Police hunt for suspect in shooting

A suspect in a Wednesday afternoon shooting remains at large today.

An arrest warrant has been issued for Leroy Zubiate, 29, of Big Spring, in connection with a Wednesday afternoon shooting at 1207 Sycamore in east Big Spring.

Juan Diaz, 23, suffered serious gunshot wounds to the face and legs during the incident, which occurred shortly after 4 p.m. Wednesday. Diaz was immediately airlifted to

Medical Center Hospital in Odessa; no update on his condition has been released. The shooting is believed to be the result of a domestic dispute between Diaz and Zubiate. An arrest warrant charging Zubiate with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon has been issued.

Contested races mount for primaries

The ballot for the March primary elections is starting to get a bit crowded, at least on the Republican side of things.

The latest candidate to file for the GOP primary is Linda Calvio, a social worker for the local Victim Services office, who has announced for the Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Place 2 election.

She will be joined on the Republican ballot by Robert Fitzgibbons, a lieutenant with the Big Spring Police Department.

Other county races to be decided in 2014, and candidates who have announced so far for those offices, include:

- County Judge — Incumbent Mark Barr has announced he will seek another term. He will be challenged in the Republican primary by former Justice of the Peace Kathryn Wiseman.

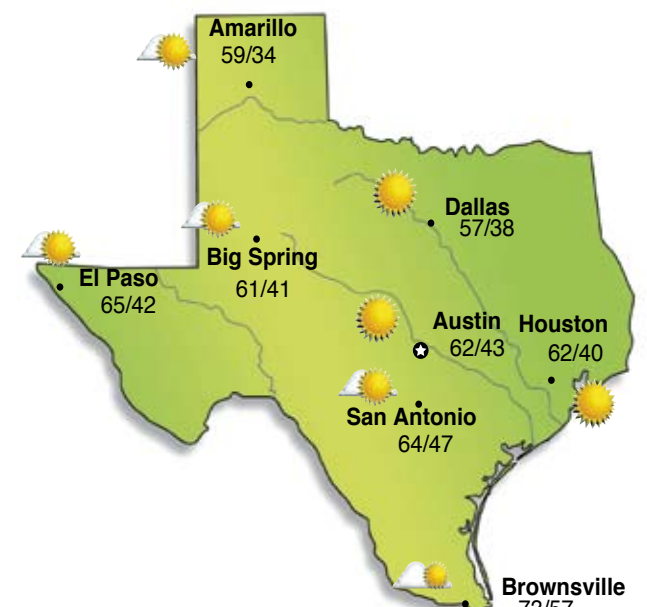

Washington dog found after 9 days under rubble

WASHINGTON, Ill. (AP) — A dog and his owner have been reunited after the animal was found under a pile of rubble more than a week after a tornado ripped through a central Illinois city.

Jacob Montgomery of Washington and his dog Dexter were separated when the Nov. 17 tornado damaged Montgomery's third floor apartment.

Montgomery is a member of the Illinois National Guard.

A guard spokesman says a neighbor sent Montgomery a Facebook message nine days later to tell him Dexter had been found under debris where the apartment used to be.

An animal rescuing organization had coaxed the 6-month-old puppy out of the rubble with hot dogs.

A veterinarian found Dexter to be malnourished, but without any major injuries.

Montgomery says as soon as the dog saw him "his tail started going."

I'm not a big one on celebrities and award shows, but my law firm represents the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, which is how I found myself in the audience last week as Angelina Jolie received the Jean Hersholt Humanitarian Award. I did not expect to be deeply moved. I was.

Jolie is, of course, beautiful — no less so, by the way (and a number of people have asked), since her double mastectomy. The film clips showing her visiting refugee camps in danger zones around the world were riveting. But it was her speech that left an indelible print on my heart.

Looking around the room of well-heeled Hollywood types, she said simply: “We are all so fortunate.” We are, in fact, the luckiest people on the face of the globe, but sometimes — when you're lonely or scared or tired or depressed, and I am, sometimes, all of those things — it is hard to remember that. Knowing that others suffer so much more does not bring happiness.

