Big Spring Police Officer Mark Castaneda has been served with a federal felony indictment by the U.S.Department of Justice, the local police department has confirmed.

Big Spring Police Det. Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer, said the felony indictment, delivered Tuesday,

BSPD is cooperating fully with the investigation and will continue to do so.

"Due to this being an ongoing investigation, no further comment will be given by the Big Spring Police Department," said Everett, who said any questions should be referred to the U.S. Department of Justice at the U.S. Attorneys Office in Dallas.

Castaneda joined the Big Spring police force on Dec. 12, 2012. He had previously been employed by GEO Group,

which is contracted to operate several federal prisons in Big Spring. However, there was no indication that the allegations involve that com-

As of Wednesday, Castaneda was being held at the Taylor County Jail.

BSPD indicated Castaneda is on paid administrative leave, pending an internal investigation.

Don was born and grew up in Kerens, Texas, until age 16 when he moved with his family to what was then East Pakistan. He attended and graduated from Woodstock School, a boarding school in the city of Mussoorie in northern India. Don then returned to Texas to attend Texas A&M. A member of the Class of 1959, he graduated with a degree in economics and served as the Cadet Colonel of the Corps during his senior year.

Upon graduation from Texas A&M, Don accepted a regular commission in the United States Air Force. Don's military service spanned almost four years, including 13 months in South Korea. Don and Fan were married in 1961. After discharge from the Air Force, Don worked for two years before he and Fan moved to Cambridge, Mass., with young sons Blake and Scott, where Don earned an MBA from Harvard Business School.

After graduate school, Don accepted a position with Continental Grain which moved the young family to Indiana, back to Texas, then to Nebraska. After a little more than two years, Don and Fan made the decision to move the family back to San Antonio, Texas. Don's career in San Antonio included acquiring and successfully turning around different companies.

Don served as a deacon of First Presbyterian Church in San Antonio and also actively served the Greater San Antonio Homebuilders' Association.

In 1975 Don and Fan and their four children moved the short distance to Boerne, Texas. Don served as an elder of St. Mark Presbyterian Church in Boerne where he led the effort to build a new sanctuary for the church. Don also was elected to and served as a member of the board of the Boerne County Line Independent School District.

After all four children graduated from Boerne High School, Don and Fan moved back to Fan's childhood home on a ranch at Big Spring, Texas, to be close to and care for their parents. Among other ongoing business interests at the time, Don refurbished the old ranch and returned it to an active ranching operation.



#### Afghan president opens gathering of elders, backs security deal

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Afghanistan's president has told a gathering of elders that he supports signing a security deal with the United States if safety and security conditions are met.

Hamid Karzai spoke as the 2,500-member national consultative council of Afghan elders known as the Loya Jirga started in Kabul on Thursday.

The four-day meeting will discuss the bilateral security pact that defines the role of thousands of U.S. troops who will remain after the NATO combat mission ends in 2014.

Karzai told the gathering that President Barack Obama assured him actions by U.S. forces after 2014 will respect the safety and security of Afghans.

The elders have the right to revise or reject any clause of the deal. Their decision will have significant influence on parliament, which has to endorse

#### Iranian envoy: Easing oil, banking sanctions part of nuclear talks

GENEVA (AP) — A senior Iranian envoy says nuclear talks have included possible ways to reduce sanctions on oil sales and banking in exchange for curbs in Tehran's atomic program. The remarks by negotiator Abbas Araghchi on

Iranian state TV reflect the scope of the possible first steps in a deal aimed at easing Western concerns that Iran could one day make a nuclear weapon — an assertion Iran strongly denies. Iran seeks a rollback in U.S.-led sanctions on oil

exports and access to international banking systems. Envoys for the U.S. and other world powers want to trim Iran's uranium enrichment.

Araghchi repeated Thursday that Iran would never halt its enrichment program, but would discuss setting levels.

