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Trial to end today

Big Spring man faces up to 20 years in prison on indecency charge

Punishment for a Big Spring man guilty of indecency with a child is expected to be assessed in 118th District Court today.

Reymundo Martinez, 50, faces up to 20 years in prison for the offense, which was first reported to police in August 2012.

Martinez had been facing five charges, including aggravated sexual assault of a child, but the other charges were dismissed in exchange for a guilty plea to the indecency charge, District Attorney Hardy L. Wilkerson said. Martinez opted to have a jury decide his punishment.

Jury selection was completed and testimony begun Monday. Wilkerson is representing the state, while Big Spring attorney Robert Miller represents Martinez.

Indecency with a child is a second-degree felony, punishable by up to 20 years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

Wilkerson said he expects the trial to be completed today.

Biden vows more sanctions

WARSAW, Poland — Denouncing Russia's actions in Crimea as nothing more than a "land grab," Vice President Joe Biden warned Russia on Tuesday that the U.S. and Europe will impose further sanctions as Moscow moved to annex part of Ukraine.

With few good options, the United States was scrambling for ways to show it won't stand idly by as Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a treaty for the Ukrainian peninsula of Crimea to join Russia. So far, Putin has been undeterred by sanctions and visa bans levied by the U.S. and the European Union, and there's no U.S. appetite for military interven-

tion. "Russia has offered a variety of arguments to justify what is nothing more than a land grab, including what he said today," Biden said in Poland, which shares a border with both Russia and Ukraine. "But the world has seen through Russia's

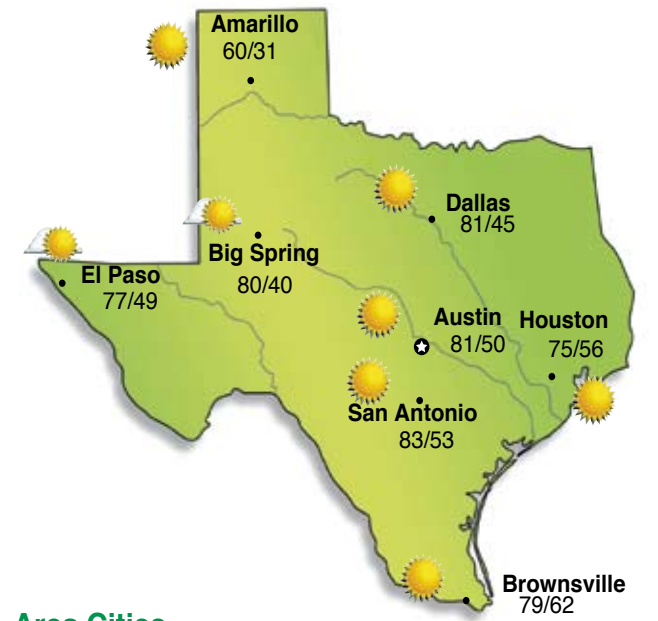

Illinois voters to choose Republican nominee who will try to win back governor's office

CHICAGO (AP) — Illinois voters will choose a Republican on Tuesday to try to win back the governor's office in a race that already has drawn intense interest from labor unions worried that the leading candidate could weaken them in the same way GOP governors have in other states across the Midwest.

At the front of the four-person pack is Bruce Rauner, a multimillionaire venture capitalist who has said he would model his governorship after Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker and former Indiana Gov. Mitch Daniels. Rauner faces three longtime lawmakers in the nomination: state Sens. Bill Brady and Kirk Dillard, and state Treasurer Dan Rutherford.

Rauner, Dillard and Brady spent Monday traveling the state to meet with voters and urge them to go to the polls. Organized labor, meanwhile, was encouraging members to pull Republican primary ballots and cast their vote for Dillard, who has been endorsed by three of the state's largest public-employee unions.

The typically left-leaning unions spent more than \$6 million on the GOP primary, both in anti-Rauner and pro-Dillard ads. Rauner has raised more than \$14 million, including \$6 million of his own money — more than any candidate seeking a gubernatorial nomination in state history.

In stops across the state Monday, Rauner warned supporters about the unions' efforts, saying Democratic Gov. Pat Quinn's "allies" were trying to hijack the election. He also has pushed for term limits for legislators, a move he says will end the cozy relationship between "career politicians" and special interests, such as organized labor.

