Water breaks send crews scrambling

Leaks repaired, students return to classes today

It was "double your trouble" for Big Spring residents and city work crews alike Thursday, as two major water transmission lines broke, leaving many residences and businesses without water and forcing local schools to dismiss classes early.

The first water break occurred on 10th Street next to Big Spring High School when a 20-inch line ruptured at approximately 3:30 a.m. Thursday. Roughly six hours later, another 20-inch line, this one located at the 800 block of Baylor, broke as well.

The pressure release caused by the breaks were sudden and intense, said Interim Public Works Director Johnny Womack.

"The (line break) over on Baylor blew out a hole bigger than my car," Womack said. "And the break (near the high school) was shooting water up more than 20 feet in the air."

As a result of the breaks, residences and businesses in the surrounding areas were without water, and City Manager Todd Darden issued a temporary ban on all non-essential water usages for all city water customers.

Three Big Spring campuses directly effected by the breaks — Moss and Washington elementaries and the high school — immediately cancelled classes Thursday and all Big Spring Independent School District schools dismissed students at 1:30 p.m.

Resurfacing of U.S. 87 set to begin

The Texas Department of Transportation is set to begin a project next week to resurface 3.6 miles of U.S. 87 in Howard County.

Work will include pavement repairs, seal coat and overlay from RM 33 to FM 700 in South Big Spring. Traffic will be reduced to one lane in each direction for sections as long as two miles, including at night.

Drivers are urged to use extreme caution in the work zone and to remain alert for workers and equipment in the area. The project is expected to be completed by early 2014.

TxDOT officials said the project is to South FM 700 and does not include Gregg Street.

Price Construction was contracted to complete the work for \$2.2 million.

