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# Gasoline prices in Lone Star State increase a head-scratching 4.2 cents

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 4.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.96/g Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas.

This compares with the national average that has increased 1.6 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.21/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the

p a s t week, prices Sunday were 17.7 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 14.3 cents per gallon lower than a month ago.

The national average has decreased 16.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 22.5 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago. "Surprisingly, the decreases we've seen in the national average have all but dried up," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan.

"I admit, it's a bit of a head scratcher to have seen wholesale gasoline prices perk up last week, and it's a bit premature to say we've seen the end of decreases in gas prices for the time being, so I'm hopeful that an uptick in the national average is merely temporary, but then again, this year has featured trends in prices that have all been earlier than expected," DeHaan said. which will decorate the dam at Comanche Trail Lake.

"(Former Big Spring Mayor) Russ McEwen asked me one time if we could do something like that," Simmons recalled. "A lot of visitors who come through here on Thanksgiving won't be here for Christmas, so it is for those people."

The week after Thanksgiving, festival workers will begin setting up displays on Dec. 2. The festival will feature more than 1 million lights and hundreds of displays, turning a large section of the park into a West Texas style Christmas wonderland.

More than 20,000 visitors are expected during the event, which last year attracted people from 38 states and 17 foreign countries.

"I'm hoping for 25,000 people this year," Simmons said. "We've come close a couple of times, but we've never quite reached that number, and I'd like to see that happen."

The festival has always been a treat for the eyes, but Simmons hopes to make it a joy for the ears this year, as well — she is organizing

In addition, Tricia co-chaired the MS Walk in Big Spring for two years and went to Austin to speak to the legislators regarding longterm health care. She was very proactive in bringing light to MS. More important than that, however, was Tricia's ability to bring light to the precious things in life. For her, the most precious things in her life were her five nieces and nephews: Katie, Macy, Matthew, Tyler, and Meagan. She adored them, had many hilarious adventures with them, called them by affectionate nicknames, and considered them her own. Tricia, although a handful and a real spit-fire, was a witness to all she came in contact with. Through her spirit and magnetic personality, she taught God's grace, true courage, patience, and to always smile, whether she was walking down the aisle (yes. walking) to marry her husband, Ron, in the nursing home, or in her last moment on earth in ICU. #### Tornadoes, powerful thunderstorms kill 6 and level homes across

#### Illinois, then sweep east

WASHINGTON, Ill. (AP) – As a powerful tornado bore down on their Illinois farmhouse, Curt Zehr's wife and adult son didn't have time to do anything but scramble down the stairs into their basement.

Uninjured, the pair looked out moments later to find the house gone and the sun out and "right on top" of them, Zehr said. The home on the outskirts of Washington, Ill., was swept up and scattered over hundreds of yards by one of the dozens of tornadoes and intense thunderstorms that swept across the Midwest on Sunday, leaving at least six people dead and unleashing powerful winds that flattened entire neighborhoods, flipped over cars and uprooted trees.

"They saw (the tornado) right there and got in the basement," said a stunned Zehr, pointing to the farm field near the rubble that had been his home.


Entire blocks in Washington were leveled. Other area towns were heavily damaged, too, and officials at Chicago's Soldier Field evacuated the stands and delayed the Bears-Baltimore Ravens game.

trump, but South takes the king, ruffs a club with dummy's last trump and cashes dummy's high diamond. He then plays the spade ace, ruffs a spade, draws trumps and scores his 10th trick with the diamond nine.

But that's not exactly how it went, because when declarer played a diamond to the jack at trick two, East, Larry Cohen, won with the ace! He then returned a trump to dummy's ace.

Convinced that West had the dia mond queen, declarer now embarked on a line of play that, with normal breaks, was virtually certain to yield 10 tricks. He played the ace of spades and ruffed a spade, ruffed a club, on which Cohen unblocked the king, and ruffed another spade. He then cashed the K-O of trumps, disclosing the 4-1 trump split and leaving Cohen with the master trump

South had eight tricks and thought he had a good chance to score two more with the K-10 of diamonds. But when he next led a diamond to the ten, the roof caved in. Cohen took his gueen and returned a club to West's ten. When Berkowitz cashed another club, Cohen got rid of his remaining diamond, and his ten of trumps took the last trick for down two!

Observe that after Cohen took the first diamond with the ace, declarer could have scored five heart tricks in his hand, two club ruffs in dummy, the two black aces and the diamond king to make his contract.

