

# Kemp tells of visit to Arabia

The land of Saudi Arabia has great agricultural potential and compares in appearance with the land near El Paso, Carl Lee Kemp said in a talk to the Kiwanis Club Monday.

Kemp, Truman Touchstone and Lowell Neumayer recently traveled to Saudi Arabia at the invitation of an Arabian prince who wanted to develop some land and to learn more about American agriculture.

Although most farms there are small and belong to the government, some farms are privately owned and subsidized by the government, Kemp said, adding that the prince has a grant for his land.

Presently, much alfalfa is raised in the country. Wheat, potatoes and other vegetables are possibilities, he said. Learning how much wheat could be produced in a year "would be trial and error," Kemp added, since Saudi Arabia has a longer growing season than we have, with only one frost and an average of two inches of rainfall each year.

The Saudis prefer American products, people and labor, but they will usually choose the cheaper way of getting things done. The country imports most of its laborers and treats them poorly, he said.

The natives are never in a hurry and are generally friendly and courteous. The national guard is "matter of fact and business like," he added.

Saudi Arabia has strict laws, Kemp said. Bibles are not allowed; liquor, snuff and pornographic materials are confiscated; television is censored. Criminals are harshly punished or put to death at 12:30 p.m. each Friday in the public square.

Religious policemen patrol the four prayer times each day. During these times, all activities stop and stores close, Kemp added.

Women are considered secondary citizens. They wear long dresses, and many wear veils. Women, children and servants eat separately and later than the men, he said.

The three visitors from Dimmitt were invited to share a meal with the prince. They ate chicken and rice and drank camel's milk. Conforming to local custom, they ate with their right hands only, and without knife or fork.

Gasoline and diesel fuel cost only 25 cents a gallon in the oil-producing country. Everything there runs on diesel, Kemp added.

The three Americans had a difficult time getting out of Saudi Arabia when they discovered that they had overstayed their seven-day visa. On the eighth day, the prince had to use his influence to arrange their departure.

They received no assistance from either government for their venture, Kemp said, adding, "We accomplished a little on our own."

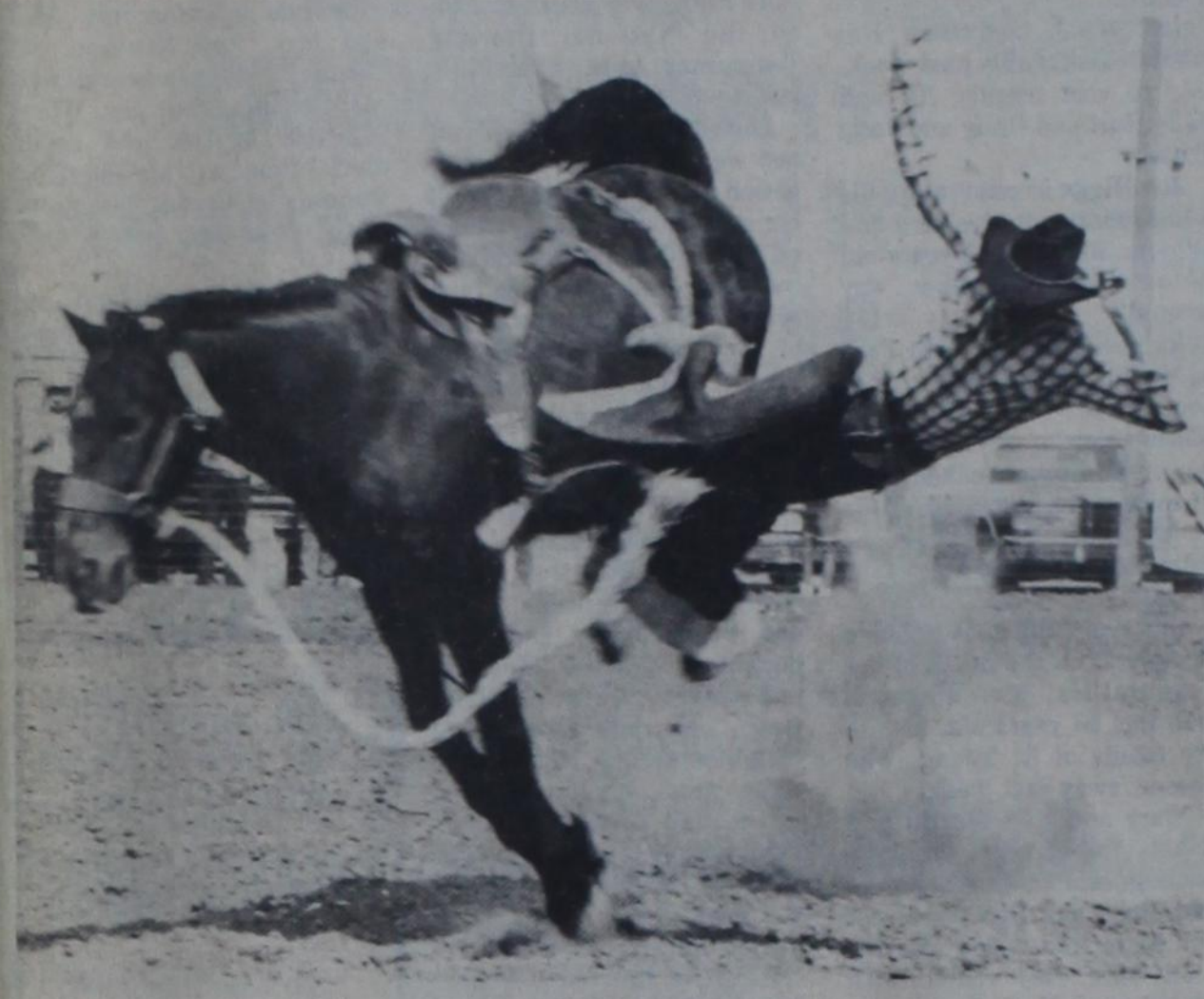

## Guggemos wins runoff in Precinct 4

Vincent Guggemos of Nazareth rang up a heavy majority in the rural boxes to defeat Thomas Falcon of Dimmitt for the Precinct 4 commissioner's nomination in Saturday's Democratic Primary runoff election.

