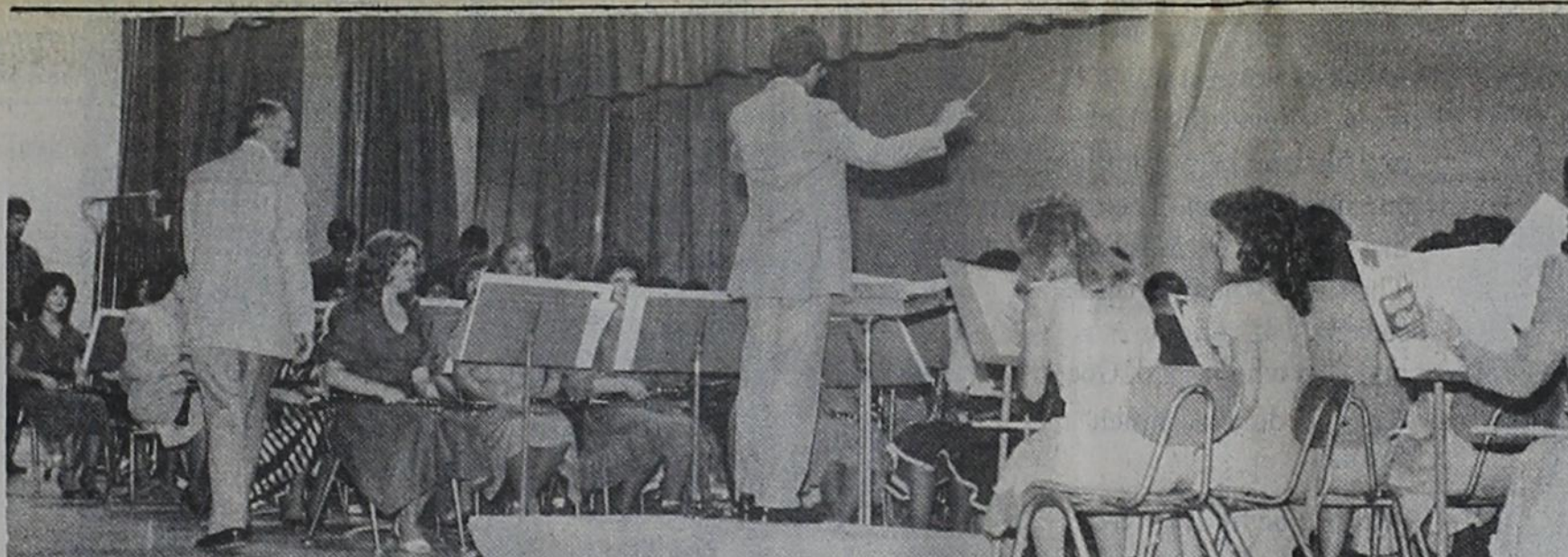

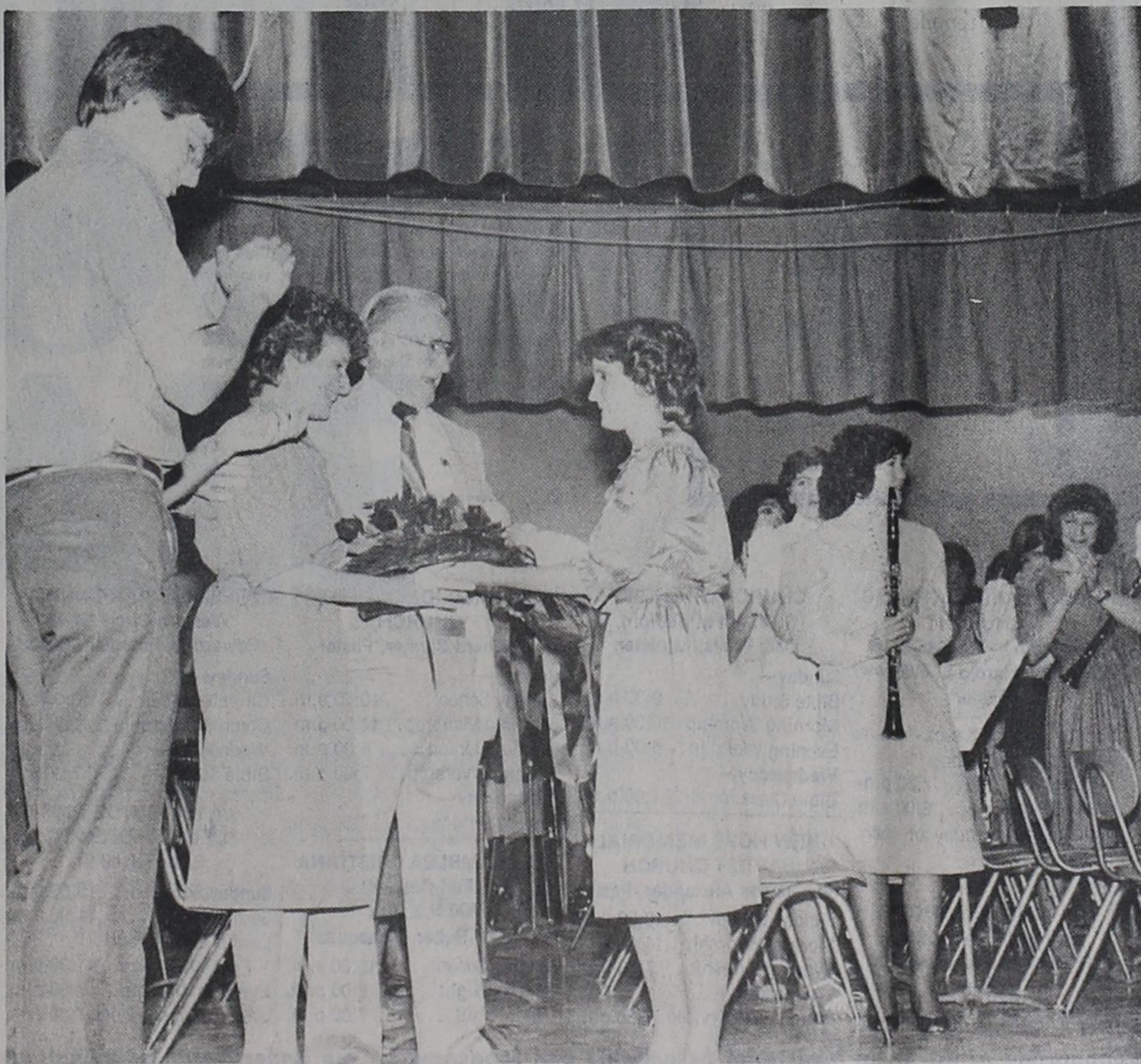

Dr. Lauro Cavazos, president of Texas Tech University, will be the speaker for the Dimmitt High School commencement exercises Friday at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium as 83 seniors receive their diplomas.

Jimmy Davis, president of the Dimmitt chapter of the Texas Tech Ex-Students, will introduce Dr. Cavazos. Supt. Robert Ryan will present the class and Charles Wales, president of the school board, will hand out the diplomas.

Giving the Salutatory address will be John Clymer, with Shelly Frye giving the Valedictory address.

Shan Powell will present the invoca-

tion and Keith Gregory will give the benediction. Tammy Calhoun and Janis Hutcheson will lead in singing the class song, "Ever Since the World Began." The processional and recessional will be played by Zelda Ellison and Shirley Peggram.

Marker to be dedicated at old POW chapel Monday

The historical marker commemorating the prisoner of war camp chapel in Castro County will be dedicated at special services Monday, Memorial Day, at 10 a.m., with Jack Flynt, past national commander of the American

Legion, giving the main address.

