WTC and HC offering mental health training

West Texas Centers and Howard College are offering a Mental Health First Aid training session to those who are interested in knowing how to respond to people with mental health problems. This class will be offered Saturday, April 26, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. in the Howard College Warren Center, Big Spring campus. An hour will be set aside for lunch. Lunch will not be provided. To register, contact the Howard College Registrar's Office at 264-5072. Classes are \$50 for the general public and free to Texas educators, teaching grades kindergarten through 12th grade. The class includes a Mental Health First Aid trainee manual. Mental Health First Aid helps those experiencing mental health problems before they can obtain professional help and support, said West Texas Centers CEO Shelley Smith. "It is similar to First Aid and CPR," Smith said. "It is designed to give members of the public key skills to help

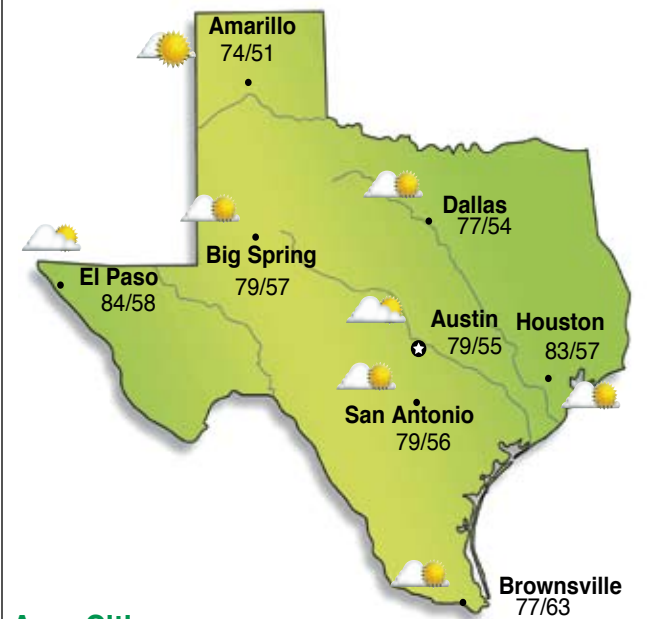

**Big Sit Saturday at C-City State Park EGGS**

COLORADO CITY — Lake Colorado City has a Big Sit Team participating in the Great Texas Birding Classic this Saturday.

The GTBC is a bird identification competition directed by Texas Parks and Wildlife across the state between April 15 and May 15 with many categories to compete in such as the Big Sit. They will have 24 hours to identify as many species of birds as possible from within a 17-foot diameter circle.

Birds can be identified by sight or sound. The team is led by Park Superintendent Kyle O'Haver, who became the new park superintendent at Lake Colorado City last winter, after moving relocating from the Rio Grande Valley.

O'Haver was previously working at one of the World Birding Center sites Estero Llano Grande State Park as the resource specialist of one of the best birding destinations in Texas. "The Great Texas Bird-

ing Classic is a fun and educational way to teach visitors about birding and raise funds for avian education and habitat projects," O'Haver said. If you would like to come by and see what the "Big Sit" is all about and learn some birds from an area bird enthusiast, head on over.

Visitors can come in during the park hours of 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and acquire an entrance fee permit of \$4 per person or free with a Texas State Parks Passport.

Webb served as director of the NSCC for 15 years and during his tenure he instituted the job placement program, the Legal Aid program which continues to be offered today, and extended the food program to include gasoline for medical and work purposes.

"Max truly has a compassion for those in need," Saldivar said.

Webb has two sons, Aaron and Mike and now lives in Fort Worth, Texas.

A lifelong resident of Big Spring, Pat DeAnda is a mother of three, grandmother of two and great-grandmother of eight. She became active in politics after the assassination of U.S. President John F. Kennedy. The death of Augustin Paradez, the first local causality of Viet-

nam, strengthened her interest in becoming politically active.