Guggemos received 372 votes to Falcon's 282.

Falcon carried Box 4 (Northeast Dimmitt) with 265 votes to Guggemos' 84. Guggemos took a 15-3 margin in the absentee voting. He edged Falcon 13-2 in Box 8 (Jumbo) and 35-2 in Box 13 (Arney). His pivotal vote came in Box 12 (North Nazareth) where he got 225 votes to Falcon's 10.

In the statewide races, Castro County voters agreed with the rest of the state in only two of the four runoffs. Local voters favored Chuck Campbell for judge for the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1. The vote here was 259 for Campbell and 248 for John Humphreys.

County voters also favored Chuck Miller for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2. The vote was 279 for Miller and 233 for Bill Black.

Totals in Castro County for the other races include 322 votes for John Hannah to 257 for Jim Mattox in the attorney general's race and 296 votes for Pete Snelson to 277 for Garry Mauro in the Commissioner of General Land Office runoff race. Statewide, Mattox won the nomination for attorney general and Mauro captured the land commissioner's nomination.

Father Stanley Crocchiola, who has been the priest of the Holy Family Catholic Church in Nazareth for 13 years, will become the pastor of a parish in Stratford effective July 1. His successor will be Father Harry Waldo, who is presently serving the Church of the Holy Spirit in Tulia.

Bishop Leroy Matthesen of Amarillo also has appointed Father Waldo to serve St. John's Mission in Hart. The Hart church has been a

mission of the Immaculate Conception Parish of Dimmitt and served by Father Raphael Chen.

Father Stanley, a widely known historian, author and artist, has been an innovator in both parish and community life during his 13 years at Nazareth.

The Catholic Youth Organization at Nazareth was founded with his guidance and encouragement, and guitar masses were started on a regular basis. He also oversaw the construction of the new CCD building and taught Catechism classes there, as well as Bible classes.

One of Father Stanley's main dreams for his parish, the annual Nazareth Christmas Pageant, became a reality and has grown into an annual tradition that attracts visitors from a wide area.

Recognizing the need for a men's community service organization, Father Stanley helped establish the Nazareth Lions Club. He also was instrumental in the successful campaign for Nazareth's incorporation as a city.

He has shared his talent and love for painting by giving free art lessons in the

church basement to anyone interested. He often gave his paintings to parishioners as gifts. He has visited several of the world's major art treasures and galleries.

As an author and historian, he completed the research and publication of several major books while serving the Holy Family Parish, and is currently researching toward another book. He has authored almost 40 books and more than 100 pamphlets on historical figures, military leaders, railroads and towns of the Southwest.

He also helped organize the research and production for the parish's Diamond Jubilee history book, published in 1977.

Father Stanley regularly conducted daily mass Monday through Saturday and three masses each Sunday, and also held a weekly service at the South Hills Manor nursing home in Dimmitt.

It appeared his ministry might be cut short several years ago when it was discovered that he had a brain tumor and he lost the vision in his left eye. But he survived brain surgery and was able, [See Father Stanley, Page 8]

Dimmitt's City Board of Aldermen voted at its Monday night meeting to purchase a 1982 Elgin White Wing street sweeper, discussed ways to regulate itinerant peddlers, and postponed action on the rate increase requested by Southwestern Public Service Co.

The sweeper selected will cost \$44,586 and will be purchased from Environmental Sales and Service of Hurst. It has a hydrostatic transmission and rides on three wheels.

Other bids received were for \$36,346 for an Elgin with standard transmission; West Texas Equipment of Lubbock bid on Mobile models for \$57,845 for a three-wheel, and \$61,945 and \$64,665 for two different four-wheel models, all with a \$4,000 trade-in allowance on the city's old sweeper; and Air Machinery, Inc. of Lubbock bid \$34,990 for a three-wheel model with standard transmission, \$43,983 for a three-wheel with automatic transmission, and \$60,772 for a four-wheel, all FMC brands.

The Elgin bid was accepted over the lower-priced FMC brand because of an earlier

delivery date. Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce President Jim Killingsworth asked the board to again consider passing stricter ordinances governing itinerant merchants or peddlers in town.

"They take money out of the flow of the local economy, but they don't pay local taxes or put anything back into the community," he told the aldermen.

Killingsworth presented an ordinance adopted by the city of Big Spring. Many of its provisions are stricter than the current local ordinances.

"We had been told that ours were as strict as they could legally be, but at a recent chamber conference we were told about this Big Spring ordinance," said Chamber Manager Delores Heller. "We were also told about Lubbock's new ordinance, which in parts is even stricter."

She noted that the Lubbock ordinance allows the chief of police three days to investigate the background of potential itinerants, provides for the peddlers to have "mug-shot" identification, and sets the licensing period at only 30

days. In Dimmitt, such merchants are required to register and post a \$1,000 bond with the Police Dept., as well as purchase a license which is good for one year.

The board asked Killingsworth to get a copy of the Lubbock ordinance and select what provisions from it, and the one from Big Spring's, that the chamber would like to see enacted here, and these provisions would be considered at the next meeting of the board.

Alderman Wayne Collins said, "We need to do something to help our local people in any way we can. I think we need to be a restrictive as we possibly can without hurting local door-to-door salespeople, such as with Avon, or those working for legitimate charitable causes."

Local SPS Manager Calvin Marsh offered to answer any questions he could concerning the rate increase request from his company.

