Howard County residents purchasing a vehicle in Texas must now show a proper form of identification to obtain a title and registration.

"We want to process your

registration and title application as quickly and efficiently as possible, said Howard County Tax Assessor-Collector Diane Carter. "So it's very important to know the new rules before heading to our office or your auto dealer."

If you are buying from a apply for the title, dealer, provide the dealer with identification. If you are buying a car from an individual, bring identification and all other required applications forms and fees with you to the county tax office to





Vehicles will be titled in your legal name as it appears on the identification. If your name has changed, you need to have your ID corrected before the purchase, Carter said. Another new state law

requires farmers and ranchers to show their state comptroller-issued Texas Agricultural or Timber Exemption Registration number before obtaining farm license plates and/or temporary excess wight permits from the tax office.

"The law will help ensure no one can infringe on the privileges extended to our qualified farmers and ranchers who deserve them," Carter said. "Unfortunately, as the state has grown, so have the number of reports of people abusing the farm plate and permit privilege."

Vehicles that do not qualify for farm plates include regular passenger vehicles, those used for gainful employment or hire, vehicles owned by farm cooperatives and ones used to transport livestock for nonretail purposes.

Here are the different types of farm plates and how they may be used:

• Farm truck/farm truck tractor plates You may use these plates to transport your own poultry, dairy, livestock, livestock products, timber in its natural state and farm products to market or to other points for sale or processing. Additionally, you can transport laborers from their place of residence to your

materials, tools, equipment and supplies from the place of purchase or storage to your farm or ranch. The vehicle can also be used to allow you to participate in equine activities or attend live-

stock shows.

• Farm trailer/semitrailer plates — You can haul seasonal harvests or livestock from the place of production to the place of process or storage and transport farm equipment to your

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

Dear Dr. Politics: I keep hearing that Ted Cruz, a Republican senator from Texas, may run for president in 2016. I also hear he was born in Canada and is a Canadian citizen. Doesn't the Constitution demand that a president be a "natural born Citizen" of the United States? So how could Cruz run? Answer: Ted Cruz's birth cer-

tificate, which was released to The Dallas Morning News at its request in August, shows three important things: First, Rafael Edward Cruz (now called Ted) was born Dec.

22, 1970, in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. Second, his father, Rafael Bienvenido Cruz, was born in

Matanzas, Cuba.

Third, and this is very important, his mother, Eleanor Elizabeth Wilson, was born in Wilmington. Del.

At birth, Cruz became a citizen of Canada because he was born there, but he also became a "natural born" citizen of the United States, in the view of many legal experts, because his mother was a U.S. citizen. According to the newspaper, Cruz's father came to the United States from Cuba in 1957 and remained a Cuban citizen until he became a naturalized U.S. citizen in 2005. (He was working in Canada as a "geophysical consultant" at the time of Ted's birth.)

The family returned to the United States when Ted was 4. Catherine Frazier, Cruz's Senate press secretary, told the Dallas paper that Cruz's mother registered his birth with the U.S. Consulate and that Cruz got a U.S. passport without a problem in 1986 to make a high-school trip to England. "To our knowledge, he never had Canadian citizenship," Frazier said.

The Dallas Morning News found a number of experts on Canadian and immigration law, however, who said Cruz definitely had dual citizenship with Canada. After the story appeared, Cruz issued a statement saying that he would renounce his Canadian citizenship if he "technically" ever had it. "Nothing against Canada," he said, "but I'm an American by birth and as a U.S. senator, I believe I should be only an American."

Cruz also said: "Given the raft of stories today about my birth certificate, it must be a slow news day."

Yeah, well, Barack Obama had a birth certificate proving he was born in the United States. but the "birther" wackos still tried to claim he was born in Kenya, making him ineligible to be president. Except it wouldn't have made him ineligible.

Using the legal argument that now helps Cruz, Obama would have been a "natural born" citizen of the United States even if he had been born in Kenya, because his mother was a U.S. citizen. (In anv case, Obama was born in Honolulu.)

So, in the opinion of Dr. Politics, Cruz is a "natural born" U.S. citizen and could legally become president of the United States.

BOSTON (AP) — Nearly a decade ago, the Boston Red Sox reversed The Curse.

Now they're even getting key calls turned around in the World Series, leaving them on the verge of an opening Fenway Park sweep for the third time in 10 sea-

And not even a need for instant replay. The umpires overturned this blown call on their

After Dustin Pedroia was called out on a phantom force play in the first inning of Wednesday night's World Series opener, second base umpire Dana DeMuth was overruled by the other five members of his crew.

Three pitches later, Mike Napoli lined a cutter to the gap in left-center field for a go-ahead, three-run double, and the Red Sox coasted to an 8-1 rout of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Jon Lester made the early lead stand up, allowing five hits in 7 2-3 scoreless innings with eight strikeouts and a walk. David Ortiz hit a two-run homer for the Red Sox after Carlos Beltran robbed him of a grand slam on a secondinning catch that sent the star right fielder to a hospital with bruised

Boston won its ninth straight Series game,

while St. Louis made three errors for just the second time this year, two by shortstop Pete Kozma and one by third baseman David Freese. A pair of Gold Glovers, pitcher Adam Wainwright and catcher Yadier Molina, allowed a popup to drop between

"We had a wakeup call. That is not the kind of team that we've been all season," Cardinals manager Mike Matheny said. "And they're frustrated. I'm sure embarrassed to a point."

