DPS seeks person of interest in slaying

SNYDER — The Texas Department of Public Safety is looking for a person-of-interest in the murder of Omar Alejandro Diaz in Snyder.

The DPS Texas Rangers Division was contacted by the Snyder Police Department on March 22 to assist with the investigation.

Diaz was found dead at his residence in Snyder and was last seen with his girlfriend on March 14 in Lorenzo, Texas. The girlfriend possibly goes by Casandra, Cassie or Cassidy Lopez and is approximately 21 years old.

Lopez has a tattoo of "Respect" on her upper chest. The tattoo reads "Loyalty" when looked at upside down.

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Poll: Health care law fails to gain support

WASHINGTON — Public support for President Barack Obama's health care law is languishing at its lowest level since passage of the landmark legislation four years ago, according to a new poll.

The Associated Press-GfK survey finds that 26 percent of Americans support the Affordable Care Act. Yet even fewer — 13 percent — think it will be completely repealed. A narrow majority expects the law to be further implemented with minor changes, or as passed.

"To get something repealed that has been passed is pretty impossible," said Gwen Sliger of Dallas. "At this point, I

don't see that happening."

Sliger illustrates the prevailing national mood. Although a Democrat, she's strongly opposed to Obama's signature legislation. But she thinks "Obamacare" is here to stay.

"I like the idea that if you have a pre-existing condition you can't be turned down, but I don't like the idea that if you don't have health insurance you'll be fined," said Sliger.

The poll was taken before Thursday's announcement by the White House that new health insurance markets have surpassed the goal of 6 million sign-ups, so it did not register any of the potential impact of that news on public opinion. Open enrollment

season began with a dysfunctional HealthCare.gov website last Oct. 1 but will end Monday on what looks to be a more positive note.

Impressions of the health care rollout while low, have improved slightly.

While only 5 percent of Americans say the launch of the insurance exchanges has gone very or extremely well, the number who think it has gone at least somewhat well has improved from 12 percent in December to 26 percent now. The exchanges offer subsidized private coverage to people without a plan on the job.

Of those who said they or someone in their household tried signing up for coverage,

59 percent said there were problems.

Repealing the health care law is the rallying cry of Republicans running to capture control of the Senate in the fall congressional elections. The Republican-led House has already voted more than 50 times to repeal, defund or scale back "Obamacare," but has been stymied in its crusade by Democrats running the Senate.

Thursday, five Democratic senators and one independent — three facing re-election — introduced a package of changes to the law that seems calibrated to public sentiment. One of their major

proposals would spare companies with fewer than 100 employees from a requirement to provide coverage to their workers. The current cutoff is 50.

The poll found that 7 in 10 Americans believe the law will be implemented with changes.

Forty-two percent think those changes will be minor, and 30 percent say they think major changes are in store.

Combining the 42 percent who see minor changes coming and 12 percent who say they think the law will be implemented as passed, a narrow majority of 54 percent see either tweaks in store, or no changes at all.

Larry Carroll, 64, a church deacon from Cameron, W.Va., says he would like to see major changes — but he doesn't have high

hopes.

"I think it's much too big a thing for the country to be taking on," said Carroll.

"I don't see repeal," he added. "The federal bureaucracy simply seems to be too strong. The federal bureaucracy is like an anaconda."

Teresa Stevens, a factory supervisor from Jacksonville, Fla., said her two adult sons shopped for coverage on the health insurance exchanges and found it too expensive.

"There are so many different things they say about (the law) that are not true," she said. "It's not affordable."

A supporter of former Democratic President

Bill Clinton, Stevens said the economy has soured for working people under Obama. "Everything is so expensive, not just health care," she said.

The poll found that much of the slippage for the health care law over the last four years has come from a drop in support, not an increase in opposition.

In April of 2010, soon after the law passed, 50 percent of Americans said they were opposed to it, while 39 percent were in favor. Ten percent were on the fence.

