Tired of tired tires? **Get a little help Saturday at landfill**

You've heard of "Trash Free," "Drug Free" and "Cell Free Zone." How about helping make Big Spring "Tire Free?"

That's exactly what Keep Big Spring Beautiful and the city are doing Saturday at the landfill.

County residents are invited to drop off old tires — up to eight at a time — from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. free of charge. No commercial tire dealers will be accepted.

"Normally the landfill doesn't accept tires but this is an exception," said Johnny

NC man sentenced to jail for sucking woman's toes

LINCOLNTON, N.C. (AP) - A North Carolina man who sucked an unwilling woman's toes inside a Wal-Mart has been sentenced to 60 days in jail.

Michael Anthony Brown apologized for his actions during his court appearance Thursday. He was convicted of assault, but a judge agreed to subtract the three weeks Brown has

spent behind bars from the sentence. Police said the 31-year-old Brown told the victim he was a podiatry student and asked her to try on shoes for him in the

shoe department of the Wal-Mart in Lincolnton last month. Investigators said Brown eventually stuck the woman's foot in his mouth and sucked on her toes, then offered to pay for her groceries after she appeared outraged.







to make the contract regardless of how the opponents' cards are divided. Win the heart and play the queen of diamonds, not a low diamond. If the suit is divided 4-0 and the defender with the A-10-9-8 takes the ace, you later lead a low diamond and play low from dummy to assure nine tricks; if the defender with four diamonds does not take the ace, stop playing diamonds and attack clubs. If both opponents follow to the diamond queen and it holds the trick,

lead another diamond to dummy's jack. If the jack also wins, shift your attention to clubs, forcing out the A-K and thus making four notrump. If you were to make the mistake of

leading a low diamond to the jack at trick two, you might find yourself going down if, for example, South had the A-10-9-8 of diamonds and took the jack with the ace.

2. It is virtually certain that North

has the ace of spades and king of hearts for his opening bid. It would therefore be wrong to rely on a heart finesse, especially when there is a much safer method of play available. The best approach is to start by

ruffing the queen of diamonds. It would be a serious error to play the ace from dummy at trick one, which would force you to make a discard from your hand before you are ready After drawing trumps, you next

lead the three of spades toward dummy, placing North squarely on the horns of a dilemma. If he goes up with the ace, you can later discard the Q-5-2 of hearts on the K-J of spades and ace of diamonds. Alternatively, if North ducks the spade, you win with dummy's jack, discard the queen of spades on the ace of diamonds, lose a heart finesse to North's king and later trump two hearts in dummy. Either way, you make the slam.

vote, with the court's five Republican appointees on one side and the four Democratic appointees on the other, the court struck down limits on total contributions to federal campaigns that have been enforced and were specifically upheld in 1976. What the 1976 court saw in Buckley v. Valeo as a "quite modest restraint upon

protected political

activity" that serves "to prevent evasion" of the limits on contributions to campaigns, the 2014 court has now held violates the fundamental protection of political speech enshrined in the First Amendment. The arms race for money is not

completely out of control. Sure, an individual still can only give \$5,200 to an individual candidate (\$2,600 for the primary, and \$2,600 for the general) and is limited to \$32,500 to national party committees, \$10,000 to state and local committees, and \$5,000 to other committees. But whereas the old law limited contributions to federal candidates and committees to \$74,600 every two years, now there are no total limits at all.

For most of us, of course, these limits are meaningless. How many people can afford \$74,600 in political contributions? We are in the world of the 1 percent already. But now those 1 percenters can give millions or tens of millions. Already maxed out on one committee? Believe me,

someone will create another. There is no limit to the avenues to contribute and no law against it, thanks to the Supreme Court.