He recommended that the city accept the findings of the steering committee that area towns had chosen to study the matter. The committee [See CITY BUYS, Page 11]

## County tennis tourney is set for June 22-27

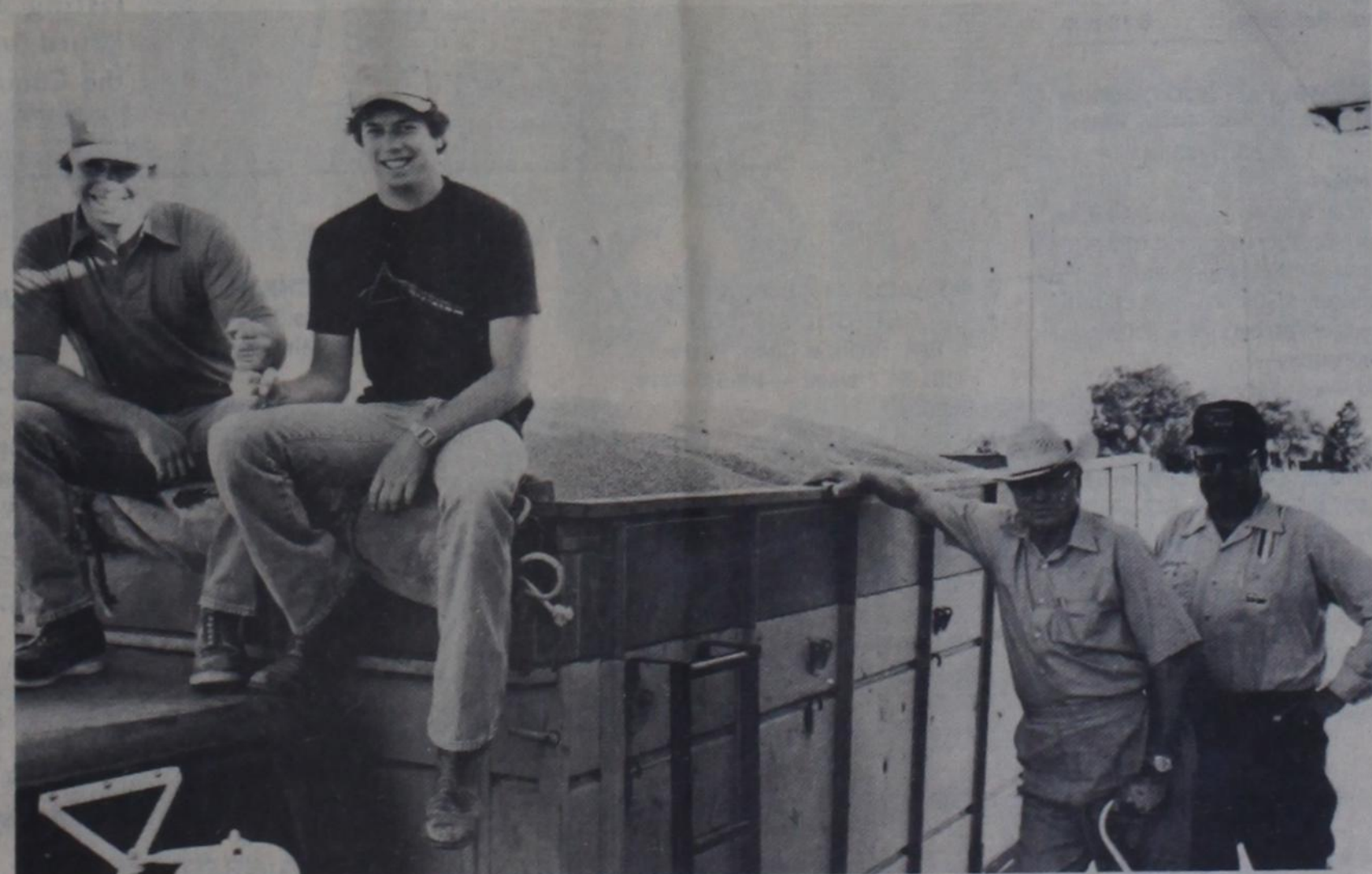
The Castro County Tennis Association Tournament is set for June 22-27 at the Dimmitt High School tennis courts.

## 1982 wheat harvest kicks off

Although the first cutting of irrigated wheat is still one to three weeks away, the county's first test loads of dryland wheat were harvested Monday north of Dimmitt.

Elevator managers throughout the county report that they expect fair-to-good yields of good-quality wheat this year, following last year's outstanding crop.

However, the price is poor. Wednesday's cash price was only \$3.27 per bushel.

Jim Elder of Dimmitt logged the official first load of 1982, delivering it to Bruegel & Sons' main facility at 6:10 p.m. Monday.

However, Elder's load of Tascosa variety tested 16.7% moisture and 60 lbs. per bushel, so he's holding off on further cutting until it dries out more, B&S Elevator Manager Carl Collyer reported.

Collyer said the field Elder is cutting is expected to make 25 to 30 bushels per acre.

Just an hour and five minutes after Elder delivered the first load to Bruegel & Sons, Coby and Matt Gilbreath brought in Dimmitt Agri Industries' first load of

the year, delivering it to the cooperative's North Leg at 7:15 p.m. Monday, after cutting it that afternoon.

The Gilbreath brothers harvested their first load on dryland eight miles north and 2½ east of Dimmitt. It had a 16% moisture content and a test weight of 59.9 lbs., Elevator Manager Jake Isaacs reported. The wheat was TAM-105 variety which "had only two half-inch rains since we planted it last fall," Sam Gilbreath said. The plot being harvested is expected to yield 20 bushels per acre.

The Gilbreaths, too, were holding off on further cutting until the moisture content drops to 12-13%.

Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., has since received three more loads of dryland wheat.

Harvesting of irrigated wheat won't begin for another week or more in most places, although J. R. Brown at Flagg Grain Co. reported that he expects a first load from the Dub Winders farm "any time now."

