

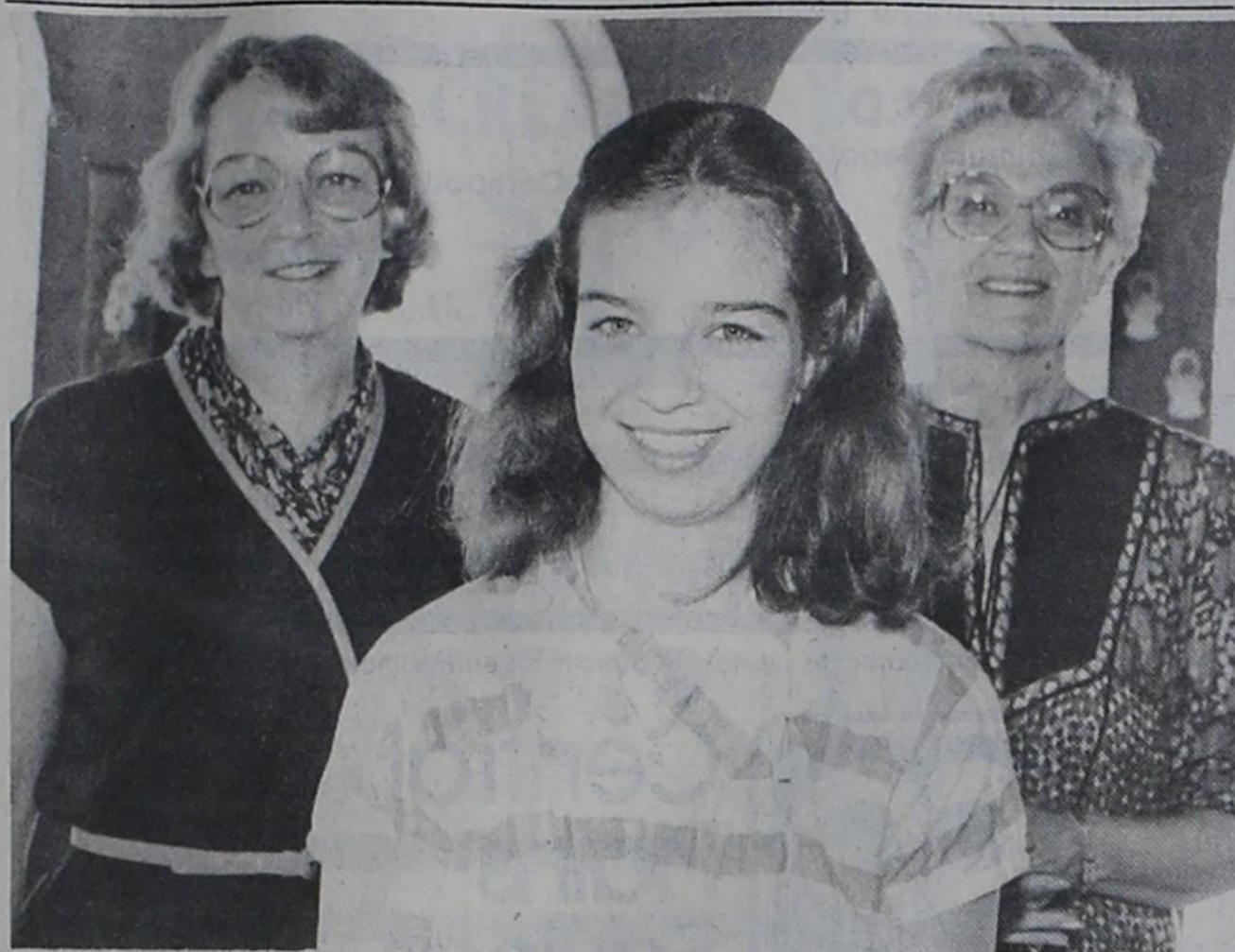

'It's great to be back,' former AFS student says

"It's great to be back. I didn't dream I would ever get to come back. I'm in my

second home again and it's marvelous," said Mia Berg, former Dimmitt High School AFS student from Norway.

Mia and her parents Knut and Aase Berg, are staying with Mia's "American mom," Bettye Huckabay, having arrived in Amarillo by plane Friday.

Tuesday, Mia visited the Awards Assembly at the high school.

"It was fun at first, but suddenly I was wishing it were me taking part, having finished a year here — then it was hard," Mia said.

"I cried after the assembly, but I think I'm over it now. I remind myself of other things I have that can be just as nice," she said.

Her stay as an AFS student for 1981-82 was cut short when she was involved in a truck-motorcycle accident the day before her senior year here was to have started. She has been undergoing physical therapy ever since the accident.

Mia says she doesn't remember everything from her first visit, but she doesn't feel things have changed much.

"Mark and Wendy Bruegel — and, of course, Bettye — wrote to me regularly and kept me informed about happenings here," she revealed. "But much of our letters were about me — I've become terribly selfish in that way."

Mia's plans for her six-week stay include "getting a terrific tan, losing a little weight, learning how to run, and getting my Texas accent down perfect."

Nineteen Nazareth High School seniors graduated Wednesday night, and 37 Hart High School seniors will walk down the aisle at 8 p.m. Friday.

Nazareth's graduates are scheduled to leave on their class trip to California today (Thursday). They will depart from Amarillo Airport at 1:30 p.m. for Los Angeles to start a six-day tour of Disneyland, Knotts Berry Farm, Universal Studios and other attractions in the LA area. Eighteen of the NHS grads and four sponsors are making the trip.

Cost of the trip is being paid entirely from a fund which class members have been building through four years of high school.

After their commencement exercises Friday night, Hart High School's graduates will take off their robes, grab their bags and leave on their class trip also. They'll depart by chartered bus at midnight Friday for an eight-day trip to Florida, where they will visit Disney World, the Epcot Center, Cypress Gardens, Sea World and Daytona Beach.

Thirty-three HHS grads and six sponsors will make the trip.

Hart and Nazareth graduates are featured in Section B of this issue.

Hart High School's commencement exercises Friday night will be held in the elementary gymnasium.

The 37 seniors will march to the procession played by Mrs. Kathy Jahay, and the invocation will be given by Dale Scott. Linda Booe will give the Salutatory Address, followed by the reading of the class history by Lesley Franks and Elias Martinez.

Mrs. Jahay will present special music, and High School Principal William E. Ammons, will present awards. Anna Steiert will give her Valedictory Address, followed by presentation of diplomas by Supt. Ted Averitt and School Board President Harold Bob Bennett.

