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Council to consider force policy

Big Spring City Council will consider a resolution spelling out the city's stance on excessive force by law enforcement personnel when they meet in regular session at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday

The city recently received grant money from the Texas Department of Agriculture, officials said. As part of the agreement on accepting those funds, the city is required to adopt a formal resolution defining its stance on excessive force by law enforcement.

The resolution the council will consider Tuesday reads in part: It is the policy of the City of Big Spring to prohibit the use of excessive force by the law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individual engaged in nonviolent civil rights demonstrations. The City also prohibits the physical barring of any entrance to, or exit from, such a facility within its jurisdiction."

The resolution goes on to state the city shall enforce its policy "to the fullest extent of the law" and establishes a policy for persons to file grievances.

The policy will take effect immediately upon final approval by the council.

In other business Tuesday, council will consider:

• Emergency reading of a resolution authorizing the filing of two grant applications with the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission under the Regional Solid Waste Grant Program.

• A budget amendment of slightly more than \$8,000 to complete funding of a solid waste study previously authorized by the council.

 Approval of an interlocal Agreement with the South Plains Association of Governments for assistance with a Texas Community Development Grant from the Texas Department of Agriculture for water improvement



Texas 2014 candidate

filing deadline hours away

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Political hopefuls statewide have only a few more hours to throw their hats into the 2014 electoral ring. The close of business Monday is the filing dead-

line for necessary paperwork to compete in Texas primaries March 4, with winners advancing to November's general election. Of the 15 statewide offices up for election, 36 Re-

publicans and 15 Democrats have filed with the secretary of state's office. A Democrat hasn't won statewide office since

1994, and the party may struggle even fielding a candidate for all possible slots. No Democrat has yet filed for any of the four Texas Supreme Court and three Court of Criminal Appeals races. Still, next year's much-watched race to replace

Gov. Rick Perry looks set, pitting Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott against Democratic state Sen. Wendy Davis.

Travel slowly improves days after Texas ice storm

DALLAS (AP) — Travel began to slowly return to normal as temperatures warmed in North Texas on Monday following an ice storm that forced the cancellation of hundreds of flights, closed schools and cut electricity to thousands of homes and busi-

The Texas Department of Transportation said in a late Sunday statement that it had reopened all major highways in the areas hardest hit by the wintry weather. Bridges could remain icy and the agency urged drivers to use caution Monday as the National Weather Service forecast temperatures would be in the upper 30s, giving way to warmer conditions and sunny skies by Tuesday.

Over the weekend, church services were canceled, some businesses closed and grocery stores scrambled to keep up with demand in the Dallas-Fort Worth area due to freezing temperatures.

Fort Worth-based American Airlines and American Eagle canceled 700 flights on Monday, mainly in North Texas. The carriers on a typical day operate about 3,500 flights, said spokeswoman Dori

About 650 people were stranded Sunday night at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, said David Magana, an airport spokesman. About 2,000 travelers were stranded there on Saturday night, while Friday night about 4,000 travelers were stranded, he said. Four of the five regularly used runways were open Monday.

"It's signs of progress," Magana said.

South Texan charged with killing toddler son

JOURDANTON, Texas (AP) - A South Texas woman has been charged in the stabbing death of her toddler son.

Atascosa (a-tuhs-KOH'-suh) County jail records show 26-year-old Tashawna Cadwell was being held Monday on a charge of capital murder of a child younger than 6 years old. Jail records don't list an attorney for Caldwell, whose bond was set at \$1 million.

Investigators are trying to determine what prompted the attack early Sunday at a home near Poteet. Deputies responded to a disturbance call. Sheriff David Soward says the boy, Caiden Parker, was dead at the scene. The victim would have

turned 2 years old on Wednesday.

A second woman and an older child, who suffered minor injuries, were at the home where Caldwell

Poteet is 25 miles south of San Antonio.