Sentencing hearing in Army general's sex case goes into its 2nd day at Fort Bragg

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Lawyers for an Army general who admitted to emotionally harming a subordinate during an affair will argue Tuesday he shouldn't face jail time for a crime that civilians wouldn't be prosecuted for.

A judge on Monday accepted a plea deal that

included the dropping of sexual assault charges against Brig. Gen. Jeffrey Sinclair in exchange for him admitting to other violations of military law. Now, his lawyers are seeking a lenient sentence by downplaying the seriousness of those charges and calling witnesses to discuss the character of the former deputy commander of the 82nd Airborne.

The sentencing began Monday with prosecutors calling the accuser and her mother to discuss damage caused to her personal and professional life by her interactions with Sinclair. Prosecutors told the judge they have a few more witnesses to talk about how Sinclair's behavior hurt the three subordinates with whom he admitted to having inappropriate relationships.

Then Sinclair's lawyers are expected to call about 20 witnesses, including commanders who Sinclair served under and soldiers he led. Sinclair himself will give a statement and may even testify, defense attorney Richard Scheff said.

The captain who's his primary accuser took the stand Monday and said she can't trust anyone and fears her superiors are always going to take advantage of her. She said as their relationship soured, she fell into despair so deep that she threatened to kill herself so the general would listen to her.

Biden arrives in Poland for trip designed to send signal to Russia on Ukraine

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Stepping into a region on edge, Vice President Joe Biden came to Poland on Tuesday to reassure anxious allies that the U.S. will stand up to Russia's aggression in neighboring Ukraine, even as Moscow brushes aside sanctions and stern warnings from the West.

Biden arrived in Warsaw on Tuesday morning for consultations with Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk and President Bronislaw Komorowski, a few hours after Russian President Vladimir Putin approved a draft bill for the annexation of Crimea, one of a flurry of steps to formally take over the Black Sea peninsula. Crimea on Sunday voted overwhelmingly to secede from Ukraine and try to join Russia.

On Monday, the U.S. and the European Union levied the toughest sanctions on Russia since the Cold War.

In further meetings in the Polish capital and

later in Lithuania's capital, Vilnius, Biden was to discuss the crisis with the leaders of Estonia, Lithuania and Latvia — three Baltic nations that are deeply concerned about what Russia's military intervention in Ukraine's Crimean Peninsula might portend for the region. All four countries share borders with Russia; Poland also borders Ukraine.

Biden's two-day trip is part of a broader U.S. campaign to step up pressure on Putin after Sunday's referendum, dismissed by the U.S. as illegal. In coordination with Europe, the Obama administration has frozen the U.S. assets of nearly a dozen Russian and Ukrainian officials, although critics contend that amounts to a slap on the wrist that Moscow will blithely overlook.

Obama's announcement underscores shift in immigration debate

DENVER (AP) — President Barack Obama's surprise announcement last week that his administration would change its deportation policy to become more "humane" shows how the immigration battle has narrowed after months of congressional deadlock.

As recently as last year, immigrant rights activists, along with an unusually broad coalition of business, labor and religious groups, were united in their demand that Congress pass a sweeping bill to both remove the threat of deportation from many of the 11 million people here illegally and eventually make them citizens. But now activists just want to stop deportations.

They have pressured Obama to limit the number of people sent back overseas, which led to his administration's announcement Thursday of a review of deportation policies after a meeting with the Hispanic Congressional Caucus. Activists also are pushing state legislatures to end participation in a program to help federal immigration authorities deport people and chaining themselves across entrances to local jails or immigration detention centers.

"We need relief and we need it soon," said Reyna Montoya, 23, of Phoenix, whose father is fighting deportation and who co-wrote an open letter with dozens of other young activists urging immigrant rights groups to stand down on the citizenship issue.

actions and has rejected the flawed logic behind those actions."

Biden arrived early Tuesday in a region on edge over Russia's nascent aggression in Crimea.

Amid eerie echoes of the Cold War, U.S. allies including Poland have raised concerns that they could be next should the global community be unable to persuade Putin to back down.

Former Soviet states are among the most alarmed by the prospect that Moscow could be resuming its traditional imperial ambitions.

But Ukraine is at greater risk militarily because it lacks membership in NATO and the promise of collective defensive measures that NATO membership provides.

The first round of sanctions having failed, Biden promised more would be coming, as he declared that Russia's actions constituted a blatant violation of international law.

Meanwhile, major Western powers sought fresh ways to show that Russia would incur real costs unless it changes course.