The marker, which will be located 17 miles north of Dimmitt on US 385 (about one-half mile north of "Big Daddy's Cutoff"), was obtained through the joint efforts of

the Castro and Deaf Smith County Historical Commissions. A similar marker will be placed in Deaf Smith County along US 60.

At the dedication services, Andrew Kershen, chairman of the Deaf Smith County Historical Commission, will give the welcome, as well as unveiling and reading the marker. Presentation of colors will be performed by the American Legion, and music will be provided by the Hereford High School band. Helen Rose, secretary of the Deaf Smith Historical Commission, will read a history of the prisoner of war camp chapel. The public is invited to attend.

The chapel was built by prisoners of war held at the camp during its three years in operation, beginning in April 1943. Made of brick overlaid with cast concrete, the chapel was built to commemorate prisoners who died in captivity.

The camp included 800 acres of land in Castro and Deaf Smith counties. Most of the prisoners were Italians.

"The chapel has been vandalized through the years, but it still stands as a symbol of the healing possible through peace. Lasting friendships were made between local farmers and prisoners, and guards and prisoners as they learned to appreciate the talents and character of each," remarked a member of the local commission.

Grand Jury bills seven

Last Wednesday, the 242nd District Court grand jury handed down seven indictments on charges ranging from aggravated assault to DWI subsequent offense.

Ramiro Martinez Esquivel, 40, of Dimmitt was indicted on charges of aggravated

assault in connection with an incident May 1 in which two people were stabbed at a local cafe.

John Henry Wooden, 22, of Midland and formerly of Dimmitt, was indicted on charges of theft from the person in connection with pick pocket instances involving victims Clarence Hance, C. G. Maples and Raymond Cooksey.

Burglary charges were listed on the indictment of Steve Tenorio, 25, of Hart in connection with the early May burglary of Farmers Grain elevator in Hart.

The car owned by Scott Rawls of Dimmitt was burglarized in the incident leading to the indictment of Ramon Enriquez, 18, of Irving and formerly of Dimmitt, on charges of burglary of a vehicle.

Theft by check was the charge on indictments given against Don Childers of Tulia and Mildred Sloss of Dimmitt. Pedro Luis Perez, 30, of Bryan was indicted on charges of DWI subsequent offense.

Mixed drink tax rebates received

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said collection of the state's 10% mixed drink tax during the first quarter of 1983 was up 2.7% over the same period last year.

The state received \$36.1 million in taxes on the sale of mixed drinks during the first three months of 1983, and Bullock's office is sending checks totaling \$10.5 million to 220 counties and 415 cities as their share of the gross receipts tax on mixed drinks

for the first quarter.

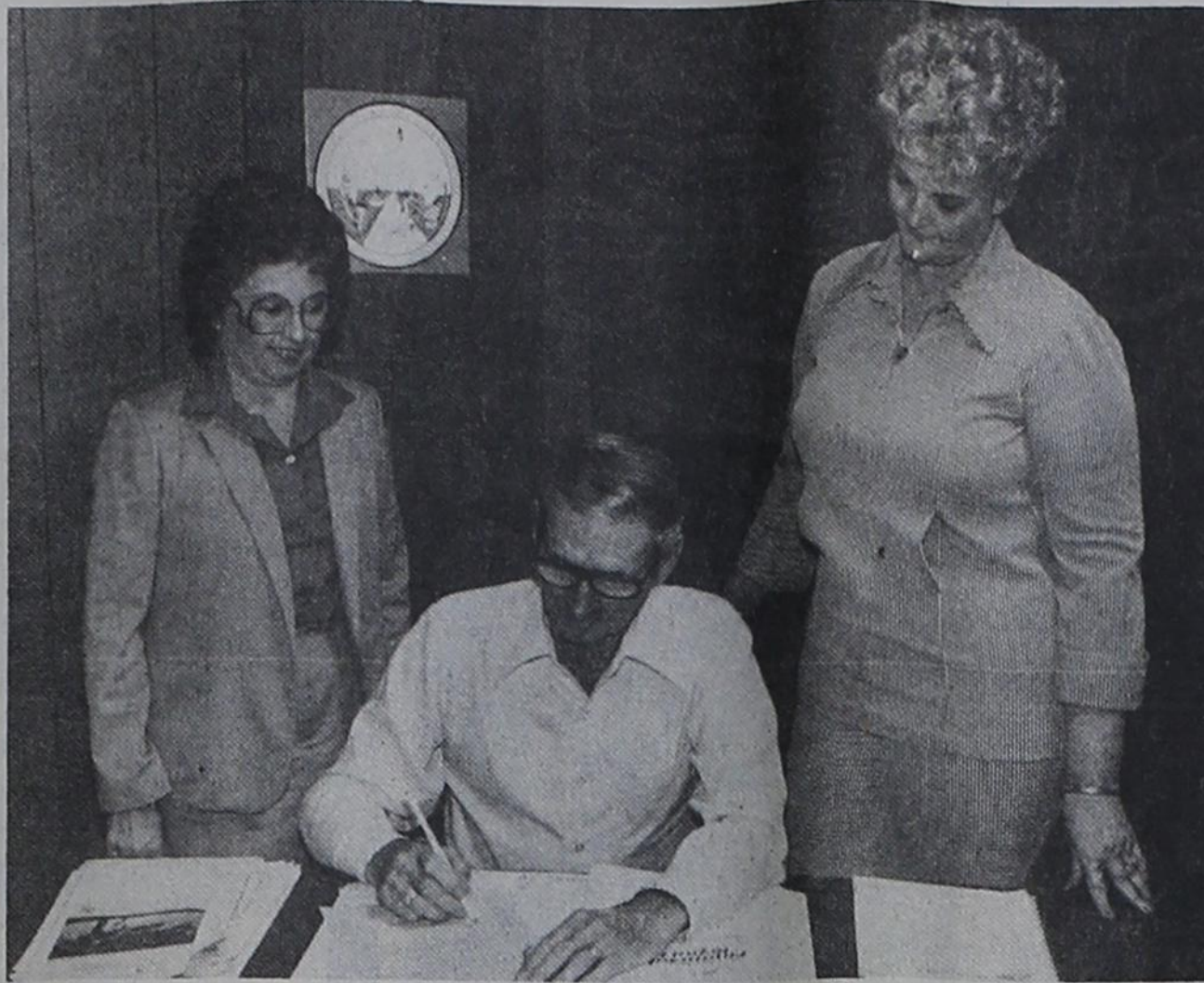
The state's general revenue fund will receive the balance — \$25.6 million — of the tax money collected.

Texas cities and counties each receive a 15% rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state.

Liquor establishments in Castro County sold \$50,915.30 worth of mixed drinks, generating \$5,091.53 in tax revenue. Fifteen percent of that, or \$763.73, was returned to the county.

Dimmitt's \$31,119.20 in mixed drink sales generated \$3,111.92 in tax revenue, bringing the city of Dimmitt a remittance of \$466.79.

Nazareth received a remittance of \$121.10 on total tax revenues of \$807.35, based on sales of \$8,073.50.

Insect scouting workshop is set VETERAN'S SERVICES

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Castro County are invited to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs. The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Allen

Knutson, Extension Entomologist Agent, said. The center is on U.S. Business Route south of the city. The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts

employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs, Knutson said. Tuesday's session opens at 8:45 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension entomologist, outlining the scope of the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program are Dr. Dale Pennington, Extension soil chemist, and Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Frank Petr and Kirby Huffman, Extension agronomists; Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist, and Greg Cronholm, Extension agent-entomology. Wednesday's session, beginning at 9 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures. Leading the sessions will be three county Extension agents for entomology. They are Cronholm of Plainview; Knutson of Dimmitt, and Dale Spurgeon of Crosbyton.