“I have never understood why some people are lucky enough to be born with the chance that I had, to have this path in life, and why across the world, there

is a woman just like me, with the same abilities and the same desires, the same work ethic and love for her family, who would most likely make better films and better speeches, only she sits in a refugee camp, and she has no voice.”

I don't know that she would make better films and better speeches, but surely there are millions of women who love their families as Jolie does, and as I do, and have no choice but to watch powerlessly as they suffer.

And knowing that may not bring happiness, but it does bring a sense of purpose. I have a little paperweight, and the message is simple: “The purpose of life is a life of purpose.”

I believe that. Not all of us are in a position to do what Jolie does. But every one of us is in a position to help.

I don't really have hobbies. I'm not much for sports or museums or adventure travel. The happiest time in my life was when my children were young, still living at home, when I was overwhelmed with my love for them and not my missing them.

And what next? What now? The most satisfying thing I do, I have come to realize, is help others. The truth is, it makes me happy. Sometimes I get taken advantage of. It happens. But mostly, I feel that when I help others, I feel better. For me, it is a blessing.

Jolie lost her mother to ovarian cancer. Her speech was a tribute from the heart to her mother, who drove her to auditions and celebrated her successes. But even as they jumped up and down in celebration, Jolie said, “She was very clear that nothing would mean anything if I didn't live a life of use to others.”

My father was a lawyer in private practice in Lynn, Mass. (“Lynn, Lynn, city of sin” was one of the nicer descriptions.) He never made much money, and he died at 54. When I was growing up, my father's “clients” were forever doing things for us. The television repairman, the guy who fixed the car and the guy who put down the linoleum were my father's clients. There was one guy who sent us handmade cribbage sets from jail. What I didn't understand until much later was that these were people who couldn't afford to pay for my father's help, and that in asking for their help, instead of sending a bill, my father was respecting their dignity.

There are many ways to help people.

Thanksgiving is a time to be grateful, certainly. But it is also a time to find the joy and satisfaction that comes from a life of purpose.

Dinero and demographics

Only two months ago, this column suggested the pro-immigrant movement was very myopic and planned only for the next battle in Congress instead of who gets sent to Congress on Election Day.

“Where are the pro-immigrant troops lining up to take on the GOP demagogues who spew xenophobia?” I asked. “Where is the effort to make the House of Representatives a little more immigrant-friendly?”

The headline noted that in order “To Reform Immigration,” we would have to “Depose the Xenophobes.”

Yet today — sooner than I expected — I'm happy to report that many other people have finally come to the same sobering conclusion: If you have a large number of Hispanic constituents and continue to oppose immigration reform, you give us no choice; we will make you pay for it at the ballot box.

In just the last two months, we have seen the emergence of a new political advocacy organization that is “planning to spend as much as \$20 million on campaigns targeting members of Congress who have sizable Latino communities in their districts but oppose comprehensive immigration reform,” according to the Washington Post.

The new group, an offspring of a network of Latino donors who raised funds for President Barack Obama's reelection, is appropriately called “The Latino Victory Project,” and is already targeting House Republicans who represent districts where Latino voters could boot the hardliners out of office.

Its members have reportedly vowed to spend \$1-2 million in campaigns in each of the targeted districts to persuade these lawmakers to either support immigration reform this year or face an intensive media campaign against them when they run for reelection next year.

Now we're talking! And it gets better. This group is part of a larger coalition of immigrant rights advocates, unions, clerics, law enforcement officials and business leaders, who have finally come to realize hardball is the only game hardliners know how to play.

This coalition created the “Cost of Inaction” voter education and outreach campaign, which specifically targets nine Republicans who have growing immigrant electorates and could suffer a backlash for having alienated immigrants in the past.

Mind you, they may not be going after the best-known immigrant bashers. Regardless of how obnoxious they may be, there is no sense wasting time trying to defeat demagogues from flaming-red, gerrymandered districts where Republican incumbents only fear challenges from the right in GOP primaries.