#### 85-year-old vet taken off plane and detained in North Korea, son says

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North Korean officials detained an 85-year-old American veteran of the Korean War last month as he sat in a plane set to leave the country, the man's son said.

A uniformed North Korean officer boarded the plane on Oct. 26 and asked Merrill Newman, a tourist from Palo Alto, California, for his passport before telling a stewardess that Newman had to leave the plane, the son, Jeffrey Newman, said Wednes-"My dad got off, walked out with the stewardess,

and that's the last he was seen," Jeffrey Newman told The Associated Press at his home in Pasadena, California. It wasn't clear what led to the detention. The son

said he was speaking regularly with the U.S. State Department about his father, but U.S. officials wouldn't confirm the detention to reporters, citing privacy issues. North Korea's official state-run media have yet to comment on reports of the detention, which first appeared in the San Jose Mercury News and Japan's Kyodo News service. The son said that, according to his father's travel-

ing companion, Newman earlier had a "difficult' discussion with North Korean officials about his experiences during the 1950-53 war between U.S.led United Nations forces and North Korea and ally China. That war ended in an armistice, not a peace treaty, leaving the Korean Peninsula still technically at war. The war is still an important part of North Korean propaganda, which regularly accuses Washington and Seoul of trying to bring down its political system — statements analysts believe are aimed in part at shoring up domestic support for young leader Kim Jong Un.

#### Rabbi: Pontiff is strong, will make reforms despite criticism NEW YORK (AP) — It was September, not an

easy time for a religious Jew to be traveling. The Jewish month of Tishrei was ending with its marathon of holy days. Kosher wine would be needed. There were Sabbath blessings to recite. Fortunately, Rabbi Abraham Skorka had a friend with the run of a hotel who arranged for kosher meals and said "amen" to the rabbi's prayers.

Skorka has been talking about this trip ever since, in interviews and meetings with Jewish groups, for two reasons: the hotel was inside the Vatican, and the friend was Pope Francis. "He invited me to share his table for the three

daily meals. He told me, 'You have to sit here' — to sit on his right," Skorka said in a recent interview in New York. "I said, 'Look, I have to say Kiddush.' I had to say the special blessing for the holiday, for Shabbat, before the meal is served. He told me, 'Do what you have to do." Skorka — rector of the Seminario Rabinico Lati-

noamericano in Buenos Aires, which has ties to the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York finds himself in the unlikely position of being close friends with a pope. When Francis was Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio, archbishop of Buenos Aires, he and Skorka co-wrote a book of dialogues on Judaism and Roman Catholicism titled, "On Heaven and Earth," had a similarly themed TV show called "Bible, A Dialogue for Today," and offered prayers from each other's pulpits.

Bergoglio kept a framed photo of the two of them in his study. At Skorka's synagogue, the rabbi displayed a greeting the cardinal made to the congregation on one of his Rosh Hashana visits.

#### With a lot to prove, U.S. Marine Osprey crews fly overtime for typhoon victims in Philippines CLARK AIR BASE, Philippines (AP) — The U.S.

Marines' newest and in some quarters most controversial transport airplane is showing the world what it's got — for the sake of the victims of Typhoon Haiyan, and perhaps its own future. The MV-22 Osprey, which can tilt its rotors to fly like either a helicopter or a fixed-wing aircraft, is delivering tons of aid every day to people affected

by the Nov. 8 storm. The U.S. military's humanitarian effort presents a golden opportunity: The Marines want to show how safe and versatile the Osprey is, countering critics and helping to persuade allies to buy their own. Anger over the decision to base the aircraft on the Japanese island of Okinawa, the only place in Asia where they are permanently deployed, has made the aircraft the poster boy of anti-military senti-

than any other helicopter-type aircraft. With its unique design, the Osprey can fly faster and farther and carry heavier loads than the helicopters it replaced.

CAPE CORAL, Fla. (AP) — Florida Republican Rep. Henry "Trey" Radel, who pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of cocaine possession and

received a year's probation, is taking a leave of absence from Congress and donating his salary to charity.