"Yet not old enough to vote, she started counting the years until she could register to vote," Saldivar said. "While friends could not wait to get their driver's license, she could not wait to register to vote. In the meantime, she started to read the War in Commission and learn about the conflicts in Vietnam as Big Spring kept receiving bodies of fallen heroes"

DeAnda served as the president of LULAC. She became the first Mexican American female elected to the Big Spring City Council, serving for 12 years.

"During her time she has been an advocate for parity in all areas that pertained to government," Saldivar said.

DeAnda also served as a teacher for the Big Spring Independent School District for a

number of years and currently is an elected trustee on the BSISD board.

According to Saldivar, the North Side Movement felt it was extremely important that they select a strong female model to name one of the pavilions after.

The North Side Movement hopes to construct a third pavilion at the park, naming it Mi Familia Pavilion. As a fund-raising effort to help with the construction costs, the NSM is offering purchases of bricks to honor or remember an individual or business

someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. It is not geared toward professionals in the mental health field, but they can learn from this training."

Mental health problems — such as depression, anxiety, impulse control and misuse of alcohol and other drugs — are common in the United States, Smith said. More than one in four American adults will

have a mental health problem in a year.

The National Council on Community Behavioral Healthcare works with communities throughout the nation, including West Texas Centers, to implement Mental Health First Aid to arm the public with skills to help individuals who are developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis.

The clinical and qualitative evidence behind the program demonstrates that it helps the public better identify, understand and respond

to signs of mental illness, thus improving outcomes for individuals experiencing these illnesses.

Participants of Mental Health First Aid are introduced to risk factors and warning signs for

mental health or substance use problems; engage in experiential activities that build understanding of the impact of illness on individuals and families; and get information about evidence-supported treatment and self-

help strategies. They also receive a course manual and a certificate at the completion of the course. Continuing Education Units are available.

# Here's Obamacare, Part 2

As I walked into the pharmacy, the technician who has kept track of all of my prescriptions for years was on an endless call trying to figure out who is going to deliver her baby and where.

The good news: Her new plan, which fully complies with the Affordable Care Act, provides much more comprehensive coverage and lower co-pays than the one she used to have.

The bad news: Neither the obstetrician who has taken care of her for the past six months nor the hospital where she had planned to give birth are covered by the plan.

Ouch. Now, this young woman is really good at dealing with insurance companies. It's what she does all day long — getting prescriptions approved, figuring out why they aren't being approved, going back and forth with doctors and insurance companies about what they will and will not cover. No neophyte, she.

And as I signaled her that I could wait, that she should finish her conversation, she never lost her cool.

Me, I would have been a wreck if someone had told me six months into a pregnancy that the doctor with whom I had developed a close and trusting relationship or the hospital that I had always relied on were no longer on my list, and that my choices — within any reasonable geographic distance — basically came down to six doctors I'd never heard of and a hospital I'd never set foot in.

## Latinos: Why should you vote?

The Democratic president who was supposed to be our great amigo turned out to be a huge disappointment, deporting more immigrants than even his Republican predecessors, refusing to ease his government's crackdown on the people he claims he wants to help, and making a mockery of his “Si Se Puede /Yes We Can” campaign rhetoric.

And the Republicans who claim they want to be our new amigos won't even allow immigration reform legislation to come up for a vote in the House of Representatives, proving they are more concerned about a backlash from their anti-immigrant “base voters” than making new friends.

No wonder so many Latinos have lost faith in American politics! No wonder so many don't bother to vote!

When you ask eligible Latino voters why they don't “do the right thing on Election Day,” many of them respond with another forceful question: “What for?”

Instead of becoming more and more involved in the electoral process, it often seems as if Latinos are becoming increasingly disgusted with both Democrats and Republicans.

Yet many politicians — including the president — have the gall to complain about Latino voter apathy. At a fundraising event in Houston last week, President Barack Obama blamed the looming Democratic Party setbacks in this year's midterm elections on blacks and Latinos.

“We have this congenital disease, which is in the mid-

term elections we don't vote at the same rates,” Obama said, according to the Washington Post.

That's true for most voters. And yet, thanks to you, Mr. President, particularly among Latinos, that disease could be spreading into future presidential elections. After all, what is the next Democratic presidential candidate going to tell Latinos: Si Se Puede? What are they going to sell us: comprehensive immigration reform?