They are wisely going after Republicans who can be defeated, in districts where the Latino vote could make a difference. They are not pursuing prominent immigrant bashers like Rep. Steve King in Iowa, but are after many other extremists who share King's draconian ideas, including Reps. Buck McKeon, R-Calif.; Gary Miller, R-Calif.; Mike Coffman, R-Colo.; Scott Tipton, R-Colo.; Daniel Webster, R-Fla.; Steve Pearce, R-N.M.; and Joe Heck, R-Nev.

It makes a lot of sense! Amazingly, some of the targeted Republicans are already trying to inoculate themselves

by modifying their former positions. Two of them — Reps. Jeff Denham, R-Calif., and David Valadao, R-Calif. — actually came out in support of H.R. 15, a House comprehensive reform bill resembling one that passed the Senate in June and included a legalization program for the 11 million undocumented immigrants already living in the U.S.

Unfortunately, nowadays, this is the American way of winning political fights. When you threaten them with “dinero” and demographics, politicians are able to flip-flop abruptly and even find compassion for immigrants they never knew they had!

Luckily, immigrant rights advocates are no longer falling for cheap lip-service and empty rhetoric. They know that if H.R. 15 were allowed to come for a vote on the floor of the House, it would pass. And they are calling on Denham, Valadao and other Republicans, who suddenly claim to be our amigos, to pressure House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, to allow that vote to take place.

Some Republicans have said they would show Boehner “how much support there is for full reform,” meaning we now have Republicans calling on other Republicans to release the choking grip the GOP has had on the immigrant community for so long. That's progress!

Two months ago, I called for “a national campaign to rid the country of elected xenophobia demagogues.” I knew the power of dinero and demographics could make some Republicans suddenly become our best friends. But I never expected to see it this soon, or that it would be so effective!

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has gone:
West North East South
1♦ Dble Redble ?
What would you bid with each of the following five hands?
1. ♠6♥J963♦J754♣8732
2. ♠K1053♥Q1053♦10♣J984
3. ♠KJ87642♥8♦73♣542
4. ♠Q53♥10962♦72♣Q763
5. ♠Q62♥J107642♦A43♣8

1. **One heart.** Whether or not to bid over a redouble is more a matter of common sense than convention. A pass indicates that there is nothing to be gained by bidding, while a bid indicates that it is unwise to pass.

Here, the aim of the one-heart bid is to avoid the awkward situation that could arise if you were to pass and partner bid one spade, your worst suit. The heart bid does not promise any values; it can be based merely on heart length and/or the obligation to keep partner out of trouble.

2. **Pass.** This is a fairly good hand opposite a takeout double, but there is no need to respond at this point since partner has a bid coming, and you have support for any suit he

names.
3. **Three spades.** This is not a strong bid, but instead indicates extra spade length and very limited high-card strength. Partner is expected to pass unless he has values in excess of a minimum double. While the chief purpose of the three-spade bid is to interfere with the opponents, it also implies substantial offensive strength if spades are trumps.

4. **Pass.** Here it is better to let partner seek his own salvation. You can't be sure which suit should be trump, so you let him make the choice. You're at least moderately prepared for any suit he chooses.

Note the difference between this hand and the first one. There you bid one heart because of the danger that partner, left to his own devices, might bid spades. Here there is no good reason to fear that action.

5. **Two hearts.** The jump to two hearts informs partner that your side may have a game in hearts. The bid is not forcing and shows a stronger hand than a jump to three hearts, which would be pre-emptive, as in No. 3 above. If partner does not accept your invitation, game is unlikely.

