Assault charge upgraded to murder

Shooting victim dies Sunday at Lubbock University Medical Center

A Big Spring teenager who was allegedly shot by her boyfriend Thursday evening has died, officials said.

Abigail Valencia, 17, died early Saturday at University Medical Center in Lubbock, said Tony Everett, Big Spring

Police Department public information officer.

Dakota Aguiano, 19, who had been charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in Valencia's shooting, had his charges upgraded to murder this morning, Everett said. Anguiano remains in custody at the Howard

County Detention Center.

Valencia was airlifted to UMC following the shooting, which occurred shortly before 6:45 p.m. Thursday in east Big Spring.

Everett said police responded to the Scenic Mountain Medical Center emergency room in reference to a gun-

shot victim. Upon arrival, they found Valencia suffering from a single gunshot wound to the left side of her head.

Everett said Valencia had been brought to the emergency room by Anguiano, who said he and Valencia

SO investigating shooting death, no arrest made

SAND SPRINGS — Howard County Sheriff's deputies continue investigating a shooting Saturday morning which took the life of a 50-year-old man here.

Deputies, who have been interviewing witnesses, are waiting on autopsy results from the body of Bobby Reed, who was sent to Lubbock following the shooting.

Sheriff Stan Parker told KBYG News Sunday evening investigators "are still working up the case" and its details, and that once his office receives the preliminary autopsy results they will present the case to the district attorney.

Parker aid they hope to have information completed by early in the week. A check with Parker this morning by the *Herald* revealed nothing new in the case.

According to reports, at 2:30 a.m. Saturday, deputies were advised of an assault at 8705 Gillem Road in Sand Springs. When they arrived on the scene, investigators found that the 50-year-old Reed had died of a gunshot wound.

"At this time, investigators are working to determine the circumstances of this case," Parker said in a release soon after the incident. "Several witnesses are currently being interviewed."

No arrests have been made in the case.

Parked on your lawn? City's about to nix that

Keep off the grass. That's the message Big Spring City Council members want to give city residents — or, more specifically, their vehicles.

The council will consider redrafting the city ordinance concerning parking vehicles in the yard of residences when the group meets at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday at council chambers, 307 E. Fourth.

The city has long had an ordinance on the books designed to regulate or restrict people from parking their cars and trucks on lawns, but it has been unenforceable for the most part, city officials say.

Now, several members of the council, including Mayor

or Larry McLellan, want to put some teeth into the ordinance.

"I agree this has become an eyesore, and I would like us to do something about it," McLellan said at a recent council meeting.

Council members will discuss modifications to the ordinance with City Attorney Linda Sjogren during Tuesday's meeting, although no definite action will be taken yet.

Also Tuesday, council members will consider appointments to several city boards and committees.

Gas prices continue to fall, reports show

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 6.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.22 per gallon Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas.

This compares with the national average that has fallen 4.5 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.49/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com. Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 36.1 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 18.2

cents per gallon lower than a month ago.

The national average has decreased 7.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 32.1 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"Gasoline prices continue to move lower nationally as we've now officially moved into fall," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "Looking forward, we're likely to see additional relief at pumps in the months ahead, and it's quite possible that by the

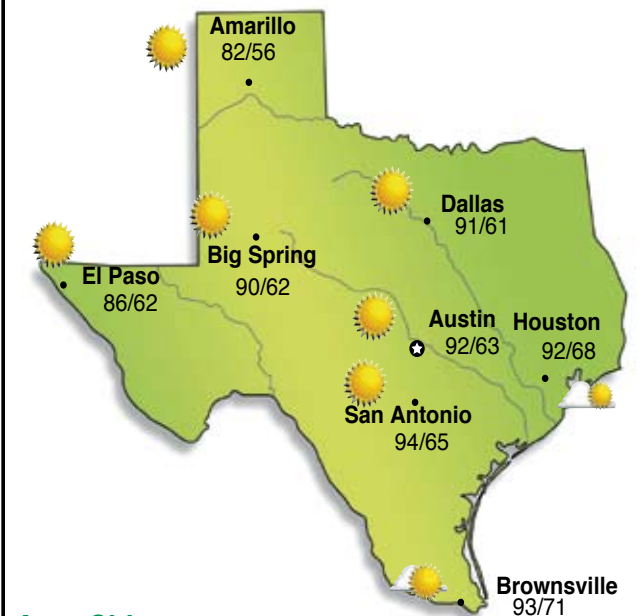

No injuries during fire at Austin group home

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Nobody has been hurt in a fire at a Central Texas group residence for the mentally challenged who may be homeless.