Singing of the alma mater by the seniors will be followed by the benediction, given by Dan Jones, and Mrs. Jahay will play the recessional.

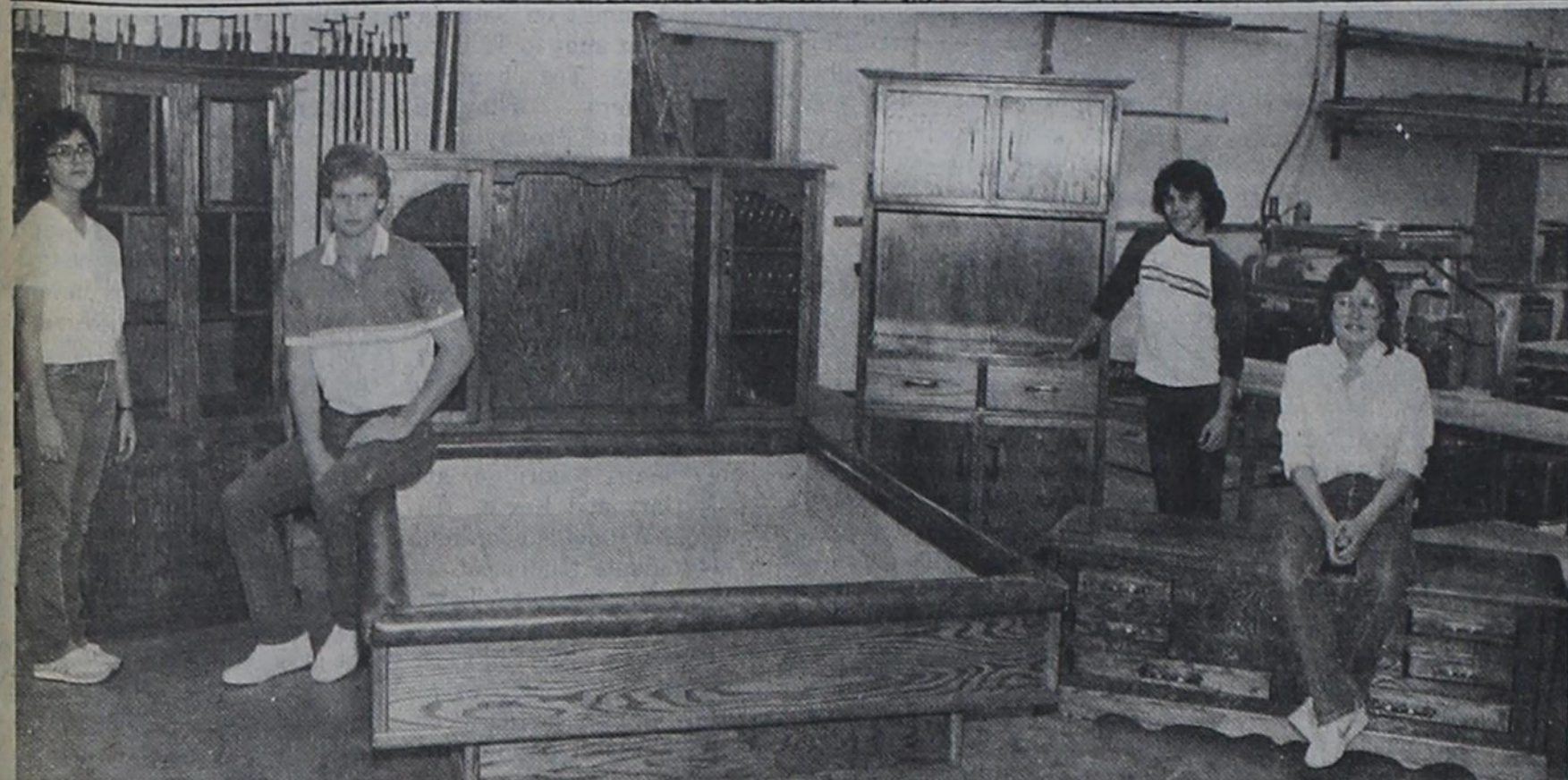
The commencement was held in the school cafeteria.

Police Dept. to hold open house Saturday

The Dimmitt Police Dept. will hold open house Saturday in the city hall meeting room, in observance of National Police Week.

From 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., the department will serve refreshments, hand out free souvenirs to youngsters, and display all the equipment that local police use on a day-to-day basis, plus that which is used in special operations and investigations.

There will also be special displays on drug abuse, crime prevention, child safety, confiscated weapons and other subjects.

"Come meet and get to know your local police officers and get a first-hand idea of their work and profession," Police Chief Don Franklin urged.

National Police Week, May 15-21, started Sunday with Police Memorial Day, in honor of all law enforcement officers in the nation who have given their lives in the line of duty. Local police observed Police Memorial Day Sunday by placing black mourning badges over their regular police shields and lowering the flag at city hall to half staff for the day.

National Police Week was established more than 20 years ago, when President John F. Kennedy noted the resemblance between the American soldier fighting and dying on foreign soil to protect the rights, freedoms and way of life of the American people, and the sacrifices made by the American law enforcement officer to protect those same rights and freedoms at home. With the advice and consent of the US Senate, President Kennedy decreed that May 15 of each

year be set aside as a day to honor and remember those law enforcement officers who gave their lives in the performance of duty in the battle against crime.

Almost two decades ago, Congress expanded the observance by passing a law that sets aside May 15 of each year as Police Memorial Day and the week in which it falls as National Police Week.

Mayor R. L. Fleming, in proclaiming the National Police Week observance in Dimmitt, called upon citizens "to especially honor and show our sincere appreciation for the police officers of this city by deed, remark and attitude," and to "make every effort to express their thanks to our men and women who make it possible for us to leave our homes and families in safety each day and to return to our homes knowing they are protected by men and women willing to sacrifice their lives, if necessary, to guard our loved ones, property and government against all who would violate the law."

Trade at home, aldermen decide

After clearing up a misunderstanding about the basing of premiums, the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen voted to accept the bid of Brown and Parker insurance agency to provide the city with multi-peril and liability insurance.

The bill the city will receive for the insurance will total about \$13,745, although the city may later receive a \$1,565 anticipated deviation and dividend, making the actual cost to the city about \$12,180.

Brown and Parker's original bid was \$11,980, but had to be raised \$200 to allow for coverage of some of the city water wells inadvertently overlooked. The adjusted figure was still lower than the competing bids of \$14,592 from Keith Lowe's Dimmitt Insurance Agency (also adjusted from a previous bid because of error) and \$18,414 from the Smith Agency.