The White House announced that President Barack Obama was inviting the leaders of the G-7 group of nations to a meeting in Europe next week to discuss further action. The group normally meets under the banner of the G-8, including Russia, but has suspended preparations for upcoming G-8 talks.

And in London, British Foreign Secretary William Hague says the U.K. was suspending military cooperation with Russia in light of

the crisis.

"It's a simple fact that Russia's political and economic isolation will only increase if it continues down this dark path," Biden said, adding that virtually the entire world rejects the referendum in Crimea on Sunday that cleared the way for Russia to absorb it.

For his part, Putin seemed to shrug off the tough talk from the West, describing Russia's move to add Crimea to its map as correcting past injustices.

In an emotional, live speech from the Kremlin, he said that "in people's hearts and minds, Crimea has always been an integral part of Russia."

Russia's move in clear defiance of its neighbors and the U.S. ups the pressure on Biden to convince its NATO allies that the U.S. won't roll over. After meeting with Polish Prime

Minister Donald Tusk, Biden headed to the Poland's presidential palace to consult with President Bronislaw Komorowski.

In sessions Tuesday in the Polish capital and later in Lithuania's capital, Vilnius, Biden was to discuss the crisis with the leaders of Estonia, Lithuania and Latvia — three Baltic nations that are deeply concerned about what Russia's military intervention in Ukraine's Crimean Peninsula might portend for the region.

All four countries share borders with Russia, while Poland also borders Ukraine.

Biden said the goal is for NATO to emerge from this crisis stronger and more unified than ever. While in Europe, Biden planned to discuss what additional steps the U.S. can take to shore up security for Poland and the Baltics, such as increased training, said a senior administration official, who wasn't authorized to comment by name and demanded anonymity.

At Warsaw's request, the U.S. last week sent some 300 air troops and a dozen F-16 fighters to Poland for joint training in a show of military support for a key ally.

Also on the agenda: long-term energy secu-

rity in Europe, a key factor that has founded the West's attempts to display a united front in punishing Russia. Much of Europe is heavily dependent on Russian natural gas, and European countries have major economic interests in Russia that could be in jeopardy if Moscow retaliates with sanctions of its own.

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Bird Poop: Nature takes its toll

The Schleicher County Courthouse is a striking architectural example of Classic Revival structures. Constructed during 1923-1924 and located in Eldorado, it replaced an earlier building that burned in 1917. Granted a Texas Historic Landmark designation in 1991, the 3-story courthouse has a native stone façade obtained from nearby quarries.

Four, half-round giant order Doric columns support a raised horizontal structure at the top. More than once, this entablature, with its continuous ledge as an accent, has been deemed the perfect place for an amorous courtship.

During the night of the first month or two of a new year, a raucous couple would express their passion to a quiet neighborhood. Having left the building by late afternoon, most county employees and visitors never experienced the noise of this avian prelude to nesting. They had, however, seen the results of broken eggs splattered on the sidewalk.

When Game Warden Chris Frey called our contact in San Angelo, he described finding one of two great horned owls that frequent the courthouse. "They nest on the ledge. This one can't fly," he continued.

Diane Tracy paused when he asked if she could come to Eldorado. To go that far would mean the veterinary clinic would be closed by the time she returned. Then the officer asked if she would meet him in Cristoval.

Some 14 miles south of San Angelo, the small community was a better meeting spot for her. When the game warden

showed her the owl, she immediately noticed that one of its eyes was completely black.

"It may be blind in that eye, but it could still fly until today." Then he added, "The other owl is still up there. We think this one is part of that pair."

By the time she arrived back in San Angelo, Diane knew in 10 minutes the clinic would be closed. A phone call reassured her the veterinarian would wait for her.

