City workers to get 6 percent raise

City of Big Spring employees are getting a raise in pay, with the possibility of even more increases in the near future.

The city council voted unanimously to approve a 6 percent, across-the-board pay increase for all city employees during a special meeting

Tuesday evening. Money for the raises will come from funds already budgeted for

this fiscal year. Giving employees a raise in the middle of a budget cycle is unusual, but the deteriorating employment situation for the city practically forced the council's hand in the matter — in the past two years, the city has lost more than half its workforce to turnover and wages rank near the bottom when compared to other West Texas municipalities.

This raise, coupled with another 6 percent increase approved last summer, is an important step toward stemming that tide, officials said.

"What the city council said to employees (Tuesday) is that, 'We care,'" City Manager Todd Darden said. "We care about how much they make and about the kind of work they do ... Realis-

"This property is located adjacent to the airpark," he continued. "Their operations include rail, and they've got other colleagues that are railcentric as well. They are very excited. They were actually here again today (Tuesday) with another potential client that has interest in doing some crude type trans-loading operations."

Wegman added the pipe coating company may have the proposal for the property owners ready as quickly as the end of this week or by the next.

"As soon as that is done, it is going to initiate the board to have to look at building more railroad structure at the

A scam artist falsely identifying himself with the Howard County Sheriff's Office is making the rounds in the county, according to information released by the sheriff's department.

"A person identifying himself as Lt. John Roberts with the Howard County Sheriff's

Office Warrant Division has been calling local residents advising them they have a warrant," said Sheriff Stan Parker. "They are given instructions to either take a sum of cash to a certain location to pay for the warrant, or they are told they can send the money by Western Union.

"This is a scam," Parker said. "The Howard County Sheriff's Office does not have anyone employed by that name nor would we ask you to ever bring cash to a location."

Officials with the sheriff's department request that if anyone receives a call from this individual they should contact the Howard County Sheriff's Office at 432-264-2244.



airpark," Wegman said."We currently have a little over \$1 million budgeted. I think it would be wise — depending on how it goes with the land owners and this particular pipe company — to seriously think about developing more rail at the airpark while we've got the money budgeted, potentially expending some more dollars to get back to that property which is going to benefit these customers.

"The pipe company anticipates \$10 to \$12 million capital investment with as many as 50 employees," Wegman continued. "There is an other company we have spoken to which would probably employ 35 employees and the gentle man that was here to day, we're not sure how many employees their operation would employ, but potentially it's going to be great to developing the area and provide a lot of jobs. These would be goodpaying jobs."

Wegman added that Fort Worth Pipe, which already has an established a site on the airpark and is using the rail system, has seen its volume of business increase substantially as the oil industry continues to boom in this part of West Texas. Wegman added that he and Avant representatives and with the short-line rail will be visiting with officials of Fort Worth Pipe to discuss their rail requirements. Because of this turnover, the city is left with a staff that is less experienced — more than half of the city payroll consists of employees with less than two years on the job — and more overworked — the city is doling out more than \$1 million a year in overtime. Also, the city is seeing an increase in customer complaints, safety issues and recruitment costs and a decrease in employee morale, Darden said.


Monterey manufacturing hubs," Wegman said. Most of the discussion was about on going projects in Mexico and how that will translate to increase commerce in the United States and Canada.

Later in the meeting Avant queried Wegman on what type of commercial transport coming through Laredo is most used to transport good from its port.

"Most of that is truck traffic," Wegman an swered. "We are seeing a great deal of rail traffic through Eagle Pass. For the pipe coating company, a lot of that pipe is being manufactured in Mexico brought in by rail from Eagle Pass to Houston, coated, and then brought back out here for distribution.

"This (local facility) would kind of short circuit that," Wegman added. "Pipe would come in probably directly form Fort Worth then come to our end for coating and distribution."

Wegman added that the more handling of the composite coated pipes lends itself to more damage. A local facially closer to the



Darden and other city officials said they were being aggressive in hiring new employees, but the city still has more than 30 vacancies across all its departments.

They have had more than 80 clients visit with them in the two-year period we've contracted with them.'

Saldivar queried Wegman on ways to help get the word out to the community about the



Religious freedom is a fundamental right

his is an exciting and glorious week for those of us who are professing Christians as we celebrate what many believe to be the most special of all reli-

gious holidays, Resurrection Day or, as it is more commonly called, Easter.

It has traditionally been associated with new fashion outfits for the family, special Holy Week services, and Easter egg hunts. The celebration should not be lim-

ited to any of those markers, however, because the true meaning of this special week is powerful and much deeper than any of them could possibly portray. It is about life — eternal life — and that's why it is celebration worthy. My family and I will joyfully proclaim our faith and trust in Almighty God this week, and every week of the year, because our faith is of ultimate importance and value.

There are gross misconceptions about a number of our freedoms in America. There are a vast number of inequities, inconsistencies and a massive amount of hypocrisy among the political and religious elite of this nation.