The aldermen voted in favor of "trading at home" when they accepted bids for two new vehicles for the Police Dept. Both vehicle bids from Stan Byrnes Ford of Dimmitt were

accepted, although both were higher than the competing bids.

Byrnes' bid on a four-door sedan with "police package" of options totaled \$9,229.60, including \$600 allowed for a trade-in.

A lower bid of \$8,513.48 was received from Stevens Chevrolet-Olds of Hereford. However, the vehicle offered did not have the "police package," and did not meet other specifications, city officials said.

Bids for a small pickup for use in animal control were only \$1,777.89 apart, with Stevens bidding \$7,476.24, including \$200 for a trade-in, and Byrnes bidding \$7,654.13, with \$400 allowed for trade-in.

Aldermen agreed that for the small difference in price, they felt it was better to trade with a local dealer whenever possible.

City Director of Public Works James Killough presented a list of specifications for a used dump truck for use in street and alley work. Aldermen approved the specifications and agreed to advertise for bids.

Concert, open house set at DHS tonight

Harmony and hardwood will combine for a big show tonight (Thursday) when Dimmitt High School presents its annual Spring Band Concert and Industrial Arts Open House.

The concert by the award-winning Dimmitt High School and Dimmitt Middle School bands will begin at 7:30 in the school auditorium.

Before and after the concert, the Industrial Arts Dept. will be open to display students' craftwork, including many pieces of furniture and mechanical projects that won first, second and third places at the recent Texas Industrial Arts Students Association show in Waco.

The DHS Band, conducted for the last time by retiring Director Ralph Smith, will perform "Sacred Suite," selections from the Broadway musical "Wiz," and standard pop favorites.

The Middle School Seventh and Eighth Grade Band, directed by Dwayne Bishop, will perform "The Ringmaster

March" and "Overture: The Court of Henry VIII — numbers which won the band a concert sweepstakes award Saturday — plus "Clarinet Rag," the theme from the Muppet Show, "New York, New York," "Phantom Trumpets," the theme from "Ice Castles" and others.

The concert and open house are open to the public, and there is no admission charge.

Fifth and Sixth Bands to present concert Tuesday

Dimmitt Middle School's Fifth and Sixth Grade Bands will be featured in a program Tuesday night in the Middle School Auditorium. The program will begin at 7:30.

The bands are directed by Dwayne Bishop. Tuesday night's concert is open to the public, and there will be no admission charge.

Vaughan Memorial Scholarship begun

A new college scholarship has been established in memory of Danny and Sharla Vaughan, who were killed April 27 in a truck accident in Colorado.

Contributions to the scholarship fund are now being solicited. Those wishing to help build the fund may donate to the Danny and Sharla Vaughan Memorial Basketball Scholarship Fund at the First State Bank of Dimmitt.

The scholarship is designated for a graduating senior boy in Dimmitt High School who played varsity basketball. Vaughan was an all-regional post forward for DHS in 1976. Establishment of the new scholarship was announced

and the first winner was named at Dimmitt High School's All Sports Awards Banquet Thursday night.

Vaughan's brothers, Kent and Gene, announced that the first Vaughan Memorial Scholarship winner is John David King, an all-state tournament post forward this year.

The starter fund for the new scholarship was established by Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan's families, and donations were taken after the athletic banquet Thursday night. Those working on the project said the fund now stands at more than \$1,000. The goal, they said, is to build the permanent fund to \$5,000 and use the interest from it for the annual scholarship.

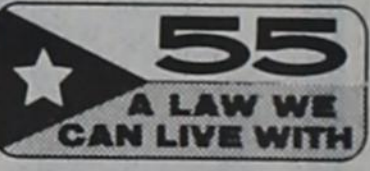

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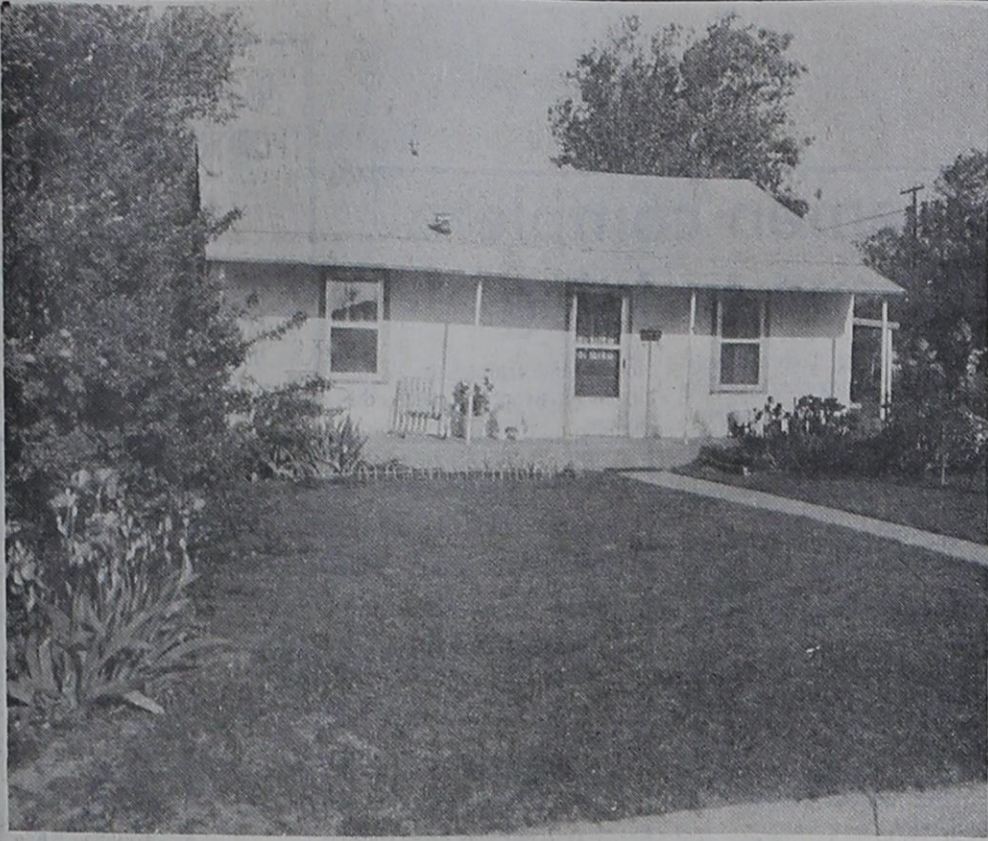