Radel made the announcement Wednesday at a crowded news conference in Florida.

"I'm not going to sit here and make any excuses for what I've done," he said. "I have let down our country. I've let down our constituents. I've let down my family, including my wife. And even though he doesn't know it, I've let down my 2-year-old son."

eline calicivirus, or FCV, is a viral infection causing "Some cats will devel-

severe upper respiratory problems in cats. Entering through the cat's eyes, nose, or mouth, this virus possesses symptoms similar to that of a common

As loving cat owners, it is important to be well informed of the causes, symptoms, and prevention of this fast-spreading infection to help keep our feline friends happy and healthy.

Frequently seen in animal shelters or within multi-cat homes, the FCV infection is typically spread amongst cats that are being housed together in large numbers or kittens with weak immune systems.

Once the cat is infected with FCV, they may carry the virus in their bodies for life.

"Approximately 10 percent of household cats exhibit this 'carrier' state and have the chance of becoming sick again during times of stress or other illness. although many will not" said Dr. Kathy Scott, lecturer at the College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences. "They may continue to shed the virus, however, putting other cats they are near at risk of developing the infection."

Depending on the strain of the virus, infected cats can show a great variety of symptoms. Typical symptoms seen with FCV are similar to an upper respiratory infection, involving sneezing, nasal conges-

tion, and conjunctivitis. with more severe cases exhibiting lethargy and poor appetite as well.

op severe gingivitis and oral pain that may be significant enough to cause the cat to not eat, while others may demonstrate lameness and fever," Scott said. "Rarely, a severe variant of calicivirus (called FCV-associated virulent systemic disease or FCV-VSD) can develop and cause critical illness, multiple organ damage, and even death." Luckily, this form is very rare and outbreaks can be controlled through strict isolation and quaran-

tine. Accurate diagnosis will help your veterinarian provide the best treatment possible, and is also important if the infected cat lives in a multi-cat household...

To diagnose FCV, the vet will evaluate the cat's clinical symptoms and medical history in addition to laboratory testing.

"A swab can be taken of the cat's mouth or conjunctiva (a thin membrane of the eye), and tested for presence of the virus in those tissues," Scott said.

Unfortunately, treatment of FCV is challenging. There are currently no medications to completely eliminate the virus or eliminate the infection at a faster pace, so the best thing you can do for your furry friend is to provide them with the support and care they need to help them feel

comfortable. Due to their stuffy noses and possible ulcers in their mouths, cats with FCV have a tendency to lose their appetite, so it is wise to provide them with soft, strong-smelling foods or pain medications that will make eating more comfortable.

"We also recommend keeping their noses clean and sometimes

using medications or vaporizers to help loosen the mucus in their noses, making it easier to breathe," Scott said. "In more severe cases, antibiotics may be needed to stop the growth of bacteria that have overgrown as a result of the FCV infection, and if cats haven't eaten in more than three days, will probably they require a short period of hospitalization to receive fluids and some form of nutrition."

The most important measure you can take to reduce the likelihood of your cat contracting FCV is to ensure that their vaccinations are up to date at all times.

'Although there is no vaccination that provides 100 percent protection, there is a vaccination available for FCV, and it is part of the 'core' vaccinations recommended by veterinarians to all cats," Scott said. "This vaccine is likely to decrease risk of the development of upper respiratory infection, but, unfortunately, can't protect against all strands of FCV, so cats still may

become infected." Though vaccinated cats still have a chance of becoming carriers if infected, they do have a lower chance of spreading the infection to other cats than those that are unvaccinated.

If coming down with an upper respiratory infection is miserable for us, imagine what it is like for our cats. Taking precautionary measurements to prevent them from coming down with FCV, as well as keeping an eye out for specific symptoms, can make a world of difference for both you and

**Dear Grateful**: Obviously, that column made a strong impression on you. Here it is again.

**Dear Ann Landers:** Please print this list of warning signals to help women determine if a mate or date is a potential (or actual) batterer.