Now, just 26 percent say they are in favor, a drop of 13 percentage points. Forty-three percent say they are

opposed, a drop of 7 percentage points since that poll four years ago. But the number who neither support nor oppose the law has tripled, to 30 percent.

The 26 percent in favor in the AP-GfK poll is not significantly different from the 27 percent registered in January and December.

The AP-GfK Poll was conducted March 20-24 using KnowledgePanel, GfK's probability-based online panel designed to be representative of the U.S. population. It involved online interviews with 1,012 adults and has a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3.4 percentage points.

Respondents were first selected randomly using phone or mail survey methods and were later interviewed online. People who didn't otherwise have access to the Internet were provided with the ability to access the Internet at no cost to them.

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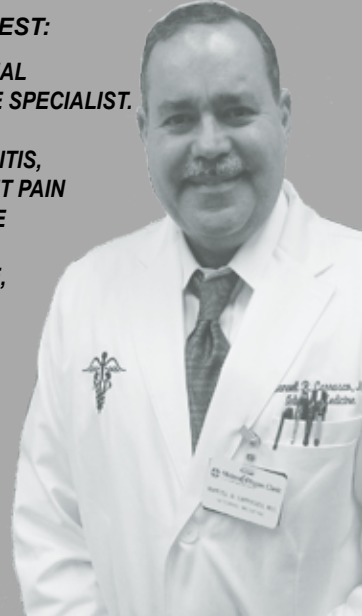

Official: Papal visit to Israel in doubt

JERUSALEM (AP) — A top Roman Catholic official in the Holy Land said Thursday that a trip to Israel by Pope Francis in late May is now in doubt because of a strike by Israeli diplomats, even as the Vatican said travel preparations were going ahead.

A cancellation of the trip could embarrass the Israeli government, which has been excitedly gearing up for the visit.

It is to be just the second foreign trip for Francis since he became pope a year ago.

Latin Patriarch Fouad Twal, the top Catholic clergyman in the region, told reporters in Jerusalem that he was hopeful that the trip would go on as planned. But he warned that if the diplomats' strike continues, Israel may be removed from the itinerary.

"If the strike will go two months, I don't think that we can make the visit to Israel," he said. Planned stops in Jordan and the West Bank during the May 24-26 trip will not be affected, he added.

The Israeli Foreign Ministry coordinates all visits by foreign dignitaries, handling everything from logistics to protocol. A diplomat said that another government ministry could theoretically take over this work, but that it would be difficult because of the lack of familiarity with procedures and standards. He spoke on

condition of anonymity because of the strike.

The Foreign Ministry went on strike this week, demanding higher salaries and better work conditions. The strike has closed Israel's more than 100 embassies and consulates for the first time. Diplomats had already reduced operations in recent weeks in a prelude to the strike. Among their demands are cost-of-living adjustments and protecting the jobs and conditions of diplomats' spouses who give up careers when their families are sent abroad.

Twal said the Israeli government has assured the church that the trip will not be disrupted. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office declined to comment.

Twal's warning came on the same day the Vatican released an itinerary that has Francis spending his last day of the trip in Israel. It includes visits to the Western Wall and Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial, a meeting with Netanyahu and a Mass in Jerusalem.

The Vatican spokesman, the Rev. Federico Lombardi, said preparations for the trip "are continuing as planned."

He acknowledged the labor issues but said in a statement "it is hoped that formal contacts with the competent authorities can resume as soon as possible" to prepare for the trip.

Intelligent design

Perhaps you have been following the story at Ball State University where the teaching of intelligent design has been prohibited. Eric Hedin, an assistant professor of Physics, promoted the idea to his students that the complex and intricate balance in nature reflects an intelligent design as opposed to a random series of accidental events.

The president of the university ruled that such teaching was not a scientific discipline and had no place in academia, an opinion widely shared in the academic community.

Baylor was embroiled in the controversy when Robert Marks, Distinguished Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, set up a website and lab on the Baylor server to investigate intelligent design in 2007.

Marks used the term "Evolutionary Informatics Lab." Both the website and the lab were shut down within months. When Ken Starr arrived as president at Baylor University, he honored Robert Marks for his efforts.