That afternoon, participants will receive practical training on insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session.

County Service Officer My office is in the courthouse, with regular office hours on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, plus other times as needed.

Overpayments come in several ways, such as a veteran or veteran's widow not reporting immediately the loss of a dependent; a student failing to notify being a dropout or dropping courses; or such debts as one being unable to meet home loan mortgage payment, etc.

Recent legislation has expanded the Veterans Administration's authority to collect debts it is owed, advises the director, Waco VA Regional Office.

Public Law 96-466 authorizes the VA to charge interest and administrative costs on those debts. Effective now, simple interest and administrative collection costs will be charged on unpaid principal balances, he stressed.

However, veterans and beneficiaries first are given the opportunity to pay in full within 30 days of the date of notification to prevent any of those interest charges. Additionally, the VA now has the authority to notify consumer reporting agencies of the debts — which might adversely affect a veteran's ability to obtain credit.

In debt cases where legal action has resulted in a judgment being granted, property may be attached, wages garnished or liens filed against property. In the case of federal employees, salaries may be offset up to 15% of the disposable income to satisfy the debt.

He noted that stiff collection procedures may be avoided if debts are paid in full, or an acceptable repayment agreement is established with the VA District Counsel.

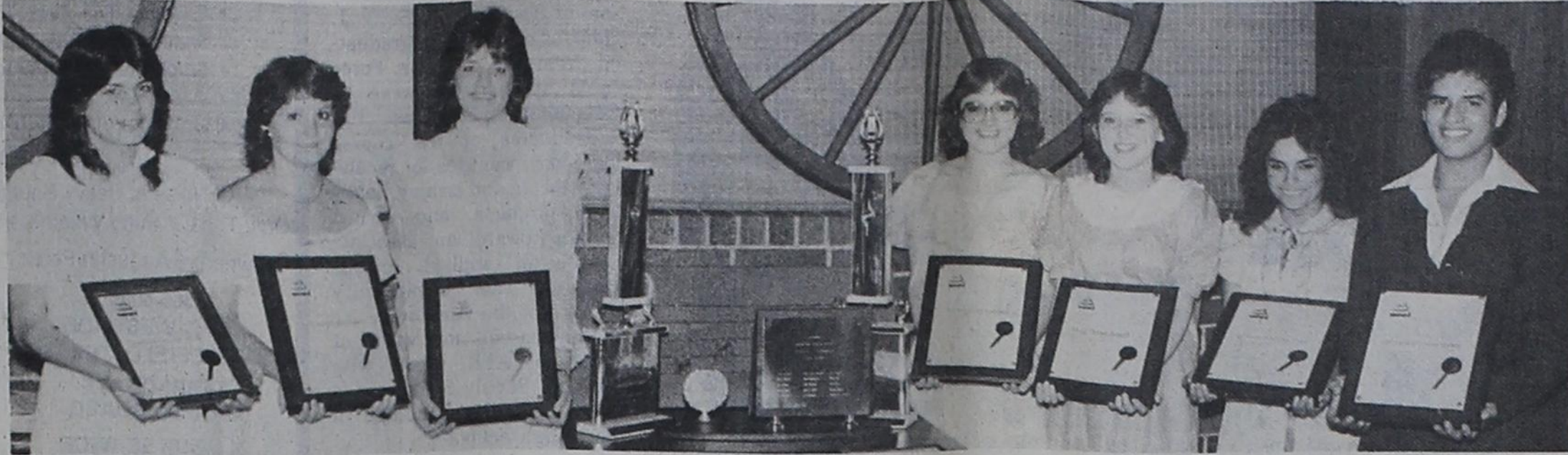

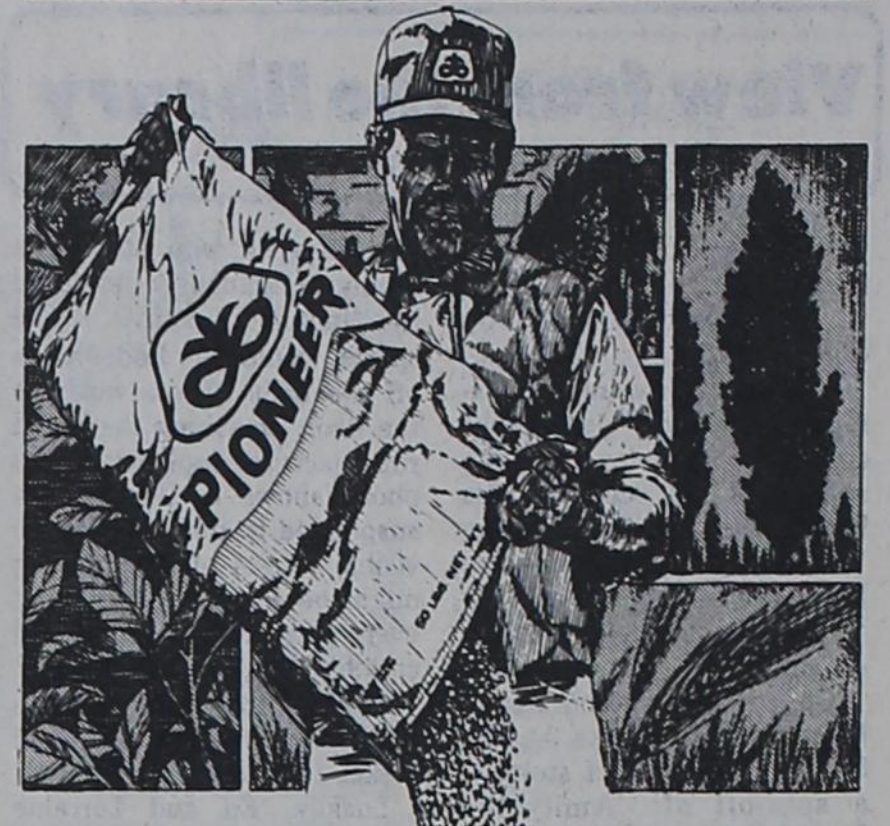
Henry explained that he had come across the handwritten message while filing sheet music away, and felt it

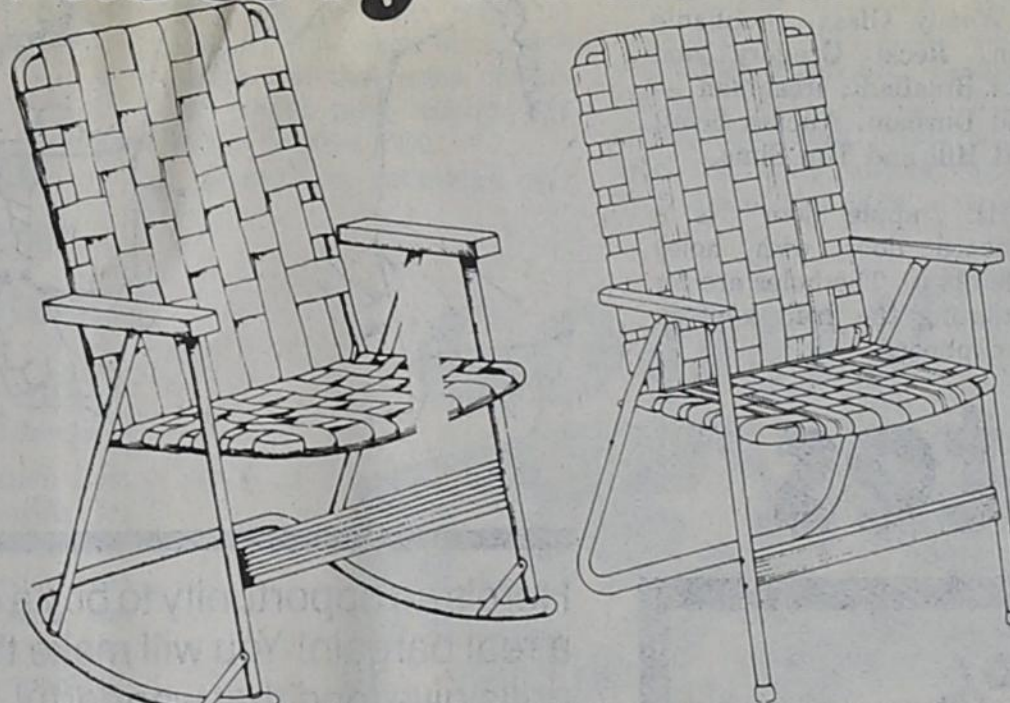

View from the library

A review of a new library book. "The Demonologist" by Gerald Brittle.