#### Philippine corruption magnifies effects of typhoon, from infrastructure to expat donations

TACLOBAN, Philippines (AP) — When a newspaper for Filipino workers in New Zealand told readers how to donate to the typhoon relief effort in their homeland, it mentioned agencies like the Red Cross but not a list of government bank accounts that the Philippine Embassy had sent over.

"I'm not going to mince words," said Mel Fernandez, the editorial adviser for the Filipino Migrant News. "We would like every cent to reach those poor people there rather than getting waylaid."

Corruption is a concern after any major natural disaster, as millions of dollars in cash and goods rush in from around the world. But those worries are especially acute in the Philippines, where graft has been a part of life for decades.

The government of President Benigno Aquino III, who has made fighting corruption a priority, is promising full transparency in reconstruction spending in areas devastated by Typhoon Haiyan, known in the Philippines as Yolanda. It announced Monday that it has established a website called the Foreign Aid Transparency Hub where funds given by foreign donors can be tracked.

"There's an urgent call now for us to monitor the

#### Once considered a leader, Oregon's insurance exchange till hasn't enrolled anyone

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - With all the problems facing the rollout of President Barack Obama's health care overhaul, nowhere is the situation worse or more surprising than in Oregon, a progressive state that has enthusiastically embraced the federal law but has so far failed to enroll a single person in coverage through the state's insurance exchange.

Despite grand ambitions, an early start, millions of dollars from the federal government and a techsavvy population, Oregon's online enrollment system still isn't ready more than a month after it was supposed to go live. The state has resorted to hiring or reassigning 400 people to process insurance applications by hand.

"We're all surprised and frustrated that we're in the position that we're in now," said Jesse O'Brien, a health care advocate at the Oregon State Public Interest Research Group, which lobbied for the exchange.

The state has received about 18,000 paper applications, at 19 pages each, and is scrambling to manually file and clear them. State officials have not been able to say when they expect the online system to launch, nor have they established a deadline to submit paper applications in order for coverage to begin Jan. 1. Meanwhile, the exchange's board is demanding answers from the executive director about when the website will work and how his team will get people enrolled on time.

For consumers, the application process can be long and frustrating.

#### Investigators try to determine what caused Boeing crash

MOSCOW (AP) - Russian investigators on Monday combed through the charred fragments of a Boeing 737 jetliner as they tried to determine what caused its crash that killed all 50 people on board.


The plane belonging to Tatarstan Airlines crashed Sunday while trying to land at its home port in the Russian city of Kazan, the capital of the oil-rich province of Tatarstan. The son of the provincial governor and the chief of the local branch of Russia's main security agency were among the victims.

The plane, which was flying from Moscow, crashed while making a second attempt at landing, said Alexander Poltinin, the head of the local branch of Russia's Investigative Committee. He said the investigators are trying to determine why the

# \$1,425 REWARD

Fifty years after the game, an online bounty of almost \$1500 is being offered to the first person who can come up with film of an epic West Texas high school football battle that had national implications ... a game that almost wasn't played.

It was November 22nd, 1963, the same day JFK was assassinated. When news of the Dallas tragedy came, the San Angelo Central High Bobcats were already on the road to Big Spring for a showdown that night with the BSHS Steers. So, it was decided to go ahead and play.

The teams were coached by two giants, the Bobcats by Emory Bellard who would become a legendary college coach who is probably best remembered as inventor of the Wishbone offense, and Big Spring by one of Bear Bryant's original Texas A&M Junction Boys, Don Robbins. San Angelo was ranked as the No. 1 team in Texas in Division 4A football, back when 4A was the highest classification. A high school football magazine also named them No. 1 high school team in the nation. San Angelo had already clinched the championship of the 2-4A Conference, also known as "The Little South-

# The last Farm Bill?

any conservatives want farm bills to stop coupling food stamps to agricultural subsidies. They see the linkage as an unsavory deal between urban Democrats and rural Republicans to waste the people's money.

But not all conservatives are principled conservatives. Principled conservatives oppose the farm subsidies as a monstrous example of corporate welfare. The other kind thinks it can strip spending from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program while preserving the farm rip-offs.

Sen. Ron Johnson of Wisconsin offers an example of the latter. "Farm-state lawmakers should no longer assent to the crass legislative tactic of combining farm policy and food stamps," he writes for National Review Online. "Instead of greasing the skids, the rapid growth in the use of food stamps is actually a major factor holding up the fiveyear reauthorization of agriculture programs."

A more realistic view of the politics involved comes from an agricultural bankers conference in Minneapolis. "If we succeed in taking food and nutrition programs out of the farm bill, this is the last farm bill," Kansas State University economist Barry Flinchbaugh told Hoosier Ag Today.