Does it matter? Of course it does. Sure, having more money is no guarantee of victory. But between having more and having less, every candidate alive would rather have more. And they are grateful, most grateful, to have more, however it comes in — including from other candidates and their funds, committees, the party, supposedly "independent" groups and individuals. Very grateful. You don't get a picture in a silver frame when you give this kind of money. You get access and a hearing and maybe a feather on the scale — not something anyone can prove, but enough for it to be a wise business decision and not just an expression of constitutionally protected political beliefs. And while it is certainly true

that both political parties play this game, it is not true that everyone does. As former Sen. Bob Dole famously observed decades ago, every business interest may have a political committee, but poor children don't. There are no million-dollar donations coming in from single mothers struggling to make ends meet, from homeless families seeking shelter, from the 99 percent of Americans who don't even earn enough to make this new decision of any immediate significance to them.

As for the argument that disclosure solves all problems, reality is to the contrary. Oh, once in a while we hear a story about a clumsy contribution from someone who is seeking federal funds at the very same time.

Sophisticated donors don't make that mistake. They've figured out ways to avoid disclosure altogether through supposed "grassroots" committees that are

anything but. Moreover, disclosure is a oneday story at best: an enterprising reporter digging through FEC reports trying to match names and companies and issues. But very few people are around for or follow up on the calls and meetings that happen months later. Moreover, the very goal of many big donors is nothing: forestall legislation to assure that nothing is done when something should be. How do you follow that?

Democracy should be sacrosanct. It should not be for sale. The venerable principle of "one person, one vote" is essentially meaningless when a tiny percent of all Americans, by writing checks and forming supposedly independent and grassroots com mittees, can and do wield undue influence on the process and its elected beneficiaries.

I certainly support the Founders' vision of an independent judiciary: appointed, not elected, and serving for life. But on days like today, I can't help but wonder whether the five-man majority might see things a little bit differently if they had to raise money — and be beholden to moneyed interests — in order to win and keep their jobs.



They knew they needed Latino voters once they got to the general election, but while appealing to their "conservative base" in the primaries, they alienated Latinos - and the rest is history. President Barack Obama was handed the Latino vote on a silver platter — twice.

And so, here comes 2016! Can a pro-immigrant candidate survive the GOP primaries? Would he or she be forced to flip-flop, become an immigrant basher and then lose the general election?

All those questions could soon be answered by the potential presidential candidacy of former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, who raised a lot of eyebrows Sunday when he said that instead of a felony, illegally coming to this country could be considered "an act of love." I know. To right-wing extrem-

ists, this must have felt like a kick in the stomach. Many have been puking on social media. "Jeb is a DemoRAT in a GOP

suit ... no different from other RINOs (Republicans in Name Only)," one of them posted on the Washington Post webpage that carried the story on Bush's comments. "He sounds like Ted Kennedy," another person added. "Electing another Illegal Alien-**Amen** Loving Bush would be an act

of INSANITY!" posted another reader.

One of them noted that while "trolling for votes," Bush "can't get Americans, so he'll take illegals." He explained that "illegal aliens have invaded America by the millions and knowingly broken our laws. That's not love. That's undeclared war. Jeb wants to surrender. Collaborator is the lowest form of American. It's not politics; it's treason.'

These are the kind of comments conservative extremists were making all over cyberspace, not only expressing their disdain for Bush but their hatred of immigrants.

"Mexicans did not come here out of love. They came here out of GREED," one of the readers noted. Yet another one said Bush would not be elected president "as long as he supports amnesty for illegals who live here amongst us ... take our jobs, work for less money, lower our standards of living, refuse to learn English, think they are entitled, are disrespectful to our culture ...

People are spewing xenophobia! And it's all because Bush went on a Fox News program and showed compassion for "someone who comes to our country because they couldn't come legally, they come to our country because their families — the dad who loved their children — was worried that their children didn't have food on the table. And they wanted to make sure their family was intact, and they crossed the border because they had no other means to work to be able to provide for their family.'

"Yes, they broke the law," Bush added, "but it's not a felony. It's an act of love. It's an act of commitment to your family. I honestly think that that is a different kind of crime that there should be a price paid, but it shouldn't rile people up that people are actually coming to this country to provide for their families." Well, even his comments got

people riled up.

And yet — at least for now those comments set Bush apart from the other potential GOP presidential candidates, all of whom have been behaving like tea party puppets — unwilling to tolerate any form on "amnesty"

and yet ready to bash immigrants on demand.