Even before Obama became president, Democrats were known for assuming that Latinos had no other choice but to vote for them, and then taking the Latino vote for granted. But Obama has taken that audacity to new heights, potentially raising Latino voter apathy and encouraging many traditionally Democratic voters to stay home on Election Day.

Amazingly, the only thing that keeps saving the Democratic Party from massive Latino defections is the insistence by a few Republicans that they can be much worse.

Just look at the way some potential GOP presidential candidates reacted to Jeb Bush's recent display of compassion for undocumented immigrants.

When the former Florida governor said illegal immigration should be considered “an act of love” instead of a felony, most of the other contenders, or their surrogates, not only took cheap shots at Bush, but sent Latinos a clear message that they are not about to change their vitriolic, immigrant-bashing dispositions.

You've heard of being caught between a rock and a hard place?

Well, Latinos keep getting caught between the hatred and hostility coming from Republicans and the phony promises

House. And if you ask me, not afterward, either.

I don't know anyone with a 20-something-year-old on their plan (which you couldn't do before) or with a pre-existing condition (And who, after a certain age, doesn't have some pre-existing condition?) who is yearning to go back to the bad old days when gastritis, not to mention heart disease or cancer, could make you uninsurable.

There are many features of the new system that most of us would agree are better than those of the old one.

But not all. The business of what doctors you can see, what hospitals you can use — very big problem. The waiting lines for doctors who accept all kinds of plans — very big problem. The confusion and expense of having a “new” plan that costs more because it covers services you don't need and at the same time forces you to leave the doctors who know you — not so good.

“Mend it, don't end it” used to be the Clinton administration's slogan about affirmative action.

Obamacare should not be repealed, and it won't be. But it needs to be fixed, and that's not a problem the IT guys and girls can solve.

So fasten your seatbelts. We're in for some rocky times, and the politicians and leaders who focus on trying to solve the problems, rather than trying to score points off of them, are the ones who deserve our support.

# What is so great about anger?

Anger must be a great emotion. Why else would so many people be so eager to spread it around? English speaking people have coined dozens of phrases to describe their devotion to anger.

Anger idioms have indeed colored our language and brightened our vocabularies. Perhaps they have defused fights and prevented explosions. Maybe a few tongue-in-cheek idioms have even channeled rupture-point anger into unexpected bursts of laughter.

For some reason, anger is often associated with things that blow up, out, or about. We speak of the person who is fit to be tied blowing up, blowing his top, a gasket, or a fuse. Sometimes we even accuse such a hothead of popping a cork.

Angry people always seem to be going somewhere. They go into fits for rage. They go on the warpath, or go ballistic. Sometimes they even go off the deep end.

Folks who stay mad as a hornet most of the time seem to have an affinity for verbs. They fly off the handle, hit the roof, bite heads off, foam at the mouth, and get hopping mad. Their feathers get ruffled, and their blood boils. They see red. They get ticked off. They get up in arms. They are easily driven up the wall.

Anger mongers tend to be warm natured. Often red faced, they stay hot under the collar. They boast of their short fuses and hot headedness. Their quick tempers replace social skills and good judgment. Anger dictates all the punches. It both controls and robs control from lives.

In spite of their weaknesses, short tempered folks are great givers and receivers. They love giving a piece of their mind, a tongue lashing, or a pain in the neck. At the same time, they can get someone's goat or get in someone's hair with little instigation.

In the Scripture, the presence of anger is never denied, nor is it totally prohibited. The Bible does, however, give some guidelines for keeping a healthy perspective on anger. King Solomon wrote, "He who is slow to anger has great understanding, but he who is quick-tempered exalts folly" (Proverbs 14:29 NASB).

The apostle Paul also had something to say about anger: "Be angry, and yet do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not give the devil an opportunity" (Ephesians 4:26-27 NASB).

Perhaps the really great thing about anger is that its use or abuse teaches God's people to be more like Him.