Among the several of current books and paperbacks coming out today on the subject of the occult is this book about Ed and Lorraine Warren. At first glance the book seems to be actually "Mom and Pop at the Haunted House."

Oh, yes. It's another one of those kind of books — the Steven King style of story — a spin-off of "Amityville Horror." But wait. Look at the book jacket. There's Mom and Pop Warren in a photo. They look like a nice Jewish couple in front of their deli. Part of the blurb says "I'm talking about what's going on right now."

The Warrens, a New England couple now in their mid-fifties, have been out ghost hunting and spirit looking since the 1940's.

During the 1960's across the country there appeared a special interest in the occult — particularly among the young adults. Ed Warren and his wife began touring college campuses with a lecture on ghosts and spirits. Theirs was not a fanciful review of occult subjects but a fact filled documented lecture on ghosts and "inhuman" spirits. A question and answer session always followed and to conclude their program was a plea to the young not to meddle in the "black" arts. The occult, they warn, is not a harmless diversion.

The book is a third person interview of the Warrens by the author, Gerald Brittle.

Not too many other occult books fact or fiction could be so bizarre. The story about Annebelle the Doll, the second chapter in the book, is presented so well that it raises the hair on the back of one's neck.

The other feature of the book is the photos. The photos document one case of

the Warrens who studied a family continuously bothered by "inhuman" spirits. The spirits would rip bed sheets off the beds, throw vases to the floor, smashing them and ruin electrical appliances. One photo shows a Coke bottle suspended in mid air with no visible means of support. It might be a joke. Except that every story has witnesses and credible sources.

To think that some of these things have actually happened makes the skin crawl a little. Luckily, Ed and Lorraine Warren discuss ghosts, "inhuman" spirits and even demonic possession. By the end of the book they explain how to deal with non physical visitors and how to keep them away.

However, this is not a book to take to bed with you. Happy reading.

Eight injured in April mishaps; DPS urges caution over weekend

Texas Dept. of Public Safety Trooper Rickey Bentley reported that DPS officers investigated six accidents in Castro County during April.

Four accidents resulted in the injuries of eight people. Two accidents were property damage accidents.

In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Panhandle, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 185 accidents during April. Six persons were killed in four fatal accidents. There were 79 accidents which resulted in 129 people injured, and 102 property damage accidents.

With Memorial Day, there is traditionally an increase in traffic accidents. Last year, 58 people died in accidents on Texas streets and highways during the Memorial Day weekend.

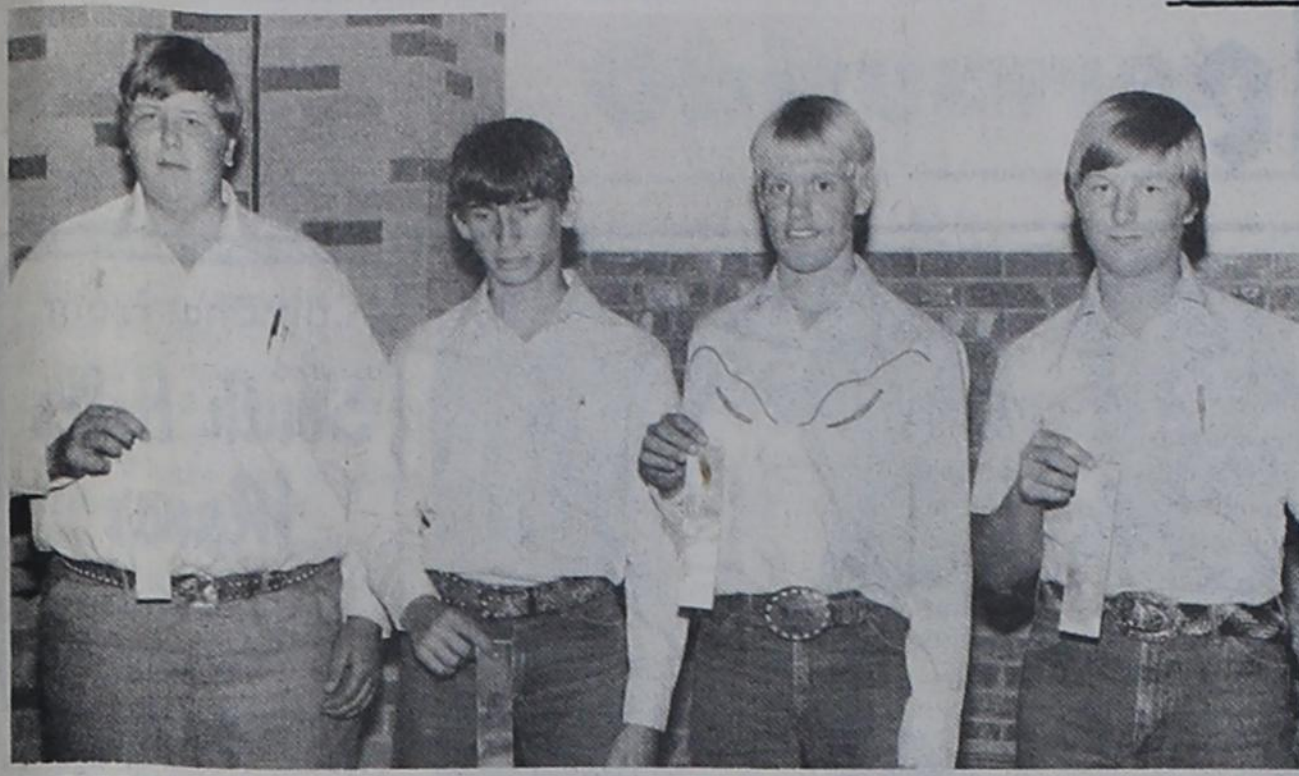
"Statewide traffic fatalities are now about 13% below the number for the same period last year," Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said. "But we also have to remember that the potential for additional fatalities during any holiday weekend is great and we must adjust our driving habits and attitudes accordingly."

"Countless lives would be saved if drivers would not disregard their own safety and the safety of others. Speeding, drinking drivers and carelessness will account for the greatest percentage of deaths this Memorial Day Weekend," Major Vernon Cawthorn, regional commander of the DPS, said.

Memorial Day, the end of school and the beginning of summer vacations, signals an increase in the number of vehicles on the roads.

"Holiday or vacation trips should be planned and a rest stop should be made every two hours to allow drivers and passengers a chance to get out and stretch to help eliminate stress and fatigue," Cawthorn said.

"Drivers who think ahead, stay alert, wear their seat belts, avoid the use of alcohol while driving and obey speed limits can have a safe trip and a fun vacation," he said.

STEER EVALUATION PROGRAM
A Steer Evaluation and Production Symposium at Texas A&M University May 20-21 will focus on a comparison of feedlot versus show steers and similarities or differences from both a carcass and visual standpoint and in production efficiency. The symposium will be based on 46 steers representing 15 different breeds that have been in a performance evaluation program since last October, notes a livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. All steers received the same ration in the same locality.