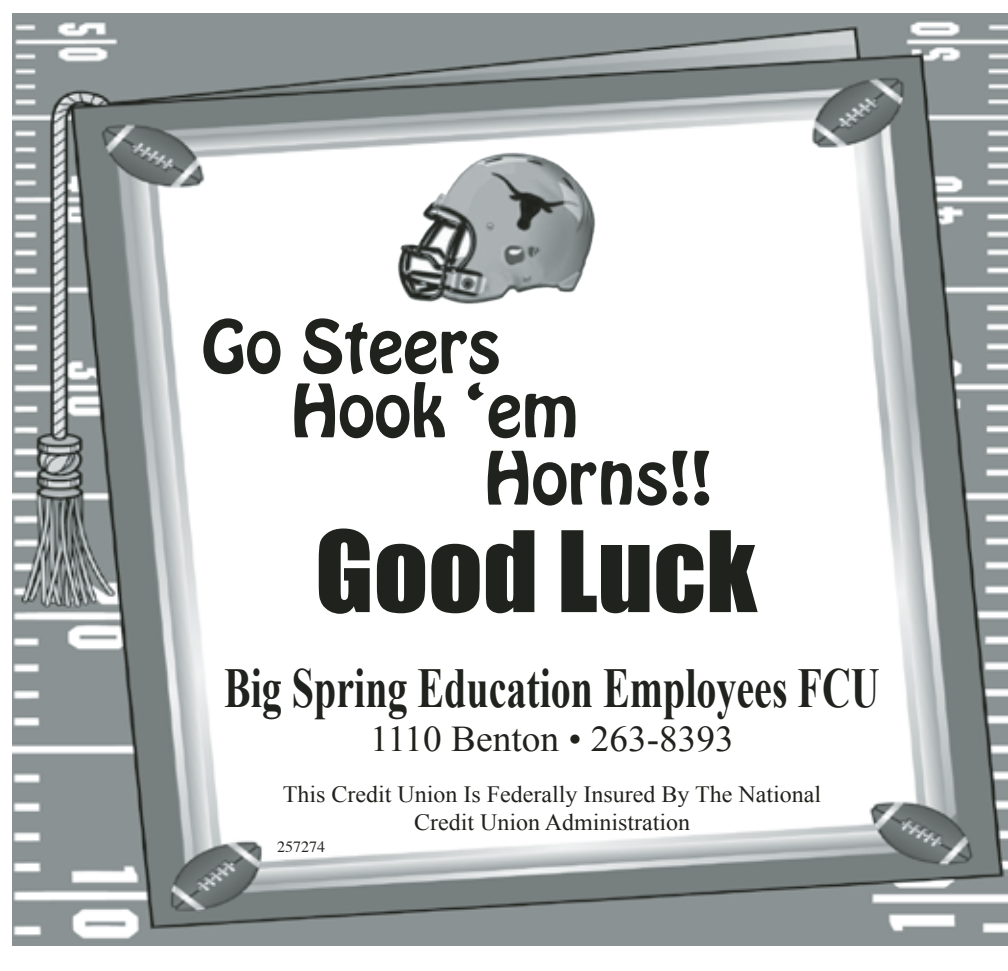

It is in those troubled times that we must hang on through the storms of life so that we can develop the kind of proven character that yields hope for the future. News in brief

Parishioners relocate after fire at Ohio church

CARDINGTON, Ohio (AP) — A priest from one Ohio county's only Roman Catholic church says parishioners will move services to a nearby church for the start of the Christmas season after a fire destroyed their decades-old building.

Authorities in Morrow County say the fire early Thursday destroyed Sacred Hearts Church in Cardington, about 40 miles north of Columbus.

No cause was immediately determined. The Mount Gilead fire chief tells WCMH-TV that a priest locked the church Wednesday night and there was no indication anyone was inside when the blaze started.

The Rev. John Bakle tells The Columbus Dispatch that parishioners remain positive despite the Thanksgiving Day loss. He says the congregation of 200 families will have services Sunday at a Methodist church in Mount Gilead.

Egypt Islamists rally despite protest law

CAIRO (AP) — Egyptian security forces fired tear gas Friday to disperse hundreds of Islamist demonstrators defying a new protest law that has drawn widespread criticism from the international community and democracy advocates.

Since a popularly backed military coup ousted Islamist President Mohammed Morsi in July, his supporters have been staging near-daily protests calling for his reinstatement, with Friday's weekly Muslim prayers a key time for mobilizing their largest numbers. The rallies have often descended into street clashes with security forces or civilians.

In an effort to quash rallies Morsi supporters have managed to sustain despite a sharp security crackdown, authorities adopted the law Sunday, restricting the right to protest. Among other rules, it requires organizers to notify the Interior Ministry three days before holding a protest, while also setting prison terms and high fines for violators.

Since the law was enacted, security forces forcefully dispersed several protests, including one organized by non-Islamist activists. Clashes at a student demonstration left one dead Thursday. The Interior Ministry warned on Thursday that security forces will deal "firmly" with "illegal" protests organized by Morsi's Muslim Brotherhood group.