The notion that a giant wave of

support for slashing food stamps is crashing across the land may be a wee bit off politically. And the idea that the public approves of taxpayer handouts overwhelmingly geared toward the rich — including such renowned agriculturalists as Microsoft cofounder Paul Allen and investment company chieftain Charles Schwab, both billionaires well, what can you say?

Flinchbaugh lays out the simple math: "There's 400 urban districts in the House, 35 rural. This isn't rocket science. Who needs who?"

The politics stink, and so do the aesthetics. Compassionate conservatives are appalled by the food stamp cuts, especially after lawmakers actually fattened the farm payouts — and at a time of fabulous crop prices.

"The conservative war on food stamps is the most baffling political move of the year," writes Henry Olsen of the Ethics & Public Policy Center. "What gives? And why are conservatives overlooking a far more egregious abuse of taxpayer dollars in the farm bill?"

Both the House and Senate versions would phase out direct payments to farmers. But they would increase subsidies for federally subsidized crop insurance.

Calling the crop insurance program "obscene," Olsen notes: "There's no income limit for this subsidy: The vast majority of this taxpayer money goes to farmers who make in excess of \$250,000 a year." Private companies selling this insurance enjoy a largely risk-free investment because the government pays them about 20 percent of the premium cost.

"Every problem conservatives complain about in food stamps is even worse in crop insurance," Olsen writes.

Let's talk about food stamps. It is true that the program has grown fourfold since 2000. This reflects a weak economy for lowwage workers but also long-term structural change in the nature of jobs. That's a fancy way of saying high-paying manual jobs are going away. The working poor are getting poorer, and there are more of them.

Do food stamps encourage dependency? The vast majority of the beneficiaries are in families with children or are elderly or disabled. Many have lost their jobs, but more than half who can work do work. That includes families with children.

Is there fraud in the food stamps program? Yes, there is. Go after the cheats.

But there's fraud in every program, including the farm program. In North Carolina alone, U.S. agents uncovered a criminal ring working a crop in surance scam. The participants were tobacco farmers, insurance agents and claims adjusters. The cost to U.S. taxpayers: almost \$100 million.

Here you have people defrauding a program that already legal izes a taxpayer rip-off. Yes, let's split the food stamps and the farm program.

# **State bound** Lady Steers edge Wylie, set for title run

SNYDER — Big Spring is headed to the state championship tournament. The Lady Steers (31-13) may as well have been playing a home game Saturday against District 4-3A nemesis Abilene Wylie, as the crowd was very Big Spring-centric. And quite loud.

The Lady Steers — after dispatching rival Monahans to get to the Region I-3A tournament, then rallying for a win over Springtown — defeated the No. 4 Lady Bulldogs 25-23, 18-25, 25-16, 25-15, 17-15 to advance to the championship tournament in Garland — the first BSHS volleyball team to do so since 1977, when former Olympic volleyball player and Big Spring grad Rose Majors was a senior.

After falling behind early in the opening set, Big Spring charged back. Morgan Seaton tied the game at 20-all on a block. Wylie was forced to take a time out after the Lady Steers took a 23-21 lead, but the stunned Lady Bulldogs couldn't regain control.

Taking the first set was a major factor in the victory, according to Head Coach Lynn Osborne.


"We went in thinking we had a good

shot at winning it all," she said. "Once we took one game off Wylie it really came into focus."

Wylie was no pushover, however, and the two teams were just beginning what turned into an all out war. The Lady Bulldogs nabbed the second set, but were stymied in the third when a 10-3 run by BSHS put WHS on the ropes. Tied at 2-2, Big Spring jumped out to an early lead and Wylie couldn't recover in the shorter, decisive set. For the third time in as many matches, the Lady Steers put away their opponent in five games. After defeating state ranked squads to get there, Osborne is confident her team has what it takes to bring home a Class 3A title. "I believe this team is talented enough to be state champions," she said. "They just have to overcome the exicitement of it all and not be intimidated by geography. They really started to peak late and they're peaking at the best time now." Erin Pollard and Julianna Rodriguez were named to the Regional All-Tournament Team, while Morgan Seaton received tourney Most Valuable Player honors. Though happy the trio was awarded for their efforts, Osborne said the Lady Steers' success was dependent on the entire team. "I'm excited for those three girls to be recognized, but it made me tense up a little, too," she explained. "Volleyball is a true team sport. I was excited for them to receive these honors, but I felt that all the girls on the team were deserving of them. They all played extremely well. I was thrilled with all of their performances." Big Spring will play the state semifinal round against Decatur (39-7) on Friday at 1 p.m. at the Curtis Culwell Center in Garland. A win would pit the Lady Steers against either Bellville (40-7) or College Station (31-11) in the champions game Saturday at 2 p.m.