Chief: Wounded San Antonio officer may not survive

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A San Antonio police officer was shot in the head and critically wounded before daybreak Sunday during a car chase with armed robbery suspects, authorities said. San Antonio Police Chief William McManus

asked for prayers for the officer, whom he identified as Robert Deckard, 31, a seven-year veteran of the department. Deckard was in intensive care after surgery at San Antonio Military Medical Cen-McManus said Sunday afternoon doctors were

not optimistic Deckard would survive. "The prognosis has not gotten any better," he

Two people, identified only as a 32-year-old man

and 28-year-old woman, were taken into custody after dawn Sunday in a rural area south of the city in neighboring Wilson County as police using tracking dogs and helicopters joined the hunt. Their names and details of their capture weren't immediately released. There were few details about the shooting, but

authorities believed the chase began after a convenience store robbery early Sunday. The people in the vehicle took off and officers gave chase out of the city down Interstate 37. Eventually, gunfire was exchanged as speeds reached 100 mph. The officer crashed after he was hit with a bullet

that went through his car's windshield. Sgt. Marcial Luevano told the San Antonio Ex-

press-News that Deckard normally works in north San Antonio but was filling in on a shift on the city's south side.

South Texas jury awards \$281 million in lawsuit

CARRIZO SPRINGS, Texas (AP) — The family of a man killed by a part breaking off a truck doing Eagle Ford Shale oilfield work has won a \$281 million lawsuit judgment from a South Texas jury.

The Dimmit County lawsuit stemmed from the May, 29, 2012, death of Carlos Aguilar. He was struck by a drive shaft from a tractor-trailer truck belonging to Heckmann Water Resources, an oil patch supplier in Pleasanton, near San Antonio. Aguilar was in a pickup hit by the flying piece

that went through the windshield, killing him.

A jury late Thursday agreed with a negligence lawsuit by Aguilar's family that Heckmann didn't properly maintain the truck. The verdict included \$100 million in punitive damages.

Company attorney Rick Reyna didn't immediately respond to a message Sunday from The Associated Press.

Travis County DA facing civil suit; could be fired

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg heads to court this week as a defendant in a civil trial that could result in her ouster from office.

The trial, set to start Monday in Austin before a visiting judge from San Antonio, stems from Lehmberg's drunken driving arrest in April. She pleaded guilty within days, was sentenced to 45 days in jail and took a leave of absence to check into rehab. Lehmberg, who a year ago had been elected overwhelmingly to a second four-year term, then re-

But a petition seeking her removal was filed by Austin attorney Kerry O'Brien under a state law that allows the removal of elected officials for "incompetency," "official misconduct" or "intoxication on or off duty caused by drinking an alcoholic beverage." Anyone living in a county for six months can file a petition there.

"I think the integrity of the office is compromised as long as she is there," O'Brien told the Austin American-Statesman.

Lone abortion clinic in Corpus Christi sees surge CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The physician

who runs an abortion clinic in Corpus Christi says his patient load has tripled since similar clinics in the Rio Grande Valley have closed because of tougher state-imposed restrictions.

Dr. Eduardo Aquino's clinic is the only one along the Texas Coastal Bend. He tells the Corpus Christi Caller-Times he

doesn't need to continue the procedures but believes women should have access to them. Aquino has been based in San Antonio for 13

years but retained admitting privileges at a Corpus Christi medical system. That puts him in compliance with a state requirement that physicians who perform abortions must have admitting privileges at hospitals within 30 miles. Aquino also says his clinic may be too small and

outdated to comply with other state provisions taking effect in 2014.

North Texas has 3.7 magnitude earthquake

MINERAL WELLS, Texas (AP) — North Texas has had another earthquake in the same general area where more than a dozen minor quakes were recorded in November.

The U.S. Geological Survey says a 3.7 magnitude earthquake happened at 3:23 a.m. CST Monday and was centered about 11 miles north-northeast of Mineral Wells.

The Parker County Sheriff's Office did not immediate have any reports of damage or injuries.

Other recent minor earthquakes happened in the Reno and Azle (AY'-zil) areas, about 20 miles northeast of Fort Worth.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Just in time for the holidays, a Texas lawmaker is making extra sure everyone remembers wishing someone "Merry Christmas" is now protected by law in public schools

Houston Republican Rep. Dwayne Bohac is holding a state Capitol press conference Monday with his son Reagan and with Santa Claus.

He sponsored a bipartisan measure that garnered national attention when it sailed through the Legislature this summer. It removes legal risks from exchanging holiday greetings in the classroom, and also protects holiday symbols such as a menorah or nativity scene.