Regardless of academic positions on the subject, reflections on creation, purpose and intelligence beyond our own are important to all of us. We must ask the questions, "Are we alone?" "Is there anyone else out there?" "Is the human race simply the result of eons of random chance on this third planet from the sun?" "Have millions of years of random chance and survival of the fittest resulted in, well, 'us'?" Or are we created in the divine image of the Creator?

We consider ourselves intelligent. We can solve problems. We can manipulate the natural laws of physics to make them work for us resulting in mechanical and electronic machines that magnify our strength and accelerate our speed. We can ponder ourselves and our own existence. We can imagine things as they could be.

We are quickly making strides in our own creation of artificial intelligence, the design of robotic machinery that perform complex tasks. We already have cars that can drive themselves. Information technology is taking us into realms reserved for the writers of science fiction. "Data," the popular android on Star Trek, may not be so far-fetched after all.

So, whenever we finally create "Data" and others like him, what will the androids think? Will they sit around and discuss whether they were the result of random coincidence, concluding that they have no accountability or connection to the humans that created them? (Seeds for another science fiction epic).

The Bible is quite clear regarding our own origin. The Psalmist says, "For You formed my inward parts; You wove me in my mother's womb. I will give thanks to You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; wonderful are Your works, and my soul knows it very well. My frame was not hidden from You, when I was made in secret." (Psalm 139:13-15).

Something beyond science resonates within us when we stand in awe on the rim of the Grand Canyon; when we behold the beauty of a sunset splashing the sky with crimson, purple and gold; when we walk by the sea listening to the waves crashing on the shore.

Only worship will satisfy the emptiness within, the realization that we are part of a grand design in the mind of God. Our faith in the One who made us fills us with meaning, purpose and peace.

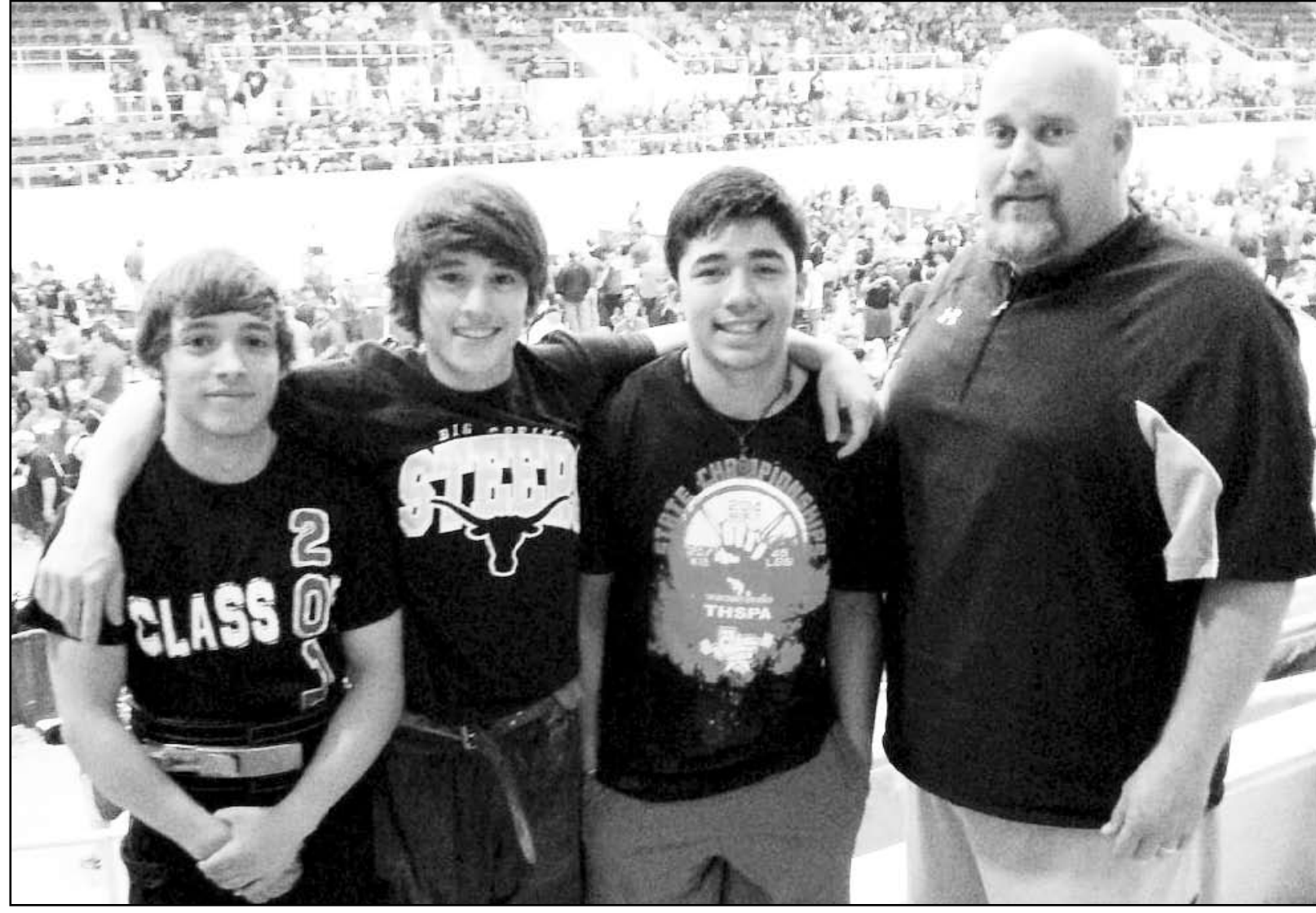
With the win, Big Spring scored 20 points and vaulted into the top spot.