The Austin Fire Department says the blaze was reported around dawn Monday at Hannah's Place in North Austin. Officials say about 30 people in the structure were safely evacuated as the fire was put out.

Authorities are trying to determine what sparked the fire.

Hannah's Place, on its website, describes the site as a group home for disabled people who are mentally challenged and homeless.

Calls to the home weren't immediately answered Monday.

Coast Guard helps rescue 2 men in Galveston Bay

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — The Coast Guard has helped save two men from Galveston Bay after a large wave hit a fishing boat and one person was swept overboard.

Coast Guard personnel on Sunday afternoon rescued the man swept from the boat and a friend who grabbed life vests for himself and his buddy — then jumped in the water.

Petty Officer 1st Class David Sassner says the fishing boat operator tried to maneuver the vessel but broke his key in the ignition and stalled the engine.

A good Samaritan notified the Coast Guard, which responded by boat. Sassner says the two men were pulled from the water and the fishing boat was towed.

Nobody was hurt.

5 family members found dead at Texas home

RICE, Texas (AP) — Investigators say no suspects are being sought after two adults and three children were found dead in a North Texas home.

Navarro County Sheriff Elmer Tanner says a Spanish-speaking male called 911 Sunday night to report that several members of his family were dead at a home in Rice, 40 miles southeast of Dallas.

Deputies and emergency medical workers rushed to the scene.

No information has been provided on the identities of the dead or how they died. Tanner says investigations are focused on the inside of the residence and that no suspects are being sought.

The Navarro County Sheriff's Office planned a news conference for this morning.

Hundreds of people report seeing fireball in sky

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Hundreds of Texans are giving online accounts of seeing a massive bright ball of light streak across the nighttime sky.

The Austin American-Statesman reports people from the Dallas-Fort Worth area west to Abilene and south to Waco, Austin, San Antonio and Houston say they saw the white fireball at about 9 p.m. Saturday. Most people say they saw one, but a few say they saw a second smaller flash.

American Meteor Society scientist Robert Lunsford says it was likely a very bright meteor or fireball.

The society says thousands of meteors pass across the Earth's atmosphere daily, but most occur over uninhabited areas. Sometimes they occur during daylight hours.

In February 2012, people from Oklahoma City to Houston gave similar accounts of seeing a fireball streak across the sky.

San Antonio police name suspect in 2011 killing

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio police believe a woman's ex-boyfriend is responsible for her 2011 death.

The San Antonio Express-News reports police have named 40-year-old Rafael Hernandez as a suspect in the death of 38-year-old Maria Teresa Leon.

Leon's family had reported her missing in August 2011. Police found her body in the trunk of her Ford Thunderbird four days later. They say she was stabbed to death.

Leon left a bar with Hernandez, and told a friend it was better to go with him to "avoid problems." Hours after her body was found, police issued a news release asking for help finding Hernandez, but didn't label him a suspect.

Police officially named him a suspect on Friday. Crime Stoppers is offering a reward of \$5,000 for information leading to his arrest.

Fisherman's body recovered from North Texas lake

DALLAS (AP) — A fisherman's body has been recovered from a North Texas lake a day after he went missing.

Cooke County Game Warden Darla Barr tells The Dallas Morning News that rescue efforts began Saturday afternoon after an emergency call about a boat on Lake Ray Roberts without an operator.

Lewisville Fire Department divers found the body of the 29-year-old from Pottsboro on Sunday morning. Barr says the body was found about a half mile west of Wolf Island.

The Tarrant County Medical Examiner's Office is investigating the cause of death and has not released the man's name.

Lake Ray Roberts is located northeast of Denton.

Texas races to transmit wind energy from Panhandle

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A \$1.6 billion transmission system designed to bring Panhandle wind energy to power-hungry Central Texas may not be large enough to export all the electricity generated by the turbines.

The Energy Reliability Council of Texas is now looking at options for transmitting more wind energy as it reviews several projects in the pipelines, the Amarillo Globe-News reported.

The problem has arisen because while the large transmission system is nearly complete, it does not have the capacity to handle the full amount of energy that could be generated in the coming years — electricity that is greatly needed as Texas' population booms, especially in the northern and central areas of the state.