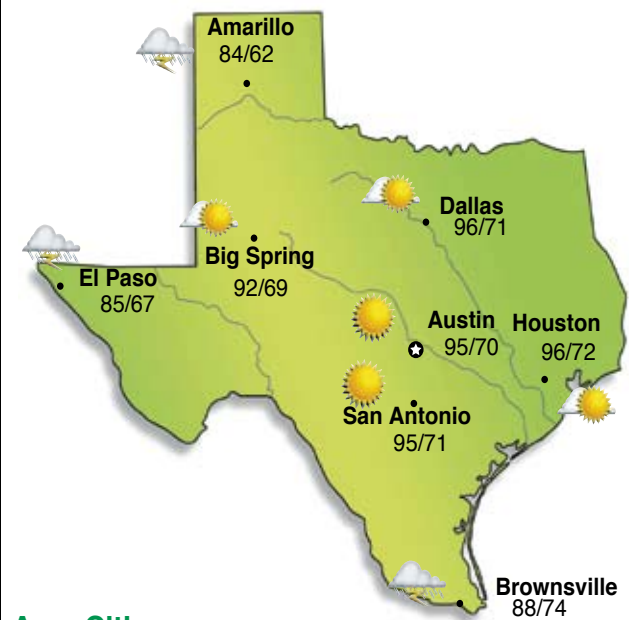

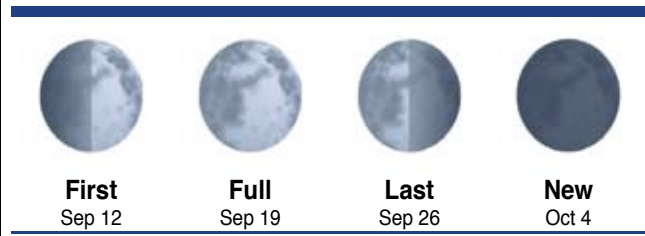

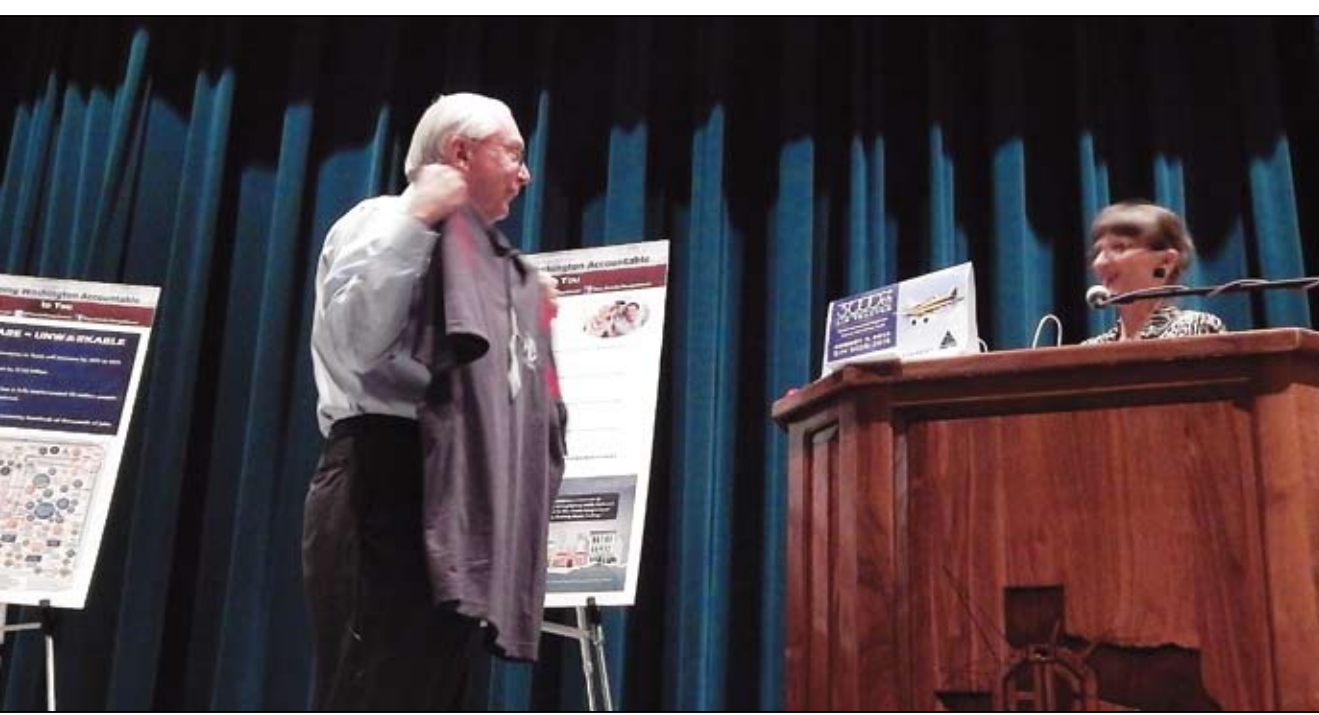

officials — citing little or no water pressure — closed the Birdwell Lane campus at noon.

All BSISD and HC students returned to classes this morning, officials confirmed.

Although the breaks were localized and water rerouted to the lines in fairly short order, repairing them will be a time-consuming process.

Crews were still digging toward the lines — located almost 10 feet below ground — early Thursday afternoon and Womack was hesitant to give a timeline as to when water service would be resumed.

But he promised that crews would be on site until the problem was fixed. Understaffed street crews were being augmented by employees from other city departments in an effort to fix the problem as quickly as possible.

“This is an ‘all hands on deck’ situation,” he said. “Most of our crews were out all night long ... and some of the guys have worked 24 hours straight. We have people from the water plant and other departments helping out — even if they really don’t know how.”

Water department officials said the leaks were repaired and the system was recharging as of 8:30 this morning. Normal service was expected to be restored by noon.

Reflections: Every nation, tribe and tongue

Last week we hosted an International Student Bible study in our home. It wasn't a large group. It was small enough that everyone could quickly learn and remember everyone else's name. They came from Zambia, South Africa, Viet Nam, Brazil, China and the U.S. It reminded me of the song we used to sing when I was a child, "Red and yellow, black and white, they are precious in His sight. Jesus loves the little children of the world." We had a similar experience last summer when we

served a church in Nuremberg, Germany. Each week we gathered in our little apartment in the Altstadt, the old city within the ancient walls that once protected the Nuremberg castle. They came from the Ukraine, Ireland, U.K, China, India, Cameroon, Sweden, Austria, Germany and, oh yes, the United States. Most of them were recent graduates from universities starting their careers in this ancient city where their lives were intersecting.