As if anticipating the reaction that his comments would get from the extreme right of his party, during the Fox interview, Bush also noted, "We need to elect candidates that have a vision that is bigger and broader, and candidates that are organized around winning the election, not making a point.'

As if telling Republicans that they should learn from their defeats, Bush added, "Campaigns ought to be about listening and learning and getting better ... I'm not being critical of my party, but campaigns themselves are reflec-

tive of this new America." Whoa! This is the kind of Republican candidate who could sway many Latinos who feel they have been taken for granted by the Democrats.

But imagine what would happen once the GOP presidential contenders get into those lively TV primary debates and begin throwing red meat at conservative audiences. Remember how they jumped on Texas Gov. Rick Perry for suggesting that undocu mented college students should be allowed to pay in-state tuition?

Almost a decade has passed since Republicans won a presidential election. And coincidentally, the last one was won by another Bush who sold himself as a "compassionate conservative."

'Hard work' pays off as Lady Steers net first track title since 2012

Heading into the final event of the District 4-3A Track and Field Championships on Thursday evening at Blankenship Field, the Big Spring High School Lady Steers held an ever-so-tiny 2 point lead over the Abilene Wylie Lady Bulldogs in the overall team standings.

For the 400-meter of the final race, Abilene Wylie raised hopes that it might surge to a win and rally past Big Spring.

For the final 300, the Lady Steers turned the race into a victory lap. The BSHS girls rallied from fifth in the standings after the first 400 meters to winning the event by more than 50 yards when senior Dyrshae Vanderbilt took a handoff from Kaitlyn Mathews and capped a stunning come-from-behind by sprinting across the finish line.

With the win, Big Spring racked up 20 points and clinched its first district track championship since 2012. The

Lady Steers rolled up 177.5 points in the meet and finished six points ahead of Wylie, which chalked up 171.5.

More than anything, Big Spring head coach Nick Roberson said the district title was a tribute to the hours of work and dedication – and to the efforts of numerous underclassmen.

"We've told since the first day they had a chance to be district champions, if they worked hard," said Roberson. "They did what they were supposed to do. They gutted it out and worked hard, and it paid off. The work and the hours we ask of these girls is unbelievable, but if there is one thing we can teach them, it is that if you work hard enough it will pay off. If they learn that, we'll have done our jobs."

No one was going to outwork the Lady Steers in the 4x400-meter re-

The Big Spring High School Steers may not have had the most athletes competing in the varsity boys' division at the District 4-3A Track and Field Championships on Thursday at Blankenship Field, but they proved they could score with the best.

trict title. Junior Erin Pollard gave Big Spring just what it needed over the first 400 meters of the race – a chance. She sprinted to a first leg of just over 60 seconds and kept the Lady Steers within striking distance. When she passed the baton to freshman Faith Roberson, the BSHS 4x400-meter team was less than 5 yards behind Wylie, which had grabbed the early lead in the race.

Once Pollard put the baton in Roberson's hands, the Lady Bulldogs could do nothing but watch their title hopes run away.

Roberson quickly erased Wylie's lead, and sprinted to the lead. By the time she handed the stick to Mathews, a fellow freshman, the Lady Steers held a 10-yard advantage.

Mathews all but giftwrapped the district championship with a phenomenal third leg. She legged out a sub-60 second time over the next 400 meters and stretched Big Spring's lead to a staggering 50

"We knew we were capable of winning," said Mathews. "Coach told us during the week that he believed we could win it if we ran hard."

"They did what they were supposed to do," said Roberson. "That, along with the super job by the rest of the team made this possible. They came through."

The 4x400-meter race wasn't the only relay event the Lady Steers dominated. Big Spring cruised to easy wins in the 4x100- and 4x200meter events. The BSHS squads won both of the races by more than 10 yards.

Lady The Steers' 4x100-meter squad led the entire race en route to posting a person-best time of 48.91 seconds. The Big Spring 4x200meter squad - consisting of Vanderbilt, Autumn Minter, Julianna Rodriguez and Mathews – turned in a winning time of 1 minute and 44 seconds.

Big Spring was just as impressive individually, scoring in almost every event.