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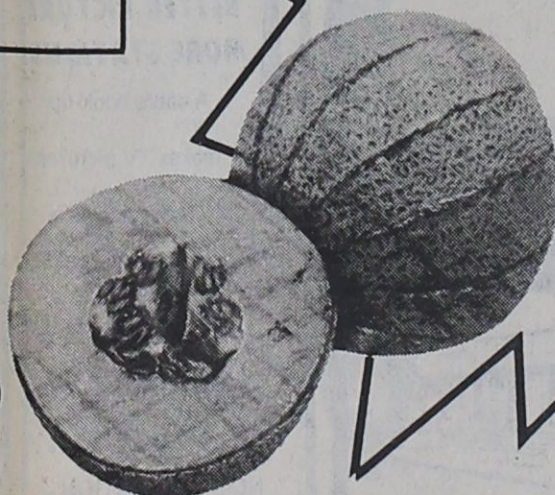
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Wheat field Kaderly is appointed day set

The Annual Wheat Field Day at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland will be held at 1 p.m. next Thursday (May 26), according to Dr. Paul Unger, Acting Director. "Everybody is invited to see the latest research on profitable production of wheat," Unger said.

In addition to observing the small grain plots, visitors will be shown research projects on cropping systems, weed control, irrigation, limited tillage, and wind energy. Latest methods of spray application will be discussed.

All arrangements for the event will be under the direction of Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Small Grain Breeder. Speakers at the various stops on the tour will include Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; and Dr. David Worrall and Gary Peterson, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Wheat Researchers from Vernon and Bushland.

Dr. Porter said "Since releasing TAM 105 wheat three years ago, we have been developing new wheat lines that have even better yield potential." "This will be the first opportunity for people to view the new wheats," he concluded.

Parkinsonism meeting set

The West Texas Parkinsonism Disease Society, will meet at 7 p.m. Friday in Room 4A100 of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in Lubbock.

Dr. Joseph Bianchine, chairman of the Department of Pharmacology at Ohio State University, will discuss the topic "The Pharmacology of Parkinson's — Old and New" at the meeting.

Dale L. Locker, director of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, has appointed Bart Kaderly of West Jefferson, Ohio, and formerly of Dimmitt, as Chief of the Grain Warehouse Division. Locker was named Director of Agriculture by Gov. Richard F. Celeste in December and began his administrative responsibilities in January.

Kaderly will oversee the financial status and operation of grain storage warehouses in Ohio. He has been a farmer for 18 years, developing a sizeable cash cropping operation. Horse short course set for May 26-27

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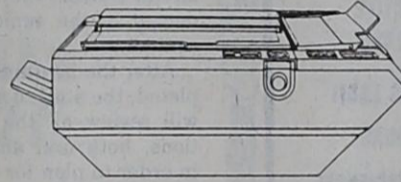
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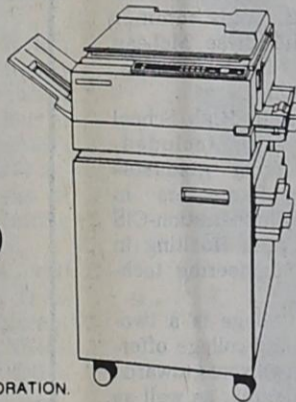


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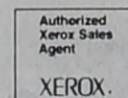
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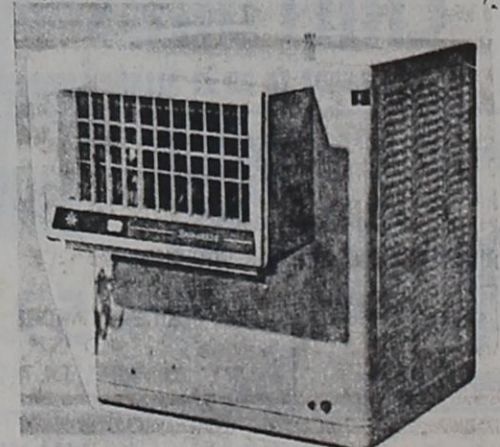
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AFS student says, 'It's not a vacation'

 "It's not a vacation — you will be disappointed or hurt a lot of times, but you learn a lot, too," Dimmitt High School AFS exchange student Isabelle Progin said of the AFS experience.

The 18-year-old from Switzerland is staying with the Don Reeve family while she attends DHS as a senior.

"It seems like a short time ago I had the impression that people here didn't understand me, and didn't care or didn't want to try and it made me depressed. I didn't know how to act, and I had trouble finding what I wanted to say in English. At Christmas I was literally sick — both physically and mentally, and I thought, 'Why am I here?'"

"But after that, I made up my mind to settle in and enjoy it, learn from it and work hard at it," she revealed.

"I can see a change in me since last August. I'm more

self-confident. I think I have grown up. Now I tell myself, 'Why can't I do it?' and I go out and try," Isabelle said.

Her efforts have included playing on the girls' junior varsity basketball team, and placing fourth at district in junior varsity girls' doubles in tennis.

"I really enjoy sports. I've been playing tennis for about three hours every day, because I know I won't get the chance once I return home," she said.