Cost of PIK could be less than was predicted

When the final verdict is in, PIK may not be as costly a government program as some have suggested.

While estimated costs of the payment-in-kind program range from \$10 to \$25 billion, two economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, peg the cost at about \$11 billion.

Dr. Ron Knutson and Ed Smith break this figure down to \$7.5 billion as the value of PIK commodities, \$2.3 billion for deficiency payments and \$1.3 billion for diversion payments. Deficiency payments result when farm prices drop below a designated level while diversion payments are for taking cropland out of production.

Analyzing the \$11 billion cost of PIK, here's a breakdown by specific commodities: corn, \$5.4 billion; wheat, \$3.1 billion; cotton, \$1.4 billion; grain sorghum, \$700 million; and rice, \$500 million.

"Although the total cost of PIK may seem high compared to farm programs in the '70s, the figure is low compared to what the government's farm program would have cost without PIK," say Knutson and Smith. They estimate that farm program costs for 1982-83 will reach about \$18 billion and that costs of '83-'84 would total almost \$21 billion without PIK. Since this estimated \$21

billion would include \$3 billion for the dairy support program and another \$2 billion on minor agricultural commodities and general administrative expenses, the remaining \$16 billion represents program costs for grains and cotton in the absence of PIK. Thus, if the \$11 billion estimated cost of PIK stands up, the program could be viewed as causing a net savings of about \$5 billion.

"These savings would result mainly from reduced commodity storage costs and

IRON DEFICIENCY
"Iron deficiency is a serious nutritional problem in Texas, says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Iron deficiency is most prevalent among low-income ethnic groups, teenage girls, infants, and pregnant and nursing women. Most are deficient, Cooksey explains, because they don't eat enough iron-rich foods. Also, other foods they eat may interfere with their body's absorption of iron."

To improve iron deficient diets, Cooksey recommends eating more meat, fish and poultry in meals, and including cereals, fruits and vegetables in the diet. Eating vitamin C-rich foods, like citrus fruit, with meals will help the body absorb iron from foods, she adds.

reduced deficiency payments," say the economists.

Why hire a youth?

Do you need summer labor in your business but can't afford it? Hiring a qualified youth could help you taxwise and could also help the youth earn some income.

Calendar-year taxpayers may claim a tax credit on their 1983 federal income tax return for 85% of the first \$3,000 in wages paid to qualifying youth employees for any 90-day period between May 1 and Sept. 15, says Dr. Ashley Lovell.

This opportunity for helping youth and helping your business is the "Qualified Summer Youth Employee" provision of the Tax Equity and Responsibility Act of 1982, says Lovell, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To qualify for the tax credit, the youth employee must:
—Perform services during the period noted above.
—Be age 16 or 17.
—Be a member of an economically disadvantaged family.

—Not have previously worked for the employer.

A designated local agency, the Texas Employment Commission (TEC), is responsible for certification of the youth's age and family economic status, notes Lovell. This information must be certified before the youth begins work. The employer will keep the approved certificate on file as a basis for completing IRS Form 5884, the jobs credit form.

To be classed as a member of an "economically disadvantaged family," the TEC will determine whether the youth's family annual income, based on the six months before the month of the hiring date, is 70% or less of the Bureau of Labor Statistics lower living standard.

Assuming an hourly wage of \$4 and with the first \$3,000 of wages qualifying for tax credit, the business could obtain 750 hours of labor from a qualifying youth, says Lovell. From the employer's

tax benefit standpoint, the \$4 hourly wage provides an income tax credit of \$3.40, with the remaining wage of 60 cents deductible as a labor expense on Schedule C or Schedule F. The business cannot claim the entire \$4 as a labor expense but only the difference between the \$4 and the \$3.40 tax credit.

If a business cannot use all of the jobs credit in 1983, the excess can be carried back three years and forward 15 years, up to the tax liability limit for each year.

For more information on the Summer Youth Employee program and the accompanying tax credit, or advice on

how to list your job openings and obtain referrals of qualified vouchered youth, call your local Employment Commission office, suggests Lovell. Refer to IRS Form 5884 or contact your tax advisor for additional details regarding the jobs credit provisions.

ASCS news Set aside acres must be protected

To provide protection from soil and water erosion for Castro County's cropland removed from production, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service requires farm program participants to plant certain grasses and cover crops or install approved conservation practices on these acres.

"Conservation management on the land taken out of production is a requirement of the 1983 acreage reduction, land diversion and payment-in-kind programs," said agency official Melvin Barton.

The diverted acres may be devoted to annual, biennial, or perennial grasses; legumes, small grains, volunteer stands other than weeds, or crop residue from use of no-till, or minimum-till practices. Barton said barley, oats, rice and wheat may be used as a cover crop but the crop may not be harvested. An exception to this harvesting restriction has been made for wheat seeded prior to January 12, 1983, on farms participating in the PIK Program. Other cover and plantings, such as those benefiting wildlife, may be developed provided they meet erosion control standards and are approved by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee with the concurrence of Soil Conservation Service.

Farmers are required to use necessary control measures for erosion, insects, weeds and rodents on diverted acres. Barton said control measures for weeds need to be sufficient to prevent the spread of weeds and consistent with control practices normally carried out on similar cropland in the area.

