-old conflict with the Western Hemisphere's most potent rebel army, a rebel force diminished in strength thanks in considerable measure to U.S. military and intelligence support.

Colombia's president, Juan Manuel Santos, said Thursday that he wanted clarification from Washington on whether U.S. intelligence-gathering in Colombia had overstepped the countries' joint operations against drug traffickers and illegal armed groups. The U.S. has supplied Colombia with eavesdropping equipment, technicians and aerial surveillance.

# Ex-sheriff and friends tell of odd encounter with Calif. teen, abductor in Idaho wilderness

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — The highly publicized multistate search for a Southern California teenage girl probably would have taken longer if she and her abductor hadn't encountered a sharp-eyed retired sheriff and three others riding horseback in Idaho's rugged backcountry, authorities said.

The girl, 16-year-old Hannah Anderson, was rescued Saturday afternoon after the former sheriff passed along his suspicions, allowing investigators to focus efforts on a southwest corner of wilderness in the Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness, a 3,600-square-mile roadless preserve in the heart of Idaho.

At a news conference Sunday in Boise, 71-year-old Mark John and his three riding mates shared the details of their meeting with Anderson and James Lee DiMaggio, who was later killed in a shootout during the rescue at a remote, alpine lake.

"They just didn't fit" said John who retired as

"They just didn't fit," said John, who retired as Gem County sheriff in 1996. "He might have been an outdoorsman in California, but he was not an outdoorsman in Idaho. ... Red flags kind of went up."

Initially, it was the lack of openness on the trail and a reluctance to engage in the polite exchange of banter like so many other recreationists John has encountered during his various horseback excursions.

# Israel publishes names of 26 Palestinian prisoners set for release ahead of peace talks

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel on Monday published the names of 26 Palestinian prisoners, most of them jailed for deadly attacks, who are to be released this week as part of a U.S.-brokered deal that led to a resumption of Mideast negotiations.

Israelis and Palestinians are to launch talks in Jerusalem on Wednesday, following a preparatory round two weeks ago in Washington. The prisoner release, expected Tuesday, is part of an agreement to restart the talks after a five-year freeze.

Relatives of some of the Israeli victims protested angrily over the list, while Palestinian pro-prisoner activists said it fell short of expectations. In all, Israel is to free 104 of the longest-held Palestinian prisoners in coming months, most of them detained for killing Israelis or suspected Palestinian collaborators.

They are to be freed in four stages over the course of the Israeli-Palestinian negotiations, which are envisioned to go on for about nine months.

Israel's Prison Service posted the 26 names online early Monday to allow two days for possible court

appeals.

# South Korean wedding companies woo rich Chinese eager for touch of Seoul's style sense

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Standing by a French chateau's window, the young bride-to-be glows in the afternoon sun as she gazes into her fiancé's eyes. This Chinese couple's fairytale moment, however, isn't unfolding at a Bordeaux estate.

The 20-something Beijing lawyers and fans of South Korean pop idol Rain are part of a small but growing number of affluent Chinese for whom the craze for all things South Korean means flying to Seoul for the weekend to have wedding pictures taken.

China is the source of one quarter of all tourists to South Korea, and a handful of companies in South Korea's \$15 billion wedding industry are wooing an image-conscious slice of the Chinese jet set happy to drop several thousand dollars on a wedding album with a South Korean touch.

The draw for many of the well-heeled Chinese isn't Seoul's ancient palaces or the fiery cuisine. It's an elegant urban style exemplified by Gangnam, the tony Seoul district made globally famous by South Korean rapper PSY's "Gangnam Style." Helping shape that image is the popularity of South Korean cosmetics and fashion and the many South Korean stars whose looks are widely copied in China.

"The style in South Korea is more sophisticated and cuter than what we have in China. We came here because South Korea is the leader in fashion and makeup," said the bride-to-be, Yang Candi, as two stylists fussed over her hair with a curling iron and giant hair clips during a recent photo shoot.

