## Council puts stamp on city pay increases

Big Spring city employees will have slightly wider than normal smiles on their faces when they get their first paychecks in June.

City council members put the final touches on a 6 percent across-the-board pay raises for all city employees by formally approving a revised pay schedule for police officers and firefighters during their Tuesday meeting.

The move was administrative in nature — the salary increase had been approved earlier this month, but a pay schedule had to be formally adopted for police officers and firefighters in accordance with civil service rules, City Manager Todd Darden said.

The 6 percent raise, coupled with another 6 percent pay increase last summer, will help bring local municipal salaries more in line with other West Texas cities and help stem a turnover rate that's seen more than half of the city's workforce leave within the past three years, officials

The raises take effect June 1 and will be reflected in city employees' June 13 paychecks, Darden said.

More raises may be in store for city employees in the near future — the city council will

"It's come to our attention that there are organizations contacting area businesses to solicit advertisements on Big Spring Steer themed T-shirts, posters, plastic footballs and similar items," said Chris Wigington, BSISD superintendent, in a written statement. "These organizations are portraying that their fundraising activities are endorsed by the school district."

## Relief route groundbreaking set Friday

A groundbreaking ceremony for the long-anticipated U.S. 87 Truck Relief Route around Big Spring will include appearances by top representatives from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and area U.S. and state representatives.

The groundbreaking is set for 10:30 a.m. Friday at Hangar 25 Air Museum, 1911 Apron Drive, and is sponsored by TxDOT, the city of



Big Spring and the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce.

Dignitaries scheduled to attend include U.S. Congressman Randy Neugebauer; State Representative Drew Darby; Texas Transportation Commissioner Fred Underwood; Lauren Garduño, Texas Department of Transportation

Howard County Judge Mark Barr; Big Spring Mayor Larry McLellan; Michael Reeves, Ports-to-Plains Trade Corridor Coalition President; and Bill Crooker, Ports-to-Plains/

TxDOT Road Hand. The four-lane, divided truck relief route is expected to help ease truck traffic in Administration; Big Spring in anticipation of increased traffic from trade between the United States, Mexico and Canada.

The 14-mile route will connect Highway 87 to Interstate 20, looping the west side of Big Spring and coming within a mile of the McMahon-Wrinkle Airport. Construction will include bridge, intersection connection, drainage

structures and landscaping.



## What NBC just doesn't get

**~**'ve always thought entrenched left-wing journalists in Washington needed their heads examined. Much to my satisfaction, it appears the

bosses of at least one Beltway anchor now agree. According to The

corporate media

**Washington Post** this week. NBC News hired a "psychological consultant" to examine why flailing "Meet the Press" moderator David Gregory has been bombing



in the ratings. The overpriced shrinks (NBC prefers the euphemism "brand consultants") came from the New York-based brand fixer-upper Elastic Strategy.

They interviewed Gregory's wife. They interrogated his friends. They crunched their numbers. They compiled their reports. And after all that, the "experts" are still scratching their noggins:

What's the matter with David Gregory? And why don't people like to watch him?

I could have saved the honchos at NBC News a lot of time and trouble. The first answer is: David Gregory is a phony. The second answer is: He's a jerk. And no amount of brand thera-

py and rehabilitation consulting can fix him.

Gregory's predecessor, Tim Russert, was highly respected on both sides of the political aisle. The former chief of staff for iconoclastic U.S. Sen. Daniel Moynihan turned "Meet the Press" into mandatory viewing for any American serious about politics and policy. Yes, he was liberal. But he never pretended to be anything he wasn't. He did his homework. He didn't pull punches. He helped enlighten the nation about our entitlement crisis. He conducted interviews, not one-sided partisan lectures.

Russert was also a decent man,

as so many warm eulogies across the ideological divide attested. I had a chance to meet him a few times as an intern in the videotape library of the Washington political unit at NBC News in 1992. He was always friendly and engaging. (Andrea Mitchell was a whole 'nother story. Gah.) Before I left to work for the Los Angeles Daily News, I drafted a little memo on suggestions to improve data collection and entry. I never expected acknowledgment. But Russert took the time to respond and thank me. A lowly intern. I never forgot that.

Gregory is the anti-Russert. His boorish behavior around D.C. is legendary — from his juvenile tantrums with the Bush press staff to his drunken radio appearances to his diva snit fits with innocent bystanders while filming news segments.

One of the most telling and notorious anecdotes involves Russert himself, who reportedly reprimanded Gregory in 2008 for going ballistic on a poor waitress while the two TV stars dined at a D.C. restaurant. But "Gregory still treats most of ... the newsroom like @#&%," an insider told the website Jossip. "Amazing how NBC cares more about food servers than about the people who have to deal with Gregory's arrogance every day." Since Gregory doesn't have the intellectual heft to carry in-depth interview segments the way Russert did, "Meet the Press" producers have reduced substantive exchanges to a few minutes and larded the rest of the show with fluff and stunts.

