Meanwhile, this weekend, get your tax forms ready.

The AARP Tax Aide Program hosts its second session of the tax season Monday at the Big Spring Senior Center. The program helped about 500 people file their tax returns last year. The free program is held each Monday from 8 a.m. until noon through mid-April.

The AARP program pro-

vides the service to people who cannot afford professional tax help, such as seniors, people with disabilities, those who don't speak English and people with low-to-moderate income. "AARP volunteers explain

many special tax credits and deductions and how people may claim them on their tax

## Forsan ISD to break ground on facilities

FORSAN — Dirt never looked so good.

According to Forsan Independent School District Superintendent Randy Johnson, brush and tree removal from the land that will house a new elementary building was wrapping up Friday with

crews expected to start hauling in dirt this week to prepare the site for foundation work.

"We are excited that there is some dirt moving out here right now, and that we have the ground breaking coming up," Johnson said.

Construction updates along with swearing in a new board member, considering several administration personnel contracts and the 2014-2015 calender are on tap for Forsan ISD trustees when they meet at 7 p.m. Monday in the

board room, 411 W. 6<sup>th</sup> St., Forsan. In regards

the \$14 million elementary school project, Johnson said a public ground breaking is scheduled for 4 p.m., Feb. 17.

Crews will be busy for the next several months preparing the area for construction of the new facility before the public sees any structures heading skyward.

Bids for that next process as

well as projects on the high school/junior high campus earmark in the \$23 million bond are expected to pass before the the board's eyes sometime in the mid to late March, Johnson said. "Everything is coming in

as expected," Johnson said. "The waste water treatment plan is not on the original time line but they warned us from the beginning that it sometimes takes a while. Our worry is on the estimates when the bids come in. With all the activity in the oil field

... we are worried we can get some good, solid bids in. We are prepared to make some further decisions if the bids are a little high."

A lag in approval from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for the first round of permissions to construct a waste water treatment plant placed that phase of the project back about a month and half, but Johnson said the district still expects to open the doors of the new



ing the night in Flagstaff, we stopped in Williams, Ariz., the last place on Highway 66 to be by-passed




## They stand high above it all

nside on TV news, talking heads described ravages of California wildfires ragullet ing across the landscape. Outside, my neighbor Josh was ready to climb into his pick-up, heading for his firefighting shift 40 minutes up the freeway.

Fresh from hearing descrip-

tions of modern firefighting technology, I asked him to explain so ordinary guys like me could under-

"Doc, you'd do well to keep it simple," Josh answered, smiling. "Firefighters just spray the wet stuff on the red stuff."



As he drove away, I gave myself a mental kick for missing the opportunity to thank him for his ongoing commitment to saving lives and property. Each shift, he's ready to uphold the pledge he made when signing on.

And the same goes for other emergency responders — men and women, professionals and volunteers — across the land. They deserve to be on ped-

estals, none of which are tall enough, broad enough or sturdy enough to hold them all. Maybe they could mount the elevated plateaus in shifts. He's a humanitarian and a

great neighbor, eager to help with chores that call for more strength and endurance than we of a certain age can muster. His smile, gentle nature and acts of kindness make us know that he's a "giver," not a taker.

I asked him about life at the station. Are firefighters really Amen good cooks? Are jokes shared

around the station? Does it seem like family? He answered "yes" to all three.

Josh joked that he knows of no other job where they "wake you up to go home." He asked if I know why God made firefighters: "Because the police need heroes, too." (Law enforcement personnel may remember that this question can be re-phrased with the names reversed.)

Another firefighter — a "friend of a friend" we'll call Dan continues his "sunny side up" approach to life, despite having lost a leg in a freak accident at the station a dozen years ago.

He remains an incurable optimist and continues on the job with a strong commitment to exercise. Within months of his accident, he put his prosthesis to the test, entering and completing the Turkey Trot and the Jingle Bell events in Dallas, both 5K

Regularly mounting his bicycle in Van Alstyne, his hometown, he often takes 25-mile

Sometimes a pack of three or four dogs gives chase. One day, a large three-legged boxer set the canine pace, getting way too close to Dan on his "real leg" side. He gave the dog a "can-wetalk look" as he pedaled faster.

domicile was saved by the Dallas Fire Department during the wee hours of a cold winter morning was asked his insurance agent's name. "Swift Sparks," he responded.