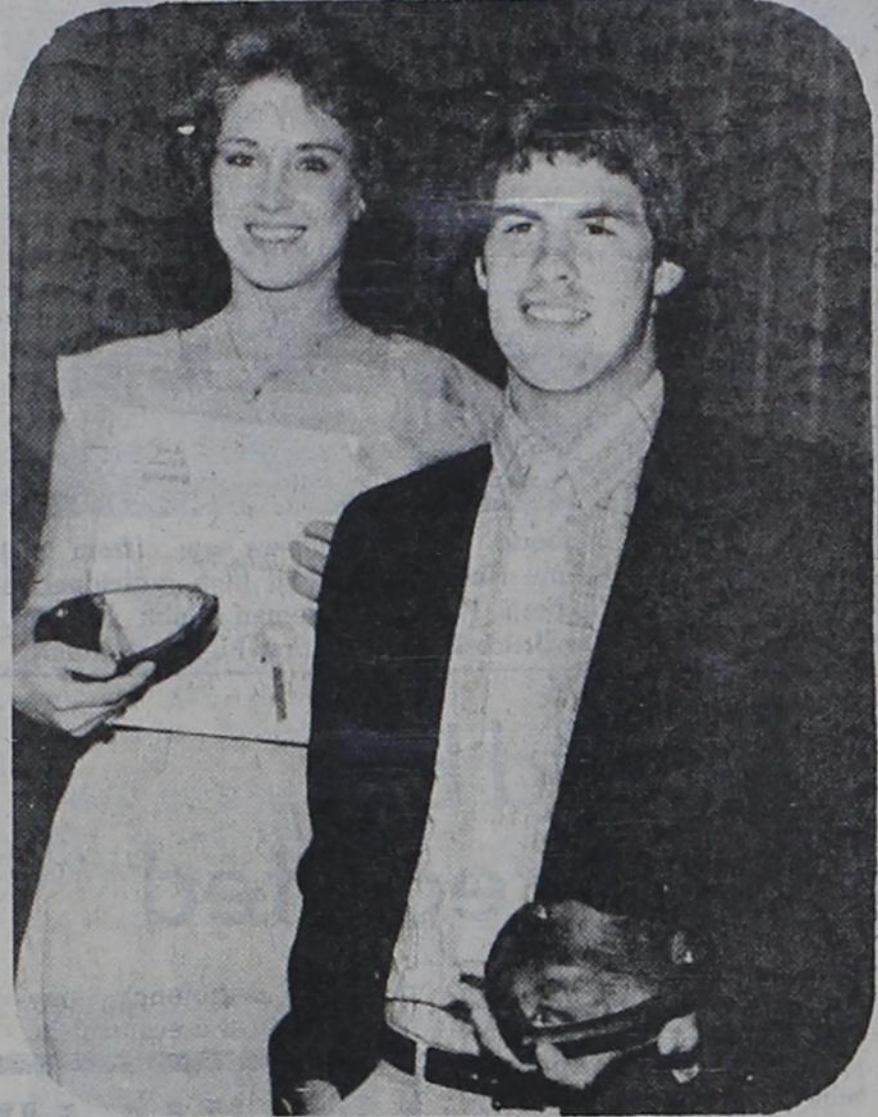
Cancer Society elects

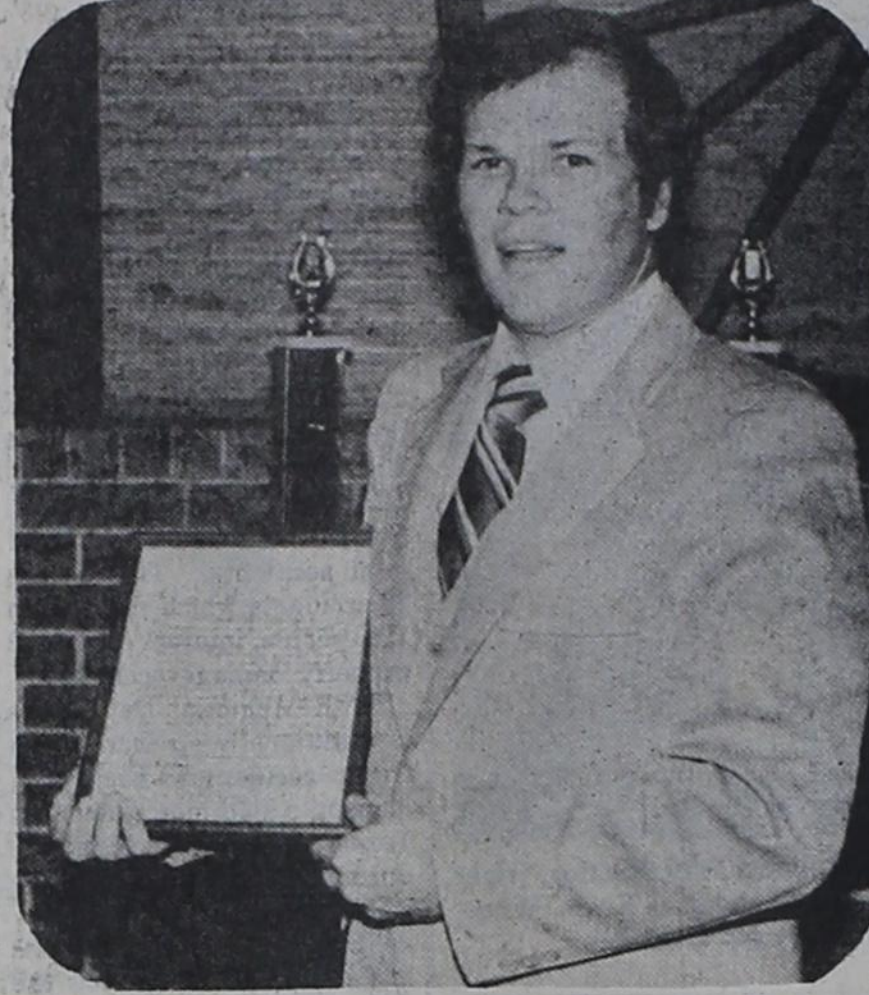

FEEDING GARBAGE TO SWINE

Food waste to be fed to swine in Texas should be treated properly before feeding to prevent disease problems, says a swine veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Regulations prohibit the feeding of garbage to swine unless heat treated at a licensed facility. Treatment consists of boiling food waste for at least 30 minutes. Food waste from ordinary household operations fed to swine on the same premises is exempt.

Social Security ...in Castro County

The automatic Social Security benefit increase based on the cost of living, previously effective each July, will be delayed for 6 months, to January 1984 under a new law designed to strengthen the Social Security system.

A related change has been made to the SSI program. The SSI federal benefit rate will increase effective July 1, 1983. The amount of increase will be \$20 for individuals and \$30 for couples. Cost of living adjustments will then be delayed until Jan. 1, 1984 to correspond with Social Security adjustments under the new legislation.

The purpose of the cost of living adjustment delay for Social Security benefits is to save the system money and to

help it regain its financial strength. Largely because of economic conditions in recent years, Social Security has had an increasingly severe financial problem.

The new law is designed to meet the problem both in the near-term and into the years after 2000. Other changes made by the new law provide additional income to the system. They include:

—The Social Security tax rate increase scheduled under previous law for 1985 will go into effect in 1984. The new 1984 rate will be 7% each for employees and employers, up from the previous rate of 6.7%. But, employees will receive a tax credit against 1984 taxes of 0.3% which will be given when taxes are deducted from wages. In effect, 1984 employee taxes will remain at the level set under previous law. Also, part of the tax rate increase scheduled for 1990 will go into effect in 1988.

—Starting in 1984, the Social Security self-employment tax rate will be equal to the combined employee-employer tax on wages. This will be 14% for 1984. Previously, the rate for self-employed people was about 1½ times the employee rate.

—Under the new law, self-employed people will receive a self-employment tax credit of 2.7% of self-employment income for 1984; 2.3% for 1984, and 2% for 1986-89. After 1989, these credits will be replaced with deductions designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employees and employers are treated for Social Security and income tax purposes.

Flower gathering—legal?

This spring's profusion of bluebonnets and other wildflowers in many areas of the state has prompted numerous calls to state agencies about the legality of picking the flowers on public lands and state-owned highway rights-of-way.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said there is some justification for confusion, since state law on the matter is subject to interpretation.

Officials said it is unlawful to pick, dig up or otherwise damage any plant found in a state or national park.

Although the bluebonnet is the official state flower, the plant is not granted any more protection from picking under state law than any other wildflower.

A spokesman for the Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation said state law declares it a misdemeanor to

"recklessly damage or destroy" wildflowers along state-owned road rights-of-way.

However, he said although his department discourages the public from disturbing the flowers, law enforcement agencies' officials normally do not construe casual enjoyment of the plants, including picking, to be "reckless damage and destruction."

State agency officials recommend that Texans and visitors enjoy this year's unusually lush offerings of wildflowers without damaging or removing them, in order to allow more people the privilege.

Another recent topic of curiosity has been the availability of seeds for growing bluebonnets and other wildflowers. Officials said no state agency distributes or sells seeds, but some may be available from commercial

seed firms, feed stores or plant nurseries.

Higher feed costs due to PIK could mean reduced milk production, says an economist in dairy marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Feed grain prices have jumped 26% nationally since PIK and that has boosted concentrate prices an average of 19% for Texas dairymen. This increase in feed costs coupled with a 3 1/2 to 4% lower milk price due to the recently imposed 50 cents per hundredweight milk tax will force a lot of Texas dairymen to trim costs by cutting back on feeding and culling marginal cows.