In neither case did there appear to be any awareness of color or race. In both instances, the evening was filled with laughter, kindness and joy. When they opened their Bibles, they shared honest questions and probing insights about God's love and His presence. Some-

times, at the most tender moments, they confessed, prayed and wept with one another.

I wonder why the world at large can't be more like that. Why is it that on a global scale we stare at each other across distant borders fearful and skeptical of one another?

In 1987 I stood at the harbor in Sydney, Australia watching as a cruise liner from the Soviet Union prepared to launch for its return trip home. I listened to the passengers singing lusty Russian choruses that echoed in the air. A Soviet cruise liner was something I had never seen in an American port, and the sounds of the singing made me wish we could know one another. I felt, if we did, we would probably like one another.

Years later, after the Soviet

Union dissolved, I visited Moscow and sat at a table with Russian believers. We visited through an interpreter and we prayed together, especially for the people of Siberia where we hoped to serve. I discovered my premonition was right. I did like these people.

I have discovered the same experience in Indonesia, Korea, Brazil, Colombia, Guatemala, and Egypt. Wherever and whenever I have met believers in Christ from foreign countries with foreign cultures and languages, I have found an instant bond. The faith that is in Christ immediately bridges differences in ethnicity, culture and language.

Our international Student Bible Study seems to me a preview of what the Bible describes in Heaven. John

wrote, "After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. ... And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." (Revelation 7:9-10)

Surely God takes special pleasure when his children from different nations worship Him in unity and love. It is the way it will be one day when all sin is removed and we gather in His presence.

Colo. flooding leads to thousands more evacuations

LYONS, Colo. (AP) — With rain still falling and the flood threat still real, authorities called on thousands more people in the inundated city of Boulder and nearby towns to evacuate as rivers and creeks rose to dangerous levels.

The late-night reports from Boulder and the village of Eldorado Springs came as rescuers struggled to reach dozens of people cut off by flooding in Colorado mountain communities.

Residents in the Den-

ver area and other downstream communities were warned to stay off flooded streets.

The towns of Lyons, Jamestown and others in the Rocky Mountain foothills have been isolated by flooding and without power or telephone since rain hanging over the region all week intensified late Wednesday and early Thursday.

At least three people were killed and another was missing, and numerous people were forced to seek shelter

up and down Colorado's populated Front Range.

Boulder County spokesman James Burrus said 17 people were unaccounted for Friday, and officials planned to publicly release the names later.

"Unaccounted for doesn't mean missing. It means we haven't heard back from them," he said.

Two backpackers who were hiking the 14,259-foot Longs Peak became stranded when the weather turned, the mother of one of the

backpackers said Friday.

Suzanne Turell and Connie Yang of York, Maine, last sent a text message at 9 a.m. Thursday with their GPS coordinates, but their cellphones have since gone dead, said Barbara Turell of Frederick, Md.

They have a tent but do not have cold-weather gear, she said.

"Those kids have been up there for two days now. They're not prepared for the cold weather," she said. "We're very concerned we may be in a long line of people needing assistance."

Late Thursday, warning sirens blared in Boulder and city offi-

cial sent notice to about 4,000 people living along Boulder Creek around the mouth of Boulder Canyon to head for higher ground, according to Boulder's Daily Camera newspaper.

The alert was prompted by rapidly rising creek levels caused by water backing up at the mouth of the canyon because of debris and mud coming off the mountainsides, the city Office of Emergency Management said.

The creek began to recede after midnight, but the conditions remained dangerous and a surprising amount of water was still flowing into the city's streets, Police Chief Mark Beck-

ner told the Daily Camera after touring the damage.

The entire hamlet of Eldorado Springs, about 500 people, was urged to evacuate because of a flash flood and mudslide threat along South Boulder Creek, Burrus said.