Smiling, the captain said, "We have enough attempts at humor down at the firehouse. Now give

me his real name. (He repeated,

"Swift Sparks.")

More than six decades ago, an ultra-conservative newspaper ran an editorial that was critical of public fire protection. The edi tor was strongly opposed, feeling that such protection should be offered only to individuals and businesses signing up for it and "paying the freight" if they

wanted fire protection. A few days later, flames engulfed the newspaper offices. Thanks to the fire department, much of the building was sal-

In the next edition of the paper, the editor profusely thanked the firefighters in a front-page letter. The final sentence, however, read thusly: "However, we still don't believe in public fire protection."

The masses endorse public fire protection. Aren't we glad that firefighters, and other emergency responders, feel strong commitment to what they are called to do? They prove regularly that they're "all in" to go "all out" when duty calls.

Sure, during quiet hours, when all is in order and alarms are silent, they share stories, laughing when they can and crying when they must.

When Josh reads this, I'll be pleased for him to render his opinion, unless he wants me to tone it down a little bit. But I won't. And when he finishes reading, I hope he'll take a few minutes to take a look at our squeaking garage door.

## **C**ODE ENFORCEMENT

Did you know City Code states...

Whenever weeds, rubbish, and garbage or any other unsightly matter exists covering or partly covering the surface of any lot of real estate within the city limits or within 5,000 feet outside the corporate limits of the city and is declared to be a public nuisance the prompt abatement of such condition shall be a public necessity.

The first step is a notice from the city whereas the unsightly condition must be removed within seven days of receiving the notice.

There are many remedies in the event that the owner fails to abate his or her duties.

They can be found guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction be punishable by a fine between \$250-\$500 for the first offense and between \$500-\$2,000 for subsequent offenses. Each day such a violation all the lakes we have continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Opening lead — eight of spades. Of the three departments of bridge — bidding, declarer play and defense — by far the most difficult is defense. When you're a defender,

you see only half of your side's resources (the 13 cards you were dealt), as well as half the declarer's resources (the 13 cards in dummy). This contrasts greatly with the perspective of the declarer, who has

the advantage of seeing all 26 cards

held by his side. He knows exactly

which high cards and how many cards of each suit are missing, and can therefore formulate a plan to make maximum use of his assets.

Consider this case where West leads the eight of spades in response to his partner's overcall. East wins with the king and returns the seven of spades, won by declarer with the queen. South, in need of a ninth trick, leads the jack of hearts, and it does not matter which defender wins the If West takes the jack with the

king, he does not have a spade to return. And if West ducks and East wins with the ace instead, he can return a spade to establish his suit but has no way to regain the lead later to cash his spade winners. So declarer winds up making four notrump, losing only a spade and two hearts. With better defense, however,

South would go down one. If East had played the seven of spades at trick one instead of the king, declarer could not have made the contract, regardless of what he did next. West would win South's first heart lead and return his remaining spade,

establishing East's spades. Sooner or later, the defenders would score three spade tricks and the A-K of hearts to put South down one.

#### Protect the elderly

TO THE EDITOR:

Citizens of Big Spring, The financial exploitation and abuse of the elderly is a widespread and serious problem, even though we rarely hear about it. Research completed by MetLife Mature Market Institute in 2009 found that \$2.9 billion are bilked from seniors each year. The National Adult Protective Services Organization (NAPSA) reports that only one in 44 cases of financial abuse is ever reported. NAPSA also reports that 90 percent of abusers are trusted family members or trusted others.