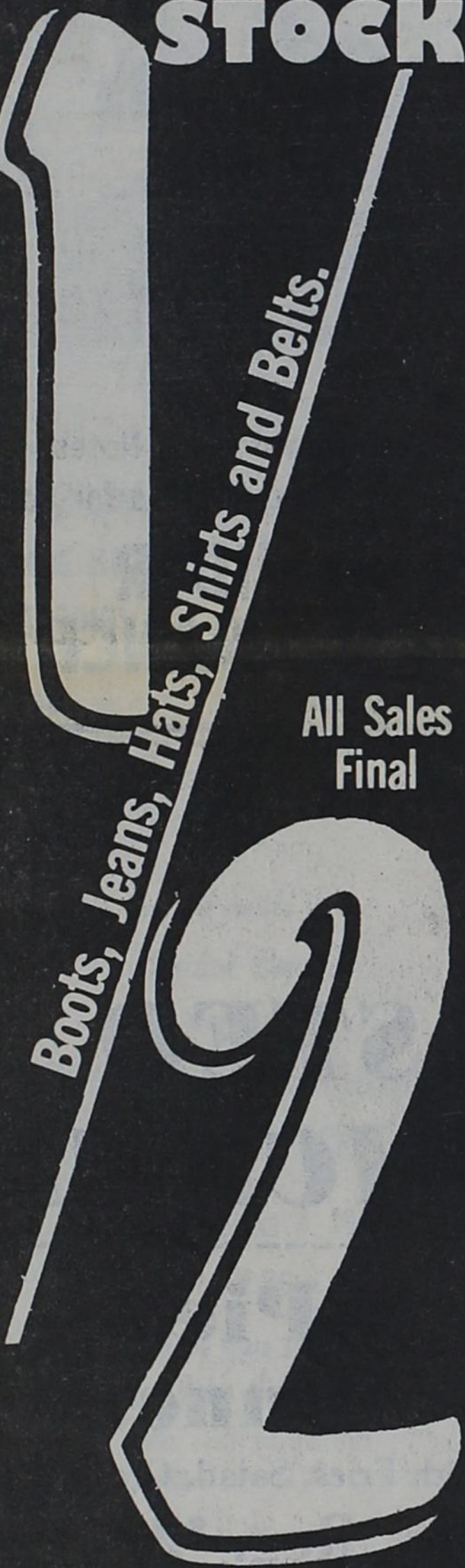

Jimmy Hoyle, who has coached Dimmitt's Bobbies to five district championships in the last six years, has resigned to accept the girls' varsity coaching position at Perryton High School.

He said the Perryton post presents "an opportunity we feel we need to take advantage of," including a higher salary.

Perryton, of District 1-AAA, "has the makings of a good program, and they're hungry for a winning program," Hoyle said. This year's Rangerettes — a young team with only two seniors — compiled a 17-10 record and finished as district runners-up, losing to 2-AAA champion Abernathy in the bi-district playoff.

Hoyle, 33, came to Dimmitt High School from Dawson County in 1977 to coach varsity girls' basketball and track. Hoyle has produced three all-state players here — Vicki Cleveland, Lori Dyer and Becky Andrews.

ing the thing, don't seem to know what is best, or anything about it for that matter. If the smart ones can't figure it out, I guess the rest of us shouldn't even try.

One thing that might be tried, for a change, is to come up with a figure that is somewhere in everybody's ballpark. Then instead of sluffing it all out at one time to every agency, or bureau, dole it out in small doses as the need is proven. Then down toward the end of the budget year cut them off altogether to be sure they don't use up their portion of the budget. Taking the waste, stealing and skulduggery out of the administration of necessary government programs would insure a huge surplus at the end of the year that could be applied to the national debt.

There shouldn't be any sacred cows where government spending is concerned. Many of the goodies, referred to as entitlements, should be discontinued, at least for the present. Since inflation, according to statisticians, is down considerably, increases in social security and similar programs should be discontinued. There are countless numbers of retired civil service workers, military personnel, government officials, including legislative, judicial and administrative (with many double-dipping) receiving pensions, and other favors, that should be frozen,

reduced or eliminated.

So far as the Pentagon, Defense Department or War Department is concerned, that establishment should have to give a strict accounting of every dollar spent. It is probably the most wasteful project being financed by the tax payers of the country. Every year when the congress and administration tackles the business of fashioning a budget, all of the generals, defense officials and military business complex officials are there to tell how far we are behind the Russians in military hardware. John Q. Public has the right to know what they have been doing with the billions that were entrusted to them in the past several decades. Many people, well informed people believe that we are still well ahead of the Russians, both in destructive equipment and technology, especially technology. We have been told all along that we have enough bombs, and delivery equipment, to kill everybody in Russia and adjoining countries. That should be some sort of a deterrent.

Since you have read this far I should tell you that the above paragraphs are a repeat from a column appearing in the News at this time last year. Since all of the elements and ingredients in the column are as pertinent today as they were at this time last year, I didn't see any need of concocting a new one.

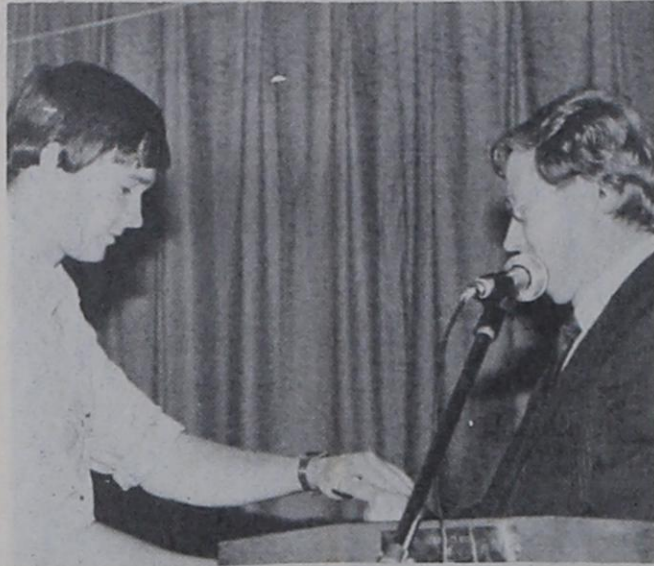

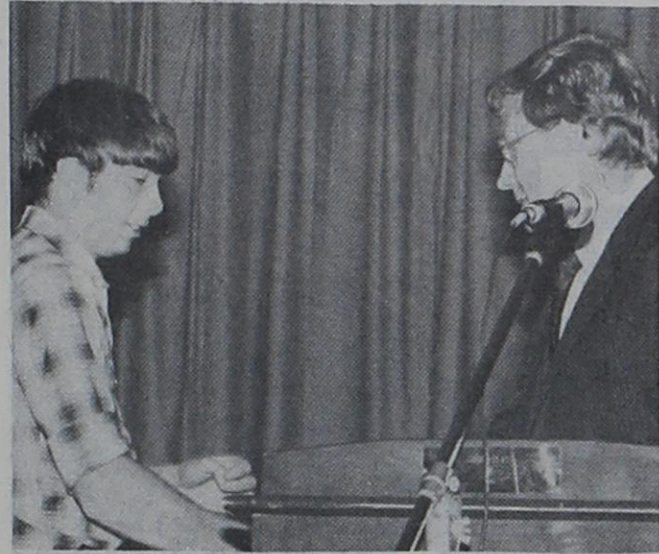

What next for grads?

Seventy-three percent of Dimmitt High School's 1983 graduates plan to go on to universities, colleges or vocational schools.

Fourteen percent of the graduates plan to enter the work force immediately after graduation, while 11% intend to enter military service.

Out of the 84 graduates, 37 students (44 percent) will be going straight to four-year schools.

West Texas State University will receive 11 graduates in the fall.

Other universities which students will attend include Abilene Christian University, Angelo State University, Cameron University, Lubbock Christian College, Oregon Institute of Technology, Southwest Texas State University, Sul Ross State University, Texas Tech University, Wayland Baptist University and Texas A&M.

Isabelle Progin of Switzerland will attend University of Geneva, and Kim Vercueil will attend Uituatgrsrand University in South Africa. They are DHS's two American Field Service exchange students this year.