## News briefs

### Ky. jury says ex-priest should serve 15 years

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A jury says a former Catholic priest stricken with late-stage cancer should serve a 15-year prison sentence for sexually abusing a teenage boy at a Louisville church in the early 1970s.

James Schook's attorney urged the jury to give the former church leader a more lenient sentence, since the 66-year-old is terminally ill. A judge will make a final determination on Schook's punishment on May 30.

Attorney David Lambertus said Schook has lived longer than was expected, so he may not have much time left. Lambertus had asked for a sentence that would allow Schook to seek parole in two years.

"If you're talking about time in someone's life, I think it's fair to say how much life is left there?" Lambertus told the jury Thursday morning.

Schook was convicted Wednesday of three counts of sodomy and one count of indecent or immoral practice with another, a felony that has a maximum punishment of 10 years in prison. The sodomy charges ranged from two to five years.

Prosecutor John Balliet said a 15-year sentence would be "very appropriate." He told the jury that Schook's health problems should not factor into punishment for the crimes he committed.

David Whitfield testified at the trial that he was 13 when he began a years-long sexual relationship with Schook. Whitfield was interested in becoming a priest, and he said the two often had sexual encounters in Schook's room on church property.

Balliet said Schook took advantage of his position of trust with Whitfield.

"He was supposed to be guiding Richard on the path to becoming a priest," Balliet said. Instead, Whitfield learned "all the wrong things about a relationship."

Schook was indicted in 2011, but sought several delays of the trial due to his failing health. He was permanently removed from ministry in 2010.

The Archdiocese of Louisville paid a \$25.7 million settlement in 2003 with 243 victims who claimed they were sexually abused by clergy or other staff. Louisville

Archdiocese priests convicted of sex abuse over the last decade have faced a range of criminal punishments.

Former priest Louis A. Miller is serving a 30-year prison sentence for sexually abusing 29 children between the 1950s and 1980s. The Rev. Edwin Scherzer was put on five years of house arrest in 2005 for sexually abusing four boys. Former priest Daniel C. Clark was sentenced to probation in 2008 for sexually abusing two boys in neighboring Bullitt County between 1999 and 2002.

The Rev. James Hargadon died in 2005 after serving a year of an eight-year sentence for abusing three boys in the 1970s.

### Many mourn likely demolition of Muscatine church

MUSCATINE, Iowa (AP) — The old St. Mary's Catholic Church nestled on 417 Green St. sits tall among trees that haven't come alive yet this spring. For the church, it will probably be its last spring intact.

The construction of St. Mary's began in 1876, at the request of the community's German Catholic population, and was complete in the fall of 1877. The first mass the building hosted was held two years later, in the cold of winter by the parish's first German-speaking pastor, the Rev. John Ignatius Grieser. It was under the guiding hand of Grieser that the church built St. Mary's school and acquired its Pfeiffer pipe organ, which has become a part of the Organ Historic Society's database.

Now, nearly 140 years after it was built, St. Mary's is about to be torn down.

Parishioner Coletta Logel, 81, is heartbroken over her church's pending demolition.

"That's the only church I've known," she said.

She began attending St. Mary's as a child in the 40s with her family. Though the parishes of St. Mary's and St. Mathias, the other Catholic church in Muscatine, have been combined since 2000 and St. Mary's has been out of use due to safety issues since last year, Logel says St. Mathias still doesn't feel like home.

## Pondering the Question

I was twenty-nine years old when my father died of multiple myeloma, cancer of the bone marrow. He was fifty-three. Only hours before his death, I spoke with him. Our eyes met during that final visit, the same eye contact we had shared from my birth. I held his hand as he drew his last breath, and then, he was gone. His body lay lifeless and unresponsive.

The morticians took his body from the hospital room where our family had waited through the night. We visited the funeral home and chose a casket. Shortly afterward other family and friends joined us to view his body lying still and quiet, dressed in his familiar suit, his hair combed. I stood by the casket and stared at his face. It was obvious another hand had combed his hair and another hand had tied his tie. He seemed to be sleeping. I almost imagined him drawing breath. Almost imagined him opening his eyes so that they sparkled once again with life, his lips parting in the familiar grin, the dimples reappearing in his cheeks. But he didn't move. We buried his body in the cemetery 38 years ago surrounded by friends who came to comfort us, many of whom are now buried nearby.