Approximately one year ago, our grandmother was hospitalized for a sudden but brief illness. During her time of hospitalization, a close family member entered a Big Spring financial institution and had a Durable Financial Power of Attorney notarized. The institution's employee, an agent of the state, notarized this profound document, although our grandmother was not present. With this Power of Attorney, our close family member has been able to gain control of all of our grandmother's financial and business matters without her consent. Our grandmother is of sound mind. Our 93-year-old grand-

mother should be enjoying her happiest, most restful and peaceful years. Instead, she is experiencing financial exploitation at the hands of a close family member who she trusts to be her caretaker. Our grandmother's ultimate vice is her compassionate heart that will not allow her to follow through with reporting the predator to the appropriate authorities. We will, however, continue to fight until justice is served for our grandmother.

Financial exploitation of the elderly is gaining Congressional attention. In 2010, the Elder Justice Act was passed to bring attention to this crime by strengthening state and federal efforts to address elder abuse, neglect and exploitation.

We urge you, citizens of Big Spring, to protect your elderly relatives if you suspect elderly abuse by calling Adult Protective Services.

Something that should be of interest is the total amount of bond indebtedness that exists today for the local taxpayers. As I have not yet seen this data offered in any media, I have gathered the following information from the Texas Bond Review Board with the database as of 8-31-13.

There are four taxing groups represented. In each tax group the tables give the Issue Name, Maturity Date, Principal, Interest, and Total Obligation. As can be seen, the total amount for all taxing agencies exceeds \$200 million. This is a large debt for a community of this size.

The taxpayers should carefully consider this when the next bond request comes before them.







## Catios give cats a safe way to enjoy the outdoors

(AP) When Carrie Fagerstrom was looking for a new home in Portland, Ore., her must-have list didn't include a spacious yard, plenty of closets or even ers have begun building a large kitchen.

Her highest priority: the comfort of her cats. "I really wanted a

house that would allow me to build a place for them," said Fagerstrom, who had visions of a catio out back.

A catio is essentially a cat's playground. It's an enclosed, covered area, much like a patio, that allows feline friends to be exposed to the outdoors, getting fresh air and scenery, while keeping them safe from predators.

"I thought it would be as simple as running wire on three sides and putting tarp overhead, but it wasn't that easy," Fagerstrom said. "It ended up being a much bigger project, but I love it."

Roughly \$5,000 later, her eight cats have room to roam in a catio filled with scratching posts, climbing apparatuses and even a drinking fountain. The space also contains human seating so that Fagerstrom and her friends can enjoy it as well.

Catios got their start with cat breeders and at animal sanctuaries, but more and more cat ownthem at home, according to Kate Benjamin, founder of Hauspanther. com, an online magazine for design-conscious cat people.

"I've been seeing a lot more people catifying their homes," Benjamin said. "If your cats are truly beloved members of your family, you won't let them live outside. There are just too many threats."

There are benefits to cats both ways: being indoors-only and being allowed access to the outdoors, says Sarah Ellis of the University of Lincoln, in England, who co-chaired a group of experts that issued

> "An indoor cat is more likely to be protected from injury, such as that from road traffic accidents and neighborhood cats, as well as less likely to contract infectious diseases that are passed from cat to cat," Ellis said. "However, an indoor-only cat may be more likely to experience boredom and frustration from the inability to exhibit hunting behaviors, running and exploring."

"'I'm worried about my marbles, because I'm scared they might fall into the wrong hands,'" Kupers said Anne told her. "Could you keep them for me for a little while?"

Anne and Toosje, frequent playmates in each other's homes and on the square, couldn't have known that Anne

wouldn't be coming back, museum head of collections Teresien da Silva said.

On July 6, 1942, about two years after the beginning of the Nazi occupation of the Netherlands in World War II, the Frank family went into hiding in a

concealed apartment above warehouse. They told everyone but a small circle of helpers that they were going to stay with family Switzerland. T h Kupers also

In August 1944, the family Frank betrayed, arrested and deported.

Anne died of typhus in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in March 1945. Her diary was recovered and published after the war by her father Otto, the only member of the family to survive. It has become the most widely read document to emerge from the Holocaust.