Northwest of Boulder, the overflowing Vrain Creek cut the town of Longmont in half. Evacuation requests were issued for some neighborhoods, all major roads were closed, and several thousand homes and businesses were without power, he said.

Interstate 25 east of Loveland was closed in both directions Friday, state transportation officials said.

A faith that can't be hidden

Wow, what faith! Anyone who has ever read "The Hiding Place" or any of Corrie Ten Boom's writings must marvel at the courage and faith of this Dutch Christian woman and her extended family.

They risked their own lives to save their Jewish neighbors who were being persecuted during the Nazi Holocaust in World War II.

Pursuing the career path of her father, Corrie became the first licensed female watchmaker in the Netherlands in 1924. Perhaps more importantly, she followed in her father's faith-shaped footsteps by hiding Jews in a

hidden room in their home so that they would not be arrested or killed.

Not surprisingly, this Christian woman who spent several years in prison for her benevolent acts demonstrated the kind of faith that comes only through adversity. With all sincerity she recorded these time-tested words: "Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God."

Because faith and prayer are links of the same chain, Corrie Ten Boom believed in prayer. Seemingly following the admonition given in the Scripture to pray without ceasing and always give thanks, (1 Thessalonians 5:17-18) she faced discouragement with assurance of God's faithfulness. Her philosophy was: "Any concern too small to be turned into a prayer is too small to be made