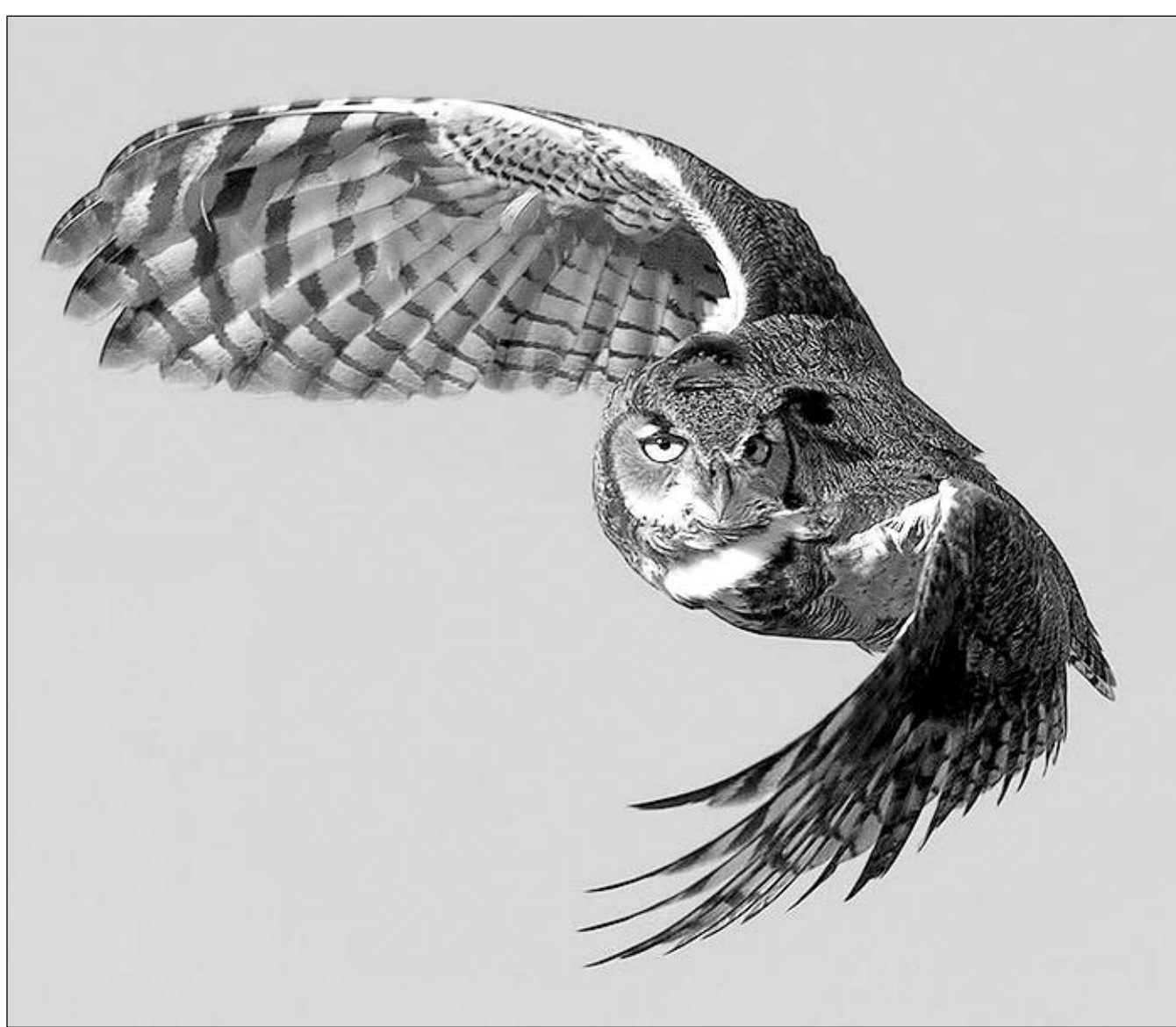
After confirming the lack of sight in the owl's eye, Dr. Karen Frembgen then felt its wings. A fracture near one wrist could heal.

An interruption by a phone call lent even more emphasis on the bird's recovery. The game warden's wife, Rita, is a professional wildlife photographer. She even has a nature center in Sonora. Before the owl had been delivered to Diane, she had taken a picture of it.

Previously, she had photographed one of the two owls atop the courthouse. When she compared her recent photo with the others, she and Chris confirmed it was the same bird.

Calling for her at home, the officer told Diane's husband the owl taken to the vet clinic was the same his wife had photographed earlier. Once he had gained the veterinarian's number, the game warden was able to share, through modern technology, a picture to show Dr. Frembgen and Diane that they were holding that same owl.

Having seen dried blood on the lower bill, Diane then mentioned that wasn't a good sign. As the veterinarian felt of the lower part, the worst was confirmed. Only flesh and skin



held the broken jaw in place.

As they looked at each other, Diane and her vet knew they had reached the inevitable. The head trauma suffered by the owl was too much to overcome.

When Diane called me that evening, she related the story of the twosome at the courthouse. She said the one she had picked up was blind in one eye. Its mate, according to the game warden and his wife, had one leg.