"So many people know about Anne Frank because of the diary, which was written under such unusual circumstances," da Silva said. "(But) the marbles are a reminder that she was just a little girl."





ing high-quality care for its residents, the parties said. In late October, an agreement was reached to the satisfaction of both parties.



## Obama signs farm bill that trims food stamps

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama carried out a presidential duty that he hasn't had a lot of opportunity to perform recently: signing into law a major piece of bipartisan legislation.

Obama signed a far-reaching farm bill Friday at Michigan State University, choosing heartland America for a rare celebration of Washington political compromise.

The bill expands federal crop insurance and ends direct government payments that go to farmers whether they produce anything or not. But the bulk of its \$100 billion per year cost is for the food stamp program that aids 1 in 7 Americans.

Obama has said the farm bill isn't perfect, but will reduce the deficit "without gutting the vital assistance programs millions of hardworking Americans count on

WASHINGTON (AP) — to help put food on the table

for their families."

The five-year bill cuts food stamps by \$800 million a year, or around 1 percent, one-fifth of the cut approved last fall by the Republican-led House. Conservatives remain unhappy with the bill and its generous new subsidies for farmers in every region of the country, including Southern peanut growers, Midwest corn farmers and the Northeast maple syrup industry.

A partisan dispute over food stamp spending held up the legislation for two years, and last fall lawmakers were warning of an impending spike in milk prices without a deal on the bill, which contains federal dairy supports. The prospect of compromise seemed bleak at the time, when lawmakers couldn't even pass a budget to keep the government running.

Sure, every now and then you might hit it just right, but most of the time trying to pick the bottom or top in any market move is tricky at best. And, as with most market endeavors, you need at least a little luck on your side for everything to work out as planned. Thinking you can wait until the absolute bottom or top before taking action is usually, in the end, a loser's game. The stock market has a way of humbling even the most confident on investors every now and then.

We know that much of the investing public is baby boomers who are underinvested in stocks and sitting on a lot of cash. At the same time, these same investors are fearful of the equity market after its huge run higher over the course of the last five years. And many were burned, at least on paper, twice in the last 14 years as the technology and housing bubbles burst. In addition, a lot of those in this strategist's generation are worried there is a good chance they might outlive their money. After all, people are living longer thanks to healthier lifestyles and medical advancements. Plus, baby boomers are not known for their money-saving abilities.

This strategist still firmly believes that one of the best ways to build wealth over time is by investing in the stock market. CDs yielding 5 percent may come back some day, but it is doubtful that day will come anytime soon. Income investors can find attractive returns in dividend-paying equities. Growth investors have many possibilities in today's market. But as we often said on the trading desk back in my foreign exchange days, "You have to be in it to win it." This means taking advantage of opportunities when they arise. You have to act.

The equity markets are in the midst of a minor pullback from recent record highs. The major indices could easily trade lower in coming weeks—or not. But we won't be able to pick the exact bottom and then jump in. Our outlook for the economy and stock market over the next 12 to 24 months is positive. In our opinion, investors need to be slowly putting money to work as the market trades lower.

The idea is to put sidelined funds to work in the market when prices are down, not when prices are high. The idea is to leg in, not jump in.

## Utah lawmakers to mull drone restrictions

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah is joining other states that have waded into the debate over unmanned aerial systems by courting the fast-growing industry while at the same time pushing for more privacy protections to limit local police use of drones.

Utah lawmakers are set to consider two bills this year dealing with drones.

One proposal limits when governments can use the aircraft while another recognizes the benefits of the technology and encourages its development in Utah.

The fine line between courting a potential job-creator and ensuring privacy protections is one several states have been walking in recent years.

In 2013, at least nine states passed laws restricting the use of drones, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

Five of those nine states also submitted bids to serve as drone testing sites for the Federal Aviation Administration, which local officials have said they hope will be a financial boon for their states.

One state, Idaho, also passed a resolution recognizing drone technology is a flourishing industry that would benefit their states.

In Utah, both proposals are still awaiting a first hearing.

The technology is so new that there are no real

privacy protections in place yet, Sen. Howard Stephenson told The Salt Lake Tribune.