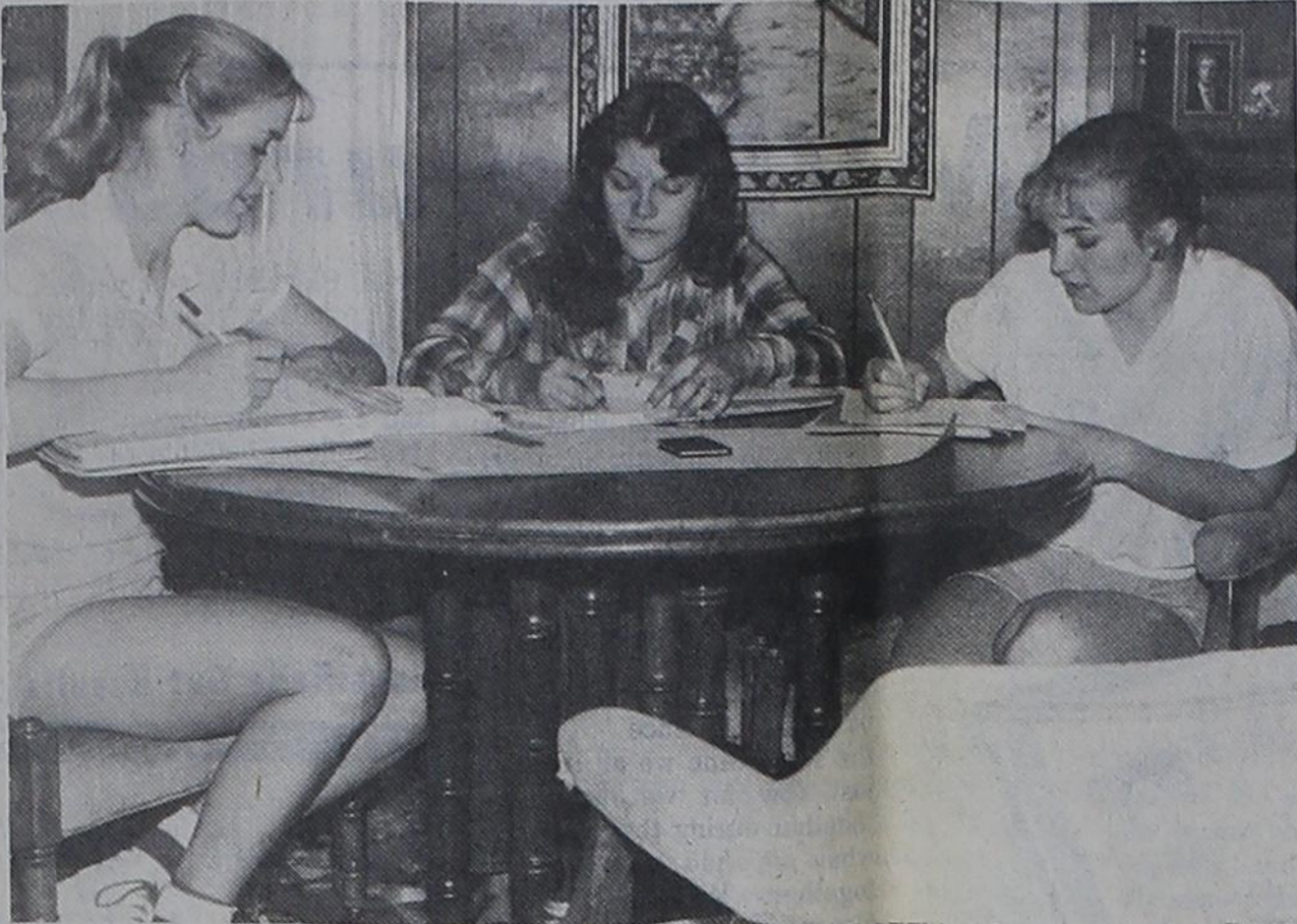
Home for Isabelle is Bernex, Switzerland, a suburb of Geneva, only a few miles from the border of France. Her native tongue is French, although she is also fluent in Italian, German and English.

"I thought my application for AFS was really good English and my English teacher back home told me it was very good. I looked back at it recently and I thought it was awful," she recalled. "I know people thought I was either very shy or stupid when I first came, but it was just that I had to take time to think how I wanted to say things in English, and by the time I got it figured out, everyone would be talking about something else."

"At my first speech I gave to a group here, my Mom (LaVon Reeve) had to 'translate' for me and help me realize what I wanted to say next."

Isabelle noted that Mrs. Reeve has helped her in other ways, too.

"Every day she asks me what I did and how my day went. She can just look at me and tell if something is

wrong. She tells me, 'I know you pretty good.'

"I'm able to talk to her. We both know it is better to talk things out than to hold it in — communication is important."

Isabelle also feels that family togetherness is important.

"I like to discuss the day's activities with the family. It is not good to ignore each other."

She said she enjoys having "girl talks" with her American sisters, Julie, a junior, and Jamie, an eighth grader. They also enjoy shopping together.

"Julie and I talk a lot, and Jamie tells me about her boyfriends," Isabelle revealed. "Back home, we don't start dating until we're about 16 or 17 years old, but here some kids start in the eighth grade."

"There is enough time to have trouble with boys later on, without starting so soon," she declared. "Most of the kids back home do not marry so young as they do here, either. It's not a mature attitude to just get married because you don't know what else to do."

"I plan to finish college before I get married, but first I have a lot of hard work ahead of me next year. My school does not give academic credit for my year here, so I still have to make up for the work I've missed in order to take the graduation exam. I'm really scared about my German, because I haven't had time to study," she explained.

Isabelle said that she hasn't decided between medicine and languages for a career yet, but added that since she doesn't like chemistry and physics, she will probably go with some type of language

career.

Her classes this year include Spanish, along with civics, trigonometry, psychology, homemaking and tennis.

"I have wanted to take Spanish for a long time. I'm glad I did. It is good to have many languages, and to try to understand different cultures — to realize that different is not necessarily good or bad, but something to learn from and accept."

Isabelle noted that she has learned a lot from her free enterprise and civics classes that will be a big help to her in her American history class back home.

"In Europe, they don't have classes such as homemaking — that has to be learned in private lessons after school. I took sewing about five years ago, but I like cooking better," she said.

Mexican food has become a real favorite with Isabelle, despite the fact that she "turned red" the first time she tried it.

"I'm going to try to talk my father into opening a Mexican food restaurant. I think it would go over really well. Anyway, Mom (Mrs. Reeve) promised she will send me tacos and hot sauce in the mail."

Isabelle said that in Switzerland, the people eat more yogurt, cheese, salads, fresh fruits and fish than here and much less meat.

She also remarked on how fast people here eat. "At home we call a buffet 'fast food.' Sometimes I get sick from eating so fast here. We take nearly an hour for meals at home, and we take time to talk."

In her talks to different groups around the area, Isabelle says she has learned a lot about herself, as well as how to relate to different types of people.

"Also, I have learned to talk to people who are not really happy to see me. But in contrast, at school the kids really seem to care whether I speak to them or not. They

will be so hard to leave. I am not ashamed to say that I am scared about leaving.

"It will be harder than when I left my family, because I knew I would see my family again, but many of these friends I have made I will never see again."

"I'm sure when I come back some of my friends will already be married. My relations with the Reeves will be different too, but we will be able to laugh about some of the problems we had."

"When I signed up to come here, it began a cycle, and I feel like I will need to visit in two years to complete the cycle, to make a full circle."

"I will never forget Dimmitt. A year of my life will always be here."

The banquet dinner of barbecued beef was catered by K-Bob's Steak House in Dimmitt.

