Peace officers look to take back unwanted drugs

Big Spring Police Department Narcotics Division, working in collaboration with the Drug Enforcement Administration, will be offering the public an opportunity to get rid of unwanted and dangerous drugs.

The National Pharmaceutical Take Back Initiative will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. April 26 at Walmart.

"This provides a unified opportunity for the public to surrender expired, unwanted or unused pharmaceutical controlled substances, dangerous drugs and other medications to law enforcement See DRUGS, Page 3

Hagel, China defense leader air differences over disputed island

BEIJING (AP) — The defense chiefs of China and the U.S. are facing off over Beijing's escalating territorial disputes in the region, with Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel wagging his finger and telling China it doesn't have the right to unilaterally establish an air defense zone over disputed islands with no consultation.

And he said on Tuesday America will protect Japan in a dispute with China, as laid out in U.S. treaty obligations.

Chinese Defense Minister Chang Wanquan said his country will not take the initiative to stir up troubles with Japan, but Beijing is ready to use its military if needed to safeguard its territory. And he warned that the U.S. must "stay vigilant" against Japan's actions and "not be permissive and supportive" of Tokyo.

The U.S. has criticized Beijing's recent declaration of an air defense zone over a large swath of the East China Sea, including disputed islands controlled by Japan.

In their remarks, the two men aired their countries' well-known positions about the territorial disputes, although doing it for the first time in China, shoulder to shoulder after nearly two hours of meetings here.

Pistorius describes relationship with slain girlfriend at murder trial

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) — Testifying in his murder trial on Tuesday, Oscar Pistorius said he and girlfriend Reeva Steenkamp sometimes had troubles in their relationship but that they sorted them out, were in love and were planning a life to-

Prosecutors say Pistorius was often jealous and overbearing in his relationship with Steenkamp and killed her intentionally after a loud argument in the pre-dawn hours of Valentine's Day last year. Pistorius claims he shot the 29-year-old model by mistake through a toilet door at his house, thinking she was a dangerous intruder.

Pistorius referred to a phone message Steenkamp sent him in late January 2013 when she said she was sometimes "scared" of the double-amputee Olympic athlete. The prosecution presented the message earlier in the trial as an indicator of Pistorius' threatening behavior.

Pistorius, 27, said Tuesday that the couple had a disagreement at a social function that day and he was "maybe just being sensitive, insecure or jealous." Pistorius said he apologized to Steenkamp and sent her a message saying: "I want to talk to you. I want to sort this out. ... I'm sorry for the things that I say without thinking."

"My lady, I think it was a bad day in our relationship," Pistorius said, addressing the judge who will ultimately deliver a verdict in the trial that began

last month.

Ukraine nervous as Russia and United States debate its fate

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — As top diplomats from Russia and the United States have met in Europe's capitals to decide Ukraine's fate in recent weeks, there's been a conspicuous absence: a representative from Ukraine.

Russia has refused to deal with Ukraine's new government since protests in February ousted the pro-Russian president. And while the West supports the fledgling leadership, it has left an impression that it's in charge of talks with the Kremlin. Time and again through history, Ukraine has

been caught in big power politics. Historians draw parallels between how Roosevelt, Churchill and Stalin divided Europe at Yalta after World War II trapping eastern European countries in the Soviet orbit. Now some Ukrainians fear history is repeating itself as they are shut out of negotiations — and sit on the sidelines waiting for a verdict.

Ordinary Ukrainians are mostly grateful for Western efforts to mediate the crisis and more than anything are terrified by the prospect of war.

But officials have sought to stress that Ukraine's voice must be heard.

Death toll 33 in Washington mudslide; 3 victims unidentified

EVERETT, Wash. (AP) — The death toll from the landslide that hit the Washington town of Oso rose to 33 on Monday, according to the Snohomish County medical examiner's office, which said all but three have been identified.

The latest name added to the list is Billy L. Spillers, 30, of Arlington. Like the others, he died of multiple blunt force injuries in the March 22 slide that crushed the residential area along the North Fork of the Stillaguamish River about 55 miles northeast

His name had been on the list of missing.