(AP) — Lea Michele made her first public appearance following the death of her co-star and real-life boyfriend Cory Monteith at the Teen Choice Awards.

# Perez throws 4-hitter, Rangers win 7th straight

HOUSTON (AP) — Not even a ninthinning home run that ended his bid at a first career shutout could ruin Martin Perez's day.

Perez threw a four-hitter for his first career complete game, leading the Texas Rangers to their seventh straight victory, 6-1 over the Houston Astros on Sunday.

"When I go to the mound I think, 'I'm the best here, and I have the ball," Perez said. "I just want to throw. That's what I did tonight. I took the ball and threw the pitch where (catcher Geovany Soto) called it."

Perez (5-3) struck out a career-high eight while walking two in earning his second straight win. Perez has allowed four runs over his last 22 2-3 innings, spanning his last three starts.

"He threw a lot of strikes out there today," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "He's good at keeping the ball down. He has good mechanics. I think when he gets erratic it's only because he tries to do too much. As long as he stays throwing the ball through the catcher and spots his fastball down in the zone the way he's capable of doing, he'll be fine."

Perez retired 15 of 17 batters from the third to the eighth, including nine in a row before Jake Elmore's single with two outs in the eighth.

"His fastball command was there. His changeup was there," Soto said. "He had a lot of early outs in the third, fourth, fifth innings.

"I think he looks a little bit differ-

ent. He has more conviction, more aggressiveness, more attack. I feel like he's doing that. Whenever he needs a strike leading off the inning or leading off an at-bat, he got a strike. He uses all his pitches real well and he used all his pitches well today."

The left-hander gave a lot of credit to Soto.

"He helped me out with pitches, and we have a good relationship," Perez said. "He called the pitches. I just threw it 100 percent. He's a good catcher and called a good game."

Chris Carter ruined Perez's shutout bid with a home run with two outs in the ninth inning, but Perez said the home run didn't matter because the most important thing was the Rang-

Alex Rios had two hits, drove in a run and scored twice in his second game with the Rangers, who have won 12 of their last 13 games. Adrian Beltre also had two hits.

Dallas Keuchel (5-7) allowed six runs and eight hits with eight strikeouts in 8 2-3 innings. He was the second Astros starter to go into the ninth this season, as Bud Norris threw eightplus innings May 8 against the Los Angeles Angels.

"That was the best I felt all year," Keuchel said. "(Perez) was better than me today, and I didn't make pitches when I needed to."

Keuchel set down the first

The field didn't have to worry about five-time Watkins Glen winner Tony Stewart. The man known as Smoke is out indefinitely after breaking two bones in his right leg last Monday night in a sprint car race in Iowa. Stewart, who has undergone two surgeries, saw his streak of 521






# Dufner holds off Furyk at PGA, wins first major title

PITTSFORD, N.Y.(AP) Jason Dufner walked off the 18th green, after casually pumping his fists in what passed for a raucous celebration. There was a familiar face waiting for him.

The last time they met in this situation, it was Keegan Bradley accepting the Wanamaker Trophy.

This time, it belonged to Dufner.

Granted, it was two vears later than it should have been. That only made it sweeter.

"I'm proud of you," Bradley said, giving his buddy a hug.

"Thanks a lot," Dufner replied. "It means a lot for you to be here."

With ice in his veins and a determination not to let another opportunity slip away, Dufner claimed his first major title with a two-shot victory over Jim Furyk in the PGA Championship on Sunday.

There was a certain symmetry to the way it went down, for Dufner to get the biggest win of par at the first hole, he at his side, a dazed look around the back nine, Swedish man to capture his career in the very same tournament that produced his biggest heartache.

On a Sunday afternoon in 2011, Dufner strolled to the 15th tee at Atlanta Athletic Club with a four-shot lead in the PGA. He promptly dumped his ball in the water, while Bradley started making birdies up ahead. By the time they had both finished 72 holes, it was all even.