Nairn takes 4th at state meet

Tyler Nairn came about as close to medaling at the 2014 Texas Powerlifting State Championships as humanly possible on Saturday at the Taylor County Expo Center in Abilene.

Maybe even closer.

Nairn, who had led the 123-pound weight classification through the first two lifts at the state tournament was forced to settle for fourth overall when several other participants turned in strong outings on their final attempts in the deadlift competition.

Nairn almost answered with a big lift of his own on his final try. His attempt, however, didn't receive favorable marks

from the three judges, leaving him just 60 pounds shy of a gold medal.

"If he had gotten his last lift, he might have had a chance at winning it," said Big Spring powerlifting coach John Wright. "He was that close."

Nairn turned in a lift of 415 in the squats, and 230 in the bench press for a combined total of 645 after the first two events. Princeton's Darius Rivera and Rio Hondo's Ralph Zapata both trailed by 15 points, at 630, heading into the final event.

Rivera posted a lift of 440 in the deadlift competition and emerged as the classification's top finisher with a total of 1,060. Zapata, with a lift of 400, finished second at 1,030.

Athens' Jose Rodriguez sneaked past Nairn with a lift of 385. His final total was 1,0005 - five points than Nairn.

A junior at Big Spring High School, Nairn was competing in his third straight state powerlifting meet.

The Steers' also picked up a solid outing from Andrew Paredes in the 114-pound classification. He finished 12th in the weight division with a total of 695.

"He did a great job for us," said Wright, noting the BSHS sophomore was competing in only his third meet ever. "The experience was huge for him."

Big Spring's Robert Martinez also attended the meet as an alternate in the 148-pound division. He did not participate in the meet.

In 1930, the names of the Turkish cities of Constantinople and Angora were changed to Istanbul and Ankara. In 1935, the notorious Nazi propaganda film "Triumph des Willens" (Triumph of the Will), directed by Leni Riefenstahl, premiered in Berlin with Adolf Hitler present. In 1941, novelist and critic Virginia Woolf, 59, drowned herself near her home in Lewes, East Sussex, England. In 1943, composer Sergei Rachmaninoff died in Beverly Hills, Calif. In 1969, the 34th president of the United States, Dwight D. Eisenhower, died in Washington, D.C. at age 78.