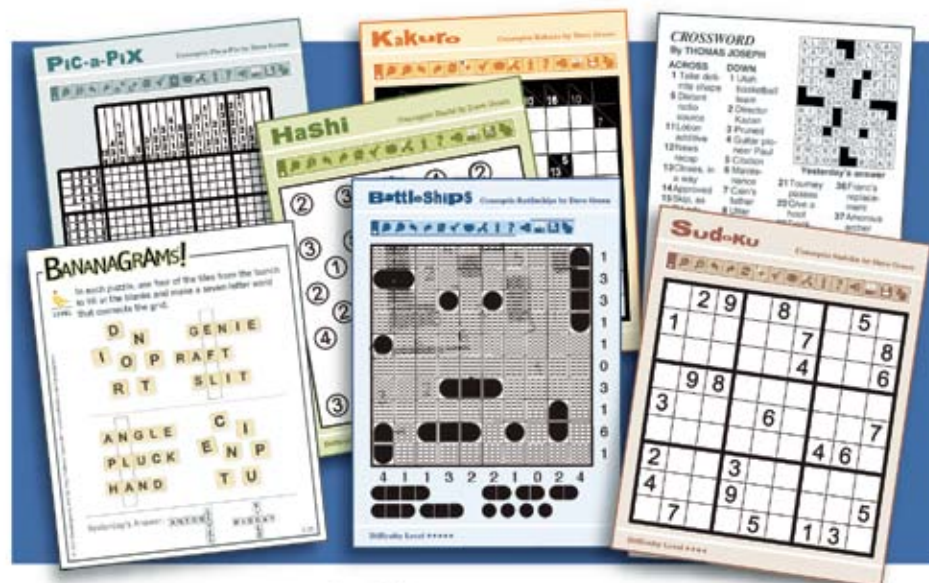

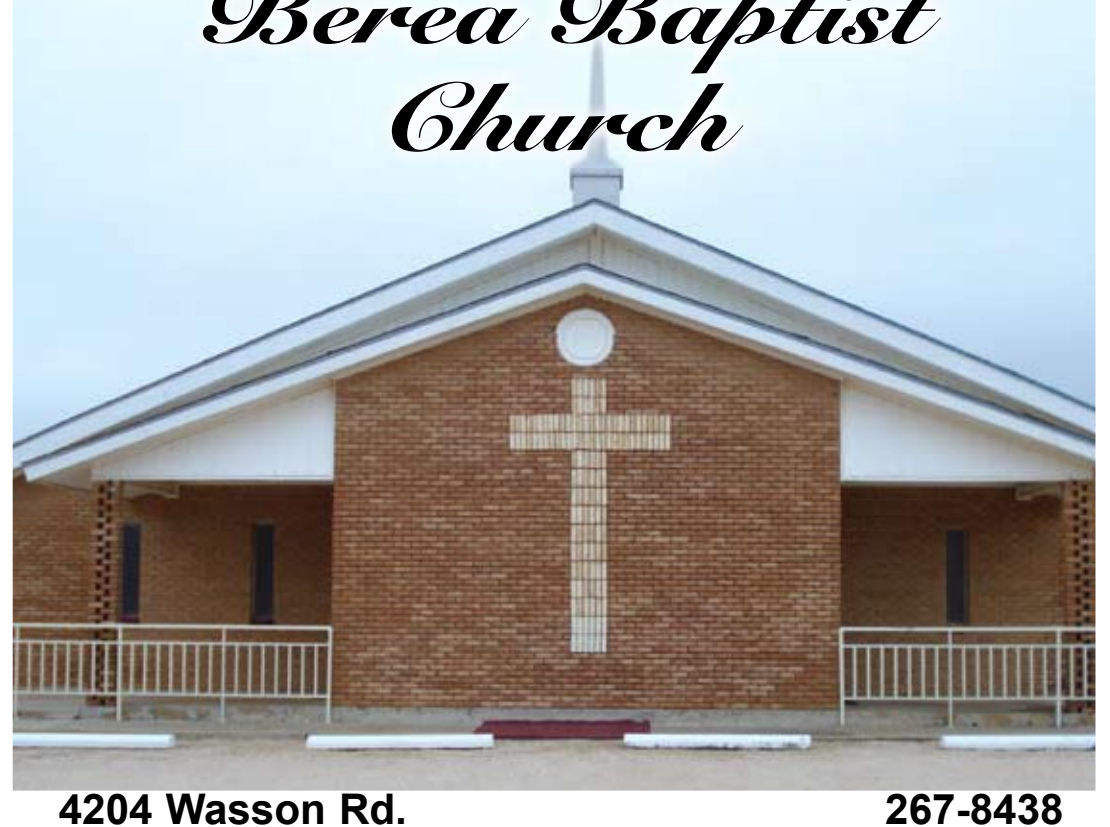

into a burden.”
Yet another statement of faith comes from Ten Boom’s journey of suffering. Speaking from experience, she said, “Worry does not empty tomorrow of its sorrow. It empties today of its strength.”

While we may be amazed at this woman’s faith and ability to endure hardship, we should be equally impressed by the stories of faith we read about in the Bible. Maybe Corrie Ten Boom’s strength came from a promise made in the Scripture.

The apostle Paul wrote to the church at Philippi, “Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your request be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your minds in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 4:6-7 NASB).

Like the Ten Boom family, perhaps many believers have hidden rooms in their homes for one reason or another. But the quality of faith that demonstrates peace beyond understanding cannot be hidden.



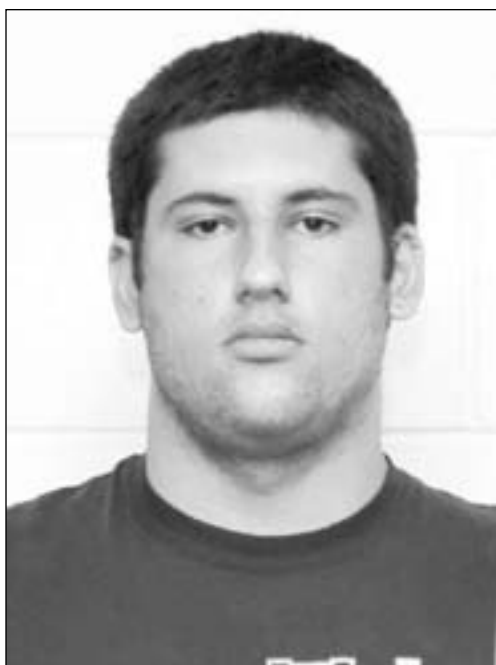

Tech upends No. 24 TCU 20-10

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Texas Tech backup quarterback Davis Webb practiced taking snaps and going to his knee in a victory formation along the sideline while his defense was on the field.