ERCOT is reviewing new wind farms that would



be capable of producing more than 11,000 megawatts of electricity, for which about 3,500 megawatts is meant to provide energy to Fort Worth, Austin and San Antonio. But the nearly completed transmission system can only handle about 2,500 megawatts.

"We expect we'll have sufficient capacity through about 2015," ERCOT spokeswoman Robbie Searcy told the newspaper.

Power providers and oversight agencies are studying where additional transmission facilities and lines could be built, considering systems that would be able to handle between 5,000 megawatts and 7,500 megawatts of additional electricity.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas website states the process across West Texas started in 2008 with an estimated 2,900 miles of transmission line at a cost of \$4.93 billion. The commission now estimates a need for 3,595 miles of transmission line costing nearly \$7 billion.

The move to generate and transmit wind energy from West Texas to other parts of the vast state comes as coal-generated power facilities, the traditional major supplier of electricity, have come under fire from new federal environmental regulations and cheap natural gas.

Houston mom charged for not treating ill daughter

HOUSTON (AP) — A Houston mother has been arrested after she failed to seek medical treatment for her 14-year-old daughter who was ill with lupus.

The Houston Chronicle reports 46-year-old Tina Renae Carr was arrested Friday in connection with the April incident.

At that time, rescue workers forced their way into the apartment after the mother barricaded the door with a refrigerator and refused to open it to police and paramedics. They found the teenager suffering from malnutrition and dizziness, and believed her body was covered with cigarette burns.

The teen was treated at a Houston hospital and diagnosed with lupus cerebritis, a brain inflammation associated with an auto-immune disorder.

Weeks earlier a doctor advised Carr to take the girl to the hospital but she refused.

were walking in the area of Circle Drive and Sycamore Street when a black Cadillac Escalade came around the corner and fired on the couple, wounding Valencia. Anguiano added a friend drove by and let him

take his vehicle to transport Valencia to the hospital.

"Patrol officers attempted to find the crime scene," Everett said. "As investigators talked to witnesses, Anguiano's story began to unravel."

It was later determined, Everett said, that the shooting occurred

at 1317 Tucson. At that point, Anguiano was arrested on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

"The weapon was not at the scene, but the investigation led to a subject who had removed the weapon from the scene and hidden it at another home on Tucson Street," Everett said.

The weapon, a .45 caliber handgun, was recovered and the subject, 19-year-old David Westbrook, was arrested on a charge of tampering with evidence.

Valencia's 2-year-old daughter, who police believe was in the room at the time of her mother's

shooting, was uninjured and has been placed with her mother's family.

Obama memorializes Navy Yard victims by calling for transformation in firearms laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama memorialized the victims of the Washington Navy Yard shooting as patriots but also individuals — one with a talent for fixing cars, another who coached softball and yet another who loved hockey and her cats.

It's not enough to cry over their deaths, Obama said.

"If we really want to honor these 12 men and women, if we really want to be a country where we can go to work and go to school and walk our streets free from senseless violence without so many lives being stolen by a bullet from a gun, then we're going to have to change," the president said.

Speaking Sunday at the city's Marine Barracks, just blocks away from where the shootings happened a week ago Monday, Obama called on Americans not to give up on trying to change gun laws that he argued are to blame for an epidemic of violence.

Gun control measures Obama had backed failed to pass earlier this year and showed no new momentum in the days following the rampage at the Navy Yard, a military installation just blocks from the Capitol.

Kenya mall crisis: Hostages not yet released, despite earlier reports 'most' were rescued

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Hostages being held by al-Qaida-linked terrorists in a Nairobi mall have not been released despite an earlier statement from the military that "most" had been rescued, a person connected to the situation told The Associated Press on Monday.

Military helicopters circled over the mall at day-

break, when about five minutes of sustained gunfire broke out inside the Westgate mall, a clear indication that at least one of the estimated 10 to 15 gunmen who attacked the mall when it was filled with shoppers Saturday was still on the loose. More gunfire rang out later, much as it did throughout the day on Sunday. A military ambulance then sped away from the scene.

Late on Sunday a military spokesman said that "most" of the hostages had been released. But a person with knowledge of the rescue operation told AP that no hostages had been released or rescued overnight. The person insisted on anonymity in order to talk about the rescue response.

Another indication no hostages had been freed: None appeared at the Oshwal Centre, a squat concrete structure that houses a Hindu temple just next to the mall that the Red Cross is using as a triage center. Medical workers attended to at least two wounded Kenyan soldiers there on Monday.