Bradley, of course, won the playoff.

Dufner kept insisting he would get another chance.

"I was probably over what happened in Atlanta, 95 percent of it, by the time we got back home," he said.

But, he conceded, "You always carry those scars with you."

They didn't show on a warm, sunny day at Oak Hill, a venerable course that Dufner considers one of his favorites.

After he rolled in a testy little 3-footer to save

went on cruise control. His tee shots were long and accurate. His irons were dead solid perfect. If not for some shaky strokes with the putter, he would've won this thing by a much greater margin.

As it was, there was nothing too dramatic about the final hours.

Just as one would expect from the guy who gave us "Dufnering."

"I would say I was pretty flat-lined for most of the day," he said. "For whatever reason, I felt really comfortable, really calm, and felt like I could do it." Until the final major

of 2013, Dufner had endured a mostly forgettable year. His most noteworthy moment came in April, when he was caught on camera during a charity appearance at an elementary school — sitting on the floor, propped up against a wall of the classroom, arms rigidly

on his face.

It turned out to be his calling card.

"Ran with it and it helped me a lot," Dufner said. "I got a lot of fans because of it and people identified with me through it." Down a stroke to Fu-

ryk at the start of the round, and all even as they went to the eighth hole, Dufner knocked his approach shot past the flag and spun the ball back in his direction, watching it roll to a stop about a foot from the cup for as easy a birdie as you're likely to see. Or, more accurate, would see three times on this day. That's how well Dufner was striking the ball.

At the ninth, Dufner pulled off a nifty up-anddown to save par, while Furyk wasted a tee shot in the fairway and made bogey. Suddenly, the margin was two shots as they made the turn.

That's how it remained, all the way

as the two guys in the final group posted the exact same score on every hole.

"I wish I could have put a little heat on him," Furyk said, "make him work those last two holes a little bit harder." Furvk bogeved the fi-

nal two holes for a 1-over 71. Dufner did the same, leaving him with a 68 for the final round and at 10-under 270 overall.

He finished it off with a tap-in from a few inches away.

About as exciting as Dufner himself.

"I had a bit of a cushion there," he said, before taking a poke at his struggles on the greens. "That last putt was in the perfect range for me to make. There's not much to celebrate from six inches or less, but it's nice to have that short of a putt to cap this off."

Henrik Stenson (70) finished three shots back, missing a chance to become the first a major championship. Another Swede, Jonas

Blixt, was four behind the winner. Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson were long gone by the time the

leaders teed off.

Woods' winless streak in the majors is now more than five years long, and this one was especially perplexing. Just a week earlier, he wrapped up a dominating seven-stroke victory at the Bridgestone. He never got anything going at Oak Hill, putting up four straight rounds in the 70s and finishing a whopping 14 shots behind Dufner.

"Just the way it goes," Woods said.

Mickelson was only three weeks removed from one of the greatest closing rounds in major championship history at Muirfield, rallying to claim his first British Open title.

Lefty apparently left his swing on the other side of the Atlantic.


nearly 10 seconds.

Avarelli now led the spade six, losing to West's eight. Back came a diamond to East's ace, and his diamond return was ruffed by South with the five. This left Avarelli with the Q-10 of spades, West the jack of spades and king of diamonds, and ast the K-9 of spades. The outcome

hinged on declarer's next play.

Avarelli searched the ceiling for inspiration, but it did not respond. Stalling for time, he turned over the last card he had played, the five of spades, in effect asking to see the previous trick.

But West misunderstood the motion and played the jack of spades. Technically this became an exposed card, and declarer could have played the spade queen and forced West to play the jack regardless of his actual holding Avarelli thought this unfair, so he

shuffled the Q-10 of spades face-down and invited East, then West, then North to select a card. All three refused, none of them wanting to bear that responsibility. Avarelli then persuaded the scorekeeper to choose the card. He did, and it was the queen, so Avarelli made four spades! Tomorrow: A little bit of knowledge.