"It looks like we're going to make quite a bit of wheat in this area," Brown said. Al [See Wheat Harvest, Page 8]

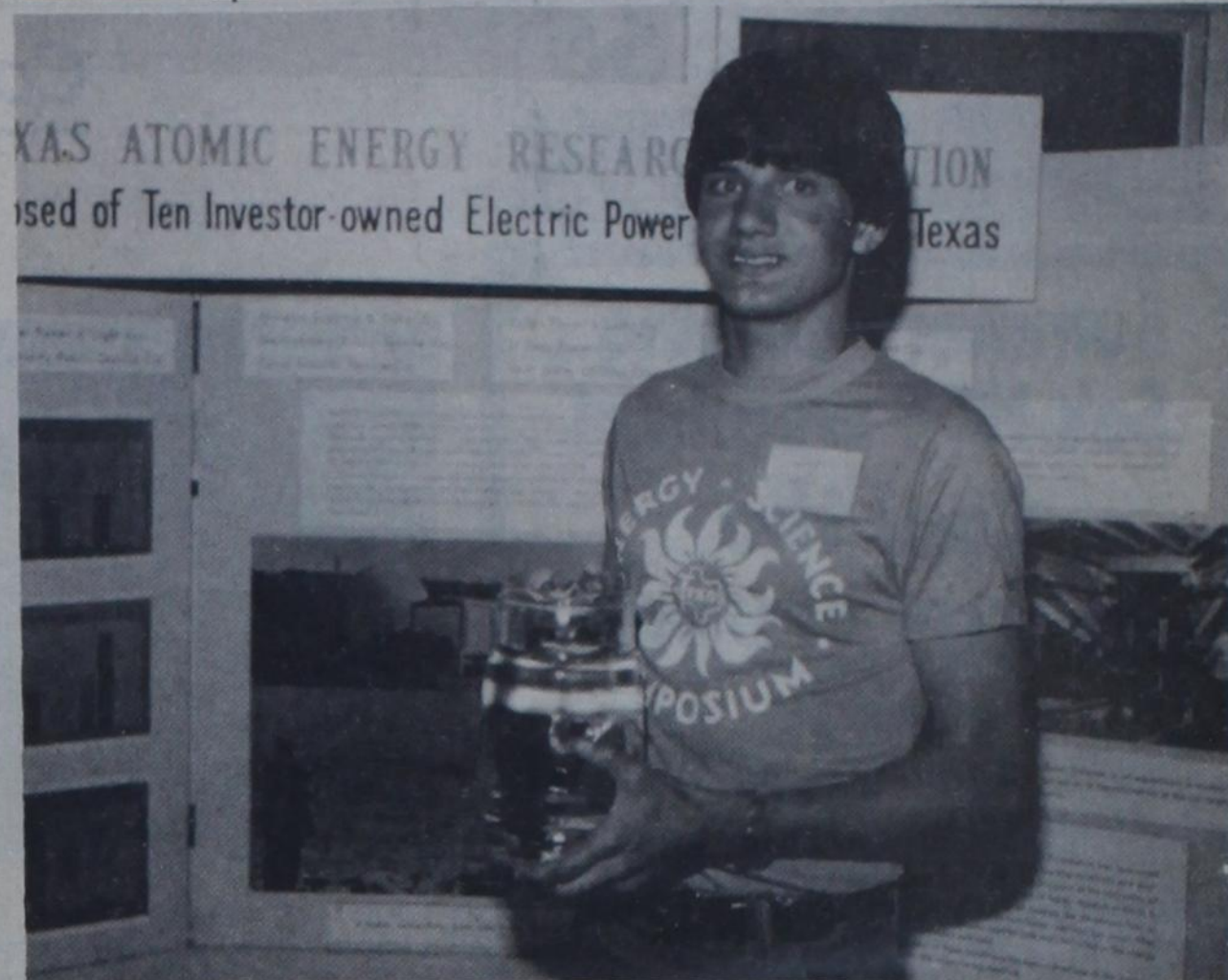

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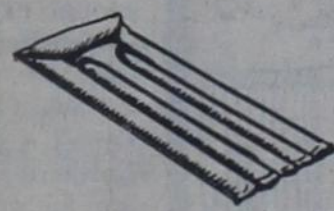


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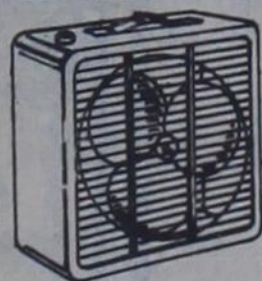

Yet different bands of the tribe had conflicting beliefs about them, and, explains the author, brought ruin and disorientation to the tribe. The book is illustrated and comes in two volumes. Peter Powell is not

an Indian, himself, but he became so familiar with Cheyenne theology he is almost like a knowledgeable medicine man.

## Insects of interest Bagworms are feeding

By ALLEN KNUTSON

Bagworms have recently hatched from overwintering eggs, and are now busy feeding on junipers, other trees and shrubs.

Insecticide control is most effective in early June when bagworms are small. Also, early control limits damage to the tree and no bags remain on the tree.

Bagworm eggs survive the winter in last year's bags. Hand picking and destroying

the bags during the winter is a good control method for small trees and shrubs. If last year's bags still remain, or infested trees are large, an insecticide treatment will probably be needed.

Bagworms feed on many kinds of trees and shrubs. Defoliation weakens the tree, and all or part of the tree may die after several years' damage.

Young bagworms build a tiny conical bag about 1/8 inch long. The tough silk bags are camouflaged with bits of leaves and twigs. Bagworms feed and grow during the summer, expanding their bags until they are about 1 1/2 inches long. In the fall bagworms become adults and mate. The females lay eggs inside their bags.