Friday's clashes erupted when security forces moved to disperse the scattered protests organized by Islamists across the country. In one western Cairo neighborhood, police fired tear gas as protesters hurled stones and burnt tires, security officials said.

Tax officials sue over exemptions for Macon church

MACON, Ga. (AP) — Local tax assessors want a court to force a Macon church to pay more property taxes.

The Macon Telegraph reports that the Macon-Bibb County Board of Tax Assessors has filed two lawsuits against Tremont Temple Missionary Baptist Church.

The assessors want to reverse decisions by another government body — the Board of Equalization — to continue giving the church tax exemptions for property not currently in use.

One of the properties in question has been for sale for seven years and vacant for most of that time. The church wants to sell the building to a private developer.

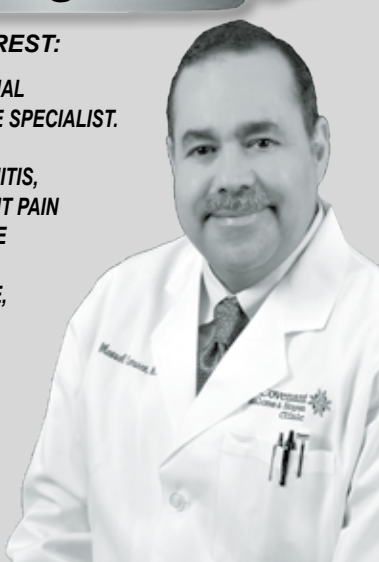
The church is claiming property tax exemptions usually granted to religious organizations.

"Champions look like defending state champs," Ritchey said of the Yellow Jackets, whose only loss came to

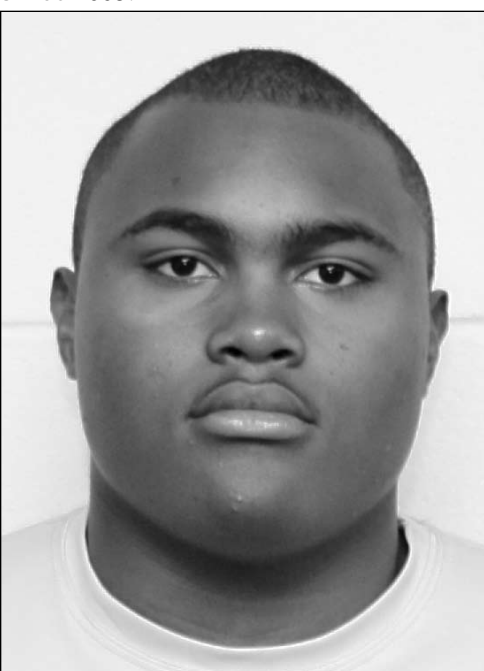
Aledo.

Romo, Cowboys top Raiders 31-24 after slow start

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Tony Romo had a virus, and his offense was looking a little pale too.

The Dallas quarterback covered everything with one quick drive just before halftime.

Romo directed a momentum-turning march to the second of three touchdowns for DeMarco Murray, backup Lance Dunbar led the Cowboys with a career-high 82 yards rushing and Dallas overcame the shock of Oakland's fumble return for a touchdown on the opening kickoff to beat the Raiders 31-24 on Thursday.

After getting sick the night before Thanksgiving, Romo found himself behind 7-0 before taking his first snap, and his offense didn't have a yard in the second quarter when he took the field down 21-7 with less than 2 minutes remaining before halftime.

Five completions from Romo later, Murray scored on a 4-yard run 10 seconds before halftime and set the stage for a second-half rally that put the Cowboys (7-5)

two games above .500 for the first time since late last season.

Dallas is at least temporarily ahead of Philadelphia (6-5) atop the NFC East.

"Teams can go one of two ways there," Romo said. "And I'm just proud of the guys the way they committed and kept grinding and getting better and better throughout the game."

Matt McGloin, an undrafted rookie quarterback making his third career start, had a strong first half for the Raiders.