# Tannehill, embattled Dolphins stop Chargers

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) — Ryan Tannehill watched the final play from the sideline, hopping anxiously as an opponent's desperation heave hung in the air, then letting out a jubilant scream when a teammate swatted the ball to the turf.

At the end of a dismal week, the Miami Dolphins finally had something to celebrate.

Brent Grimes broke up Philip Rivers' final pass in the end zone as time expired, and the embattled Dolphins beat the San Diego Chargers 20-16 Sundav.

Tannehill threw for 268 yards, including a 39-yard score to Charles Clay, who broke two tackles on the play. Miami managed 104 yards rushing behind a makeshift line.

The victory came amid a harassment scandal that raised questions regarding the team's locker room culture. An NFL special investigator will question players this week about the relationship between offensive tackle Jonathan Martin and guard Richie Incognito.

"There's a lot going on, but we're not focused on that," Tannehill said. "We're focused on football."

The Dolphins (5-5) won for only the second time in the past seven games. They're still in contention for an AFC wild-card berth, despite a dreadful defeat last Monday at Tampa Bay and the distractions of the harassment case.

"We're fighting through this," tackle Tyson Clabo said. "Someone's got to get that last wild-card spot. Why not us?"

The Chargers (4-6), who were plagued by penal-

ties and missed tackles, lost their third game in a row

"We made too many mistakes from start to finish," coach Mike McCoy said. "We hurt ourselves way too much."

Trailing by four points, San Diego started from its own 17 with 1:54 left and drove to the Miami 25. On the final play, a harried Rivers lofted a pass toward Vincent Brown in the end zone, but the 5-foot-10 Grimes leaped to slap the ball away.

Rivers threw for 298 yards and Ryan Mathews ran for 127, including a career-best, 51-yard dash to set up a field goal. But the Chargers had 10 penalties for 76 vards, including two infractions that cost them 11 points in the first half.

"Ten penalties, that's a lot," Rivers said. "We're not playing well enough to overcome those things.'

Miami played at home for the first time since the scandal broke. The stands were less than two-thirds full, and an airplane banner reflected the mood by calling for the firing of general manager Jeff Ireland, who has long been in disfavor with fans.

Because center Mike Pouncey missed the game with an illness, the Dolphins had three backups starting on the offensive line. Martin missed his third consecutive game while undergoing treatment for emotional issues, and the suspended Incognito sat out his second game.

Working behind the patchwork line, Tannehill was sacked four times, increasing his NFL-high season total to 41. But Miami averaged 5.5 yards per rush to limit the Chargers' time of possession.

As usual, the Dolphins went with pass plays twothirds of the time. On the game's opening drive, they marched 76 yards — with all but 2 coming through the air — for a field goal.

Penalties repeatedly hurt the Chargers. Corey Liuget was flagged for roughing the passer to negate a teammate's fumble recovery at the San Diego 1, and two plays later the Dolphins scored a touchdown for a 10-7 lead.

Liuget said he didn't see Tannehill get rid of the ball.

"It was a costly penalty for us," Liuget said. "I wish I could get that one back. It's not a great feeling at all."

A scrambling Rivers hit Antonio Gates for a 5-yard touchdown with a minute left in the first half, but the quarterback was flagged for throwing past the line of scrimmage, and the Chargers settled for a field goal that made it 10-all at halftime.

A drive in the second half stalled after receiver Keenan Allen was flagged 15 yards for taunting, and the Chargers defense was penalized four times for offsides.

San Diego's Derek Cox dropped a potential picksix in the first quarter, and on the next play Johnny Patrick intercepted Tannehill at midfield. The Chargers scored four plays later for a 7-3 lead.

Clay put Miami ahead to stay in the third quarter when he caught a short pass and ran over defenders Marcus Gilchrist and Donald Butler en route to the end zone, making it 17-10.

# NASCAR's Jimmie Johnson joins Richard Petty, Dale Earnhardt with sixth cup win

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP) - Soaked in sweat,champagne and success, Jimmie Johnson celebrated yet another NASCAR championship by sipping a beer.

A six-pack would have been more appropriate.