The loss of one potential parent and its ability to secure food for the young and its mate weighed heavily upon Diane. The next day, she called the game warden. To ascertain if there were young on that ledge was critical.

When he called later, his news was that the remaining bird had left. There was no nest to be

seen.

Knowing that great horned owls are not known for their construction of nests, I gave her some examples of what I had found. Eggs deposited on bare metal in air-conditioning vents. Young found in the crook of a tree with a twig or two, a few feathers, and remnants of half eaten mice and rats.

It was no wonder the eggs had rolled off the ledge to splatter on the walkways. The parents were as bad as pigeons in their lack of nest building abilities.

Attracted to each other, the disabled owls had answered the passionate urges of their specie.

Their determination to further their numbers had compelled them to overcome their limitations.

The stately stone edifice had offered a safe and elevated platform for the family-to-be. Instead, it had become a silent witness to the tenacious behaviors

found in nature.

News in brief

After Crimea, world anxiously awaits Putin's next move

MOSCOW (AP) — With Crimea in Russia's pocket, the world anxiously awaits Vladimir Putin's next move.

Beyond the prize of the Black Sea peninsula, a picture is emerging of what the Russian president ultimately wants from his power play: broad autonomy for Ukraine's Russian-speaking regions and guarantees that Ukraine will never realize the Kremlin's worst nightmare — joining NATO.

The big question is whether Putin is willing to invade more areas of eastern Ukraine to achieve these goals.

For the West, it all boils down to a tough dilemma over compromising with Moscow to avert military conflict or taking a hard-line stance and risking a Russian invasion of Ukraine. Putin has sent clear signals he could take extreme measures if he doesn't get his way on keeping Ukraine out of NATO and ensuring that Ukraine remains in Russia's political and economic orbit.

Sunday's referendum in Crimea, which overwhelmingly supported joining Russia, has also raised fears that Ukraine's eastern provinces could try to hold their own independence votes.

China: Checks on Chinese on missing jet find no terror links

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Checks into the background of the Chinese citizens on board the missing Malaysia Airlines jet-

liner have uncovered no links to terrorism, the Chinese ambassador in Kuala Lumpur said Tuesday.

The remarks will dampen rule out speculation that Uighur Muslim separatists in far western Xinjiang province might have been involved with the disappearance of the Boeing 777 and its 239 passengers and crew early on March 8.

The plane was carrying 154 Chinese passengers, when Malaysian officials say someone on board deliberately di-

verted it from its route to Beijing less than one hour into the flight. A massive search operation in the Indian Ocean and beyond has yet to find any trace of the plane.

Chinese Ambassador to Malaysia Huang Hui-kang said background checks on Chinese nationals didn't uncover any evidence suggesting they were involved in hijacking or an act of terrorism against the plane, according to the state Xinhua News Agency.

The best players play well, but they don't always achieve the perfection they could attain if they saw all four hands. For example, take this deal where all four players would have bid or played differently had they seen each other's cards.

North had no convenient bid over West's weak jump-overcall of two hearts. But when he passed and South showed a good hand by bidding three clubs, North indicated

interest in game by cuebidding West's suit. South read this as showing a heart stopper, and, after accepting North's invitation to bid three notrump, then stood his ground when East doubled.

West led a heart, and South ran like a bunny with nine tricks. He could have made two overtricks by guessing which way to take the diamond finesse, but he was understandably content to settle for three notrump doubled.

Of course, had West been sufficiently inspired to lead the king and another spade, the contract would have failed. But then, had North-South seen all the hands, they would have bid five clubs, which could not have been defeated.

East surely would have altered the outcome had he simply raised two hearts to three, or even had he bid two spades. After either action, North-South could scarcely have arrived at three notrump, and it is doubtful that they would have reached five clubs.

Part of the fascination of bridge lies in attempting to gain the maximum result on every deal, even though every player realizes that, realistically, this goal is impossible to attain. But there's still a lot of fun — and certainly no harm — in analyzing all the different possibilities.

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Cowboys sign former Browns QB to 2-year deal

(AP) — The Dallas Cowboys have three quarterbacks with starting experience in the NFL — at least for now.

The Cowboys added free agent Brandon Weeden on a two-year contract Monday even though they expect Kyle Orton to return behind Tony Romo next season.

There have been reports Orton might not come back for a third season as Romo's back-

up, but the team is expecting Orton to be on hand. Dallas carried two quarterbacks late last season after Alex Tanney was claimed off the practice squad by Cleveland, where Weeden had fallen out of favor.

