Mudslide recovery brings tears to searchers

"I can go home and ... eat some food, hug

Associated Press DARRINGTON, Wash. -

As firefighter Jeff McClelland uncovered a body on the moon-like surface that blankets what used to be the community of Oso, he soon realized that the search party had a close connection to the victim: The dead man's son and brother were among the volunteers scouring the debris field. The relatives sat beside the

body as it was zipped into a bag. McClelland found himself overcome with tears. The discovery served as

a touching reminder of the deeply emotional work that is playing out in this tightknit town as rescuers like

Scores of people once thought missing in the mudslide have turned up safe, but that provided little relief to rescuers like McClelland

who are tasked with bringing

been found.

Hope of a miracle discovery of a survivor has faded as the search entered its sixth day Thursday, replaced by acknowledgement that some families may not be able to bury a body.

Authorities cross-referencing the reports they received of missing people with those who had checked were able to eliminate 140 people from the list of the missing Wednesday, said Snohomish County Emergency Management Director John Pennington.

That left 90 confirmed missing, with another 35 who authorities are unsure were in



Thai satellite spots 300 objects floating in Indian Ocean near search area for Malaysian plane

BANGKOK (AP) — A Thai satellite has detected about 300 objects floating in the Indian Ocean near the search area for the missing Malaysia Airlines jetliner, officials said Thursday.

Anond Snidvongs, director of Thailand's space technology development agency, said the images showed "300 objects of various sizes" in the southern Indian Ocean about 2,700 kilometers (1,675 miles) southwest of Perth, Australia.

Some of the objects were estimated at up to 16 meters (52 feet) long, he said. The images were taken by the Thaichote satellite

on Monday, took two days to process and were relayed to Malaysian authorities on Wednesday.

Anond says the objects were about 200 kilometers (125 miles) from the area where a French satellite

on Sunday spotted 122 objects. It remains uncertain whether the objects are from Malaysia Airlines Flight 370, which disappeared March 8 with 239 people aboard.

Uneasy on the eyes: Spotters hunting for missing Malaysia Airlines flight face tough task

PERTH, Australia (AP) — They stare out at a punishingly unbroken expanse of gray water that seems, at times, to blend into the clouds. Occasionally, they press their foreheads against the plane's windows so hard they leave grease marks, their eyes darting up and down, left and right, looking for something — anything — that could explain the fate of the missing Malaysia Airlines plane.

The hunt for Flight 370, which vanished on March 8 during a trip from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing, is complicated in just about every way imaginable,

from the vastness of the search area to its distance from land to the brutal weather that plagues it. But for all the fancy technology on board the planes and vessels scouring the swirling waters, the best tool searchers have are their own eyes.

Those eyes can spot things man-made equipment cannot. But they are also subject to the peculiarities of the human brain. They can play tricks. They can blink at the wrong moment. They can, and often do, grow weary. "It is incredibly fatiguing work," says Flight Lt.

Stephen Graham, tactical coordinator for the crew on board a Royal New Zealand Air Force P-3 Orion that has made six sorties into the southern Indian Ocean search zone. Search and rescue makes up a small part of what

Graham's squadron does, and visual spotting is an even smaller subset of that. But everyone on board has had to learn how to do it — and it's not as simple as most people think.

Crews found another body late Wednesday, said Brian McMahan, a landslide incident spokesman. Authorities have now discovered at least 25 bodies, though not all have been recovered. Authorities said they expected to update the toll Thursday morning.

Bach spoke via phone about a wedding the family had planned for summer at the rural home that was destroyed. And how, she wondered, do you plan a funeral without a body? "We'll probably just have a memorial, and if they find the bodies eventually, then we'll deal with that then."

A death certificate, issued by the state, is legal proof that someone has died. Families often need them to settle their affairs. The authority to issue them starts with a county medical examiner or coroner, said Donn Moyer, spokesman for the Washington State Department of Health. If and when it appears there is no chance of finding someone, people can ask the county to start that process.

Two Washington National Guard Blackhawk helicopters arrived at the site Wednesday to relieve sheriff's helicopter crews that had been working since Saturday.

The Blackhawks' sole mission is body removal, said Bill Quistorf, chief pilot for the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office.

Annie's Mailbox

Dear Annie: My parents are both in their 80s and don't get around well anymore. Dad has a history of verbal (sometimes physical) abuse, and Mom has always put up with it. Recently, Mom has been cornering family members and telling them how crazy Dad is, that he screams at her all the time, hits her with his cane and pinches her. We had a domestic relations caseworker come to the house when Dad wasn't home, and Mom told the caseworker that everything was fine and not to come back. She told me Dad would be upset if he found out.