Several insecticides provide bagworm control including sevin, diazinon, orthene and malathion. The biological insecticides containing Bacillus Thuringiensis are also effective and very safe to use. Spray the foliage thoroughly for effective control. Always read and follow label directions when applying insecticides.

[Continued from Page 1], suggested allowing SPS an overall 9.003% rate increase as opposed to the 12.7% increase originally requested by the company.

Mayor R. L. Fleming said the city has until July 1 to decide whether to accept the 9% or let it go to the Texas Public Utilities Commission to decide. He added that it is rumored that the PUC may allow an 11% increase.

Marsh said that SPS has already agreed to the 9% figure.

The aldermen agreed to table the matter until the next meeting of the board June 21, "so we can see how some of the other area towns are going to go."

Marsh said that Amarillo, Borger, Canyon and Happy have already approved the 9% increase, while the majority of area towns' governing bodies did not meet until Monday night.

In a breakdown of the overall increase, residential rates will be hiked about 12% and irrigation use will be raised about 14%.

Alderman David Hays said that he felt it difficult to justify an increase for the company when it seemed that it was making no efforts to curtail spending on items he termed "niceties" such as landscaping, new automobiles and building decor.

Marsh countered that his company has instituted several austerity measures, including curtailment of private use of company autos. He added that even though he is the local manager, he still gets out and helps read meters.

Dimmitt Police Chief Ron Mitchell told the board that he has begun looking around to see what is available for the police department to purchase for two new patrol cars allowed for in the budget.

He said he would not mind getting smaller-type cars, such as Ford Fairmont or Chevrolet Malibu or Citation, as long as they could be purchased with the police package - heavy duty suspension, brakes and electrical system.

He added that one local dealer said it was too late to order the 1982 police package, and noted that it will be some time before 1983's will be available.

Mitchell agreed to present the particular specifications he wants for the vehicles at the next meeting of the board.

Several aldermen remarked that they had been contacted by citizens concerned about the mosquito problem around town.

City Manager Paul Catoe said that city employees started Monday on a program of spraying with the truck-mounted sprayer five days a week for eight hours a day.

He added that aerial spraying will be done Saturday morning, followed by another aerial spraying Monday, along with continued ground spraying. Mayor Fleming noted that it costs \$2,184 for each aerial spraying.

The board also recommended that the city consider purchasing a fogger to use instead of the present machine which dispenses droplets.

Board members issued a plea for individual property owners to also do their part in keeping the pests under control.

Eliminating standing water, cutting weeds and spraying shrubbery were ways suggested for citizens to help.