Fifteen students are planning to attend two-year colleges after graduation. These schools include Amarillo College, Clarendon College and South Plains College.

Trade vocational schools will receive 13% of the class, or 11 students. Nine will attend Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo, while

one will attend business school and another will enroll in beauty school.

Nine graduates will enter the armed forces. Five seniors will enter the Air

Force, two will enter the Army, and two will enter the Marines.

Fourteen percent of the class will enter directly into the work force.

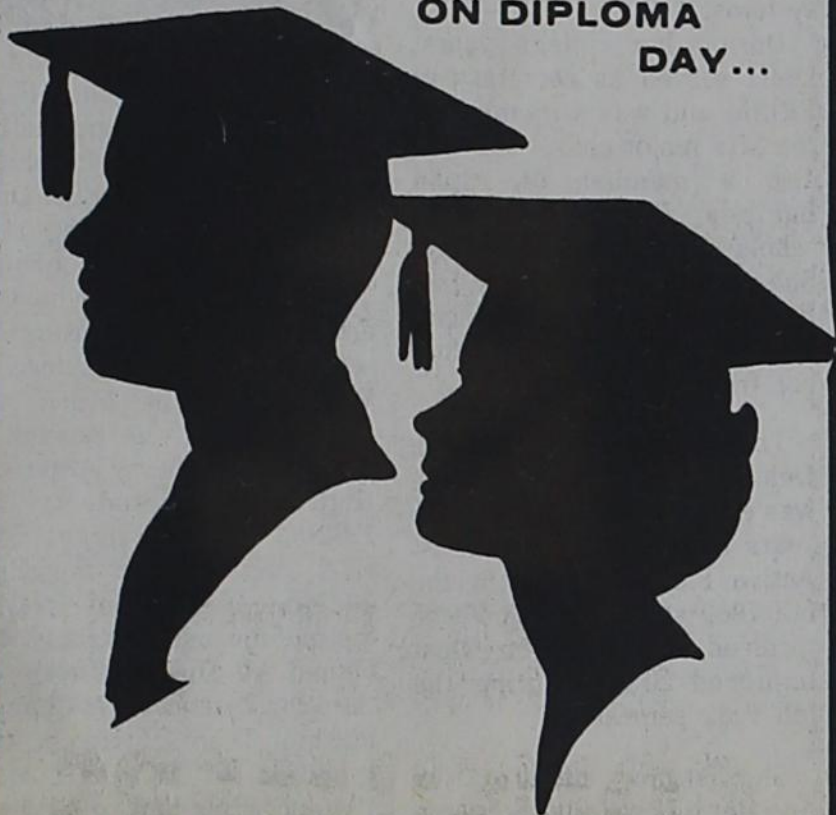

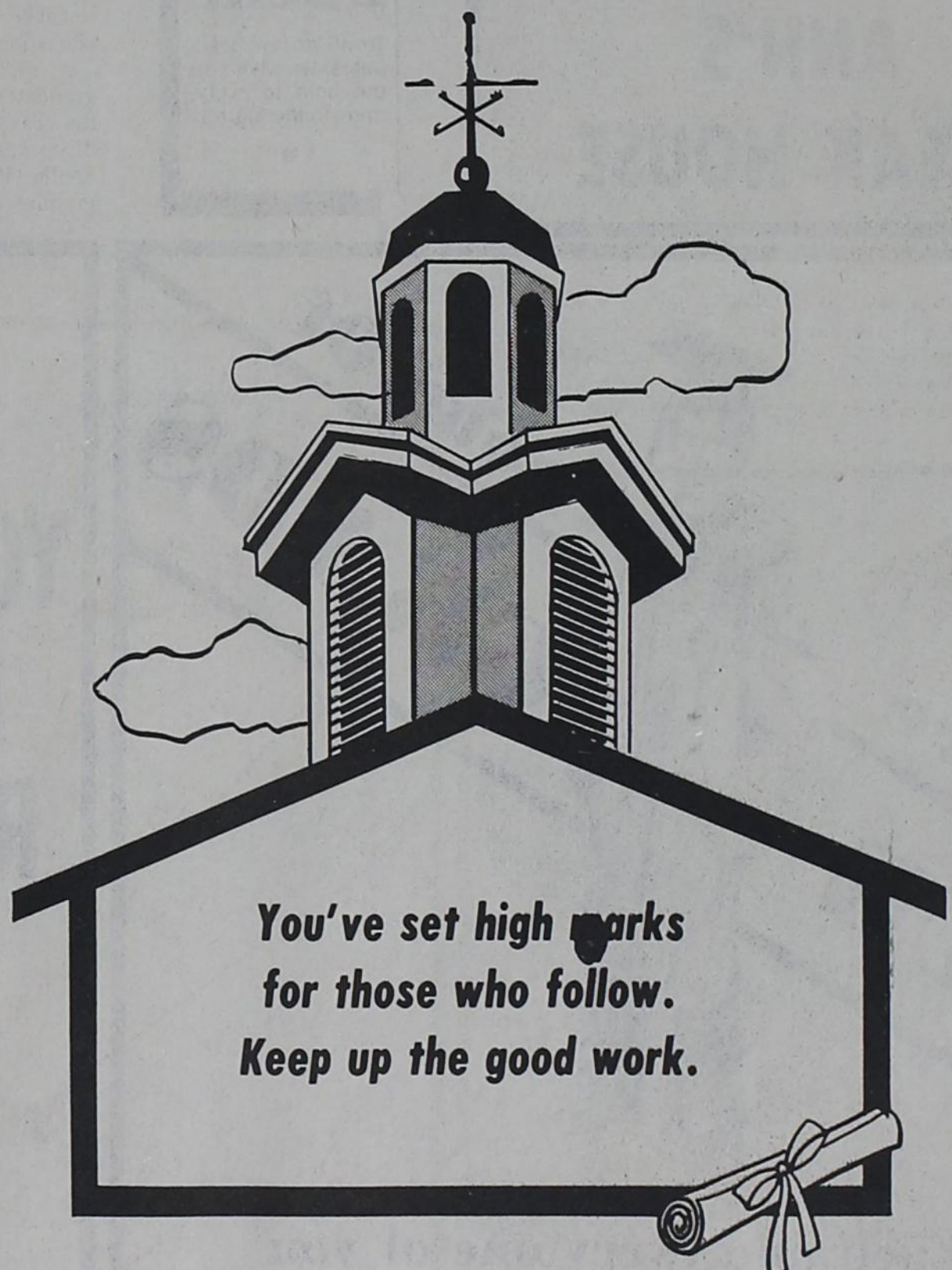
Ben Benton was elected president of the Bethel 4-H Club for the 1983-84 term at the club's May 14 meeting.

Lantz earns Tech degree in computers

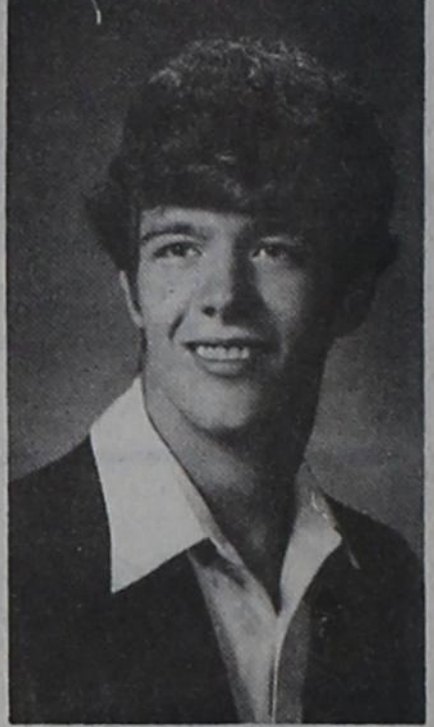