My mother is in better physical shape than Dad, and I'm quite sure she could hurt him if she chose to. But she is becoming forgetful and making mental errors. She blames it on living with Dad. My father cannot deal with her mind going, so he yells at her even more. Despite that, she continues to make him dinner, put on his shoes and help him get around. My wife and I have begged her to come live with us, but she refuses.

She wants us to tell
Dad's doctor that he is
crazy. I don't think he's
the crazy. He's a depressed
man whose body is failing.
He was prescribed
antidepressants, but won't
take them. Mom tells Dad
that she's sick of him, and
he says he can't stand
looking at her. But
apparently, they can't live
without each other. Any

advice? -- Help

Dear Help: Some
couples fall into a
dysfunctional pattern of

behavior and cannot envision living any other way. You cannot force Mom to confirm abuse to the authorities, nor can you make Dad take his antidepressants.

Nonetheless, if your mother is showing signs of dementia, and Dad is abusive, you need to be more proactive.

Ask each parent whether you can accompany them to their doctor for a checkup. That will give you the opportunity to discuss the problem. You also can write the physician or call and leave a message with all the pertinent information. Please keep an eye on their situation, be attentive to Mom's complaints, and try to get both of them out of the house, individually, as often as possible.

Dear Annie: How does one get a job in this century? Is it enough to send online applications and not follow up with a phone call or a visit to the business? Please help. -- A Wife

Dear Wife: Send applications in whatever form the company requests (most now prefer them to be online). If you do not hear back within 10 days that the application was received, follow up with a phone call or an email. If the company does not let you know whether or not they are interested within another two weeks, call or email again. Make sure your resume is current and include a cover letter. You also can check at your local library for assistance in putting the materials together and navigating

the application process.





Not All Roads Lead to Rome

Opening lead jack of diamonds Consider this deal where South is declarer at four hearts. You'd probably agree with East's opening diamond bid, South's one-heart overcall and West's one-spade bid, but might disagree with what happened from then on. Most players would bid only two hearts with the North hand, and some would not carry on to four hearts with the South hand.

Be that as it may, let's say declarer ducks West's jack-of-diamonds lead and wins the next diamond with the ace. He then success-

fully finesses the queen of spades,

cashes the ace and ruffs a spade in dummy. Next comes a low heart to the eight, taken by West with the ace.

West is now forced to return a club, since a spade would yield a ruff-and-discard. When he leads the five, South plays the nine from dummy and captures East's king with the ace. Declarer cashes the queen of trumps and then leads a club toward dummy's J-2. West goes up with the queen, but the battle is over, and South makes four hearts after parking his diamond loser on dummy's jack of clubs.

A good workmanlike job by declarer, you might say — especially his decision to tackle spades at trick three instead of leading trumps first. It was this farsighted maneuver that eventually forced West to lead a club at trick seven and enabled South to avoid losing a second diamond trick.

If you analyze the situation more closely, however, you find that there were two ways West could have defeated the contract. First, if he had cashed the ace of hearts at trick two before leading his second diamond, he could not have been forced to break the clubs later.

Failing that, however, all he had

to do was to return the queen of clubs rather than the five at trick seven! There is nothing declarer can do to overcome this extraordinary play, and South must go down one.

Louisville faces rival Kentucky in quest to repeat

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Louisville's quest of fulfilling coach Rick Pitino's hopes for the Cardinals repeating as national champions and becoming a "mini-dynasty" hinge on beating archrival Kentucky.

That's going to be a tough challenge against the Wildcats, who have been a thorn in the Cardinals' side.

Eighth-seeded Kentucky

(26-10) enters Friday night's Midwest Regional showdown against fourth-seeded Louisville (31-5) with a 3-2 edge in the NCAA tournament and a 31-15 series lead. The Wildcats have won five of the last six against Louisville, including at the 2012 Final Four en route to their eighth national championship, and a 73-66 victory last year in Lexington on Dec. 28.

Kentucky would love to former Louisville great Dardash Louisville's dream of a third straight Final Four appearance, considering the Wildcats are trying to win their own second title in three

For Louisville to win, the Cardinals need to forget history and focused on what they've been doing to win 14 of their last 15.

'We're looking for revenge,"

With most of a week to prepare, it's likely Ryan has cooked up a way to penetrate the scheme.

"You have to probe," Ryan said. "But I've seen the way they're playing it. Attacking it and getting people to move a certain direction, and using your angles and misdirection and different things that good zone offensive teams use, we're going to have to put all those together."

Few teams in recent seasons have been better in March than Baylor, which has won 17 of its 20 postseason games over the last six years.

The Bears haven't been content with Sweet

16 success, either: They reached the regional final before losing to the eventual national champion in 2010 and 2012. They missed the NCAA tournament last year, but went ahead and won the NIT anyway.


