little two-lane farm road when we reached the Caprock breaks. The roadside was covered with
yellow daisies and bright rust-colored Indian blankets (another form of daisy), along with purple lupine,
buttercups, foxtail and several others that have unpronounceable Latin It was breathtaking.
That area obviously. got even more rain than we did during April. Seldom were we out of sight of at least
two playa lakes. Most of the lakes were the color of mud, but many tall pasture grass.
It was downright marshy.
We saw cattle standing knee-deep in water, munching on the taller
shoots around them. There are both pasturing and cow-cattle-mostly Angus and black
baldies-are uniformly fat and sleek. The wheat is full height and appears ours. $\downarrow$ are was too windy for a boat, and too
shallow and weedy around the edges for good shoreline fishing. But no matter. The wildflower experience was worth the trip.

## Arkansas River Shiner to be listed as 'threatened'

Under the terms of a conservation
agreement sought by the Texas Parks agreement sought by the Texas Parks
and Wild life Dept. (TPWD) and the and Wildlife Dept. (TPWD) and the Oklahoma Dept. of Wildlife Conser-
vation (ODWC), the United States vation (ODWC), the United States
Fish and Wildlife Service plans to list the Arkansas River Shiner a threatened, not endangered, unde threatened, not endangered, under
the federal Endangered Species Act. Threatened status for the tiny fish, which lives in the Canadian River in the Texas Panhandle, will mean
greater flexibility for farmers and greater flexioiry for farmers and
ranchers regarding land use pracrices, while effectively protecting the shiner and its acquatic habitat. Later this month, the US Fish and Wildlife
Service is expected to publish Service is expected to publish
threatened listed for the Arkansa threatened listed for the Arkansas
River Shiner in the federal register River Shiner in the federal register.
The Arkansas River Shiner is minnow endemic to the western Arkansas River basin, where it charac teristically inhabits channels of fluctuating, shallow steams with sifting