While there have always been anti-God crusaders and antagonists against Christianity, the movement to discredit and decrease the influence of faith in a Divine Creator has never been more organized, publicized and funded as it is today. Anti-Christian activists, political leaders and atheist celebrities are boldly and loudly bombarding our society with their hatred and prejudice against the God of the Bible and those who embrace Him and His word.

The louder they profess their contempt and animosity toward Christians, the more determined I am to lift my voice in declaration of my unwavering faith in God.

I am, of course, a believer in religious freedom and everyone has the right in America to believe whatever they choose to believe about God, even to the point of denying His existence. But know this, I will never apologize for being a believer in Jesus Christ and I will not be intimidated by those who are working tirelessly to quiet the Christian testimony. I am thankful there is a vast army of believers who are in agreement with me on that matter and it is our time to make our voices heard loud and strong.

Human freedom, and especially religious freedom, reflects God's design for creation and His pattern of redemption. Religious freedom is thus grounded in the character of God as revealed in the Bible and in the moral structure of the world that we can know through reason and spiritual revelation.

Religious freedom is a fundamental right. As the American founders put it, it is "unalienable."

According to the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life, Christians face harassment in more countries than any other religious group. In the words of the World Evangelical Alliance, Christians are "the largest single group in the world ... being denied human rights on the basis of their faith."

Overt persecution of Christians is widespread in many Islamic societies.

Christians are murdered by radical Islamists in churches in Egypt and Iraq.

Bibles are not permitted in Saudi Arabia, and the Saudi national curriculum continues to teach students to "kill" Jews and apostates, view Christians as enemies, and spread the Islamic faith through "jihad," a teaching it promotes by funding the distribution of extremist textbooks throughout the world.

In some Islamic states, conversion to another religion is a capital offense.

In my own denomination, a Church of God woman pastor in the city of Choloma, Honduras, was murdered on Thursday, April 3, by two gang members who had earlier demanded "protection tax" to keep church members safe from their attacks.

Maria Francisca Sevilla, 39, the mother of three children, was co-pastor with her husband, Geovanny, of a church in the third largest city of the nation.

According to police reports, she was surprised in her home by her attackers when she returned from taking one of her children to an afternoon school session.

She was stabbed repeatedly, fighting against her assailants and calling for help, but she died in the church doorway before help arrived. In November 2013, the pastoral couple and one of their children were kidnapped, beaten, and dumped in a drainage ditch in San Pedro Sula, about 15 miles from their home. On yet another occasion, the husband was attacked, tied up and left in his vehicle, which the gang intended to burn, but the police patrolling the area arrived in time to rescue him.

In the United States, religious freedom is being encroached upon and reduced through the courts, in administrative policy, and in our culture.

The capacity of religious believers to form and sustain distinctive institutions is threatened today. The United States Department of Health and Human Services has proposed "preventive services" regulations that require provision of FDA-approved contraceptives and sterilization.

These regulations threaten the religious freedom of insurers, employers, schools and other religious enterprises that conscientiously oppose contraception and abortion.

Administrative and regulatory policies pose further threats to religious freedom. Christian doctors, nurses, pharmacists and other health-care providers are being put at professional risk by policies that compel all healthcare workers to undertake procedures and provide prescription drugs that many of them regard as immoral.

While the threats to freedom of faith, religious practice and religious participation in public affairs in Islamist and Communist states are widely recognized, grave threats to religious freedom have also emerged in the developed democracies. In the West, including the USA, certain religious beliefs are now regarded as bigoted.

Pastors are under threat, both cultural and legal, for preaching biblical truth. Christian socialservice and charitable agencies are forced to cease cooperation with the state because they will not bend their work to what Pope Benedict XVI called the "dictatorship of moletimicm."

"dictatorship of relativism." Seeing this develop before our very eyes, I say it's unquestionably time for Christians all over the world to declare with Paul the Apostle, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ." Have a blessed Easter — He lives!

Nevada showdown: All hat, no cattle

evada cattle rancher Cliven Bundy and his well-armed supporters forced the wellarmed federal government to back down and return Bundy's seized cows — which were seized because Bundy, 67, stopped pay-

ing grazing fees in 1993. How does anyone get the government to back down?

At first blush, Bundy seemed to have right on his side. He's a cowboy who just wants to keep being a cowboy.

The federal government, which

owns more than 80 percent of Nevada land, including the land on which the Bundy family had settled, threatened to put him out to pasture. The Bureau of Land Management told the rancher he would have to cut back cattle grazing on federal lands to accommodate the threatened desert tortoise. So in 1993, Bundy stopped paying federal grazing fees. "They were managing my ranch out of business," Bundy explained, "so I refused to pay."

As the Las Vegas Review-

Journal editorialized, the federal government has endangered a Western way of life in deference to "the 'threatened' desert tortoise and a supposedly fragile desert ecosystem that somehow has sustained cattle and the reptiles since the 19th century."