But without much help from the league's fifth-best rushing attack, his offense stalled in the second half as Oakland (4-8) clinched an 11th straight season without a winning record since going to the Super Bowl during the 2002 season.

"I don't know if he played as well as he did in some of the previous weeks, but I still thought he did some good things," said Raiders coach Dennis Allen, the league's youngest

"I thought it worked out very well," Walz said. "It was a promotion to say thank you to all our friends. I never dreamed it would turn into such national attention. I was trying to

Texas still alive with win over Tech

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — After a 1-2 start, Texas coach Mack Brown was mocked for suggesting the Longhorns could win for a Big 12 title.

Nearly three months later, the league crown is still out there for the taking if Texas can get one more win and some help from an old rival.

Case McCoy passed for two touchdowns and ran for another and Texas kept its Big 12 title hopes alive Thursday night with a 41-16 win over Texas Tech.

Joe Bergeron ran for 102 yards and a touchdown for the Longhorns (8-3, 7-1 Big 12), who end their regular season on Dec. 7 at No. 9 Baylor. If Texas wins that game and No. 7 Oklahoma State loses to No. 20 Oklahoma, the Longhorns would claim their first league championship since 2009.

"Our focus was to put ourselves in position for that game to have meaning. We did that," McCoy said. "As crazy as this season

has gone, we have a chance to do that."

Any chance of a Big 12 title seemed remote when Texas dropped consecutive blowout losses to BYU and Ole Miss in early September. With his national title hopes dashed, Brown turned his team's focus to winning the Big 12.

The Longhorns reeled off six straight wins before they stumbled with a 38-13 home loss to Oklahoma State on Nov. 16. That defeat rekindled speculation that Brown's job is in jeopardy and whether Thursday night could be his last home game after 16 seasons.

Texas responded to the 25-point home loss — the worst of Brown's tenure — with a 25-point win that sets up at least the potential for a title and a Bowl Championship Series berth.

"They've got a lot of pride," Brown said. "We've got to regroup to give it one more shot."

Thursday night also was the fi-

nal home game for a senior class that signed with Texas just a month after the Longhorns lost to Alabama in the 2009 season championship game.

That group likely expected to contend for Big 12 and national championships every year, but instead has gone 30-19 overall with an 18-16 mark in the Big 12. If they don't win the Big 12 title, they will be first Texas senior class since 1989 to not win or share a conference or division championship.

"It's big," Texas senior defensive Jackson Jeffcoat said after getting three of the Longhorns' nine sacks on the night. "We had to win this one. We have to win the next one."

Texas Tech (7-5, 4-5) ended its regular season with its fifth consecutive loss under first-year coach Kliff Kingsbury.

"We're making too many mistakes against

say, "The first drink's on me. Thanks for coming out and I appreciate how loyal you are."

Kansas State gained attention a week earlier when the school offered 300 pounds of free bacon to students who attended the women's team's season opener. That promotion also worked, bringing in twice as many students as last year's average. Each student came away with five strips of bacon, and the Wildcats walked away with a victory.

The Wildcats had tried a similar promotion nine years earlier when the school offered \$1 hot dogs during a basketball game against Rutgers. So many fans took advantage of the promotion that Kansas State ran out before half-time.

Not this time.

No. 14 Colorado had its own idea of how to draw more students to its home game against Iowa on Nov. 20 — offer men's basketball tickets for the game against Kansas. More than 2,000 students showed up and saw the Buffaloes win a 90-87 thriller.

"To have the fan support

we did was pretty awesome," Colorado coach Linda Lappe said. "They got a great show and helped us. It was a real advantage having the students there, which made it feel more like a college atmosphere."

Lappe knows that a loud student section can have a greater impact at a women's game.

"Men's teams see it all the time, whereas it's a lot rarer in women's games," she said. "When we first got here we had maybe five students, now we get like 200. The students make it a fun environment. They are funny, have great sayings and dress in funny costumes."

good teams," Kingsbury said. "We got away with it earlier in the year against teams that weren't as good."

The Red Raiders came in with the nation's top passing offense, but allowed the Longhorns to chase freshman quarterback Baker Mayfield the entire game. Mayfield passed for 237 yards, but the Red Raiders' biggest play came on a 51-yard touchdown on a fake punt by Ryan Erxleben in the first quarter.