Weeden was a first-round pick by the Browns in 2012 and had a promising rookie season, when he passed for 3,385 yards and won five

starts. However, he started poorly in 2013, got benched, lost his confidence and never recovered.

He also became a target of abuse by Cleveland fans, who grew tired of him forcing passes and making bad decisions. He was released last week.

At 30, Weeden is much older than a typical third-year NFL player because he played professional baseball for five

years before finishing his college career. He started his baseball career with the Yankees' organization.

The Browns picked Weeden 22nd overall after two strong seasons as the starter at Oklahoma State, also the college home of Dallas Pro Bowl receiver Dez Bryant. Weeden had Oklahoma State in contention for the 2011 national championship game before

settling for the school's first BCS bowl bid, a 41-38 victory over Stanford in the Fiesta Bowl.

Orton made his only start for Dallas in the season finale against Philadelphia last year with a playoff berth on the line. Romo injured his back a week earlier against Washington and had surgery two days before the Cowboys lost to the Eagles.

Rangers send Tepesch to Round Rock

SURPRISE, Ariz. (AP) — Texas Rangers right-hander Nick Tepesch, who had been a candidate for the starting rotation, was optioned to Triple-A Round Rock on Monday after a couple of rough outings.

Tepesch had never pitched about Double-A before last spring, when he earned the spot as the Rangers' fifth starter. But he had an 11.25 ERA in three starts this spring, and in his last game Saturday allowed nine hits and seven runs in three innings against AL West rival Oakland.

That was among 11 moves made by Rangers, which came two weeks before their regular-season opener.

Jose Contreras, a 42-year-old right-hander in camp on a minor league deal, was offered reassignment to minor league camp. The team said Contreras is weighing his options, and might retire as an active player.

Contreras had a 10.50 ERA in three games this spring training. The Cuban pitcher, who had ligament replacement surgery on his right el-

bow in June 2012, spent last season with the Pittsburgh and Boston organizations. He made seven relief appearances for the Pirates last May. He has a 78-67 career record in the major leagues, with a 4.57 ERA over 299 games with the New York Yankees, Chicago White Sox, Colorado, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

The Rangers also optioned right-handers Cory Burns and Miles Mikolas, and infielder Andy Parrino, to Round Rock.

Tepesch was 4-6 with a 4.84 ERA in 19 games (17 starts) for the Rangers last season.

Among six players reassigned to minor league camp was right-hander Daniel Bard, who is still going through rehabilitation from surgery in January for Thoracic Outlet Syndrome. When the Rangers signed Bard to a minor league contract in February, they knew he wouldn't be an option for the start of the season.

Also sent to the minor league camp were catchers Patrick Cantwell and Brett Nicholas.

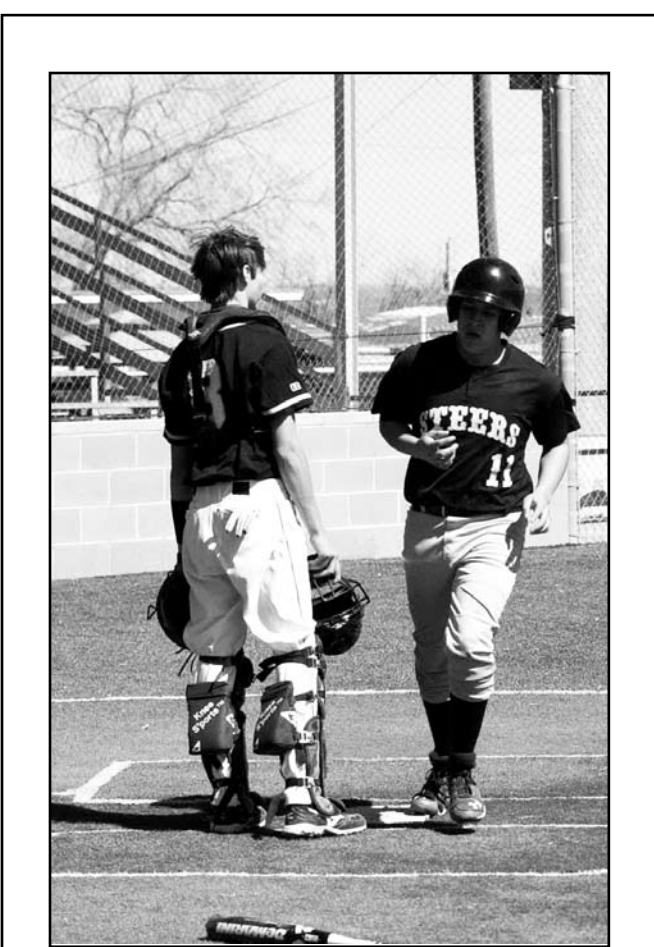

Colts owner has double image in media

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Colts owner Jim Irsay is known in NFL circles as a tough businessman and eccentric billionaire who enjoys interacting with fans about his beloved team and favorite songs from bands like the Beatles and the Grateful Dead.