Thousands of South African police prepare for mourners, statesmen coming to Mandela ceremony JOHANNESBURG (AP) — Thousands of South Af-

rican police officers will be on hand at a ceremony honoring Nelson Mandela in a Soweto soccer stadium, and authorities will block access to the site if crowds become too large, officials said Monday. Mourners including dozens heads of state are

expected to flock to the 95,000-capacity stadium for Tuesday's memorial for the anti-apartheid icon. Mandela made his last public appearance at the same stadium for the closing ceremony of the 2010 World Cup, when the venue was called Soccer

Lt. Gen. Solomon Makgale, a spokesman for the South African Police Service, said "thousands" of officers will direct traffic, protect mourners and help the bodyguards of visiting dignitaries. "We will be on hand to make sure people are able

to grieve in a safe environment," Makgale told The Associated Press. Makgale said a joint taskforce of police, diplo-

mats and intelligence service personnel already have been making plans and talking to the foreign delegations who plan to attend the ceremony.

Obama to pay tribute to Mandela, attend memorial service in South Africa

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama will pay tribute this week to Nelson Mandela, making the long trip from Washington to South Africa Monday to attend a national memorial service for the anti-apartheid icon.

Tuesday's memorial service will also serve as a rare reunion of nearly all the living American presidents. George W. Bush and his wife, Laura, will accompany Obama and first lady Michelle Obama on Air Force One, while former Presidents Bill Clinton and Jimmy Carter will travel separately to South Africa.

George H.W. Bush is the only living president who will not attend. His spokesman said the 89-year-old is no longer able to travel long distances.

The American leaders will join dozens of other dignitaries and tens of thousands of mourners at the memorial service at a Johannesburg stadium. Mandela will be buried Dec. 15, following a state funeral in his hometown of Qunu.

Obama has called Mandela a personal hero, and his own political rise has drawn inevitable comparisons to the former South African leader. Each was his nation's first black president and a winner of the Nobel Peace Prize — though those close to the U.S. leader say he is aware of the vast differences in the politicians' experiences.

Powerful storm moving up East Coast dumps snow,

travel headaches abound

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A plodding storm that dumped heavy snow on the unsuspecting Mid-Atlantic region threatened to make roads dicey in the northeast corridor for Monday's commute while travel disruptions continued to ripple across the country days after the same system first began wreaking havoc in the skies.

The seemingly never-ending storm that coated parts of Texas in ice struck with unexpected force on the East Coast, blanketing some spots in a foot of snow and grinding highways to a halt.

Travel problems could linger into Monday afternoon, with freezing rain and icy conditions sticking around as wintry weather stretched from Missouri to Maine.

The storm canceled more than 2,500 flights Sunday and delayed thousands more, according to estimates from the website Flightaware.com. More than 1,000 of Monday's flights were already canceled, the greatest share from Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport, which was still reeling from the effects of the ice storm that brought North Texas to a standstill.

The forecast for Monday remained up in the air for the northeast, depending on how quickly the system moves and temperatures rise, according to the National Weather Service. Meanwhile, a winter storm warning was in effect until 10 a.m. for Washington, D.C., and Baltimore where up to a quarter inch of ice was expected because of freezing rain that could cause power outages.

More socially liberal, America's new rich are wielding power but may foil income equality

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's not just the wealthiest

Fully 20 percent of U.S. adults become rich for parts of their lives, wielding outsize influence on America's economy and politics. This little-known group may pose the biggest barrier to reducing the nation's income inequality. The growing numbers of the U.S. poor have been

well documented, but survey data provided to The Associated Press detail the flip side of the record income gap — the rise of the "new rich."

Made up largely of older professionals, working married couples and more educated singles, the new rich are those with household income of \$250,000 or more at some point during their working lives. That puts them, if sometimes temporarily, in the top 2 percent of earners.

Even outside periods of unusual wealth, members of this group generally hover in the \$100,000-plus income range, keeping them in the top 20 percent of earners.