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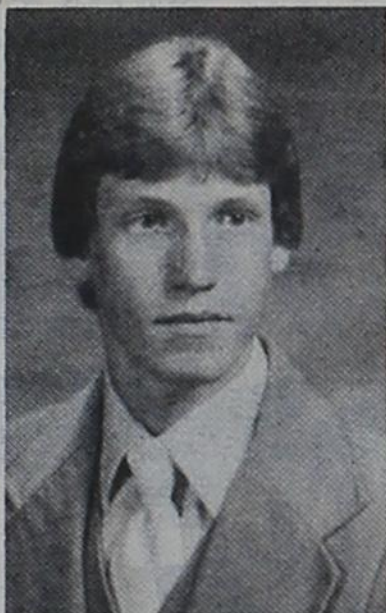
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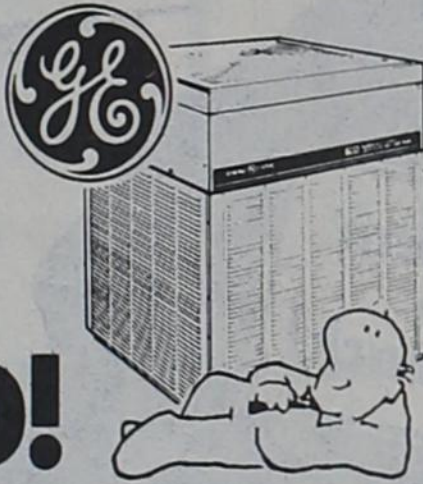
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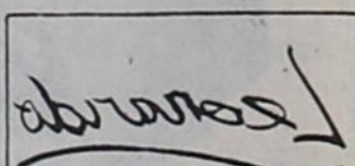
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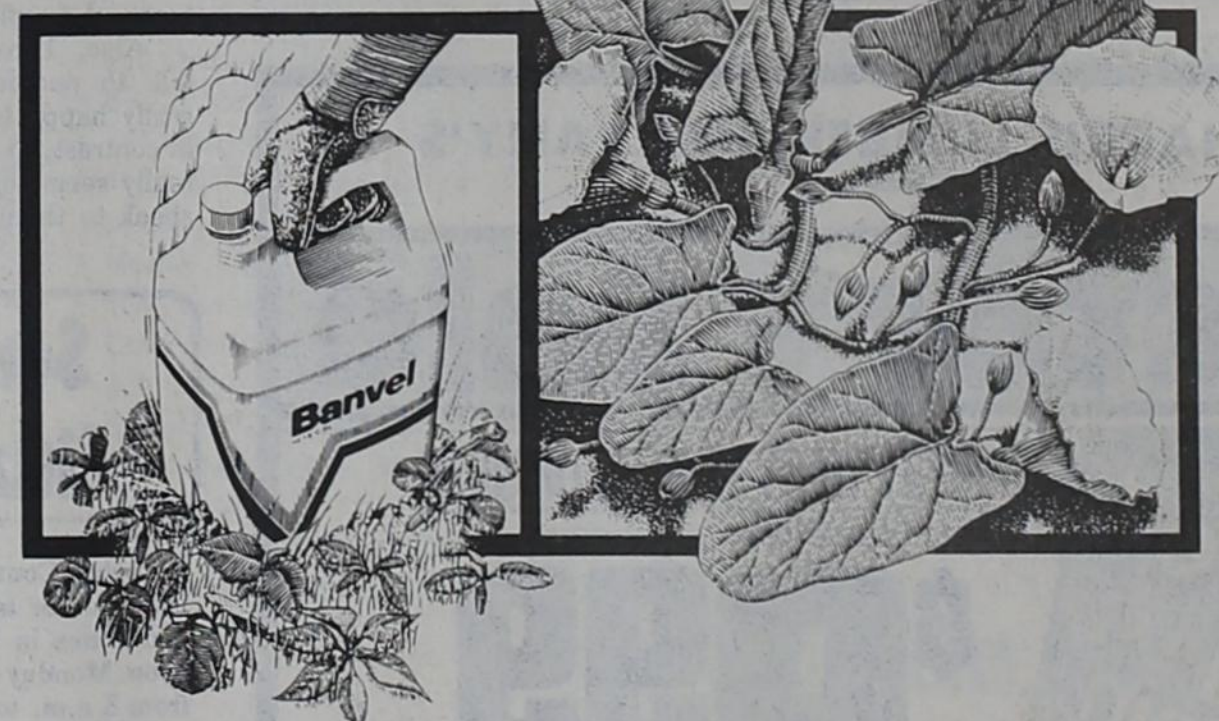
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Hoelting and Birkenfeld accept JC scholarships