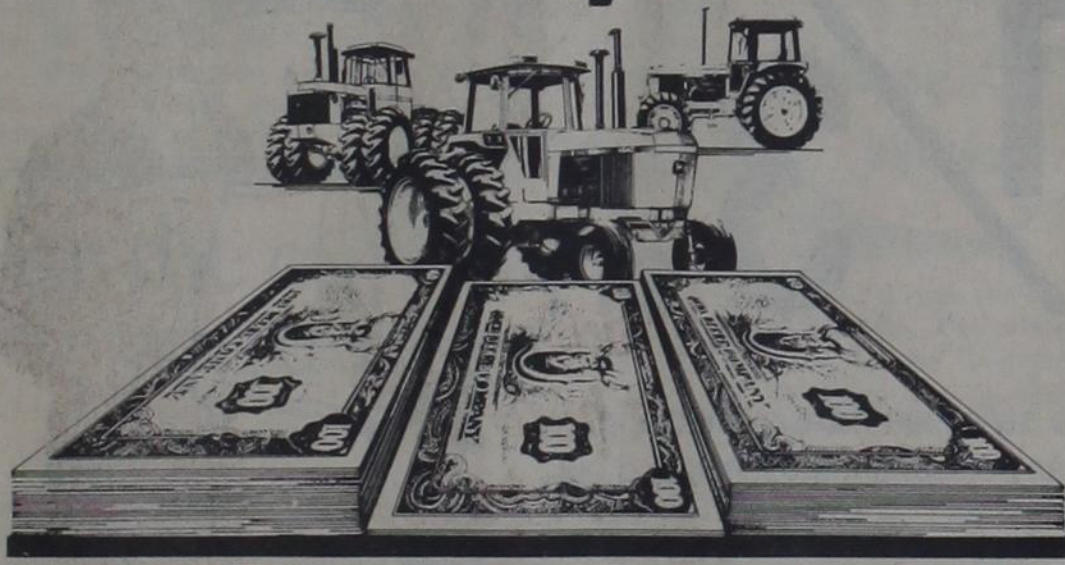

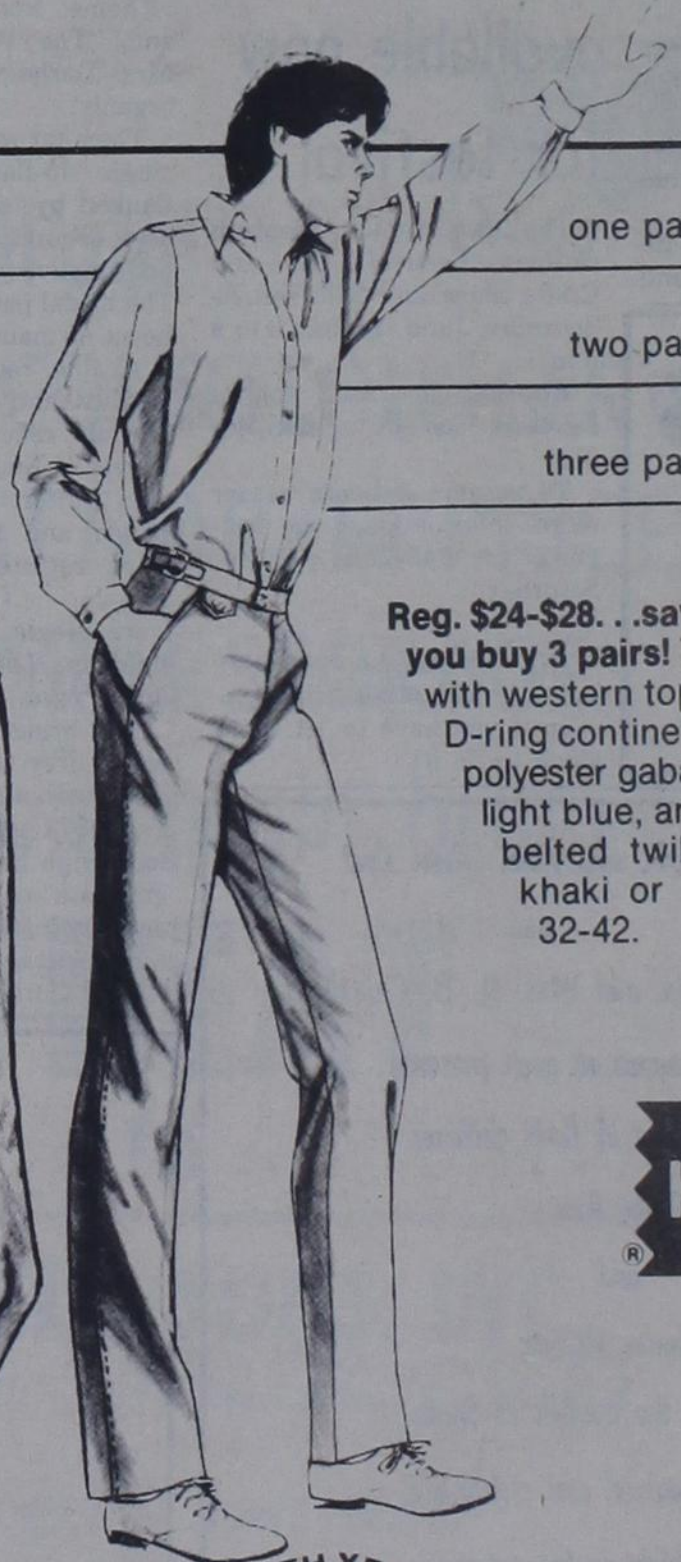
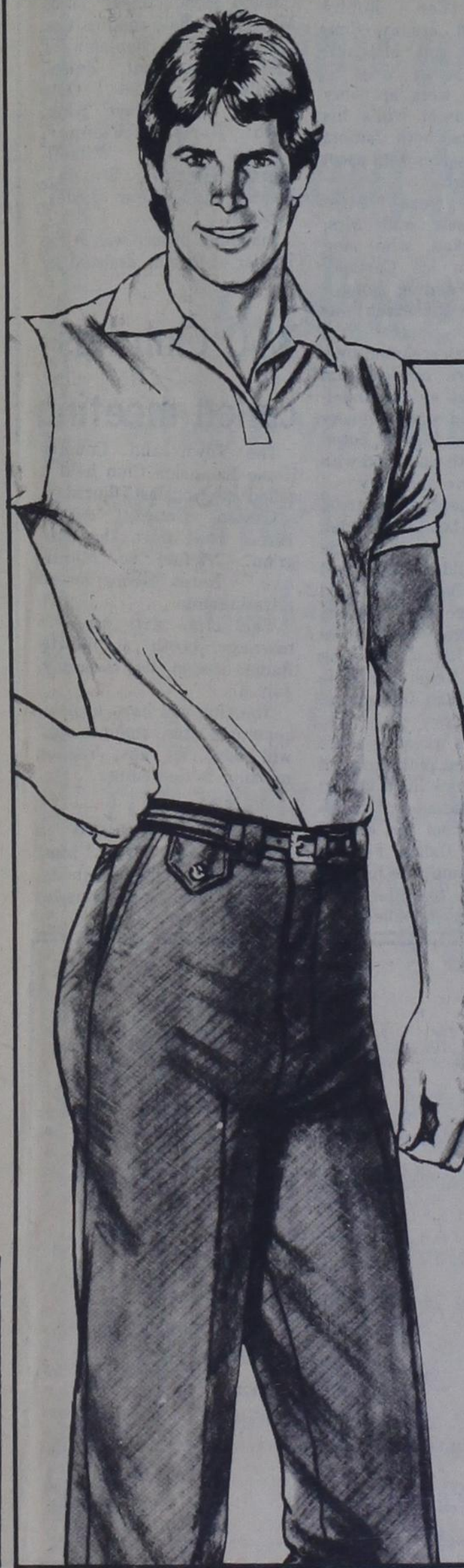

I have received many phone calls during the past few days in regard to our growing mosquito problem. The city is currently taking every possible measure to eliminate this problem so that Dimmitt residents can enjoy their outdoor summer activities.

efforts could help save many lives in the event of a natural disaster.

WE don't know who defined a taxpayer as "a person who doesn't have to pass a civil service exam to work for the government."

City personnel have been ground spraying for three weeks on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays in an effort to eliminate the mosquito problem early in the summer months; however, our ground spraying unit has had no measurable effect on the mosquito population. We have therefore decided to take immediate action on aerial spraying.

A local aerial spraying firm has agreed to spray the city this coming Saturday and Sunday, June 12 and 13. The city will also increase ground spraying to five days a week, eight hours a day. Ground spraying hours will be 7 to 11 a.m. and 5 to 10 p.m.

Residents may assist city personnel in fighting the mosquito problem by keeping their own yards and alleyways cleaned and maintained on a regular basis. Through our combined efforts, I believe that we can eliminate our mosquito problem for the remainder of the summer months.