Be careful if your mate displays any of the following signs:

1. Jealousy of your time with coworkers, friends and family.

2. Controlling behavior. (Controls your comings and goings and your money and insists on "helping" you make personal decisions.)

3. Isolation. (Cuts you off from supportive resources such as telephone pals and colleagues at work.)

4. Blames others for his problems. (Unemployment, family quarrels — everything is "your fault.")

5. Hypersensitivity. (Easily upset by annoyances that are a part of daily life, such as being asked to work overtime, criticism of any kind, being asked to help with chores or child care.)

6. Cruelty to animals or children. (Insensitive to their pain and suffering, may tease and/or hurt children and pets.)

7. "Playful" use of force in sex. (May throw you down and hold you during sex. May start having sex with you when you are sleeping or demand sex when you are ill or tired.)

8. Verbal abuse. (Says cruel and hurtful things, degrades and humiliates you, wakes you up to verbally abuse you or doesn't let you go to sleep.)

9. Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde

11. Threats of violence. (Says, "I'll slap you," "I'll kill you," or "I'll break your neck.")

12. Breaking or striking objects. (Breaks your possessions, throws objects near or at you or your children.)

13. Uses force during an argument. (Holds you down or against a wall, pushes, shoves, slaps or kicks you. This behavior can easily escalate to choking, stabbing or shooting.)

Ann, please tell your readers they don't have to accept violent behavior from anyone — mates, dates, parents or friends. Because millions of American women will be battered at some time in their lives, they need to know how to read the warning signs. Any woman who sees herself in the column today should call the nearest women's crisis line and tell someone what is happening. She will be provided with support and safety options.

There are several ways to break the cycle of violence, and identifying the warning signs is the first step. — *Portland, Ore.* 

Dear Oregon: Some women do not realize they are being abused until it is pointed out to them. They have been made to believe abusive treatment is what they deserve. I hope women who see themselves in this column will look up the number of the nearest women's shelter and call the National Domestic Violence Hotline at 1-800-799-SAFE (1-800-799-7233) or visit thehotline.org. It could save their lives.

Recently, she said something that really hurt my feelings, and I decided to talk to her about it and clear the air. However, when I mentioned it, she became terribly agitated and insisted she would never say any such thing. She actually got her family involved, and they agreed that I was imagining things.

I love my sister and don't want to upset her, but this really bothers me. She has mentioned that her friends joke about her memory, and she doesn't like it. But I'm surprised that her children and husband are not aware of the problem. Should I just let it go? — *Massachusetts* 

Dear Massachusetts: We suspect her husband and children are well aware of the problem, but have chosen not to deal with it. Please encourage your sister to talk to her doctor. Say that you are worried about her. Memory problems are common, but if she is substituting others' experiences for her own, it could be more serious.

Ask if she is scheduled for a regular checkup and see whether you can accompany her, alerting the doctor if she neglects to do so. Also mention your concerns to her husband and children. Your sister may be too embarrassed to address this, so they need to be more proactive.

Dear Annie: A year ago, my husband, who is very financially savvy, set up an investment account for his 2-year-old niece. Because she didn't need any more toys and the family lives quite a distance from us, we thought this would be a nice way for us to

recognize birthdays, holidays and special events. Our plan was to make small investments into this account for her in the years to come.

Soon after the parents received the information on the account, they cashed it out and reinvested it in a different type of account. They recently offered to share the details with us so we could invest for their daughter.

Annie, what would have been a fun way for us to honor her is no longer of interest to us. We will of course still send gifts to the child, but we feel the parents' action was extremely tacky. What do you think? — *Boston Aunt* 

**Dear Boston**: We understand why you have lost your enthusiasm, and we agree that the parents should have been grateful and left things alone. But it might assuage your annoyance to look at it another way: If you had purchased the child an outfit and the parents had exchanged it for something they preferred, would you be as upset? ## Tigers trade Fielder to Rangers for Kinsler

DETROIT (AP) — Less than two years after boldly signing Prince Fielder to a \$214 million contract, the Detroit Tigers traded the slugging first baseman to Texas in another blockbuster move.