Congress ready to renew plastic gun curb as Newtown anniversary underscores lack of gains

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate vote to renew an expiring ban on plastic firearms capable of evading metal detectors and X-ray machines is shaping up as a bittersweet moment for gun control supporters, days before the anniversary of the deadly mass shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Con-

Monday's vote to extend the prohibition on plastic guns for another decade responds to a growing threat from steadily improving 3-D printers that can produce such weapons. But gun control advocates seem sure to lose an effort to impose additional, tougher restrictions on plastic firearms — a harsh reminder of their failure to enact any new federal gun curbs in the year since 20 first-graders and six educators were murdered in Newtown, Conn.

The slayings last Dec. 14 prompted the newly reelected President Barack Obama to push gun control to the top of his domestic agenda. But Congress approved nothing, and gun control advocates face the same uphill struggle in 2014, complicated by internal divisions over what their next step should

"The gun lobby still has enormous power in Washington — more, frankly, than I thought they still had," said Sen. Chris Murphy, D-Conn., who represented Newtown last year while in the House.

Illustrating the roadblocks that have thwarted gun control forces, an effort by Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., to make plastic guns more detectable by requiring them to have a permanent metal part seems certain to fail Monday. His plan is opposed by Republicans and the National Rifle Associa-

likely to satisfy opponents who want to rid Thailand of her powerful family's influence. The protesters are pushing for a non-elected "people's council" to replace her democratically elected government. Thailand has been plagued by major bouts of up-

heaval Yingluck's brother Thaksin was toppled in

a 2006 army coup that laid bare a deeper conflict

between the elite and the educated middle-class against Thaksin's power base in the countryside, which benefited from populist policies designed to win over the rural poor. An attempt by Yingluck's party last month to pass

a bill through Parliament that would have granted amnesty to Thaksin and others triggered the latest "After listening to opinions from all sides, I

have decided to request a royal decree to dissolve Parliament," said Yingluck, her voice shaking as she spoke in a nationally televised address Monday morning that broke into regular programing. "There will be new elections according to the democratic system."

North Korea purges Kim Jong Un's influential uncle over "depraved life" of corruption, drugs

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North Korea announced Monday it had sacked leader Kim Jong Un's uncle, long considered the country's No. 2 power, saying corruption, drug use, gambling, womanizing and generally leading a "dissolute and depraved life" had caused Pyongyang's highestprofile fall from grace since Kim took power two

The removal of Jang Song Thack, once seen as Kim's mentor, is the most significant in a series of purges the young leader has conducted in an apparent effort to bolster his power since his father's 2011 death. But worries remained over whether the expulsion of such a senior figure could instead lead to less stability and open up the possibility of a power struggle.

The confirmation that Pyongyang had "eliminated Jang and purged his group," carried in an unusually detailed and lengthy dispatch by the North's official Korean Central News Agency, was seen by some analysts as a warning against dissent. It came about a week after South Korea's spy agency said that two of Jang's closest assistants had been executed for corruption.

North Korean state TV showed a still image of two uniformed guards holding Jang by the arms at a meeting of the country's Political Bureau as dozens of dark-suited officials seated behind rows of long desks looked on.

Family of Pa. Amish schoolhouse shooter shares hopeful story of forgiveness, reconciliation

STRASBURG, Pa. (AP) — Once a week, Terri Roberts spends time with a 13-year-old Amish girl named Rosanna who sits in a wheelchair and eats through a tube. Roberts bathes her, sings to her, reads her stories. She can only guess what's going on inside Rosanna's mind because the girl can't

Roberts' son did this to her.

Seven years ago, Charles Carl Roberts IV barricaded himself inside an Amish schoolhouse near Lancaster, tied up 10 girls and opened fire, killing five and injuring five others before committing suicide as police closed in.

The Amish responded by offering immediate forgiveness to the killer — even attending his funeral and embracing his family.

Terri Roberts forgave, too, and now she is sharing her experience with others, saying the world needs more stories about the power of forgiveness and the importance of seeking joy through adversity.

Baylor, Knights to meet in Fiesta Bowl

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — The Baylor Bears had been the perennial patsies of the Big 12, stringing together 14 straight losing seasons following the demise of the Southwest Conference in 1996.

Art Briles changed the complexion of the program.

Capping a steady climb to respectability, the sixth-ranked Bears earned their first conference title in 33 years by beating Texas and were rewarded with a spot in the Fiesta Bowl alongside No. 15 Central Florida on New Year's Day.