I asked myself the question Job asked centuries ago, the question every man and woman must ultimately ask when they stand where I stood on that day, "If a man die, shall he live again?" (Job 14:14).

Job's struggle with the question was not about theology or

philosophy. His struggle was like mine. It was personal. It is the struggle we all must face sooner or later when those whom we love die. "At least there is hope for a tree," Job said, "If it is cut down it will sprout again. ... Its roots may grow old in the ground and its stump die in the soil, yet at the scent of water it will bud and put forth shoots like a plant. But a man dies and is laid low; he breathes his last and is no more." (Job 14:7-10) After having pondered the question, Job foresaw the Easter event we celebrate this weekend. He wrote, "I know that my redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand on the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see him with my own eyes — I, and not another. How my heart yearns within me!" (Job 19:25-27).

The world will ponder Job's question this weekend when we gather in Christian churches around the world. If Jesus was raised from the dead, the answer to life's most important question is clear. Luke wrote, "After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God." (Acts 1:3). Paul wrote, "But now Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who are asleep. For since by a man came death, by a man also came the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ all will be made alive." (1 Corinthians 15:20-22).

He was perfectly content to let the other seven runners in the field set the pace for the first 500 meters of the race.

It was the last 300 that concerned him most. Running in last place after the first lap, Lopez shifted into a higher gear as he rounded the first turn on the final lap.

From that point on, the only thing the rest of the field saw of the Big Spring High School senior was the bottom of his spikes and the back of his jersey.

Lopez earned the first

of his three invitations to the Region I-3A Track and Field Championships by blazing to an easy win on the 800-meter race. Despite trailing for much of the race, his late kick enabled him to win the event by almost five yards with a time of 2 minutes and 3.60 seconds.

"That has been his plan," said BSHS assistant track coach Mike Warren. "Coach wants him to run a little faster on the first lap, but he hasn't needed to."

Backed by Lopez's impressive last-to-first run, the Big Spring track team all six of them, managed to earn the runner-up honors at the meet. The Steers rolled up 80 points and finished behind only Wylie in the final standings. Wylie won the team crown

### Lady Steers send all three relay teams to regional meet

PECOS - The Big Spring High School Lady Steers relay teams expected tougher races this week as they headed in to the District 3-4 3A Area Track and Field Championships. The teams advancing are supposed to be tougher, right?

A challenge in any of the three relay events never came Thursday at Rotary Field.

En route to sweeping all three relays, the Lady Steers' shattered the BSHS school record in the 4x400-meter relay for the second time this season and powered Big Spring to a second-place finish in the final team standings. Wylie won the area title.

Big Spring, which stood next-to-last following the field events,

dominated the running portion of the meet. Overall, 81 of the Lady Steers' 85 points came in the running events.

Just how dominating can one team be in an event? Just ask the other seven teams in the 4x400-meter relay.

Big Spring breezed to an easy win in the mile relay race. They posted a school-record of 3:57.31 in the event and finished more than 13 seconds - or about 100 yards - ahead of Wylie, which crossed the line in second at 4:12.63.

The race was never close. Ever.

Big Spring's Erin Polford turned in a lap of effort in the first lap of the race, giving the Lady Steers a 5-yard lead by the time she passed the baton to Faith Roberson.

"This is why we're all here," Heat forward Shane Battier said. "The regular season is great and all, but this is the

fun part. You wake up and you're excited for the playoffs. There's no better time than right now."

It begins Saturday with four games: Top-seeded Indiana hosts Atlanta, and Brooklyn visits Toronto in the Eastern Conference, while the West series openers include Golden State at the Clippers, and Oklahoma City against Memphis.

On Sunday, No. 1 overall seed San Antonio opens against Dallas, right before Miami welcomes Charlotte. Washington at Chicago, and Houston hosting Portland round out the action.