Fielder was dealt to the Rangers on Wednesday night for second baseman Ian Kinsler. The Tigers agreed to pay the Rangers \$30 million as part of the swap, according to a person with knowledge of the deal. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the amount of money exchanged was not revealed when the teams announced the trade. The \$30 million is payable from 2016-20.

"Obviously, a very exciting trade for us in adding Prince Fielder to the organization," Rangers general manager Jon Daniels said. "Also a tough trade to make in that Ian Kinsler's been with the organization since he was drafted in '03, and we've signed him here a couple of times. Been here, a catalyst for our World Series clubs, and a huge part of this. A winning guy, a heart-and-soul guy, and Detroit got a tremendous player and person."

It's the first headline-grabbing move of baseball's offseason, and it involves two of the American League's top teams. Detroit has won three consecutive AL Central titles and reached the World Series in 2012, while Texas won the AL pennant in 2010 and

Fielder, a five-time All-Star, had to consent to the trade before it could be completed. The big first baseman signed a \$214 million, nine-year contract with the Tigers before the 2012 season that includes a limited notrade provision.

"We're thankful for what he did for us," Detroit general manager Dave Dombrowski said. "It'll be a bat that we miss at times — there's no doubt about it."

Kinsler just finished the first season of a \$75 million, five-year con-

With stars like Fielder, Justin Verlander, Miguel Cabrera and Anibal Sanchez in the fold, Detroit's payroll had become one of the game's biggest. And although Fielder hit 55 home runs over the last two years for the Tigers, his numbers dipped this season and he struggled in the playoffs when Detroit lost to Boston in the AL championship series.

Fielder hit .279 with 25 homers this year. He drove in 106 runs, but it was his lowest home run total over a full season. He did not have a single RBI in the 2013 postseason and hit .182 in the ALCS.

Daniels said the trade came together quickly — the first discussions took place Tuesday. The Rangers will welcome the durable Fielder, who has played 162 games in four of the

last five seasons. Texas was interest-

ed in Fielder when he signed with

Detroit as a free agent.

"Our offer was well below what it ended up being, so we weren't that close," Daniels said. "I thought he was a genuine guy that really loved the game, really loved playing the game, loved his boys, his sons."

Kinsler batted .277 with 13 homers this year. The a three-time All-Star was limited to 136 games because of injuries to his ribs and right side. Kinsler stole 15 bases in 2013 — not a high total by his standards but more than any player on the Detroit team he is joining.

The trade could save the Tigers more than \$75 million in the long run, giving them more financial flexibility with Cy Young Award winner Max Scherzer a year from free agency.

Fielder is still only 29, and the Rangers are set to add a big bat to the middle of their lineup while also resolving a logiam in the middle of their infield. Jurickson Profar, a highly touted 20-year-old prospect, appeared to be blocked by Kinsler and shortstop Elvis Andrus. Now, Profar should have a chance to play regularly.

The Tigers signed Fielder to a huge contract shortly before spring training in 2012 — after designated hitter Victor Martinez injured his knee. Martinez came back in 2013. With Fielder gone, Cabrera may move from third base back to first.

"I'm really not sure what we're going to do as we sit here now today," Dombrowski said. "Eventually, we see him as a first baseman. Will it happen this year or not? I'm not

The 31-year-old Kinsler fills a need at second base for Detroit after Omar Infante became a free agent.

Fielder is due \$168 million through 2020, a salary of \$24 million per season. Under his no-trade clause, he submits a list of 10 teams each year that he can be traded to without his

Texas was not on that list this year, but Fielder agreed to accept the trade and instructed agent Scott Boras to approve the deal.