From Somalia, spokesman Sheik Ali Mohamud Rage for al-Shabab — the militant group that claimed responsibility for the attack — said in an audio file posted on a website that the hostage takers had been ordered to "take punitive action against the hostages" if force was used to try to rescue them.

Obama opens U.N. meetings with diplomatic opportunities on Iran, Syria, Mideast peace

NEW YORK (AP) — President Barack Obama opens meetings at the United Nations with diplomatic opportunities on three vexing issues: Iran's disputed nuclear program, Syria's chemical weapons use, and elusive peace between Israel and the Palestinians.

All three pathways are fraught with potential pitfalls and hinge on cooperation from often unreliable nations. Obama also risks being branded as naive and misguided if the efforts fail, particularly in Syria, where he's used the prospect of diplomacy to put off a military strike in retaliation for a chemical weapons attack.

Still, the recent developments mark a significant shift on a trio of issues that have long proved problematic for Obama at the United Nations. His former Iranian counterpart used the annual U.N. General Assembly meetings, which open Monday, as a venue for fiery, anti-American speeches. Failed Middle East peace talks led the Palestinians to seek statehood recognition at the U.N. despite staunch American objections. And the Obama administration has been stymied on Syria at the U.N. Security Council due to intractable Russian opposition.

But this year, Iran has a new leader who is making friendly overtures toward Obama, raising the prospect of a meeting at the United Nations. U.S.-brokered peace talks between the Israelis and Palestinians have resumed — though on an uncertain course. And Russia has joined with the U.S. on a diplomatic deal to strip Syria of its chemical weapons.

Joel Rubin, a former State Department official who now works at the nonproliferation organiza-

tion Ploughshares, said the confluence of events underscores an often frustrating aspect of diplomacy.

Angry Pakistani Christians protest church attack as death toll rises overnight to 81

PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — Angry Pakistani Christians on Monday denounced the deadliest attack ever in this country against members of their faith as the death toll from the church bombings climbed overnight to 81.

A pair of suicide bombers blew themselves up amid hundreds of worshippers outside a historic church in northwestern Pakistan.

The attack on the All Saints Church in the city of Peshawar, which also wounded over 140 people, occurred as worshippers were leaving after services to get a free meal of rice offered on the front lawn.

A wing of the Pakistani Taliban quickly claimed responsibility for the bombing, saying they would continue to target non-Muslims until the U.S. stops drone attacks in the remote tribal region of Pakistan.

The bombings also raised new questions about the Pakistani government's push to strike a peace deal with the militants to end a decade-long insurgency that has killed thousands of people.

After election victory, Merkel to start talks for new German government

BERLIN (AP) — Chancellor Angela Merkel won a stunning victory in Germany's elections, but she still faces the delicate work of forming a coalition government. She and top party officials were meeting Monday to talk strategy about reaching out to the center-left rivals they need to form a government.

Merkel's Union bloc scored its best result in 23 years Sunday to put her on course for a third term, winning 41.5 percent of the vote and finishing only five seats short of an absolute majority in the lower house. However, Merkel's coalition partner crashed out of Parliament.

Merkel looks likely to end up leading either a "grand coalition" government with the center-left Social Democrats of defeated challenger Peer Steinbrueck — reviving the alliance that ran Germany in her first term — or, less likely, with the environmentalist Greens.

"We have two possibilities: the Social Democrats or the Greens," Volker Kauder, the leader of her party's parliamentary group, told ARD public Television. "We will determine in our committees how the talks should go."

"We will provide our country with a strong government," Kauder added before heading into the talks.

Long, strange trip ending for iconic Volkswagen hippie van as production to halt in Brazil


SAO PAULO (AP) — It carried hippies through the 1960s, hauled surfers in search of killer waves during endless summers and serves as a workhorse across the developing world, but the long, strange trip of the Volkswagen van is ending.

Brazil is the last place in the world still producing the iconic vehicle, or "bus" as it's known by aficionados, but VW says production will end Dec. 31. Safety regulations mandate that every vehicle in Brazil must have air bags and anti-lock braking systems starting in 2014, and the company says it cannot change production to meet the law.

Although output will halt in Brazil, there should be plenty of VW vans rolling along for decades if only because there are so many, and they are so durable. VW produced more than 10 million Volkswagen Transporter vans globally since the model was introduced 63 years ago in Germany, though not all resemble the classic hippie machine. More than 1.5 million have been produced in Brazil since 1957.

The VW van is so deeply embedded in popular culture, it will likely live on even longer in the imagination.