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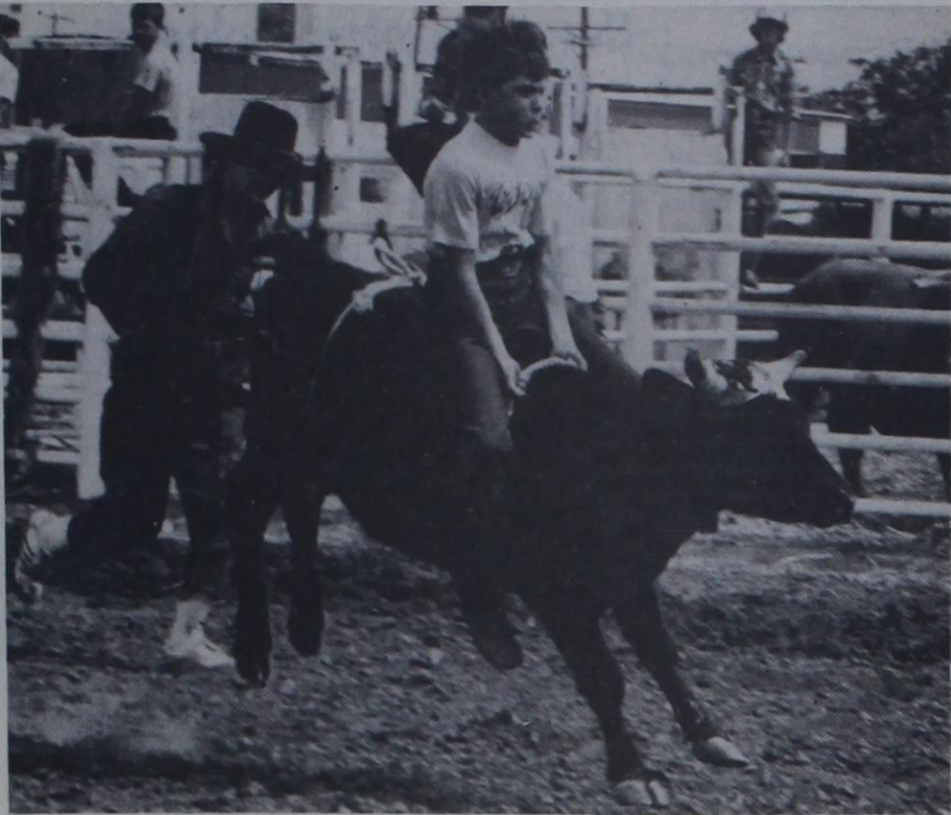
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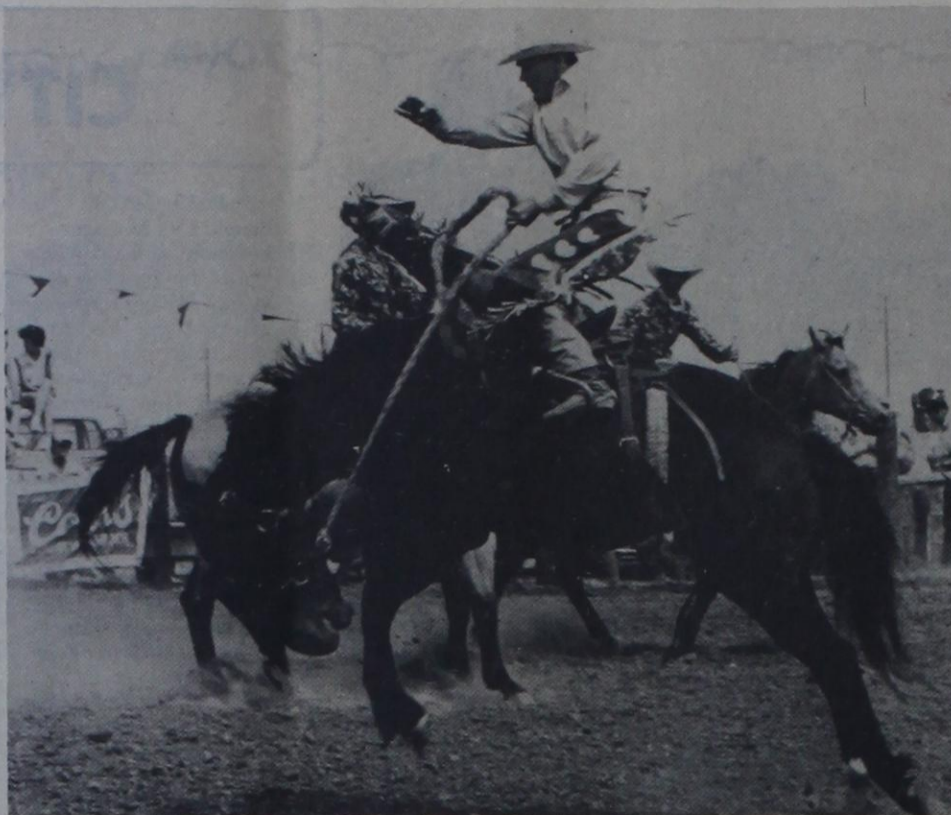

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## 'Patterners' share joy in youth's graduation

When young Brent Hodges made his way haltingly across the stage of the Tulia High School auditorium to receive his high school diploma, it marked the culmination of many years of painstaking labor, love and care by literally hundreds of concerned friends and neighbors from over a wide area of Castro, Swisher and Randall Counties.

Brent was crippled as an infant due to a reaction from a polio injection, resulting in brain damage that affected his movements. His handicap was so severe that a prominent pediatrician recommended that he be committed to an institution.

But his parents, S. A. and Frances Hodges, who at that time farmed in the Arney community, refused to accept that verdict.

They checked with other parents who might have a child similarly afflicted, and consulted other physicians and specialists. Their quest led them to San Antonio, where the Institute of Human

simultaneously, with Brent prone on an elevated table.

Many friends and neighbors volunteered their services. Dorothy Sims of Happy organized a regular schedule that eventually involved as many as 125 people serving in shifts.

Three times daily for two years, this procedure was faithfully followed.