The number of missing on Monday was 12, said Shari Ireton, spokeswoman for the Snohomish County sheriff's office.

However, that figure does not necessarily correlate with the number of dead, said Kelly Stowe, a spokeswoman for the medical examiner's office. The missing list remains fluid as names are added and removed.

killed himself with his .45-caliber pistol after confronting a female military police officer, who Grey said fired once at Lopez but didn't strike him.

After winning greater rights in constitution, Egyptian women waiting to see them realized

CAIRO (AP) — Women activists say they won a major step forward with Egypt's new constitution, which enshrined greater rights for women. But months after its passage, they're worrying whether those rights will be implemented or will turn out to be merely ink on paper. The causes for concern are many. Men hold an

overwhelming near-lock on decision-making in politics, and activists say they are doing little to bring about equality. Violence against women in public space has grown over the past three years of turmoil since the 2011 ouster of autocrat Hosni Mubarak. And some activists say the increasingly repressive political climate is stifling chances for democratic reforms that would bring women's rights.

An incident in March underlined how far activists say they still need to go to change public attitudes. After a female student at Cairo University came under mass sexual assault by male students, the university's president, Gaber Nassar, criticized her for the way she was dressed. A well-known TV presenter, Tamir Amin, went on a tirade on his show, saying the student was "dressed like a belly dancer." She was wearing black pants, a longsleeved pink shirt and a head-scarf.

Amid an uproar on social media, both Nassar and Amin apologized for their comments.

Bird Poop: The resilient morning dove

plaintive call echoing through the quiet of an early spring morning told me of its delicate pres-

ence. Seconds later, a future mate gave its response.

Throughout many a late March and April, their low moaning songs mean a renewal of a long-absent call. Instead of the implied



sadness of "Oo-ah! Cooo, cooo, coo," our neighborhood can celebrate the mourning doves' voices drifting through the trees.

The reality of the many dangers their species encounters came once again with the first delivery to our front door one year. After relating that a bird couldn't fly, a woman gently released a mourning dove into my hands.

Earlier that morning, she had found it lying on the ground near her dining room window. "It looked like it was asleep with its eyes open," she continued. "Thought you might want to look at it."

After extending each wing and searching for breaks, I allowed the dove to flap its wings in protest. Suggesting it could have suffered a soft tissue injury, or bruising, I added that with time, it might fully recover from the traumatic blow to the leading edges of its wings.

Three days later, another mourning dove arrived. As a fledgling, it had already had seeds and insects introduced into its diet. Within a week of leaving its nest, the young mourning dove should have been on its own. Instead, it had been kidnapped.

During that spring, others arrived. Some had been battered by storms or altercations with traffic. Others had been stolen from their nests

by blue jays and grackles. The numerous obstacles the species faced could only be balanced by their perseverance.

When we had bought our home, the neighborhood was blessed with the cooing of morning doves. At times. their presence had been numerous. With ample bowls for seeds and water, they entertained us throughout the day.

Glancing out the den window one afternoon, we noticed a newcomer. Sleek, slender, and stately, the mourning dove had the typical coloration: gray-brown. On each side of its face was the familiar black spot. Also adorning its wings were the black dots seemingly placed at random.

Its buff-colored belly was tinged with the familiar pinkish hue. This lent a subtle contrast to its pink legs and feet.

As it slowly walked around the nearly empty dishes, then further into the vard. we could see that it was iniured. One wing dragged on the ground.

As evening approached, the remaining doves took flight to the trees in our back lot. As they flew, we could see their long, wedge-shaped or tapered tails edged in white.


Left alone, the newcomer looked abandoned. As we wondered what to do next, it took flight.

Clearing our back fence, the mourning dove landed in the easement.

After a brief pause, it flew to the nearest limb of a large mesquite. By stair-stepping upward, it reached a height that meant safety for the night.

That the bird could elevate that much was a surprise to us. Then we wondered if it would be able to come back.

Incoming with some of the doves the next morning was the bird with the droopy wing. Later in the day, it left on its own accord. As it became a regular, we named

it "Droopy."

For three years, Droopy was a daily guest at the food

On some days, it would leave and return several times. Although its primary feathers were frayed on the ends, the bird managed to use its wing effectively.