"If he was coming off the best year of his career, he's not available." Daniels said. "I think that's kind of the whole idea of this deal — if anybody feels like that's a sign of things to come, that he's slipping, you may not like the deal. We don't feel that way. We don't feel that way at all."

Kinsler is guaranteed \$62 million through 2017: \$16 million in each of the next two seasons, \$14 million in 2016, \$11 million in 2017 and a \$5 million buyout of a \$10 million option.

It's already been an unpredictable offseason for the Tigers. Manager Jim Leyland stepped down after the season and was replaced by Brad Ausmus. Detroit could have come back with a similar roster and probably been favored to win the division again, but now more changes seem possible.

"If you put Kinsler's bat at the top of the lineup, that's an instant threat," Ausmus said. "It changes the dynamic, but it doesn't mean it's any less

If Cabrera moves back to first base, prospect Nick Castellanos might replace him at third. Previously, it appeared Castellanos would have to play the outfield if both Cabrera and Fielder were still on the team.

Andy Dirks is still available to play left field, but that's a spot the Tigers could still try to upgrade. They also have six capable starting pitchers — Drew Smyly was used in the bullpen this year — so that's a surplus that could come in handy in a possible

Detroit's bullpen will likely undergo a makeover after struggling last

The Rangers lost slugging outfielder Nelson Cruz to a late-season suspension as a result of MLB's investigation in the Biogenesis case. He's now a free agent, and if Texas loses him, Fielder, who hit 50 homers in 2007 for Milwaukee at 23, should help replace his production.



## Steers face familiar foe

Big Spring to take on rival Andrews for 2nd time in area round

The season continues for Big Spring, with the next obstacle being Andrews (5-6), a team the Steers (8-3) are quite familiar with. BSHS came out on top of a 61-48 shootout with the Mustangs in a predistrict bout.

Since then, Andrews' offense has changed quite a bit out of necessity on the heels of quarterback Shane Dolgener's seasonending injury. If you ask BSHS Head Coach Phillip Ritchey, it may have changed for the better. Dolgener's passing game was effective, but now the Mustangs have more scoring options with a resurrected running game.

"They're as dangerous as they were or more," Ritchey explained. "They will still spread it out a bit, but they are running the ball more. You almost wish they would just throw it. They have a big running back who's hard to stop. We have to be sound in everything we do. They're really good at running quick screens. In my opinion it's one of the most wellrounded offenses we'll see all vear."

Containing Andrews' retooled running game and limiting its own mistakes will be important facets of Big Spring win. Ritchey expects another highly competitive game against one of his program's oldest rivals.

"It's going to be completely different," Ritchey said. I believe we've improved a lot. This district will make you get better. But Andrews is a better team, too. Statistically speaking, whoever wins the tunrover battle usually wins the game. We will have to play like we have been to win."

After last week's relatively balmy football weather in Pecos where the Steers routed Fabens 61-21, this week's affair at Odessa's storied Ratliff Stadium could be drastically different. Temperatures could dip as low as the 20s and a chance of sleet or snow is predicted. Despite the inclement forecast, Ritchey hopes Steer Nation will be represented at the venue, which is about an hour-long drive from Big Spring.

"It's going to be a good football game," Ritchey added. "It's going to be a cold night, but we hope everyone bundles up and comes out and helps us win another game. It means a lot to the kids."

Big Spring may be peaking. The Steers dropped a game in the regular season finale to Monahans 31-0, but played about as perfect as game as it gets against Fabens last week. The defense held Fabens scoreless for more than three quarters and the offense racked up more than 650 yards.

Junior quarterback Tobyn Tannehill passed for more than 240 yards and rushed for 50. Senior receiver Tate Kennedy hauled in three touchdowns. The tandem of freshman Presston Alexander and junior Hunter Hill menaced Fabens from the backfield and senior allstate selection Devin Roberson again had a strong outing on both sides of the ball. Ritchey's veteran offensive line won the battle up front decisively, allowing seven Steers to score in a variety of ways.