That means: If it's Sunday, it's "Meet the Jerk."

Last fall, Gregory the guncontrol activist masquerading as a Sunday talk-show journalist made headlines with his brazen hectoring of NRA CEO Wayne LaPierre — while illegally brandishing a 30-round ammunition magazine on national television. He has used the show to fawn over vulgar, misogynistic

"comedian" Bill Maher and to repeatedly browbeat Timothy Dolan, the archbishop of New York, over gay marriage.

As I've noted many times over 20-plus years in this business, the problem isn't bias. It's the pretense of non-bias. Gregory and his peers suffer from cognitive dissonant hack syndrome, a common affliction among incurable left-wing journalists who sanctimoniously pay lip service every day to neutrality and objectivity, while brazenly using their platforms to promote partisan political narratives.

Desperate NBC suits in denial tried to get Gregory to immerse himself more in social media to appeal to "younger viewers." But he detests the hoi polloi and refuses to respond to critics. You don't have to be a high-priced brand guru to know that for social media engagement to work, it requires an engaging personality to actually, you know, engage.

Another NBC muckety-muck gave his expert analysis on the network's David Gregory Problem: "You need to be who you are. We're trying to look at who David is."

Well, there's the rub, isn't it? Gregory, like many of his ilk, is a thin-skinned elite who lives in the Beltway bubble and can barely contain his contempt for his audience. With rare exceptions, the supposed watchdogs of Washington journalism are lapdogs for the establishment with "Don't You Know Who I Am?" egos as big as the politicians they sidle up to every weekend.

To the chagrin of NBC and its brand EMTs, Americans have discovered an effective cure: the "off" button on their remotes.

## Rand Paul makes a muddle

et some candidates seek the middle. Rand Paul is comfortable in the muddle.

Some have said the junior senator from Kentucky is the most "intriguing" of the possible Republican presidential candidates for 2016.

But if he is the most intriguing, it is not because he is the most interesting. It is because it's so hard to figure out just what he is saying.

Abortion? That ought to be easy for a conservative such as Paul, right?

Not so fast there.

"I think the debate is about when life begins," Paul said, stating the problem but not the solution, something he has become very adept at doing. "Is it OK for an 8-pound baby to be aborted one week before delivery? If the mother says she's anxious and wants to 'kill myself,' you can have the abortion one day before it's due." Paul was speaking at the Uni-

versity of Chicago in an event sponsored by its Institute of Politics. His questioner was the institute's founder and former Obama aide, David Axelrod. And Axelrod tried to pin Paul down several times. But it was like trying to pin down quicksand.

Axelrod asked Paul to state when he thinks life begins. "My personal religious belief is

that life begins at the very beginning," Paul said. He then said that currently,

the abortion debate in America is between those who believe in "all life and no abortion" and those who believe in "all abortion and no life."

"I think the law will come down in between," Paul said. "I think the public is in the

middle."

Or in a muddle as to just what Paul believes the law should be. But how about affirmative ac-

tion and college admission, seeing as that has been in the news this week?

"There was a time when we needed special protections, but we've come a long way," Paul said. "But I think a person ought to be accepted on character or scores."

But don't some children suffer because they go to schools in poor neighborhoods and get a second-rate education?

"If poverty is causing lower scores," Paul said, "let's fix the problem." Politics can include the art

of saying nothing — some men have been elected president by saying nothing at all but saying it well — but it is hard to see Paul surviving the modern-day presidential primary meat grinder of debate after debate with a campaign based on platitudes. Asked about U.S. intervention

– a sticky issue with libertarians, who usually favor no intervention unless terrorists are actually landing troops on the shores of New Jersey — Paul dived quickly into the muddle once again. He said the argument is be-

tween two extremes, "those who would fight nowhere" and those who would fight "everywhere all the time." But is that really true? Is it

really that simple? And what foreign policy would President Paul derive from that keen analysis? "Let's try not to be Pollyanna about making the world 'safe for democracy," Paul said, using

a phrase coined by Woodrow Wilson 97 years ago and rarely invoked today. But wouldn't Paul intervene to prevent an atrocity overseas like the Holocaust, even if U.S. secu-

rity were not at stake? Axelrod

asked.

"Haiti, after the earthquake, yeah," Paul said. "And atrocity in Africa? Yeah, we can help to corral other countries."

But a real problem, Paul said,

is how much the United States wastes every year on foreign aid. "Government-to-government aid is the history of corruption,"

Paul said. "Almost invariably, the money is stolen. We should vastly reduce foreign aid, especially to countries where they burn our flag."

Moving right along, how about pollution?

"We should minimize pollution," Paul said. "But we have gone completely crazy with pollution laws."

It was not all Looney Tunes. At one point, Paul quoted Marx. Not Karl but Groucho.

"Politics is the art of looking for trouble, finding it, misdiagnosing it and then misapplying the wrong remedies," Paul said, giving Groucho full credit.

