The State Board of Education ha struggled to adopt a statewide curriculum framework known as the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS), and before the task wa highly charged political issue. Almost four in 10 of those I surveyed listed "poor attitudes" in their top seven bad habits. Words like "complacent," "apathetic," "unmotivated" and "negative" were common.
One CEO said, "People with bad attitudes are never happy." He went on to say that kind of thinking always influences others. CDon't listen, don't think and say what's on your mind. One-third of
those surveyed ranked "listening," "speaking," "writing" and "thinking on your feet" as career limiting deficiencies.
One attorney said, "You don't care about others if you can't take time to listen to them." Several linked success to having good speaking and writing ${ }^{\text {skills. }}$ Do what you want to do, then blame someone else. All actions have results-good, bad or neutral. $25 \%$ of the respondents agreed that refusing to accept responsibility for negative results keeps foiks from achieving success.