Game 2 is Thursday night, with 22-year-old rookie sensation Michael Wacha starting for St. Louis against John Lackey. Wacha is 3-0 with a 0.43 ERA this postseason.

The only three Americans in the 78-man field were easy to find Thursday in the BMW Mas-

Just look at the top of the leaderboard.

Luke Guthrie packed a 2-liter bottle of Mountain Dew and flew halfway around the world for one week, hopeful he would at least broaden his experience by playing golf on foreign soil. He got more than he expected. The 23-yearold American took 19 putts — one short of the European Tour record chipped in twice and

had a 7-under 65. Not only did Guthrie have a three-shot lead, his score was more than 9.67 shots better than the course average.

"It was one of the better rounds I've ever played," Guthrie said.

Uihlein ended it with an exquisite flop shot from behind the 18th green in which he let the wind hold it up in the air, and used the slope to bring it back to tap-in range.



LONDON(AP) — The Lions and Miami Dolphins will travel to London next year to take part in the NFL International Series.


The NFL had announced earlier this month that it would play three games at Wembley Stadium in 2014, with the Jaguars, Falcons and Raiders as the designated home teams.

Dates have not yet been announced.

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

# Undaunted Bulldogs to take on Crane

COAHOMA — It's been a long year for the Bulldogs. Barring a huge reversal of fortune at some point during Friday's game against 7-0 Crane, the season may seem to get even longer.

But there's a tinge of optimism in Coahoma Head Coach Trey Gardner's voice this week, which may or may not belong. The Bulldogs, he explained, are playing better than their 1-6 record shows.

"I'm aware we're not anybody's favorite," Gardner said of his odds at toppling the Cranes. "But we're trying to get the guys in the mindset that we've got a shot a beating

Gardner hasn't lost all sense of reality. He raises legitimate points. Last week, Coahoma played Sonora — a similar team with a similar defensive line and accrued 379 yards of offense.

Quarterback Braxton Iden connected with receivers when needed, but under center, he and the Bulldog backfield created a slew of problems for even the staunch Broncos.

"Not to take anything away from Crane — they're a good team but we don't think it's a bigger hill to climb than the one we had in front of us last week," Gardner said. "Obviously, we have to play

better defense, but we turned the ball over twice in the red zone and had a touchdown called back. Theoretically, we could have gone into the

half with a 28-21 score. I'm not saying that means we would have won it, but it could have been a lot closer. We feel that with the exception of Denver

City, we have played with everybody we have gone up against."

A win may be a win and a loss may be a loss, but if you look at the statistics, Coahoma has rivaled or surpassed its opponents total yardage in four games. The surprising effectiveness of the Gardner's offensive line, the steady leadership of Iden and the explosiveness out of the backfield have all been silver linings in what Gardner expected to be a tumultuous year of rebuilding.

At this point, the playoffs are a fading possibility for the Bulldogs. Though they aren't eliminated from postseason contention just yet, Gardner admits his team is playing mostly for pride and to gain valuable experience for next season, which looks promising with a roster filled with underclassmen.

"There's still some scenarios where we could put us in the playoffs," he said. "There's also a point where teams get into a comfort zone. We're approaching that. We may not have much to play for soon. But there's really no need for us to be nervous. We have nothing to lose. Our opponents are the ones with something to lose. Last week, we were three mistakes away from scoring at least 21 more points. It was a closer game than the score indicated. Crane's defense is just as big, but maybe not as athletic as Sonora's. Our backs are small, but they run hard. If we can run it as well as we did last week, there's a possibility there. But we have to play better defense. We have to run the ball well and finish."

For the past few years, Crane has used a spread offense with a reliance on the passing game to move the chains. Gardner said this season, it has reverted back to the running game on the strength of its backs.

"They were a bona fide spread team," Gardner added. "Now, they'll be under center as much as they are in the gun. It will probably be 50/50. When we get the ball, we have to keep it for a while and finish our drives."

Adding a potential offensive boost will be the return of sophomore Kyler Franks, who has the ability to bolster the improved Coahoma backfield, which has been anchored by Iden, Paul Cortez, Christian Van Wey and Kody Barber.

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

lost to Snyder, so it's door-die for them. They will give us their best. We will have to play like we did last week if we're going to win in their stadium."

Your decision is crucial. If you play the ten from force of habit, consistent with the traditional principles of sound defense, it costs you the contract. South wins with the king, takes a club finesse and finishes with

Observe, however, that if you win the opening diamond lead with the ace and shift to the ten of spades, the contract fails regardless of what declarer does from this point on. Eventually he loses three spades, a diamond and a club, and goes down

It should not surprise you that if you let South win the first diamond with the king, he will make the contract. While it can't be denied that putting up the diamond ace allows South to score three diamond tricks instead of one, those three tricks do not give him the nine he needs to make the contract. You should feel much more concerned with finding a play that defeats the contract than with finding a play that stops declarer from making three diamond

To that end, you should launch an attack on spades - your only real hope — before declarer can launch his own attack on clubs. If you do, you wind up with a modest plus instead of a substantial minus.

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