"The van represents freedom," said Damon Ristad, the Missoula, Montana, director of the documentary "The Bus," which follows van fanatics,

This deal occurred in an invitational pair tournament in the Netherlands in 1990. The winners were Enri Leufkens and Berry Westra of the Netherlands, who outdistanced a strong multinational field comprising 16 pairs of the world's best players.

When Westra-Leufkens held the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. A panel of expert commentators, watching on Vu-Graph, predicted that four hearts would go down one after West led the nine of clubs, since declarer seemed certain to lose a club, a spade and two diamonds.

But Leufkens demonstrated that they were sorely mistaken. He took East's jack of clubs with the ace and immediately returned the club ten. East won with the king and shifted to the A-J of diamonds, allowing the defenders to score their two diamond tricks before South could discard a diamond on the queen of clubs. In the process, however, dummy's 10-9 of diamonds became established.

After taking the diamond king, West shifted to a spade, East's queen losing to the ace. Leufkens now avoided the trap of playing the A-K of trumps and then trying to get rid of his two remaining spades on two of dummy's winners.

Instead, he crossed to the heart ace, cashed the club queen, pitching a spade, and led the diamond ten. East was helpless. If he discarded, Leufkens would discard his last spade, so East ruffed and declarer overruffed. Leufkens then returned to dummy with the heart king — simultaneously drawing the last two opposing trumps — and disposed of his last spade on the diamond nine.

Thus, the "unmakable" contract came home, leaving the red-faced panel to partake of a generous portion of humble pie.

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Cowboys rout Rams 31-7

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — DeMarco Murray strolled around left end for 14 yards on his first carry. There wasn't a St. Louis defender near him until the end of a much longer run a few plays later.

The Rams almost looked like they didn't remember what the Dallas running back did to them in their last meeting.

Murray rushed for 175 yards and a touchdown two years after setting a franchise record against St. Louis as a rookie, and Tony Romo threw for three scores in a 31-7 victory Sunday.

The third-year back had 96 yards rushing to 18 for the entire the St. Louis defense at halftime. His 41-yard run two plays into the third quarter gave him his first 100-yard game in more than a year and set up a touchdown for a 24-0 lead.

Murray probably could have threatened the 253 yards he set against the Rams in 2011, but he was soaking up cheers from the crowd when the huge video showed him relaxing on the sideline in the fourth quarter.

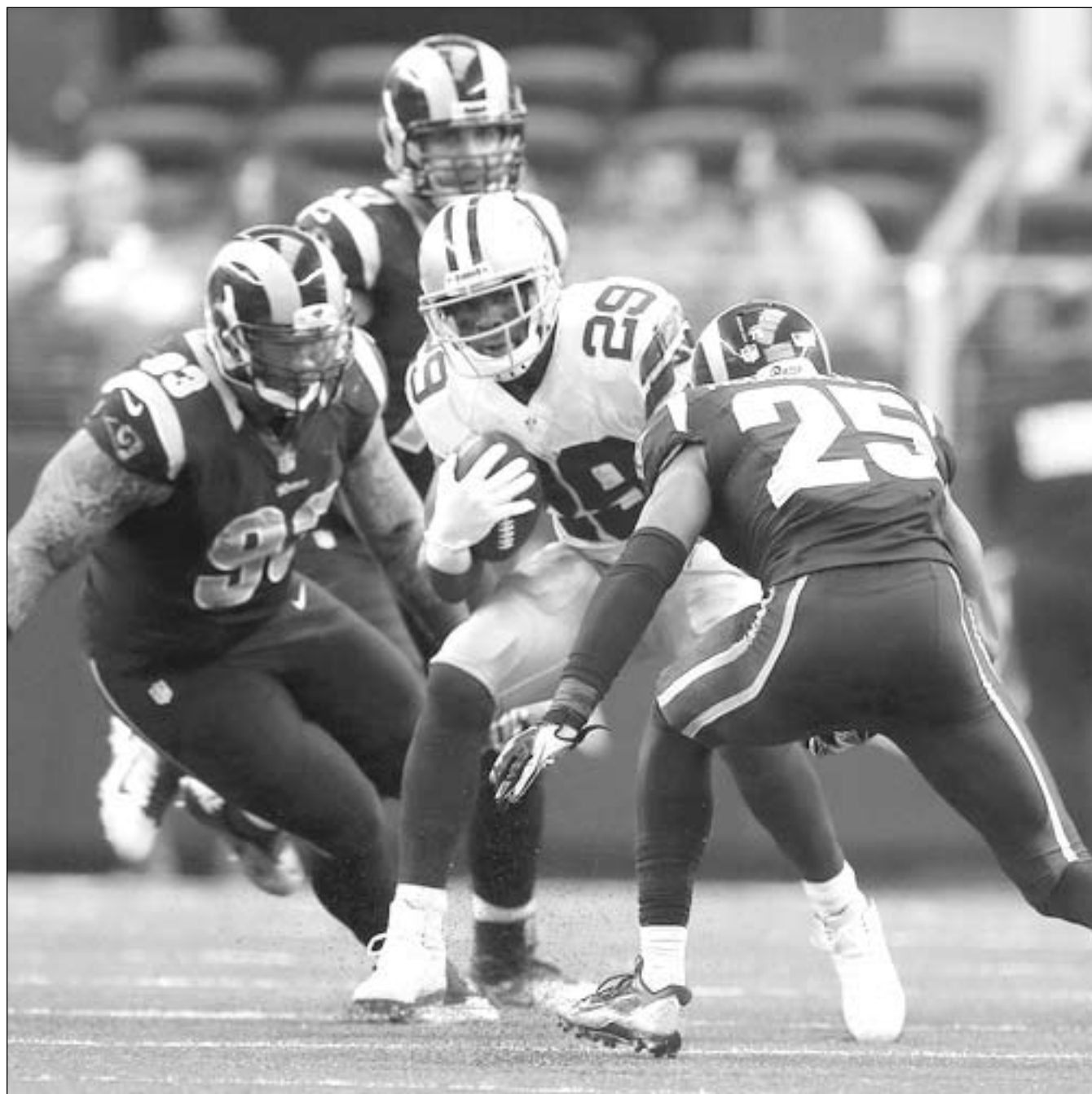
"When you get a runner like that going, you can feed on him," Cowboys coach Jason Garrett said. "He gets a little contagious for everybody. Everybody starts feeling it."