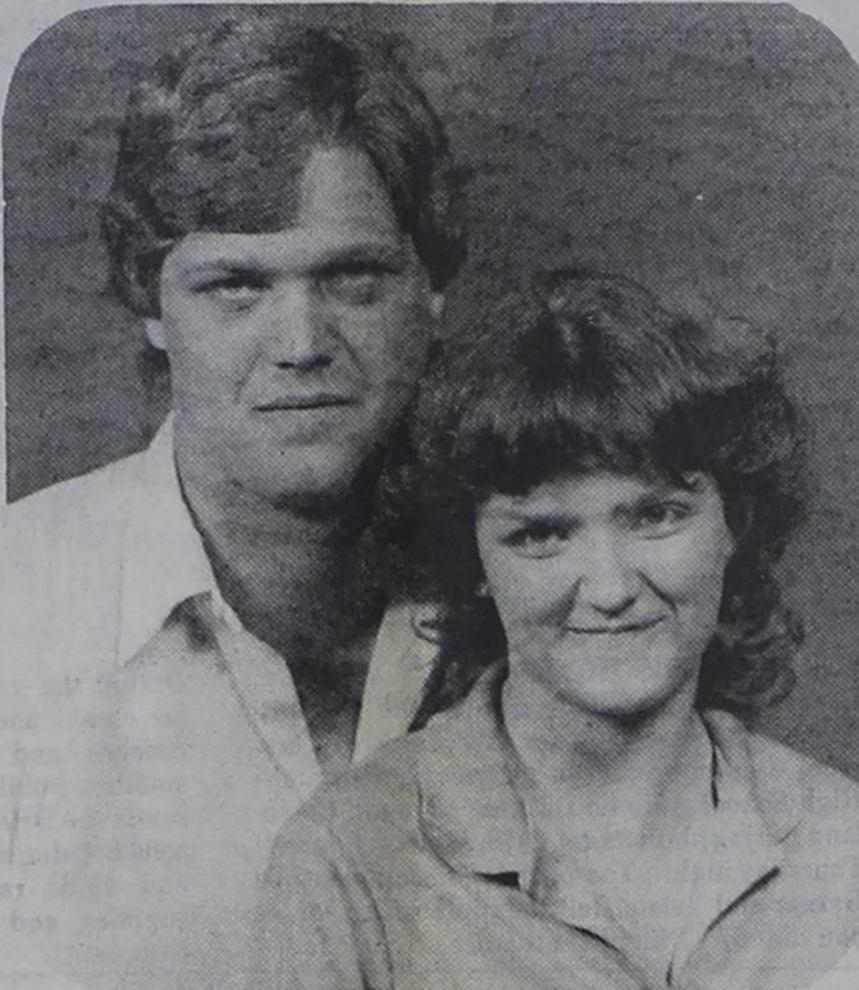

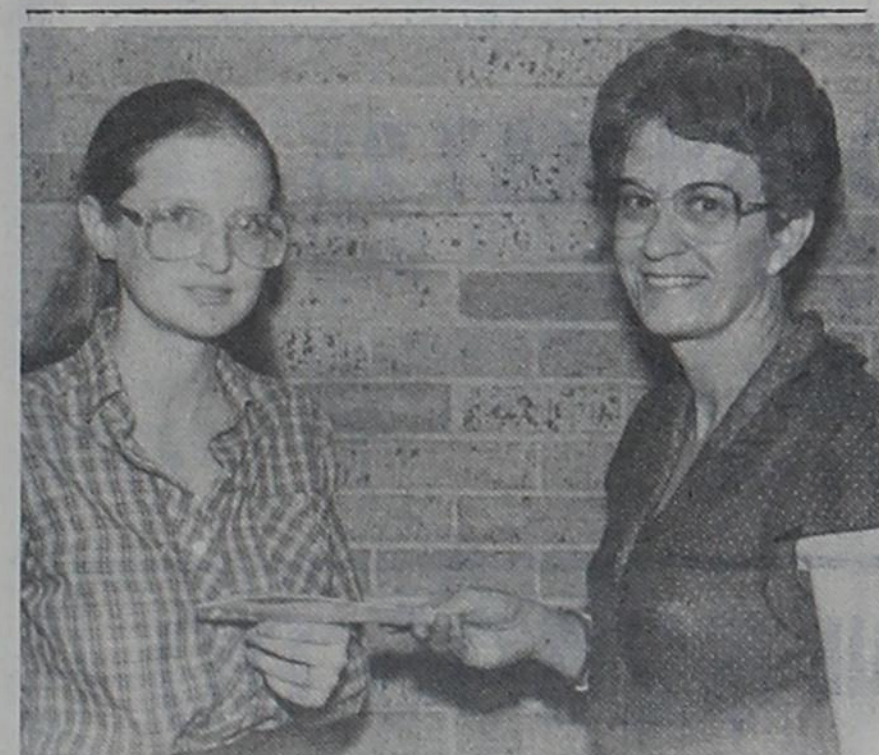

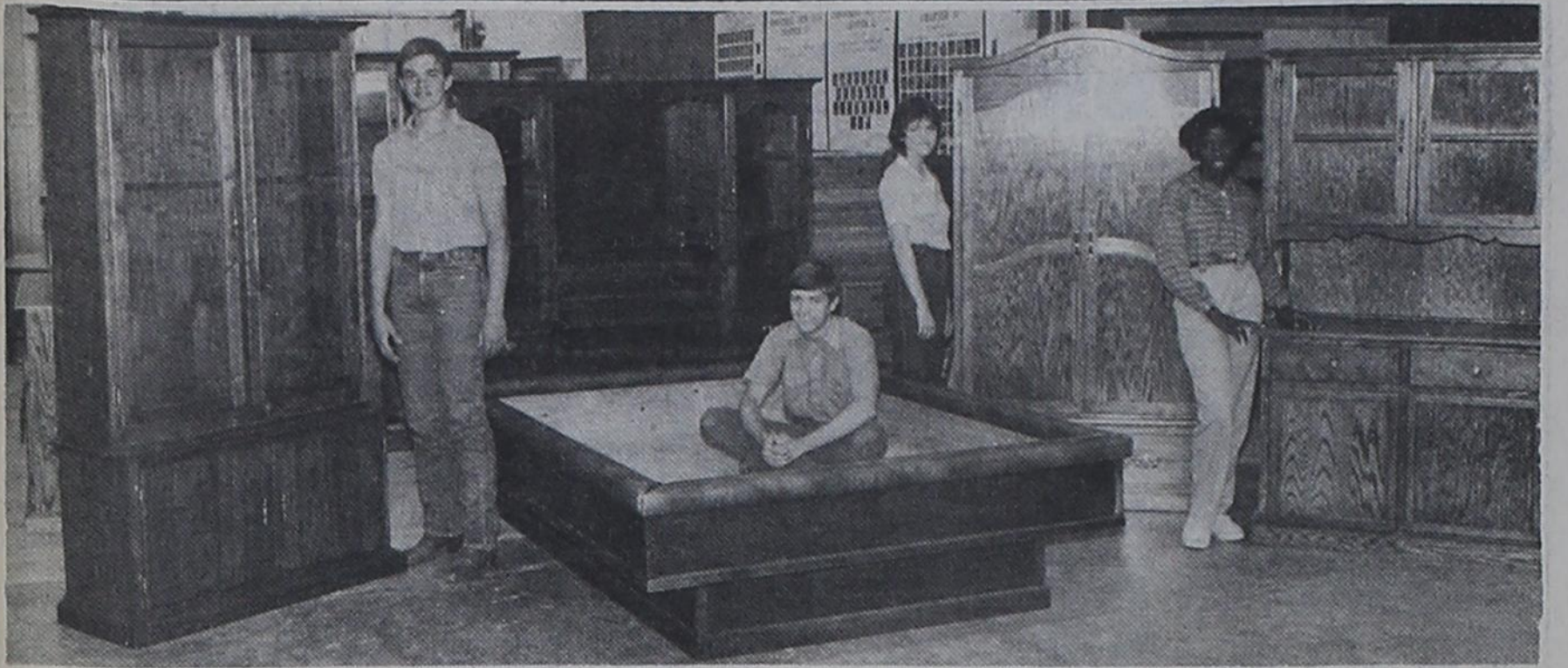

\$1,500 offered in four cases

Forms for requesting a direct deposit of VA benefits may be picked up at most banks or other financial institutions.

Cheese giveaway Glass is to be cut back

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will be giving away less cheese due to a drop in commercial sales.