But I think Paul believes this joke is revealed truth. And he believes that it is safest to not look for trouble, to make no real diagnoses and apply no remedies whatsoever. That way, you offend the least number of people.

It may not solve any of America's problems, but it could get a guy elected.

"I don't say that the president is a bad person," Paul said, referring to Barack Obama. "But I worry about the next president and the next."



## Brand names in NY standardized tests vex parents

NEW YORK (AP) -'Just Do It" has been a familiar Nike slogan for years, but some parents are wondering what it was doing on some of New York's Common standardized English tests.

Beer and Life Savers showed up on the tests more than a million students in grades 3 through 8 took this month, leading to speculation it was some form of product placement

advertising. New York state education officials and the test publisher say the brand references were not paid product placement but just happened to be contained in previously published passages selected for the tests.

Some critics aren't so sure and questioned why specific brand names would be mentioned at all.

"It just seems so unnecessary," said Josh Golin, associate director of the Campaign for Commercial-Free Childhood, which monitors marketing directed at children.

"It would be horrible Nike to express their if they were getting paid for it," he said. "But even if they're not, it's taking something that should not be a commercial experience and commercializing it."

The test questions Brands including have not been made Barbie, iPod, Mug Root public, and teachers and principals are barred from discussing them. But teachers posting anonymously on education blogs have complained that students were confused by the brand names, which were accompanied by trademark symbols.

> The Nike question was about being a risk taker and included the line, "'Just Do It' is a registered trademark of Nike," according to students who took the test.

Sam Pirozzolo, of Staten Island, whose fifth-grader encountered the Nike question, said there was apparently no reason for such a specific brand.

"I'm sure they could have used a historical figure who took risks and invented things," Pirozzolo said. "I'm sure they could have found something other than

point." Deborah Poppe, of

West Hempstead, Long Island, said her eighthgrade son was similarly puzzled by a question, which drew complaints for a second straight year, about a busboy who failed to clean some spilled root beer — Mug Root Beer, to be exact, a registered trademark of PepsiCo.

"Why are they trying to sell me something during the test?" she quoted her son as saying. "He's bright enough to realize that it was almost like a commercial."

The use of brand names was one of several complaints raised by some educators and parents about the statewide tests, aligned to the Common Core standards intended increase academic rigor. Some contend they are too difficult and don't measure what students are actually learning.

While such general complaints about Common Core tests have arisen elsewhere, advocates said the prevalence of brand names appears to be specific to New York.

Representatives of the New York State **Education Department** and Pearson, the education publishing giant with a \$32 million fiveyear contract to develop New York's tests, said the companies did not pay for the exposure.

## Mavs even series with Spurs, 1-1

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Blowing their playoff opener turned out to be great therapy for the Dallas Mavericks.

Eighth-seeded Dallas rolled to a 113-92 victory over San Antonio on Wednesday night, snapping a 10-game skid against the Spurs and evening their first-round series at a game apiece.

Dallas didn't relent in Game 2 after watching a 10-point lead evaporate in the final eight minutes of the series opener Sunday.

"Game 1 actually helped a lot more than today," Mavericks forward Dirk Nowitzki said. "We were down after Game 1, but in this building to be up 10 with six or seven minutes left, I think that gave us a lot of confidence coming into this one. Just keep executing the game plan."

It was Dallas' first playoff victory since June 12, 2011, when it rebounded from an 0-2 deficit to defeat the Miami Heat for the NBA title.

Monta Ellis scored 21 points, Shawn Marion added 20 points, Nowitzki had 16, Devin Harris had 18 and Calderon 12 for Dallas, which never trailed after the opening minutes of the second quarter.

Manu Ginobili had 27 points, Tony Parker added 12 and Tim Duncan 11 for the Spurs, who did not have any other player score more than seven points.

"They beat us in every aspect of the game," Ginobili said. "They played harder. Our defense was soft (and) not as aggressive as theirs. Not that I don't expect them to play hard. We know they are a tough team, but having such a poor performance in the playoffs both-

McGrady signs minor league baseball contract

SUGAR LAND, Texas (AP) — Former NBA star Tracy McGrady signed Wednesday to pitch for the Sugar Land Skeeters in the independent Atlantic League.

The 6-foot-8 righthander officially reported to spring camp last week and made his first scrimmage appearance against Alvin Community College on April 16. In an inning of work, he allowed one run on three hits with no walks

and no strikeouts. 34-year-old McGrady spent 16 years in the NBA with the Toronto Raptors, Orlando Magic, Houston Rockets, New York Knicks, Detroit Pistons and Atlanta Hawks. The seventime All-Star won two scoring titles.

Aldridge became the first player with consecutive games of 43 points games in the playoffs since Tracy McGrady did it in April 2003 after scoring a career-high and franchise playoff-record 46 in an overtime win in Game 1.