Sam Bradford, was Murray's old college teammate at Oklahoma, was only feeling pressure.

The Cowboys (2-1) sacked him four times in the first half and had six in total after St. Louis (1-2) hadn't allowed a sack in four games dating to last season. It was the longest streak for the Rams since John Hadl was under center for a division champion in 1973.

DeMarcus Ware had two sacks and broke Harvey Martin's 30-year-old franchise record of 114. Then-coach Bill Parcells and owner Jerry Jones used to have fun throwing around bets how many sacks 2005 first-round pick Ware would get.

"I think of it every time I think of his number of sacks," Jones said. "I can't say that it is unexpected because of how hard he works, and his talent

Tannehill leads Miami past Falcons, to 3-0

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) — The stadium shook with a roar as Ryan Tannehill skipped across the field pumping his arms in glee, the Miami Dolphins' comeback complete.

Tannehill was celebrating his 1-yard touchdown pass with 38 seconds left to rookie Dion Sims, who made a one-handed catch to help the unbeaten Dolphins rally past the Atlanta Falcons 27-23.

The score capped a 13-play, 75-yard drive after Atlanta's Matt Bryant missed a 35-yard field goal attempt with 4:46 left. Jimmy Wilson intercepted Matt Ryan in Falcons territory to seal the victory.

"We have a special team, a team with a lot of talent," receiver Brian Hartline said. "We're going to continue to improve. The sky's the limit."

Miami fell behind 10-0 and 20-10 and trailed much of the game, but nonetheless improved to 3-0 for the first time since 2002. The injury-plagued Falcons, who were one play from the Super Bowl last season, fell to 1-2.

An enthusiastic crowd of 70,660 reflected the buzz building about the surprising Dolphins, who are trying to end a streak of four consecutive losing seasons.

"We've got a damned good football team," owner Stephen Ross said. "The quarterback is maturing."

The last-minute comeback victory was the first for Miami's second-year QB. Tannehill finished 24 for 35 for

236 yards and two scores. He shook off two turnovers and five sacks, and was at his best at the end of his half.

On the final drive, Tannehill threw 8 for 11 for 69 yards, with two of the incompletions because of dropped passes. The winner came on second down, when Tannehill lobbed his throw over linebacker Stephen Nicholas to Sims, a backup tight end.

Tannehill's first NFL touchdown by pulling the ball in with his left hand because his right arm was tangled up with Nicholas.