Part of the therapy required Brent to crawl through a tunnel made of wood and wire that forced him to use his arms and legs. Parents and helpers refrained from assisting Brent in any way unless absolutely necessary, compelling him to use his own resources in crawling, walking, feeding himself and any

activity that required effort on his part.

Eventually, the long and arduous patterning and enforced exercise began to pay off. With a minimum of assistance, Brent was able to show animals at the FFA shows. The Happy Lions Club sponsored him two weeks at the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children in Kerrville. His teachers were considerate and helpful, often going beyond their duties to give special assistance to Brent in his studies. Also, Brent has engaged in home study courses. He has become adept in computer programming and operation.

Since insurance was not available, the Hodges have

spent large sums to assure Brent's ability to "go it on his own." Brent plans to enroll in Amarillo College for further studies in computer science.

He graduated from Tulia High with more than the required credits. His 81 fellow graduates presented him with a special award for his determination, friendliness and independence. And the audience of 1,000 showed its admiration by giving Brent a prolonged and standing ovation.

The pride in Brent's graduation was shared by his parents and many volunteers who by love, patience and untiring effort had helped Brent overcome seemingly hopeless odds.



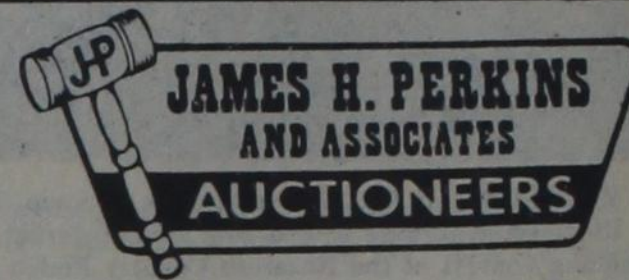
A special plaque with the contributor's name engraved on it will be presented to members who give \$250 or more.

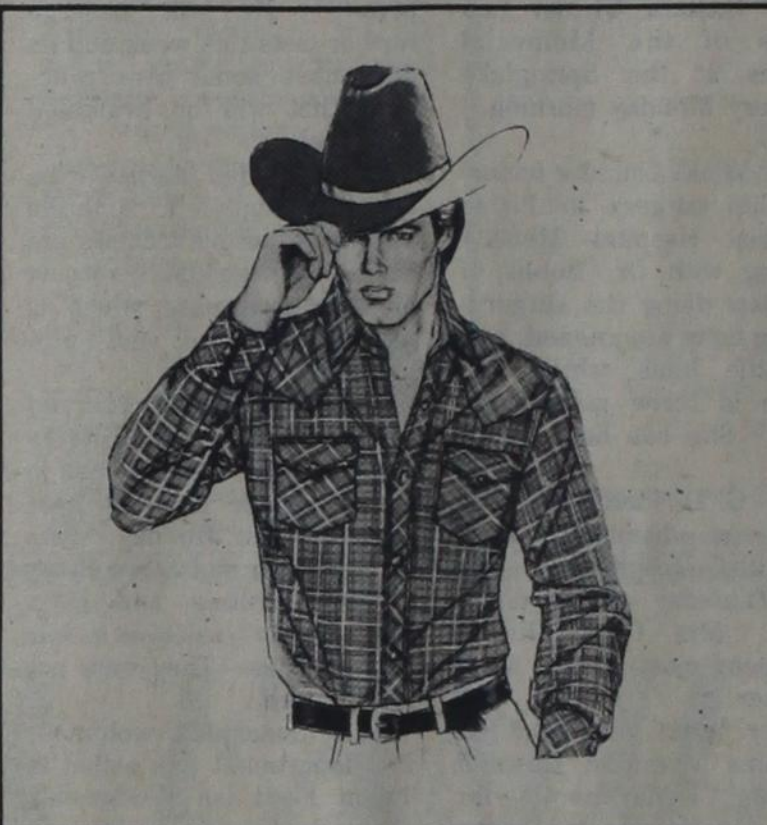

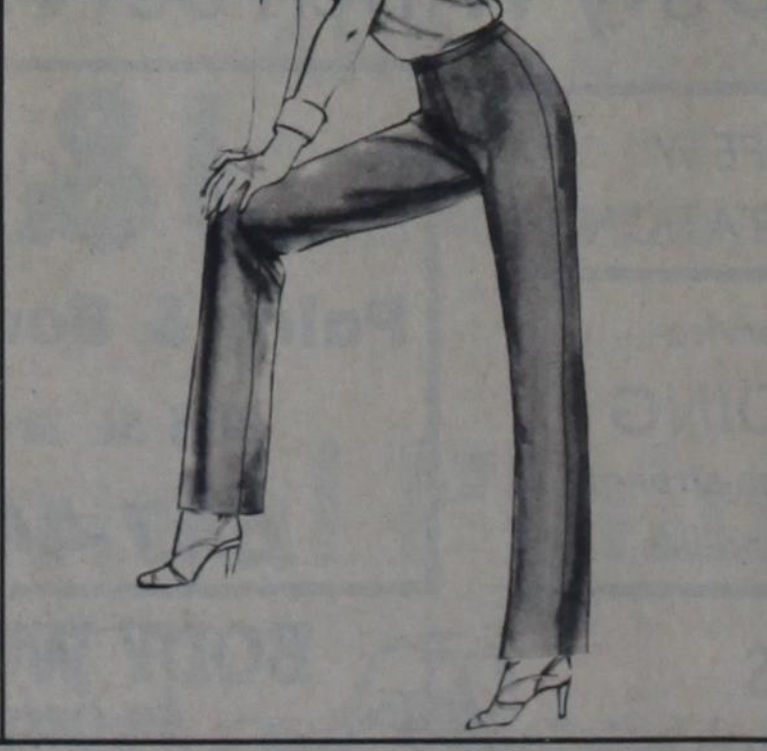