The postseason came to a thrilling conclusion last year, with the Heat rallying from a five-point deficit in the final 28 seconds of regulation to win Game 6. They went on to take a tight Game 7, helped when Tim Duncan missed over Battier from point-blank range down the stretch, to hand San Antonio its first loss in five NBA Finals appearances.

This Date In History

Today is Good Friday, April 18, the 108th day of 2014. There are 257 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On April 18, 1934, the first laundromat (called a "Washateria") was opened by John F. Cantrell in Fort Worth, Texas; four electric washing machines were rented to members of the public on an hourly basis. On this date: In 1775, Paul Revere began his famous ride from Charlestown to Lexington, Mass.,

warning American colonists that the British were coming. In 1831, the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa was officially opened. In 1906, a devastating earthquake struck San Francisco, followed by raging fires; estimates of the final death toll range between 3,000 and 6,000. In 1923, the first game was played at the original Yankee Stadium in New York; the Yankees defeated the Boston Red Sox 4-1. In 1942, an air squadron from the USS Hornet led by Lt. Col. James H. Doolittle raided Tokyo and other Japanese cities. The

first World War II edition of The Stars and Stripes was published as a weekly newspaper. In 1944, the ballet "Fancy Free," with music by Leonard Bernstein (BURN'-styn) and choreography by Jerome Robbins, premiered in New York. In 1949, the Republic of Ireland was proclaimed.

By the time Roberson passed the baton to Kaitlyn Mathews, the Big Spring lead had grown to epic proportions. When senior Dyrshae Vanderbilt took the baton for the final lap, she was well around the second corner of the track before Wylie and Mountain View managed to make their final exchanges.

Big Spring was just as impressive in the 4x100- and 4x200-meter relays. The Lady Steers won both of those relay events by large margins, as well.

The BSHS 4x100-meter squad turned in a time of 42.84 seconds more than 6 seconds faster than the time the squad ran last week at the District 4-3A meet and won by 25 yards.

The BSHS 4x200-meter squad also posted a big victory. After running second on the first leg, the Lady Steers hit high gear on the final lap, sprinting to a 20-yard victory with a time of 1:43.31. Wylie was second at 1:47.14.

Roberson and sprinter Martha Lewis highlighted the Lady Steers' individual efforts. Both qualified for the Region I-3A Track and Field Championships in individual races. Only the top four finishers in each event advance to the regional meet, which will be held next Friday and Saturday at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Roberson, much like the BSHS relay teams, found little challenge in racing to an easy victory in the girls' 800-meter run. She finished the race in a time of 2:21.41 — almost 6 seconds faster than Mountain View's Emily Estrada, who placed second at 2:27.22.

Brittany Clay and Addie Jimenez also competed in the 800 for the Lady Steers. Clay placed seventh at 2:48.70, while Jimenez was eighth at 2:53.00.

Lewis punched a ticket to the regional meet with a third-place finish in the 100-meter dash.

She legged out a time of 13 seconds in the race, finishing behind Snyder's Miccah Wesley and Priscilla Guzman.

Lewis came back later to place fifth in the 200.

Karina Alvarado narrowly missed qualifying for the regional meet. She finished fifth in the 3,200-meter run, and sixth in the 1,600.

Ebony Zavala also finished fifth in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 50.61.

Kiana Ramsey was the only BSHS standout to score in the field events. She placed fifth in the high jump.

team crown with 131 points.

As impressive as Lopez's run in the 800 was, it might have been overshadowed by the team's effort in the 400- and 4x400-meter races.

Lopez and teammate Ian Gonzales gave the Steers 18 points with a 1-2 finish in the 400.

The two broke from the start and led the race throughout. Lopez won his second gold medal of the meet with a time of 49.90 seconds. Gonzales finishes just .28 seconds later, completing the course in a mark of 50.18.

Gonzales, Lorenzo Jones, Tobyn Tannehill and Lopez were just as impressive in the boys' 4x400-meter relay. The team cruised to an easy victory in the race,

completing the 4-lap race more than 20 yards ahead of its nearest competitor.