Webb had just thrown his first touchdown pass, a 19-yarder to Bradley Marquez that broke a tie with 3:48 remaining and sent the Red Raiders to a 20-10 victory over No. 24 TCU on Thursday night.

The victory formation wasn't overconfidence. The freshman had just never won a college football game before.

"It was a beautiful ball from Davis Webb," Marquez said. "Those kinds of balls you don't drop."

Webb came on after freshman walk-on Baker Mayfield left the game in the fourth quarter with an apparent injury to his left knee or ankle.

Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury doesn't make freshmen available to the media.

The score came after the Red Raiders (3-0, 1-0 Big 12) thought they'd scored on a 49-yard TD pass from Webb to DeAndre Washington, but

he dropped the ball at the half-yard line. An unsportsmanlike conduct penalty took them back to the TCU 14. Two plays later, Webb hit Marquez.

"That's about as ugly as you can win, but we'll take it," Kingsbury said. "Pretty bizarre, but I thought our kids' effort was incredible the entire time. Played their hearts out and found a way to win an ugly game."

TCU (1-2, 0-1) scored its only touchdown when B. J. Catalon ran in from 17 yards to make it 10-all with 6:28 remaining

TCU's Trevone Boykin went 23 for 36 for 194 yards and two interceptions. He rushed for a career-high 101 yards on 20 carries.

Mayfield went 21 of 40 for one touchdown and 216 yards. He threw three interceptions.

Webb went 3 for 4 for 77 yards and a touchdown.

Ryan Bustin made a 37-yard field goal to put the game out of reach with 2:43 remaining.

The Frogs had their chances. A 69-yard punt return for

Another Sept. slide for Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers are sliding again in September, right into their final series against AL West foe Oakland.

A huge difference this season is that the Rangers will be home for this three-game series, and still have two weeks of games left after that.

Texas still has a tight hold on the AL's top wild-card spot despite losing nine of its last 12 games (2-8 in September) while dropping four consecutive series.

But remember how that wild-card thing worked out last sea-

son?

After going to two World Series in a row, then being in first place for a MLB-high 178 days last season, the Rangers ended the regular season with their worst slump of the year, losing nine of 13. That included being swept in three games the first week in October at Oakland, which clinched the AL West title by winning game No. 162.

Even with Yu Darvish on the mound at home, the Rangers lost the first one-and-done wild-card play-off to Baltimore. Oakland won 8-2

in its series finale at Minnesota on Thursday, when the Rangers had their last scheduled day off before playing 17 days in a row.

In the last two weeks, including losing two of three in Oakland, the Rangers went from a three-game division lead to now 3 1/2 games back of Oakland.

"Our heart is still in it. We've just got to do what we have to do to win ball games," manager Ron Washington said. "I'm not concerned. We'll be ready to play with Oakland coming to town."

Romo to play through rib problem again

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Tony Romo played through broken ribs to help keep the season afloat for Dallas in 2011.

The injury isn't as serious this time, which means the task doesn't appear as daunting for the Cowboys quarterback.

Romo has bruised ribs after he was crunched between two defenders late in the first half of a 36-31 win over the New York Giants in the opener. He played the second half and says he's just dealing with soreness heading into

Sunday's game at Kansas City.

The offense didn't do much when Romo returned — just 98 yards after halftime. And the Cowboys never could put away the Giants despite the gift of six turnovers from a revamped defense.

But Romo thinks Dallas has something to build on.

"More than anything they wanted to keep everything in front of them and really make us move the ball with a lot of plays," said

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Sept. 13, the 256th day of 2013. There are 109 days left in the year. The Jewish Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur, begins at sunset.

Today's Highlight in History:

On September 13, 1788, the Congress of the Confederation authorized the first national election, and declared New York City the temporary national capital.

On this date:

In 1759, during the final French and Indian War, the British defeated the French on the Plains of Abraham overlooking Quebec City.

In 1803, Commodore John Barry, considered by many the father of the American Navy, died in Philadelphia.

In 1912, a state funeral was held in Japan for Emperor Meiji.

In 1948, Republican Margaret Chase Smith of Maine was elected to the U.S. Senate; she became the first woman to

serve in both houses of Congress.