"It was awesome. It was amazing," Sims said. "The defender grabbed one hand, so I had no choice but to use the other one."

Tannehill suggested the play to his coaches during a timeout just before-hand.

"It's a play we know very well," he said. "It's either going to be a touchdown or a throwaway. We had a lot of confidence in that play."

Tannehill's other pass was an 18-yarder to Hartline to make it 20-20 late in the third quarter. Tannehill also moved Miami 60 yards in the final 2:04 of the first half for a field goal on the final play.

The victory allowed Miami to keep pace with New England atop the AFC East.

"It was a good step forward," Hartline said. "Expectations will

The New York Yankees retired Rivera's No. 42 Sunday, and the great reliever honored Jackie Robinson during a ceremony in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park.

Robinson's No. 42 was retired throughout the major leagues in 1997 on the 50th anniversary of the day the Brooklyn Dodgers second

baseman broke baseball's color barrier. Players wearing 42 at the time were grandfathered.

"It is a great pleasure and honor for me to be the last player to ever wear number 42," Rivera said during the ceremonies before the last regular-season day home game of his 19-season career.

As Rivera stood nearby, Robinson's wife Rachel unveiled a plaque dedicated to Jackie.

Rangers blow Ogando's stellar start

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Alexi Ogando gave the Texas Rangers more than they could have anticipated on Sunday.

The Rangers' offense couldn't support Ogando with any runs.

Justin Maxwell hit a grand slam with two outs in the 10th inning and the Kansas City Royals beat the Rangers 4-0 Sunday in a matchup of AL wild-card contenders.

Ogando had kept it scoreless by pitching seven in-

nings of two-hit ball, striking out five and walking one in a duel with Royals ace James Shields.

"Him and Ogando were locked up, zero zero," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "We put ourselves in positions to get some runs off Shields, but just didn't deliver. For seven innings, Ogando was good and we got through the eighth and ninth."

Shields gave up six hits in

eight innings, walking one and striking out two.

"He was making his pitches the way he wanted, hitting his spots," Alex Rios said. "It was the best I've seen him."

Ogando, who had three stints on the disabled list this season, excelled in just his eighth start since May 15. He left after 77 pitches.

"It doesn't matter who I'm facing. I'm competing with the batters," Ogando said through an interpreter.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, Sept. 23, the 266th day of 2013. There are 99 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 23, 1952, Sen. Richard M. Nixon, R-Calif., salvaged his vice-presidential nomination by appearing live on television to refute allegations of improper campaign fundraising. (The address became known as the "Checkers" speech because of Nixon's on-air reference to the family pet, a dog named Checkers.)

On this date:

In 63 B.C., Caesar Augustus, the first Roman emperor, was born.

In 1779, during the Revolutionary War, the American warship Bon Homme Richard, commanded by John Paul Jones, defeated the HMS Serapis in battle.

In 1780, British spy John Andre was captured along with papers revealing Benedict Arnold's plot to surrender West Point to the British.

In 1806, the Lewis and Clark expedition returned to St. Louis more than two years after setting out for the Pacific Northwest.

In 1846, Neptune was identified as a planet by German astronomer Johann Gottfried Galle (GAH'juh).

In 1908, an apparent baserunning error by Fred Merkle of the New York Giants cost his team a victory against the Chicago Cubs and left the game tied 1-1. The Cubs won a rematch and with it, the National League pennant.

In 1912, Mack Sennett's first Keystone short subject, a "split-reel" of two comedies both starring Mabel Normand and Ford Sterling ("Cohen Collects a Debt" and "The Water Nymph"), was released. Houston's William Marsh Rice Institute, later renamed Rice University, opened for classes on the 12th anniversary of Rice's death.

In 1949, President Harry S. Truman announced there was evidence the Soviet Union had recently conducted a nuclear test explosion. The test had been carried out on Aug. 29, 1949.

In 1957, nine black students who'd entered Little Rock Central High School in Arkansas were forced to withdraw because of a white mob outside.

In 1962, "The Jetsons," an animated cartoon series about a Space Age family, premiered as the ABC television network's first color program.

In 1973, former Argentine president Juan Peron won a landslide election victory that returned him to power; his wife, Isabel, was elected vice president.

Today's Birthdays: Actor Mickey Rooney is 93. Singer Julio Iglesias is 70. Actor Paul Petersen ("The Donna Reed Show") is 68.

down.

"That was the biggest play of the game," Miami receiver Mike Wallace said.