He may end up adding convicted felon to the mix.

Irsay was pulled over near his home in suburban Carmel just before midnight Sunday by police who said they found multiple prescription

drugs inside his vehicle. He was spotted driving slowly, stopping in the roadway and failing to use a turn signal, and police said Irsay failed several roadside field sobriety tests.

The drugs weren't associated with any of the pill bottles found inside, police said.

The 54-year-old Irsay, who acknowledged a painkiller dependency more than a decade ago, faces preliminary charges of misdemeanor driving while intoxicated and four felony counts

of possession of a controlled substance.

If Irsay is charged and convicted on the felony counts, he could face six months to three years in prison on each count. Chief Deputy Prosecutor Andrew Miksha said no decision had been made on formal charges and a hearing was set for March 26.

Irsay, whose mug shot was posted on websites for millions to see, said nothing as he left the Hamilton County Jail after posting bond Monday.

RGIII may shed knee brace this season

BALTIMORE (AP) — Washington Redskins quarterback Robert Griffin III is feeling so strong that he's ready to ditch the knee brace that he played with last season.

Griffin was on hand for the 36th annual Ed Block Courage Awards in Baltimore on Monday. Players from each NFL franchise nominate a teammate, and

Griffin got the honor in Washington.

He said his teammates picking him for the award was especially meaningful considering their challenging 2013 season, when the Redskins lost their last eight games to finish 3-13.

"It was a tough year," Griffin said. "We didn't win a lot of games, (so) it's truly a testament to my teammates to show

me they still have faith in me, to show me that they appreciate what I had to go through last year coming back from the injury and all the turmoil during the season. That's special to me."

Griffin spent most of the last offseason trying to rehabilitate his surgically repaired right knee. He struggled for much of the year.

Call and inquire whether she'd like to see her grandchild. We hope she will agree.

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, March 18, the 77th day of 2014. There are 288 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On March 18, 1974, most of the Arab oil-producing nations ended their 5-month-old embargo against the United States that had been sparked by American support for Israel in the Yom Kippur War. On this date: In 1766, Britain repealed the Stamp Act of 1765. In 1837, the 22nd and 24th president of the United States, Grover

Cleveland, was born in Caldwell, N.J. In 1913, King George I of Greece was assassinated in Thessaloniki. In 1937, some 300 people, mostly children, were killed in a gas explosion at a school in New London, Texas. In 1938, Mexican President Lazaro Cardenas nationalized his country's petroleum reserves and took control of foreign-owned oil facilities. In 1940, Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini met at the Brenner Pass, where the Italian dictator agreed to join Germany's war against France and Britain. In 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the Hawaii

statehood bill. (Hawaii became a state on Aug. 21, 1959.) In 1962, France and Algerian rebels signed the Evian Accords, a cease-fire agreement which took effect the next day, ending the Algerian War. In 1990, thieves made off with 13 works of art from the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston (the crime remains unsolved).

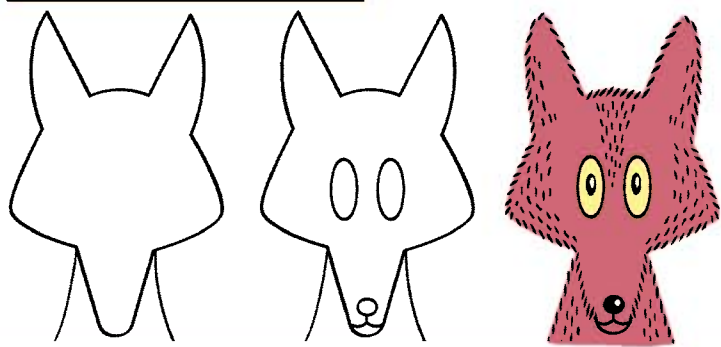