In 1959, Elvis Presley first met his future wife, 14-year-old Priscilla Beaulieu, while stationed in West Germany with the U.S. Army. (They married in 1967, but divorced in 1973.)

In 1962, Mississippi Gov. Ross Barnett rejected the U.S. Supreme Court's order for the University of Mississippi to admit James Meredith, a black student, declaring in a televised address, "We will not drink from the cup of genocide."

In 1970, the first New York City Marathon was held; winner Gary Muhrcrke finished the 26.2-mile run, which took place entirely inside Central Park, in 2:31:38.

In 1971, a four-day inmates' rebellion at the Attica Correctional Facility in western New York ended as police and guards stormed the prison; the ordeal and final assault claimed the lives of 32 inmates and 11 employees.

In 1989, Fay Vincent was elected commissioner of Major League Baseball, succeeding the late A. Bartlett Giamatti (juh-MAH'-tee).

In 1993, at the White House,

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and PLO chairman Yasser Arafat shook hands after signing an accord granting limited Palestinian autonomy. "Late Night with Conan O'Brien" premiered on NBC.

In 1996, rapper Tupac Shakur died at a Las Vegas hospital six days after he was wounded in a drive-by shooting; he was 25.

In 1998, former Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace died in Montgomery at age 79.

Today's Birthdays: Actress Barbara Bain is 82. Actress Eileen Fulton ("As the World Turns") is 80. TV producer Fred Silverman is 76. Former White House spokesman Larry Speakes is 74. Actor Richard Kiel is 74.

an apparent touchdown by Brandon Carter in the fourth quarter was called back after officials ruled he'd signaled for a fair catch.

The Horned Frogs had 13 penalties for 115 yard. "We cannot have as many penalties as we

did," TCU coach Gary Patterson said. "I have to give their defense credit."

Carter had another punt return wiped out — a 28-yarder in the third quarter on a clipping penalty.

Mayfield threw his third interception early in the fourth quarter off a tipped ball and into the hands of Derrick Kindred. But TCU got no points off it when Jaden Oberkrom

missed wide right on a 55-yard field goal try.

TCU put together its first sustained drive of the game early in the second half but got only a field goal to pull within 10-3 with 6:01 remaining in the third quarter. The Frogs looked in good position for another score after Carter returned a punt to the Red Raiders 46. But a clipping penalty by TCU's Dominic Merka moved the ball back to the TCU 41 and the Frogs failed to get a first down and punted.

Boykin scrambled for a first down on a 30-yard run to the Red Raiders 32 late in the third quarter, but Jackson Richards intercepted his pass shortly after and returned it 20 yards.

Jace Amaro caught nine

passes for 97 yards to lead Texas Tech. Eric Ward, the Red Raiders' leading receiver coming into the game, went without a catch. He was covered most of the night by Jason Verrett, TCU's stand-out defensive back.

Texas Tech went up 10-0 in the first quarter, but both teams' second quarters were plagued with penalties and punts by both teams.

Mayfield found Kenny Williams in the flat along the near sideline on the Red Raiders' initial series, and he picked up some blocks and evaded at least one tackler to score a 50-yard touchdown. After the Red Raiders stalled at TCU's 22 on their third possession, Bustin kicked a 39-yard field goal to put Texas Tech up 10-0.

Romo, who was 36 of 49 for 263 yards with two touchdowns to Jason Witten and an interception. "I think in this type of game, you've got to protect the football. If we continue to do that, it will help us."

Romo has one of the best averages in the league in yards per pass attempt. He had one of the lowest of his career against the Giants, and his numbers weren't too far off his first full game with his rib injury two years ago. He had 255 passing yards and nursed the Cowboys to an 18-16 victory over Washington — all on field goals.

Coach Jason Garrett says the injury isn't taking away any throws Romo needs to make, even though it looked like a problem on his first try after halftime against the Giants.

He rolled out and severely underthrew Dez Bryant on a deep ball, although he did have pressure closing in.

"There was a guy up in his face and he couldn't really get into it," Garrett said.