The BLM surely has earned its black-hat reputation in Nevada. In a classic example of federal overreach, the BLM carved out a small "First Amendment Area" for pro-Bundy protesters, which only fueled the public's distrust of government.

Nevada Gov. Brian Sandoval suggested that the BLM reconsider its approach to constitutional rights — and Sandoval's a former federal judge, whom you would expect to stand up for the federal court orders Bundy is flouting.

Sandoval issued a statement before the BLM backed down in which he argued, "No cow justifies the atmosphere of intimidation" that he was placing on BLM's doorstep.

That sentiment ought to apply to Bundy, as well. The rancher says he does not recognize the authority of federal courts. "I abide by all of Nevada state laws," Breitbart Texas reports that the scion told talk radio. "But I don't recognize the United States government as even existing."

He was willing to start a "range war" and risk the lives of his supporters in order to retrieve some cows. He doesn't feel he has to recognize a government elected by his fellow citizens.

The BLM clearly can be accused of overreach, but who elected Bundy to be judge, jury and sheriff?

Bundy could have fought the government at the ballot box by trying to elect members of Congress who want to defang the BLM. (It's strange when you realize that for all their anti-Washington sentiments, Nevada voters have sent Harry Reid to the Senate repeatedly since 1986.) That's the American way. Threatening to shoot law enforcement officers who simply are carrying out court orders is not.



In 2006, Salazar was diagnosed with a rare disease which left him paralyzed from the neck down and in 2009 was given only a short time to live.

"Shortly after returning home (from the VA Hospital), I began to move my upper body and began seeing improvements," Salazar said in a written statement. "My wife and I have truly lived the marriage vows, for better and for worse, for richer or for poorer, In sickness and in health... In 2011, she was diagnosed with breast cancer and life became very difficult with us both needing home healthcare. By a miracle, I have regained about 70 percent of my upper body strength but am in a power chair for now."

Salazar's wife, a cancer survivor, works fulltime and cares for him in the evenings. In his mobile chair, he goes throughout his neighborhood and does small jobs to make ends meet.

Because he remains paralyzed in both legs and has 70 percent strength in his arms, Salazar has a difficult time getting in a vehicle. The family cannot afford a new one.





Roberson qualifies for state golf tourney

Devin Roberson is headed to high school golf's version of the Promised Land.

The Big Spring High School senior punched his ticket to the Class 3A state golf tournament on Thursday with a solid round on the final day of the Region I-3A Golf Championships at Shadow Hills Golf Course in Lubbock. He shot

a 74 over the final 18 holes of Regency Lost Pines Resort in the tournament and finished with a two-day total of 150.

Roberson's final mark left him in a three-way tie for seventh in the individual standings, and gave him a berth in the upcoming state tournament. Only the top three teams and the top 10 individuals qualified for the state tournament, which will be held April 28-29 at the Hyatt Austin.

The BSHS standout kicked off the tournament on Mondav by carding a 76. He trimmed two strokes off his score on his final day.

Tvler Brvan and Tate Kennedy also turned in solid outings at the tournament. Bryan posted a final round of 73 and finished the meet with a mark of 156, just six strokes

shy of qualifying.

Bryan tallied an 83 in the first round on Monday.

Kennedy finished the tournament with identical rounds of 83 and posted a final mark of 166.

BSHS Teammates Mikey Pappajohn and Sam Harris also did well. Pappajohn turned in rounds of 79 and 80, respectively, and finished at 159. Harris turned in scores

of 84 and 85 and finished at 169.

As a team, the Steers finished fifth in the final standings with a two-day total of 631 - one stroke better than District 4-3A rival Abilene Wvlie.







Defensive signals are either positive or negative. Thus, if your partner leads the king of a suit and you have the A-7-2, you can ask him to continue the suit by signaling positively with the seven, or to discontinue the suit by signaling negatively with the deuce.

Similarly, if you are void of a suit that is being led, such as when declarer is drawing trumps, you can signal positively or negatively by the size of your discard in some other suit. Such signals are essential if the defenders are to overcome the natu-

ral advantage declarer has over the defense.

In general, a positive signal, telling partner which suit to lead, is more illuminating than a negative signal, which merely tells him which suit not to lead. At the same time, however, a combination of negative signals can add up to a positive sig-

nal, as illustrated in this deal. West leads the jack of hearts, dummy winning with the king as East follows with the deuce. Declarer then plays a low diamond to the king, which holds, followed by the ten and another diamond, West taking the ace on the third round.

East has an opportunity to discard on the third diamond, and his choice of plays is critical to the defense. If he signals with the nine or ten of spades, it costs him the contract even though West shifts to that suit. South's eight becomes a stopper on the fourth round, and he makes three notrump.

But if East discards the club deuce on the third diamond, West should shift to a spade. When he does, South goes down two. The spade shift by West is not

difficult once East has expressed disinterest in hearts and clubs by playing the deuce of both suits, inferentially suggesting a spade lead. All West has to do is to obey his partner's suggested line of defense.