Back on top with only two NASCAR legends left to catch, Johnson won his sixth title in eight years Sunday to stake his claim as one of the most dominant competitors in sports history. Now looming large in Johnson's windshield is the mark of seven titles held by Richard Petty and the late Dale

Earnhardt. The party had barely started on No. 6 when the debate began: Where does Johnson, who onand-off for two years has used the hashtag '6Pack' on Twitter to describe his bid for this title, rank among NASCAR's greats? "I feel like this team is capable of a lot of great things. There's still great years ahead of us," Johnson said. "But all of that is in the future, a seventh, an eighth. I don't want to focus on that yet. It's not time." The time to rank Johnson will be when his driving career is over. But at just 38 and the youngest driver to win six titles, his career

could last another decade or more.

"I have six, and we'll see if I can get seven," Johnson said. "Time will tell. I think we need to save the argument until I hang up the helmet, then it's worth the argument. Let's wait until I hang up the helmet until we really start thinking about this."

Said crew chief Chad Knaus, who trails only Dale Inman's eight championships in the NASCAR record books: "I don't think we're even close to the potential of the team yet."

That should be devastating news to the rest of NASCAR.

Johnson, needing only to finish 23rd or better to spoil Kenseth's dream season, was on cruise control most of the day at Homestead. His lone hiccup came when traffic stacked-up on a restart and he and Kenseth made slight contact, causing Johnson to plunge 15 spots in the field with damage to his fender.

Yet he still rallied to finish ninth and beat Kenseth for the title by 19 points.

"He is an amazing talent, there's no doubt about it," Knaus said. "He can do things with a race car that most mortals can't. Let's just be denied for a third consecutive year.

"If Jimmie would have got a flat or something, that would have been all right," Kenseth lamented. "Never seen anything like this in the sport and probably never will again. ... Maybe he'll retire."

Johnson won a record five straight titles from 2006 through 2010, was mathematically eliminated before the 2011 finale, but was back in the title hunt last season. Only he had a tire failure in the penultimate race at Phoenix and then a mechanical failure in the finale to lose the championship to Brad Keselowski.

It just went by so fast it Jordan, he now has six seems like. Now, I'm really going to slow things down here and enjoy it. This is so, so sweet."

It was just as special for Hamlin, who bounced back from a fractured vertebra earlier this season that sidelined him for over a month. Hamlin hasn't been the same since, and Sunday's victory, his first of the year, extended his winning streak to eight seasons.

"Is the year over yet?" grinning Hamlin а asked in Victory Lane. "Man, I wanted to keep that streak alive."

Hamlin's celebration was brief as the victory stage was cleared for Johnson. Hamlin nearly stood atop the podium in 2010, when he took Johnson down to the wire, only to fade in the finale as Johnson claimed his record fifth consecutive title. Now, with the sixth title, Johnson's accomplishments resonate far beyond NASCAR. His numbers stack up with Roger Federer, who won 16 of 27 Grand Slams from 2003-10; Michael Phelps, who won 18 gold medals in three Olympics from 2004 to 2012, and Tiger Woods, who won four consecutive majors in 2000 and 2001, and seven overall from 1999-2002.

"When you mention Michael's name, he's given me a hard time that I only won five," Johnson said. "I can't wait to send him a text and say, 'Hey, buddy, I've caught up."

Johnson won the title this year with a 5.1 average finish over the 10 Chase for the Sprint Cup championship races. The mark was second only to the 5.0 average he posted in 2007 when he beat teammate Jeff Gordon for his second title.

It was four-time champion Gordon that discovered Johnson racing in the Nationwide Series in 2001 and convinced team owner Rick Hendrick to hire him for a new fourth team. "You know, they are unbelievable and they proved it again this year just how good they are as a group, as a team," Gordon said. "Jimmie as a driver, Chad as a crew chief, Hendrick Motorsports, everybody is just so good. But specifically, the No. 48, they just have a chemistry."

many drivers might have won titles had they not competed against Johnson and his Hendrick Motorsports team. The loser this year was Matt Kenseth, who 10 years removed from his only NASCAR championship had a career year but still came up short.

"Unfortunately, we're racing during the Jimmie Johnson era," said Denny Hamlin, winner of Sunday's race. Hamlin lost the 2010 title to Johnson.

"We're just unlucky in that sense. I think being out there and racing with him, I can say he's the best that there ever

Kenseth, needing a Johnson collapse to have any shot at the title, positioned himself to pounce should anything go awry. Kenseth led a race-high 144 laps and finished second to Joe Gibbs Racing teammate Hamlin.

"It was just unbelievable year for us. Obviously, we wanted to win the championship as good as we ran all year," said Kenseth, winner of seven races in his first season with JGR.

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