In ordering a 52% cutback in the cheese giveaway program that was started about a year ago, Secretary of Agriculture John Block cited two reasons — needy people who qualify for free cheese normally buy their own, and some people who are not so needy receive free cheese rather than buy it.

"Evidence that the cheese giveaway program was hurting cheese sales started showing up during the last quarter of 1982," said Dr. Bud Schwartz, dairy marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "During that quarter commercial sales were down 8% from a year earlier. But the real shocker came last February when commercial sales were down a staggering 29% from February of 1982."

The cheese giveaway program was started in early 1982 as a means of reducing government stocks of dairy products purchased under the dairy program. More than 50 million pounds of cheese had

been given away each month before the cutback.

"Not having outlets for surplus dairy products complicates the problem of what to do about dairy policy," said Schwartz. "The USDA has imposed a 50 cents per hundredweight tax on milk producers to try to discourage increased production which has been hurting the dairy industry in recent years. The assessment will pay part of the cost of the dairy program and will hopefully turn milk production around from its persistent upward trend."

Program is 'penny stocks'

"If you had invested \$1,000 in IBM stock in 1957, you'd be a millionaire today," David Schaeffer told the Dimmitt Rotary Club Friday during his program on "penny stocks."

Schaeffer pointed out that IBM started out as a "penny stock" (those selling for \$5 and under per share), and noted that other stocks in the lower price range could eventually rise the same way.

He gave pointers on what to look for in choosing a stock to invest in, but cautioned that investors in the "very high risk market" need to be able to afford to lose their investments or to have their money tied up for a considerable period of time.

NUTRITION

The Food and Drug Administration requires that packaging which makes a specific nutritional claim must have the product's nutritional content printed on the label, says Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The label must show the serving size, calories, and amounts of protein, carbohydrates and fats per serving. It must also indicate the percentage of US RDA provided per serving. The RDA stands for "recommended daily allowance" or the approximate amounts of protein, vitamins, and minerals needed by adults for good health. To eat an adequate diet, the total amount of food consumed in a day should add up to about 100% of the US RDA for nutrients, says Haggard.

"They will provide valuable input into the SCL committee process and the policy-making decisions of the conference," he concluded.



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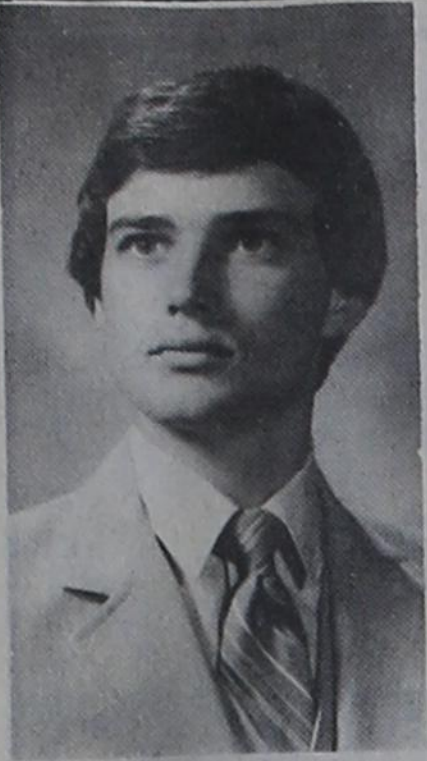

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
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Nazareth seniors to go to California

Eighteen of the 19 Nazareth High School Seniors will be going on the senior trip to California, accompanied by four sponsors.



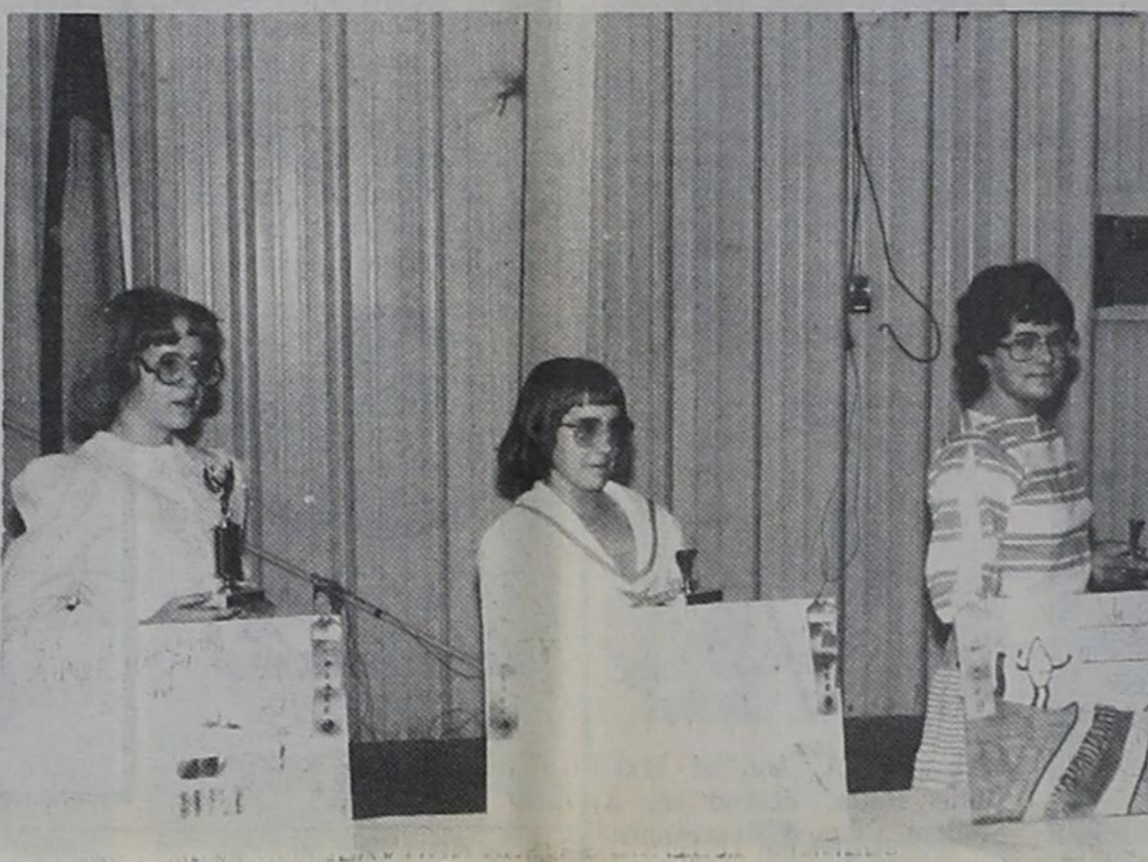