The Dolphins lost defensive end Cameron Wake (knee) and linebacker Koa Misi (shoulder) to injuries, but the defense dug in after a slow start. Consecutive possessions by Atlanta in the second half netted a total of 10 yards, which allowed the Dolphins to rally.

"Guys had to step up," said first-round draft pick Dion Jordan, who came off the bench to see his most extensive action of the season. "We stuck together and it came up big."

The Falcons scored on their first three series, and at one point the Dolphins trailed in total yards by 127-3. Atlanta had the ball for nearly 23 minutes in the first half but was up only 13-10 at halftime.

Kenseth wins 2nd chase race at New Hampshire

LOUDON, N.H. (AP) — Matt Kenseth just might win a championship with a touch of dominance, not dullness.

Kenseth has firmly defended the style of his 2003 championship, stating his one-win season in the final year before NASCAR made the move to the playoff-style Chase format was as meaningful as all the titles collected by Jimmie Johnson or Tony Stewart.

He probably won't have to justify anything about his Cup run this season. There are plenty of checkered flags.

Kenseth made it 2 for 2 in the Chase, holding off Joe Gibbs Racing teammate Kyle Busch to win Sunday at New Hampshire Motor Speedway.

He followed his win in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship opener at Chicagoland with his series-high seventh victory of the season. Kenseth made his 500th career start and built a 14-point lead over Busch before the series shifts to Dover.

One win or seven, Kenseth will take a title any way he can.

"If you're fortunate enough to win a championship, or another championship, I don't think there's a bad way to win it," he said. "I know it still gets brought up because it was the last year without the Chase and we won once race. But I was real proud of what we did that year. It was tough to accomplish."

Kenseth was paired with owner Jack Roush for more than a decade and won 22 races, a pair of Daytona 500s and the 2003 championship. He's having a career year in his first season at JGR, obliterating his

previous season best for wins — 5 in 2002.

"I don't feel like I'm necessarily a better driver than what I was last year," he said. "Certainly, things are different."

Just a little bit. His gamble to change teams has been a success, and Kenseth's eyes glistened as tears rolled down his cheeks in Victory Lane. He reached for a big white towel to wipe them away.

Neither side could have expected this kind of run.

"We've known Matt for a long time but, in all reality, we wouldn't have guessed seven wins," team President J.D. Gibbs said.

Kenseth was anxious heading into New Hampshire because it had long been one of his worst tracks. He might have calmed down had he checked this season's results from some of the other tracks where he traditionally struggled: Four of his seven wins in 2013 are at tracks where he was winless.

Kenseth and Busch made it a 1-2 finish for Joe Gibbs Racing and helped the organization win for the fifth time in the last seven races dating to Busch's win at Watkins Glen in August. Kenseth won at Bristol, Busch took Atlanta and Kenseth won the last two.

Kenseth joins Greg Biffle (2008) and Tony Stewart (2011) as the only drivers to win the first two Chase races. Stewart went on to win the title.

Kenseth moves on in the No. 20 Toyota to Dover, where he's a two-time winner. He led 29 laps there earlier this year before an engine failure ended his day.

"For me to win at

Loudon, it's more than a stretch, more than a dream," Kenseth said. "This is probably one of my worst places. This just shows you how good this team is."

Chase drivers filled six of the top 10 spots. Biffle was third and Johnson fourth. Dale Earnhardt Jr. was sixth and Carl Edwards ninth. Jamie McMurray was the highest non-Chase finisher in fifth place.

JGR, with Busch, in the past has dominated the regular season, but dropped off considerably once the Chase began. Now they've carried their success into the Chase and are a credible 1-2 threat to give Toyota its first Sprint Cup title.

Busch is nipping at Kenseth and said the 20 "lucked into one" last weekend. He blamed a poor restart for losing at New Hampshire.

"That's good that we're both up there like that," Busch said. "We're pushing each other hard and we're pushing the competition, too."

While NASCAR has been smacked with scandal, Kenseth has quietly gone under the radar doing what he does best: winning races. He has 31 wins in 500 starts.

He joined Richard Petty as the only NASCAR driver to win in his 500th career start. It was easy to spot Kenseth's No. 20 Toyota — and not just because it was the only car in Victory Lane. JGR slapped an oversized "500th Start" logo on the front of the hood.

Chase drivers took spots 13-17: Kurt Busch, Joey Logano, Jeff Gordon, Ryan Newman and Clint Bowyer. Kevin Harvick was 20th.