"It's a big deal, a great accomplishment for the city of Waco, the state of Texas and the University of Baylor," Briles said after the official announcement Sunday night. "Anytime you play in a bowl with a big B, C and S, it's a big-time deal."

Baylor (11-1) did not have a winning record in the Big 12 before Briles ar-

rived in 2008, winning three or fewer games nine times. The Bears took baby steps at first,

winning four games in 2008 and 2009 before putting together their first winning record since 1995 the next

Baylor won 10 games in 2011, eight

in 2012 and became national title contenders this season with an offense that put up 51 more yards per game than any other team.

The Bears' national-title hopes fizzled with a lopsided loss to Oklahoma State on Nov. 23, a game that also put a dent in their BCS chances.

Saturday's games left no doubt Baylor was headed to a BCS bowl for the first time.

It started with Oklahoma's win over Oklahoma State in the Bedlam game, a victory that cost the Cowboys the Big 12 title and essentially made the Texas-Baylor game the de facto conference championship.

The Bears took care of it early, building a 17-3 lead on the way to a 30-10 win over the Longhorns to cap their first 11-win season and first conference title since winning the SWC in 1980.

After trips to the Texas, Alamo and Holiday bowls, Baylor is in the BCS and hoping to make it a regular appearance.

"Now that we've established ourselves as Big 12 champions, like I told the freshmen earlier today, it's not like we've reached the mountaintop," Briles said.

Annie's Mailbox ®

Dear Annie: I am a woman in my mid-30s, and think I may have been molested when I was young. I have little memory of my childhood up until age 13. But I do know that when my friends played with their Barbie dolls, they had her driving around, going on dates and dressing up pretty. I pretended she was having sex with Ken.

Other kids played house, but I pretended to be the dad and would get on top of my younger sister and rub against her. When I was 14, I made out with my 8-year-old stepcousin until his mother caught me, and for years after, he refused to talk to me. When I was 16, I kissed my best friend's 10-year-old brother.

I don't remember anything specifically. I only remember having a bad dream once that my dad molested me, and for years afterward, I didn't want to be near him. Our relationship still feels kind of strained. I don't know what to think anymore. What should I do? — Bewildered and Worried

Dear Bewildered: We would not presume to tell you what happened to you as a child, if anything actually did, or whether it involved your father. We suggest you seek therapy, although we do not recommend those who claim to specialize in "recovered" memories of abuse. This type of therapy is not reliable. Ask your doctor to refer you.

Dear Annie: We have a family member who wishes for us not to contact him anymore. Both of his parents are deceased. What do we do? -UpsetRelatives

Dear Upset: You must respect his wishes, even though it seems cruel. (We assume this family member is not under any type of duress from a partner who is trying to isolate him.) We would inform this relative that you will cease contact, as per his wishes. But add that you still care about him, and should he wish to resume contact, it always will be wel-

Dear Annie: "Little Sister in Need" told you about her abusive older brother, and you told her to "stop taking it personally"? She wasn't talking about disagreements. She cited his being "verbally, psychologically and at times physically abusive."

You should have told her that what's going on is abuse and, if he gets physical, constitutes domestic violence. She needs to talk to a domestic violence counselor and be alert for signs that he's also abusing his wife and child. Odds are that he is. Abusers rarely limit themselves to just one victim. — Judy

Dear Judy: Many readers agree with you, but we did not get the impression that the current abuse is physical. Sibling relationships are complicated, and there is often physical fighting and hitting when siblings are younger. While we don't condone such behavior, we also know that the physical side usually stops when the siblings reach adulthood. It does not necessarily carry over to his wife and child, nor does it seem so from her letter, although she certainly can investigate.

The fact that her brother continues to harangue her verbally indicates that he has anger and control issues. He lashes out at his sister because this is the dynamic they have had for 20 years. If speaking to a therapist would be helpful for her, we agree that this is an excellent idea. However, it also would help if she changed her response to her brother, not only because it would force him to change how he speaks to her, but also because it could improve her perception of her own strength in his presence. He is intimidating her, and she needs to stand up to him in a way that empowers her without exacerbating the situation.

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
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
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