When white-wing doves, years later, made an unexpected appearance, and started growing in number, the mourning doves were

slowly pushed out of our yard by the more aggressive and larger birds. Even more competition was to come when the bigger Eurasian collared-doves invaded our neighborhood.

Only occasionally now do we see mourning doves come to the elevated water dishes in our side vard. Such arrivals are noteworthy.

After a lengthy drink, they will rise swiftly into the air. In those precious seconds,

we can hear the gentle whistling of their wings as they fly to a nearby mesquite.

Their presence continues to remind us of the resiliency of a droopy winged bird and its struggle to be with its own species.

anywhere from one or two hours every night. It's interesting that about 70 percent of the characters in a man's dream are other men. Women's dream contains almost an equal number of men and women. Aside from that, men generally have more aggressive emotions in their dreams than the females do.

Well, I hope you enjoyed reading these odd facts about our dreams. Speaking of odd, did you hear the story about a man named John Odd?

From the time he was small, people made fun

of him calling him "odd man," "odd ball," "odd fellow" and the "odd man out" and similar names.

When he married, people immediately started calling them "the odd couple!" John was enraged by this, so he discussed the situation with his wife.

In their discussion he said, "I hate my last name. My whole life, people have made fun of it and recently, I realized that people who don't even know me are making comments about what might be on my gravestone then laughing about it. I want you to promise

Guinn wins 4-3A title, advances to regional

Kelsie Guinn punched her tcket to the Region I-3A Golf Tournament in grand fashion on Monday afternoon. The Big Spring High School senior fired a final round of 76 and nailed down the District 4-3A girls' golf crown.

Guinn finished as the district's top medalist, finishing with a three-round total otf 213. She finished five strokes ahead of Snyder's Cassidy Rawls in the final standings.

By winning the individual title, Guinn advances to the regional tournament, marking the fourth straight season she has advanced past the district level. Snyder and Monahans finished first and second, respectively, in the team standings. Guinn starred on the Western Texas

College Golf Course on Monday. She recorded the second-best round on the course and easily edged out Rawls for the top spot. The two had entered the final round in a tie for the medalist Monday and finished with an 81.

Greenwood sophomore Ryan Pate also advanced to the regional tournament. She posted a round of 73 on Monday and finished third overall. She has advanced to the Region I-3A meet in each of her first two varsity seasons.

Snyder eased to the District 4-3A team golf title. The Lady Tigers notched a third-round mark of 347 and finished 11 strokes ahead of Monahans in the final standings.

Big Spring finished fifth in the team standings with a team total of 1,144. Sweetwater and Greenwood were third and fourth, respectively.

Mariah McIntosh, Brianna Cobos and Gabby Fair all played well for the Lady Steers. McIntosh shot a 99 in the final round and finished the tournament with a score of 286. Cobos fired a 106 on Monday and finished at 307. Fair's final round was a 112. She finished the meet at 320.



The bidding: West East South North 1 🌲 Pass Pass Opening lead — king of hearts. North's seven-club bid was

hardly scientific, but the final contract is certainly reasonable. The only real problem is how to play the hand. Anyone whose nature it is to play

hastily could easily wind up down one. Declarer might win the opening heart lead with dummy's ace, cross to the nine of clubs and then cash the A-K of spades, discarding a heart and a diamond from dummy. But, having done this, South would sooner or later lose a diamond trick.

However, declarer would not be putting his best foot forward if he played the hand in this fashion. Certainly it's correct to win the heart lead and draw the two missing trumps. But when South cashes the A-K of spades, he should discard two diamonds from dummy instead of a heart and a diamond.

Declarer next plays the A-K of diamonds and ruffs a diamond in dummy, establishing his fourth diamond. He then returns to his hand with a trump in order to discard dummy's ten of hearts on the five of diamonds, and the grand slam is

The key to making the contract lies in not giving in to the initial impulse to try to dispose of dummy's ten of hearts immediately. A moment of reflection should allow declarer to see that the only real chance for the grand slam is to opt for the 68 percent probability that the missing diamonds are divided 3-2 and proceed accordingly.