Mike Davis caught touchdowns of 47 and 7 yards for Texas and Malcolm Brown rushed for

128 yards. Anthony Fera kicked field goals of 37 and 49 yards, tying the Texas record by making 15 in a row this season.

The fake punt gave Texas Tech an early 7-0 lead before the Longhorns responded with Fera's first field goal and McCoy's long touchdown pass to Davis in the first quarter.

"I just threw it as far as I could," McCoy said.

Texas pushed the lead to 20-7 when Bergeron rumbled 12 yards for a touchdown, a play set up by a 43-yard completion from Jaxon Shipley to Davis on a double-reverse pass.

McCoy's second career rushing touchdown came in the third quarter.

head coach making his first appearance near the Dallas suburb of Hurst, where he grew up.

Five things to consider after the Cowboys won the second straight Thanksgiving meeting between these teams:

SHOCKING START: Dallas was without kick returner Dwayne Harris because of a hamstring injury, and rookie replacement Terrance Williams gave the Raiders a touchdown with a fumble on the opening kickoff.

Greg Jenkins picked up the ball at the 23 after it squirted away from the pile and outran everyone to the pylon. The play was upheld on review after replay showed Williams' knee hitting the turf just as

the ball was coming out. "To have the opening kickoff fumbled and returned for a touchdown and then be down a couple of scores in the first half, nobody blinked," Cowboys coach Jason Garrett said.

SURPRISING RUN TOTALS: Oakland's Rashad Jennings rushed for 35 yards on 17 carries — a 2.1-yard average — and had both of Oakland's offensive touchdowns on 1-yard runs. Darren McFadden carried just five times for 13 yards in his return after missing three games with a hamstring injury. The Raiders finished with 50 yards rushing — 1 more than their season low — while the Cowboys came with the league's 29th-ranked rushing offense and had 144 yards on the ground, their second-best total of the year. "We didn't tackle," Raiders linebacker Kevin Burnett

said. "We would hit them in the backfield, and we'd have six guys round them and we'd let them go."

COWBOYS TANDEM: Murray had just 25 yards after his third TD, but ran for another 38 to finish with 63 and help Dallas burn the clock with a seven-point lead in the fourth quarter.

Most of the late damage came on a drive to Dan Bailey's 19-yard field goal to put Dallas up by 10 with 1:56 left. Murray, who tied the score at 7-all on a 2-yard run the first play after a fumble by McGloin late in the first quarter, also had 39 yards receiving. Dunbar, who went out with a left knee sprain in the fourth quarter, sparked the tying and go-ahead touchdown drives in the second half, highlighted by a 45-yard run that led to a 4-yard scoring pass from

Romo to Dez Bryant, who had seven catches for 61 yards.

CAREER DAY: Andre Holmes, who played seven games for the Cowboys last year before ending up on the practice squad, had career highs with seven catches for 136 yards. He had only three catches for 65 yards in his first five games for the Raiders. He was a big part of McGloin converting five straight third downs with passes on a pair of touchdown drives in the second quarter. He had a 16-yard score overturned on review, but Jennings scored from the 1 on the next play. "It felt good," Holmes said. "I had a calendar, I checked it, wanted to come here and play well against the team I played for."

INJURY UPDATE: Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said he didn't think Dunbar's knee

injury was serious, and the Cowboys have 10 days off before playing Chicago on Dec. 9. Raiders guard Mike Brisiel injured a knee on Oakland's first offensive play and didn't return. Oakland cor-

nerback Mike Jenkins, who spent his first five seasons with the Cowboys, had a tackle for loss, a pass breakup and a forced fumble before leaving with a shoulder injury in the fourth quarter.

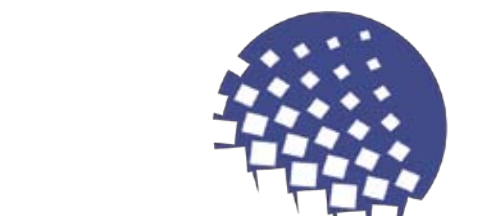
